WHEREAS, In the year 1849, the Board of Managers of the Washington National Monument Association did publish their circular, stating that they would be pleased to receive a Block of Marble, Granite or other suitable stone, from each State in the Union, with the name of such State thereon engraved, which Block should be placed in an appropriate position in the Monument, and in the order of preference in which such stone should be received. *And whereas*, in pursuance of said circular, a public meeting was held in the City of Wilmington, at which Dr. J. W. Thomson, William R. Sellars, William Chandler, Samuel Canby and John Jones were appointed a committee to procure said block and Collectors to procure subscriptions to defray the expenses.

And whereas, The said committee did immediately procure from the banks of the Brandywine and near the Brandywine Battle Ground, a Block of Granite and caused the same to be properly prepared and decorated on the face, with a medallion bust of Washington and the figures

"1849" in bold relief; and also, to be inscribed thereon the word "Delaware," with the motto, "The first to adopt, will be the last to abandon the Constitution:" which block with marble casings now occupies its destined position in the obelisk. *And whereas*, sufficient funds have not been contributed to defray the expenses of procuring and placing the said block in its position, but the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars yet remains due and unpaid.

Therefore be it, and it is hereby resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Delaware in General Assembly met, That this Legislature does hereby accept the said Block and recognize the same as the contribution of the State of Delaware, to the Monument now being erected to the memory of Washington.

Resolved further, That all dividends upon said stock shall be, and the same are hereby pledged and appropriated to the School Fund of this State, and shall be distributed in the same manner as the interest on the aforesaid sum of twenty-five thousand dollars now is distributed.

Resolved further, however, That no subscription shall be made by the State Treasurer in virtue of these resolutions, until the said New Castle and Wilmington Rail Road company, and the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Rail Road company shall have entered into a contract, as authorized by the act passed at the present session of the General Assembly entitled, "A further supplement to the act entitled, 'An act to authorize the construction of a Rail Road from the town of New Castle to the city of Wilmington,'" by which there shall be guaranteed to the Stockholders of the said first named company, seven per cent. per annum, on the capital stock of said company, clear of all charge and expense whatsoever.

WHEREAS, By the preamble and resolutions of the Select and Com

mon Councils of the City of Philadelphia, adopted the — day of September, 1851, and communicated to this General Assembly, it appears that the design is entertained of erecting by the thirteen States, originally forming this glorious Union a suitable Monument or Monuments, on the spot hallowed by the Declaration of Independence, commemorative of our admiration of the illustrious men, who there promulgated the National principles of civil and political liberty ; our reverence for their character and unalterable attachment to the institutions which were founded and matured by their deliberations, and the wisdom of which has been justified by experience.

And whereas, In the opinion of this General Assembly such memorials are just tributes due to their exalted worth, in gratitude for their eminent zeal which prompted, and their heroism which sustained them; as testifying our estimation of the blessings which have descended on us their posterity ; and as exhibiting to the world the veneration in which we hold the place rendered sacred, by associations so dear to the heart of every freeman and philanthropist. Therefore,

1st. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Delaware, in General Assembly met, That the concurrence of this General Assembly is hereby expressed in the resolutions of the Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia, that a Convention be held in that city on the Fourth day of July next as therein mentioned, to deliberate on the mode by which such object can be best effectuated.

2d. Resolved, That to carry into effect the plan proposed of holding said Convention, the Hon. John M. Clayton and Hon. James A. Bayard be, and they are hereby constituted and appointed delegates, on the part of the State of Delaware.

3d. Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be transmitted by His Excellency, the Governor, to the Select and Common Councils of Philadelphia and the delegates above nominated. •

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Delaware, in General Assembly met, That the State Treasurer be, and he is hereby directed, to pay to Samuel M. On motion of Mr. Martin,

The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate that the House having finished its business for the session, would be ready to adjourn in five minutes.

Which was done.

Mr. Jump of the Senate, being admitted, presented sundry enrolled bills for the signature of the Speaker of the House, and returned others which had received the signature of the Speaker of the Senate.

And he withdrew.

Mr. Boulden from the Committee of Enrollment, reported the following bills as duly and correctly enrolled :

“Joint resolution for the investment of a portion of the School Fund.”

“Resolution directing the State Treasurer to pay certain sums of money to the Commissioners of the revised code.”

“Joint resolutions appointing delegates to the Convention to be held in Philadelphia on the Fourth of July, in relation to erecting Monuments by the thirteen original States to the signers of the Declaration of Independence.”

Mr. Huffington, Clerk of the Senate, being admitted, informed the House that the Senate having closed its business for the session, would be ready to adjourn in ten minutes.

Mr. Harper then offered the following resolution, which,

On his motion,

Was read as follows, to wit :

Resolved, That the thanks of this House are justly due to Samuel Jefferson, Esq., Speaker of this House, for the uniform courtesy of manner that he has exhibited on all occasions, during this protracted and trying session, owing to the vast amount of important business that has occupied and claimed its attention, both of a public and a private nature, through all of which he has ever acted with the utmost impartiality as presiding officer of this House.

Which resolution,

On motion of Mr. Harper,

Was

Adopted unanimously.

