Wilson, Amstel plans Approved

The Newark Planning Commission approved plans to rezone a tract on the west side of the city for use as single family homes and townhouses, as well as on Amstel Avenue that now houses a beauty school. No members of the public spoke for or against the plans.

The original 86-unit project, known as Saw Mill Place, off Casho Mill Road was never developed after annexation of the site and approval of rezoning by the City Council in 2007.

Now known as The Wilson Farm, the community would occupy nearly 40 acres of the site with a large percentage of the tract staying open space. The proposal calls for 18 single-family dwellings and 63 townhouses. It is one of the largest residential developments to come before the city in years in a

landlocked city.

Newark Planning Director Roy Lopata said the project reflects a changing housing market that could handle growth from BRAC-related jobs generated at Aberdeen Proving Ground and perhaps Bloom Energy, which wants to build a plant on University of Delaware property at the former Chrysler site.

By contrast, the adult condominium market has been hit hard by an inability of potential owners to secure financing, according to Lopata.

Jeff Lang, president of Lang Development, developer of the property, said the company was unable to develop the site as condominiums, due in large part to the financing squeeze. Lang ran into such problems with the Twin Lakes residential development off Elkton Road. However, his

Newark-area woman seriously injured in crash

Delaware State Police are investigating a two-vehicle that seriously injured a Newark-area woman on last Friday night.

The crash occurred at 7:10 p.m. Troopers said Nicole E. Cook, 28, was driving a 2001 Mercury Cougar on Del. Route 1 near Smyrna. Cook's vehicle left the west edge of the roadway and traveled across the grass median before entering the southbound lanes of Route 1. The Cougar then struck the driver's side of a 2002 Honda Odyssey driven by Shyam Belepur, 44 of Lancaster, Pa. After the impact, Nicole Cook's vehicle overturned and she was ejected from the vehicle. She was transported from the scene by a Delaware State Police helicopter to Christiana Hospital where she was admitted with serious injuries. Belepur was not injured.

While being restrained by the victim the suspect displayed a folding knife and swung it at the victim who then released his grip on the suspect. In a collaborative effort involving the New Castle

County Police Criminal Investigations Unit, Crime Analysis, Patrol and the Mobile Enforcement Team, Matthew Kline and Shaun Anderson were identified as suspects in video surveillance using stole credit cards from the burglaries.

Newark man dies of wounds

A Newark area man died of a gunshot wound after being found inside a pickup truck in Wilmington.

At 11:57 p.m., Wilmington Police were called to the scene of an accident on the 800 block of West 8th St.

Uniform officers arrived and discovered a Chevrolet pickup truck that had struck a telephone pole. The only occupant of the pick up was the driver, who was unconscious and unresponsive.

Officers initiated first aid and quickly discovered that the driver was suffering from a gunshot wound to the right side of his torso.

The victim was transported by ambulance to Christiana Hospital where he was pronounced dead. It appears that the victim's death was the result of the gunshot wound.

The victim has been identified as Dewey L. Lee, a 62year-old man from Newark.

Detectives were working to determine where the victim was when he was shot as well as a possible motive and suspect description.

Auto sales scam

On Tuesday, June 21st, a Newark Police officer was dispatched to a residence in the 200 block of Cheltenham Drive for a report that the victim was scammed into sending money to buy a used

The victim began shopping online for a used vehicle and found one for a good price. Emails were exchanged and the victim agreed to send a deposit on the car. The victim wired \$2,650 to Atlanta, Ga. More contact was made via email and the seller wanted the full payment prior to shipping the car. The victim became suspicious and then learned that ad was fraudulent. The FBI has also been contacted in this case.

Burglary reported

On Tuesday June 28, a Newark Police officer was dispatched to Pizza U in the Newark Shopping Center for a report of a commercial burglary. The owner had arrived to the restaurant and noticed that the side door was unlocked. He then checked the registers and noticed that money was missing from one of them. Fires related to grilling cause heavy damage

A second fire in the New Castle area related to outdoor cooking caused \$75,000 in damage.

