Dear Colonel Graviet:

This letter is in response to your recent inquiry pertaining to the question of whether the above-captioned charge is a cause of action under Section 7 of the 1986 ADEA amendments arising under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 as in effect January 1, 1987, as to which the ADEA amendments of Section 3 and 4 shall not apply.

It is the opinion of the EEOC, Philadelphia District Office, that the above-captioned charge is such a cause of action arising under the ADEA of 1967 as in effect before January 1, 1987 and therefore the 1986 amendments shall not apply with respect to this charge. The reasons for this opinion are the following. First, the charge arose in 1984, before the effective date of the 1986 ADEA amendments. Second, a Letter of Violation was issued by this office on November 19, 1985, finding that the Delaware State Police discriminated against individuals who were mandatorily retired at the age of fifty-five (55) or after twenty (20) years of service. This letter was also issued prior to the effective date of the 1986 ADEA amendments. Third, the EEOC and the Delaware State Police have been involved and continue to be involved in efforts to achieve voluntary compliance with the ADEA, pursuant to Section 7(b).

This office recognizes that the issue has not been addressed by the courts. Nevertheless, this office takes this position due to the facts of this case as outlined

above.

This office also encourages that Delaware State Police voluntarily comply with the ADEA to resolve this matter amicably and without court involvement.

STATE OF DELAWARE Office of the Governor July 10, 1987

To the Delaware State Senate of the 134 General Assembly of the State of Delaware

I am returning Senate Bill No. 185 as amended by Senate Amendment No. 1, which I received on July 1, 1987, and which is entitled: AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 33, TITLE 19 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION.

This Bill originated from the Department of Labor and was intended to clarify whether individuals who engaged in employment of a specific, limited duration would be eligible for unemployment compensation benefits when their term of employment was completed. The clarification would make it clear that those individuals would be excluded from unemployment benefits. However, due to an unintended inclusion of the word "not" within the legislation, the intent of this legislation has been thwarted.

Under current law, an individual who leaves work voluntarily without good cause is ineligible for unemployment compensation. As stated above, the intent of this legislation was to preclude unemployment benefits for people who were employed on a limited duration. An exception to that preclusion would be where an individual was collecting unemployment benefits immediately prior to accepting the employment of limited duration. Unfortunately, the bill reads that such an individual who accepts limited duration employment will be deemed to have left work voluntarily without good cause, but that that individual would not be subject to the provisions which would preclude unemployment benefits for voluntarily leaving work. Obviously, the word "not" should not have been included inasmuch as it has the effect of creating a law which is contrary to the original intent of the legislation. With the inclusion of that qualifier, the bill could easily be interpreted to read that while the employee left work voluntarily he would not be subject to the provisions of the unemployment compensation laws which preclude payment of benefits under that circumstance.

I support the concept of the original intent of Senate Bill No. 185 as amended by Senate Amendment No. 1, However, due to the technical flaw cited above, I hereby return Senate Bill No. 185 as amended by Senate amendment No. 1, without my signature.

Thank you for sending me a copy of Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 88 of the 134th General Assembly, concerning a State Department recommendation to discontinue Extended Voluntary Departure (EVD) for the 7,000 to 10,000 Polish nationals who have resided in the United States since martial law was declared in Poland in 1981.

As you may know, the decision whether to continue the special immigrant status for the Polish nationals is reviewed every six months. The State Department recently recommended that EVD be revoked June 30, which would result in mass deportation of the Polish nationals if approved. This recommendation apparently was based on a desire by the State Department to normalize relations with the Polish government.

While the State Department makes recommendations based on foreign policy grounds, the decision to extend EVD ultimately rests with the Department of Justice. You should be pleased to hear that the Attorney General Edwin Meese announced on June 18 that the special immigrant status will be extended for the Polish nationals through December, 1987. Legislation was also recently introduced into Congress which would give permanent resident status to the Polish nationals who arrived in the United States before July 21, 1984, but no action has been taken to date.

Thank you for bringing the Delaware General Assembly's resolution regarding Polish refugees (S.Con.Res. No. 88) to my attention. I'd like to take the opportunity to share my views with the Senate on this issue.

As you know, Poles residing in the U.S. without visas have been granted a temporary stay of deportation since 1981 under the classification known as Extended Voluntary Departure. That status was due to expire on June 30, but Attorney General Meese chose to extend it until December 31 for the 7,000 to 10,000 Poles that have been in this country since July 21, 1984.

While I am pleased that the fears of many Polish refugees have been allayed for the time being, my sentiments are tempered by the knowledge that significant problems still exist in our nation';s refugee policies. Too often in the past, political expediency, not humanitarian considerations, has become the guiding factor in our national approach to refugee issues. It is my hope that Congress can work with the President to establish a more objective asylum process, one based on actual conditions around the globe.

Again, thank you for making the Senate's views known to me.

JOINT SESSION HOUSE CHAMBER January 14, 1988

Pursuant to HCR 98, the House and Senate met for a Joint Session in the House Chamber. The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the members of the Senate. They were admitted and seated.

The Speaker of the House invited the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and the President pro Tempore of the Senate to be his guests on the podium.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Honorable Andrew Christie, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, and other members of the Judiciary. They were admitted and seated.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the members of the Governor's Cabinet and other State and County elected officials. They were admitted and seated.

The Majority Leader moved that the House and the Senate convene in Joint Session.

There was no objection. The Majority Leader moved that the Speaker of the House preside over the Joint

Session. There was no objection.

The Majority Leader moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the

Senate act as secretaries to the Joint Session. There was no objection.

The Majority Leader moved that the Speaker of the House appoint a committee of four to escort the Governor to the House Chamber. The Speaker appointed Representative Smith (Spokesman), Representative Bennett, Senator Marshall and Senator Berndt.

The chair declared a short recess to await the arrival of the Governor and the Escort Committee.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of the Honorable Michael N. Castle, Governor of the State of Delaware.

The Governor was admitted and introduced by Representative Smith.

The Speaker welcomed the Governor and invited him to the podium.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Mr. Speaker, Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. President Pro Tem, members of the 134th General Assembly, members of the Cabinet, members of my family, honored guests, and the people of Delaware.

It is with considerable pleasure that I appear before you today to report on the state of the state:

Delaware continues to enjoy unprecedented prosperity. More Delawareans are working than ever before. Our schools are among the best in the country. Our business community is strong and diverse. And recent years have seen dramatic improvements in community is strong and diverse. the ability of government to meet its responsibility to build for Delaware's future.

For, truly, the worth of our accomplishments can only be measured by what they allow us to do next. It is the future that concerns us, and the value of the past is to be found in the lessons it teaches us, in the foundation it represents, and in the sense of

direction it provides. I am convinced that at no time in the long history of this state have we been better able than we are today to improve the way we live and brighten the future for future generations.

But we can not ignore the past and its progress.

If we have helped a child overcome obstacles to a productive and happy life, we cannot overlook that accomplishment. If we have strengthened our ability to combat polluters and protect our land and water from harm, then we must build on that progress. If parents send their children to our schools with confidence that they will learn and grow, then we must recognize those who have made this possible. And if Delaware is better -- our roads, our human service programs, our support for farm and business -- then we must assess those accomplishments, if only to test whether our course is true and correct.

When I took office, it was with certain goals in mind. The priorities of this administration have not changed since I took office, and they provide a good

measure against which to gauge our accomplishments.

o The first is to provide the best possible education in our public schools. No issue has dominated public events more in recent years, both in Delaware and across the country. Propelled by the "Nation at Risk" report, virtually every state in the nation has made public education a top priority. Delaware's response was a comprehensive report and recommendations designed to made our state a national leader in education.

The result?

Three years ago we were ranked twenty-second in teacher salaries. Today Delaware teachers are the fifteenth highest paid in the nation, and that ranking could well increase when the current year is taken into account.

New teachers should expect a starting salary of over \$20,000 a year in fiscal year 1989 if local districts pay their fair share of those salaries. The average salary has gone from slightly over \$23,000 a year to \$29,600 a year in just three years. Delaware ranks eighth in expenditures per pupil, and our teacher to pupil ratio is in the top third in the nation.

Counting the dollars we have put into our schools is a convenient way of measuring our progress, but it should not be confused with the real issues of education. Quality is at issue, higher standards and greater accountability are at issue. We are willing to spend more on public education, but we want results, and

results come from better teaching.

Thus we have increased the teacher work week to a minimum of thirty-seven and a half hours a week, although most teachers work much longer. We have revised the teacher salary schedule to encourage professional growth. We spend \$2 million a year on teacher career enhancement programs. We have devised a method of enhancing teacher skills that has become a nationally recognized model. And we have both set high standards for hiring new teachers, and strengthened our ability to recruit good teachers.

I would be remiss if I did not single out one "educator" -- for that is truly what he has become -- who has led the fight for better schools. Chuck Welch has worked closely with a new and dynamic State Board of Education to assure that our

schools meet the high demands of modern life and commerce.

As President of the State Board, Chuck has the responsibility for asking how much better our schools have become. That's a question the vast majority of our taxpayers want answered. They know our schools have improved, that accountability has increased, that our young people graduate better prepared than in years past. But the economic survival of the state of Delaware demands even greater improvements, even more accountability, even better-prepared graduates -- and that is why I am proposing a major new education program today.

It is based on the premise that education is not a process of repetition and rote alone. Good teachers will tell you that something magic happens when children learn -- really learn, when they grasp not only the facts but the concepts that tie them together, when they learn to think instead of memorize, when suddenly their

eyes open and they are able to take responsibility for their own learning.

Too often that's missing in our schools because tradition, the natural conservatism of any institution, and the formulas and regulations that we in government impose on schools are the enemies of good and creative teaching.

I want to sweep away the obstacles to good teaching by inviting up to seven schools to participate in a program we are calling the Innovation in Teaching and Learning Program. The goal is to find better ways to teach and help children learn more. It will offer an unprecedented measure of freedom to our schools, not only from regulation and formulas, but from the past as well. Today innovation and new understanding of how people learn are making better education possible, and we have an opportunity in Delaware to involve teachers in the process in ways that did not exist before.

The stakes are large. This small state cannot afford to graduate students who do not have the skills they need to hold a job; we cannot afford to allow one out of every four students to drop out. The approach is simple: to allow decisions about how to teach, about how to structure the curriculum, and about how students spend their time to be made at the school level, keeping traditional methods only if they meet the test of whether they help kids learn.

