## Returns down, sales are up

*'Twas the day after Christmas, and all through the stores, sale signs were hung, even on doors.*

*Merchants were waiting by the cash registers with care, in hopes that the shoppers soon would be there.*

*The shoppers were anxious, surrounded by returns, while visions of bargains danced in their heads...*

NEWARK RESIDENTS hit the streets of Newark early this week to take advantage of sales on Christmas paraphernalia. Main Street shops, like Woolworth's, the National 5 & 10, and Rainbow's stationery store, featured 50 percent off of wrapping paper, cards, ribbons and bows.

Newarkers Doty Veasey and her granddaughter, Kelly Laward, were just two of the bargain hunters at Woolworth's this

week. "I like to get my Christmas cards, decorations and bows now," Veasey said. "This is when you can get the good stuff for half the price."

Newark resident Rosemary Waggoner braved the scores of people at the Christina Mall to pick up three boxes of cards and 10 rolls of paper to store for next year.

Main Street merchants can also attest to the volume of sales made on post-Christmas bargains.

"People come in and buy five or six rolls of wrapping paper," Rob Gibson, an employee at the National 5&10, said.

Grassroots associate Joanna Barnekov expressed similar sentiments.

"The Christmas stuff is going like crazy," Barnekov said. "When we opened Monday, we had 20 women in the store right away. They were spending a lot of money on the 50 percent off cards and stuff."

While post-Christmas sales have been high for Main Street vendors, returns have been comparatively low.

"We've had a number of exchanges for

size but the percentage of returns is tiny," Vonna Taylor, of Grassroots, said.

Sales associates like Taylor know that the bulk of exchanges and returns comes the first week but trickle in for another month.

"The bulk of returns is right away, but other's live farther away and it will take them longer to make the trip to Newark," Taylor said.

Gibson added that it takes people a few days to decide whether they like a gift or not.

After picking up cards and wrapping paper on Monday, Waggoner, as Gibson suggested, waited until Tuesday to hit the mall with returns. "I've been returning all day," she said. "I even have to mail back two gifts."

Even when faced with only being refunded half the price she paid for an item because she misplaced the receipt she said, "I don't care how much I get back. I just want to be done."

*...And I heard shoppers exclaim as they left stepping light, Happy New Year to all and to all a good night.*

## Larger city budget allows rebuilding of cut services

City officials aren't yet ready to sing out a chorus of "We're in the money," but the outlook for 1995 is "much brighter now than it was a year ago."

There is almost \$1.5 million or 9.1 percent more money in the City of Newark's 1995 General Operating Budget. The gain, however, includes some surplus money from 1994 (\$894,600) and state bond bill money (\$314,600) — gains which were not anticipated in 1994. Without these, the increase would be 3.4 percent.

In a budget summary, city manager Carl Luft said, "The overall budget for 1995 increases by 9.1 percent. Although this appears to be significant, given the current economy, there is, in fact, only a moderate gain when the budget cuts made last year are factored into the equation."

In September 1993, city officials projected a \$1.5 million revenue shortfall, but managed to cut that number by almost half in its fourth quarter. They

issued a hiring freeze, let some seasonal temporary workers go early and collectively tightened their belts.

So far the city has been able to avoid raising utility costs or property taxes (41 cents per \$100 of assessed value.) The budget does suggest reevaluating water fund rates by mid-

1995 to compare the future costs of supplying water to the money it makes from selling water.

Council members unanimously approved the budget — a grand total of \$17,131,150 up from \$15,703,350 in 1994.

The city will add a full-time refuse collector (cut out of

1994's budget), a part-time water engineer and building code clerk, and temporary/seasonal positions in refuse, street maintenance, parks and horticulture.


More money than last year is allocated for street maintenance repairs, the first phase of a law enforcement accreditation program, employee testing and removal of trees from Christina Creek.

In addition, new technology (specifically upgraded data processing and telecommunication systems) makes up a significant portion of the 1995 budget.

The city is also investigating more cost-effective ways to provide electric to residents.

"A major theme in the 1995 budget is to catch up and build our service base back to where it was two years ago prior to all the cuts made in 1994," Luft said. "Despite this task, we have managed to add some new programs and projects while, at the same time, retain a reasonable cost structure for our customers."



## Crime reports drop nearly 13%

Although repetitive crimes seemed to plague Newark in 1994, the reality is that crime decreased locally by about 13 percent.

The big crime news for Newark this year was not isolated events but repeated criminal activity. Business robberies early in the year, business burglaries this summer, and the recent rash of personal robberies have challenged Newark's municipal law enforcement department.

"It's been a pretty good year in policing," said Newark Police Chief William Hogan.

"But the situation of ongoing crimes, such as the business burglaries and robberies, can be very frustrating to police."

Three armed robberies occurred in January 1994 and targeted busi-

nesses such as the Waterbed Store in College Square Shopping Center, Kentucky Fried Chicken Restaurant on Marrows Road, and Travelodge on Main Street.

