DelDOT: Major overhaul of Elkton Road to begin in 2019

A \$25 million road reconstruction project slated to begin in spring 2019 will bring major changes to Elkton Road, including a third lane, a separated bike path and intersection im-

provements.

The project will provide a more permanent solution to the potholes and rough road surface that plagued the highway for two years, according to Delaware Department of Transportation officials, who unveiled the plans Monday night.

"This is the long-term fix," Project Manager Michael Nauman said. "Everything before was the proverbial Band-Aid."

The roads took a beating during

UD seeks hotel partner

Project proposed for STAR Campus

University of Delaware officials are seeking interest from developers to build a hotel and conference center on the burgeoning STAR Campus.

On Monday, UD issued a call for companies to submit letters of interest detailing their qualifications and ideas for the project. Plans will be considered on a rolling basis, and the process will eventually culminate in a formal request for proposal.

Jeremy Sunkett, director of real estate for UD, said a hotel has always been in the university's long-range plan for the 272-acre site, which UD purchased from

City honors fallen Aetna firefighter

On Monday night, city council honored Senior Firefighter Jerry Fickes, who died last month while battling a blaze in Wilmington's Canby Park neighborhood.

Fickes, 51, was a longtime member of Newark's Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Co. and at one time served as an assistant chief.

The fire, which officials allege was intentionally set by one of the residents, broke out in the early morning hours of Sept. 24. When Wilmington firefighters entered the home, the floor collapsed, trapping three — Lt. Christopher Leach, Ardythe Hope and Brad Speakman — in the basement.

Fickes went into the house

to save them, but fell when the floor collapsed further. Fickes, who had been employed by WFD for 13 years, died as a result of the collapse, as did Leach, a 14-year veteran of the department. Hope and Speakman were injured and are still recovering.

Fickes left behind his wife, Laura, and two sons, 18-year-old Benjamin and 16-year-old Joshua.

On Monday, Deputy Mayor Stu Markham presented Laura Fickes with a resolution from the city, calling her husband's death "a great loss to the Newark community."

"Jerry Fickes will be remembered for his dedication, hard work, strength and his love for firefighting, which came second only to his love for his family," Markham said.

Annual Newark Halloween parade set for Sunday

A tradition nearly seven decades strong will continue Sunday when the 69th annual Halloween parade marches down Main Street.

The parade will start at 3 p.m. at Tyre Avenue and Main Street and then head west on Main Street to North College Avenue.

More than 50 groups signed up for the parade.

Costumed individuals or families who want to march alongside these groups may do so by checking in with parks and recreation staff at George Read Park (across from Newark High School) by 2:30 p.m. Sunday.

Before the parade kicks off, the Downtown Newark Partnership will host

A Pumpkin Palooza from noon to 2 p.m. on the Academy Lawn. At this new event, guests of all ages will be able to buy a pumpkin to carve or paint using provided supplies. Brewed Awakenings will provide free coffee and lemonade as well as sell baked goods. Volunteers from the Newark Arts Alliance will offer free face painting.

"We know families come down to Main Street early to find the best spot to watch the parade," DNP administrator Megan McNerney said in a statement. "A Pumpkin Palooza will provide a fun, welcoming atmosphere for visitors and give them something to do while they wait for the parade to begin."

The annual Trick-or-Treat Main Street will begin immediately after the Halloween parade, and children will be able to go from business to business, collecting candy from Main Street merchants.

Due to the festivities, the following streets will be closed on Sunday from 2:30 to 5 p.m.: Main Street (Library Avenue to North College Avenue), Tyre Avenue and Delaware Circle. Delaware Avenue (South Chapel Street to Library Avenue) will be closed from 2:30 to 4 p.m.

There are no rain dates for any of these three events. In case of inclement weather, call the Leisure Time Hotline at (302) 366-7147.

Council authorizes city to explore purchasing VFW property

City officials may be sitting down soon with leaders of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 475 to discuss potentially buying the property located behind the municipal building.

Council discussed the issue behind closed doors before Monday's regularly scheduled meeting and publicly voted 4 to 2 to direct City Manager Carol Houck to begin preliminary negotiations for the 3-acre site, which contains the VFW building as well as a

baseball field used by Newark American Little League. Council members Jen Wallace and Mark Morehead were the opposing votes, and Mayor Polly Sierer was absent from the meeting.

Houck emphasized Wednesday that she simply wants to talk with VFW officials about a potential sale. If the city decides to move forward with a purchase, that would require another vote by council.