The state's role in this will be to help teachers and principals take advantage of the tremendous amount of valuable research going on all over the country by providing information and support, so that the teachers who will be teaching all of us how to improve our education system are also learning from their peers in other states.

The pilot schools will serve as models and laboratories for our other schools, and in time I expect many of their ideas and innovations to become integral parts of education in Delaware, just as I expect other schools to replace the original

pilot schools as excellence spreads and grows in this state.

There is much more that we can do to improve our schools, of course. urging the General Assembly to approve a new program to hire retired teachers to provide instructional support in our schools, thus freeing classroom teachers from non-teaching duties. I intend to continue to look for ways to assess the progress of school districts and individual schools; to initiate an extended day program so that working parents can be confident that their children are properly cared for; and to continue our commitment to supply schools with teaching materials by increasing Division II funding.

o The second priority of my administration has been to assure an on-going economic development program that brings good jobs and promising futures for our citizens.

Beginning in 1981, Delaware launched one of nation's most aggressive and successful development efforts. By taking advantage of our ability to work together and move quickly, and by leading rather than following in the fast-changing work of banking and finance, we have become a national finance center.

But our success is not solely in banking. Incentives enacted over a period of years have resulted in almost 2,000 new blue collar jobs and and over \$128 million in investments in blue collar industries. Our economy is strong and diverse, and an example of the opportunities it has provided can be found in the fact that many more handicapped workers now have the chance to work and prove they can do the job. We are fortunate to have one of the most successful and well-run agricultural sectors in the country, and the state continually demonstrates its commitment to the Delmarva poultry industry.

Delaware has long been a center of research, and today we continue in the forefront. The task force I appointed on high technology is making a contribution to our economic progress, and the University of Delaware is a national leader in composites research. In fact, one of the most promising areas of research combines two of Delaware's strengths -- composites and agriculture -- by seeking new ways of

processing and packaging food products.

Our institutions of higher learning are important to Delaware's future growth, and Russel Jones, the new president of the University of Delaware, and William DeLauder, the new president of Delaware State College, have already demonstrated the vision that will make the public-private-education partnership successful. It goes without saying that under Jack Kotula's tutelege Delaware Technical and Community College is an important force in Delaware's ability to offer employers a range of skilled and well-trained workers.

That is part of the reason our unemployment rate is so low. It has dropped steadily the last three years, and was at or below three percent throughout 1987. Only one other state can claim a lower unemployment rate. We have become a regional employer, attracting tens of thousands of skilled workers from surrounding

states every day.

For prospective employers, Delaware's strong work ethic, its high educational standards, and the fact that we are in a major labor market are powerful incentives

for relocation in our state.

And once businesses get here, they find that the state is equipped to work with them and help them — whether the need is for specialized training, for less red tape, or for competitive tax treatment.

In the coming year we will add a new dimension to our economic development effort. Delaware has sponsored several trade missions to Asia and Europe, and the budget I will present two weeks from now will include funding for the first step in establishing a Delaware presence overseas. I believe we must take this step if we are to remain competitive in a global economy.

o <u>The next priority has been to continue the sound conservative fiscal policies</u> which pulled Delaware back from the edge of economic ruin and restored vitality to

our state.

Certainly no other state can boast a record of tax reductions like Delaware's. Personal income taxes have been cut four years in a row, and our top rate has gone from 13.5 percent to 7.7 percent during that time. We have eliminated inheritance taxes between spouses. The 1988 tax year will see 30,000 low income earners no longer paying income taxes. And by restructuring our business taxes we have literally dropped thousands of businesses from our tax roles and kept other Delaware businesses competitive.

The tremendous economic growth this state has enjoyed has brought more and more revenues to the state each year. We estimate that potential new revenues during the past three years total \$590 million. Fully a third of that amount has been returned to taxpayers through tax cuts. Virtually the entire balance has been devoted to improving the quality of service the state provides to its citizens.

But -- and this is vitally important -- much of that new spending has been structured so that it will not become part of the base budget. Working with Senator Nancy Cook, Representative Phil Corrozi and the other members of the Joint Finance Committee, we have exercised caution in allowing the budget to grow, mindful of our mandate for continued fiscal conservatism. For instance, we have actually reduced state debt for the first time in Delaware's history.

Delaware has been very fortunate in recent years. We have been able to address the needs of our citizens and provide important new programs, but at the same time reduce business and personal income taxes. We have concentrated our resources where the need was greatest. Like the families and businesses which support state government with their tax dollars, we have lived within our means and balanced competing demands, and significantly improved services to our citizens both budgetarily and managerially.

o Our fourth priority is to remove the obstacles to self-sufficiency that afflict some of our citizens, making it possible for them to live a fulfilling life, while at the same time offering help for those who need it in a way that preserves human dignity.

No area of government better typifies the challenges and accomplishments of government, in this state, in this decade, than human services. The demand for services has been great.

The potential for innovation and creative solutions has been exceptional. The effects of federal budget cuts have been inescapable and the need to set priorities unparalleled.

After education, human services has grown faster than any other government undertaking in the past three years. If you consider each year separately, the level of commitment is significant. But only by viewing the cumulative impact of three budgets — and the fourth two weeks from now — can one fully grasp just how much we have done in this area.

In Delaware we divide human services among several departments -- Health and Social Services; the Department of Services to Children, Youth and Their Families; and Community Affairs. But human needs cross departmental lines, and the last three years have seen a concerted effort to adjust our approach to those needs, to consider the range of problems that might affect a single family and address each of them in a coordinated way.

That is only part of what we are doing, of course. We have worked to design programs to keep people in their homes and communities whenever possible, and that has resulted in a dramatic shift away from institutional care to community-based services. We have developed a strategy of intervention that allows us to identify problems early on and attack them, whether a nutritional or learning problem in the first sixty months, a family-related problem for a young student, or behavior that might lead a student to drop out of high school. Much of our human services infrastructure today is focused on prevention; it is our goal to free future generations from dependency at the same time we are helping those who need our help today.

By any measure, human services has demanded much of our time, attention and resources. Increases in Health and Social Service spending have outstripped overall budget growth, and the Children, Youth and Their Families budget has gone up by more than fifty percent in three years.

We have increased welfare payments each year; spending for community programs for the mentally ill have gone up by 64 percent; and the budget for community mental retardation services has grown by over 100 percent. We have funded eleven new community group homes for the mentally retarded in just three years. And two weeks ago a new program went into effect to provide Medicaid coverage up to 100 percent of the poverty level for pregnant women and infants to age one. That will help up to 1,500 women and their children. In addition, we have begun a pilot HMO program for families making the transition from welfare to independence.

We have enjoyed a high rate of success with Delaware's unique "First Step" program, providing education and training to help long-term welfare recipients break free of the cycle of poverty. One out of every four First Step clients has found permanent work, and it is a measure of our success, as well as the strength of our economy, that our welfare roles have actually shrunk in the past year by 400

families.

Payment for foster homes that care for abused and neglected children has been increased to 100 percent of the federal standard, and payments for group homes have risen substantially.

The Division of Child Protective Services has developed and is now using a

better method for identifying children in danger of neglect or abuse.

We have expanded programs designed to take the place of incarceration at Ferris School -- among them the Delaware Bay Marine Institute and special foster care and

supervised independent living.

And the innovative "Focus on the First Sixty Months" continues to target children during their first five years of life, a time when so much can be done to eliminate obstacles to happy and productive lives. A pilot program aimed at helping four-year-olds develop basic skills so they can start school on the same level as their peers is in the second year. Most important, this program has set the tone for all of our prevention/intervention efforts, and made people aware that many of our society's problems -- substance abuse, teen pregnancy, incomplete education -- have their roots in pre-school years.

Throughout the entire range of human service programs, we have balanced current needs and future goals, helping today's families achieve independence at the same

time we are working to save new generations from dependency.

Now we must build on these accomplishments:

O In the past, welfare payments have been equally distributed by welfare size. Smaller families have received proportionally less when compared with larger families, and this year we can take the first step in correcting this situation.

o The WIC program, a nutritional program for women, infants and children, has benefited those Delawareans who qualified under federal guidelines, but federal funding has limited the number of people able to participate. This year, using state funds, we will expand the program to include many more families.

O AIDS continues to be a major concern for Americans, and each state has an obligation to provide testing and counseling to those who request it. In Delaware,

we will continue to meet that obligation.

- o Recent years have seen a concerted effort to combat the influence of drugs and alcohol on our society. While several state agencies have roles in this effort, Delaware has embarked on a new program called "Above the Influence." Unlike other programs designed to scare young people into temperate lifestyles, "Above the Influence" aims to change social acceptance of substance abuse.
- o For the first time, we are prepared to offer a strong program of child mental health services. Dr. Julian Taplin, the new director of the division, has developed a program to treat children and adolescents in their community instead of in institutions.
- o As you will see in the budget in two weeks, I am prepared to create new mental health day treatment programs for children in Kent and Sussex counties, where services are not now available, and for adolescents in New Castle County.
- o For those senior citizens who can no longer remain in their homes because of serious illness, I want the General Assembly to change the way we reimburse nursing homes for Medicaid clients so that more will be served. Those who have given so much to this state deserve to know that they will be cared for as they grow older.

protecting the environmental interests of future generations.

The first state in the nation to enact coastal zone legislation can be expected to have a strong environmental record, and Delaware indeed has one. Blessed as we are with great environmental riches, we long ago decided that our natural resources deserved and would have our protection.

The last three years have been no different.

We successfully resisted a serious assault on the Coastal Zone Act. We have taken strong action when violations required it. We have increased our ability to monitor and react to airborne hazards, and we have committed both time and money to cleaning up hazardous wastes. We have devoted millions of dollars to protecting land and water from harm.

Finally, we have shifted our attention to the future in a way unique in Delaware history. Almost two years ago, I proposed that Delaware embark on the first truly long-range study of environmental issues affecting this state. My goal was to develop a plan for addressing those issues not only today but beyond the year 2000. Environmental Legacy, as the program is called, was intended to be a broad-based, public effort to protect all that is good about Delaware.

In the year and a half that followed, literally hundreds of citizens got involved in this effort. Our intent had been to bring environmentalist and industrialist to the same table -- to meet face-to-face, to talk about issues, to understand each other's concerns. And I can say to you today that virtually everyone who has anything to contribute to Delaware's environmental future has participated.

