Rail-station project gets \$10 million

Officials announced Friday that the Newark Regional Transportation Center project off South College Avenue in Newark would receive \$10 million in additional federal funding.

The latest federal TIGER Grant funds are an addition to the \$2.8 million in TIGER funds the project received in 2010, said DelDOT spokesman Brett Taylor.

The project, which will cost an estimated \$26 million to complete, is a joint venture between WILMAPCO, DelDOT, Delaware Transit Corporation, the City of Newark, New Castle County, the University of Delaware and the Delaware Economic Development Office.

Taylor said the existing Newark Rail Station site would undergo significant renovations and eventually include a ticket kiosk, public restrooms, a handicap-accessible platform and expanded parking facilities, over the next four years.

He said the cooperating agencies are working off of funds from the previous grant to finish a preliminary environmental and engineering assessment of the site, scheduled for completion in July 2013. See **RAIL STATION**, page 3 »»

was taken aback.

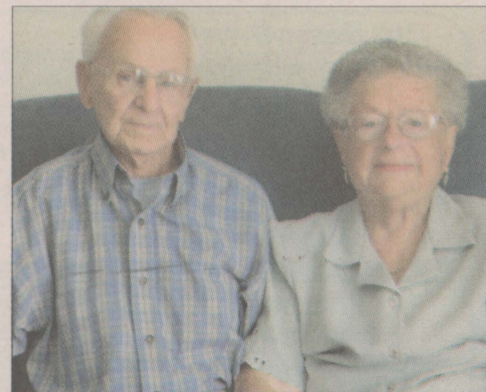
"We wondered why they were there," she said.

City to host fireworks at UD July 4

The City of Newark will host its annual Liberty Day Festival and fireworks display starting at 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 4.

The event will be held in the University of Delaware Athletic Complex, on the former practice football field to the left when facing Delaware Stadium.

Admission is free and all are welcome. Visitors can park for free in the lots surrounding the university's Athletic Complex.

Vendors will be selling food

and drinks, and craft items will also be available for sale. Visitors are encouraged to bring a blanket or chairs to sit on during the event, said Dana Johnston, the city's community-affairs officer. Pets should be left at home as the fireworks could scare them, she added.

Two bands will perform during the festival: Howard Valentine and the Prophets of Love will go on at 6 p.m., and Club Phred will take the stage at 7:45.

The fireworks display will start at dusk – between 9 and 9:30, Johnston said.

A steady flow of people

usually attend the festival between 6 and 9 p.m., and then between 8 and 9:15, the lawn fills up with spectators for the fireworks display, said Joe Spadafino, the city's Parks and Recreation director.

"We usually get between 25,000 and 30,000 people; they fill up the UD Athletic Center," Spadafino said, adding, "The fireworks company does a good job of changing up their fireworks display, so I'm looking forward to seeing what they come up with this year."

The city has been putting on the fireworks show for 15

years, he said. It has hosted the annual Liberty Day Festival each Fourth of July since 1976, the year of the country's bicentennial.

"We started off having (the festival) at West Park Elementary School and then White Clay Creek State Park," Spadafino said. "Now

it's in the current location because the number of people has grown so much."

The city of Newark funds the fireworks, with help from corporate sponsors.

If it rains, the fireworks display only will be held at dusk on Thursday, July 5. If there is questionable weather, call the

city's Leisure Time Hot Line at 302-366-7147 to find out about any cancellations.

City offices and Alderman's Court will be closed Wednesday due to the holiday. No yard waste will be collected Wednesday but the trash and recycling schedule for the week will remain the same.

The couple has one son who lives nearby in Delaware and another who moved to Massachusetts.

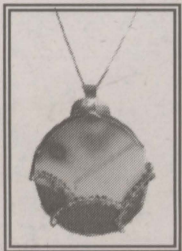
The Coopers are often asked how to stay married for 65 years, Agnes said.

Flower-shop owner to host First Amendment Day event

We've all got a special something that really sets us off. A lover's bad habits, a leaky faucet, a neighbor's choice of Sunday-morning music: these are just some of the things that can try men's souls.

Modern society's dictates only allow us to spout off about our problems for so long before a rant becomes a nuisance and people start backing away. But one local florist is planning to give locals the rare chance to air their grievances in front of an audience this weekend.