The city has been aware that the VFW may be looking to sell, but Post Commander Vince Shavico said this week the organization

hasn't made any final decisions.

"The city came out and did a site assessment," he said. "That's the extent of our talks with the city."

He said his post is having financial trouble, and leaders are considering selling the building because it is in poor condition.

"The building is up for grabs because, quite frankly, we need to sell," Shavico said.

On Wednesday, Wallace said she voted against entering into negotiations because she doesn't believe purchasing the VFW property is a priority.

"I think the city has too much on its plate," she said.

The city is spending too much already, according to Wallace, and residents have endured a number of tax increases and rate hikes over the years to pay for those purchases.

"The city has not really made a case to the people as to why they would want to acquire the property," she said.

Morehead echoed Wallace's concern that the city may be overextending itself. He said there are already several potential expenditures coming down the pipeline,

such as buying the Rodney property and building a downtown parking garage, in addition to a number of necessary stormwater projects.

"I don't think the pace we're talking about spending is sustainable," he said.

He doesn't think purchasing the VFW is a bad idea, but it isn't necessary right now.

"If your neighbor's house came on the market, you wouldn't buy it just because it's there," Morehead said. "When Main Street floods again, purchasing the VFW won't be our highest priority."

Woman robs elderly man on West Park Place

A 74-year-old man fell victim to a strong-arm robbery Tuesday when a woman approached him on West Park Place and stole his wallet, authorities said.

According to Lt. Bill Hargrove, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, the incident occurred at approximately 5:15 p.m. as the victim was walking down West Park Place near Peach Road.

The victim told police that a black woman between 5 feet 5 inches and 5 feet 7 inches tall with a medium build walked up behind him, grabbed his arms and pinned them against his back. She then took his wallet out of his back pocket and ran toward South Main Street.

Hargrove said the victim was not injured.

There is no surveillance footage of the robbery, but police are still investigating.

South College Avenue gas station robbed at gunpoint

Police are searching for a man who fled in a pickup truck after robbing the Shell gas station on South College Avenue last week.

According to Newark Police spokesman Lt. Bill Hargrove, the incident occurred at approximately 8:30 p.m. Oct. 21 at the gas station located at 804 S. College Ave.

Hargrove said the sus-

pect – described as a white man wearing a dark hooded sweatshirt and gloves – entered the convenience store armed with a handgun and demanded cash from the register. The clerk handed over an undisclosed amount of money, and the suspect fled on foot toward a blue pickup truck waiting on Brook Drive off West Chestnut Hill Road.

Hargrove said there is no surveillance footage of the incident at this time, but officers are still investigating.

After being denied free breakfast, man steals hotel guest's wallet

Police are trying to identify a man who was captured on camera stealing someone's wallet at Embassy Suites on Monday.

According to Sgt. Gerald Bryda, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, the theft occurred at approximately 8:45 a.m. inside the atrium of the hotel, which is located at 654 S. College Ave.

Bryda said the suspect – a white man wearing a red hat, light colored sweatshirt and dark pants – took the wallet off a table while the victim – a hotel guest – was getting food from the breakfast buffet. The wallet contained credit cards and a drivers license.

After the suspect took the wallet, Bryda said, surveillance footage shows him walking out of the hotel. It is unclear if the suspect left the area on foot or if he got into a vehicle.

Hotel staff told police that prior to stealing the wallet, the suspect tried to order from the breakfast buffet using a false room number. He was denied food, as the free breakfast is for hotel guests only.

Bryda said employees at Homewood Suites, which is located next to Embassy Suites, also recognized the suspect. They told police he also tried to get free breakfast there, but was denied.

License plate stolen off car in College Square Shopping Center

Bryda said the man got out and saw that his roof was wet and there were pieces of balloons. There was no damage to his car, but he called police to report the incident anyway. He did not see who threw the water balloon, Bryda said.

If a suspect is identified, Bryda said, he or she will face disorderly conduct charges.

Newark Country Club golf pro retiring after 26 years

Doug Frazier said he had a few old photos in his car from his earlier days working at the Newark Country Club and grabbed his keys. When he returned a few minutes later, he dropped a heavy stack on the table and smiled.

"I love all of these photos. They're all great moments. They're all fun," he said, thumbing through the pictures. "I was so blessed to have this job and be a part of people's lives in a fun way."

Frazier, 57, is retiring after 26 years working as the head golf professional at Newark Country Club on West Main Street. His last day is Nov. 6.

Originally from Traverse City, Mich., Frazier's love of golf started at the age of 14 when he took a nighttime job watering a Michigan golf course and became interested in the day-to-day operations of the country club.

