Mr. Hering was granted the privilege of the floor and read the following statement.

In March of 1967 Governor Terry addressed the Senate on two proposals for Cabinet Government in Delaware. One was to merge the State Board of Health and the State Department of Mental Health into one cabinet-type agency.

It was soon pointed out to the Governor that creation of such an agency would require an amendment to the State Constitution, since the State Board of Health is referred to in that document. Six months later, such an amendment was introduced into the Senate, but the Governor apparently has not pushed the idea and nothing has happened.

With this background in mind, I am today introducing two Constitutional Amendments which would repeal Article XI and Article XII, those sections relating to the State Board of Health and the State Board of Agriculture.

I can see no good reason why these two agencies should be specifically singled out in the Constitution and hope that taking this step now might help to speed up efforts toward needed agency consolidation and Cabinet Government.

Along with the 10 measures from the Goals Committee Report that I introduced recently, this is one more effort to act rather than merely talk about government reorganization.

SUMMARY COMMENTS ---

Mr. Speaker, I would like now to comment on the bill itself.

SUMMARY OF COMMITTEE ACTION ON THE 1969 BUDGET: —

House Bill No. 464, which was the suggested appropriation bill presented by Governor Terry, outlined an expenditure of \$173,013,279. The appropriation bill presented as House Bill No. 637 by the Joint Finance Committee sets forth the detail for expenditure of \$174,572,537. This represents an increase of \$1,559,258. This increase is 0.9% more than the Governor's original recommendation.

The final recommendation of House Bill No. 637 represents approximately a 19% increase in State expenditures from the General Fund of the State Treasury over the corresponding appropriation of a year ago.

Initially it was the desire of members of the committee to reduce the budget below that recommended by Governor Terry in House Bill No. 464. In this regard some progress was made in a downward direction totaling \$144,652. However, there were other factors which worked in the other direction, resulting in a net increase of slightly more than a million and a half dollars. Some of the influences which moved the appropriation upward were:

(1) Governor Terry sent three letters to the committee asking it "to raise my recommended budget by \$492,340". A substantial portion of his recommendations merited inclusion in the budget by the committee. As a result of the changes suggested by the Governor, he said, "This . . . results in a final recommended budget of \$173,597,640".

(2) Salaries:

The appropriation for salaries in this budget totals about \$86,000,000, or slightly over 49%. This does not include funds spent for salaries by the University of Delaware nor a \$500,000 Contingency Fund to be used by the Personnel Commission to implement the Merit System. Since salaries represented such a large proportion of the funds appropriated, the committee considered this subject at length. At least six discussions were held with Mr. William D. Gordon, chairman of the Personnel Commission and/or Mr. James Rosbrow, Executive Director of the Personnel Commission, concerning the proposed Merit System and alternate proposals regarding salaries.

The committee concluded it was in the best overall interest of the State and its employees to appropriate the requested funds to implement the Merit System as proposed. This involved funds in excess of \$1,125,000 for normal salary increases, and an esimated \$760,000 to adjust salaries of the 6,000 employees under the Merit System to a wage in line with similar jobs in this area.

(3) Education:

(a) Increased Capital Outlay for Schools.

Education personnel throughout the State apprised the committee of the very strenuous efforts school districts were making to try to maintain school books, furniture, office equipment, and other needed educational supplies on \$100 per educational unit, a formula which has remained unchanged for 12 years. Due to the simple fact that the same type items cost more each year, the committee appropriated an additional \$50 for each educational unit in the school system of the State. This required adding \$270,450 to provide more of the needed supplies required to educate the children of Delaware.

(b) Private and Parochial School Bussing

House Bill No. 436, signed as recently as May 2, 1968, directing the State Board of Education to provide for bussing private and parochial school children imposed a requirement on the resources of the State to fund the program. To meet the needs of this legislative directive, the committee added \$240,000 to the budget.

(c) School Bus Contracts

The Superintendent of Public Instruction felt new contracts could not be made unless additional funds were provided to overcome rising costs of bus operation, particularly when bus contracts of recent origin are now in effect at higher rates than those expiring. In order to keep the school buses rolling this September the committee appropriated \$260,000 to carry out this need.

(d) Delaware Technical and Community College

The appropriation for education in this field remains the same as originally requested in House Bill No. 464. However, savings of \$40,000 originally requested for presidential salaries of both the Northern and Southern Branches were diverted to provide instructional data processing equipment and capital items. Combining the budgets of the Northern and Southern Branches into one budget, as requested by the Board, should provide better education, flexibility of operation, and economy.

(3) Veterans Bonus

House Bill No. 275 as amended by the Senate made provisions for payment of a bonus to all service men who served in the Armed Forces of the United States during the Viet Nam conflict. In order to fulfill this obligation, it was estimated \$100,000 will be needed to operate the Delaware Military Pay Commission. This appropriation was added to the budget.

(4) Law Enforcement

A well-staffed police force is essential for adequate law enforcement. The number of State Police is limited by law to 250 men including staff superivsion. Because of this stipulation, new men cannot be trained until vacancies are created by the retirement of older men. This leaves the effective staff short for a period of 16 weeks while new recruits undergo their training. A correction of this situation was suggested by Col. Lamb when he appeared before the committee. Subsequently, the Governor recommended changes in this area. In order to "lock the barn before the horse is stolen", the committee appropriated an additional amount of over \$300,000 to provide for a total of 308 uniformed State Police. This increase in the number of State Police and the additional funds will permit training two classes of recruits during the next year and provide them, at graduation, with the necessary equipment to become effective members of the force.

(5) Appropriations due to omission

(a) Certain personnel of the Legislative Reference Bureau were not included in House Bill No. 464. This required adding \$15,000 to the appropriation.

(b) No appropriation was included in House Bill No. 464 to permit the Legislative Council to continue its function. The committee added \$40,500 for this purpose.

(c) An error in the State Police Retirement Fund for last year went unnoticed until recently. This oversight required adding \$23,800 to this budget.

There were other types of appropriations with which the committee became involved:

(1) Appropriation by involvement

This type of appropriation may be illustrated by the following example.

In 1966 the Governor established an Interagency Commission on Mental Retardation. Initially and throughout 1967, this Commission was financed largely with Federal funds. House Bill 464 expected cooperative participation for this year. Later information from the agency indicated Federal funds would not be available for operating expenses. Because of this situation, the Governor changed his original recommendation from \$12,800 to \$27,500, for an increase in the budget of \$14,700. It is common rather than the exception that Federal funds decrease after the initiation of programs. The Federal funds, though alluring at first, involve the State in appropriating more money as Federal funds decrease or are withdrawn altogether.

