

# Spring Break Cancelled

Spring break has been cancelled, according to university Head Honcho E.A. Trombone.

"We thought the best way to save money on electric bills, in addition to silencing the critics of the lengthened school year, would be to do away with Spring Break," Trombone said in a memo to LeRoy Jenkins, a maintenance worker.

Mr. Jenkins said, "I just found this thing in the mailbox this morning, and I thought the university community might want to know about it."

Trombone said he couldn't understand how the letter got in Jenkins' mailbox. "I could have sworn that letter was addressed to Dr. Gamble," he said. L. Leo Gamble, university provost and big mahoff, was unavailable for comment.

Trombone explained that the university would save at least \$85 by making the move. "This time of year, we can really save money on utilities," he explained. "Between April 1 and April 30, we neither heat nor cool the buildings on campus. On the other hand, if you will, we have to air-condition

the buildings in late May. So it makes sense not to waste this beautiful weather we've been having."

Later, at an impromptu press conference in the Memorial Hall bell tower, where Trombone was hiding until the incident blew over, a reporter from the Newark Weakly Ghost asked, "What about students who have already left for Florida?"

Trombone answered, "I would say, speaking personally, that they're really up the creek, and with no paddle. That's what they get for leaving early."

Asked if this was fair to those students, who will return to find they've missed a week of classes, Trombone queried in reply, "Is it fair that we're alive? Look at me — just back from the Virgin Islands, and I was due to leave for Guam next Monday, but I'll just have to wait like everyone else. It is, and again I'm speaking personally, not as university president, their tough beans."

Student groups reacted quickly and decisively to the announcement. The UDFP tabled a resolution

that would ask for further investigation of the matter. The RCS moved to reopen the tabled resolution for further debate, and the Coed Driving Committee decided to reorganize their group so they could show movies and throw their two cents into the fray.

Faculty, too, were quite upset with the proclamation. One member of the AAPU who wished to remain anonymous (although we would divulge his name for a price) said, "This is very distressing. I was looking forward to doing some extra research over vacation. I'm really starting to feel bad about the amount of time I've been teaching this semester, when I'd much rather be publishing works of great importance in my field."

Dr. John E. Worthless, vice honcho for Student Affairs and Administration, said, "We were going to charge a \$19 Spring Break fee, but it would be hard to collect and besides, we're number one in student charges already. We don't have to try harder."

## Sex Goddess Croaks; Della OD's on Grass

Another sex goddess has taken her own life, an apparent victim of exploitation and the loneliness of life as a celebrity.

# Christiana Towers Collide

Officials at the university are at loss to explain the whys and wherefores that lead to the crash of the two Christiana Towers, killing all inhabitants of the east tower and all but 70 in the west.

Eyewitnesses say the east tower had just been cleared for cleaning by Plant Operations moments before Thursday's noontime tragedy when the west tower, for some unknown reason, started shaking. Apparently the west tower was under the impression it was to be cleaned first.

The west tower, according to one survivor from the ill-fated dorm and popular partying palace, was probably trying to get to the van with the cleaning equipment in an attempt to have its halls cleaned first.

The ensuing movement by so large a building caused

the structure to start swaying and eventually topple into the adjoining tower.

Even as you read this, rescue workers are sifting through the debris searching for more bodies. Hope of

finding survivors is slim, but rescue workers get first dibs on unclaimed valuables.

Rescue officials say priority will be given to transporting the injured to Newark Emergency Center, where they will be cryogenically frozen. In the meantime bodies of those lost in the tragic accident are being housed in makeshift dormitories, student lounges, and dining hall freezers.

One survivor of the mishap, Alan Crablice, described the happenings as he saw them from his porch on the first floor of Christiana West.

"I was just sitting by my window as I usually do about noon on Thursdays. There's this girl that goes by about then on her way to lunch, and whenever I'm home I make sure that I'm by my window to do some scoping."

"Well anyway," Crablice

continued, "I was just waiting for this girl to come by when I noticed that the radio tower on top of east was starting to sway and bricks were starting to fall off. The next thing I knew the tower fell over and crushed my building. I don't know how I or anybody else in here got out alive. I hear everyone else in the other building got it. Tough break," Crablice added.

John Schnook, Special Assistant for Special Projects of a Secretive Nature, said, "Anyway, this solves the problem of vandalism in the Towers. We can probably house people in Old College or the Commuter House. Besides, this will allow us to admit a lot of people who would love the chance to attend the university. We also have an excuse to raise tuition now," he said with a sly chuckle.

