Tigani gets 2 years in federal prison on campaign finance violations

Former beer distributor Chris Tigani was sentenced to two years in federal prison for campaign finance violations, Assistant U.S. District Attorney Robert Kravetz reported on Tuesday.

Tigani - who at one time headed N-K-S, the Anheuser-Bush beer distributor in Delaware - was convicted in U.S. District Court in Wilmington, Del. of making illegal contributions, via the company and "straw employees," to campaigns, Kravetz said.

"Straw employees" referred to contributions made in the name of company employees. Tigani also faced tax-related charges.

Tigani had sought home confinement, but prosecutors wanted prison time.

While the combined convictions add up to as much as 16 years, federal sentencing guidelines call for shorter prison terms, Kravetz said.

The conviction was another chapter in the rise and fall of Tigani.

N-K-S, under Tigani, appeared to wield considerable power in Delaware, with the company at one point negotiating a deal on land from the Delaware Department of Transportation at a price that was well below the property's market value.

That land deal, along with other problems at DelDOT over real estate practices, led to the res-

ignation of former Secretary of Transportation Carolann Wicks and a continuing probe into its operations.

Tigani also had ties to former Gov. Ruth Ann Minner.

Then came a series of reverses, after he was ousted as head of the family owned distribution company based in New Castle and lost a palatial home that was once the residence of former MBNA CEO Charles Cawley.

Tigani was unsuccessful in his efforts to regain control of his home and the distributorship, at one point representing himself in complex legal matters.

Kravetz said the case marked the end of the federal case against Tigani.

Residents see power bills go down

Newark residents and businesses are seeing a drop in their power bills due to the city's annual revenue stabilization adjustment (RSA).

"The overall reduction is 9.5 percent (in the aggregate), with the benefit of the reduction being appreciated by our commercial customers to a greater extent because of their volume of usage," said Robert J. Uyttebroek, the city's director of finance.

The average residential customer saw a \$10 drop in his or her electric bill starting Jan. 1.

Three factors contributed to the decrease. First, the city over collected on power bills



last year by \$2.4 million based on its new rate structure enacted in May.

The cost of power also fell due to unexpected reductions in the price of natural gas.

"There's been a substantial drop in natural gas since the last time we priced it, and we are becoming the beneficiary of that," said Mayor Vance Funk III.

Thirdly, the city adjusted its profit margin on selling power from up to 25 percent to a flat 20 percent.

Selling power is the city's largest revenue generator. In 2011, sales revenue totaled \$57.7 million, with \$40.5 million of that being paid to the city's supplier, Delaware Municipal Electric Corporation (DEMEC), who oversees power distribution for nine municipalities in the state. A little over \$2.4 million is being returned to consumers through the RSA with the remainder funding the city's government.

This is the first year of the city's controversial RSA plan, which allows the city to pass along higher power rates during the summer when demand is greater.

According to Funk, this summer's rates may be lower because DEMEC has added a second natural gas turbine to generate power. This will reduce the need for DEMEC to purchase electricity on the open market at higher rates.

"At a time when utility rates have continued to go up, I am very happy to get to a period when they are finally going down," Funk said.

DEMEC customer can expect adjustments in their electric bills each January as the city resets rates based on the previous year's data.

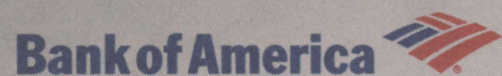

Bear man accused of molesting elderly Md. woman in intensive care

Easton police arrested a Bear, Del. man last Thursday, March 1, after he allegedly sexually assaulted a sedated woman while she was in the intensive care unit at the Memorial Hospital at Easton.

Benjamin David Crew, 58, of North Hyde Place, was charged with three counts of second-degree sex offense, three counts of third-degree sex offense; three counts of second-degree assault and one count of vulnerable adult abuse-physical injury.

Crew was released on \$75,000 bond. According to online court records, Crew has no criminal history in Maryland.

According to Easton police, officers responded to Memorial Hospital for a reported sexual assault. Police said Crew visited a patient, who was heavily sedated, and witnesses saw Crew touching the patient's vaginal area.

Police said the woman was unaware of the incident because she was heavily sedated.

Shore Health System Corporate Communications issued an initial emailed statement Saturday morning to The Star Democrat:

"As soon as our nursing staff saw what appeared to be inappropriate behavior, we followed our protocol for reporting this type of incident. The quick

response of our staff brought the matter to the police, who initiated an investigation," said Linda Mastro, director of corporate communications for SHS. "This is an unusual and isolated incident and all precautions were and continue to be taken to maintain the safety and confidentiality of our patient."

In a follow-up email, Mastro said there was no breach in hospital security. Crew had full rights to visit the woman, she said, and every security measure was followed.

"We have reviewed our policies and practices and found that all appropriate measures were taken. The public should feel secure that they are not in danger."

