As an interesting sidelight, she mentioned that out of some 300 girls enrolled in the college, only two are married. And since "what's good-for-memust-be-good-for-my-dog-too" is the motto of many bet owners, the number of dogs getting indiscriminate doses of tranquilizers is on the upswing. Veterinarians are concerned with this turn of events.

Tranquilizers definitely have an important place in canine medicine, Given before surgery



dogs. The veterinarian is able to proceed with the examination faster and more easily. They're prescribed to calm a dog frenzied with pain. They're also prescribed for such specific purposes as calming a dog that gets in a highly nervous state. And that's how trouble begins. The owner is pleased with results, gets the prescription refilled and gives her pet a pill whenever he gets excited. This is the type of practice that veterinarians are against.

Although tranquilizers are generally considered safe, there is the rare and unpredictable occasion when either the shot or pill form will have a completely opposite from quieting effect on a dog.

While his antics may alarm or amuse his owners, the reaction should be reported immediately to your veterinarian, who may then prescribe a different drug or, if the occasion warrants, discontinue this form of treatment.

Feeding Tip: Don't be con-certed if your pet gulps his food without chewing as this is a trait of some breeds and individuals.

Perkins Cites Need For High Salaries With Competition For Faculty Members

Salaries for faculty members in America's colleges and universities must move to an entirely new level if democratic government is to meet the test of the '60's, Dr. John A. Perkins, president of the University of Delaware, warns in his annual report for 1958-59.

"Professors in Russia are among the highest paid people in that incentive-conscious system, inconsistently called Communism." Drekhns writes "Are the American people and their representatives, out of short-run, personal selfishness, to withhold incentives and defeat themselves and their nation in the long run?"

In today's competitive teacher market, all the advantages of a quality institution are essential to provide bona fide higher education for a greater number of Delaware youth, Dr. Perkins says, but notes that "salary is so important in the recruitment and rentention of fac-uity that it warrants special con-sideration.

"As long as faculty salaries were wretched." Dr. Perkins declares, "everyone conceded improvement was necessary. Since improvements have been made, there will be those the been best the state.

was necessary. Since improvements have been made, there will be those who may hesitate about raising salaries further. To justify their position, they will doubtless make illogical salary comparisons.

"University staffs must be remunerated for what they are, Perkins said. "They are not temporary, partime, political office-holders with business or farm income behind them. They are not high grade clerks or skilled craftsmen. A competent professor is a man with intellectual talents far beyond the ordinary person.

"He invests more years in the development of his talents for his life's work than any other professional man except the medical doctor. He is sought after by business, government, and international agencies at salaries considerably abountiversity pay scales."

Supporting his argument with examples from his own experience at the University of Delaware, Dr. Perkins notes that one woman graduate in the 1859 class was given a beginning salary approximately that of the average Delaware faculty