(2) Expenditure by entrapment

On May 10, 1968, the committee received a letter from the Department of Mental Health concerning "a serious problem" whereby "several buildings at Governor Bacon Health Center were declared unsafe due to fire hazard regulations. Approximately 70 patients were transferred temporarily to the Emily P. Bissell Hospital, where a vacant building was 'activated' to accommodate them."

As a result of this change, a request was presented to the committee to provide around \$100,000 to care for the same patients at the new facility. The committee did not include this item in the budget so this problem remains to be funded. Regardless of the merit, this example serves to illustrate the jolt to fiscal planning by a "sudden discovery" of a situation that certainly did not develop overnight.

Another example is cited for precautionary reasons. In reviewing the salary expenditures of the Department of Mental Health for the first two weeks of May, it appeared the rate of expenditure for that period projected to the end of Fiscal 1969 would result in a deficit of substantial magnitude. The subject was discussed with personnel of the Department who restudied the problem. On June 11, 1968, Dr. Ingram reported by letter:

"The budget projection prepared by Mr. Zeller based on the May 1968 payroll and a $2\frac{1}{2}$ % increment (pay raise) for present employees would indicate that we would have a deficit of approximately \$129,000 based on the amount recommended by the Governor for all present and new positions. Salary savings during the year could possibly exceed our estimate and reduce this deficit or eliminate it."

This possibility was brought to the attention of the Governor and the Budget Director. The Budget Director reported the payroll selected at random for checking was not typical. He refigured the situation and felt turnover in personnel throughout the year would enable the Department to live within the recommended budget. The committee hopes this will be the case.

There were several other alterations to House Bill No. 464 which, it is believed, are worthy of comment.

(1) Better snow removal and ice control promised at the same cost

HB 464 had two line items in the budget of the Engineering Department of the Highway Department for snow removal: one for \$150,000 for salary-overtime and one for \$150,000 for contracts. At the instigation of the committee and in consultation with the Highway Department, one item appears in this budget as follows:

"Contingency Fund - Overtime and Contractual snow removal and ice control — \$300,000".

The Highway Department indicates this will give them much more latitude to provide effectively for snow removal and abnormal icy roads.

(2) A boot-strap lift that improves efficiency at less cost

The original request of the Department of Agriculture indicated for the second year the need for an involved type of analytical equipment which would free a laboratory technician for other work equivalent to three-quarters of his time. An agreement was reached with the head of the Department to forego, for this year, two new employees and a car in favor of the analytical equipment. This suggestion will improve a vital section of the Department at an appropriation \$4,600 less than that originally requested.

(3) Reorganization of duties

A question was asked of the Superintendent of the State Board of Education if he could get along with fewer new people than originally requested. His first reply was no. In three days he returned and asked the committee for a few minutes in which he outlined a change in his staff which would save \$32,000 at no sacrifice in service. Automobiles

In studying the budget the committee became aware of many requests by the agencies for the purchase of new automobiles and replacement of older vehicles. Study revealed the State has a high capacity for mobility of its employees. Tabulation of vehicles in use revealed these figures:

If the proposed purchases were added to the passenger cars now in use, a rough approximation indicates the State owns about one car for every eight employees.

The committee felt it is time to show restraint in this area and cut 44 of the additional new cars out of the budget, saving approximately \$80,000. For the agencies which find they are unable to adjust their practices to carry on their functions with their present vehicles the committee provided money in the Contingency Fund for allotment of 10 passenger cars by the Budget Commission. The committee felt the practices employed in the utilization of State cars need a thorough study leading toward a motor pool in one or more sections of the State. To support this thought, three observations are listed:

(1) One agency of 27 employees has 25 vehicles and requested a new one.

(2) It is not uncommon to find many State vehicles sitting unused in the many parking lots around the State Capitol a substantial part of the day.

(3) One agency head indicated he found it inconvenient to park his two private autos and the State car in his driveway due to the necessity of frequent moving. As a result he sold one of the private cars.

In conclusion, I have touched on highlights resulting from the preparation of this budget bill. There are many interesting details which cannot be included at this time.

It is believed House Bill No. 637 goes farther to serve the needs of the State than the original appropriations bill.

To the House of Representatives of the 124th

General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On June 10, 1968, I received House Bill No. 281 as amended by House Amendment 1 and Senate Amendment 3, Entitled:

"An Act to Amend Section 2151, Title 21, Delaware Code, relating to Motor Vehicle Registration Fees".

I respectfully return House Bill No. 281 to the House of Representatives without my approval, for the following reasons:

House Bill No. 281 would replace the uniform motor vehicle registration fee now in effect with a sliding scale under which motor vehicles having a gross load weight of 3000 pounds or less would pay twelve dollars (\$12) per year, motor vehicles having a gross load weight of 3001 pounds to 3800 pounds would pay sixteen dollars (\$16) per year, motor vehicles having a gross load weight of 3801 pounds to 4500 pounds would pay a fee of twenty dollars (\$20) per year, and motor vehicles having a gross load weight of more than 4500 pounds would pay twenty-four dollars (\$24). The effect of implementing this sliding scale would be an estimated net loss of nine hundred thousand dollars (\$900,000) in state revenues. When considered with the fact that the Joint Finance

Committee has increased my recommended budget by nearly one million dollars (\$1,000,000), a financial situation is created in which it would be fiscally irresponsible for me to approve House Bill No. 281. The State of Delaware's financial situation is such that it cannot afford this net change of nearly two million dollars (\$2,000,000).

This bill suffers from other defects as well. I have been advised by the Motor Vehicle Commissioner that it would be impossible to implement this change by July 1, 1968 as provided in the bill. A minimum of ninety (90) days would be necessary to make the changes in procedure which would be required. In addition, House Bill No. 281 would provide that the shipping weight of the vehicle is to be used in determining gross load weight, and this would require the compilation of complicated tables showing the shipping weight of each model car.

