





## Soil Bank Closed To New Contracts For Reserve Plan

There will be no sign-up of additional land or contracts under the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve this fall. William H. Reynolds, chairman Delaware Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said this today in response to inquiries from farmers regarding the status of the program.

Reynolds also said that program contracts which expire in 1960 or later are no longer eligible to be extended for an additional period of years.

"Under the Soil Bank Act enacted in May, 1956," Mr. Reynolds explained, "The Secretary of Agriculture was authorized to enter into Conservation Reserve contracts with producers during the five-year period 1956-60."

The sign-up under the 1960 program was held last fall, so that farmers would know in advance of the cropping season whether their land would be accepted into the Conservation Reserve. Since the authorization to enter into new contracts has not been extended beyond 1960, there will be no sign-up this fall.

"Farmers should understand, however, that the existing contracts for 1960 and previous years will remain in effect and payments will continue to be made under them for the period of the contracts."

There are 284 Conservation Reserve contracts in effect this year in Delaware, involving a total acreage of 18,420 acres, Reynolds said, and annual rental payments for 1960 amount to approximately \$306,854.

Dear Sir:

There is a situation in Newark that is growing alarmingly worse each year.

Youngsters of all ages who ride bicycles on the streets of our fair city are showing a flagrant disregard for all the rules of safety and an open contempt for the laws concerning traffic.

Daily, one can see boys and girls but more often boys, riding speedily through red lights, riding down the wrong side of the street, riding the wrong way on a one-way street and dodging between pedestrians on the sidewalk.

There was one outstanding example of such contempt quite recently. I was just about to cross Main Street at the corner of Academy as the light changed to green in favor of traffic leaving and entering the latter. At this point, a teenage boy on a bicycle came at high speed down Main, going the wrong way on the north side and boldly continuing through the red light.

A member of our local constabulary was standing within feet of me, saw it and yet completely disregarded the incident. To see boys coming down Main Street the wrong way on bicycles before school during the week is a daily occurrence. Daring out on bicycles between cars on this and other streets while opposing traffic is also frequently observed.

There seems to be an open defiance for all that constitutes safety and correct procedure. To me and others with whom I have discussed this, there appear to be two questions. First, is bicycle traffic not governed by the same rules that govern automobile traffic and secondly, do we wish our youngsters to grow up this way, that is, if they survive this spreading disease?

I further think that the schools could appoint some responsible youngsters as "safety patrols," "crossing guards" or whatever we might call them. They could take tours of duty before and after school, at intersections and on busy thoroughfares, to help enforce safety rules. Such control is exercised in many other cities across the country with eminent success.

Without intending to take a slam at our local police force, merely all agree that its members could participate more fully in this obviously needed control. Newark is no longer just a small town!

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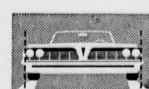

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## Hofstra, Unbeaten In 17 Tests, To Play Hens On Saturday At Delaware Stadium

Hofstra College, unbeaten in 17 games since mid-1958, will face Delaware's Fighting Blue Hens when they return home after two long road trips this Saturday at 2 p.m. in Delaware Stadium.

Coach Dave Nelson's gridders got some small satisfaction out of a 6-6 tie with Marshall College, last weekend after four straight defeats, and the Admiral called the game the "finest showing" of the season, and said that natural improvement this week could lead to a rough afternoon for the Flying Dutchmen.

"We're not losers, let," said Nelson, pointing to four games left to go against rugged opposition. Nelson never has had a losing season in nine previous campaigns at Delaware, although in 1952 his club split even in eight games.

Hofstra, under Coach Howdy Myers, had a tough time last Saturday against a hungry Temple team. Hofstra made one long drive pay off in a touchdown and then held on, as Temple forced two safeties before bowing, 6-4.

Hofstra was runner-up to Delaware in the Lambert Cup rankings a year ago with a perfect 9-0 record. It is the first meeting between the two clubs. Myers is in his 11th year at the Hempstead, Long Island, school and currently sports an 88-33-3 record.

The Flying Dutchmen uses a wide-open attack with lots of passing, spread formations and breakaway speed. They have depth and experience in 14 lettermen, with Capt. Bob DeNeef at end, the top small-college pass receiver in the East last year. He set a Hofstra record in 1958.

Also back are Hofstra's leading ground-gainers for the last two

years, Halfback Bill Heiser and Fullback Bill Kolb.