Today, police are investigating the five separate robberies of University of Delaware students and Newark residents late at night and in the early daylight hours.

After more than 20 business burglaries this summer, most which occurred on Main Street and in College Square Shopping Center, Newark police finally arrested and charged a Middletown man and two juveniles in connection with the troubling crime spree.

Police did more this year to clean up - literally - the city. More than 200 hours were spent on an intensive graffiti investigation targeting the people responsible for drawing, scribbling and writing on buildings and bridges in town.

The three-month investigation led to the arrest of about 10 people, some who were sentenced to clean up graffiti around Newark.

A decrease in aggravated assaults, other assaults, criminal mischief, weapons offenses and thefts has been reported. Police responded to fewer alcohol, noise and trespass violations this year but drug offenses are up slightly.

Robberies reports remained the same, but burglaries increased in Newark from 157 to 186. Auto thefts increased by 43 reports.

Unlawful sexual intercourse has increased to 10 reports from seven last year. Hogan said most of these reports were acquaintance rapes.

"We feel good about the serial rapist being caught and linked possibly to a few cases in Newark and look forward to proceeding in the prosecution of the man," Hogan said.

# Water, traffic, power top concerns

**M**ANY OF THE ISSUES city officials faced in 1994 are still on the table for 1995.

Newark City Manager Carl Luft said, "We worked hard on a lot of things, but we are still working on them, such as historic preservation regulations and our power supply - the fruits and benefits of our work will occur in 1995."

These benefits are why Mayor Ronald Gardner is looking forward to 1995. Continued improvements to the city's water system, increased attention to traffic problems, and a new contract for the city's power are on Gardner's list of things to do next year.

Although both officials agreed they don't like to dwell on the past, a quick glance back did rekindle some memories, good and bad, on which they commented.

If there was one issue in 1994 the mayor wouldn't like to see repeated in 1995 it was the debate over Daugherty Hall and the parking garage on East Main Street.

"It was an awful lot of aggravation and I'd rather not go through that again," said Gardner. Luft said the death of police dispatcher Diane Zebroski was one of the most difficult times for him and his staff.

But there was much good news for the city

in 1994, according to Luft. Groundbreaking for a new senior center off Marrows Road and acceptance to the National Main Street Center's program were among the highlights he readily recalled.

Being elected chair of WILMAPCO and closing the book on several ongoing issues, such as the fate of the Deer Park Farm property and Wilburfest were high points in the mayor's opinion. But perhaps the best aspect of 1994, according to Gardner, was the continued acquisition of open space.

"This year we pretty much completed efforts on the referendum," said Gardner. "In other words we spent just about all the funds and we will be able to provide some active parkland when growth dictates the need for it - most will just be guaranteed green space."

Both officials are optimistic about 1995. Luft said he is looking forward to settling down on zoning issues, such as Five-T's controversial proposal for a Sleep Inn Hotel at 630 South College Ave., across from the Bob Carpenter Center. Mayor Gardner agreed zoning issues were plentiful. He said the hotel proposal was the hardest vote he made all year. Gardner voted in support of the hotel.

# District schools now linked via fiber optics

**S**MILE! You're on candid camera — in a manner of speaking.

Next month, students and teachers in the Christina School District — with the use of fiber optic telephone lines, video cameras, television sets and computers — will be learning and teaching in high-tech classrooms.

These distance-learning centers place participants in separate buildings interacting through the high technology.

A demonstration at the December Christina School Board meeting premiered the program. Fourth graders from Bayard school spoke French at Christiana High School while board members watched from their seats in

Glasgow High School. Christina superintendent Dr. Iris T. Metts said the distance learning systems now operate anywhere in the mid-Atlantic region and soon anywhere in the world.

Christiana and Glasgow High schools are up and running. Newark High will be connected in January. The district hopes to hook-up middle schools for the 1995-96 next school year. Eventually all schools in the district will go on-line.

A remote control is used to move the cameras around the room and images are digitized through a computer, according to Tom Jarrett of Bell Atlantic, the company that is installing the technology.

The cost to the district to hook up each site is about

\$50,000 and a \$1,550 fee per month to use the system.

Plans for the distance learning centers include SAT and ACT preparation courses, writing courses, math topics, string instrument instruction, advanced placement classes, Japanese and Chinese language classes, counselor meetings, guest lectures, specialized science topics and staff development activities.

While Christina is just beginning the program, distance learning has been up and running in the New Castle County Vocational Technical School District since the beginning of this school year. This district uses the labs for specialized math and foreign language instruction.

# Mondays important without football

The topics at Newark City Council meetings may not be as exciting as Monday night football, but nonetheless, many issues were brought forth and resolved this year that affect the lives of Newarkers.

There were controversial issues that made headlines each week and discussions about new carpet and trash removal. Big or small, decisions were considered with equal attention to detail.

In 1994 Newark endured its second year of budget cuts. City staff tightened their belts and residents did without some capital improvements, such as some road improvements. The former police station and senior center on East Main Street were sold and Newark bought 34 acres of parkland for about \$1 million.