Before coming to Newark, he attended Ferris State University in Michigan for the school's professional golf management program and he gained experience working at several courses across the country, such as Wilmington Country Club and Bidermann Golf Club in Greenville.

He lives in the Pike Creek area with his wife, Teresa, and their college-aged daughter.

"My love for the people and the area is what made me choose to come and stay," he said.

As the club's golf pro for the last 26 years, Frazier has been responsible for organizing tournaments, member coordination, outside work, food and beverage work,

running programs, merchandising and club fitting. He has also given hundreds of golf lessons, during which he assesses the player's initial abilities and natural talent before teaching fundamentals like grip and swing.

When he was hired, he said the club board told him they didn't want someone who was going to leave after only a few seasons. He promised them 25 years and stuck to his word, even staying a little bit longer.

"I never wanted to leave. I never thought the grass was greener on the other side," he said. "I just always wanted to be here."

One of Frazier's most memorable moments is when the club hosted the Longest Day of Golf charity event that benefited the

American Cancer Society. In 2000, he said, he and club champion Mark Doughty, John Wilson from 93.7 WSTW and Dave Raymond, who portrayed the Phillie Phanatic mascot, played golf from sun up to sun down to raise money for the organization.

"I played 151 holes and shot a 200," he said. "I played more golf that day than I did all year."

He had fun at all of the club's themed parties and enjoyed running the junior golf summer camps over the years. He said introducing younger players to the game, watching them grow and seeing some of them go into golf careers gave his job meaning, and he still keeps in touch with a few of his former campers.

However, his greatest enjoyment

has been interacting with club members, who he said are more like family.

"I've been very humbled and honored to be their professional," he said.

When Frazier started at Newark Country Club, golf was at its peak and members were using the club every day for tournaments, competitions and as a social gathering

spot. He said the community has changed since then and golf is now in an "uncertain place." People don't play as much, and the costs to keep the club running continue to rise, he said.

Frazier recalled the club struggling during the 2008 recession.

"What stayed true during that whole time is our core golfers who want this place to say," he said. "We have a hidden gem of a golf course here."

The club has hired Matt Bonnano as the new golf pro, and Frazier is confident his successor will carry on the tradition of Newark, while navigating the club through a new era to ensure its survival.

"The club is in good hands," he said.

Frazier's last day is approaching fast, but he's not looking forward to it.

"It's bittersweet," he said. "I've spent so much of my time here."

After he retires from the club, he plans to head to Michigan to spend time with his siblings and take care of his mother, who has fallen ill.

He said he won't be leaving the game of golf completely and hopes to still hang around Newark Country Club, play a couple rounds and continue to help shape the club's future.

"Being here every day, this is what made it all good," Frazier said, pointing to the photos spread out on the table. "And, of course, I have a beautiful view."

The Newark Country Club is hosting a dinner in Frazier's honor on Nov. 4 from 6 to 9 p.m. Tickets are \$32 plus gratuity. Call the club at (302) 731-4251 by Monday to make a reservation.

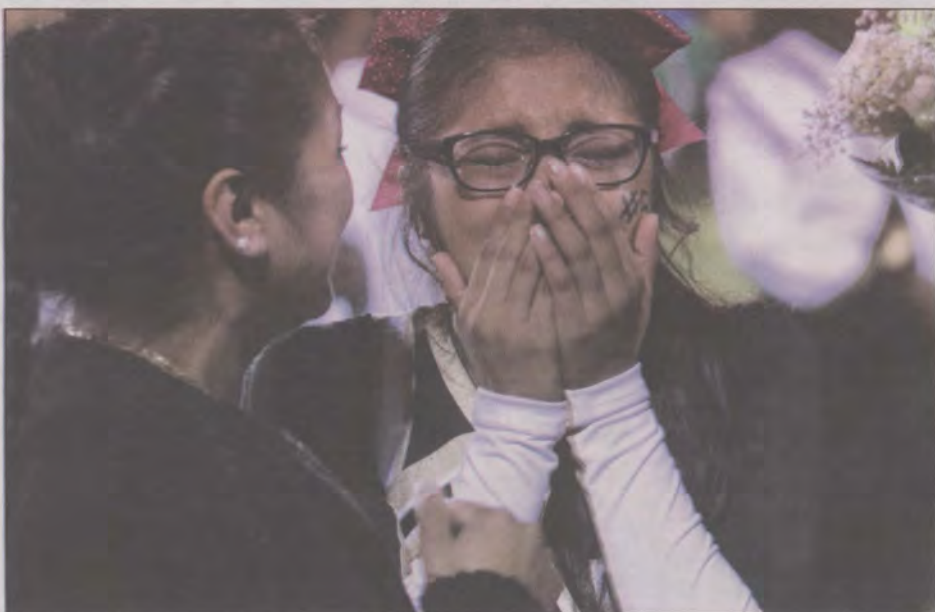

Bean soup sale a rewarding experience for volunteers

As Catherine Penta picked up her bag of Good Neighbor Day Bean Soup Mix, she was quick to point out that she's no stranger to the 11-bean mixture sold to raise money for the Newark Area Welfare Committee.