John Mayer, owner of Kirk's Flowers in Suburban Plaza Shopping Center, will host his first First Amendment Day event Saturday, and he is hoping citizens of all ages will

show up and speak to the crowd about whatever's irking them. Each participant will be given five minutes to speak.

"You can speak on anything you want: food, politics, what kind of toys you play with, your wife, your husband — whatever you want to talk about, you can," Mayer said.

His only rules: "No vulgarity or threats."

He said that since it's an election year, he figured citizens might want the chance to publicly talk about things that are important to them.

The three-hour event will be held in Suburban Plaza, at the intersection of Route 4 and Elkton Road, probably in front of the former Gore store, to the left

of the center's main entrance, he said.

Mayer is planning his own short diatribe on a city ordinance that requires his business to maintain a water cooler, which he believes is unnecessary.

Despite its potentially political nature, Mayer wants Saturday's event to be a lighthearted affair.

"Hopefully we'll have a real positive day," he said.

"After that, we'll begin the final engineering and construction, and we'll have three years to complete that," according to the terms of the most recent grant, Taylor said.

Phase One of the project will like-

ly include realignment of the Norfolk Southern freight-rail tracks to allow for safety upgrades to the passenger-rail platforms, Taylor said.

"That would hopefully improve (Norfolk Southern's) operations also, in terms of using their property more efficiently," he said.

He said Phase Two of the project would most likely bring more frequent train stops to the Newark station.

The station currently only serves passengers heading north-bound, but Taylor said planners are in discussions with Maryland

officials about the possibility of extending MARC service north to Newark.

"Currently there's no commuter-rail service from Newark to Perryville," he said. "We think that will be a great benefit to the students in those areas."

Colorful admissions director will retire from UD Friday

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When about 3,850 incoming freshmen descend upon the city to begin their college lives at University of Delaware this August, one of the people most influential in bringing them to the school will be starting his first semester as a retiree.

Lou Hirsch, who has worked in the university's Office of Admissions since 1984, will step down from his post as director of admissions this week. His last day will be Friday.

Hirsch said recently that he was retiring "for the obvious reasons — I'm an old person, and as much as I love this job, it's long hours," he said.

He still plans to do some consulting work, but for the most part, he is looking forward to pursuing other interests.

"I'll be staying in Newark and living about a block and a half away from my office," he said. "Main Street has a wonderful collection of restaurants and shops, so I look forward to enjoying those. I enjoy living in this town."

José Aviles, who formerly served as director of admissions at Millersville University, will replace Hirsch.

Hirsch, who grew up in New Jersey, graduated from Brandeis University and received a master's degree

from Columbia. He came to Delaware in 1984 as a recruiter for the university's Honors Program. Over the years, his role expanded to encompass more general undergraduate admissions.

For those who work in admissions, the year is divided, he said: much of the fall and spring are spent visiting high schools and talking students through the process. In the winter, department members "hunker down" and pore over thousands of applications from high-school students, he said.

"We start off by dividing the application pool into two parts: kids from Delaware and kids from outside Delaware," Hirsch said. "If you're from Delaware, you have a significantly better chance at getting into UD."

As part of the school's commitment to Delawareans, he said, the university fills 65 to 70 percent of its roughly 4,000 openings each year with applicants from Delaware.

"The vast majority of kids from out-of-state are academically qualified (to attend the school), because our reputation is so good. But their chances of acceptance are lower."

So what does it take to become a Blue Hen? Hirsch, who has been on the front lines of the cutting-room floor for nearly three decades, said the qualifying factors are not as cut-and-dry as one might believe.