For city councilmembers, the most difficult vote of 1994 was probably during Five-T Associate's battle to win approval for a Sleep Inn Hotel at 630 South College Ave., located across from the Bob Carpenter Center.

The vote was split in 1991, split again in 1993, and finally ended in a tie this spring. The decision did not go uncontested, however, as Five-T ultimately sued the city and won this fall.

Some other issues that filled council chambers included the debate over the University of Delaware's new student center, Wilburfest and numerous other zoning requests.

Council took a couple stabs at problems with rental housing in Newark. They voted to raise rental permits early in 1994 and then later voted beef-up their overcrowding ordinance to place the burden on landlords.

Elections in and around the city were more lively this year than last—in which there were no contested races.

Councilman Tony Felicia decided to run for two offices in 1994. He announced his candidacy for reelection to city council and for the 25th Representative District in

# Desegregation tops headlines throughout '94

The same, steaming controversy that made headlines early this year already is the hot topic of 1995.

It was about a year ago that legislators, educators and parents were debating whether New Castle County school districts should, after 16 years of court-ordered busing, emerge from under federal control.

It was Gov. Tom Carper who, in the summer of 1993, suggested "a concerted effort on the part of the state, local educators, parents and community leaders work out an agreement" to avoid having the desegregation case taken back to court.

All four school districts (the defendants) under the order — Christina, Red Clay, Colonial and Brandywine — voted to join the state in asking for the end of court-ordered busing.

Then, a federal judge asked the school districts and the Coalition to Save Our Children (the plaintiff, who represents the interests of minority children in Wilmington, to work together to draw up an out-of-court settlement.

They did agree, but the controversial consent order failed to be voted on in the Delaware Legislature.

Since the consent order was not approved by the state legislators, now the desegregation

case is in federal court in Wilmington. U.S. District Judge Sue Robinson will decide whether forced busing must continue or not.

The court case will be argued through Jan. 10 in courtroom 3 of the Caleb Boggs Federal Building in Wilmington.

It is because Christina superintendent Iris Metts believes schools will change, whether the court order is lifted or not, that she began a district task force in 1994 comprised of parents, teachers and citizens to study how the district can better educate children.

The task force is studying magnet, Montessori, cluster, traditional and year-round schools.

But Christina administrators and board members, while not sure about the outcome of the court case, do know for sure more elementary schools are needed to keep pace with a burgeoning school-age population in the Bear/Glasgow area.

Just this month, although it has been in plans for some time, Christina School Board members okayed March 7 as the date people living in the district will decide whether or not to pass a proposed referendum to raise property taxes.

If the referendum passes, Christina will use the money to build two new elementary school and renovate and repair 11 schools.

Some things on the Christina School Board stayed the same this year, while there was an unexpected change.

James Kent was victorious in running for reelection to a third five-year term to the board and was also reelected to board president.

But just as it seemed the school board would remain constant until the next election, member Susan Mitchell tearfully resigned for personal reasons.

The Christina Board asked for applicants

to fill the District C seat and received seven qualified candidates. They chose Terry Schooley, mother of two Newark High School graduates, as the new board member.

It was also during 1994 that students were in school late into summer (June 15) due to the inclement weather and the excessive number of snow days (12, but Gov. Carper forgave three days) tallied last winter.



## Time to end demolition derby

IT SEEMS AS THOUGH 1995 might be off to a good start even before it begins. We welcome the news this week that state transportation officials have included the extension of Wyoming Road, between Library Avenue and Marrows Road, in its draft of the 1996-98 Capital Improvement Program.

The much-needed extension — possibly one of the shortest but vitally important road projects anywhere in the First State — has been in limbo since 1987, when the City of Newark first included the Wyoming project in its comprehensive plan.

The extension plan appears to be a sound one. While the draft will not be up for public review until next month, from what we have been told by city officials, construction would route travelers behind Pep Boys and K-mart in College Square and provide direct service to the Delaware Technology Park adjacent to the busy shopping center.

The College Square shopping center traffic patterns, entrances and exits were designed to discourage drivers from cutting

through to Marrows Road. However, frustrated drivers wanting to avoid congestion on Ogletown Road regularly engage shoppers in a sort of demolition derby as both negotiate the busy lot. It has been a dangerous condition for years with only near misses and close calls surpassing actual collisions. The extension would relieve this potentially deadly situation.

DelDOT officials are enthusiastic about the project, according to the associate city planner, but it's far from a done deal. The extension must make it into the final capital program, then be approved by the General Assembly.

Our new state representatives, who should be eager to return the favor to the Newark voters who elected them, should get behind this project. One of their first actions in office should be to inform state transportation officials about the dangerous situation now in Newark, list the benefits the Wyoming project will have on future development in the technology park, and encourage its inclusion in the final capital budget.