"My mother taught me how to make this," Penta said. "In those days, we didn't have Progresso."

Penta eschews the recommended method of making the soup with ham hock - the ham covers up the zesty taste of the beans, she says - but has her own signature recipe.

"I put in a tomato and onion and maybe some garlic," she said. "No powder, the real garlic."

Penta was one of dozens of Newarkers who bought the soup mix as part of NAWC's annual one-day fundraiser last Friday. Volunteers fanned out across the city and sold the soup bags at the Newark Senior Center and several local businesses.

The event, dubbed Good Neighbor Day, has for decades been one of the Newark Area Welfare Committee's most popular fundraisers. Founded in 1930,

the organization helps those in need by running a food pantry, an emergency assistance program, a holiday food drive and other programs.

The event raised approximately \$900. Though the dollar amount is not staggering, the event also raises awareness of NAWC and allows volunteers to promote the organization's other efforts, such as the food drive in December.

Mert Davies, who was

manning the booth at Newark Senior Center, said this is her sixth or seventh year selling the soup mix.

"It's a rewarding thing, neighbors helping neighbors," Davies said. "There are lots of people who need this support."

Set up in front of Acme in College Square, Beverly Stoudt said she has been selling the soup for nearly 20 years.

"People have been very generous," she noted.

Newark-area teen repairs homeless shelter for Eagle Scout project

Ben Mitchell wasn't sure where he wanted to complete his Eagle Scout project, so he asked some of his Boy Scout troop leaders, who suggested he look into the Sunday Breakfast Mission.

"When I heard about it, it kind of hit home," Mitchell said.

A nonprofit organization, the Sunday Breakfast Mission provides nightly shelter for more than 280 homeless men, women and children in Wilmington, in addition to free meals, food boxes and other support for low-income families.

Mitchell, 18, who lives in the

Chestnut Hill Estates neighborhood and recently graduated from Delaware Academy of Public Safety and Security in New Castle, said a few of his family members have been homeless at one point in their lives. Because of that, he knew he would be more emotionally invested in helping the Sunday Breakfast Mission than doing any other sort of project.

He learned the walls in two men's dormitories there needed repair and began planning, fundraising and creating a budget for the project. He raised \$400 and spent \$362 on supplies, donating the rest of the money to the Sunday Breakfast Mission.

Mitchell said he isn't much of

a handyman, so his father and uncle showed him how to properly spackle and paint.

"Then I was able to teach other people and kind of apply my leadership skills to delegate tasks," he said.

The labor took roughly three days once Mitchell bought all the supplies and corralled a group of 37 volunteers made up of friends, family and other members of Troop 255. Throughout the project, he said, he learned how to budget his money by keeping track of every penny spent, and all of the hard work made him realize how a little elbow grease can go a long way.

"While we were working, some of the men came up to us

and thanked us and said 'God bless you' and things like that," he said. "So it just shows the smaller things you can do can really mean a lot to the people who need it."

Mitchell's mother, Jackie, said she is proud of her son.

"But I'm not surprised at all because he's always been very giving," she said. "When he was 11 years old, he went out and collected food for the Newark Area Welfare Committee for no reason whatsoever. He just saw a need."

Mitchell will receive his Eagle Scout award for his Sunday Breakfast Mission project during a ceremony on Saturday at Newark United Methodist Church.

The club's "Stuff the Bus" fundraiser is set for Nov. 5 at Newark Shopping Center. Those interested in donating can stop by between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. to drop off supplies.

"The idea is to get the entire Newark community involved with this event," club president Nathan Millman said.

Specifically, the most in-demand items are socks, underwear, shampoo, razors and deodorant, said Marc Marcus, director of the Newark Empowerment Center.

Housed at Newark United Methodist Church on Main Street, the center helps homeless people and other Newarkers in need. On weekday afternoons, it provides meals and hygiene kits to anyone who needs them and also organizes the Code Purple shelters during the winter.