The 116-bed hospital, which has an additional a 20-bed Requad Center for Acute Rehabilitation, states on its website a list of visitor guidelines designed "to aid the recovery of our patients by providing a secure, supportive and healthful environment." According to the guidelines, all visitors are required to sign in and must display a visitor pass obtained from the Information Desk at the hospital lobby. As for the intensive care unit, the guidelines state that "family members, care givers and/or surrogate decision makers may visit as the patient(s) needs may be limited (and) based on the needs of the patient."

Additionally, the online Patient Guide lists a SHS patient's rights and responsibilities, which includes "a secure

environment and protective services" and 24-hour security every day.

Man injured after apparently climbing on freight train and touching high-voltage lines

A man was injured Saturday morning, March 3, after climbing on a freight train and touching high-voltage lines.

Newark Police were called to Christiana Hospital after being alerted that a 24-year-old man had touched the lines while climbing on a freight train at around 4:30 a.m.

Officers learned that the man, who lives in the 200 block of East Park Place in Newark, had gone to the railroad tracks just south of Kells Park.

The victim, who was alone at the time of the incident, climbed on a Norfolk Southern train and once on top came in contact with an overhead high voltage line. The victim apparently lost consciousness and later awoke on the tracks.

He managed to walk back to his residence and alerted his roommates who transported him by private vehicle to Christiana Hospital.

The victim was initially treated at Christiana Hospital for burns to approximately 35 percent of his body including left hand, neck, face, right arm and shoulder, back and right leg. He was then transported to Crozer Chester Medical Center where he is currently being treated

for his injuries, which are not believed to be life threatening.

The victim's identity is being withheld as no charges have been filed at this time. The investigation is continuing. Anyone with additional information about this incident should contact Cpl. Adam Stevens at 302-366-7110 ext. 434 or adam.stevens@cj.state.de.us.

Safe Streets Task Force traffic stop leads to heroin seizure

New Castle Safe Streets Task Force has arrested three subjects after the driver was stopped for an equipment violation, in the neighborhood adjacent to the Governor's Square Shopping Center in Bear, and police found heroin hidden throughout the vehicle.

On Friday, March 2, at 1:45 p.m., members of the Safe Streets Task Force were patrolling in the area of Songsmith Drive when they performed a vehicle stop near the intersection of Carvel Lane, on a green Chevy Malibu for an equipment violation. As they approached the vehicle, all three occupants of the car were observed acting suspicious as they were moving around in their seats.

At that time, detectives could smell an odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle and then observed marijuana residue in the area of the center console. All three occupants were then removed from the vehicle and detectives found the front seat passenger, Raheem Sanders, to

be in possession of four bundles and five loose bags of heroin, which he attempted to hide in his pants.

Corporal Steven Donahue and his canine partner "Monty" had responded to the scene to assist, and the canine was able to locate an additional five bundles under the driver's seat, which had been occupied by Karimah Moore, and another bundle inside a cup holder that slides out from the dashboard. Detectives seized a total of 527 bags of heroin (13.175 grams). Sanders, Moore and a 16 year-old male, who had been sitting in the rear driver's seat, were all taken into custody without incident.

All three occupants were charged with Drug Dealing in Heroin (Possession with Intent to Deliver) and Conspiracy in the Second Degree. They were also ordered not to have contact with one another.

Safe Streets Task Force traffic stop leads to drugs and weapon seizure

New Castle Safe Streets Task Force has arrested Jermaine King, a 31 year-old male who resides in the unit block of Verdi Circle in Newark. He

has been charged with drug and weapon offenses after police conducted a vehicle stop and found him in possession of marijuana, counterfeit crack cocaine and a sawed-off shotgun.

On Thursday afternoon, March 1, at 4:32 p.m., members of the Safe Streets Task Force were patrolling in the area of the Derr's Market when they observed a red Toyota Corolla, fail to use a turn signal as the vehicle traveled on Farland Way and made a left turn onto Songsmith Drive. Moments later, the detectives stopped the vehicle near the intersection of Taylor Road and Smalley's Dam Road.

As they approached the vehicle, detectives made contact with the driver, later identified as Jermaine King, and a passenger, later identified as the driver's 14 year-old step son. At that time, they could smell a strong odor of marijuana emanating from the car.

King was then removed from the vehicle and found to be in possession of three bags of marijuana (11.7 grams), five bags of counterfeit crack cocaine (1.9 grams), a bag of small zip lock bags and \$784 in cash.

Corporal Joseph Rago and his canine partner "Dayan" responded to assist the detectives and conducted a money sniff which yielded a positive indication for the presence of a controlled dangerous substance. The detectives then seized the \$784 of suspected drug money.

During a search of the car, police located a 20 gauge sawed-off shotgun, a large bag that contained six individual bags of marijuana (166.4 grams), a digital scale and packaging materials, in the trunk of the vehicle. Police then discovered that the serial number to the shotgun was scratched off.

A computer inquiry revealed that King had two outstanding capias issued by the New Castle County Court of Common Pleas and he was driving with a suspended license.