The Speaker then arose and delivered the following address :

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

I am fully sensible of your kindness and indulgence to me, during the present session, and for the cordial manner with which you have been pleased to express your approbation of my official conduct. It will be among the most grateful recollections of my life. When called upon by you to the important station of presiding over the deliberations of this house, I approached it with all the diffidence consequent upon a want of experience in the business of Legislation. But relying upon your indulgence, I accepted it with a determination so to conduct myself, as to merit your approbation. How far I have succeeded, appears from the very flattering manner in which you have alluded in your resolution to the discharge of my duties. It is a subject of gratulation that we are about to close a protracted and tedious session, during which probably more labor has been performed, and more interesting and exciting subjects have been before us, than at any previous session for many years, and although in the settlement of those questions we have widely differed, and under the influence of excited feelings we may not always have used that courtesy which is due from one member of a legislative body to another, yet I feel conscious, that we will extend each to the other, that charity which covereth a multitude of faults. Permit me gentlemen, at this moment of perhaps final separation, to thank you for the kind indulgence which you have been pleased to extend to the many errors which I have doubtless committed, and to express to you all my ardent wish that you may have a safe and pleasant return to the bosom of your respective families, there to enjoy all that happiness which is attainable in this life. I now tender to you all a cordial and an affectionate farewell.

In pursuance of a Joint resolution of both Houses, I do now adjourn this House *sine die*.

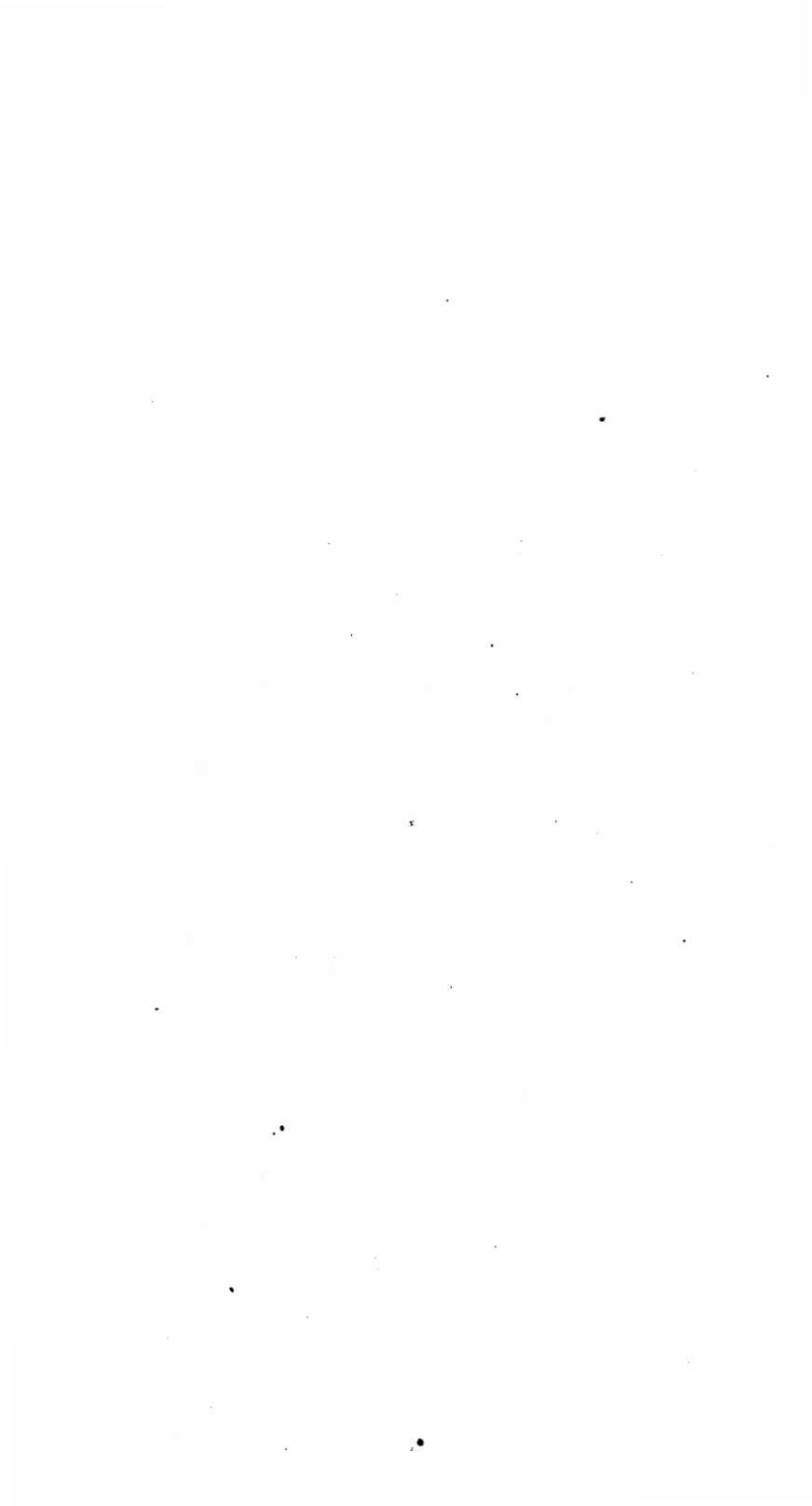