On an average day, between 20 and 40 people visit the center, Marcus said. Each year, the center serves approximately 800 different people who need supplies, help paying rent or assistance finding other resources.

"Anything that helps fill that need is a real plus for them," Marcus said.

Millman said the Newark Rotary Club sees the fundraiser as a good way to

involve the community in a project that will have a real effect on Newark. Several groups from Newark and the University of Delaware have already signed on to help.

"We want to do new service projects that deeply impact the local community," he said.

The event will also include music and refreshments for

those who donate.

"We thought it would start small, but it's growing rapidly," Millman said. "We want it to be fun for the community."

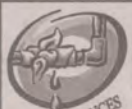

Editor's note: Volunteers at the Pencader Heritage Museum have been digitizing old Newark City Council meeting minutes. They share excerpts with Newark Post readers in a weekly column.

March 1929 – Councilman Hubert was appointed acting mayor replacing the late Eben Frazer.

The Red Men's Home applied to the Legislature for exemption from taxes for curbing and sewers. A delegation was sent to Do-

ver to meet with the committee considering said request. Merchants in town wanted a chance to bid on the contract for supplying the town with light bulbs.

William Cunningham was appointed a full-time police officer at \$120 per month, provided he used his own motorcycle. Residents were complaining of several bad spots in streets around town. Mrs. Thomas Ross was refunded her \$1.10 capitation

tax as she was a minor. Drafts of a new charter would not be sent to the state legislature for two years as more changes were under consideration, including making unpaid taxes a lien against property.

Mr. Handloff requested permission to put signs on trees and poles advertising his new theater. (This would have been the opening of the State Theater.) Needing more information, council

phoned Mr. Handloff during the meeting and asked him to appear that evening to clarify exactly what he wanted. He was granted permission provided the signs were not up more than ten days.

George Leak was questioning his electric bill, as a small portion of his property was in town limits. (He was apparently seeking the lower in-town rate.) Leak's Garage sat approximately where the traffic island is at the

divergence of Main Street and Ogletown Road.

Former Newark star Dutch Hoffman returns home

It was homecoming at Newark High School last Friday night and for one of the Yellowjackets' former stars in attendance, it was truly like coming home.

Mark "Dutch" Hoffman remembers being on that same field when he was as young as 3 or 4 years old and then throughout his childhood. He and his brother would walk to Newark High after school from what was then the Central School to be at practice with their father, legendary coach Bob Hoffman, and then catch a ride home with him. They also spent countless summer days in The Hive or in the stadium as their father sorted through equipment or worked on the fields.

"We spent many a day at the Newark football facility," Hoffman recalled of the locker room and stadium that now bears his father's name.

Hoffman was one of several members of Newark's 1976 state championship team — the first of the school's 10 title teams — serving as honorary captains prior to Friday's game against Charter School of Wilmington.

"It was a very emotional night," Hoffman, 58, recalled during a phone interview a couple days later. "Being in the locker room and hearing Coach (Barry) Zehnder's pregame talk and seeing some of my dad's old ballplayers like Ray Bias and Lou Strengari, and then going onto the field and hearing the alma mater and the anthem. It just brought back so many memories that I actually got choked up, just like I am now. It was beautiful."

Hoffman admitted becoming a quarterback was inevitable, and not necessarily because his father was a coach.

"When you look at my baby pictures when I was 2 or 3, they are all labeled 'Mark,'" he explained. "My father was a big Eagles fan and the team got a quarterback named Norm Van Brocklin who was nicknamed 'The Flying Dutchman.' He was named the league MVP in 1960 and so all of my pictures after 1960 are labeled 'Dutch.'"

Hoffman started playing football with the Veterans of Foreign Wars post when he was 10 years old. Unfortunately, he never had a chance to play for his father because Bob passed away of a brain embolism when Dutch was in eighth grade.

"My dad and I and some friends had just finished working out and were playing some basketball in the Newark gym and he collapsed," Hoffman recalled. "One of my biggest regrets is never getting to play for my dad. But that's how it goes."

What followed for Hoffman was a stellar career as a quarterback playing for his father's successor, Rocky Reese. Hoffman led Newark to the state championship game his junior year, but the Yellowjackets lost to Caesar Rodney, 18-14.

The following season Newark went undefeated in the conference, defeated Seaford in the quarterfinals and then upset Salesianum in the semifinals to advance to the state championship game and a rematch against Caesar Rodney.

Hoffman recalled that he played a very "pedestrian" game in the first half of the title game and Newark trailed 12-0 heading into the locker room.