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## New Computer To Vaporize ID Losers

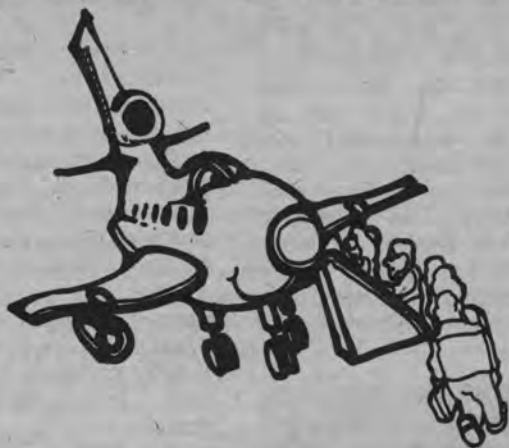
A new computerized identification system may be implemented by university Security, according to John Schnook, director of Security.

The system will cost about \$80,000 and will be funded by a gift from a private source, who requested that the system be used just on Irish-Catholic students, Schnook said. It is believed that the private source involved also funded the university's court case against the Newman Center priests.

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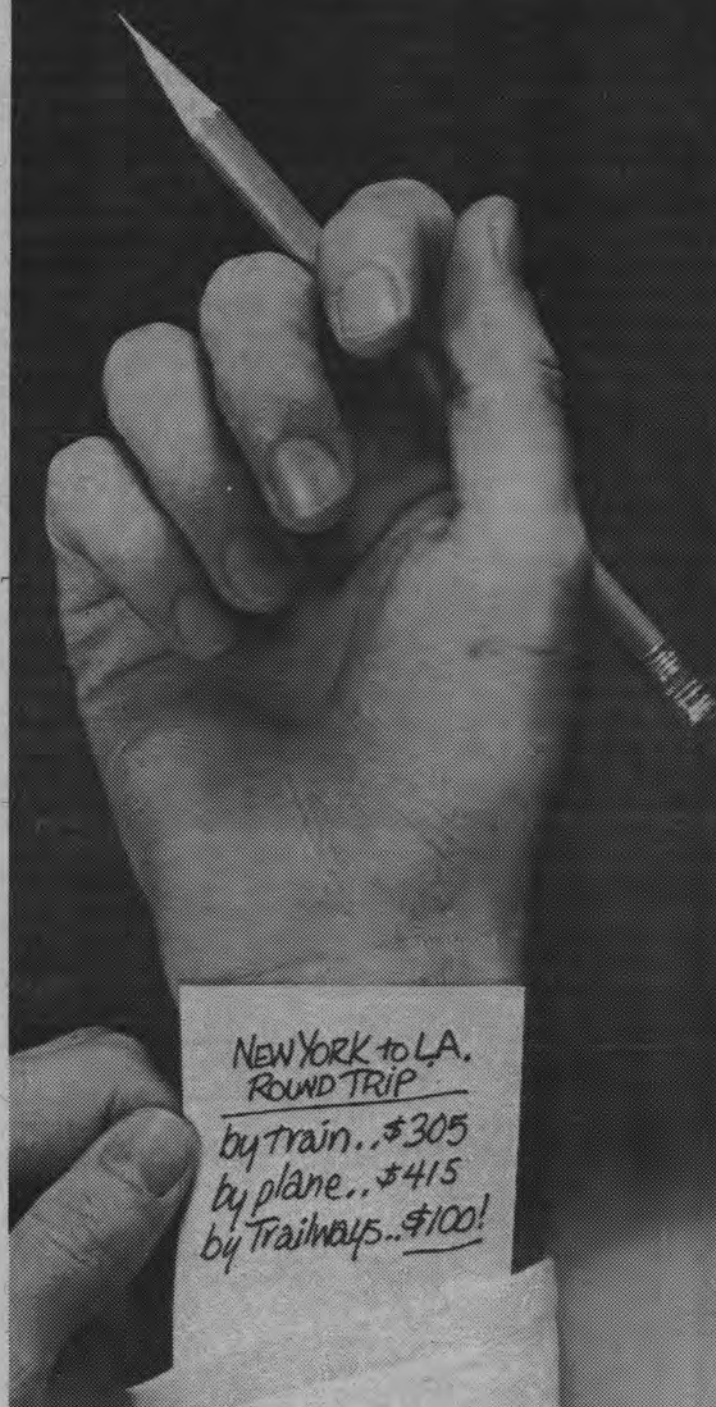
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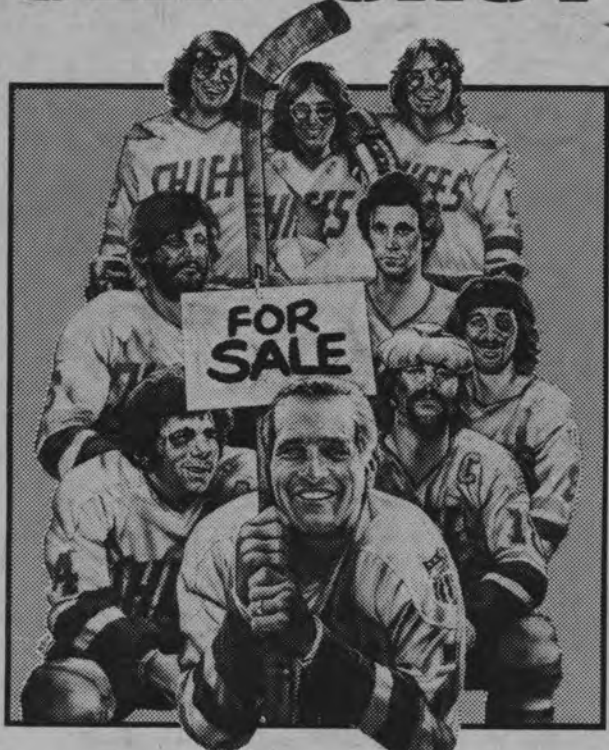