The product of their effort is being refined today, and next week the final report will be issued. But after reading the draft report, I am prepared to call on the General Assembly to join me in committing Delaware to the first steps in implementing the Environmental Legacy Program and thus to preserving what is good about this state for future generations. When I submit the budget in two weeks, the fiscal ramifications of this effort will be seen. Today I want to talk about the first goals we have set and what is involved in reaching them before we undertake new challenges.

o I propose that we begin a comprehensive management study of our beaches and develop an approach to preserving them that takes into account the entire shoreline instead of solving individual problems on an ad hoc basis.

This study, which will emphasize cost-benefit analysis, will serve as the starting point for solving a problem that concerns many Delawareans.

o I propose that we begin to overhaul our educational approach to environmental matters by -- over the next 10 years -- expanding the time and effort devoted to teach the next generation about the environment and their responsibility to it.

o I am proposing that the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control take steps to create a Scientific Advisory Committee to increase the state's ability to identify and tap sources of expert knowledge in environmental areas. This step was recommended highly by the Environmental Legacy group, which also urged that we create an implementation committee to make recommendations and

oversee their implementation. I will create that committee this year.

o There are other recommendations to be implemented as well: increased planning capability, expanded planning for management of freshwater wetlands, and greater financial support for hazardous waste clean up.

All are important, all should be done this year if our commitment to Delaware's environmental future is genuine.

It is ironic that, as we celebrate the bicentennial of the Constitution, the strong central government so important to the Federalists' plan finds itself unable to lead or meet the responsibility it has assumed for itself in recent decades. It is ironic that the very word "federalism" today connotes a shift of authority and control from Washington to Dover and other state capitals. This is not a failure of our system of government, but of the men and women who have claimed the mantle of leadership, and who but would turn it into a cloak of invisibility when it comes time to deal effectively with the very real problems facing the country.

There is no question that the lack of leadership, political courage and

constructive work in Washington must be addressed, or that it will be. But if Delaware's environmental future is to be secure, if our education system is to continue to improve, if our criminal justice system is to become more effective and efficient, if human services are to be extended to all those in need of help, if the quality of life of this state is to be preserved -- and if these things are to happen now -- then it is up to us.

Delaware has proven that we can do the job.

When the federal government began to cut back its public housing programs, we developed an innovative program of our own. We have not waited for Washington to act on welfare reform. We have taken over important environmental programs from the Environmental Protection Agency and established a state "superfund" rather than wait for federal action. And we have charted our own course with the recently enacted "quality of life" legislation.

At a time when even the best run states and communities are beginning to wonder if they have allowed growth to weaken neighborhoods and threaten future growth, Delaware has already enacted a package of laws which provide us with the tools we need to assure orderly and managed growth and maintain our exceptional way of life.

When I called the General Assembly into session last month, we met here with a well-defined goal in mind: to adopt the first phase of a long-range plan to address Delaware's land-use, environmental and infrastructure needs during an era of continuing economic growth. The need was clear: the counties have been unable to meet the growing pressure of development, whether for economic expansion in New Castle County or commercial development in eastern Sussex County. Pressures on our highway system had resulted in unacceptable traffic levels in a number of communities.

We had already taken the first step in June when I proposed creation of the Transportation Trust Fund. For the first time, we have the means to plan our transportation future -- and then act on those plans, whether it is to relieve congestion in northern New Castle County or begin work on a new north-south highway. For the first time, decisions about roads and highways will be made by the experts rather than in the interest of political expediency.

I am confident that the General Assembly will take the remaining steps needed to complete this process in a matter of days. We must set new standards -- high standards, because that is what our constituents want!. By doing so, we assure our citizens both a voice in land use decisions and a large measure of protection from poor planning and precipitous development. If Delaware is a better place in the decade to come -- and I am convinced it will be -- then you have helped make it so.

o The final priority encompasses a great deal. It is the over-arching goal of increasing the quality of life of our citizens.

It can mean offering economic incentives for business expansion or expanding

unemployment benefits for out-of-work Delawareans, getting our court system back on track or redoubling security in our prisons, or assuring that our highways can meet the demands of the 21st century and that state government can meet the demands of the individual citizen.

Certainly the quality of our criminal justice system affects our quality of life. I believe that the time has come to undertake a long and thoughtful examination of the system, from the manpower requirements of those who enforce the laws, to the ability of the courts to handle cases, to the use of sentencing alternatives, and finally to the way in which we control dangerous criminals in our prisons. It is clear to me that we must improve coordination within the system, increase cooperation among its appoint and laws to make better use of criminal increase cooperation among its agencies, and learn to make better use of criminal justice resources.

Chief Justice Christie in this past year has exerted significant and positive leadership in these directions, and it is evident to me in the budget proposals the Chief Justice made, and in the recommendations of the Budget Office, that his assessment of courtroom needs is precisely correct and I will support his recommendation that we add two Superior Court judges in the coming fiscal year.

But that is not the only proposal that must be acted upon this year. The merger of Superior Court, the Court of Common Pleas and Municipal Court in Wilmington has been before the General Assembly for too long without action being taken. If we are serious about making the criminal justice system work, then we must take seriously our responsibility to complete that merger.

We must begin to address the courtroom congestion caused by jury trials for minor cases. And we must ensure that the courts have the personnel they need, just as we must ensure that the State Police are able to provide adequate coverage

throughout the state.

Earlier this month I met with the judges and outlined the steps we must take to improve our court system. I have asked my staff to distribute copies of my remarks to your offices today, so that you can consider how we might help our judges dispense justice.

If the progress that has been made in the Department of Correction since last February can be matched by the other elements of the criminal justice system in the year to come, then we will have gone a long way toward making the entire system responsive to our needs.

Let's consider exactly what we have done in Corrections:

We commissioned an able and knowledgable group of Delawareans to conduct an in-depth study of our prison system and make recommendations which would help us repair the system. Then we asked the Stone Task Force to continue its work by overseeing the many changes we put into effect. I was determined that this report would not gather dust on a shelf.

We have hired long-time corrections professionals to run our prisons. Watson, our new Commissioner of Correction, has the right priorities -- public safety highest among them -- and has methodically gone about getting them done.

With the beginnings of a top management team in place, we negotiated a contract with the guard union which eliminated a problem identified by the Stone Task Force and gave management increased flexibility in running the prisons. At the same time we agreed to a new personnel system with new advancement opportunities for correctional officers, and I call on the General Assembly today to support this new system.

We have begun to develop a system of accountability within the prison system and develop a sense of responsibility among those who run it.

We have begun to implement the excellent recommendations of the Sentencing Accountability Commission, which promise to restore flexibility to a too-rigid system.

To address the problem of overcrowding, we are moving quickly to expand our capacity at Smyrna and Georgetown. Two hundred new beds will be available at Smyrna in February, 200 halfway-house beds in Georgetown by the end of the year.

Today we are moving toward a better corrections system, and in the budget I present on January 28th I will ask you to support proposals which will bring about lasting improvements in the system.

There is much more to be done this year, of course.

o Leaders in Delaware's agricultural community tell me that the future growth of that important sector depends on thoughtful, long-range planning. To ensure that, I will shortly appoint a blue ribbon panel to examine new ways to market Delaware products at home and overseas, to encourage processing of farm commodities here, and to find ways to diversify our agricultural base.

o Our citizens expect us to complete work on the campaign financing reform begun last year, and we must work toward that end.

o They are encouraged by our efforts to work with our neighbors in Maryland to protect our shores from pollution, and their concern about the environment has convinced me that we must focus our attention on outdoor recreation in the coming years

o And they want -- demand -- deserve -- safe highways. We we will announce a major new effort aimed at highway safety.

This week we lost one of our leading citizens when Senator John Williams died. Senator Milliams was a man of integrity. He represented the sense of community and love of freedom which has long set Delaware apart. No one knew better how important the people are to the success of government.

Without the 630,000 citizens of this state, without their collective pride in Delaware and their resolve to make this state great, little would have been

accomplished in recent years.

I'm talking about community leaders who have given their time and energy to important projects. I'm talking about state employees who have proved that creativity resides in every agency of government. I'm talking about farmers who are good businessmen, about teachers who inspire young minds. I'm talking about the thousands of volunteers who share their time with others.

They have set high standards for all of us in government, and as a result the last three years have seen tremendous progress — in our economy, in our commitment to reducing the tax burden of government on individuals and businesses alike, and in the real improvements in the quality and scope of services that government

provides.

And now, as we begin Delaware's third century as the First State, we must lay

new plans, and set our sights on new and higher goals.

Few states have enjoyed the opportunities we have enjoyed, few states have been able to move from one plateau to the next, higher one, to make genuine improvements in the quality of life their citizens enjoy. We in Delaware have been fortunate enough to be one of those states, and by working together we will continue to be.

Lt. Governor Woo invited the Speaker of the House and the President pro Tempore of the Senate to be his guests on the rostrum.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the elected officials of the State. They were admitted. The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the members of the Governor's Cabinet. admitted.

Senator Sharp moved that the Senate and the House convene in Joint Session. There was no objection.

Senator Sharp moved that the President of the Senate preside over the Joint Session.

There was no objection.

Senator Sharp moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House act as secretaries to the Joint Session. There was no objection.

On motion of Senator Sharp and without objection, the President named the following as an escort to the Governor: Senator H Representatives Soles, Representative Quillen. Senator Holloway (spokesperson), Senator Berndt,

A brief recess was called to await the arrival of the Governor.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of Governor Michael N. Castle and the escort committee.

Senator Holloway introduced the Governor who was welcomed and introduced to the podium by the President of the Senate.

The Governor then addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. President Pro Tem, Mr. Speaker, members of the 134th General Assembly, honored guests, and the people of Delaware.

Today I am presenting for your consideration my proposed operating budget for fiscal year 1989.

At the same time, I am submitting the fiscal 1989 capital spending plan, my recommendations for improvements to our schools, roads, infrastructure, and state facilities.

Together they represent a comprehensive plan for progress in Delaware during the next year, and in a few moments I will discuss the individual initiatives they contain.

But first I would like to describe the overall budget and how we approached it.

Webster's describes a budget as (and I quote) "a plan for the coordination of resources and expenditure." Certainly the budget I am submitting today is that.

