Thomas Wins 3rd Term President of Fire Company

Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company Conducts Annual Election; Doyle, Gray, Smith Re-elected To Offices; Cook, Mitchell, Wharry, Wollaston Elected Directors

Olan Thomas, who succeeded John List as president of Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company, was re-elected to third term as head of Newark's volunteer fire department annual Aetna election last Friday night.

George W. Smith, who succeeded Clifton Knotts as fire president, was re-elected to a second consecutive term in that office. Other re-elected officers are William Doyle, vice-president; Fred Gray, secretary; and Allen Smith, treasurer.

Four new directors were elected: Robert Cook, Robert Mitchell, John Wharry, and Charles Wollaston. The board of directors will meet on Jan. 15 at 8 p.m. at the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company.

Thomas was elected president of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company, which has 100 members, for the third time. He was first elected in 1959 and was re-elected in 1961.

Thomas is a 35-year-old married man with two children. He is a member of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company and the Newark Fire Department.

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Bd. Of Education Hires 3 Teachers, Rejects State Plan

School Board To Select
Pupil Insurance Program,
Review Pay Incentive Plan

Meeting last Friday, the Newark Board of Education hired three teachers, rejected a proposed state building maintenance plan and agreed to select an insurance program for school pupils.

The board hired one secondary and two elementary teachers. One of the elementary teachers will conduct a third-grade class at the Mendill School, while the other will have a second-grade class at Central. The secondary teacher will replace an English teacher leaving Oglethorpe Junior High.

The board also rejected a proposed state building maintenance plan which would have cost \$100,000 a year. The board agreed to select an insurance program for school pupils.

Now handled by the district's Council of PTA's, the pupil insurance plan will become the responsibility of the board. The school administrative staff will conduct preliminary work of analyzing various insurance plans and will present its findings to the board.

In a discussion of the proposed teachers' incentive plan which was rejected by the teachers on Dec. 4, William Cooke, board president, stressed that the board had nothing to do with the formulation of the plan, compiled by a committee of teachers with some help from the administration.

Superintendent Wilmer E. Shue said the committee plans a post-mortem in January to analyze the failure.

The board rejected a state plan for maintenance of buildings. Under the proposal, repairs would be estimated to cost no more than one-half of one percent of the value of a school less than five years old or one percent of a school over five years old.

Mr. Shue cited weakness in the plan with no provision for unforeseen losses such as heating system breakdowns.

The board felt the plan would be satisfactory only for normal maintenance.

It is still under consideration in Dover.

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Col. Ephraim Jolls Dies At Age Of 72 After Long Illness

Local Sportsman, Army
Vet, Instructor, Athlete
At U. D., Succumbs Monday

Colonel Ephraim Preston Jolls, retired Army officer and former professor of military science and tactics at the University of Delaware, died of cancer last Monday morning at the Veterans Administration Hospital at the age of 72.

Colonel Jolls retired from the Army in 1946. He served in the Panama Canal Zone and Hawaii as well as Army posts in this country, and was stationed at Ft. Francis E. Warren in Cheyenne, Wyo., at the time of his retirement. While serving there he was awarded a citation for preserving racial harmony with troops under his command.

From 1928 to 1933 Colonel Jolls lived in Newark, teaching military science and tactics at the university and serving as president of the Athletic Association.

Born in Middletown, the son of the late Joseph Charles and Alice McColgan Jolls, he graduated from Middletown High School in 1908 and received his degree in electrical engineering from the University of Delaware in 1913.

He pitched for the university baseball team as well as pitching for the Bloomer Girls, a famous women's baseball team which employed a male pitcher to relieve the girls' weak pitching arms. Later he coached the university baseball team.

Before entering the service in 1917, Colonel Jolls was associated with the Delaware Power & Light Co. and the Monmouth County Traction Company of Keyport, N.J.

Colonel Jolls and his wife, Ruth Emily Lorenz Jolls, whom he married in 1918, returned to Newark when he retired. He spent much of his time hunting and fishing.

He is survived, in addition to his widow, by a daughter, Mrs. Truxton W. Boyce, Allentown, Pa., two sisters, Mrs. Lottie Brown and Mrs. Alice Daniels, both of Middletown; three brothers, John J. and Clinton H. Raleigh, N. C., and two granddaughters, Barbara Jolls Boyce and Virginia Truxton Boyce.

Colonel Jolls was a member of the Newark Area Welfare Committee and the Newark Fire Department. He was a member of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company and the Newark Fire Department.

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C. of C. Assists Local Shoppers With Courtesy Parking Tags

City Council Approves Newark Chamber of Commerce
Plan To Provide Pennies, Courtesy Parking Tickets
With Police Cooperation To Promote Goodwill In Area

The Newark Chamber of Commerce is providing special courtesy parking tickets and pennies for meter deposit in a goodwill program to encourage shopping in the City of Newark.

The proposal was approved by Newark City Council at a special meeting last Monday night, and the Newark Police Department is cooperating by depositing pennies provided by the Chamber in meters where the time limit has expired, and substituting the Chamber of Commerce courtesy ticket for the conventional yellow parking meter violation tag on the parked vehicle.

