City honors fallen Aetna firefighter

On Monday night, city council honored Senior Firefighter Jerry Fickes, who died last month while battling a blaze in Wilmington's Canby Park neighborhood.

Fickes, 51, was a longtime member of Newark's Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Co. and at one time served as an assistant chief.

The fire, which officials allege was intentionally set by one of the residents, broke out in the early morning hours of Sept. 24. When Wilmington firefighters entered the home, the floor collapsed, trapping three – Lt. Christopher Leach, Ardythe Hope and Brad Speakman – in the basement.

Fickes went into the house

to save them, but fell when the floor collapsed further. Fickes, who had been employed by WFD for 13 years, died as a result of the collapse, as did Leach, a 14-year veteran of the department. Hope and Speakman were injured and are still recovering.

Fickes left behind his wife, Laura, and two sons, 18-yearold Benjamin and 16-year-old Joshua.

On Monday, Deputy Mayor Stu Markham presented Laura Fickes with a resolution from the city, calling her husband's death "a great loss to the Newark community."

"Jerry Fickes will be remembered for his dedication, hard work, strength and his love for firefighting, which came second only to his love for his family," Markham said.

Hotel staff told police that prior to stealing the wallet, the suspect tried to order from the breakfast buffet using a false room number. He was denied food, as the free breakfast is for hotel guests only.

Bryda said employees at Homewood Suites, which is located next to Embassy Suites, also recognized the suspect. They told police he also tried to get free breakfast there, but was denied. NPD is asking for the public's help to

Newark Country Club golf pro retiring after 26 years

Doug Frazier said he had a few old photos in his car from his earlier days working at the Newark Country Club and grabbed his keys. When he returned a few minutes later, he dropped a heavy stack on the table and smiled.

"I love all of these photos. They're all great moments. They're all fun," he said, thumbing through the pictures. "I was so blessed to have this job and be a part of people's lives in a fun way."

Frazier, 57, is retiring after 26 years working as the head golf professional at Newark County Club on West Main Street. His last day is Nov. 6.

Originally from Traverse City, Mich., Frazier's love of golf started at the age of 14 when he took a nighttime job watering a Michigan golf course and became interested in the day-to-day operations of the country club.

Before coming to Newark, he attended Ferris State University in Michigan for the school's professional golf management program and he gained experience working at several courses across the country, such as Wilmington Country Club and Bidermann Golf Club in Greenville.

He lives in the Pike Creek area with his wife, Teresa, and their college-aged daughter.

"My love for the people and the area is what made me choose to come and stay," he said. As the club's golf pro for the last

As the club's golf pro for the last 26 years, Frazier has been responsible for organizing tournaments, member coordination, outside work, food and beverage work,

running programs, merchandising and club fitting. He has also given hundreds of golf lessons, during which he assesses the player's initial abilities and natural talent before teaching fundamentals like grip and swing.

When he was hired, he said the club board told him they didn't want someone who was going to leave after only a few seasons. He promised them 25 years and stuck to his word, even staying a little bit longer.

"I never wanted to leave. I never thought the grass was greener on the other side," he said. "I just always wanted to be here."

One of Frazier's most memorable moments is when the club hosted the Longest Day of Golf charity event that benefited the American Cancer Society. In 2000, he said, he and club champion Mark Doughty, John Wilson from 93.7 WSTW and Dave Raymond, who portrayed the Phillie Phanatic mascot, played golf from sun up to sun down to raise money for the organization.

"I played 151 holes and shot a 200," he said. "I played more golf that day than I did all year."

He had fun at all of the club's themed parties and enjoyed running the junior golf summer camps over the years. He said introducing younger players to the game, watching them grow and seeing some of them go into golf careers gave his job meaning, and he still keeps in touch with a few of his former campers.

However, his greatest enjoyment

has been interacting with club members, who he said are more like family.

"I've been very humbled and honored to be their professional," he said.