But it is far, far more.

It is a tool of incredible complexity that can work dramatic changes in people's lives. It is a measure of our progress and success, as well as of our determination to go further and accomplish even more.

It is a statement about us -- about my Administration, about the General Assembly, about our communities -- and about the aspirations and values that rule our lives

If the role of the state is to encourage commerce, foster education, protect public safety, secure a safe environment and help those who need our help, then this is how we do all those things.

For all the work that goes into this document, for all the hours of discussion and debate in my office, for all the work that the Joint Finance Committee and the Controller General's Office will commence in a few days, the budget is only a means to

For example, there is a young man I'll call Andrew.

Andrew is 17.

A year ago, when he was in 10th grade, he quit school; a year later, realizing that his future was limited without a diploma, Andrew returned. Of course, that's what we would like all our dropouts to do. Andrew, however, was still experiencing problems at home, and a part-time job often left him too tired to concentrate in class.

Well, after Andrew had done his part by returning to school, we certainly were not ment, after Andrew had done his part by returning to school, we tearnly were not going to let him down by not helping him get through a difficult time of his life. Through Christina School District's Community Mentor program, which is part of an overall, statewide effort to solve the dropout problem, we found a mentor for Andrew — actually, two mentors. A coach at his high school is his high-school mentor, and Judge Joshua Martin of Superior Court is his out-of-school mentor. Both men are there when Andrew needs to talk.

The result? First quarter, Andrew made honor roll, and today he's still going

When you look at the budget later today, instead of seeing pages of print and lists of numbers, try to see that young man whose return to high school after dropping out was made easier because we have been developing programs to fight the drop-out problem. Try to see a young mother not only struggling to get off welfare and support herself and her family, but against a learning disability as well -- whose future is now immeasurably brighter. Look for a teenager trying to cope alone with poor health and pregnancy—able to turn to the state for support and medical care so she could give birth to a healthy baby. Or look for a retarded adult, once committed to an institution, who is now able to walk down a neighborhood street and wave to new friends.

In my State of the State Address I outlined what I consider to be the most important priorities during this decade of progress in Delaware —

o To hew to the sound conservative fiscal policies which have made Delaware a strong and successful state.

To promote jobs and opportunities for all our citizens.

o To safeguard our environment.

o To drive toward the day when Delaware schools become a model for the nation, our teachers the best and most effective.

o To work toward the goal of independence and self-sufficiency for all Delawareans.

o And to make sure that government effectively increases the quality of life of all of our citizens.

The budget I am presenting to you today reflects those priorities. But we must not commit the error of weighing the progress and priorities of only a single budget; instead we must consider this budget in the context of the budgets that preceded it, as well as the opportunities it affords us to do even more in the future. And by that measure you and I have moved Delaware ahead a great distance these past three years. We have eschewed short-term solutions, instead adhering to the priorities both my Administration and the members of the General Assembly have identified as important, and every lawmaker in this chamber today can point with pride to their accomplishments. have balanced the need to provide meaningful programs with the need to reduce the tax burdens on taxpayers; progress and improvement have always been our goals, but they have been measured and their cost carefully weighed. At a time when revenues have been abundant, the temptation to spend without regard to consequences is great, but discipline has marked our budget deliberations.

The hundreds of individual programmatic initiatives of this administration's four budgets are like the tiles in a mosaic -- they must be considered together to accurately assess our accomplishments. And I would tell you today that the mosalc is a panarama of progress and prosperity, of men and women enjoying new opportunities, of government at once more able to help its citizens and <u>less</u> intrusive in their lives.

So let us now turn to the operating and capital budgets and, as we consider each proposal, keep in mind the progress each represents, and the promise each program represents for the future.

The Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council's latest estimate of new revenues in fiscal year 1989 is \$1,052.9 million. To that we add the anticipated 1988 fiscal year carry-over of \$42.9 million and a Medicaid adjustment of \$2.6 million. From that balance we have subtracted \$34.3 million, which I will discuss in a moment. After computing our constitutionally mandated 98 percent limit, fully funding our reserve requirements and setting aside \$10.1 million for grants-in-aid, I am recommending a Fiscal Year 1989 operating budget of 1,020.7 dollars.

The remaining \$12 million is one-time revenue which I am allocating to capital

programs because it should not be built into the base budget.

In conjunction with my budget, I am also submitting to you today my recommendations for a capital budget of \$192.8 million, including the needs of the Transportation Trust

Since the beginnings of this Administration, with increasing effectiveness and impact, four cabinet councils have brought together individual cabinet secretaries whose responsibilities overlap to develop policy guidelines which define the direction of

government.

The Human Services Cabinet Council has identified four primary goals for the many programs its constitutent agencies administer: self-sufficiency, prevention, quality of care and improvements to the systems of delivery. Having identified primary goals, we then have gone about finding programs and approaches that will help us reach those

goals, drawing on the expertise of our employees in each department.

Thus child health programs like WIC, or Women, Infants and Children, go to prevention. Staffing increases improve quality of care. Staff development programs improve the system structure. And expanded employment training helps welfare recipients

achieve self-sufficiency -- often with extraordinary results.

Let me give you an example.

Mary is 32 years old. She has two children and has been on welfare for over five years. Mary told us she was interested in a clerical career, but her overall performance tested at only a fourth-grade level. Through our "First Step" program, Mary enrolled in basic skills remediation classes to improve her performance level, then

moved on to a 20-week JTPA clerical skills program.

But her initial high grades began to slip -- from A, to B, to C, to D -- and the program staff quickly requested diagnostic testing, which revealed that Mary was dyslexic. With that knowledge, we were able to modify her program and she successfully completed it and found a job in a law firm as a receptionist. Within a year, she had progressed to a legal assistant position, a position which provides medical benefits, and the partners in the law firm have hired another "First Step" graduate because they were so impressed with Mary.

For the record, the average annual cost of education and training for a welfare mother in the "First Step program" is \$869. On the other hand, to do absolutely nothing costs \$6,372 a year -- year after year after year -- and also imposes the future costs associated with another generation falling victim to the vicious cycle of poverty and

welfare.

The great economic progress of the last half-decade has afforded us a unique opportunity to expand and improve the human services we provide to Delawareans who need our help. Our commitment to that effort is evident both in programs like "First Step," and in the fact that only education has enjoyed growth more dynamic than that of our human services budgets.

In the budget before you, I am proposing that we increase spending for the Department of Health and Social Services by 7.9 percent, that of the Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families by 11.1 percent. I am also urging the General Assembly to approve a total of \$11 million in capital projects for these two

departments.

The Department of Services for Children affords us the first opportunity to solve problems that afflict some of our citizens. It is our initial and primary investment in

Delaware's future.

This year the department launched a major initiative with its Family Preservation Program. Its goal: to support and strengthen vulnerable and troubled families, both protecting their children and preserving a potentially supportive family structure. To further that effort, I am proposing that we add four new staff workers to the Division of Child Protective Services to respond to emergencies at night and on weekends, and provide more clerical help so case workers can spend more time doing their job.

To continue our emphasis on less restrictive alternatives to institutional care, I am urging you to approve an intensive, specialized community program as an alternative

to psychiatric hospitalization in New Castle County.

At the same time, I am recommending two new day programs -- at a combined cost of almost half a million dollars in additional spending -- to allow the Division of Child Mental Health to help children from ages three to twelve in Kent and Sussex counties and adolescents in New Castle County.

For those young people who come to the attention of our legal system, I am supporting the plan developed by the Division of Youth Rehabilitation, a plan which will ensure both security and help for violent or chronic offenders. I am recommending that we add a total of thirty-six slots for alternative schools, special foster care and supervised independent living.

I am recommending new programs, at a cost of over \$770,000, to provide specialized intensive group care, short-term group home care for young people leaving Ferris but to go in the community, and intensive in-home services under with nowhere "Mentor/Advocate" program.

I would also close the crowded Bridge House Detention Center and move the facility to the Ferris Campus, and have included \$720,000 in the capital budget to upgrade the existing Ferris facility to house these children awaiting adjudication.

I am recommending that we fund eleven new positions in the Division of Child Mental Health to assist in the development of alternative services and help us make sure we are getting the best and most effective programs for our money.

Finally, I am recommending that the bond bill include \$3.9 million to complete

department offices on the Ferris Campus.

I am proposing an increase of \$14.6 million in the budget of the Department of Health and Social Services. Of that increase, \$4.9 million is for new programs, over and above inflationary increases.

In the coming year, several major spending initiatives which are part of the "Focus" initiative are included in my recommended budget.

o I believe we must expand the WIC, or Women, Infants and Children, program to

include an additional 200 women and 200 children. o We must assume responsibility for the genetic services program to detect, treat and prevent genetically related handicapping conditions -- an integral part of our infant mortality reduction initiative.

o And I am recommending that we expand Medicaid coverage to cover women who earn up to 100 percent of the federal poverty level and their infants up to the age of two.

These three programs will cost over \$640,000, but that money will be well-spent if

it assures healthier children and stronger families in Delaware.

I suggested earlier that, when you look at the proposed budget, you look beyond the numbers to the people we must help, people like Jenny, an 18-year-old Kent Countian who entered the Kent General Hospital/Public Health maternity clinic some time ago. Jenny clearly had problems which could adversely affect the outcome of her pregnancy and permanently reduce the chances for her unborn child to have a happy and productive life. She was underweight and undernourished. She had no family or friends to provide support, the child's father had abandoned her, and she lived in a crowded apartment.

The medical team at the clinic referred Jenny to the Division of Public Health,

where she received support services from a team of professionals who put together a program for her which included living at Bayard House, a shelter in New Castle County. There another team worked with Jenny and six months later she gave birth to a healthy nine-pound baby boy; today a public health nurse is helping her keep her son healthy.

Apart from having a profound effect on two lives, we accomplished a good deal more

in this case.

Prenatal care and child health screening and immunization costs an average of \$853 per family. But if we fail that mother and child, and if the child encounters any of the problems we know spring from early neglect, the cost to the state, above and beyond the human loss, is far greater. A year in a residential treatment center costs nearly \$24,000; a year of incarceration at Ferris School, almost \$38,000; a year at the Delaware Correctional Center, over \$15,000.

In other words, it costs a great deal less to solve the problem at the beginning

than it does to address its consequences later.