"Coach Reese and the assistants gave us quite a tongue-lashing," he recalled. "And

then we came out and scored 22 unanswered points to win the title."

Hoffman refused to take any credit for the come-from-behind win.

"Our offensive line was dominating and created holes for Andy Mishaw to run through," he recalled with excitement in his voice. "The line moved their line off the ball, and Andy was picking up 5 and 6 yards at a pop. We just ran it down their throats and our defense shut them out in the second half."

"We were a good tight-knit team and it showed in the second half of that championship game. There was no quit in us," he added.

Hoffman, who was a first-team All-State

selection that year, received a full scholarship to play quarterback at West Virginia, where he started every game his sophomore year.

"It was an experience I'll never forget playing against the likes of big-time schools like Penn State, Oklahoma and Pittsburgh," he said. "It was just a wonderful experience."

The following season, Hoffman lost his starting job to Oliver Luck, whose son, Andrew, now plays quarterback for the Indianapolis Colts.

"I still wanted to play football, so I decided to transfer to Delaware and play for Tubby Raymond," Hoffman said.

However, despite being anointed the starter for the Blue Hens, Hoffman suffered a career-ending neck injury just four games into the season.

"I just give the glory to God that I wasn't paralyzed," he admitted. "The spinal cord was bruised but not cut."

Hoffman stayed at UD to get his degree in special education and went on to enjoy a teaching career with stops at Newark High and Shue-Medill in the Christina School District. In 2007, he and his wife, Kara, moved to Lewes and Hoffman finished up his teaching career at Mariner Middle School, retiring in 2014.

"My main hobbies are my two golden retrievers and surf fishing," Hoffman said with a laugh. "Other than that I go to the gym, putter around the house, and we live in the woods, so right now there's a lot of leaf care."

Hoffman doesn't get to Newark games often anymore — he did attend Butch Simpson's final game last season — but he is impressed with the program's new coach.

"Coach Zehnder is doing a nice job," he said. "They are having a tough year, but they are young. He really impressed me with his pregame talk."

Hearing that talk and being part of the pregame ceremony brought back a flood of emotional memories for Hoffman.

"Football has just been a huge part of my life, and playing at Newark was my best experience doing that," he said.

Yellowjackets welcome home 'legends' with homecoming win

The Newark Yellowjackets celebrated homecoming last Friday night by playing solid in all phases of the game and were rewarded with a solid 35-21 victory over The Charter School of Wilmington (1-6).

"Any time you walk off the field with a win, it's a great thing," head coach Barry Zehnder said. "This team needed something positive. The past few weeks we have had some things to be happy about but haven't put it all

together at one time. [The coaches] were proud of the guys for putting it all together and playing the way they are capable of playing."

Dequan Woods rushed for 192 yards and a touchdown, and Alex Pollard ran for 82 yards and a score to lead the Yellowjackets' offensive effort.

"When a player runs for almost 200 yards in a game, it's easy to recognize Dequan Woods as standing out, but really what stood out is the unselfish play by everyone on the field," Zehnder pointed out. "We have been asking them to trust each other and play for each other, and Friday night they were successful because they did that. When a player runs for 200 and another runs for over 80, the line did a great job and the receivers

blocked down field."

Zehnder was also pleased with his team's defensive effort, as the Yellowjackets held the Force to 199 total yards while forcing three fumbles and snaring two interceptions.

"I thought as a team we ran to the ball much better on defense than we have in past weeks," he said.

New homecoming week tradition

Leading up to the homecoming game, Zehnder started a new tradition by having a former player come in each day during practice and talk to the team about being part of the Newark football tradition. Guests included Jeff Conkey, Arnold Saunders, and Dan, Jeff and Louie Strengari.

"They all did a great job talking about not only their memories and Newark football, but they also spoke about representing the community, showing respect, dedication and effort, and applying the lessons from football to life and being good fathers and husbands," Zehnder said.

The 'Duke' returns home

Former Newark great and current James Madison star Taylor Reynolds spent the Dukes' bye week in Newark and stopped by The Hive to talk to the Yellowjackets before they took the field.

"Taylor talked about what Newark meant to him," Zehnder said. "He explained to the guys that being 'coached hard' is a good

thing because it prepares you for things and it makes you better. He also spoke about the importance of academics."

Looking beyond the playoffs

Although Newark won't make the playoffs this year, Zehnder reiterated he and his staff are coaching as if they are.