The Wilmington Manor along with several neighboring fire companies responded to a reported house fire located in unit block of Liborio Drive south of New Castle, shortly before 4:30 p.m. on July 4th. Units arrived on scene to find fire showing from the exterior of the two-story townhouse.

The occupant and her dogs safely escaped.
An investigation by sate Fire Marshal deputies revealed the occupant had placed discarded charcoal ashes into the trash container. The hot ashes ignited the contents of the can and the fire spread to the structure.

The occupant was being cared for by relatives.

The July 4th fire followed an earlier blaze in another New Castle-area neighborhood that caused heavy damage to a home when a fire from a propane grill spread to the home.

Alan Brown Chief Deputy at the Fire Marshal's office in New Castle recommended that all hot embers from grills, fire places and fire pits should placed in a metal container and soaked in water prior to being discarded in the trash

He also says users of propane grills should read safety instructions provided by manufacturers. Those instructions include keeping grills 10 feet from the home.

The kids are free to ramble along at home or in the neighborhood, family time is less structured, and we all wish those hazy, lazy, crazy days of summer could always be here. As the summer winds along into July, here are a few suggestions to keep the kids busy in case that summer breezy feel-ing begins to unwind. With a little support from an adult, kids can take an idea and run with it on their own, developing their creative skills with

friends and siblings.

For very little cost, you can keep kids busy with a variety of make-it-yourself projects and have them devel-oping their skills in problemsolving, creativity, and teamwork. These are important skills to keep kids engaged in reading or mathover the summer, while having fun with hands-on learning. Gather up some scrap supplies from your craft bin or kitchen cabi-nets, and look for ideas in the library or online to inspire the kids with make-it-yourself projects. Some suggestions to consider are: make your own kite, homemade play dough, bird treats with seeds and

peanut butter, building with cardboard boxes, or make a soap bubble recipe and experimentwith homemade bubblemaking devices.

Master Gardeners graduate from program

University of Delaware's Castle County Cooperative Extension announced the class of 2011 New Castle County Delaware Master Gardener Volunteer Educators.

Every two years the organization seeks to re-invigorate and increase its volunteers. The year 2011 was a "training year" for New Castle County Master Gardeners; training was scheduled from March to May of 2011. Certification as a Master Gardener is achieved only after participation in a rigorous training course and completion of the specified hours of volunteer service. Master Gardener Trainees must successfully complete a three-month training session that translates into 72 hours of horticultural course work. They train as apprentices in the following Master Gardener Volunteer committees: Youth Education, Workshops, and Telephone/Diagnostics. Finally, they must complete 40 hours of volunteer service in New Castle County prior to

the end of the 2011 year.
Delaware Master Gardeners bring environmental education and the joy of horticulture into classrooms, homes, communities, and demonstration gardens throughout the county. They offer science-based guidance on home lawns and gardens, develop demonstration gardens and community service projects, run gardening workshops for adults, conduct youth outreach, and staff the Garden Line tele-phone service. Through the Junior Gardener program, one of its most extensive outreach efforts, New Castle County Master Gardeners bring environmental education about resources, recycling and composting to classrooms.

U of Delaware tuition increases 7 percent

announced a 7 percent tuition hike for both in-state and out of state students.

Tuition for in-state undergraduate students at the University of Delaware will increase \$630, or 7.0 percent, for the 2011-12 academic year - bringing the annual in-state tuition cost to \$9,670. Undergraduate students from outside Delaware will pay \$1,700, or 7.0 percent, more in annual tuition. Their tuition next year will be \$25,940.