I am recommending new program spending totalling well over \$650,000 for prevention-related programs, among them additional funding for AIDS testing and counseling; state funding for services to handicapped children to replace lapsing federal funds; new funds to expand and upgrade respite/crisis stabilization services for

the mentally ill; and new positions in Adult Protective Services.

I am recommending that we spend \$800,000 in the coming fiscal year to change the method by which nursing homes are reimbursed by Medicald to encourage them both to

provide care for the elderly and to encourage cost containment.

I am recommending that we add nineteen new staff positions at Delaware State Hospital and provide additional staff training. The total cost: over \$340,000. In each of my three previous budgets, I have recommended increases in welfare payments. And again this year, I urge the General Assembly to increase funding for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. The \$454,000 in new funds would be used to level up families to a more uniform percent of the poverty level.

At the same time we are promoting self-sufficiency, we are working to place men and women who need our help in the least restrictive settings possible. To that end, my budget includes funds for a 28-bed halfway house program, to be operated by a private provider, on the grounds of Delaware State Hospital; it includes funding for a new group home for the mentally ill in Kent or Sussex County; it includes funding for two Medicaid-certified group homes and one neighborhood home, along with related day programming and medical costs, for the mentally retarded; and it includes funds for day

programming for mentally retarded students graduating from special schools during 1988.

Taken together, these initiatives reflect the considerable progress we have made in recent years. By building on past accomplishments, we are better able to serve

Delawareans who rely on the state for assistance.

We have not neglected the capital needs of this large and important department. In the bond bill, I am recommending almost 6.6 million in new spending, including 2.3 million for much-needed minor capital improvements and ongoing maintenance. I am recommending that we finance a new, 21,000 square foot public health lab, that we continue to modify the buildings on the State Hospital campus to increase their usefulness, and begin expansion of the state Medical Examiner's Office lab.

the increasing globalization of even state economies internationalization of economic development efforts. To that end, I am recommending that we authorize the Development Office to establish a Delaware presence in both Asia

and Europe as the first step in expanding our ability to compete in the future.

At the same time, I am recommending that we increase the staff of DDO to increase that agency's capabilities, and that we increase our business advertising substantially.

The Development Office's responsibili oes far beyond its business recruiting and service functions, of course. It is charged with identifying and developing infrastructure initiatives that will further our economic development program.

o For instance, the \$2.3 million capital appropriation for the Delaware Composites Technology Park at the University of Delaware to encourage and support new businesses in

the field of composites research.

o And \$600,000 in the operating budget to provide renovated facilities for a clinical medical facility at the Delaware Medical Center facility in Christiana. This unique facility, where clinical testing of new pharmaceuticals would be carried out,

would enhance our ability to attract related industry to Delaware.

I am recommending that you approve funding, through the bond bill, of \$2.6 million for development of the public infrastructure to encourage private development in the area of the Christina Gateway project. I am recommending a \$500,000 appropriation to create a Development Incentive Fund, to be administered by DDO, to provide flexibility in creating incentives when they are needed and not just in June. I am also proposing that the state create a \$4.5 million financing program for businesses to fill the void left when the federal government greatly curtailed use of industrial revenue bonds.

For housing, the proposed bond bill contains \$3 million, a new installment which

brings our commitment to the Housing Trust Fund to \$19 million.

I am also proposing that the bone bill include an important Department of Agriculture project: \$1.6 million to renovate and expand the Agricultural Complex in Dover,

improvements that are much needed.

I said in my State of the State Address that I will shortly create a blue ribbon panel of farmers, development experts, representatives from the Department of Agriculture, legislators, and educators to assess the future of agriculture in Delaware. setting aside \$350,000 to identify and prioritize those programs which will make it easier for the farmers of Delaware to continue to farm their land with the same independence that has marked American agriculture for centuries.

Today I am also recommending that you appropriate \$442,000 and create ten new positions to consolidate all forestry functions statewide. This will ensure that the state has the ability to manage one of our most important natural resources in the best

interest of all our citizens.

I said two weeks ago that I believe we must add two new judges to the Superior Court. The budget you will begin considering today includes \$407,000 to create those two new judgeships and provide adequate staff support; the capital budget includes

\$350,000 to house the new judges.

Those judges will help us move toward the goal of improving coordination and cooperation among the various elements of our criminal justice system. This will not be a simple task, but the quality of justice in Delaware depends on carrying out long-overdue reform throughout the public safety and criminal justice communities, and I am confident I have your support in this effort.

Including the two judges and six support personnel, I am recommending that you approve a total of thirty-three new positions in the judiciary. Those positions will help speed the judicial process by increasing staffing in the Presentence Office, the New Castle County Prothonotary, the Court of Common Pleas, Family Court and our Justice of the Peace Courts. The total cost for these improvements to our criminal justice system: almost \$754,000.

Last year we revamped the salary plan for the Attorney General's Office in an effort to offer competitive salaries to deputy attorneys general. This year I am recommending that we complete a similar process begun this year in the Public Defender's

I am recommending new positions for an appellate unit in the Public Defender's Office, a new attorney to address the growing delay between arrest and sentencing in Superior Court cases, and a one-time appropriation to continue office automation for the Public Defender. I am also recommending funding for further office automation in the Attorney General's Office, as well as continuation of the Career Criminal Unit.

The fiscal year 1989 recommended budget includes major enhancements in security for the Department of Correction. Specifically, over \$407,000 has been recommended for security positions at Delaware Correctional Center, the Women's Correctional Institution

and Sussex Correctional Institution.

I have recommended that the General Assembly appropriate additional dollars for pay incentives associated with the new classifications of corporal and sergeant for correctional officers, providing increased opportunities and new career incentives for our prison guards. With these changes, we encourage correctional officers to take greater responsibility for the security of the prisons, and at the same time enhance the Department's ability to effectively manage its institutions.

I am recommending new positions to enhance our ability to check on offenders who are on work release; new positions in Probation and Parole in anticipation of increased workload; and new positions and funding for previously federally funded SENTAC programs, including intensive supervision and job training.

And, to move forward on the long-overdue Delaware Justice Information System, I am proposing funding of over \$1 million for the offender status and criminal history conversion projects. These projects are of critical importance to our prison system because they will allows us to track offenders quickly and accurately.

In addition, the proposed bond bill contains over \$3.2 million in spending for corrections projects, including \$1.8 million for a new women's prison, almost \$800,000 for minor capital improvements, and \$370,000 for new improvements to perimeter security.

Last week I unveiled a major new program to improve safety on our highways. program is in direct response to the increase in highway fatalities on Delaware highways. Drunk driving has been reduced in recent years, but not enough; trucks are involved in more and more accidents; speeding is an ever growing problem; motorists ignore simple safety measures that can save lives; and teenagers continue to be involved in too many accidents. The comprehensive plan developed by the Department of Public Safety offers

solutions to these problems. I am recommending that we expand the State Police corps in the coming fiscal year fifteen troopers, over and above the 42 new troopers to be hired to replace For the first time in Delaware history, we are setting authorized strength

retirees. for the State Police at 475 troopers, demonstrating our commitment to safe roads and

communities. I am also proposing that we invest \$229,000 in the coming fiscal year in a new program to offer career incentives to troopers in addition to rank promotion. I believe this will serve to increase morale in the division as well as to improve the division's

ability to do its many jobs.

The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control plays an important role in our lives. Its scientists, technicians and enforcement officers must monitor the quality of our air and of our water; they must take responsibility for solving the problems of hazardous waste that plague society today; they play a role in our deliberations about the use of our limited natural resources. Those are issues that demand society's attention; at the same time, the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control must address individual problems, serving each Delawarean with the same level of concern as they do major issues.

Last year five families in the Harrington area learned that their water wells were contaminated. The Division of Air and Waste Management, which we created in 1985, began searching for the source of contamination, but there was another concern: the families did not have the financial resources to easily replace the wells. So the department helped those families find ways to finance the work. Two Seaford families were also able to turn to the department for help in replacing contaminated wells last year, and

38 other domestic wells in the area were tested but found clear of contamination.

Just as the Department of Natural Resources must address the environmental concerns of the entire state as well as those of individuals, so it must solve tomorrow's

problems as well as today's.

It was a concern with the future that launched the Environmental Legacy Program, which released its final report and recommendations on Tuesday. Each member of the General Assembly has received a copy of the summary report, and I urge all of you who have not already done so to read this important document. It represents the best work of some of the best minds in Delaware, and at the same time represents the future of our state.

My proposed fiscal 1989 budget includes new programs to begin implementing the ideas contained in the Environmental Legacy report, and to begin as well the process of preserving and enhancing Delaware's natural resources and quality of life in the decades

I am proposing a comprehensive management plan for our beaches, because only by considering the entire coastline will we succeed in protecting any of it. In the meantime, I am recommending a ten percent increase in the annual funding for beach preservation projects in the bond bill; including beach preservation funding in the operating budget, this will bring our four-year commitment in this important effort to over \$5.2 million. And in the operating budget I am proposing two new positions for the

Indian River sand bypass system, which should be fully operational early in 1989.

As I said in my State of the State Address, I want our schools to play a larger role in educating Delawareans about the environment -- as recommended by the Environmental Legacy committee -- and to assist in that I am recommending funding to provide the "Conservationist" magazine to all seventh-g aders in the state. I am recommending new positions to improve planning for environmentally valuable land holdings, to strengthen our efforts to combat non-point pollution, and to bolster our water resources laboratory.

I have included a million dollars in the budget for leaking underground storage tanks

and the state's "Superfund.'

The bond bill, in addition to the increased beach preservation funds, contains another million dollars to supplement our Land and Water Conservation Fund, bringing it to \$4.0 million. The bond bill also provides several million dollars for sewer construction and other important DNREC projects.

Our institutions of higher education play an increasingly important role in the life of the state as they become more and more involved in our economic development program. Each publicly supported institution plays a unique part in Delaware's life, and each has contributed to the state's special character.

As in years past, I am recommending that we not only meet current obligations to our colleges and university, but also increase funding to address the impact of inflation.

In addition, I am proposing new spending for all three schools.

For Delaware Technical and Community College, which plays such a large part in training Delawareans for the workplace, I am recommending funding for expansion of its libraries. We will also continue to phase in a new pay plan for DelTech instructors.