I have returned this bill with disapproval only because of its effect on the financial situation. I have no objection to the introduction of a bill which would provide for a sliding scale of registration fees provided the technical defects mentioned above are eliminated and provided further that it is accompanied by a revenue producing measure of sufficient size to offset any loss in revenues it would cause. It should be noted in this context that the Vanity Tag Bill which was designed to offset the cost to the State of the Home and Hospital for the Chronically III at Smyrna has come far short of expectations and will in no way relieve the financial burden imposed by that transfer. Therefore, any measure designed to produce offsetting revenues will be studied very closely in order to insure that there is no net loss of financial resources.

It should also be noted that this action became necessary because of the priorities that had to be and have to be attached to such measures as the kindergarten bill, the summer job bill, the recreation bills, the day care bill, and the bill to increase the size and salary of our State Police force. We must give priority to these costly measures designed to improve the education of our children, to cure the causes of civil unrest, and to ensure law and order for our State. It became necessary to choose and the choice was clear. We cannot allow our financial situation to deteriorate to the point where we are strapped in meeting our responsibilities in the areas of education, civil unrest and law and order. Placing my signature on this bill would have too greatly limited my ability to respond to these much-needed measures.

For all of these reasons, I return House Bill No. 281 without my approval.

To the House of Representatives of the 124th

General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On June 27, 1968, I received House Bill No. 202 entitled:

"An Act to Amend Title 15, Delaware Code, Effecting A General Revision of the Election Laws of the State of Delaware by Amending Chapters 1, 3, 11, 13, 15, 17, 20, 45, 47, 49, -50 and 55, Relating to the Departments of Elections, State Election Commissioner, Voter Registration, and the Provisions Dealing With General Elections."

I return this bill without my approval for the following reasons:

First, this bill has nearly two dozen technical errors in drafting, and disapproval would be necessary for that certain reason alone.

Secondly, this bill would unduly restrict the prerogative of the Governor in the appointment of members to the County Departments of Election. Both 15 Del. Code § 103, and 15 Del. Code § 104, relating to appointments to the County Departments of Election, would be deleted and new sections inserted therefore. Sub-section (e) of the new section 103 would provide as to New Castle County as follows:

The members to be appointed by the Governor under subsections (c) and (d) of this Section shall be appointed from a list of not less than 3 nominees for each member to be appointed, which list shall be submitted by the respective State Chairman of the political party from which the appointment must be made.

Sub-section (f) of the new section 104 would provide similarly as to Kent and Sussex Counties. I feel that such a restriction on the Governor's prerogative in this sensitive area is unsound and unjustified and I cannot approve of it.

Third, certain sections of this bill are unconstitutional. Section 38 would provide as follows:

Section 38. Amend Title 15, Delaware Code, Section 4947 by deleting the second sentence thereof and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "The same principles shall be applied to removals from one place to another within this State provided, however, that if a person shall have changed his residence from any place within this State to any other place within this State within 30 days immediately preceding the date of the general election, said person shall be considered resident of the election district from which he has moved for the purpose of voting in such general election."

By thus allowing persons who move during the last thirty days before election to another place in the State outside of the hundred or election district in which they are registered to vote, it would contravene Article 5, Section 2 of the Delaware Constitution which states:

"Every citizen . . . who shall have been . . . for the last thirty days a resident of the hundred or election district in which he may offer to vote . . . shall be entitled to vote at such election in the hundred or election district of which he shall at the time be a resident . . ."

In addition, the title of this bill does not reflect the fact that Sections 12 and 39 impose criminal penalties upon any person violating the provisions of this subchapter. Article 2, Section 16, of the Delaware Constitution and the cases interpreting said Article indicate that the Title of any bill should be so drafted as to give to the people fair and reasonable notice of the bill's contents. Here no such notice is given insofar as the possible imposition of criminal penalties are concerned.

For these reasons, I hereby return House Bill No. 202 without my approval.

On June 19, 1968, I received House Bill No. 540 entitled:

"An Act to Amend Section 6521, Title II, Delaware Code, Relating to the Department of Correction by Changing the Qualifications of the Director of Field Services, District Directors, Case Work Supervisors, and Probation and Parole Counselors and Field Counselors of the Department of Correction."

Following a careful study of House Bill 540, I have decided to return it to the House of Representatives without my approval, as it would have the effect of lowering professional qualifications for probation and parole personnel.

While I have been told that probation officers are most difficult to obtain because of restrictions now in effect, I nevertheless believe the Board of Corrections - which opposes this legislation - should have an additional year to fill the vacancies under the present strict definitions. Adequate money for the purpose is available in the fiscal 1969 Budget Act. If after another year vacancies exist, the present law will have to be carefully reviewed and amended by both the Board of Correction and the General Assembly.

To the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On June 26, 1968, I received House Bill No. 520 entitled:

"An Act to Amend Part II, Title 30, Delaware Code, By Adding A new Chapter 20 Granting A Corporation Income Tax Credit to Certain Business Firms Which Contribute to Neighborhood Organizations or Which Engage in Activities Tending To Upgrade Neighborhood Areas."

I respectfully return House Bill No. 520 to the House of Representatives without my approval because I have been unable to determine the extent of its effect on Delaware's revenues despite consulting many agency heads. The bill would allow a "tax credit" of up to five percent of the annual tax paid by business firms or fifty thousand dollars, whichever is less for contributions made to neighborhood organizations operating community service projects in impoverished areas. in essence, therefore, a business firm, as to five percent of its tax with an upper limit of \$50,000. would have the choice of paying said sum to the State of Delaware in taxes or of contributing said sum to a worthwhile neighborhood project without any net loss in income after taxes to the business firm. This would make such a contribution most attractive and could result in a very substantial loss of revenue to the State of Delaware at a time when we cannot afford it. Without a further study indicating the amount of loss involved with some degree of certainty and indicating that the amount involved is reasonable in size, I cannot approve of this measure.

Let me emphasize, however, that I am strongly in favor of providing some form of tax incentive to encourage business firms to invest in worthwhile projects in our impoverished areas and am disapproving of this bill only because of uncertainty with regard to its effect and my opinion that the loss in revenues caused by it would be subsetutial. I feel considerable thought and study must be given to providing an equitable, sound and attractive basis for encouraging such business investment. Even in this instance, I would have given serious consideration to signing this bill had it provided a less costly tax deduction rather than a tax credit. As it is, I feel I must return House Bill No. 520 without my approval.

On June 26, 1968, I received House Bill No. 213 entitled:

"An Act to Amend Section 9203, Title 10, Delaware Code, Relating to Political Affiliation of Justices of the Peace."