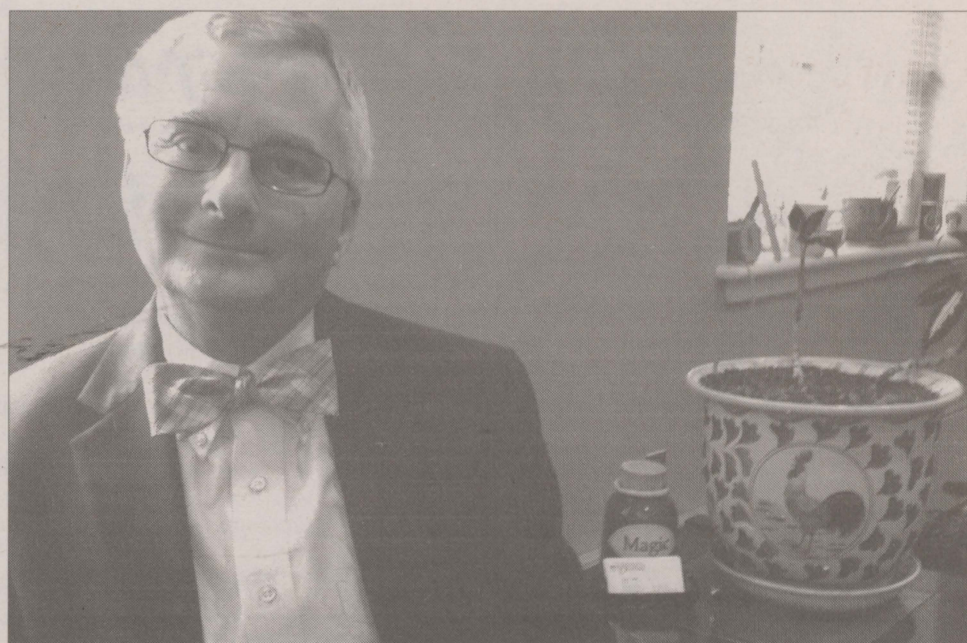
SELECTION STANDARDS

Sure, a strong GPA and high SAT scores are helpful, but they are mere numbers in a selection process that places a much greater value on the human spirit.

"In college, so much education comes from outside the classroom — from interactions with other students," Hirsch said. "So what we in admissions ask (ourselves) is, 'Will teachers enjoy having this person in class?' 'What will other kids learn from this person?' We're imagining it's 2 a.m. in the residence hall, and there's kids gathered around half-eaten boxes of pepperoni pizza, and what would this (applicant) bring to that experience? These are the factors that help you bring in the most interesting human beings. And our goal is to find the 3,850 most interesting human beings that we can encourage to accept our offer of admissions."

Jeff Rivell, deputy director of the Office of Admissions who has worked with Hirsch for about 26 years, said he values Hirsch's "holistic" approach to the applicant-selection process.

"He's been committed to finding out the interests and desires of the students, and wants to make sure there's joy in the college search," Rivell said. "It's such a defining moment — to pick a school that you're going to invest in for four years — so it's not just about the money; it's about the investment, and he's very sensitive to that."

A LIVELY LEGACY

One of the most memorable legacies Hirsch will leave behind, Rivell said, is his annual report to the university's Board of Trustees regarding the upcoming year's crop of new freshmen.

Before Hirsch's final report to the trustees, on May 8, university president Patrick Harker told the audience he would miss hearing Hirsch's annual presentations, "which are more like productions."

"Lou gives us the statistics one has to give — the SAT scores, the GPAs and the demographics," Harker said. "But it's all just prelude to the stories: the oboe player, the first-generation college student, the athlete and the math-lete."

Hirsch, donning a bowtie and jacket, stepped up to the podium and proceeded to bring the incoming Class of 2016 to life.

He read moving excerpts from application essays of: a varsity-soccer-team captain who had befriended a nerdy

kid no one else liked; a girl who played first violin in the all-county orchestra; a political-science major who, while munching on cereal one morning, realized that if everyone in the city turned in cereal-box tops, then that could make a real difference in the world; and a girl whose class had recuperated a pidgeon,

amazing student I have ever taught."

His presentation was so moving that one could almost imagine it accompanied by a Beethoven symphony rising to a forceful crescendo.

Hirsch said later that the application essay is really an applicant's chance to rise to top of the so-called heap.

and who equated watching it fly away to her own feelings about heading off for college.

Hirsch quoted a self-proclaimed Navy brat who had written, "Somewhere between the moving vans and the flight suits, I found books."

And from one teacher's letter of recommendation, he read: "When he steps away from the chorus to sing a solo, the rest of us hold our breath."

Another teacher wrote of her student, "He is the most

"The biggest mistake applicants make is, they assume that because they haven't done anything dramatic by age 17 — haven't earned an Olympic medal — that they have nothing to write about," he said. "(But) what works best is kids talking about things that are very ordinary in their lives — music, SGA, sports, or whatever it is — but writing about them in a way that shows us they've thought about why they do those things, and what they've learned."