## Kids do more than talk to animals

AS WE TALLIED UP OUR 52 issues this year, even we were amazed at how much space we devoted to education. Certainly, many stories informed readers of the actions of the Christina School Board and district officials, building and construction problems, desegregation maneuvers and education budgets. But, as well, we devoted hundreds of column inches to publicizing just some of the many good things going on in our neighborhood schools. #### Murderer escapes in mysterious manner

The murderer, supposed to be locked securely in one of a series of cells opened only by levers worked from an outside corridor, in the most mysterious manner passed

# Worried about animals, students aid Cecil zoo

**T**HIRD GRADERS at Downes Elementary School have heard the roar and plea of the wild. And they responded by raising about \$300 to help feed animals at the troubled Plumpton Park Zoo in Cecil County, Md.

Officials of the nearby Maryland county shut down the zoo in October because of electrical code violations.

The zoo is home to nearly 500 animals, ranging from a giraffe, bear, cougar, camels, bison, zebra and sheep to animals such as those that were brought to Downes Elementary this month to thank the children in person. Animals traveling to Newark included a turtle, a bird, and even an eight-and-a-half foot python snake named Baby Monty.

The children in Eleanor Williams' class officially formed the "Save the Animals Club" after hearing through the media that animals at the zoo might be killed at the beginning of the year.

Students Katie Duffy and Steven Salevan were founders of the club. "I heard the animals were going to be killed," said Steven, "and I tried my best to prevent it."

Williams said the children talked about how to save the animals during recess and decided to raise money.

After getting permission from Downes principal Charles Haywood, the children made a box for donations and set it in the school's entrance hallway.

Williams said her students made posters to promote the fund raiser and created an animal word search game that was given to students who donated to the youngsters' cause.

"These and other donations buy

us time," said Martin Walsh, of the Plumpton Park Zoo. "We are still very hopeful that we will reopen. Without things like this, it wouldn't be possible to keep the animals."

The zoo official said it has been donations such as the one from the Downes students that have ensured that animals have not been put to sleep. He said there has been an outpouring of donations of both money and food.

Walsh said while some farm animals could be sold or given away, wild animals are hard to relocate. Other zoos do not have room and some animals are injured and cannot be released from captivity.

Walsh said, for some animals, Plumpton Park Zoo is the last stop. "Some can and would be relocated," he said, "but the majority we cannot find homes for."

Walsh said while other zoos have limited space, Plumpton Park has plenty of space for animals but lacks necessary funding.

Diane Thompson, with Plumpton Park, said the zoo was 80 percent financially self-sufficient before it was closed. She said Cecil County, Md. Department of Parks and Recreation took over the zoo eight years ago from private ownership.

"If the county will pay to fix the electrical problems, then we can reopen," said Thompson.

In the meantime, it is donations big and small which keep the zoo animals fed. The Downes class plans on taking a field trip to the zoo this spring.

## New Year's traditions

Customs range from mourning old year to ringing in the new

**A**S PEOPLE MAKE New Year's resolutions, they may wonder what other traditions accompany the spirit of "in with the new and out with the old."

Resolution is defined as the "act or result of resolving or answering a question or a problem" as printed in Webster's New International Dictionary.

According to *The American Book of Days* by George William Douglas, "New Year's festivals once included rites which were supposed to ward off the barrenness of winter and ensure the return of spring with its fertility."

The book says, Armenian-American storytellers believed all rivers would stop flowing for five minutes at midnight on New Year's Eve. Up to the year 1900, it was a custom in Kau district for every Hawaiian to wear black on the last day of the year to mourn its end.

On New Year's Day in Scotland it was an ancient custom for boys to go from house to house asking for money and food and singing this ditty, "I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, A pocketful of money and a cellar full of beer. And a good fat pig, to serve you all year, ladies and gen-

tleman sitting by the fire. Pity us poor boys out in the mire."

It has been a custom from the beginning that American presidents welcome the new year in by holding a reception for the public. On the first New Year's Day after his inauguration, President George Washington held an open house to receive the people.

Letting out the old and ringing in the new is a very old custom for New Years.

As recent as the 20th century, on New Year's Eve, mothers would go to the front door and open it wide, go to the back door and stand there

for a moment honoring the biting chill that swept through the house," according to *The Folklore of American Holidays* edited by Hennig Cohen and Tristram Potter Coffin.

At one time in Maryland, the book reports, New Year's Eve was known for its private masquerade parties where all guests were masked until the clock struck midnight and the masks were removed.

Now, as in the past, is the custom to ring the new year with bells, chimes, whistles and noise.

## Tax credits for low-income workers

**T**HE EARNED INCOME Credit (EIC) is a tax benefit for low-income workers.

For those who owe federal income tax, it can reduce or eliminate the tax they owe, and some workers can get money back. Even workers who don't owe income tax can qualify. These workers receive their entire EIC in a check from the IRS.

In tax year 1992, over 14 million families received a total of \$13.4 billion in EIC benefits. The average family's credit was \$933.

The EIC used to be available only to workers who were raising children. But in 1994, a small credit — worth up to \$306 — will be available to some low-income workers who aren't raising children.