House Bill 213 which would provide that no more than a majority of the Justices of the Peace shall belong to the same major political party while the remainder shall belong to the other major political party is clearly unconstitutional, as it contravenes Article 4, Section 29 of the Delaware Constitution.

In the case of Buckingham v. State ex. rel. Killoran 3, Terry 405, 42 Del. 405 35 A.2d 903 (1944) the court held that the Legislature has no authority to add further qualifications in connection with a constitutional judicial office such as a Justice of the Peace, where the qualifications for that office are expressly provided for the by Constitution, as is true in this instance.

Therefore, I have no choice but to return this bill without my approval.

On June 26, 1968, I received House Bill No. 533, entitled:

"An Act to Amend Title 7, Delaware Code, By Repealing Part II Relating to the Shell Fisheries Commission and Its Jurisdiction, and Revising Part I in Order That the Boad of Game and Fish Commissioners Hereafter Assume Certain Functions Formerly the Responsibility of the Shell Fisheries Commission and Accomplishing Certain Other Additions To, Revisions and Codification of the Authority of the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners By Further Amendment of Title 7 and Title 23 Relating to Navigation and Waters, and Authorizing the Acquisition of a New Watch Boat for the Expanded Water Patrol Duties of the Board and Making an Appropriation Therefor."

This bill confers jurisdiction over the commercial water industries (including Shell Fisheries) to the sports fisheries oriented Game and Fish Commission.

There is, upon occasion, a strong conflict of interest between sports fishermen and commercial fishermen. Accordingly, it is important that both interests be represented by boards recognizing their special problems and needs so that any conflict can be fully negotiated by understanding men and women. It would, in my estimation, be most unfair for the shell fish industry, which has been a source of considerable revenue for many Delawareans in the past and is now on the way to a substantial comeback, to be controlled by the sports fishermen as would be the case if this bill became law.

This bill provides for the purchase of a much needed watchboat to police the shell fish harvest. While I am very much in favor of this investment, I will not bite boat bait. The General Assembly upon its return should promptly approve funds for purchase of a watchboat so that our able shell fish commission can proceed with the job that it has been assigned to do under existing law. Until such a step is taken, the commission must operate under less than ideal conditions, a situation for which the General Assembly must assume responsibility.

House Bill 533 is herewith returned without my approval.

On June 26, 1968, I received House Bill No. 480 entitled: "An Act to Amend Chapter 81, Title 10, Delaware Code, Relating to Limitations of Actions."

The restrictions imposed on private property interests by this bill cannot be countenanced or allowed. This bill would require that all suits questioning the legality of "any ordinance, code, regulation or map, relating to zoning or any amendment thereo, or any regulation or ordinance relating to subdivision and land development, or any amendment thereto . . ." enacted by a county or municipality must be commenced within thirty days of publication of the public notice thereof. This thirty day limitation is most unfair to the owners and future owners of the property affected by the change. In many cases, interested parties would not be aware of the ordinance, etc., until it affected their specific plot of ground and this could and often would be long after its adoption. I feel that such a restriction would be unreasonable and, therefore, return House Bill No. 480 without my approval.

A DISCUSSION OF PROFESSIONAL NEGOTIATIONS

"COLLECTIVE BARGAINING" FOR TEACHERS AS

PROPOSED BY HOUSE BILL NO. 705

Everette Hale

This is the fourth bill introduced in the General Assembly dealing with this subject since May, 1966. The previous bills were primarily sponsored by the Delaware State Education Association with some acquiescence to the desires and opinions of local school boards and Chief School Officers. The concern or need for professional negotiations bill has been running lukewarm for quite a while and we have somewhere between fourteen and twenty-one local school districts who have entered into voluntary professional negotiations agreements over the past few years. This spring a question arose in the Wilmington school district where two organizations sought the right to bargain exclusively for the teachers in Wilmington. They have been assured a representative election this fall.

On June 12 of this year the Attorney General issued an opinion stating in part "... that since professional school employees are expressly excluded from the provisions of Chapter 13, Title 19, Delaware Code" (the law which gave all other state employees the right to bargain collectively and which was passed in 1965) the agreements between local districts and their teachers were invalid. This decision in my opinion makes it necessary that the State Government give its local school districts some guidelines in which to operate, I hope, harmoniniously with their local teachers' organizations.

This particular proposal, House Bill No. 705, contains provisions which are contrary to the desires of both the AFT and the DSEA. It is the result of my study of the laws of over ten states and my consultation with experts and representatives of all the vested interests concerned with the bill.

The following is a discussion of the facts of the bill:

Section 4001. The provisions of Section 4001 are selfexplanatory with the possible exception of (c). The definitions of public school employees is specified in this section in order to define the bargaining unit so as to not be necessary to repeat throughout the sections of this bill.

Section 4002. The purpose of this Act is the improvement of personnel management and it is my hope that this bill will promote harmonious relationships within the local school districts.

Section 4003. This section permits the employees to join any organization for their own benefit but prohibits specifically the closed or union or agency shop. It also requires that dues may be deducted from employees pay only with that employee's request.

Section 4004. This section sets out the procedure for determining an exclusive bargaining agent. Under paragraph (a) if a majority of the public school employees belong to an organization and they request the right to be the bargaining agent it shall be granted by the local school district. However, if one organization requests the right to be the exclusive bargaining agent, thirty percent of the public school employees have the right to challenge the local board and by petition request that an election be held to determine the exclusive bargaining agent. Under paragraph (1) if an election has been granted additional organizations may request to be included on the ballot by showing that they have by petition at least ten percent of the employees.

Paragraph (2) merely states that election must be held within 45 days.

Paragraph (c) provides that the bargaining representative will be certified for a minimum period of two years and sets up procedures for additional elections for teachers organizations.

Paragraph (d) results because the AFT membership prefers to bargain exclusively for the classroom teacher and the DSEA prefers to include in its bargaining unit supervisors, assistant principals, etc. This section provides that although only teachers may vote in an election the local board and the bargaining unit may include other classes of employees by agreement.

Section 4005. It has been the experience in Government and the private sector that employees will endeavor to fight for the right to bargain on things they think important. This section merely recognizes that fact. It is my personal opinion that with the teachers organization concerned with all problems of the district that they will be less likely to take an unreasanable stand on any individual item. I think this is true since it takes the combined efforts of the local Board, the administration, the teachers and the parents organizations to secure additional funds by referendum in school districts.