The News Journal calculated that the total increase, including fees was up 9.6 percent for in-state students and 8.1 percent for those out of

"The increase in tuition and fees is directly related to our ongoing goal to provide an exceptional educational experience for UD students and additional need-based financial aid. Although there is much financial pressure nationally on higher education institutions, we recognize our responsibility to remain affordable for in-state residents and continue to allocate a portion of our resources into more aid for Delawareans. We are also focused on ensuring that our academic, student services and research offerings meet the needs of all students while maintaining a balanced operating bud-

Approximately 43 percent of next year's increase is necessary to cover costs of rising demand for financial aid among UD students. The current economic environment is still affecting many Delaware families, leading to more students needing assistance under the university's Commitment to Delawareans and other financial aid programs. Forty-five percent of in-state students who have enrolled since fall 2009 have received financial assistance through the Commitment to Delawareans, and the average per year aid package (including support for tuition, fees and on campus room and board) during this time has been \$14,833.

Since 2007, UD has increased financial aid by 47 percent. The total amount of financial aid from all funds for undergraduate and graduate students has grown by \$55.4 million, from \$116.8 million five years ago to \$172.2 million this past year.

Also contributing to UD's rising tuition and fees are the increasing costs of facilities maintenance as well as health and property insurance. "We remain vigilant about our expense budget and are reengineering programs and reviewing business processes

The University of Delaware get," President Patrick Harker to seek greater innovation and efficiency. Many departments and units are taking advantage of new opportunities to deliver administrative services at lower cost in light of the current economic environment," said Executive Vice President Scott Douglass. "In addition, we continue to increase our efforts to encourage philanthropy in order to meet our strategic goals of providing excellent, affordable and accessible undergraduate as well as professional education."

> Virtually the entire growth in the amount of next year's student fees, \$340 of a total \$354 increase, will go to fund capital improvements and construction of new student recreational and athletic facilities. The Health, Student Center and Student Comprehensive fees support student health services, the student fitness center, recreational programs, concerts, UD Speaks guest speakers and the activities of registered student organizations. Increased room and board fees reflect higher costs related to continued upgrades in the residential dining hall menu plus the normal inflationary increases in food, labor and direct costs for next

> Tuition and fees account for approximately 35 percent of the full cost of educating

University of Delaware. The additional 65 percent is comprised of state appropriations, contracts and grants, endowment earnings and contributions. In contrast, tuition and fees account for approximately 85 percent of the full cost of educating an out-of-state resident at UD. The remaining 15 percent is comprised of other revenue and support.

UD receives an appropriation from the state to support

a Delaware resident at the the cost of education for instate students. This appropriation accounts for 11.9 percent of the total UD operating budget, down from 13.0 percent last year and 18.6 percent five years ago. The total impact of this decline in state support over the past five years is \$11.2 million.

While UD has a lower percentage of in-state resident students than other comparable state flagship universities, nearly 39 percent of

the University's students are Delawareans. Four out of five college-bound Delawareans apply to UD; for fall 2011, 88 percent were admitted, either directly to the Newark campus (65 percent) or to the Associate in Arts program (23 percent), which can lead directly to a four-year degree from UD. By contrast, this year only 57 percent of out-of-state applicants were admitted.



Residents turn out to oppose Stopyra rezoning

Residents turned out for a New Castle County Planning Board heariang on the Stopyra property off Capitol Trail and Possum Park Road east of Newark. The News Journal reported 200 people turned out to oppose the project. That number mirrored the reported 240 that attended an earlier community meeting on the project. The Citizen's Advocacy Possum Park Area (CAPPA) had urged residents to attend the meeting.

The Planning board and the county Department of Land Use are expected to make a recommendation to the County Council next month, following the two-hour hearing, the newspaper reported.

Developer Frank Acierno has proposed the rezoning in the hilly area. Acierno is the owner of Concord Mall and other commercial properties in Delaware and elsewhere.

Published reports have indicated that a Target discount store is a likely tenant at the site that has been called the Newark Town Center. even though it is outside city limits. Target opened a store in Christiana Mall last fall.