Eligibility for the EIC depends on a family's size and income. Workers without a qualifying child who earn less than \$9,000 in 1994 are eligible for a credit of up to

\$306. Families with one child who earn less than \$23,755 in 1994 are eligible for a credit of up to \$2,038. Families with two or more children who earn less than \$25,296 are eligible for a credit of up to \$2,528.

In most cases, the EIC will not affect eligibility or benefit levels for federal assistance programs, including AFDC, Medicaid, SSI, food stamps, or public or subsidized housing.

To get the Earned Income Credit, file a federal tax return. If you were raising children in your home in 1994, file form 1040 or 1040A, not form 1040EZ. Be sure to attach Schedule EIC. If you were not raising children in your home in

1994, file form 1040, 1040A or 1040EZ. You don't need to file Schedule EIC.

You can still get the EIC even if you haven't filed for a long time. If you were eligible you can claim the EIC for three years back. Call the IRS to find out how. If you owe back taxes, the EIC may lower your tax bill. You may also be able to work out a payment agreement.

Many legal immigrants who are employed are eligible for the EIC as well, including green card holders, refugees, and others legally authorized to work. Getting the credit will not hurt your immigration status.

If you don't know how to file a tax return, get free help filing your tax return and more information about the Earned Income Credit by calling the IRS at 1-800-829-1040.

**Mankin, 'UD professor emeritus**

**N**EWARK resident, Victor J. Mankin, a retired Professor Emeritus of the University of Delaware, died Dec. 17, 1994, at his home in Nottingham Green from complications of Parkinson's disease.

Dr. Mankin, 74, was raised in the Chestnut Hill section of Philadelphia and earned a degree in Psychology from Millersville University in 1946. During World War II he was a Chief Petty Officer in the Navy and taught Aircraft Hydraulics at the Naval Air Technical Training Center in Chicago.

After working as a machinist and teaching industrial arts at a vocational high school, he was employed by the Wilmington School District as a guidance counselor. He received his doctorate in education from Temple University in 1950.

Dr. Mankin became Supervisor of Guidance for the Wilmington Public School System where he remained until joining the faculty of the University of Delaware in 1965. In 1976, Dr. Mankin was the recipient of the National Vocational Guidance Association Award for Innovation and Exemplary Practices.

He was coordinator of the School Counselor Preparation Program in the Education Department until retiring in 1979. The Delaware Personnel and Guidance Association established a Counselor of the Year Award in his name in that year.

Dr. Mankin enjoyed woodworking, sailing and falconry. He was a licensed falconer who trapped and trained birds of prey. His favorite falcon was Graybar, a prairie falcon which he kept and flew regularly for almost ten years. He occasionally spoke to school children and civic groups about the ancient sport of falconry and enjoyed networking with falconers from other states.

He is survived by his wife of 47 years, Louisa Clafin Mankin; a daughter, Lynn Mankin of Newark; two sons, Mark of Newark and James of State College, Pa.; his mother, Edna Davis Mankin, and a sister, Elaine Mankin Rafetto, both of West Chester, Pa.; and a granddaughter.

**Fiedler still *the* classical conductor**

**T**HIS IS THE LAST edition of the *Newark Post* for 1994 and that means it's retrospective time. Contemplating my review this year was actually an easy task. This year marks the 100th birthday celebration of a man who is *the* classical music conductor to millions of Americans — even to some who "don't like classical music" — Arthur Fiedler.

I am one of those who has but pleasant thoughts about this man born 100 years ago in Boston.

I remember as a child hearing him on the Esplanade and in later life in the hallowed Symphony Hall in Back Bay — with all of the orchestra level seats replaced by cafe tables and chairs.

I remember being mesmerized by this bigger than life person who brought communicants of the classics and those who weren't together on the banks of the Charles for a rollicking good time. I met him only once, but I liked him.

Fiedler has the distinction of being the best-selling conductor in history. His records, later CDs, with the Boston Pops are way ahead of the greatest masters of the baton in the history of music. His RCA Victor Red Seal recordings have opened the door to classical music to literally millions of fans.

Even though his reputation is built on Pops, he was a serious musician. After beginning the study of violin at a very early age with his father, he went to Berlin to

study conducting, piano and violin. His professional career began in 1915 when young Arthur joined the Boston Symphony Orchestra as a violinist. During those years he organized the Boston Sinfonetta. This later became known as the Fiedler Sinfonetta.

That was in 1929 that he founded the now internationally renowned Esplanade Concerts.

That was the turning point in his career. A year later he was appointed music director of the Boston Pops, fulfilling an ambition to bring what he called "light" classical music to the public at large. He held that position until his death in 1979.