Jermaine King was charged with the following crimes: Driving without a Valid License, Failure to Signal, Drug Dealing in Marijuana, Unlawful Dealing in a Counterfeit Substance (Crack Cocaine), Possession of a Deadly Weapon by a Person Prohibited, Possession of a Firearm with an Obliterated Serial Number, Possession of a Deadly Weapon during the Commission of a Felony, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Endangering the Welfare of a Child. King was arraigned and committed to the Howard

Young Correctional Institute after failing to post \$52,000 secured bail.

Two arrested after robbery at Christiana Mall

The Delaware State Police have arrested two subjects following a strong-arm robbery that occurred at the Christina Mall last Thursday night.

The incident began at approximately 9:35 p.m. on March 1 as a 19 year-old New Castle woman was walking to her car, which was in the parking lot of the Christiana Mall in the area of the Barnes and Noble Bookstore. As the victim arrived at her vehicle, she noticed that there was a female subject inside of it. The victim then began yelling at the female who then exited the car holding a bag, which had been inside of the victim's car. The victim then grabbed the bag from the female subject but was then approached from behind by a male subject who knocked her to the ground and began to assault her. He then removed another bag from the victim's hands and entered the driver's seat of a dark colored Saturn SUV along with the female suspect. The SUV then backed out of a parking space, running over the victim's leg. It then fled from the lot. The victim was removed from the scene and transported to the Christiana Hospital where she was treated for non-life threatening injuries.

Investigating Troopers provided assisting units with a description of the suspects and the suspect vehicle. The

vehicle was then observed by a Trooper traveling on west-bound DE Rt. 4 in Stanton and was eventually stopped on Windsor Avenue and Adelphi Avenue in the development of Silview. The suspects, later identified as Bradley Hampton, 25, of Newark, and Kimberly Dorman, 24, of Dover, were then taken into custody. A subsequent search of the Saturn SUV was executed and revealed evidence linking the two suspects to the robbery.

Hampton and Dorman were arrested and charged with Robbery 1st Degree, Possession of a Deadly Weapon during the Commission of a Felony, Conspiracy 2nd Degree, and Criminal Mischief. They were both arraigned at JP Court 11 and committed to the Department of Corrections for lack of bail in the amounts of \$52,000 (Hampton) and \$52,250 (Dorman).

Troopers investigate Wawa robbery

The Delaware State Police are currently investigating the late night robbery of the Wawa Store located on E. Chestnut Hill Road in Newark.

The incident happened on Wednesday, February 29, at approximately 11:58 p.m., as a male suspect entered the Wawa Convenience Store located in the 200 block of East Chestnut Hill Road in Newark. The suspect approached the sales counter and asked to purchase a pack of cigarettes. As the 22 year-old male employee was conducting the transaction, the suspect displayed a handgun and demanded money from the register. The victim complied and turned over an undisclosed amount of cash to the suspect who then fled from the store. He was last

seen running toward DE Rt. 72. The clerk was not injured.

The suspect is described as a white male, 30-31 years of age, 6'00-6'02" tall, 180-250 lbs. He was last seen wearing a light colored jacket, blue jeans, and a black mask partially covering his face. He was also armed with a handgun.

Male victim assaulted in armed robbery at Abbey Walk Apartments

New Castle County Police are investigating an armed robbery and assault that occurred Tuesday night as the victim was walking to his apartment, while in the Abbey Walk apartment complex.

On February 28 at 11:13 p.m., officers responded to the unit block of Abbey Lane for a robbery that just occurred. When officers arrived, the 28 year-old victim indicated that three subjects, one of whom was armed with a handgun, approached him from behind and began assaulting the victim before taking his property.

The investigation revealed that the victim exited his vehicle and began walking to his apartment when he was accosted by three male subjects. One sub-

ject displayed a handgun as his accomplices began assaulting him. The victim was knocked to the ground and the suspects rifled through his pockets removing his property.

The suspects eventually fled from the area and the victim called 9-1-1. The victim sustained minor injuries and refused medical treatment. A canine team responded to assist and performed a track, but they were unsuccessful in locating the suspects. The suspects were described as three black males in their early twenties who were wearing dark sweatshirts and blue jeans.

Armed robbery suspects apprehended in Middletown

On Saturday February 25, at approximately 7:15 p.m., Middletown Police were dispatched to the 200 block of West Main Street for a report of an armed robbery that just occurred. Upon arrival officers made contact with the victim, who stated that he was robbed at gunpoint by two unknown black males and a white female.

The Middletown Police conducted a K-9 track from the area of the robbery, which lead officers to the intersection of North Cass Street and West Lake Street. Officers observed a white female and a black male walking in this area who matched the physical description of the suspects. The sub-

jects were stopped and the female, Heather Mcquiston, 21, of Newark, was identified as one of the assailants. Mcquiston was taken into custody and transported back to Middletown Police Department.