"The focus this week and weeks nine and 10 will be the same thing it has been every week," he said. "We are working to win this week and be 1-0 this week. Each week is about getting better, and for us that means on the field and off. We have been very focused on coaching on and off the field lessons, how to succeed during football time and during

non-football time. That won't stop because we were unsuccessful making it into the 2016 playoffs."

This week's game

Newark (2-5) travels to Delcastle (0-7) on Saturday for an 11 a.m. kickoff. Similar to last week's game against Charter, the Yellowjackets are facing a team desperate for a win. The Cougars have lost all but one of their games by at least 37 points.

"After the few weeks we had, we are encouraging confidence," Zehnder said. "We will remind them that we can't afford to overlook anybody and part of that is coaching with the same expectations and intensity at practice whether it is a team with zero wins or zero losses."

the snowy winter of 2013-14, with many deep potholes opening up. Though they were patched that spring and summer, similar damage happened again the following winter. The reconstruction project was already on the horizon, but the damage was so bad, DelDOT spent \$2.5 million repaving the road starting last fall.

The new project, which is expected to be completed by spring 2021, will replace the asphalt with concrete, which Nauman said will last longer and hold up better under pressure from heavy truck traffic.

The work will be focused on the portion of Elkton Road from the state line to Casho Mill Road. The portion heading into downtown Newark was redone during a years-long construction project that concluded in 2012.

The most noticeable change will be the addition of a third travel lane in each direction between Otts Chapel Road and Christina Parkway. Nauman said the additional lanes will accommodate increased traffic on that segment of the road.

The project will also add a second right turn lane from Christina Parkway onto Elkton Road. The turn will be controlled by a traffic light rather than the current yield sign.

However, Nauman warned, the two years of construction will be difficult for motorists, who will face lane closures and delays. The northbound lanes – the ones used by cars coming from Maryland – will be reconstructed first, and all traffic will be shifted to the southbound side, with one lane in each direction. Once that is complete, the southbound lanes will be reconstructed.

"It will be painful, but you'll get a good product in the end," he said, adding, "If you're local, you'll drive around it."

Bike path to connect Maryland, Hall Trail

Cyclists, too, will benefit from the project.

DelDOT is planning a 10-foot-wide paved bicycle and pedestrian path that will run parallel to the northbound lanes but be separated by a grassy median.

"There's a huge demand for it," Nauman said, noting that many residents and University of Delaware students use bikes to travel Elkton Road. "It will add connectivity from Maryland all the way through Newark."

The path will connect cyclists to Gravenor Lane, from which they can ride through Devon and the Binns to get to the James F. Hall Trail. The trail takes cyclists along the Amtrak line all the way to the Delaware Technology Park on Wyoming Road, or they can branch off onto the Pomeroy Trail to head north to Main Street or into White Clay Creek State Park.

The Elkton Road path will also provide a connection to Rittenhouse Trail and the bike path that parallels Christina Parkway. On the southern side, it will extend into Maryland and connect with the Stonegate Apartments.

DelDOT will be responsible for maintenance of the path, including snow removal.

Crews will also build a sidewalk along the southbound lanes.

Upgrades planned for Dunkin' Donuts intersection

Upgrades planned for the intersection of Elkton Road and McIntire Drive are sure to please coffee lovers.

DelDOT has been working on the improvements with the city of Newark and the owners of the Dunkin' Donuts located at the intersection.

Officials are planning to create a new entrance to the Dunkin' Donuts property – which also includes a former tobacco shop soon to be occupied by a liquor store – on the south side of the building. That land, owned by the city, is used as a yard waste dump but will soon be converted to a park.

Building that entrance would create a traditional four-way intersection and allow drivers coming from McIntire Drive or northbound Elkton Road to enter the Dunkin' Donuts

parking lot.

Because the current entrance to the doughnut shop doesn't line up with McIntire Drive, northbound drivers on Elkton Road can't turn left into the parking lot. However, many people illegally do so anyway, making the turn at McIntire Drive and travel-

ing against traffic in order to sneak into the lot.

"It's a pretty big safety issue," said Tom Coleman, Newark's public works director.

The city also has an interest in having a signalized intersection for visitors to use to come in and out of the future park.

Coleman said Dunkin' Donuts will pay to build the new entrance and a small parking lot for the park. In exchange, the business will be able build a driveway into its parking lot from the new entrance.

"It worked out as a win-win for us and Dunkin' Donuts," Coleman said.