Man arrested for robbing Dunkin Donuts

Third robbery of a city business in five days

Officials from Newark Police Department and Cecil County Sheriff's Office arrested an Elkton man around 7 p.m. last Wednesday in connection with the armed robbery of the Dunkin Donuts on Elkton Road in Newark that happened earlier that morning.

Police charged Jacob Harding, 22, of Elkton, with first-degree robbery and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

Police said that around 7:53 a.m. Wednesday, June 20, a white male suspect wearing a gray sweatshirt with the hood pulled over his head, a white baseball cap, long black shorts, gloves, black shoes and a dark-colored backpack entered the store, at 1142 Elkton Road.

He sat down at a table, and after several minutes, approached the register and placed an order with the 38-year-old male clerk. When the clerk opened the register, the suspect displayed a handgun, reached into the till, removed an undisclosed amount of cash, and fled the store.

Investigators used video surveillance and a phone tip to link Harding to the crime.

Newark Police Department detectives, with the assistance of the Cecil County Sheriff's Office, executed an arrest and search warrant of Harding's Elkton home and took him into custody without incident.

Harding is being held at the Cecil County Detention Center pending his extradition back to Delaware.

Wednesday's Dunkin Donuts robbery was the second to happen at the Elkton Road Dunkin Donuts within 48 hours, and the third armed robbery to occur in or just outside a city business in five days.

Newark Police Department spokesman Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda said police do not believe the robberies are linked because the descriptions of the suspects do not match.

Around 3:45 a.m. Tuesday, June 19, according to police, a woman had made a purchase at the Dunkin Donuts store, walked back across the parking lot and got back in her SUV when two black men in dark hooded sweatshirts approached the driver's side of her vehicle, displayed a handgun and demanded she hand over her purse, which she did. The suspects then fled on foot towards McIntyre Drive. The suspects are still at large.

The other robbery happened just before 10 a.m. Saturday, June 16 at the SAS Cupcakes store on Main Street.

In that incident, police said, a 19-year-old female store employee had just opened the store when a Hispanic male suspect entered the store, displayed a large knife and

demanded cash. The suspect took money and the victim's cell phone and fled out the front door in an unknown direction.

The suspect is still at large. He is described as a Hispanic male with a large, muscular build and a buzzed haircut. He was wearing a black-and-red shirt, dark pants, black sunglasses, and had tattoos on his arms and neck.

Bryda said the city is still below where it was last year at this time in terms of robberies, and that this week's spike in business robberies seems to be an anomaly.

But he said employees and city residents should always stay aware of their surroundings, just in case.

"The big thing is to start off with is just, know your surroundings and know what's going on around you," he said. If someone does confront you and ask for money, he said, "don't resist. Give them what they want. Your property is replaceable; you are not."

Another important thing to remember if you are robbed or mugged, Bryda said, is to call 9-1-1 immediately.

"In many cases, people call a relative first or call someone else first" because they are shaken up and want to talk to someone they know about what just happened, he said.

But the first thing a victim should do is call the police.

"The quicker we can respond to it, the better chance we have of catching the suspect," Bryda said.

"We know it's traumatizing, but call us first."

Also, victims should try to notice the color of the assailant's clothing, any unusual markings, and, if possible, which direction he or she headed off in, and what type of vehicle he or she was driving.

Sparrow Run fire ruled arson

The Delaware State Fire Marshal's Office has ruled that a building fire that happened last Wednesday on Brookmont Drive in Bear was arson.

Christiana Fire Company was alerted to the fire around 2 a.m. Wednesday and responding firefighters found heavy smoke and flames coming from the building, said Chief Deputy Fire Marshal Robert Fox.

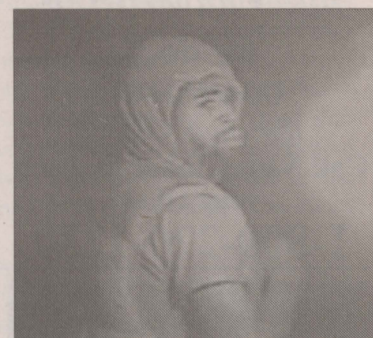
State Fire Marshal deputies were also called to the scene to investigate, and they eventually determined that the fire was arson, he said.