Further investigation identified a 17 year-old Smyrna resident, and Tyler Golon, 18, of Dover, as the other two assailants who were still at large.

The investigation revealed that the 29 year-old male victim had spoken to Mcquiston earlier in the evening and he later invited her to his residence. As they were entering his residence, Golon and the juvenile male forced their way in, displayed at least one handgun and demanded the victim's money. After a struggle, Mcquiston, Golon and the juvenile fled empty handed. The victim suffered moderate swelling to the back of his head as a result of the altercation.

During the struggle a 20 year-old male neighbor exited his residence to help his neighbor and he was threatened by the males.

Mcquiston was arrested and arraigned later that evening on Attempted Robbery 1st Degree and Conspiracy 2nd Degree. She received \$31,000 secured bail and was committed to the Woman's Correctional Institute.

The Juvenile was arrested on February 26 and was arraigned on the Attempted Robbery 1st Degree, Possession of a firearm during a commission of a felony, aggravated menacing, conspiracy 2nd degree and assault 3rd degree charges. He was released on \$65,500 unsecured bail.

On February 29, Tyler Golon was arrested and arraigned on his Attempted Robbery 1st Degree, Possession of a firearm during a commission of a felony, aggravated menacing, conspiracy 2nd degree and assault 3rd degree charges. He was released after posting \$25,000 secured bail.

Newark swimmer wins first place at state meet

Sarah Braatz had been waiting with baited breath all season long for the chance to qualify and swim at the state meet. As it turned out, qualifying for the event was the easy part for the talented Newark High sophomore. The real challenge came when it was time to decide what events to enter.

Sarah qualified for eight events, but because swimmers are limited to just two individual events, she had a decision to make.

The first event was an easy choice – her favorite, the 100 freestyle.

And then after debating which one would be the second, she decided on the 200 individual medley.

But then, she had second thoughts.

“My club coach suggested I swim the 200 free and Coach Stambaugh (Newark coach Bryan Stambaugh) agreed,” Sarah explained.

It turned out to be the right choice.

Sarah placed first in the 200 freestyle at the Delaware Interscholastic Athletic Association State Swim Meet on February 25. She was the lone champion on a Newark team that finished sixth overall.

“Not at all,” Sarah said when asked if she expected to win. “I was shocked, surprised and happy all at the same time.”

While most parents have to watch their

child swim from the bleachers at Carpenter Sports Building, Sarah’s mother, Brigitta, had a front row – or in this case deck – seat. Brigitta is a DIAA swim official and was timing the race. However, as close to the action as she was, she still missed her daughter touching the wall.

“My heart was pounding for Sarah, but my eyes were fixated on lane six,” Brigitta explained of her role as an official. “So I couldn’t watch her race. But the official in her lane was whispering in my ear, sort of like a play-by-play. I was so nervous for her, and then, very excited for her.”

As much as mother and daughter wanted to celebrate on deck, they maintained their poise so as not to break the protocol of officials not communicating with swimmers.

“My mom looked over and smiled,” Sarah, who also placed third in the 100 freestyle, recalled. “And then during a break she snuck out into the hallway and gave me a big hug.”

Like most swim champions, Sarah worked hard to get to this point. She started swimming lessons at the age of 7 and it was then that her instructor suggested she swim competitively. Brigitta wasn’t keen on the idea at first, but quickly warmed up to the sport.

“I was like, ‘Oh, you want to swim?’” Brigitta reenacted the conversation with a less than enthusiastic tone. “The reason I started them [Sarah’s sister, Hannah, is also on Newark’s swim team] in swimming was because I wanted them to be safe in the

water. But now I tell them that it’s something they can do forever.”

Sarah estimates she swims 10-15 hours a week, with the majority of those hours spent as a member of the Delaware Swim Team. She then attends one or two practices a week with the Yellowjackets. It’s a training schedule that would be considered unorthodox for most high school athletes, but apparently not swimmers.

“Just about all high school swimmers who make podium [a top three placement] swim with clubs,” Sarah explained.

Although the high school season is now officially over, Sarah wasted no time returning to her club team after winning the state championship.

“I took Sunday off and went to practice on Monday,” she said. “I love the way swimming makes me feel, even after a hard practice. Swimming helps me relax. It’s a great way to get frustrations out. It really helps with everything.”

Sarah did admit there was one thing she didn’t like about the sport.

“You have to be very dedicated,” she said. “There are lots of things you can’t do.”

Despite that fact, Sarah has found time to be very involved at Newark. Her list of activities include sophomore class council, student government, and serving as an officer in the positive behavior system club. She does all this while maintaining a 4.3 grade point average.