Section 4006. It is not the intent of this law to restruct in any way the right of the employees in taking these grievances to anyone that they feel so inclined.

Section 4007. Both parties are simply obliged to set down and negotiate in good faith and make a written contract if requested by either party.

Section 4008. The local Board of Education is prohibited from getting involved in trying to discourage employees from exercising their right under this law.

Section 4009. This section deals with the method for treating problems which cannot be resolved by negotiation between the bargaining representative and the Board of Education. The first paragraph sets up a procedure whereby they submit their differences to mediation. Frequently in collective bargaining both teams are reluctant to make all of their concessions to the other side and through mediation it is more likely that compromises are effected which permit both sides to save face.

The second paragraph is the treatment of problems not resolved by mediation. It provides for the selection of a fact finding committee or fact finder who's job it will be to hold hearings, get all the facts, make them public, and provide recommendations. This procedure which has been tried in the State of Wisconsin has been very successful since neither the local board nor the bargaining representative are inclined to have an impartial person or persons bring their entire case before the public. In Wisconsin, the experience has been that they both are reluctant to air their linen in public. This fact frequently encourages resolution of the problem prior to the issuance of the final report and recommendations. If it doesn't, it is hoped that public opinion will sway and force a resolution of the problem.

Section 4010. This is a typical no strike provision which is written broad enough to cover reporting off sick and other activities that have been recently tried in other states.

The second paragraph is a unique provision borrowed from the Maryland Statute which provides that if an organization calls a strike it shall be prohibited from being the exclusive representative for a period of two years. In other states normally the first item negotiated by the striking teachers has been ammesty from the no strike penalties of the state law. It has been found that monetary penalties very frequently get negotiated away. However, I believe that this provision which prohibits the striking organization from being the bargaining representative two years will seriously restrict the leadership of either teachers organization from calling a strike since it is possible or probable that they will be yielding their right to bargain to their competing organization.

Section 4011. This section merely continues the agreements in effect currently to the extent that they are not in conflict with this law.

Section 4012. This section specifically prohibits any agreements being made which are in conflict with the Delaware Code. It is a broad provision since many responsibilities are specifically delegated in the code as being the responsibility of the State Board of Education. In other words, an agreement cannot be made which violates either the State's statutes or adopted rules and regulations of the State Board of Education.

Introduced by Rep. Lesher. Referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

HB 702 — An Act to transfer the payment of certain expenses and the receipt of certain fees, fines and costs relating to the administration of justice from the several counties to the state and to provide for compensation and pension benefits of court employees upon such transfer. Introduced by Rep. Benson. At Mr. Benson's request, this bill was laid on the Speaker's Desk.

HB 703 — An Act to amend Section 6508, Title 29, Delaware Code, relating to annual reports of State Agencies. Introduced by Reps. Lesher and Bartleson. Referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

WHEREAS, T. Lees Bartleson was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1956 and has been reelected every two years since that time; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bartleson won reelection in 1958 by over 8,500 votes, the largest majority ever given to a House candidate at the time and probably still a record today; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bartleson has served his State and his party well over these years and in several sessions has been selected by his party to a leadership position; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bartleson has been known as "a legislator's legislator" for his careful preparation and detailed homework, particularly in the area of the State budget; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bartleson's service has included many interesting events, such as when he attended a legislative conference in Puerto Rico and a taxicab drove off with his luggage and without him; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bartleson has indicated that he plans to retire from his legislative duties at the conclusion of the 124th General Assembly; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly that this body expresses its deepest gratitude to Mr. Bartleson for his many years of devoted service to the State of Delaware; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the members of this House wish to express to Mr. Bartleson their best wishes for a long and happy retirement, which he has so richly earned; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mr. Bartleson.

Introduced by Rep. Lesher and entire House. Adopted by voice vote.

HR 130 — Authorizing payment of amount due the Harrington Journal for supplies furnished the 124th General Assembly. Introduced by Rep. Sebrell. On motion of Dr. Sebrell HR 130 was adopted by voice vote.

HR 131 — Authorizing payment of amount due for services rendered by Mr. Joseph W. Pfaff on behalf of the Joint Finance Committee. Introduced by Rep. Sebrell. Adopted by voice vote.

A messenger from the Senate delivered SB 443 and SB 439 informing the House that they have passed the Senate and requesting the concurrence of the House.

Mr. Castle asked for an explanation of the "technicalities" the Governor mentioned in his veto message, and requested privilege of the floor for Mr. Hartnett, Legislative Bureau Director. Mr. Hartnett repeatedly claimed that to the American Bar Association this would be divulging a "confidential memo to the Governor without the Governor's consent". Mr. Zimmerman requested that the bill be deferred until someone else could be found to explain the technicalities.

The Honorable Charles L. Terry, Jr. Governor of the State of Delaware Dover, Delaware

> Re: The Neighborhood Assistance Act (House Bill No. 520)

Dear Governor Terry:

I sincerely regret that you found it necessary to veto the Neighborhood Assistance Act (House Bill No. 520). Your statement that "it is ridiculous on its face" perplexes me when you personally have backed bills this session which provide precisely what this bill proposes.

To my knowledge, this is the first bill introduced into our State Legislature that acknowledges that government - at the state or federal level - cannot as demonstrated by past performance solve all our urban problems. The bill endeavors to foster involvement of the private sector in the problems of the urban areas by giving to business firms a tax-credit for tackling recognized problems. Heretofore, the only financial recognition given to private enterprise was the right to take contributions as a deduction on corporate tax returns. Your Committee on Civil Unrest - more recently concurred in by the President's Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders - advocated tax credits to private industry in return for attempting to solve many of the ghetta problems which the state and national governments have either tried and failed or only scratched the surface. Private enterprise - not government has been the harbinger of progress throughout our American heritage.

When reviewing the number of programs and amounts of money which the General Assembly has appropriated this current session, I am disappointed that you did not feel the private sector could lend a willing hand in this direction. The mechanics set forth in this bill provide, in my judgment, the necessary controls by the Chief Executive to restrict the amounts of money that private enterprise can invest and receive a tax-credit for. I believe that you have made an unwarranted conclusion by claiming that this legislation "could result in a very substantial loss of revenues . . . at a time when we cannot afford it". The simple fact is that we are not losing revenue by encouraging such a program but rather asking the inventiveness of the private sector to do exactly what the state government is indeavoring to promote. Any program for which a tax-credit is approved must fall within the guidelines set forth in the legislation.