The investigation revealed several other incidents of criminal mischief to vehicles and other buildings in the area, Fox said. He would not comment further on the nature of those crimes.

The fire caused about \$80,000 in damages to the building, which Fox said is a townhouse that had been turned into an office. The building is not a residence, he said, but would not release any more details about the nature of the business conducted in the office.

No one was injured in the fire, he said.

Castle County Police are working together to solve these crimes. The agencies are requesting the public's assistance in identifying a person of interest in the photo above.

The photo was taken from surveillance video taken at the scene, Fox said. He would not comment further on the video's source or what else transpires in the video.

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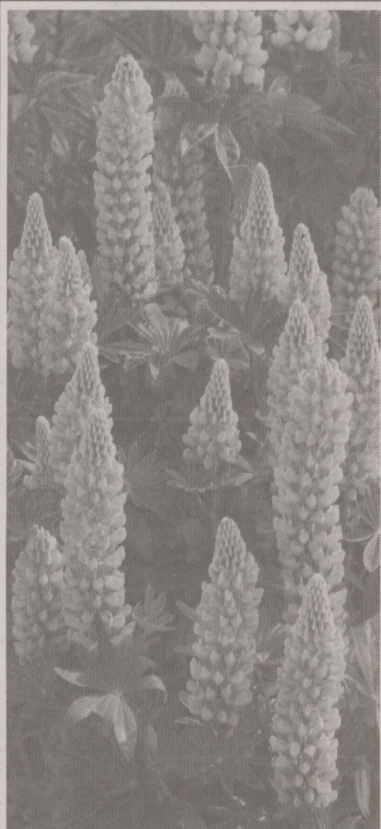

Newark gas station robbed

Newark teacher arrested for allegedly hitting student

Delaware State Police have arrested a 31-year-old teacher following an incident in which she struck a student in her classroom.

The investigation into the incident began on Wednesday, March 7 after

Delaware State Police Youth Aid Unit detectives were contacted by administrators at the Delaware Autistic Program in the 100 block of Brennan Drive in Newark, police said. Detectives were advised that a witness had come forward stating they had observed a teacher at the school, Danielle Finlay, strike a 17-year-old male student in the head while inside of her classroom because the student was making loud noises.

The witness further advised that once the student continued making the noises, Finlay struck him a second time with an empty water bottle. The victim was not injured.

She has been charged with two counts of offensive touching.

Finlay turned herself in to detectives Thursday morning. She was arraigned at JP Court 2 and released on her own recognizance.

Man finds human skull near Pea Patch Island

Delaware State Police detectives are investigating the discovery of a human skull found about 4 feet from the shore of Pea Patch Island Sunday.

Police spokesman Cpl. Jeffrey Hale said Monday that Delaware State Police detectives were called to Carney's Point, N.J. around 6 p.m. Sunday in reference to a New Jersey man who had found a human skull in the water off the island, in Delaware City.

The man told detectives he, along with his daughter and her friends, had gone on his boat to the island with plans to go swimming when he found the skull in the water about 4 feet from shore. He said he checked the area for other remains but did not find any. He took the skull back to

Carney's Point with him and contacted the police.

The skull was turned over to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner for possible identification.

Delaware State Police detectives responded back to Pea Patch Island earlier Monday to conduct a search for other remains, but found none, Hale said.

Burglar pushes in window AC unit, enters home, steals items

Newark Police are investigating a burglary that occurred sometime between noon and 1:15 p.m. June 21 on Benny Street.

Police spokesman Cpl. Mark Farrall said an unknown suspect or suspects pushed in a window unit and entered the residence, which was unoccupied at the time, and removed cash, a laptop and a small safe. The crimes are classified as burglary, criminal mischief and theft. There are no suspects at this time.

Car stolen from residence while owner on vacation

Sometime between June 16 and June 23, an unknown suspect or suspects stole a 1997 red Honda Civic from in front of a victim's home on the 800 block of Wharton Drive in Newark. The victim was on vacation and returned to find the car had been stolen, said Newark Police Department spokesman Cpl. Mark Farrall.

Man pesters police, resists arrest

Newark Police arrested Kenneth Holmes, 20, of New Castle last week and charged him with resisting arrest after Holmes interfered while an officer was attempting to ticket another driver, said spokesman Cpl. Mark Farrall.