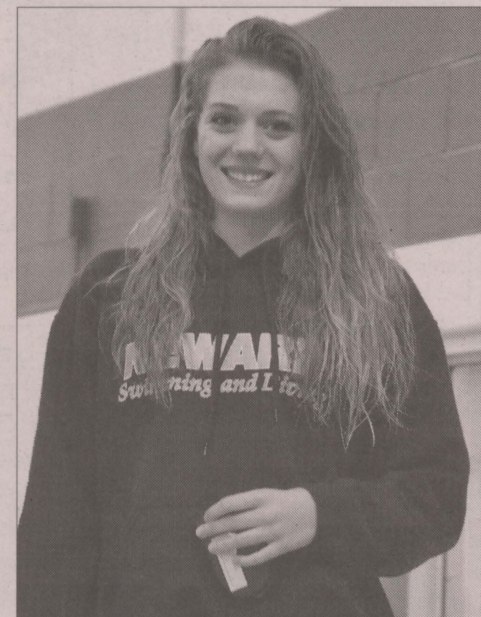

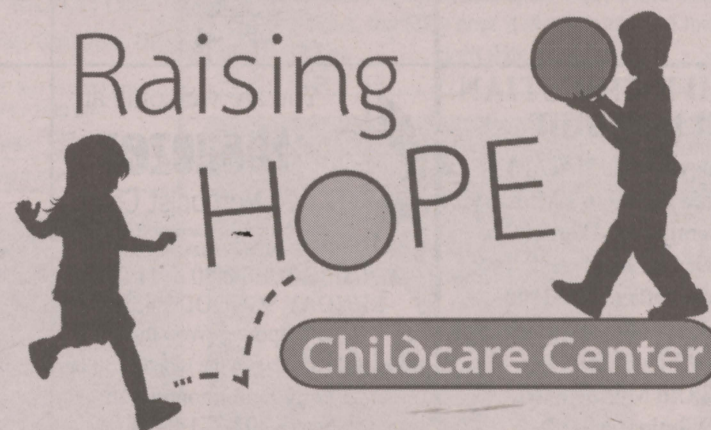

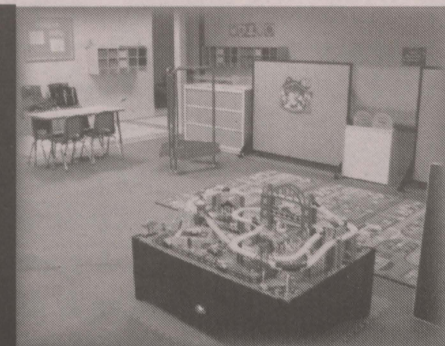

Christiana Mall Bridge demolition to require weekend/nighttime closure of Route 1

As part of the on-going Route 1/I-95 Interchange project, the Department of Transportation (DelDOT) announces that the contractor, Cherry Hill Construction Company, has scheduled to demolish the old bridge and install concrete pipes for drainage during the weekends of March 9 and March 16. Beginning on Thursday, March 8, incoming and outgoing traffic will utilize the new Christiana Mall Road bridge.

This construction will impact the following locations:

Route 1 southbound will be CLOSED from I-95 to Route 273 beginning at 10 p.m. on Friday, March 9 until 7 a.m. on Saturday, March 10; and at 10 p.m. on Saturday, March 10 until 10 a.m. on Sunday, March 11.

Detour for Route 1 Southbound Traffic:

Route 1 southbound will be detoured to I-95 southbound to Route 273 eastbound to Route 1 southbound.

Route 1 northbound will

be CLOSED from Route 273 to I-95 at 10 p.m. on Sunday, March 11 will be re-opened to traffic at 5 AM on Monday, March 12 following the weekend closures.

The following weekend, Route 1 northbound will also be CLOSED from Route 273 to I-95 at 10 p.m. on Friday, March 16 until 6 a.m. on Saturday, March 17; and 10 p.m. on Saturday, March 17 until 8 a.m. on Sunday, March 18.

Detour for Route 1 Northbound Traffic:

Route 1 Northbound traffic will be detoured to Route 273 westbound to I-95 northbound onto Route 1 northbound.

Daytime lane closures will occur throughout these weekends on both northbound and southbound lanes on Route 1 from I-95 to Route 273.

This work is being performed during the weekends and at night to decrease impact on commuter traffic during the week.

Variable message signs will be posted to alert

motorists of the upcoming closure and detour routes.

All oversize loads are required to have permits that inform the driver of clearance restrictions and provide mandatory alternate routes when height clearance is an issue.

Out of the Attic

This week's Out of the Attic item is a circa 1942-43 picture of World War II Federal emergency housing under construction for servicemen and war workers brought to the area and their families. George Read Village was built and managed by the Wilmington Housing Authority (the only such Federal agency at the time). Located on the east edge of Newark, the "Village" residents worked in war plants such as the munitions plants at Elkton or at other critical war-related jobs. Each building was a duplex. Each home had a living room, dining area and kitchen on the first floor. Upstairs there were three bedrooms and a bath. Coal-fired furnaces provided heat.

Many of the workers were transported to and from work by company buses.