According to the group, the project includes the following:

· 54 acres rezoned for Regional Commercial, an area greater than the 30-plus acres for the Pike Creek Shopping

• The traffic created would increase the vehicles per day on Capitol Trail/Kirkwood Highway) by 50 percent.

• The main entrance would be at the Holy Angels flashing light on Possum Park with a second (right turn in, right turn out only) near the present entrance to Possum Park Apartments.

· A group of state legislators, most from the area, have requested that the Delaware Department of Transportation conduct a new Traffic Impact Study from a 2007 rezoning proposal.

Rezonings have become increasingly contentious in New Castle County, with opponents pointing out the large number of empty store spaces and traffic problems.

company found a market at Twin Lakes by partnering with Cornell Homes for non-age restricted housing and sees similar potential for the Wilson Farm site.

The Planning Commission also gave unanimous approval to rezoning for a mixed use project at 70-74 Amstel Avenue that is now the site of the Shilling Douglas School of Hair Design.

Known Carroll as Commons, the project would include a salon operated by the beauty school. Also a part of the project are 16 two-story townhouse-style apartments. The townhouses are aimed at the student housing market, but can be converted to owner-occupied housing through separate utility meters and other steps.






Last month, the commission approved an adjacent project that would house the Baptist Student Center.

A golfing change 'fore' the better

Aaron Weiner's pitching style once was described by his Newark National Little League all-star coach, Dennis Murphy, as being "like an artist painting a picture, with each pitch a stroke of the artist's brush."

That was until Weiner suffered tendonitis in his throwing arm, which is a pitcher's worst nightmare. However, for the Newark resident it turned out to be a blessing.

It was that bout with tendinitis in eighth grade that Weiner says more or less forced his decision to focus on the sport of golf rather than pursue a potential varsity career as a pitcher.

"I was unable to pitch, make the throw from shortstop, or even raise a soup can above my shoulder," said Weiner, who is working this summer as an intern at ING Direct. "I did physical therapy, but the process was slow and minimally effective. It was a frustrating injury because the only solution was to completely stay off it. However, my golf swing remained unaffected by the injury, and so it was a fairly logical decision to transition to golf."

The decision turned out not only to be a logical one, but a good one. In addition to several first-place finishes in local and regional golf tournaments over the past few years, Weiner's accomplishments include becoming the first Delawarean to win the prestigious Philadelphia Junior Golf Championship last year, and then capping his senior season at Charter School of Wilmington winning the Blue Hen Conference tournament where he shot a personal best 69 - and placing second in the DIAA State Golf Tournament.

In retrospect, even though hitting a tiny white dimpled ball became his passion, Weiner credits his early experiences throwing a white ball with laces as one reason his golf career has been so successful.

"Pitching was a thrill for me," he said. "I liked the sense of control and responsibility that you have as a starter on the mound. The game is largely in the pitcher's hands, especially in Little League. I guess if there was one position that compares most to playing golf, it would be pitcher. The attention is focused on you, there's a lot of pressure to perform, and there's no one to lean on. It's you against the hitter in baseball; and you against the course in golf. Both are largely individual battles."

One battle Weiner didn't have to wage was convincing his parents that giving up baseball for golf was the right move for him.

"Of course we were a little disappointed that he was giving up baseball knowing that he could have competed at the high school level," his mother, Mindy Brandt-Weiner, said. "But when he started playing

golf he instantly fell in love with the game. We realized he had some natural ability and we felt it was more important for him to be involved in something that he really wanted to

Another battle Weiner aced was in the classroom at Charter. A National Merit Commended Scholar, he graduated with a 4.18 cumulative GPA, was president of the Student Council and a member of the National and Spanish Honor Societies. The accomplished student-athlete will attend Emory University as a Goizueta Scholar, receiving a full-tuition scholarship to attend the prestigious Atlantabased business school, where he also hopes to play golf.