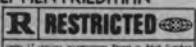


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## McGino's Opts for Scrounge

"This system will save the students money in the long run," explained Schnook, "by reducing overcrowded conditions and eliminating the red tape that normally would be necessary to replace the ID. Rather than replacing the student ID, we'll get rid of the student."

Now, "the only problem is sometimes the death rays tend to back-fire, which vaporizes the Security officer and leaves a 50-foot crater that remains radioactive for 50,000 years," he said. This problem should be overcome within six months to a year, he said.

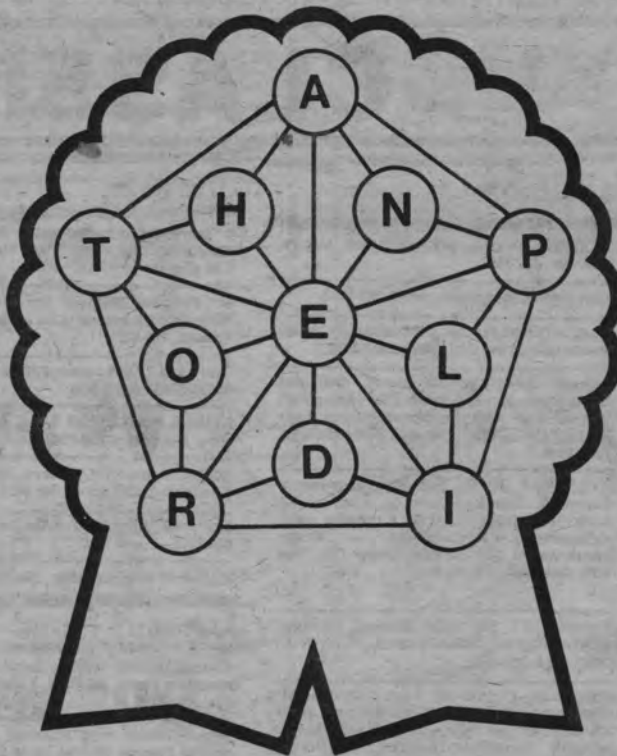

According to Mulhern, "There's a lot of wind and turbulence around the lip of the stadium, so I have to go into the stadium at a slant, as close to the lip as possible." As for the other problem, Mulhern remarked, "I've got to keep away from the people or else I could end up suspended and unable to control my landing."

Mulhern considers his act safe and puts down the daredevil label attributed to this skillful artist, stating, "With the proper timing and knowledge of equipment, you'll be safe. I got hurt more playing football and wrestling in college." While at Delaware, Mulhern was a star lineman on the football team and, for Paul Billy's wrestling squad, won the 1973 MAC title in the 190-pound weight class and wrestled in the nationals.