After the war the government declared the property excess and the units were sold with the first option to buy going to the current resident followed by returning servicemen and women. Today, over 60 years later, almost all of the units are still in use. Some duplexes have been combined into single-family homes. Many have been remodeled inside and out. One was converted to be a church. Some are still occupied by the original owners or their families. The Village is located on Delaware Circle and Thompson Circle with one-block spurs Caldwell Place, Haslett Place, Bassett Place, Delaware Avenue, McKean Place and Washington Place. Entrance and exit for the



self-contained neighborhood is at Tyre Avenue and Delaware Circle or Washington Street and East Main Street. (Picture credit Delaware Public Archives).

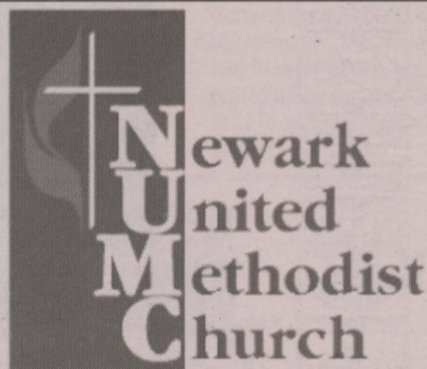

Valentino Nardo, Sr.

Mr. Valentino William Nardo, Sr., 93, of Wilmington, formerly of Newark, passed away on Monday, March 5.

A beloved local community leader and life-long crusader against hunger, Val was the founder of the famed "Val's Needy Family Fund," an organization dedicated to feeding the needy since 1968. His commitment to caring for others was his driving passion; through his hard work, unflinching optimism, and

boundless generosity, he provided food to thousands of people over the years and inspired many others to take up the important work of assisting the less fortunate among us.

Val's Needy Family Fund would later become a part of the Newark Area Welfare Committee, which received from Val over \$5,000 worth of canned goods, fruit, and bread each year for their Holiday Food Box program.

Val also supported the Meals on Wheels program sponsored by the Newark Senior Center, providing hot, nutritious meals to the homebound. For his many years of selfless service to the community, Val was twice honored with the prestigious Jefferson Award, most recently in 2007. In the early 1970s, he was also named Delaware Man of the Year by then-Senator (now Vice President) Joe Biden.

Val was a native Delawarean, born in Wilmington on February 19, 1919, son of the late Fiore Santo Nardo and Maria Rose Gioffre Nardo. He proudly served his country as a Quartermaster in the U.S. Army during World War II. In civilian life, Val made his career as a barber; he owned and operated "The Hairtaker," a popular Newark barber shop for 20 years until his retirement.

A devout Catholic, Val was a longtime member of St. John's-Holy Angels parish, where he served as a Eucharistic Minister. Recently, he and his wife of 71 years, Mary, were honored by the Catholic Marriage Encounter as the longest married couple in the diocese.

Val was an active member of the Knights of Columbus, the Kiwanis Club, the

Newark Morning Rotary Club, and the Newark Lions Club. A gifted musician, he delighted audiences for many years playing violin in the Val Nardo Duo and also playing for the church choir. In his rare leisure hours, Val could often be found tending the lovely garden around his home or playing golf with friends.

Visitation will be held from 10 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. on Friday, March 9, 2012, at Holy Angels R.C.