For Delaware State College, I am recommending several new budget items: funding for new library books, funding for new laboratory equipment, and the creation of a new position — that of Dean of Faculty.

And for the University of Delaware, I am also recommending additional funding for library books, increased dollars for Title VI scholarships, and support for a new molecular biology professor in the College of Agricultural Sciences so that the university can maintain its leadership in agricultural research.

In the capital budget, I am recommending a total of \$3.3 million for continued funding for construction of DelTech's Trade and Industry Building in Sussex County, completion of Alison Hall's renovation on the University of Delaware campus, and a bookstore addition at Delaware State College.

I have already described -- in the State of the State Address -- the innovative new program to allow teachers and principals in selected pilot schools to develop better and more effective teaching methods unfettered by tradition and highly structured funding formulas. To support that program, I am including \$210,000 in the proposed budget.

With this budget, we will complete the phase-in of a restructured basic salary schedule for education professionals, providing both competitive starting salaries and real financial incentives for continued professional development. In total, I am recommending an \$11.7 million increase in salaries and other employment costs for education salaries. Teachers will receive, on average, an increase of \$1,175, or 5.7 percent.

I am also recommending several new initiatives. Most significant, perhaps, is a program to relieve teachers of non-teaching duties by hiring retired teachers -- at an initial annual cost of \$600,000 -- to take responsibility for routine hallway and cafeteria duties, to assist in the classroom, and to be available to work with the students. In recommending this program, I believe we are sending a message to teachers, telling them that we agree with their contention that too much of their time is spent away from teaching, and that we are willing to hire people with the skills and sensitivity to work with students.

There are many other programs for which I am recommending increased funding, but I will mention just a few of them here. We will strengthen the four-year-old development program; increase funding for Read Aloud; enable Adult Basic Education to help more illiterate citizens; increase funding for the career placement counselor program in the state's high schools; continue the phased retrofitting of stop arms on school buses; and increase Division II funding for new text books and instructional materials. I am also recommending funding for the extended day care program so that schools can be used to provide care for children.

Finally, I propose that we set aside \$2.4 million in the capital budget as the state's 60 percent share for construction and renovation projects approved by school district referenda in the coming year. This is part of a total \$11.2 million appropriation which includes \$4.8 million for minor capital improvements and maintenance projects -- an increase over last year -- and continued funding for a number of

important projects.

Now I will discuss the \$34.3 million in revenues I mentioned earlier.

There is a long-standing tradition in Delaware of using funding approaches that maximize our resources through innovative management techniques that protect the long-term financial stability of our state. The Transportation Trust Fund is one of those programs. We launched the Fund last year with a small infusion of revenues, with

the intention of increasing revenues gradually over several years.

Today I am recommending that we accelerate that plan by transferring the final six cents of motor fuel tax and half of the motor vehicle document fee, a total of \$34.3 million. My proposal for these revenues is to shift to the Fund the responsibility for certain expenses now paid out of the general fund — transportation-related debt service, currently \$32.7 million annually, plus \$4 million in annual road maintenance and equipment costs, as well as anticipated debt service expenditures related to current transportation projects. In addition, we will move \$3 million slated for Department of Transportation maintenance and equipment out of the bond bill.

In all, I am proposing that we shift responsibility for \$42.2 million in expenditures from the general fund and the capital budget to the Transportation Trust Fund. By this action, the state's general fund programs will benefit through increased revenues through 1992 and in the future the dollars necessary to pay for essential

highway projects will be there.

Among the projects that will be supported through trust fund revenues that are included as part of the Department of Transportation's \$137.8 million capital budget:

We have transferred municipal street aid from the grants-in-aid bill and increased it to \$3 million.

We will begin the final phase of work leading to construction on the U.S. 13 relief

We will continue work on Route 4 at Ogletown, where congestion has been a nightmare for motorists.

We will continue to upgrade the Route 7 corridor between U.S. 13 and the Pennsylvania state line.

We will continue to develop plans for such traffic hotspots as the Newark and Mill Creek regions, just as we have done in Sussex County already.

That study resulted in our decision to significantly increase the capacity of Route 1 between Lewes and Rehoboth, and that project is funded.

We will upgrade Route 14 between Harrington and the Maryland line, and we will upgrade Route 113 through Milford.

Over and above this impressive list, we will improve, reconstruct and increase the

capacity of literally hundreds of roads statewide. It is always difficult, in delivering this message, to do justice to each agency of

The Department of Community Affairs does not boast a large budget or frequently occupy the public spotlight, but to the many thousands of citizens who use libraries, to the elderly who depend on its programs, to the volunteers who depend on its coordinating efforts, it is vitally important.

The National Guard derives much of its funding from the federal government, so we spend little time discussing its budget, but we go to work each day knowing that the Guard is there when we need its well-trained troops for emergencies.

The Department of Finance plays a pivotal role in the state's operations, but does so with such quiet skill and professionalism, and with so few demands for our tax dollars

that we seldom think to mention its work.

*The Department of State, with its hard-working and dedicated staff, generates fully 17 percent of state revenues each year, and yet it is seldom the focus of our attention. When an industry shuts down and Delawareans find themselves with outdated skills or no

prospect of employment, the Department of Labor quietly and professionally goes about providing training, benefits and assistance in finding new jobs.

We routinely fund the operations of the Fire School, perhaps with a passing mention, and that agency goes about its business of teaching firefighters to save lives and property as well as any fire school in the country.

And Administrative Services, which has much of the responsibility for maintaining and

operating state government facilities, is seldom mentioned in our discussions.

But each department and agency serves a vital function, and my proposed budget provides for each.

Finally, salary policy.

I am recommending that all merit and exempt-comparable state employees receive a three percent increase effective July 1, 1988, unless they are at their maximum, in which case they will receive at least 1.5 percent.

And I am recommending another 3 percent increase effective January 1, 1989, for employees at 97 percent of their midpoint or below; those over 97 percent will be brought to 100 percent.

Thus we will continue the effort to pay competitive salaries to every state employee, and keep our promise to install and maintain a fair and flexible merit pay system.

During the course of this message, I had described several cases where the state came to the aid of individuals and families who needed help. $\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \right) = \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \right) \left(\frac{1}$

There are countless others. I could have described, for instance, a young mother with three children who was able to turn to the Division of Child Protective Services for help and support during the break-up of her marriage and a serious illness of one of her children.

A child, abandoned by her parents and abused by her caretaker, who was cared for by

the same division until she was adopted — and reunited with a sister. Or a woman who, after 20 frustrating years at Stockley Center, is today working as a generic aide in state government, responsible not only for herself but for assisting others as well.

Or the many Delawareans who will benefit as we develop a comprehensive and well-considered plan to provide medical insurance coverage for the needy, an effort already underway.

The examples I have used range from an unborn infant whose mother received prenatal care, to a teenage girl abandoned and hurt by those responsible for her well-being, to a mother in her thirties who was fighting to free herself from the endless cycle of poverty and dependence.

Each has benefited from decisions made in this building, and especially from the leadership provided by Senator Cook and Representative Corrozi.

When President Reagan delivered his State of the Union Address Monday night, he brought along a prop: the federal budget. That enormous and confusing document, spilling over the podium next to the President, was meant to serve as an example of the failure of Congress to meet its responsibilities.

The budget I am presenting to you today could clearly serve as an example of one state's achievement in good government, because it brings us closer to the day when we are really successful at preventing problems; it moves us closer to the day when we can truly say, "Every Delawarean enjoys a life of opportunity; it moves us closer to a future of hope and progress for each of our citizens.

I thank you very much.

Lt. Governor Woo thanked the Governor for his remarks and asked the escort committee to escort the Governor back to his Executive Office.

Senator Sharp moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compare their respective Journals to see if they agree.

I would like to start by relating to you a personal family experience with an uninsured motorist. Five years ago, the vehicle being driven by my wife's sister was struck broadside by a vehicle being driven by an uninsured motorist. My sister-in-law was seriously injured in this incident which resulted in the other driver being charged with an convicted of vehicular assault. My wife's sister was in a coma for more than 2 weeks and to this day still suffers from residual effects of the crash. However, when will never be fully compensated for her injuries since the other driver had no insurance. Her own insurance policy paid the limits of \$10,000 in PIP coverage. This amount barely covered hospital and medical expenses. It did not cover pain and suffering, lost wages. after-care or partial permanent injuries. To show the lack of responsibility on the part of the driver whose vehicle collided with hers, it further should be pointed out that subsequent to this incident, the defendant was charged with and convicted of 2 counts of robbery.

I support the so-called "Sticker Bill" and Commissioner Levinson's efforts in this

area because I perceive that the incident touching my family which I have related to you is more than likely not an isolated one. Statistics support my perception.

I have gathered for you the stats on the number of persons charged with driving without insurance whose cases have been filed in Delaware's Justice of the Peace Courts during the first three (3) months of 1988. There were 1,965 such cases. Bases upon this figure, we can expect a total of 7,860 no insurance cases being filed in magistrate courts during 1988. And those are only the ones who were arrested for the offense. How many others are there in Delaware who irresponsibly drive without insurance, knowing that it is against the law to do so but further knowing that the changes of getting caught are slim? How many feel that the benefits of monetary savings from not paying insurance premiums outweigh the risks of apprehension, arrest, and conviction for violating this serious motor vehicle offense? I don't know the answer to these questions other than that the numbers must be substantial. Especially when you consider that national statistics show that for any DUI arrest, the offender has driven under the influence on 200 other occasions without being arrested.

I recognize that should the Sticker Bill become law, the responsibilities of Delaware's magistrates will increase. Higher fines translate into a greater degree of difficulty in the collection process. Should the Bill in its final version include a provision excepting violations from the voluntary assessment statute, our caseload shall surely increase. Yet, as has been the case on so many other occasions in the past, I am confident that Delaware's Justices of the Peace will fulfill their constitutional

obligation to see that the laws of the State are faithfully executed.

As a member of the judiciary and with fidelity to the separation of powers doctrine, I leave it to others to explain the details of the proposed legislation and the rationale therefore. I do, however, state for the record my personal support this or similar legislation since experience tells me that far too many motorists are today driving without insurance; thus, this situation commends itself to legislative action.

Dear Ms. Moyer:

This letter will respond to your request regarding information on uninsured motorists in the state of Maryland. Although the Insurance Division does not have statistics on the estimated number of uninsured motorists in the state, we do consider the existence of uninsured motorists to be a serious problem.

