NEWARK TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO Local Post Office Handles Taken from Issue of Post dated December 15, 1926 Record Amount of Yule Mail

The lives of three Newark men were instantly destroyed and two other men, also from Newark, injured, when the Ford sedan, in which they were riding was struck by Baltimore and Ohio freight irain No. 186 at the unguarded grade crossing at Elk Mills, Md. The secident occurred about 11:30 Saturday ight. This crossing is approximately three miles below Newark.