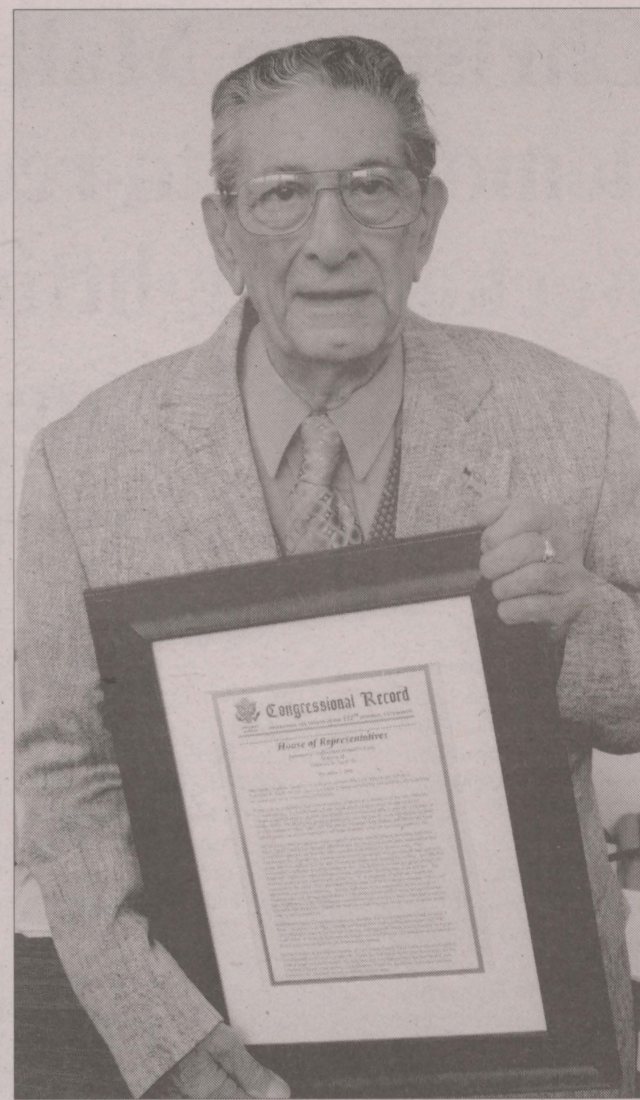

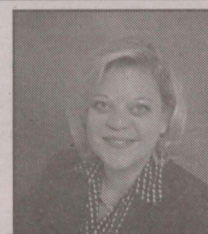

National Bubble Week

With this winter's record warm weather, many people are ready to leap into spring with activities to celebrate being outdoors. Why not participate in National Bubble Week March 11-17, 2012 as a way to rejuvenate and celebrate! With a few low-cost supplies, some homemade bubble solution, and a camera to record the action, you can participate

as a family for a day or a full week of activities at your school or community group. Not only will you have some good clean fun outdoors, but making bubbles enhances hands-on learning skills for children that help them to apply academic skills while having fun playing and learning together.

Making bubbles is a good way to experiment as a scientist with children. Children can use their skills of observation, communication, and organization to

plan and implement experiments in making bubbles. Parents and adults should plan to ask open-ended questions during the process and let the children take the lead in the bubble action.

Experiment with different recipes for homemade bubble solution and decide which works best. The basic ingredients are 1 cup dishwashing soap (DAWN or JOY is recommended), 2-3 tablespoons of glycerin (purchased at a pharmacy), and 1 gallon of water mixed in a milk jug with a lid. Make it

ahead of time as the mixture gets better with age.

Recycle items from your household trash or recycle bin to use as bubble wands. Plastic containers, lids, cups, fruit baskets, paper tubes, slotted spoons, etc., can act as frames to form various bubble shapes and sizes. Or try experimenting with different size loops of yarn or thick cotton string that will hold the bubble solution.

Have the participant measure, count, describe, and record their results with the various bubble tools and bub-

ble solutions. Ask open-ended questions to gather observations and descriptions of the process. Use a camera to document the results.

Get creative by setting up bubble relays or contests for largest or most bubbles in timed trials. Or make bubble art by adding powdered craft paint to a tray of bubbles and lifting a print with a sheet of paper. Or choreograph a bubble dance while producing bubbles to your favorite classical music.

Host a bubble birthday party with carbonated bever-

ages, bubble bath play, bubble gum blowing, a rented bubble machine, and plenty of balloons. Play musical chairs to the tune "I'm forever blowing bubbles" or "Tiny Bubbles".

Consider participating in the National Bubble Week Facebook event to enter your family photos of bubble making into the Bubble Fun Wall of Fame. Whatever you choose, remember to make sure the children and adults get into the action together to invent and experiment with all of the possibilities.

Banh Mi Boy teaches old flavors new tricks

What's crunchy, savory, and pickled all over? One of my new favorite lunch options.

Always intrigued by something new, I sat down with Larry Chen, one of the owners of Banh-Mi Boy on Main Street. I already knew that Chen and his brother opened the Vietnamese sandwich shop more than a month ago and that their parents have been in the restaurant business for over 25 years, so I was excited to get into the behind-the-scenes details.

When you first walk into Banh-Mi Boy, you are instantly captivated. The space is bright and welcoming and the staff friendly and willing to answer any and all questions. The atmosphere only added to my excitement to try whichever dish Chen would name the "signature" during our chat.

Chen described in detail some really amazing sandwiches, including a twist on a meatball sub using pickled vegetables and Vietnamese meatballs. But he was pleasantly surprised to announce that so far, the traditional Banh-Mi has been the shop's top seller.

Let's start with the basics. What is Banh-Mi?

It literally translates as "bread." But the "original," which is what I had the delight of tasting, is chock full of other goodies. The bread itself is fresh and toasted to perfection so it gives

you that perfect crunch when you bite into it ... can you hear it in your head? Next is a thin layer of pork liver pate and a homemade mayonnaise. The sandwich is then stacked with pork roll, ham, minced barbecued pork, cucumber, pickled carrots and daikon radish, fresh cilantro, and jalapeno peppers.

I know, it's a lot. And the combination is unique. But that's something that

Chen recognizes. He grew up eating it and loving it and decided it was time to make it available to others.

"There is nothing new about the ingredients," Chen explained.

He's right. We've all had most, if not all, of the Banh-Mi components in one form or another. So why not try them together?

I'm definitely glad I did. It was so obvious that

everything was fresh, made that day. My assumptions were confirmed as Chen admitted, "My mom is literally in the back prepping food for the lunch rush right now."