Farrall said police were working a routine seat-belt-enforcement operation and had pulled over a driver for not wearing her seat belt when Holmes approached the driver's car and started questioning her about why she was getting a ticket.

Holmes was blocking the way of the officer trying to issue the ticket, Farrall said. Eventually, the officer attempted to take Holmes into custody. Holmes resisted, but the officer was finally able to handcuff him, and transported him to police headquarters, Farrall said.

Holmes was arraigned at New Castle County Justice of the Peace court on outstanding warrants for failing to appear in court for other traffic-related offenses. He was also charged with resisting arrest for the incident in Newark.

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City to pay legal fees for planning commissioner

The city will reimburse Planning Commissioner Angela Dressel for \$750 in legal fees she incurred during a board of ethics hearing in March.

Open-government advocate John Flaherty filed a complaint against Dressel, alleging she violated ethics by voting on a controversial proposal concerning Newark Charter School. Dressel is a teacher at the school, and her husband serves as president of its board of directors.

Dressel, who was represented by attorney Mark Sisk, was cleared of any wrongdoing.

Council Jerry Clifton brought up the issue of reimbursement at Monday's council meeting.

"If we don't do it for someone who was found not guilty, I don't know why anyone would serve on a board," Clifton said.

No formal vote was taken, but council seemed to unanimously support reimbursement, and interim City Manager Carol Houck said that was enough direction for her to start the reimbursement process.

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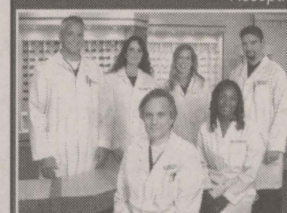

UD sophomore on U.S. World Cup rugby team

All the talk in the sports world these days is of the London Olympics, Euro 2012 and LeBron James finally winning an NBA title.

But for rugby fans anywhere in the world, all eyes and ears are on the Junior World Cup Trophy, being contested at Murray Rugby Park Stadium in Salt Lake City, Utah. The event, held June 18-30, includes eight teams from around the world made up of players under the age of 20 from each country's top rugby programs.

University of Delaware sophomore Glen Thommes is one of 27 members of Team USA. He's the first Blue Hen to ever play in the event.

"I was extremely excited," Thommes said during a phone interview between games. "It's hard to put into words. It's the dream of every champion in sports to play at a high level. I had to try out several times and so it was such a relief when I made it. It was a combination of excitement and relief because it was always something I dreamed of doing, ever since I started playing."

Thommes' rugby career began his sophomore year at Salesianum when he decided to give the spring sport a try after being cut by the baseball team as a freshman.

"My buddies talked me into playing rugby and so I figured I'd give it a shot," said Thommes, who also played football and wrestled at Sallies. "And I fell in love with it."

During the summers, Thommes played for the Delaware Destroyers and the EPRU All-Star rugby teams. It was there he honed his skills and became a natural fit for the Blue Hens' top rugby team as a freshman, where he quickly

learned he would have to take his game to an entirely different level to be successful.

"The size of the players and the pace of the game," Thommes, who is majoring in mechanical engineering, noted of the difference between the levels. "If you make a mistake in college, people capitalize on it more than in high school. In college, you need to know what you are doing because

it is more skill-based, as well as players having more strength and speed."

On the field, the 6-foot-2-inch, 207-pound Thommes is a flanker, and said his main job is "to do a lot of rucking," which happens when a player is tackled and both sides engage over top of him, forming a ruck while two players are fighting for possession. Thommes also has to try and get to the ball first when it is swung wide following a scrum. Delaware rugby coach Bjorn Haglid knew that Thommes was special as soon as he saw him play in high school.

"Glen is an exceptionally talented individual who was heavily recruited by other programs," Haglid said. "[Even being as tall as he is], with his speed and endurance he can out run smaller players. His best ability is to understand what he needs to do and his overall focus on the game and his impact on it."

Thommes' skills helped the U.S. jump out to a 2-0 start early in the tournament with wins over Tonga and Chile. The U.S. then clinched first place in Pool A with a win over Russia Tuesday night, putting them in the championship game on June 30 against Japan. Regardless of the final outcome, Thommes said he will always cherish the chance he has had to be part of such a prestigious team.