When Frazier started at Newark Country Club, golf was at its peak and members were using the club every day for tournaments, competitions and as a social gathering

spot. He said the community has changed since then and golf is now in an "uncertain place." People don't play as much, and the costs to keep the club running continue to rise, he said.

Frazier recalled the club struggling during the 2008 recession.

"What stayed true during that whole time is our core golfers who want this place to say," he said. "We have a hidden gem of a golf course here."

The club has hired Matt Bonnano as the new golf pro, and Frazier is confident his successor will carry on the tradition of Newark, while navigating the club through a new era to ensure its survival.

"The club is in good hands," he said.

Frazier's last day is approaching fast, but he's not looking forward to it. "It's bittersweet," he said. "I've spent so much of my time here."

After he retires from the club, he plans to head to Michigan to spend time with his siblings and take care of his mother, who has fallen ill.

He said he won't be leaving the game of golf completely and hopes to still hang around Newark Country Club, play a couple rounds and continue to help shape the club's future.

"Being here every day, this is what made it all good," Frazier said, pointing to the photos spread out on the table. "And, of course, I have a beautiful view."

The Newark Country Club is hosting a dinner in Frazier's honor on Nov. 4 from 6 to 9 p.m. Tickets are \$32 plus gratuity. Call the club at (302) 731-4251 by Monday to make a reservation.

Ben Mitchell wasn't sure where he wanted to complete his Eagle Scout project, so he asked some of his Boy Scout troop leaders, who suggested he look into the Sunday Breakfast Mission.

"When I heard about it, it kind of hit home," Mitchell said. A nonprofit organization, the

Sunday Breakfast Mission pro-vides nightly shelter for more than 280 homeless men, women and children in Wilmington, in addition to free meals, food boxes and other support for lowincome families.

Mitchell, 18, who lives in the

from Delaware Academy of Public Safety and Security in New Castle, said a few of his family members have been homeless at one point in their lives. Because of that, he knew he would be more emotionally invested in helping the Sunday Breakfast Mission than doing any other sort of project.

He learned the walls in two men's dormitories there needed repair and began planning, fundraising and creating a budget for the project. He raised \$400 and spent \$362 on supplies, donating the rest of the money to the Sunday Breakfast Mission.

Then I was able to teach other people and kind of apply my leadership skills to delegate tasks," he said.

The labor took roughly three days once Mitchell bought all the supplies and corralled a group of 37 volunteers made up of friends, family and other members of Troop 255. Throughout the project, he said, he learned how to budget his money by keeping track of every penny spent, and all of the hard work made him realize how a little elbow grease can go a long way.

Mitchell said he isn't much of some of the men came up to us


"We want to do new service projects that deeply impact the local community," he said.

Former Newark star Dutch Hoffman returns hom

It was homecoming at Newark High School last Friday night and for one of the Yellowjackets' former stars in attendance, it was truly like coming home.

Mark "Dutch" Hoffman remembers being on that same field when he was as young as 3 or 4 years old and then throughout his childhood. He and his brother would walk to Newark High after school from what was then the Central School to be at practice with their father, legendary coach Bob Hoffman, and then catch a ride home with him. They also spent countless summer days in The Hive or in the stadium as their father sorted through equipment or worked on the fields.

"We spent many a day at the Newark football facility," Hoffman recalled of the locker room and stadium that now bears his father's name.

Hoffman was one of several members of Newark's 1976 state championship team - the first of the school's 10 title teams

serving as honorary captains prior to Friday's game against Charter School of Wilmington.

man, 58, recalled during a phone inter-view a couple days later. "Being in the locker room and hearing Coach (Barry) Zehnder's pregame talk and seeing some of my dad's old ballplayers like Ray Bias and Lou Strengari, and then going onto the field and hearing the alma mater and the anthem. It just brought back so many memories that I actually got choked up, just like I am now. It was beautiful." Hoffman admitted becoming a quarter-

back was inevitable, and not necessarily because his father was a coach.