Let us briefly review what this General Assembly has approved through appropriations that deal with urban problems:

(1) \$100,000 to the Opportunities Industrialization Center to promote the learning of a trade;

(2) \$350,000 for a limited three-month summer jobtraining program for youths from impoverished areas;

(3) \$340,000 for a statewide recreation program, part of which will certainly be earmarked for the city dwellers;

(4) a \$5 million dollar appropriation for low-income housing.

Without exception, all of these areas could be undertaken, contributed to or operated by the private sector in one form or another. Why, therefore, can we not permit business to attempt a solution to these problems without the usual governmental bureaucratic controls?

I have already noted above that in my judgment such legislation should not be considered a loss of revenue but rather giving the opportunity to private enterprise which state and federal governments have failed to fulfill.

Figures obtained from the State Tax Commissioner indicate that only one corporation in our State would be entitled to the entire \$50,000 annual credit under the basic portion of the bill. There are only twelve corporations that paid Delaware corporate income taxes in 1967 in excess of \$75,000. You stated in one of your press conference that the State would lose between \$700,00 - \$800,000 in revenue. I find this completely unrealistic both as to sum and as to your term of the word "loss".

In conclusion, therefore, I must respectfully ask my colleagues to join me in overriding your veto. The new approach offered by House Bill No. 520 to a yet unresolved basic fundamental problem dictates, in my judgment, that an override is in the best interests of the people of our State.

Mr. Lesher read the following letter:

July 23, 1968

To the Members of the General Assembly of the State of Delaware

I am writing each of you to ask your support of a Bill which New Castle County has prepared permitting quarterly supplemental assessments of real estate and the collection of taxes based upon the supplemental assessments. This Bill would eliminate present inequities and would substantially benefit the Counties and the various school districts.

At present each of the Counties can only assess real property annually. This means, in the case of New Castle County, that only property which appears on the assessment rolls on July 1 of each year can be taxed for the ensuing year. Any new building or improvements to property which occur after July 1 cannot be taxed until July 1 of the next year. Furthermore, the assessment roll must be certified to the County Council in April. Consequently, increases in assessment which occur between April 30 and July 1 may escape taxation unless it is possible to include them by estimate.

Under the Bill which we are supporting, the Counties can, at their option, make quarterly supplemental assessments. This means that in New Castle County any increase in the assessed value of property which occurs between April 30 and July 1 could be taxed on a supplemental assessment roll which would be certified on July 1. Any increase in valuation between July 1 and October 1 could be picked up on the October 1 and January 1 could be included on the January 1 assessment; and any increase between January 1 and April 1 could be placed on the April 1 assessment. The Bill provides that the tax collected under the supplemental assessment procedures would be prorated based on the time remaining in the tax year. For example, increases in assessment roll would pay only 75 percent of the usual annual taxes, because only threequarters of the tax year would be remaining.

The Bill also provides for notice to the property owner of any supplemental assessments and for appeals by the property owner in the event he believes that a supplemental assessment is inequitable.

This Bill would remedy the unfair situation now existing whereby a property owner can improve his property and have the use of it for a substantial period before he is required to pay a tax upon it. Each taxpayer would be required to pay his fair share of the County tax burden. The Bill would also benefit the school districts, since school taxes would also be collected under the supplemental assessment procedures. We strongly urge the adoption of this Bill by the General Assembly.

SB 441 having received a constitutional majority was declared passed by the House.

Mr. Cashman introduced the following:

RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE 124TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY 1967-1968

I. RULES OF ORDER

Rule 1—Convening of House

The House of Representatives shall meet every day (Friday, Saturday, Sunday and holidays excepted) at 1:30 P.M., unless otherwise ordered.

Eighteen of the members elected to the House shall constitute a quorum to do business, but a less number may recess or adjourn from day to day.

Rule 2—Order of Business

1. Calling of House to order.

- 2. Prayer by Chaplain.
- 3. Salute to Flag.
- 4. Roll Call.
- 5. Approval of Minutes.

6. Presentation of petitions, memorials or communications.

7. Reports from Standing and Special Committees.

8. Reporting by the Clerk of prior filed bills and resolutions.

9. Introduction of all other bills and resolutions by members.

10. Calendar for the day.

11. Miscellaneous business.

II. DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER

Rule 3-Call to Order

The Speaker shall take the Presiding Officer's chair at the designated hour and shall call the House to order.

Rule 4—Control over Debate

The Speaker shall have general direction over the House chamber and shall preserve order and decorum. In debate he shall prevent personal reflection and confine the members to the question under discussion. No member shall have the floor except when recognized by the Speaker.

Rule 5—Decide Questions of Order; Appeal

The Speaker shall decide all questions of order. An appeal from his decision may be made by any member if

properly seconded. The appeal shall be upheld only upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present and voting. The Speaker shall not vote on appeals from his own decision.

Rule 6—Temporary Presiding Officer

The Speaker may name a member to perform the duties of Presiding Officer, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment or a recess except when the Speaker obtains leave of absence, in which case he may name a member as Speaker Pro Tempore during such leave which leave shall not exceed five legislative days.

When neither the elected nor appointed presiding officer shall be present, the House shall be called to order by the senior member in terms of service of the Majority Party who shall serve in the interim as the Presiding Officer.

Rule 7—Signing of Bills and Resolutions

The Speaker shall sign all bills and resolutions requiring his signature. All warrants, writs and subpoenas issued by the House shall be signed by the Speaker and attested to by the Chief Clerk. In the absence of the Speaker, the Speaker Pro Tempore shall sign when and where necessary.

Rule 8—Assignment of Bills and Resolutions to Committees

The Speaker shall determine the principal objective of a bill or joint resolution and assign same to the committee to which such subject matter is appropriate. Concurrent resolutions may, in the discretion of the Speaker, also be assigned to committee.

Rule 9—Appointment of Committees

The Speaker shall appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Where illness or other sufficient cause shall compel the absence of any committee member for more than five consecutive legislative days, the Speaker, in his discretion, may fill such vacancy during said absence.

III. CONDUCT OF MEMBERS

Rule 10—Attendance of Members

Every member shall be in his seat at the hour to which the House shall be called to order.

No member shall, unless from illness or other sufficient cause, absent himself from any session of the House without having first obtained leave of absence from the Speaker.

