COUNCIL APPROVES NAME

NEWARK NITE BECOMES NEWARK DAY Newark Nite, one of the city's largest

events, saw a major change this year when city officials decided to move it to daytime hours.

The change was sparked in part by a series of crimes that occurred in the city after the 2010

"We still had intoxicated people walking around, several pushing instances," Mayor Vance A. Newark Newsstand, a Main Street icon, closes

The wooden shelves that used to be filled with Time, Newsweek, Sports Illustrated, People and other popular magazine and newspaper titles were reduced to a single stack of the New York Times and a few cigar boxes Monday morning.

Likewise, the walls of Newark's secondoldest store were not as colorful, lively and

bright as they have been for more than 75 years, as the Newark Newsstand closed its doors for the final time.

"It's a Newark institution on Main Street," Newark Mayor Vance A. Funk III said. "I first came in contact with the newsstand in 1959 when we moved to Newark. It was the place to go for newspapers and magazines.'

The store was run by members of the becoming the fourth owner of the newsstand in its long history. It was popular for its vast selection of magazines and newspa-

pers from all around the world and also carried a variety of tobacco products.

Funk said the wide selection is what made the store special. Funk used to see bundles of papers and magazines lined up outside of the doors of the newsstand on Sunday mornings. However, in the last few years they seemed to be diminishing, he said.

Minaxi Patel, who ran the store with her Patel family, who took over five years ago, husband, Naresh, and daughter, Dhara, said people would come from Pennsylvania and



NEWARK CHARTER SCHOOL • EXPANSION APPROVED

Newark Charter School's plans to add a high school to its current K-8 offerings drew a large deal

Opponents argued it would draw students away

concern that the school, which opened in 2001, does not have enough minority and low-income students.

The state board of education approved the expansion in April under the condition that NCS begins offering the free-and-reduced lunch program and better advertises its application process.

The school has begun renovations of the former Lear plant on Elkton Road, and the high school will open there in the fall.

CITY SETTLES LANDLORD LAWSUIT

• In June, the city agreed to pay a \$950,000 settlement to a group of landlords, ending three years of legal wrangling over the city's rental

The city also agreed to significantly reduce the fees, which the landlords claimed were so exorbitant they represented an illegal tax.

Five landlords filed suit against the city in 2009, alleging the city's rental fees were illegal because they exceed the actual expenses incurred by the city for administering and enforcing its rental code. The suit sought a refund of past fees and a court order mandating the city lower the permit fees.

The suit was heard in Chancery Court, but the court gave the parties a chance to settle the matter out of court.

MAIN STREET ICON CLOSES

Main Street lost of one its best-known • businesses in June when the Post House restaurant closed its doors for the last time.

The restaurant had been in business since 1957, before the owner decided to sell it earlier this year.

In addition to providing breakfast and lunch to several generations of Newarkers, the Post House

was also known for its stalwart manager and cook. Jane Woolsey.

Woolsey, who worked there for 46 years, said there is no doubt she will miss her customers, many of whom have been loyal patrons for decades.

"They've become my family," Woolsey said on one of the restaurant's last days. "The best memories were watching the children grow up."

NEWARK SPARED BY HURRICANE SANDY

Hurricane Sandy roared toward the region in late October, but thankfully spared Newark of the extreme damage seen in New York

The late-season storm did, however, bring heavy rain and wind to Newark, as well as close schools and businesses and force the cancellation of the city's annual Halloween parade.

"Overall, Newark did very, very well," City Manager Carol Houck said the day after the storm. "We have very minimal power outages and limited flooding.'

RETIRED PROFESSOR **GOES MISSING**

Volunteers turned out in droves to search for a retired University of Delaware professor after he went missing in the fall.

John Dohms, 64, who suffers from dementia, did not return to his Cleveland Avenue home as p.m. Sept. 13.

Two days later, he was sighted on Little Baltimore Road near North Star Elementary School. Rescue dogs confirmed the sighting, but investigators were unable to find him.

The university is offering a \$10,000 reward for information that helps find Dohms, but he is still missing.

BLOOM ENERGY BREAKS GROUND

Bloom Energy broke ground on its Newark facility April 30.

The California-based company is the first tenant at the University of Delaware's science and technology campus, located on the former Chrysler site on South College Avenue.

When construction is finished in late 2013, the 200,000-square-foot facility will be a manufacturing hub where fuel cells are used to convert fuel into electricity through an electro-chemical process that does not require combustion.