"Making this team is a huge

accomplishment for me personally," Thommes said. "I have been working my tail off and putting in the extra hours of work to be the best player I can, and this achievement is a sign that all of my hard work is starting to pay off."

Haglid said Thommes' experience playing in the tournament will also benefit the Blue Hens.

"What he is learning over the summer and what he will bring back in experience will greatly help the team," Haglid said. "We finished the season ranked No. 13 in the nation and with players like Glen, we will finish even better, if not at the top."

Despite the accolades, Thommes is determined to do even more to improve his own game.

"Although I'm very happy with [making this team] I am not content or comfortable where I am," Thommes explained. "This is a stepping stone to bigger and better things, and there will always be parts of my game that need work. Nobody ever reaches the best they can be, and to get complacent at this stage would be a waste of all the hard work I've put in so far."

So far, that hard work has paid off, now on both sides of the country.

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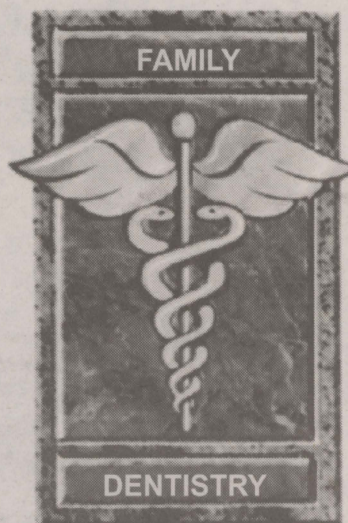
Track stars earn all-state honors

It's a jungle out there!

A kangaroo, an elephant and two monkeys made their debut on Main Street this month in a new jungle-themed mural created by local artist Dragonfly Leathrum.

Leathrum, 42, created the mural in Traders Alley between Cameras Etc. and Iron Hill Brewery with some help from her art students at Layton Prep and her private students from other local schools.

"This mural is mainly for the kids," Leathrum said. "It has animals and bright colors."

Leathrum said she hopes the mural draws attention to its surrounding stores, such as Village Imports Fair Trade. The mural's colors were inspired by the Subway

sign that hangs above it, she said.

Leathrum has painted eight other murals in the area. To paint a mural in town, she has to obtain permission from the Newark Arts Alliance, the City of Newark, and in this case, landlord Paul Schlosser. Leathrum said there is usually a questionnaire that asks community members what they want in a mural, but the idea and design for this one were all hers.

"I wanted something a little more colorful and abstract than I usually do," she said.

Leathrum said she thought about things that would be fun and make her happy. She decided on the animal silhouettes and big blocks of color.

Since there was not a lot of detail work in this mural, she said the students

weren't too intimidated to help paint it. Instead of class, her students had the option of painting the mural for an hour every day. They worked on it for about two weeks, during which they cleaned the wall, prepped it with a white coat, drew the design and layered on four coats of paint.

"There's nothing like painting on a public wall and getting paid for it," she said.

Some of Leathrum's other murals are in the Newark Community Center, by Panera Bread and across from the Newark Shopping Center.

The most popular part of this mural has been the kangaroo, and she said she's been asked a few times why she put a kangaroo in a jungle.

She answered simply, "I like kangaroos, man."

Now they're cooking!

Food Bank's culinary-arts students get a taste of the catering world

Eleven students graduated from The Culinary School at the Food Bank of Delaware last Tuesday.

Guest speaker Robert Egger, founder of the DC Central Kitchen and author

of "Begging for Change," praised the students during a graduation ceremony held at the food bank's Newark facility. "You all have already changed lives by making the choice to come here," he said. "You don't have to choose between making money and doing good; you can do both."

Under the instruction of Food Bank of Delaware Chef Instructor Mark Saunders, students have spent the past 14 weeks developing their passion for the culinary arts. From proper knife-handling techniques to sautéing and food-safety skills,

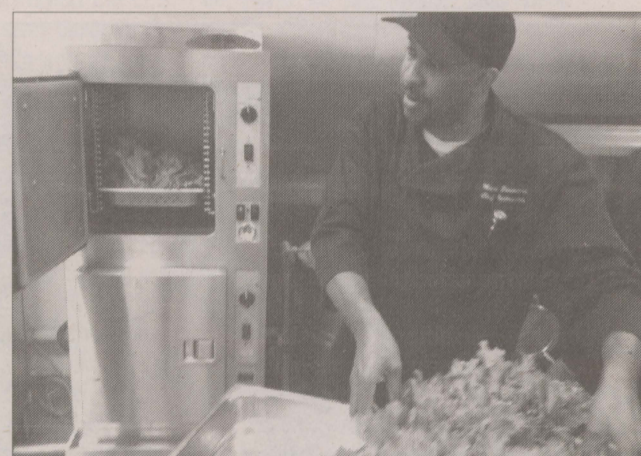

the students learned many of the skills necessary to land jobs in the culinary arts.