Rule 11—Addressing the House

Every member desirous of speaking shall rise from his desk and respectfully address the Speaker but shall not proceed to speak further until recognized by the chair. His remarks shall be confined to the subject before the House.

Rule 12—Decorum of Members

Every member shall conduct himself in an honorable manner at all times. Personal reflections shall be prohibited.

While the Speaker is putting the question or addressing the House or while a member is speaking, no member or other person shall engage in private conversation or be permitted to walk across or out of the House or pass between the Speaker and the member addressing the House.

A member shall not be interrupted when speaking, except to a call to order by the Speaker or by a member through the Speaker, or by a member to explain, or by a motion for the previous question, or to adjourn.

No member shall be referred to by name in debate, unless for transgression of the rules of the House and then by the Speaker only.

If any member of the House shall transgress the rules, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down and not proceed without leave of the House, which if granted, shall be upon motion that he be allowed to proceed, which motion shall not be debateable.

IV. COMMITTEES

Rule 13—Standing Committees

The standing committees of the House shall be constituted, insofar as possible, in proportion to the number of members of the two political parties.

The Speaker shall appoint the membership of the following standing committees which shall continue during the session.

- 1. Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee
- 2. Appropriations Committee
- 3. Banking and Insurance Committee
- 4. Commerce and Corporations Committee
- 5. Education Committee
- 6. Elections Committee
- 7. Fish, Oyster and Game Committee
- 8. State, Urban and Municipal Affairs Committee
- 9. Health and Welfare Committee
- 10. Highways and Public Safety Committee
- 11. House Administration and Passed Bills Committee
- 12. Judiciary Committee
- 13. Labor Committee
- 14. Miscellaneous Committee
- 15. Public Buildings and Lands Committee
- 16. Revenue and Taxation Committee
- 17. Revised Statutes Committee

Rule 14—Appointment of Special Committees

The Speaker, on his own initiative or upon order of the House, may appoint Special Committees.

Rule 15—Quorum on Committees

A majority of members of any standing or special committee shall constitute a quorum.

Rule 16—Committee Meetings

No committee meetings shall be held while the House is in session without the consent of the Speaker. So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed.

Rule 17—Committee Reports

Committee reports other than only signatures, including minority reports, shall be printed or typewritten.

Bills and resolutions reported out of committee shall be by a majority of the committee. The committee member shall designate whether he is voting (a) favorably, (b) unfavorably, (c) upon the merits.

Rule 18—Committee of the Whole

The Committee of the Whole shall mean and include a committee of the entire membership of the House. So far as may be applicable, the rules of the House shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole.

V. BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

Rule 19—Introduction of Bills and Resolutions; Filing with Clerk

Every bill or resolution shall be introduced by a member or by report of a committee. Introduction may be by either of two methods:

(a) Filing of bills and resolutions with the Clerk of the House.

A bill or resolution may be introduced by being filed with the Clerk of the House not less than one-half hour prior to the opening of the session. A bill or resolution that is filed with the Clerk of the House while the House stands in recess, in adjournment, or is not otherwise meeting, shall be given a number and entered upon a docket kept for that purpose. At the beginning of the day's session following the filing of a bill or resolution with the Clerk, the Clerk shall introduce the bill or resolution. Such introduction of the bill or resolution by the Clerk shall constitute the first reading of such bill or resolution.

(b) A bill or resolution may be introduced from the floor while the House is in session if it is deemed necessary.

Rule 20—Preparation and Custody

Every bill and resolution shall be introduced with an original and seven backed copies marked "duplicate".

While under consideration by the House, the original of the bill or resolution shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk of the House or the chairman of the com-mittee to which it was assigned. A "duplicate" copy shall go to the following: The Speaker, the Majority and Minority Leaders, the Majority and Minority Whips, the sponsor, and the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Upon introduction a copy of each bill or resolution shall be delivered to every member. There shall also be delivered to the Legislative Reference Bureau 160 copies of said bill or resolution and original stencil.

The original of all bills and resolutions shall be produced in such manner as approved by the State Archivist and Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau for permanency and legibility.

No bill or joint resolution shall be introduced into the House unless it be "prefaced" by a brief statement of its purpose which shall be known as the title and shall also contain the text of the bill or joint resolution in full.

Rule 22-First Reading and Assignment to Committee

Every bill and joint resolution when introduced shall be read one time by title only, after which it shall be assigned to the proper committee.

Every bill or joint resolution whether emanating from the House or the Senate carrying an appropriation or which may involve any financial obligation either present or future on the part of the State of more than \$50,000, which has been previously referred by the Speaker under the Rules to any Committee of the House other than the Committee on Appropriations shall, after the same has been reported back to the House, be re-referred for not more than five legislative days to the Committee on Appropriations for its advisory report, if any.

Rule 23—Final Reading and Consideration by House

When brought before the House for passage, each bill and joint resolution shall be given its final reading by title and enacting clause only unless the Speaker directs a reading in full.

No bill, joint resolution, or concurrent resolution, if assigned to committee, shall be brought before the House for passage on the same day it is reported out of committee, nor in the absence of the sponsor without his written consent.

Rule 24—Amendments

Every bill and resolution may be amended at any time before final action is taken. No title of a bill or resolution, however, may be amended or changed except for typographical error.

Rule 25—Substitute Bills

A substitute bill may be introduced by the sponsor of the bill for which it is a substitute. Upon introduction the sponsor shall briefly explain either orally or within the substitute wherein it differs from the original. The substitute shall be assigned to committee and follow the same procedure as other bills.

Once assigned to committee the substitute bill shall render null and void the bill for which it is a substitute.

Rule 26-Petition Bill or Resolution Out of Committee

Every bill or resolution which shall have been in committee for a period of not less than ten legislative days shall, upon written request of eighteen or more members of the House, be reported to the House for a decision as to its further disposal.

Rule 27—Voting

Every bill or joint resolution which shall come before the House for final action shall be acted upon by a roll call vote.

The names of the members of the House shall be called alphabetically and each shall, without debate or comment, answer "yes", "no", or "not voting".

No member shall be permitted to change his vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Chief Clerk.

VI. MOTIONS

Rule 28—Motions to be in Writing

All motions shall be reduced to writing if desired by the Speaker. Any motion may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before an amendment or ordering of the yeas and nays.