"When you look at my baby pictures when I was 2 or 3, they are all labeled 'Mark," he explained. "My father was a big Eagles fan and the team got a quarterback named Norm Van Brocklin who was nicknamed 'The Flying Dutchman.' He was named the league MVP in 1960 and so all of my pictures after 1960 are labeled 'Dutch.'"

Hoffman started playing football with the Veterans of Foreign Wars post when he was 10 years old. Unfortunately, he never had a chance to play for his father because Bob passed away of a brain embolism when Dutch was in eighth grade.

'My dad and I and some friends had just "It was a very emotional night," Hoff- finished working out and were playing some basketball in the Newark gym and he collapsed," Hoffman recalled. "One of my biggest regrets is never getting to play for my dad. But that's how it goes.

What followed for Hoffman was a stellar career as a quarterback playing for his father's successor, Rocky Reese. Hoffman led Newark to the state championship game his junior year, but the Yellowjackets lost to Caesar Rodney, 18-14.

The following season Newark went undefeated in the conference, defeated Seaford in the quarterfinals and then upset Salesianum in the semifinals to advance to the state championship game and a rematch against Caesar Rodney.

Hoffman recalled that he played a very pedestrian" game in the first half of the title game and Newark trailed 12-0 heading into the locker room.

"Coach Reese and the assistants gave us quite a tongue-lashing," he recalled. "And



then we came out and scored 22 unanswered points to win the title."

Hoffman refused to take any credit for the come-from-behind win.

"Our offensive line was dominating and created holes for Andy Mishaw to run through," he recalled with excitement in his voice. "The line moved their line off the ball, and Andy was picking up 5 and 6 yards at a pop. We just ran it down their throats and our defense shut them out in the second half.

"We were a good tight-knit team and it showed in the second half of that championship game. There was no quit in us," he added.

selection that year, received a full scholarship to play quarterback at West Virginia, where he started every game his sophomore year.

"It was an experience I'll never forget playing against the likes of big-time schools like Penn State, Oklahoma and Pittsburgh," he said. "It was just a wonderful experience.

The following season, Hoffman lost his starting job to Oliver Luck, whose son, Andrew, now plays quarterback for the Indianapolis Colts.

I still wanted to play football, so I decided to transfer to Delaware and play for Tubby Raymond," Hoffman said.

However, despite being anointed the starter for the Blue Hens, Hoffman suf-fered a career-ending neck injury just four games into the season.

"I just give the glory to God that I wasn't paralyzed," he admitted. "The spinal cord was bruised but not cut.

Hoffman stayed at UD to get his degree in special education and went on to enjoy a teaching career with stops at Newark High and Shue-Medill in the Christina School District. In 2007, he and his wife, Kara, moved to Lewes and Hoffman finished up his teaching career at Mariner Middle School, retiring in 2014.

"My main hobbies are my two golden retrievers and surf fishing," Hoffman said with a laugh. "Other than that I go to the gym, putter around the house, and we live in the woods, so right now there's a lot of leaf care.'


Hoffman doesn't get to Newark games often anymore — he did attend Butch Simpson's final game last season — but he is impressed with the program's new coach.

"Coach Zehnder is doing a nice job," he said. "They are having a tough year, but they are young. He really impressed me with his pregame talk."

Hearing that talk and being part of the pregame ceremony brought back a flood of emotional memories for Hoffman.

the snowy winter of 2013-14, with many deep potholes opening up. Though they were patched that spring and summer, similar damage happened again the following winter. The dian. reconstruction project was "Th already on the horizon, but the damage was so bad, DelDOT spent \$2.5 million repaving the road starting last fall.

The new project, which is expected to be completed by spring 2021, will replace the asphalt with concrete, which Nauman said will last longer and hold up better under pressure from heavy truck traffic.

The work will be focused on the portion of Elkton Road from the state line to Casho Mill Road. The portion heading into downtown Newark was redone during a years-long construction project that concluded in 2012.

noticeable The most change will be the addition of a third travel lane in each direction between Otts Chapel Road and Christina and the bike path that par-Parkway. Nauman said the additional lanes will accommodate increased traffic on that segment of the road.