And they can also include "real-world catering experience" to their resumes.

Through the Food Bank of Delaware's recently established Culinary Catering program, students in the school got a taste of what it's like to fulfill actual high-volume food orders and serve the dishes they've prepared at events for local private groups, businesses and organizations.

Community groups are invited to order meals from the catering program's menu, which includes hors d'oeuvres, platters, salads, side dishes, boxed lunches, deli trays and desserts, starting at about \$5 per person.

Revenue earned through the catering program helps fund student scholarships to The Culinary School, said Kim Kostas, the food bank's com-

munity-relations manager.

Since The Culinary School opened in 2002, adult Delawareans have trained there with hopes of eventually landing jobs in the food-service industry. Most of the culinary students come from disadvantaged backgrounds, and are referred to the school from prison re-entry programs and the state Department of Labor, Kostas said.

Students receive 14 weeks of hands-on culinary training through the school, based in the Food Bank of Delaware's facility on Garfield Way off Route 72 in Newark.

The school hosts three, 14-week sessions per year with about 13 students enrolled in each session. About 235 students have graduated from The Culinary School since the program started 10 years ago.

Many of the students go on to work in corporate cafeterias through partnerships the Food Bank has with Sodexo and Sherm's Catering, which

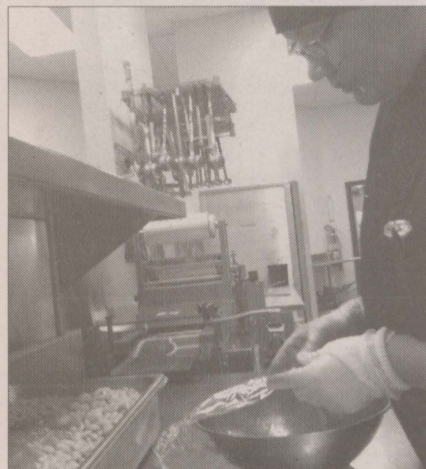
serves the café in the New Castle County government building, Kostas said.

"Through a partnership, they take students in for internships and then in many cases, hire them after they've graduated from the program," she said.

The catering program is an extension of the school; students work together, along with Saunders, to fulfill catering orders. The students

catered the Plein Air Coastal Delaware event in Rehoboth Beach on May 11, and the Wilmington Grand Prix cycling event on May 19.

The photos on this page were taken earlier this spring while Saunders and his students were busy prepping food for the Food Bank's annual banquet, an elaborate gathering of more than 150 volunteers and donors.

Out of the Attic

Old Stone Church façade

This week's Out of the Attic item is an April 20, 2007 photograph of the façade of the Old Stone Church on West Main Street just west of South College Avenue.

This portion of the historic church was retained, while the rest of the building was razed to make way for construction of the Trabant University Center at the University of Delaware.

The stone First Presbyterian Church was completed in 1872. "New-school" Presbyterians began meeting in 1835, and an "old-school" Presbyterian congregation was organized in 1839. Each group built a church in 1843.

The "new-school" First Presbyterian Church was built south of Main Street between Depot Road (South College Avenue) and Academy Street. The "old-school" Village Presbyterian Church was built at Chapel and Main Streets.

In 1860, the new- and old-school congregations united as the First Church.

A year later, the vacant Village Church was offered to the Methodists to use while they rebuilt when their 10-year-old Main Street building burned.

In 1868, Charles Murphy purchased the again-vacant Village Church and donated it to the Catholic Diocese of



Wilmington. The building was consecrated as St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church.

In the 1950s, the First Presbyterian Church decided to relocate from the building on the edge of "downtown" to a new "brick church on the hill." In 1965, the congregation occupied their new facilities on Nottingham Road and vacated and sold the downtown stone church to the University.