A grateful public has remembered him in so many ways. He had a great love of music and people and the people returned that love. One of the most memorable occasions was on the evening of the bicentennial concert, July of 1976. Over 400,000 people jammed the Esplanade to hear the concert and the standing ovation lasted well into the night. If you walk across the expressway that parallels the Charles River near the Esplanade, you walk over Arthur Fiedler Bridge. A prominently placed plaque makes sure all the pedestrians know it too. There are so many other tributes, but that one is there to greet me — and millions of others — as we enter that ground dedicated to music and see the beautiful wooden shell. The price of admission is still the same

as when Fiedler conducted. It's free! He fulfilled his ambition which I mentioned earlier. His record and CD albums, concerts, television and radio broadcasts forged a legacy that brought the classics to the masses. His love for all styles of music and his fantastic ability to communicate in the universal language of music are legendary.

And during this Fiedler Centennial Celebration, RCA is providing an opportunity to for his many fans to have access to some out-of-print recordings and, for some yet-to-be fans, an opportunity to discover the genius of his interpretation of all kinds of music.

First there is a boxed set called "Arthur Fiedler: The Collection." It includes three CD remakes of his records "Marches in Hi-Fi," "Gaité Parisienne" and "Hi-Fi Fiedler." That particular arrangement of the Offenbach opus has long been my favorite.

Another centennial offering is "100 Fiedler Favorites" with some of the maestro's best loved classic performances. This eight-hour tribute covers just about every facet of the conductor's career. It would be hard not to find one or two of your favorites here.

On the lighter side there's "Arthur Fiedler and Friends," which includes collaborations with Duke Ellington, Leontyne Price, Al Hirt, Stan Getz, Peter Nero and many other luminaries of the music world. It's hardly necessary for me to tell you what the music is like in "Strauss Family Waltzes."

This coming Saturday evening as we prepare for 1995, there will be a lot of Fiedler in the air around our house. It is fun music, it is the music of celebration and, more simply it is music my family enjoys.

Happy birthday centennial, Arthur Fiedler! You are one of those very special and rare people who more than fulfilled his ambition.

**Paper Mill plan on council agenda Tuesday**

Newark Planning Commission will vote on a new proposal for homes along Paper Mill Road at its meeting Tuesday night.

City Council bounced a plan for 200 homes back to the planning commission this fall, saying it need-

ed to be more creative and have less units.

Richard duPont, whose family has owned the land since the 1930s, has reapplied. He needs the commission and city council to rezone his 74.12 acres from office space to residential/commercial.

His new plan includes some commercial facilities, such as a restaurant and corner store, mixed

with residential neighborhoods.

In other business, the planning commission will vote to close the loophole that city officials believe Five-T Associates — developers of the Sleep Inn Hotel across from the Bob Carpenter Center on South College Avenue — were able to slip through in a recent lawsuit the city lost.

January. He ran unopposed for council and lost the bid for state office.

Councilman Olan Thomas, who served on council longer than anyone in Newark's history, was defeated by Gerald Grant. He lost by 54 votes.

Newark City Solicitor, Thomas Hughes, decided to retire this year after serving almost 20 years with council.

Plans for the Deer Park Farm property went through more public changes than any other this year. In the beginning townhouses were proposed. The plan received much opposition and the owner soon withdrew his application. Questions about the property, located at 48 W. Park Place, resurfaced when the owner tried to raze the historic farm house.

Council told him he couldn't, so he rezoned the land, torn down the

building and planned four single family homes.

He returned to council a few months later asking to change the zoning again and approve a church. Council approved the church and presumably the fate of the parcel is now sealed.

In March, Council voted to fill the void left when the Newark Department Store left the Newark Shopping Center with a Jolly Rogers Family Restaurant.

The summer of 1994 was filled with hopes of getting aid from the National Main Street Center, which was approved for Newark and eight other cities in Delaware.

City planners learned some lessons later in the summer. The demolition of the rear portion of Daugherty Hall and the Deer Park Farm house spurred a grass roots movement to get the city to adopt strict laws that will protect historic structures.

The draft of a historical ordi-


nance, which some community members say limits the rights of historic property owners, will be voted on in early 1995.

"Hot issues," such as community pressure to somehow change the university's charter to make it adhere to city zoning laws and the push for a bypass around Newark heated up about the same time as November elections.

A proposal for 200 new homes on Paper Mill Road didn't excite council members in early fall. They told the landowner to draft a different, more creative plan.

Planning commissioners will vote on a new and improved plan next week. Council included a presentation on one of its agendas to accommodate residents who live near Christina Creek.

These neighbors had formed a working group and came to council with a slide presentation detailing flooding damage.

it in its 1987 comprehensive plan. Maureen Roser, Newark's associate planner, said the "program development" category is "a sort of limbo" where state transportation planners place projects before they are pulled out and listed separately.

Roy Lopata, city planning director, said the road will help service the Delaware Technology Park and reduce the number of drivers who cut through College Square Shopping Center to avoid Ogletown Road.

According to Lopata, if the project makes it into the final draft of the CIP, then the General Assembly will

vote whether to include it with the state's budget in June.

"The project is high on our list," said Lopata. "And we're convinced it should be high on everyone's list."