One of the specific concerns of the 1988 Maryland legislature has been the rising cost of insurance in the Maryland Automobile Insurance Find (MAIF), the statutorily created residual market for drivers who cannot obtain insurance in the admitted market. There is a fear that if costs cannot be curtailed, many motorists will simply forego the purchase of mandated insurance.

Senate Bill 637, which has passed the Maryland Senate and is pending in the House of Delegates, helps to address the problem by making personal injury protection benefits optional for MAIF insureds. They presently pay as much as \$500 for the minimum \$2,500. benefit. If the bill passes, it will, at least for the present time, help reduce MAIF premiums, and hopefully, the number of uninsured motorists.

As further evidence of the problem, documents submitted to the Insurance Division by MAIF indicate that the number of uninsured motorist claims made by its own members is increasing in both frequency and severity. MAIF reported that for the prior year ending June 30, 1987, its uninsured motorist claims frequency was 1,902 and its various and

June 30, 1987, its uninsured motorist claims frequency was 1,892 and its average paid claim was \$1,845. For the prior year ending March 31, 1987, the uninsured claim frequency was reported to be 2.350 and the average paid claim was \$2,606. Because of the rise in both frequency and severity of uninsured motorist claims, MAIF received approval for an approximate 92% increase in its uninsured motorist premiums, effective September 1, 1987.

Finally, MAIF has informed the Insurance Division that in calendar year 1987, it has 148,968 policies in force in Maryland. Of this number, 11,204 of the policies were cancelled at the insured's request. It is expected that the majority of these cancelled at the insured's request. It is expected that the majority of these policyholders secured other insurance through the admitted market. However, during the same period, 40,841 policies were cancelled by premium finance companies for failure to same period, 40,041 policies were canceried by premium finance companies for factors and make payment. It is feared that the majority of these persons did not secure insurance elsewhere and may, in fact, be driving without statutorily mandated insurance.

INTRODUCTION

The Delaware Farm Assistance Task Force was established under the provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 21 in February of 1988 for the purpose of reviewing and recommending "proposals to provide assistance to Delaware farmers impacted by several years of drought." The sponsors of the resolution, who included Representatives Caulk, Carey, Mack and West and Senators Minner, Adams, Cordrey, Vaughn, Connor and Slatcher, were moved by the seriousness of the several crises confronting Delaware agri-business.

The first and most obvious of these is of course the aforementioned, "several years of drought". Many Delaware farm families have been forced to leave agriculture after what in several cases had been generations of involvement. Many others have been left laboring under extremely heavy burdens of debt.

Other problems of an extremely serious nature could pose even greater dangers to the future of agriculture in Delaware in the long term. Among these are the impact on agriculture and agri-business by the increasingly rapid and wide-spread residential and commercial development - particularly in southern New Castle, in the area of Dover and in coastal Sussex. Another is the growing burden of government regulation which carries with it a perception on the part of many Delaware farmers that some federal and state officials are more interested in limiting and halting their activities than in working with them to achieve desired ends. Still another serious problem is the erosion of America's position in the world commodities markets.

When considered as a whole, it becomes all too clear that these and other problems plaguing Delaware's farmers threaten the very existence of that activity which has been the mainstay of Delaware's economy for three centuries. Even as agri-business remains the number one segment of the Delaware economy, it struggles for its very existence.

the number one segment of the Delaware economy, it struggles for its very existence. At a time when the state of Delaware has provided direct financial assistance to our auto and steel industries amounting to millions of dollars and when we've provided major incentives for the development of banking and commerce and new industry, the state has done relatively little for farmers beyond the routine services provided by the Department of Agriculture and other state agencies. At present Delaware's 2,800 farm families own more than 80 percent of all the land in the state. In addition substantial segments of the work force, particularly in Kent and Sussex Counties are employed by agri-business. In view of these facts, one can only conclude that if Delaware is to preserve this valuable segment of its economy and this major contributor to our much-vaunted "Quality of Life," the time is at hand to undertake some extraordinary measures to assist our agri-business community.

In view of the fact that the Delaware Farm Assistance Task Force was charged to carry out its function in only 30 days, it was impossible for task force members to make more than a brief study of these problems. Task force members saw their function as being only the beginning of a larger and more extensive effort to study the problem and to find ways of providing both rapid, short-term assistance and recommendations and mechanisms for longer range answers.

The Delaware Farm Assistance Task Force held a total of four meetings between February 2 and March 10, 1988. The report which follows will present both the recommendations and a summary of the work of the task force. RECOMMENDATIONS

The Farm Assistance Task Force saw as one of its primary goals the framing of a set of recommendations to the Joint Finance Committee, the General Assembly and the Governor as to how the state might best assist Delaware agri-business in the up-coming fiscal year and beyond. Included among these recommendations are six proposals for funding specific programs and one additional recommendation which does not involve the expenditure of funds. The funding proposals total \$260,000 in Fiscal Year 1988 moneys and \$350,000 in Fiscal Year 1989 moneys. The specific recommendations and a short discussion of each follow:

 <u>CROP INSURANCE</u>: The Task Force Recommends an Expenditure of up to \$260,000 in F.Y. 1988 Funds to Provide a State Subsidy for Crop Insurance which would match the Federal Subsidy within the Limitation of a \$260,000 Cap. This is a One-Year Program Only.

After considerable discussion and study, the task force concluded that providing a state subsidy to cover a portion of the cost of crop insurance for eligible Delaware farmland would be perhaps the quickest way to aid a maximum number of Delaware farmers in the event that drought conditions persist into the 1988 growing season. The state subsidy would match the present federal subsidy with the important exception that the federal subsidy is open-ended while the state's would be limited by the \$260,000 Cap. It should be stressed that \$260,000 is more than enough to handle the anticipated number of farmers signing up for insurance, but it is theoretically possible that a larger number will sign up. In that unlikely event, the state subsidy would be correspondingly reduced.

At the present time, there are three levels of crop insurance policies available. Level One pays 50 percent of the value of the normal harvest. Level Two pays 65 percent and Level Three pays 75 percent. An example of how the program operates is:

A farmer has a field with a growing history which indicates that normal crop yield in a good year is 100 bushels per acre. He buys a crop insurance policy insuring this field for 65 percent of the harvest. The growing season is a bad one and the farmer's yield in that field is only 20 bushels per acre. The farmer's insurance pays him the difference between his 20 bushel per acre yield and the value of 65 bushels per acre.

The state's subsidy will be for 30 percent of the premium for Levels One and Two Policies (50% and 65%). The subsidy for the Level Three (75%) policy will be the same as that for the 65% policy. The state subsidy will be handled through the Federal Crop Insurance Office.

Last year the federal subsidy program cost U.S.D.A. \$65,000 for Delaware. Agriculture Secretary Chandler estimates that participation by Delaware farmers will be considerably greater during the 1988 growing season because of improvements in the program, increased publicity, pressure on farmers from lending institutions and seed and fertilizer dealers, and if it is approved, a state subsidy. If four times as many farmers participate this year, the cost of the state and the federal governments would be \$260,000 each.

There are various deadlines for sign-up for the insurance depending on the type of crop. The insurance is sold through private insurance agents. All sign-up deadlines are before the July 1 start of Fiscal 1989, making it necessary for any state subsidies to be encumbered from F V 1988 funding

necessary for any state subsidies to be encumbered from F.Y. 1988 funding.

Crop insurance is seen as a valuable risk management tool to help farmers avoid the kind of crushing losses many have suffered in recent years. At 65 percent or even 75 percent the pay out isn't enough in most cases to give farmers a profit after a poor harvest. It is generally sufficient to pay their costs for seed, fertilizer and other expenses.

 AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH PROJECT: The Task Force Recommends an Expenditure of \$50,000 in F.Y. 1989 Funding for a new Study by the University of Delaware Cooperative Extension Service into Either a New Crop or a New Way of Processing and/or Marketing Crops Already Being Grown by Delaware Farmers.

The University of Delaware has undertaken several successful crop studies in the past in an effort to help Delaware farmers find new crops both well-suited to Delaware growing conditions and able to be successfully marketed. Perhaps the best recent example of such a study is that done over the past few years on sorghum, which has proven itself to be useful as a supplement to animal feeds and which Delaware farmers are expected to begin growing in substantial quantities. Such a study could also take the direction of finding new ways of processing and/or marketing crops which Delaware farmers are already growing. An example would be the development of salad oil manufacturing facilities to turn soybeans into salad oil, which is now being done by a large Sussex County agri-business firm. Another example of using an old product in new ways is the development of fresh mushroom marketing by Chester County, Pennsylvania, mushroom growers to replace sales of canned mushrooms lost to foreign competition.

3. <u>ENVIRONMENTAL SPECIALIST FOR DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE</u>: The Task Force Recommends an Expenditure of \$37,500 in F.Y. 1989 Funds to Hire an "Environmental Specialist" Who Would Assist Farmers and Agri-Businesses in complying with State and Federal Environmental Regulations.

An increasing problem for farmers and Delaware agri-business is the growing burden of state and federal regulations, particularly involving environmental matters. It isn't simply the expense of complying with regulations which creates problems, but also the time required, which takes farmers and

agri-businessmen away from their work.

Another problem is the sense many farmers and agri-businessmen have that environmental officials are harassing them rather than working with them to solve problems. An example of this phenomenon is the case of a Sussex County tomato canner who had recently installed a new treatment system to treat his effluent. The old pipe which had been in use in prior years and which had been in violation of state environmental regulations was still in place after the new system was installed, but it wasn't hooked up and was unused. A DNREC official making an inspection of the plant wrote up the pipe as a violation even after being informed that the pipe wasn't in use and the cannery owner was required to pay a \$3,000 fine. Afterwards he was made to cap the pipe, an inexpensive job costing only a few dollars.

It is difficult to escape the feeling that the cannery owner was cited for a violation and required to pay a fine simply as harassment, since he had quite clearly made a genuine effort to comply with regulations by installing the new system <u>and was in fact in compliance at the time of the citation</u>. The proposed environmental specialist would work on the Dept. of Agriculture staff with

FARM FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SPECIALIST FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE: The Task Force Recommends an Expenditure of \$37,500 in F.Y.