The project will also add a second right turn lane from Christina Parkway onto Elkton Road. The turn will be controlled by a traffic light rather than the current yield sign.

However, warned, the two years of construction will be difficult for motorists, who will face lane closures and delays. The northbound lanes - the ones used by cars coming from Maryland will be reconstructed first,

and all traffic will be shift-ed to the southbound side, with one lane in each direction. Once that is complete, the southbound lanes will be reconstructed.

"It will be painful, but you'll get a good product in the end," he said, adding, "If you're local, you'll drive around it."

"There's a huge demand for it," Nauman said, not-ing that many residents and University of Delaware students use bikes to travel Elkton Road. "It will add connectivity from Maryland all the way through Newark.

The path will connect cyclists to Gravenor Lane, from which they can ride through Devon and the Binns to get to the James F. Hall Trail. The trail takes cyclists along the Amtrak line all the way to the Delaware Technology Park on Wyoming Road, or they can branch off onto the Pomeroy Trail to head north to Main Street or into White Clay Creek State Park.

The Elkton Road path will also provide a connection to Rittenhouse Trail allels Christina Parkway. On the southern side, it will extend into Maryland and connect with the Stonegate Apartments.

DelDOT will be responsible for maintenance of the path, including snow removal.

Crews will also build a sidewalk along the south-Nauman bound lanes.


A map shows the planned changes at the intersection of Elkton Road and McIntire Drive.

DTP opens new business incubator at STAR Campus

University of Delaware's STAR Campus is now open.

UD, state and federal officials gathered earlier this month to celebrate the opening of the Delaware Technology Park's incubator, which is housed in the former Chrysler administration building. The space, which was rehabbed by Delle Donne and Associates, is also home to UD's health science department and the technology company SevOne.

The incubator is an expansion of Delaware Technology Park, which opened in 1992 on Wyoming Road. A nonprofit collaboration between the state, university and private sector, the facility houses 50 start-up companies.

DTP's STAR Campus location opened earlier this year and is already at its capacity of 12 tenants, mostly pharmaceutical, biotechnology and nanotechnology companies. "Tm thrilled to get compa-

nies that have so much po-tential to scale up," J. Michael Bowman, president of DTP, said.

Companies pay \$65 to \$75 per square foot, cheaper than if they had to find their own facility. They each get private lab space, plus access to shared areas, such as a kitchen and conference room.

The idea, he said, is to nur-The latest addition to the ture the small companies so they grow and eventually move out on their own. Tenants sign three-year leases, but Bowman is happy to tear up the leases sooner if the company outgrows DTP.

"I'm a small-ball player. Make the garden grow and reseed," he said. "Someone else comes behind with the same start-up needs.

Bowman said DTP needed to expand to accommodate more tenants, and the STAR Campus site provided a good opportunity for the companies to collaborate with UD. Future amenities in the works - such as a hotel and train station upgrades - were also a factor in the decision, he said.

students benefit ID through the Spin-In program, through which undergraduates work for the tenant companies. The students often get hired after they graduate, or sometimes branch out and form their own company.

"It's a feeder and keeps talented people graduating from UD in the area," Bowman said

The new facility was partially funded by a \$3 million loan from the state and a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Chrysler in 2009. UD has received unsolicited interest from developers, and officials want to get a sense of what other companies might be interested. We need to have a dia-

log with the marketplace," Sunkett said.

He said UD has no preconceived ideas about the size or brand of a potential hotel but does want it to be a "full-service" hotel with a restaurant and conference center that would offer opportunities for the school's hotel and restaurant management students.

UD already has an on-campus hotel, the Courtyard Marriott, and the Clayton Hall conference center on its north campus. How a STAR Campus hotel would affect those properties remains to be determand. The marketplace will have to weigh in," Sunkett said. "We view this as complementary to what we

Sunkett said the hotel would likely be built near the train station, which is due for a major overhaul in the coming years. While the STAR Campus is still in its infancy, UD






