The referendum in the Stanton school district last Saturday was approved by a 609 to 334 vote, to increase the tax from 12 to a maximum of 32 cents, to provide funds for salary supplements for teachers, service staff, and other local expenses.

This is one of the most rapidly

growing districts in the hundred. Land for a third elementary school has been purchased although construction is not scheduled to start until 1961.

The new school will be located opposite Meadowood, adjoining Eastburn Acres.