Rule 29—Debate and Vote on Motions

Every motion before the House shall be decided in a fair and impartial manner by the Speaker. The vote of a majority of the members present shall prevail in the case of incidental motions, subsidiary motions, or other motions presenting questions of a general procedural nature. The vote of a majority of the elected members shall prevail in the case of privileged motions, main motions, or other motions presenting questions of a substantive nature. Such voting shall prevail unless contrary to these Rules or unless it is in conflict with the statutes or provisions of the Constitution of the State of Delaware.

Rule 30—Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except during roll call, and shall be decided without debate.

Rule 31—Precedence of Motions

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but

- 1. To adjourn.
- 2. To adjourn to a day certain.
- 3. To lay on the table.
- 4. For the previous question.
 - (which four motions shall be decided without debate)
- 5. To commit.
- 6. To postpone to a day certain.
- 7. To postpone indefinitely.
- 8. To amend.

Rule 32—Motion for Previous Question

A motion for the previous question shall not be entertained except at the request of five members rising for that purpose, and shall be determined without debate; but when the previous question has been called and sustained, it shall not cut off any pending amendment. The vote shall be taken without debate, first on the amendments in their order and then on the main question.

Rule 33—Motion for Reconsideration

(a) No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day or on one of the three next succeeding legislative days.

(b) When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of possession of the House and been communicated to the Senate, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Senate to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

VII. CALENDAR

Rule 34—House Calendar

The Clerk of the House shall keep a House Calendar on which shall be placed the number and subject of all bills and resolutions and the name of the introducer thereof; and, if reported from committee, the action of the committee thereon. Said bills and resolutions shall be kept on the Calendar until final action is taken thereon, and such as lie over and other matters undisposed of, shall be placed in the order in which they are presented.

Rule 35—Announcement of Calendar for the Day

Immediately prior to adjournment or recess, the Clerk shall announce to the House by the number, sponsor and/or committee, the bills and/or resolutions that are being placed on the Calendar for the day for the next legislative session. **Rule 36—Delivery of Bills and Resolutions to the Senate**

All bills and resolutions originating in the House, or Senate bills or resolutions to which the House has added amendments or its concurrence, shall be delivered to the Senate by the Chief Clerk of the House or by the Bill Clerk within the five next succeeding legislative days.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

Rule 37—Suspension of Rules

The rules of the House shall not be changed or suspended except by a vote of three-fifths of the members elected to the House, unless these rules otherwise provide.

Rule 38—Authorized Manual of Parliamentary Practice

In all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules, the rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall govern the House.

Rule 39—Supervision of Legislative Staff

The Chief Clerk, or in his absence the Assistant Chief Clerk, shall at all times have complete jurisdiction over the members of the legislative staff. In this respect the Chief Clerk, or Assistant Chief Clerk, shall be directly responsible to the Speaker and House Administration and Passed Bills Committee.

Rule 40—Registration of Lobbyists

Any person who is employed for compensation paid by others than the Legislature and whose employment calls for or includes activity in or about the House of Representatives in regard to legislation must register with the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives. Such person shall disclose in the detail deemed by the Chief Clerk necessary, the following information which will be recorded in a register kept by the Chief Clerk: (1) the name and address of the registrant; (2) the name and address of the registrant's employer including any association, organized group, state agency or office, or labor union, and in case of multiple employers a sufficient number so identified as to indicate the class or classes registered with those interests the registrant is concerned; and (3) the subject or subjects of legislation to which his employment relates.

A person to whom this requirement or registration applies may not appear before a House committee in pursuance of his employment until he is registered except upon special invitation of the committee, nor shall he in such pursuit try to influence the legislative judgment or action of a member of the House.

A person who is registered under this rule, or who should be registered under it, when appearing before a committee shall disclose to the committee those in whose interest he speaks, the purpose of his appearance and when he or the person for whom he appears has a pecuniary or other special interest in a measure or proposal different than the public generally, which is not apparent from his testimony, the fact thereof. Further, in pursuance of the employment for which – he is or should be registered he must not knowingly furnish false information or make a false statement which is material and relevant to any matter with an intention to, or which he should know will have a tendency to influence the judgment or action of the House or of a committee thereof.

Rule 41—Certification of News Media

Accredited representatives of the daily and weekly press, press associations, and of radio and television stations shall be accorded equal press privileges by the House Administration and Passed Bills Committee. Any person wishing to report proceedings of the House may apply to said committee for assignment to suitable available space.

On approval of the House Administration and Passed Bills Committee, radio and television stations shall be permitted to air and record sessions of the House.

Rule 42—Privilege of Floor

The privilege of the floor may be granted by the Speaker upon request of any member.

CONSTITUTIONAL VOTE REQUIREMENTS

I. Three-fourths vote (27) of all the members elected to each House required.

A. To borrow money or create a debt by or on behalf of the State except the following which require only a majority vote of the elected members:

(1.) To supply casual deficiencies of revenue; (2.) Repeal invasion; (3.) Suppress insurrection; (4.) Defend the State in war; (5.) Pay existing debts. Article VIII, Section 3

B. To appropriate public money to any county, municipality or corporation. Article VIII, Section 4

C. To issue or loan bonds of this State to any county, municipality or corporation. Article VIII, Section 4

D. To pledge the credit of the State by guaranteeing or endorsing the bonds or other undertakings of any county, municipality or corporation. Article VIII, Section 4

II. Two-thirds vote (24) of all the members elected to each House required.

A. To expel a member for disorderly conduct. Article II, Section 9

B. To lay out, open, alter or maintain roads and highways which form continuous roads or highways through at least a portion of the three counties. Article II, Section 19

C. To create courts other than constitutional courts. Article IV, Section 1

D. To grant jurisdiction over additional misdeameanors to inferior courts. Article IV, Section 28

E. To initiate impeachment proceedings. Article VI, Section 1

F. To enact or amend the general corporation law. Article IX, Section 1

G. To enact any special act of incorporation. Article IX, Section 1

H. To amend the Constitution. Article XVI, Section 1

III. Three-fifths vote (21) of all members elected to each House required.

A. To override the Governor's veto of any bill or resolution requiring the concurrence of both Houses, except on a question of adjournment. Article III, Section 18

IV. In all other bills and resolutions a majority vote of all the members elected to each House required.

V. Rules:

"Each House may determine the rules of its proceedings". Article II, Section 9

DEBT STATEMENT

Every bill authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes pledging the faith and credit of the State shall be accompanied by a debt statement upon introduction and shall be brought up to date at final consideration. Title 29, Delaware Code, Section 7424.
