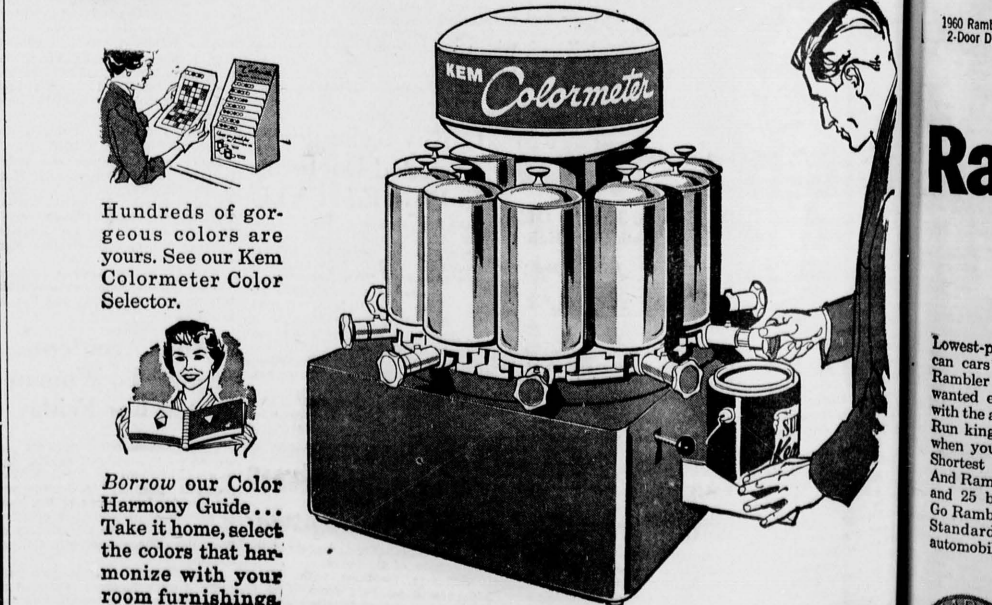

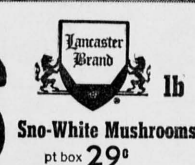

Blue Cross-Shield Provides Students New Hospital Plan

Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage will be available to eligible full-time students under a new contract, being offered for the first time, it was announced yesterday by Robert C. Denzler, assistant managing director of Group Hospital Service, Inc.

The new contract offers standard Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage to individual students at rates lower than other individuals pay.

The coverage is year-around and not just during the school term, Denzler pointed out. He said the new contract is being offered in line with Group Hospital Service's policy of trying to meet community needs as they develop.

The numbers of Delaware college students are increasing to the point where a new contract tailored for their specific requirements was needed.

To be eligible for the new, low cost student contract, persons must be full-time students under 23 years of age who are either residents of Delaware attending school in or out of Delaware, or residents of any state attending school in Delaware—are in good health, do not have other hospitalization coverage, and are not employed on a regular full-time basis.

Present Blue Cross-Blue Shield members who are eligible for the new student contract may apply for it now. Application forms may be obtained through the Group Hospital Service offices. Other eligible students may apply during statewide enrollment week, Nov. 23-30.

Students under 19 may be covered in family contracts, and this will be unchanged with the offering of the new contract.