If the project is approved, preliminary engineering will begin in 1996, with construction to follow in the 1998-2000 time frame.

Lopata said DeDOT's draft should be available for the public to review sometime in January.

Although the holidays are coming to an end, there is an on-going need for food donations and money to feed those in need. Nardo stockpiles food year-round for the hungry.



## Best in the state

St. Mark's Morelli, Glasgow's Kleinburd lead girls honor roll

St. Mark's, Glasgow and Newark are quickly swimming away from the rest and dominate the girls swimming honor roll.

The trio owns 35 of the state's possible 60 best times and points (diving). The defending state champion Spartans have a first-place time with Lauren Morelli in the 100 backstroke (1:02.89), while Adrienne Welch from Glasgow is second (1:04.4) and Newark's Carolyn Firchak has the No. 3 spot (1:04.88).

The Spartans have a top time in the 200 medley relay (1:54.87) and the most points in 3-meter diving (215.10).

Glasgow's Kari Kleinburd clocked a 1:59.90 in the 200 freestyle and is tied for first with Padua. Kleinburd anchored the 200 freestyle relay with Valerie Dillon, Welch and Leslie Stagg as the Dragons swam a state-best 1:45.97. St. Mark's is second (1:46.19). Alyss Lange clocked the second-best time of 1:02.27 in the 100 butterfly for the Dragons.

"And all three of the schools haven't even shown what we have yet," said Glasgow Coach Dave Kohan. "Most of these times are from earlier meets."

Newark doesn't have a No. 1 time but owns eight positions, including Firchak's third in the 200 IM (2:16.55) and Deb Caron's fourth-place times in the 500 and 200 freestyle events. Newark is third in the 400 freestyle relay (3:53.13) and the Spartans are second (3:50.47).

"Glasgow is going to be tough," said Newark Coach Dave Arles, looking ahead to the Jan. 20 showdown. "They'll swim against A.I. du Pont first (Jan. 12), so I'll see what they have. But a lot of teams haven't had some of their swimmers yet because of other (national and regional) meets. So other swimmers will be popping up."

"St. Mark's is head-and-shoulders above the rest," Arles said. "They'll be tough to keep up with; they have too many good swimmers. Padua is still strong. It will be a tough state meet."

The Yellowjackets (3-1) beat Wilmington, Padua and A.I. this year and lost to St. Mark's.

Cheryl Emmett from Christiana holds the second spot in the 500 freestyle with a time of 5:26.46.

Dixon, Drummond, Burkhard set pace, Larsen anchors distance medley relay

Glasgow High shattered a school record Tuesday as the Dragons, Newark and St. Mark's opened the 1995 indoor track season by competing in the third annual Diamond State Indoor Track Invitational at Delaware Field House.

The distance medley relay team of Rob Dixon (400 meters), Damon Drummond (800), Mike Burkhard (1200) and Matt Larsen in the mile (1600) finished sixth overall with a clocking of 11:12 to eclipse the previous mark of 11:26.

"I had a cramp, a right side stitch again," said Larsen, a senior cross-country star who substituted for Joe Sharkey, who was ill. "I said 'I'm just going to try to run through this'. One of our guys was sick so I had to jump in there for him. I came out with not that bad a split (4:44), so I was pretty pleased."

"We knew for a fact that we just wanted to beat St. Mark's and Salesianum; we have a lot more talent than they do, at least in the beginning of the season," Larsen said. "You know the out-of-state teams are going to be trying to win because they're so much better than Delaware teams. So you try to stay up with them and have it carry you through to a good time."

"We just expect the kids to do the best they can do," said Glasgow Coach Art Madric. "We had a sixth place overall finish in

boys distance medley relay. It was real nice finish, all the kids ran really well. They did a real nice job."

The 130-team event drew top-level track and field athletes from Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, New York, Washington D.C. and Virginia.

Glasgow's Crystal Lambert, Kina Thornton, Nina Haley and Raegan Byrd won the Delaware Division girls 4 x 400 relay. Lambert, defending state champion in the 55-meter hurdles, placed fifth in that event with a time of 8.8.

"We're kind of watching and looking at our people and the Delaware competition," said Madric. "This meet basically is an indicator of where you are right now."

Newark's Nashawn Jackson, Keisha Bradey, Kyneta Lee and Crystal Smith teamed up to place second in their heat of the girls 4 x 200 relay despite a bad exchange between the first and second legs.

"This is a great competition," said Newark Coach Frank Smith. "I'm glad they went to a two-day format because it gives you an chance to relax and concentrate on your team individually. This is an opportunity for us to get a good look at some new kids as well as some veterans. I love this meet."

"This is our first meet whereas we're competing against a lot of out-of-state schools who have one or two meets under their belts," said St. Mark's Coach John Lanutti. "So it's more or less practice for us."

## Hodgson Silver Eagles soaring for new coach Bender

Inaugural win over vocational rival Delcastle 'monumental'

Hodgson's Silver Eagles have lofty ambitions, but they know the real work begins from the ground up.

