IN MEMORY OF BILL ANDERSON

We were shocked and saddened by the unexpected loss of William A. Anderson, known fondly to us as Bill, who passed away in Hawaii while on vacation. As one of the early graduates of DRC, Bill's long and productive career spanned the 50-year history of the organized study of disaster. He was well-known to us all, though we knew him in different persona as friend, mentor, and intellectual leader of this field for many years.



Bill's work on the Alaska Earthquake set the standard for later DRC field studies, inaugurating the tradition of quick-response fieldwork at DRC and elsewhere. Bill's first job after DRC was at Arizona State University, where he enjoyed a spectacular and rapidly-promoted career. Bill was a well-established scholar at the time he left ASU for his position as a program manager at the National Science Foundation. There he laid the foundation for what we now recognize as today's mature disaster field, with a well-established funding program in the NSF Engineering Directorate. At the time Bill arrived at NSF, there was little hazards-oriented social science research being funded at the agency; most such research was in the engineering and physical sciences. Bill capitalized on an accelerated interest in interdisciplinary work that was germinating in the areas of earthquake risk and seismic safety, especially relating to risk perception and public tolerance and acceptance of mitigation measures. As Dennis Wenger stated bluntly but with enthusiasm for Bill's influence, "If you have received an NSF grant at any time, you should thank Bill for that support. Bill created and institutionalized the research program. Its continuation is a testimony to him." His influence was far reaching, owing to his role at NSF, including the competitions that led to the National Center for Earthquake Engineering Research (NCEER), and then later the Pacific Earthquake Engineering Research Center (PEER), the Multidisciplinary Center for Earthquake Engineering Research (MCEER), and the Mid-America Earthquake Center (MAE Center).

To the senior scholars of our field, Bill was a close friend, mentor, confidant, and trusted advisor. For the most junior scholars, and for those still to enter the field, Bill's was a name cited with reverence in any number of publications. We all

owe a special debt to the Earthquake Engineering Research Institute whose wonderful oral history, written by Robert Reitherman, allowed us a more personal look at an individual who many, especially scholars early in their careers, would have known mainly as a titan of the field. How else would we have learned that Bill took up rollerblading just a few years ago? His high energy and relish for adventure and fresh experiences benefited us all, because these characteristics led Bill to the various important positions he held in a number of organizations in addition to the National Science Foundation, such as the World Bank and the National Academy of Sciences.


We offer our thanks to Bill's wife Norma, daughter Candice, and their family for organizing and hosting a memorial for Bill on March 22nd in Silver Spring, Maryland. There friends and colleagues from years past and more recently gathered to remember Bill with stories, pictures, music, and memorabilia from Bill's research and travels. It was a time to reconnect and to reflect. We'll all miss Bill, but we will also remember his many achievements that built and advanced our field.



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GRANTS

DRC is part of a team that was recently awarded a grant from DHHS to study post-Sandy resilience in NYC. Working on the project are, from DRC: Jim Kendra, Joe Trainor, Joanne Nigg, and Benigno Aguirre; from Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health: Jonathan Links, Norma Kanarek, Brian Schwartz, Takera Igusa, and Natalie Semon; and from NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, Sarah Sisco, Ingrid Gonzalez, and Marc Jean. This collaborative effort involves building on the JHU/DRC theoretical model of community resilience (CoPE-WELL) which will guide the gathering of local data for representation in a systems dynamics model and ultimately point to potential interventions that could guide planning and bolster resilience in NYC.

OUTREACH TO PRE-K, LOWER, AND MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

DRC faculty have had a great time talking to children about disasters, disaster research, and emergency preparedness. Tricia Wachtendorf had the chance to meet with Wilmington JCC Pre-K students during community helper week, talking about what a disaster researcher does and what goes into a disaster supply kit. 