Barry Fetterman, junior quarterback from East Greenville, Pa., probably earned himself the starting position for Delaware when he piloted the Blue Hens to a 6-6 tie with Marshall.

Fetterman, who had seen little action as second-string quarterback last season and this year, started last week and played almost the entire game, offensively and defensively. He was spelled occasionally by Quarterback Gary Hebert.

We all caught fish—black drum, trout, blues—but Ol' Gibbo stopped us in the red drum department. He caught three beautiful yearlings while Bill Leary caught one.

Francis Neide caught a rare croaker from the surf, along with a flounder—and this last helped make the trip for Mr. Neide, a flounder champion if ever.

But according to the Hatterasmen, we were too early. The big run of big bronzed channel bass or red drum was expected at any day with cooler weather, and we saw but one during our three-day stay—a great 34-lb. bronzed-mailed monster some 4-ft. long, hanging in the ice house of an official Field and Stream weighing station just after it had been beached last Saturday morning.

We were still trying in the warm sun and a blue slough last Sunday afternoon at Cape Hatteras when Carolina Jim Etheridge reminded his friends from Newark that they'd better reel in and hurry north if they wanted to catch the last ferry home over Oregon Inlet.

This trip was one of the great ones, and as previously ailing Francis Neide put it—"just what I needed. Haven't had an ache or a pain since."

## At Oregon Inlet

Last Thursday night, while Francis Neide unsuccessfully tried to sleep with an aching back in the back seat of the car, he slept soundly but soundly in sleeping bags at Oregon Inlet amid a sandstorm and in the questionable heat of a dune on the Carolina coast.

C., joined us the next morning, and after a false start with a pair of skates in the roaring gale and surf reported to be tearing with red gold drum the day before, we shifted our attack to the very tip of Cape Hatteras where mighty breakers thundered into sheets of flying spray some dozen yards behind us to the north, and we fished in the calm water with the wind at our backs for some sensational surf casting south of the cape.

Mr. Neide caught the first channel bass—a golden yearling with the characteristic black spot on its powerful, squared tail—and things picked up from there with each of us catching at least one puppy drum, along with a sprinkling of bluefish, gray trout, and whiting.

## Top Soybean Crop Expected To Yield 22 Bushels/Acre

Delaware farmers are beginning to harvest the state's 183,000-acres of soybeans, the largest acreage in Delaware's history—six per cent larger than last year's crop according to Agronomist Frank B. Springer, Jr.

Expected yield per acre will equal last year's average of 22 bushels.

Because of the importance of quality beans, Springer suggested that farmers harvest soybeans when they are ready. Corn will stand in the field better than beans and will not suffer as much.

Soybeans should be combined when moisture is between 12 and 14 per cent. If they are above 14 per cent moisture they will mildew. If below 12 they will crack during thrashing.

Cylinder speed on the combine should be very slow, Springer said. Even as slow as 500 rpm's may be necessary to reduce cracking. Cylinder speed should be checked two or three times a day as the beans dry out.

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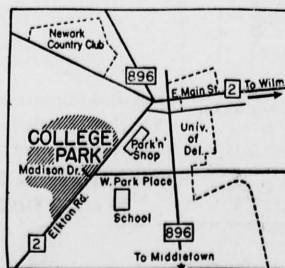

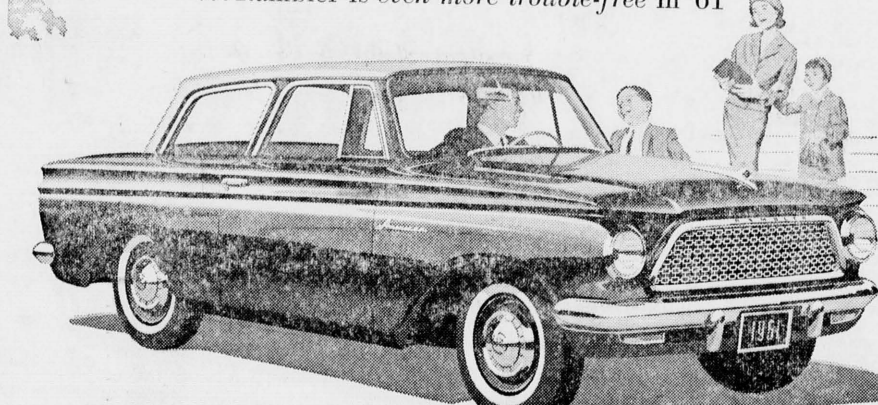