"A lot of kids want to come out of here with a positive experience and a fine education," Bender said. "I really enjoy the excitement. The kids feed off that and we're being successful. When I see that my eyes light up; I'm happy as heck I'm here. It's been great from the beginning."

The Silver Eagles are off to one of their best-ever starts, a 4-2 mark that includes an

inaugural 69-59 win over arch-nemesis and vocational school rival Delcastle.

"The win over Delcastle is monumental. That's a big school and they're a big team," Bender said. "It's a credit to our kids and the coaching staff."

Playing point guard for Hodgson is 6-foot-1 freshman Jeffrey Goff, who carries a 3.6 grade-point-average. He'll be joined by 5-foot-9 senior guard Scott McFarland, who

set a tournament record last year with seven three-point baskets. Both average about eight assists per game.

"(Goff) is quite a floor leader for us," Bender said. "He gets the ball where we want it; he's got that senior presence of mind. He and McFarland are leading the team in assists; that's everything you can ask from the top men."

Freshman Lloyd Price is a 6-foot-4 forward averaging 14 points-per-game. Wendell Camper, a 6-foot-3 sophomore, starts at the other forward and junior center Corey Forehand rounds out the frontcourt.

"Forehand's a scorer; he was top in the conference last year," Bender said. "Price is a good, quick rebounder, and Camper is strong inside."

Five-foot-9 senior guard Andre Ross gives Hodgson defensive versatility and Kevin Kelly, a 6-foot-3 junior, is a strong rebounder and forward-type player. Isaiah Smith is a 6-foot-3 junior forward and Dave Johnson is a 6-foot-6 freshman swingman.

In a recent 72-62 win against Wilmington

Christian last week, Price led all scorers with 21 points and 12 rebounds. Camper added 19 points, Forehand had 15, Ross added seven, Kelly and Smith four each and Goff had two.

Rounding out the team is 6-foot-3 junior forward Manny Banks, 5-foot-8 junior guard Cameron Donovan and sophomore guard Todd Gilbert.

"We move the ball around quite a bit," Bender said. "We're small but we try team-wise to be multi-defensive. We're a youth-oriented team."

Bender, who has taught since 1969 in the vocational school district, coached basketball teams at Salesianum, Delcastle for 18 years, Wilmington College, A.I. du Pont, and at Caravel the past two years, where he led the Buccaneers to the state tournament the last two seasons.

"The same thing applies here that applied at A.I. and at Caravel," Bender said. "Both programs were down, but we sell the kids that we can win and we show them we can win with discipline."

Following a thrilling overtime victory against crosstown rival Glasgow, the 'Jackets fell in the final minutes to McKean in a state semifinal game at drizzly Baynard Stadium. "I think our guys showed a lot of class," said Coach Hugh Mitchell. "We stood in there like men."

Christiana's boys basketball team advanced to its first-ever state championship semifinal only to lose to Caesar Rodney in the final seconds. "I'm very pleased," said Coach Ron Hollis. "It was a great season by my kids."

St. Mark's softball team made it to the semifinals where they fell to Padua.

**School best:** Glasgow's boys cross country team. The Dragons won their first Flight A championship since sharing the title as

co-champs with the girls team in 1984. "The team's pretty high about the whole thing right now," said Coach Ron Hull, following a perfect 9-0 season, 7-0 in the conference. "It's really nice to go undefeated."

**Personal best:** Newark's Jody Russell was named the Newark Post Athlete of the Year. Russell was named All-State receiver on the football team, All-State outfielder for baseball and honorable mention as a basketball player.

"This year's been great," said the 6-foot-6, 210-pound Russell.

**Flying high:** Hodgson Vot-Tech emerged as a wrestling power as the Silver Eagles charged through the regular season unbeaten to capture their inaugural Flight B title, the first conference championship of any kind in school history. Hodgson advanced to the Division II state championship and lost to Smyrna.

### Patrick places fifth in 55-meter dash

The top high school runners from the Mid-Atlantic region descended on Delaware Tuesday and Wednesday for the third annual Diamond State Indoor Invitational track meet at University of Delaware Field House.

The event attracted over 130 different schools including Glasgow, Newark and St. Mark's.

"It was a really competitive field this year for the meet," said Newark Coach Frank Smith. "We knew coming in that we were up against some good athletes."

Glasgow's Rob Dixon, who won a state championship and a first place at the Diamond State Indoor meet in the 55-meter hurdles last year, settled for a consolation victory Wednesday in the same event.

Dixon also took top honors last week in the 55-meter event while competing at the Bishop Lawson games in Bronx, New York.

"I'm disappointed with my finish," said Dixon. "Physically I am ready but mentally I am behind."

"Rob is a gifted runner," said Glasgow Coach Art Madric. "He is a top notch runner that will use this loss as motivation."

The Diamond State meet also gives local athletes the opportunity to be watched by college scouts.

Since the start of the event three years ago hundreds of college recruiters have attended to watch some of the fastest runners in the nation.
