Alleen Ritchie, R. Gifford  
Earn All-A's Getting B's  
Two Newark High School grad-  
uates and University of Delaware  
students — Alleen Ritchie, of 45  
respect Ave., Newark, and Rich-  
ard Gifford, Jr., of near Newark—  
have earned straight A's in all sub-  
jects taken at the university dur-  
ing the past semester.  
Miss Ritchie, an Education major,  
who graduated from Newark High  
school in 1949, ranked No. 1 in a  
class of 35 students and Richard  
Gifford, an Agriculture major, who  
was a member of the 1950 graduat-  
ing class at the local high school,  
ranked No. 1 in a class of 360.  
A report recently released by  
the University of Delaware, re-  
veals that 40% of the Newark High  
school graduates at the university  
made the Dean's List by attaining  
an average of B or better.  
Sixty percent of the 20 Newark  
students in Delaware's Class  
of 1953 attained at least a B av-  
erage, and in the Class of 1954, 44%  
of the 18 local students made the  
Dean's List.  
There are eight Newark High  
graduates in the Class of 1955 and  
two have a B average, while in the  
Freshman Class, 25% of the New-  
ark pupils have earned these schol-  
astic honors.

25 YEARS AGO

### Extension of City Limits