The plan

Road improvements:

- Reconstruct concrete pavement
- Widen road to six lanes from Otts Chapel Road to east of Christina Parkway
- Lengthen turn lanes at signalized intersections to increase capacity
- Free-flow right turn lane from northbound Otts Chapel Road onto Elkton Road
- Add a second right turn lane from westbound Christina Parkway onto Elkton Road
- Add a second left turn lane from southbound Elkton Road onto McIntire Drive
- Add a fourth leg to Elkton Road and McIntire Drive intersection

Pedestrian/cyclist improvements:

- Add pedestrian signals and crosswalks at signalized intersections
- Add a 10-foot wide multi-use path with two pedestrian bridges from Stonegate Boulevard to Gravenor Lane
- Add bike lanes at signalized intersections and entrances
- Connect missing sidewalk link from DuPont Stine Haskell frontage to Suburban Plaza frontage
- Provide sidewalk connections to bus stops

DTP opens new business incubator at STAR Campus

The latest addition to the University of Delaware's STAR Campus is now open.

UD, state and federal officials gathered earlier this month to celebrate the opening of the Delaware Technology Park's incubator, which is housed in the former Chrysler administration building. The space, which was rehabbed by Delle Donne and Associates, is also home to UD's health science department and the technology company SevOne.

The incubator is an expansion of Delaware Technology Park, which opened in 1992 on Wyoming Road. A non-profit collaboration between the state, university and private sector, the facility houses 50 start-up companies.

DTP's STAR Campus location opened earlier this year and is already at its capacity of 12 tenants, mostly pharmaceutical, biotechnology and nanotechnology companies.

"I'm thrilled to get companies that have so much potential to scale up," J. Michael Bowman, president of DTP, said.

Companies pay \$65 to \$75 per square foot, cheaper than if they had to find their own facility. They each get private lab space, plus access to

shared areas, such as a kitchen and conference room.

The idea, he said, is to nurture the small companies so they grow and eventually move out on their own. Tenants sign three-year leases, but Bowman is happy to tear up the leases sooner if the company outgrows DTP.

"I'm a small-ball player. Make the garden grow and reseed," he said. "Someone else comes behind with the same start-up needs."

Bowman said DTP needed to expand to accommodate more tenants, and the STAR Campus site provided a good opportunity for the companies to collaborate with UD. Future amenities in the works – such as a hotel and train station upgrades – were also a factor in the decision, he said.

UD students benefit through the Spin-In program, through which undergraduates work for the tenant companies. The students often get hired after they graduate, or sometimes branch out and form their own company.

"It's a feeder and keeps talented people graduating from UD in the area," Bowman said.

The new facility was partially funded by a \$3 million loan from the state and a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Chrysler in 2009. UD has received unsolicited interest from developers, and officials want to get a sense of what other companies might be interested.

"We need to have a dialog with the marketplace," Sunkett said.

He said UD has no preconceived ideas about the size or brand of a potential hotel but does want it to be a "full-service" hotel with a restaurant and conference center that would offer opportunities for the school's hotel and restaurant management students.

UD already has an on-campus hotel, the Courtyard Marriott, and the Clayton Hall conference center on its north campus. How a STAR Campus hotel would affect those properties remains to be determined.

"That's a question of de-

mand. The marketplace will have to weigh in," Sunkett said. "We view this as complementary to what we already have in place."

If built, the STAR Campus hotel would be the seventh hotel on South College Avenue and the 10th in city limits, counting the Candlewood Suites under construction at 1101 S. College Ave. and a Marriott planned for Ogletown Road.

Sunkett said the hotel would likely be built near the train station, which is due for a major overhaul in the coming years. Plans call for a station building – in place of the small ticket booth there now – as well as a raised platform, pedestrian walkway and more parking. Construction of the station, which will allow for an expansion of regional rail service, will begin next year and conclude in 2018.

While the STAR Campus is still in its infancy, UD officials envision a future

for the site as an urban-inspired campus centered around a new transportation hub and featuring research and development space surrounded by parks, restaurants, retail stores and a hotel.

The site currently contains UD's health science complex, the technology company SevOne, a Bloom Energy factory, a zero-emissions vehicle lab and the recently opened Delaware Technology Park business incubator.

The next phase of construction will focus on a 16-acre site next to the health complex, where Delle Donne and Associates' plans to build a 10-story tower likely containing a mix of research, office, retail and residential space. The UD Board of Trustees will vote on final approval this fall, and construction could begin early next year.

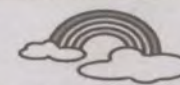
Sunkett said UD is evaluating proposals for other parts of the site but would not discuss specifics.

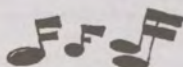