1989 Funds to Fund This Position Which Would Augment the Cooperative Extension Service's Present Efforts in This Area.

This proposal is actually to fund a portion of a larger proposal which the University of Delaware had made to the Castle Administration earlier in the year, but which was dropped from the Governor's proposed budget. The original proposal would have cost some \$187,000 and would have involved the hiring of several persons, the renovation of office space and the purchase of computer equipment, etc.

While the task force felt unable to recommend funding to cover the cost of the entire program this year, there was a strong feeling expressed that having such

services available is of great and growing importance to the farm community in Delaware. The Farm Financial Management person would allow the Cooperative

Extension Service to expand its present efforts in this area.

A strong spokesman in support of this proposal who spoke to the task force on its behalf was Rep. Donald Clark, a Kent County seed dealer. Rep. Clark stressed

that many bankers and certified public accountants do not fully understand the intricacies of agricultural economics and farm financing and that many problems result from this lack which this specialist could help in solving.

5. ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE FOR CONSTRUCTION OF POULTRY MANURE POLLUTION CONTROL SHEDS: The Task Force Recommends an Expenditure of \$175,000 in F.Y. '89 funds to Augment Present State Subsidies for Construction of Poultry Manure Sheds, a Program Now Underway Through Local A.S.C.S. Committees and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

The leaching of poultry manure into the groundwater has been identified as a source of water pollution. For some years the state and federal governments have been involved in a program to encourage poultry farmers to build sheds in which to store the manure until it is spread on the fields as fertilizer. It is when the manure is stored outside in large concentrations and thus exposed to rain that the problem occurs.

The basic sheds are 40 ft. by 60 ft. and cost approximately \$13,500 to build.

A shed of this size provides storage capacity for six months worth of manure from 40,000 chickens. The present federal subsidy is \$3,500 and the present state subsidy is \$5,000, representing 63 percent of the cost of the structure. By comparison, the states of Maryland and Virginia provide subsidies which together with the federal subsidy add up to 75 to 87 percent of the cost of the building. The problem is basically one of long waiting lists in Sussex and Kent Counties where the vast majority of Delaware's poultry is grown. At the present time some people have been on the state's waiting list for three years. Of the 97 projects currently on the Sussex waiting list, for example, some 35 have already been approved for federal funding but they can't proceed because of a shortage of state funding.

The \$175,000, if approved, would go to the Division of Soil and Water Conservation's Conservation Districts as a way of helping to cut down on the backlog of manure shed projects awaiting state funding. It is understood that

this

money augments rather than replacing DNREC funding for this purpose.

 HIGH-TECH POULTRY RESEARCH PROJECT: The Task Force Recommended Funding in the Amount of \$50,000 in F.Y. 1989 Moneys for a Variety of Poultry Research Projects Recommended by the Governor's High-Tech Task Force and Coordinated Through the Delaware Development Office.

The Governor's High-Tech Task Force has studied the Delaware poultry industry and recommended in its final report that four areas of research be pursued in an effort to strengthen the industry in the state. It should be stressed that out of the \$500 million in agricultural production in Delaware last year, \$310 million

came from broilers, \$40 million came from soybeans and \$40 million came from corn. Thus, some \$390 million of the total \$500 million comes from these three

crops directly related to the poultry industry.

The four recommended areas of research which this \$50,000 expenditure would go towards funding are: (1) Disease Control; (2) Nutrition; (3) Processing; and (4) Waste Utilization and Disposal. It is expected that the Delaware Development Office would work with Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc., and poultry industry representatives in determining industry priorities for study within these four areas.

The importance of disease control has been seen in recent years when the Delmarva poultry industry has been threatened by Avian Influenza. It is interesting to note that in the area of waste utilization and disposal, a possible area of study is ways to recover protein value from dead chickens and recycle the protein into poultry feed. At present dead poultry constitute an environmental problem from time to time and this would be a way of turning a problem into an asset.

7. CREATION OF A "BLUE RIBBON" PANEL TO STUDY THE FUTURE OF AGRICULTURE IN THE STATE OF DELAWARE: The Task Force strongly endorsed Governor Castle's Call in His Recent Budget Message for Creation of a "Blue Ribbon Panel of Farmers, Development Experts, Representatives from the Department of Agriculture, Legislators and Educators to Assess the Future of Agriculture in Delaware."

The problems confronting farmers and agri-businessmen have become serious enough so that the future of agriculture in the state is threatened. The task force feels that the same sort of effort which was recently undertaken by the Environmental Legacy Task Force is much needed for agriculture. Many problems which the task force has discussed in its brief existence are in need of in-depth study. Among these are the regulatory burden on farmers and food processors, the pressures on Delaware's farmland from real estate development and proposed highway construction, need to develop new markets, problems with foreign trade and labor shortages to name a few.

OTHER WORK OF THE TASK FORCE

The Farm Assistance Task Force considered many problem areas for agriculture which did not find their way into the final recommendations either because of funding limitations or because it was felt that they were beyond the scope of the task force's mission. This is not to say, however, that these problems are not worthy of further consideration.

The task force recommends, as noted in item 7 above, that a major study of the future of agriculture in Delaware be undertaken by a panel of experts from many sectors of agriculture, agri-business and government and that this panel establish sub-committees to carry out detailed studies of various areas of concern.

The task force discussed some of these areas which are outlined below. In addition to those mentioned, there are others and the panel should not confine its activities to those noted here.

AREAS OF CONCERN:

FOOD PROCESSING: Food processors in Delaware are facing serious problems not only from the growing burden of environmental regulations and sometimes over-zealous government regulators as noted above, but also because of labor shortages and commetition both from other regions in the U.S. and from overseas.

competition both from other regions in the U.S. and from overseas.

LABOR SHORTAGES: The area of labor shortages in particular is a pressing problem to agri-business at the present time. One cause of this problem is the very success of Delaware's economic development efforts in recent years. As new jobs open up in manufacturing, recreation and tourism, banking and commerce and construction, it becomes more and more difficult to find persons to fill job openings in agriculture generally and food processing particularly. This problem is in need of a detailed study.

HOUSING SHORTAGES: A lack of available low and moderate income housing in Kent and

HOUSING SHORTAGES: A lack of available low and moderate income housing in Kent and Sussex Counties is an important contributing factor to the shortage of labor in agri-business. While the state government is deeply involved in working to alleviate the housing shortage in Delaware, there has been little, if any, work to coordinate low-income housing construction with agri-business labor needs in southern Delaware.

MIGRANT LABOR: One special aspect of the farm labor problem is the increasing difficulty of obtaining and employing migrant laborers. Migrant labor has been an important, even essential, aspect of Delaware's farm economy for generations in the harvesting of fruits and vegetables. These crops, although not of the level of importance of poultry, corn and soybeans, are nonetheless of importance to the state and the ability of our farmers to continue growing them in the future is in doubt because of the migrant labor problem.

The Vegetable Growers' Association of Delaware, Inc., recently put forth the proposition that the state of Delaware might build and operate its own labor camp in Sussex County to replace those once owned by individual farmers. While this idea has many problems and possible pitfalls, the fact that the Association suggested it is reflective of the need for new ideas and new departures in this area.

REVOLVING FUND FOR IRRIGATION SYSTEMS: One of the most important risk management tools available to farmers today is irrigation. However, at an estimated cost of \$75,000 per system, irrigation is a solution not easily available to most farmers. There was some discussion of creating a revolving fund to make loans at low or no interest to farmers to allow them to install such systems. While this program would be expensive to initiate, it is worthy of some consideration as a long-range possibility.

FARMLAND PRESERVATION: Delaware presently has laws which seek to promote preservation of farmland, but these haven't proven particularly effective at a time when the so-called "highest and best use" of much of our farmland is deemed to be residential and commercial development. Farmers in most cases can sell their land, put the money in the bank at interest and make more money with far less difficulty than they can through farming. We have reached a state in which those who continue to farm do so in most cases because they enjoy it and have always done it, not because it is financially rewarding for them to do so. Yet the preservation of farmland is an essential factor in maintaining the quality of life so many of us enjoy. It is quite true that as one travels through the rural Delaware landscape, enjoying the open expanses of farmland and forest and the wildlife which flourishes therein, that one is enjoying a valuable natural resource compliments of Delaware's farmers. Except for state, federal and private nature preserves and forests, open land in Delaware is owned by farmers. Ways need to be found to enable this to continue.

A STUDY OF CURRENT RULES AND REGULATIONS IMPACTING AGRICULTURE: A strong need for this type of study was expressed. It could be undertaken by a sub-committee of the larger agriculture panel. The point is that in many cases, compliance with these regulations would be greatly enhanced by better communications between the "regulators and the regulatees." Very few, if any, farmers are intentionally violating or seeking to side-step government regulations, but at the same time these regulations have blossomed forth in such abundant profusion as to boggle the minds not only of the farmers and agri-businessmen but of the government officials charged with enforcing them. Thus, we encounter the increasingly common occurrence in which one can call five officials in search of an authoritative interpretation of a regulation and receive five different answers.

The task force recommendation calling for a Department of Agriculture Environmental Specialist will go some of the way toward dealing with this problem, but there is still much to be done. As Secretary Chandler said at the first task force meeting, "We've got to have a spirit of cooperation and give and take here. If you take one-third of the money it costs to regulate agriculture, and give it to us for education and cost-sharing

money it costs to regulate agriculture, and give it to us for education and cost-sharing programs, I guarantee you'll get a lot more done than if you regulate farmers to death."

A FINAL OBSERVATION ON LONG-RANGE FUNDING FOR STATE ASSISTANCE TO AGRICULTURE AND AGRI-BUSINESS: State Budget Director Scott Douglass summed up many of the opinions expressed during task force meetings when he noted that he prefers to see farm assistance programs which provide incentives for new areas of research and investment and new departures in agri-business rather than "transfer payments to keep one person on the farm."

Our farmers are proud and independent people as our forefathers have been for generations. If agriculture in Delaware ever descends to a state in which it can only stay alive through the use of government subsidies, then it is already dead. Delaware agriculture is struggling, but there is still an excellent chance that with a common sense approach and with public education to inform Delawareans just how essential farming is to the quality of our everyday lives, it can retain the central position it

has enjoyed in Delaware life for three centuries. As Council of Farm Organizations President Dan Hudson observed: "We sit right on the fringe of the best market in the world. If we can't make it here, no one can.'