"Through the cooperation of the local merchants," the courtesy ticket reads, "the Chamber of Commerce and City Council, a police officer has placed one cent in the parking meter and has issued this ticket in an effort to spare you the cost, time and inconvenience of a regular parking ticket."

"If you feel the effort to be worthy, kindly reimburse the Chamber the one cent by giving it to any merchant in town. Your help will enable us to continue this service. Sincerely, Newark Chamber of Commerce," the ticket concludes.

The proposal was presented by Reginald Rockwell, a director and a member of the retail merchants section of the Newark Chamber of Commerce.

The penny deposit will provide an additional 12 minutes of parking time.

HOW TO ASK FOR A BLESSING

Two blind beggars were making the rounds in the city park. It was a lovely spring morning. Many people had come to the park to take in the beauty of spring.

Each blind man carried a tin cup. Each had a sign hung around his neck. One man's sign read: "Please Help the Blind." The other man's sign read: "It's Spring . . . and I Am Blind!"

At the end of the day one beggar had only a few coins in his tin cup—none was in his pockets. But the other's cup was overflowing. His pockets jingled with change.

Can you guess which one got more money? The one whose sign read: "It's Spring . . . and I Am Blind!"

Why? Wasn't the other beggar who got practically no money just as blind as the one whose tin cup was full? Didn't he need money as badly as the other? What made the difference in the results?

It was the way in which the beggars asked for their blessing. The successful beggar's sign opened the people's hearts and opened his sign moved them to compassion because they realized that here was one who could not enjoy what they enjoyed—the beauty of a spring day. He was blind! His sign showed the people his need.

The other beggar could not see the beauties of God's wonderful world, true. But simply asking, "Please Help the Blind" was not sufficient to urge the people to help him. He did not know how to ask for a blessing!

If you want a blessing, you must first learn how to ask for it. If you are seeking a blessing from God, you must know how to seek God's help.

When you pray to God and ask for a blessing, ask for it in faith—believing that He will answer your prayer. And don't become impatient. God always answers prayer in His own due time. We cannot hope to know what may seem to detain God. We cannot hurry God.

When you ask a blessing from God, tell Him of your need, fully, openly and with faith. Don't hold anything back from God. Although God knows you and your need even before you ask it, it is you who must show God that you are willing to "level" with Him all the way.

When you ask of God in faith, believing that God wants to bless you, you will receive the desire of your heart.

Pre-treat spotted areas by rubbing full-strength liquid detergent into the stain, then let stand 15 minutes. Wash the garment in hot water with soap or synthetic detergent, but avoid using too much detergent. Rinse garment thoroughly, then hang to dry.

Shortly after he was employed in Philadelphia, Chief Hometown met a former Army buddy who asked him to serve as a substitute on a bowling team. In full Indian regalia in keeping with his position in show business, the Chief attracted attention but resolved "I might just as well bowl good as look good." Digging in, Chief Hometown compiled a 212 average and was a member of the Walker-McDermott Philadelphia championship team of 1958-59.

Chief Hometown married an Irish girl, and Mr. and Mrs. Hometown have adopted three children — Jeff, Peter, and Katie, seven, six, and four. Jeff is a full-blooded Indian, and his brother and sister are half Indian, half Irish. "The only requisite is love," the Chief said, disclaiming any credit for adopting a family.

"And guess what the boys wanted for Christmas?" Chief Hometown said with a half frown. "Cowboy suits!" Made an honorary chief of the Seminoles by Chief Mike Osceola during a visit to Florida, Hometown is a personal friend of "Cochise" Michael Ansara, who, by the way, is no Indian.

In his missionary work for the American Indian, Chief Hometown traveled at his own expense to Broken Knee, S. D., where he visited Father Edwards, a Jesuit, in charge of a school for some 300 Indian children whose forebears participated in the Sioux uprising. And at Broken Knee in South Dakota, a monument marks the spot where 400 Sioux women and children were massacred by soldiers of the U. S. Army.

In his message for American school children, Chief Hometown stressed the honor of the American Indian in living up to his word; his betrayal by the white man under flags of truce; and Indian friendship proffered through the years from the time of the first European settlers, despite abuse of Indian personal and property rights.

At luncheon in Simone's Restaurant with Jack Handloff, Blaine Fitzgerald and Joe Cann of the Blue Hen Lanes; Herb Grund, Baltimore bowling representative for Brunswick; and the editor of the Newark Post, Chief Hometown said "It's a thrill for me to wake up in the morning. You have to have nothing to appreciate something," the Chief said, and as a son of a former top-ranking middleweight boxer in the easy-come, easy-go school — and it was all gone when Chief Hometown was growing up — he experienced a time of "having nothing."

With full appreciation for "something" which he has earned, the Chief visits youngsters in hospitals, schools, and other institutions, and at the Maryland State School for the Deaf, he performed in pantomime — real Indian sign language.

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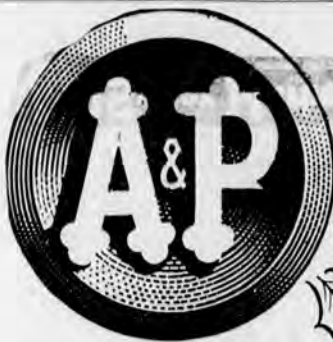