I told you I wanted to take you out of your comfort zone and this sandwich is a great start. The pate is savory and very rich, but met with the crispness of the vegetables and fresh cilantro; and then the bite from the jalapenos is fantastic. There also is just the

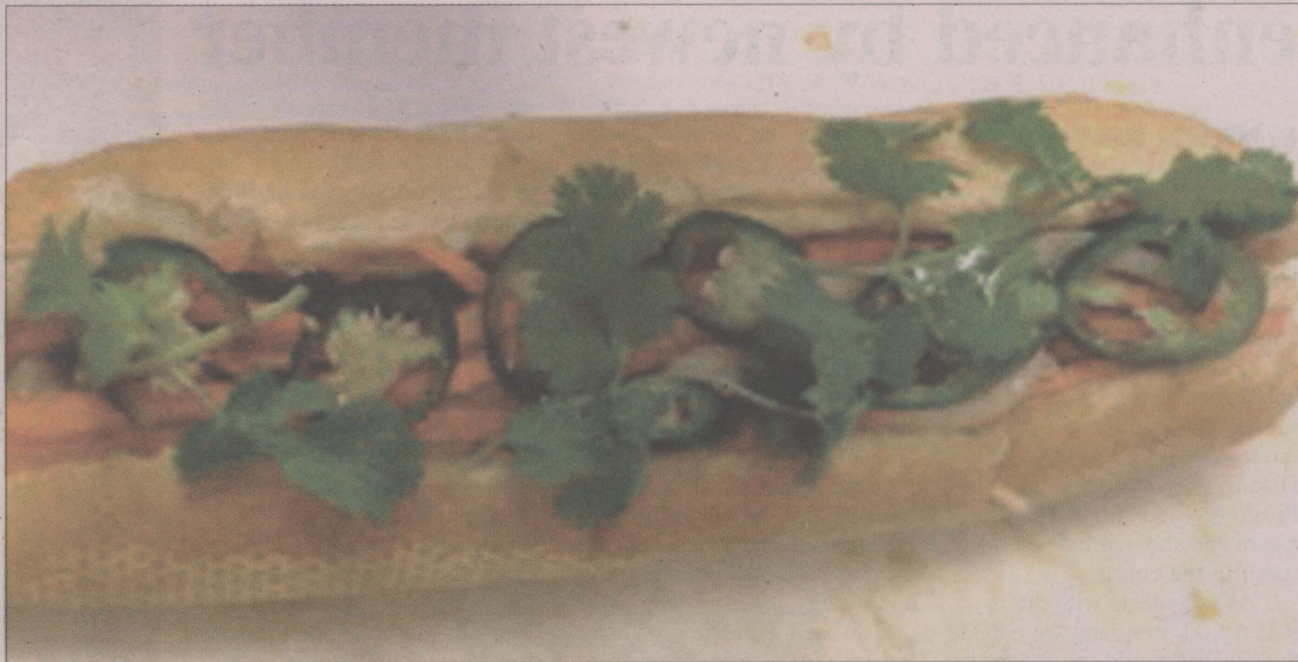
right amount of meat on the sandwich so that it doesn't overpower all of the other ingredients. Everything works really well together. In fact, I called my father at his restaurant and told him all about it. He's currently planning a trip down to Delaware just to have the Banh-Mi Boy experience.

Oh! One more thing ... when you decide to give Banh-Mi Boy a try, give yourself the time to try their traditional Vietnamese

drip coffee. It's made with three different blends and is strong, bold, and insanely good. The traditional way that it's served is an experience in itself and the atmosphere and staff are bound to make you want to stick around.

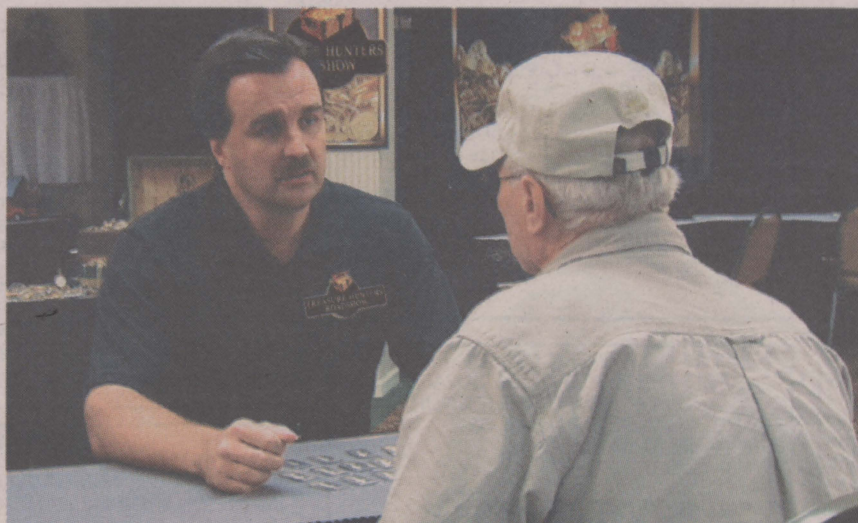