"The qualifying will be taking place the first week in September," said Weiner, who credits his grandfather for sparking his interest in golf. "Everyone plays four rounds and the top aggregate scores qualify for the team. If my game progresses as planned this summer, I believe I have a good shot at making the team. I will be continuing my tournament play and preparation this summer in some local and other regional events."

Just last week Weiner played in the DSGA Junior Championship, shooting 72-73 at Newark Country Club to win the 18-year-old age divi-sion and finish third overall. He also qualified for next week's DSGA Amateur Championship at Back Creek Golf Club.

"I think Aaron has a tremendous chance of being very successful and having a promising collegiate golf career at Emory," said his swing coach, John Randolph, head golf professional at Fieldstone Golf Club. "Aaron has a great love for the game, which breeds excellent work ethic, and helps him keep taking his game to new levels. He has been one of the most determined students I have ever had the opportunity to work with. Flat out, he puts his mind to something, we develop a plan of action for him, and he does it."

Weiner, whose handicap is 0.5, says one of his earliest golf memories was at the age of 10 when he experienced the "thrill of playing tournament jonbuzby@hotmail.com.

golf' when he competed in the Delcastle Junior Open. Now, eight years later he hopes to experience the thrill of competing at Div. III Emory - currently ranked No. 10 in the country - where he's confident the game will continue to prepare him for his future in the business world.

"Golf has taught me a lot about people in general, and it has definitely helped develop my interpersonal skills," he said. "The mental toughness that golf requires is another skill that will serve me well in the real world. A round of golf, much like life, requires you to battle through adversity and remain focused even when you are successful."

Swank choses Goldey Katrina Swank, a two-time Delaware softball state champion at Caravel Academy, has committed to play softball at Goldey-Beacom College, according to head coach Bill

"I think she'll be an excel-lent addition to the ball club," Streets said. "I had the opportunity to see her play, and I'm looking for instant dividends. She comes from an excellent high school program, so she knows what winning is all

Swank played four years of varsity softball and captained both the softball and girl's basketball teams her senior year. A versatile player, she hits for average and plays infield and outfield positions. She was selected a Blue/Gold All-Star for her performance this past

Swank was an honor student and a member of Caravel's Relay for Life and Blue/Gold Committee.

African Lion hones skills of area Navy corpsman

CAP DRAA, Morocco -The sun barely peeked over the horizon when the stillness was shattered by the roar of artillery. The son of a Newark couple crawled out of his tent into the southern Moroccan morning to begin another day.

Navy Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Jonathan C. Fitch, son of Gary and Beatrice Fitch of White Drive, Newark, is in Morocco supporting exercise African Lion 2011.

"My role is to provide medical support for the firing training operations here," said Fitch, who graduated in 1999 from Christiana High School, and received a bachelor's degree in 2009 from the University of Delaware.

African Lion is an exercise between the Kingdom of Morocco and the U.S. that involves more than 2,000 U.S. service members and approximately 900 members of the Royal Moroccan Armed Forces. The exercise serves as a way for both U.S. and Moroccan military members to hone their skills and learn to work together to a accomplish missions.

"Training here is a little different due to the different culture and language barriers," said Fitch, who is assigned in Reading, Pa.

In spite of the barriers, Fitch and his fellow service members worked with the Moroccan forces on different types of military training including command post, live fire, peacekeeping operations, disaster response, aerial refueling, and low-level flight training. Both the Moroccan and U.S. forces receive valuable training during the course of the exercise.

"I never really realized how important my job is until I came here," said Fitch.

They experienced sandstorms, the rain showers of the wet season and the heat that traditionally goes with a desert. "It isn't as hot as I expected it to be and there is a lot more rain," said Fitch, who has been in the military since 1997.

As the artificial thunder of artillery fire dies away for a moment, the sun rises fully above the desert horizon and begins its journey toward the nearby Atlantic Ocean. Fitch and the other participants in African Lion 2011 go about their business sharing experiences and knowledge with each other and their Moroccan counterparts.
