350-pound bank robbery suspect strikes again in Glasgow

Delaware State Police believe the 350-pound suspect in the Sunday robbery of a supermarket branch in Middletown has struck again, after paying a visit to an Elkton supermarket bank.

Delaware State Police identified Robert G. Kelly, 49, of Townsend, Del., as the

suspect in the hold-up of a Wells Fargo Branch in Glasgow, Tuesday morning.

The latest robbery occurred at around 10:30 a.m. at the Wells Fargo at 2450 Glasgow Avenue. The suspect entered the bank, approached the 26-year-old female teller and presented a note. The teller complied and turned over an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspect fled the bank on foot in an unknown direction.

On Sunday, Middletown Police said the suspect entered the Acme Market branch of Citizen's Bank at 11:13 a.m. The man demanded money from the teller, who gave himan undisclosed amount of cash police said. The suspect then fled the scene.

Detectives also released surveillance photos from an M&T Bank at Big Elk Mall, where the suspect was observed just before the robbery at the Wells Fargo. No robbery was attempted.

Kelly is described as being 5 feet, 10 inches tall and 350 pounds, with gray hair and blue eyes.

Kelly is believed to be driving a 2002 gold Chevrolet Venture minivan with Delaware license plate PC 137797.

Elkton PD undercover operation nets heroin suspect from Newark

A Delaware man is facing heroin charges after investigators captured him in Elkton on Friday during an undercover operation that spurred

a high-speed car chase. police said.

The suspect, Kevin Gale. of Newark, allegedly



tossed 84 dose bags

of heroin from his car as he sped from the Wal-Mart Super Center parking lot in the 1000 block of East Pulaski Highway to the near- munity of Sparrow Run. by Chapel Run neighborhood, police said.

Officers took Gale into custody several minutes later after surrounding that community, police added. Investigators recovered 84 discarded bundles of heroin, which they found strewn on the pavement along Gale's escape route, according to Sgt. Scott Knauer, a spokesman for the Elkton Police Department. He was held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Teen assaulted during attempted robbery in **Wellington Woods**

New Castle County Police are currently investigating an attempted robbery and assault of an 18 year-old Newark teen. The victim was accosted at knifepoint and then assaulted by two male subjects on Monday night.

On January 9 at 8:38 p.m., County Police responded to the victim's home for a reported robbery involving a weapon. When officers arrived, the teen indicated that as he was walking from the bus stop on Wellington Drive and approaching the intersection of Hawk Drive, he observed four unknown male subjects heading in his direction. It was learned they were walking from the com-

Moments later, two of the suspects approached him and one of them displayed a knife, before they began assaulting him. During the assault, the victim was able to fight them off and they fled in an unknown direction empty handed. The teen did sustain several minor lacerations during the altercation and refused medical treatment.

A canine team responded to the scene and conducted a track, but was unsuccessful in locating the suspects. The suspects were described as four black males who were wearing all dark clothing, two of which had facial hair.

Troopers investigate armed robbery at **Newark store**

Delaware State Troopers are investigating the armed robbery of Country Tobacco store that occurred Monday evening in the Possum Park Mall, Newark.

The incident occurred at approximately 8:00 p.m. on January 9, as two male suspects with ski masks covering their faces and armed with handguns, entered the Country Tobacco store, located at 19 Possum Park Mall. The suspects confronted a 42 year-old female customer and forcibly removed

an undisclosed amount of money from her hand. The suspects then confronted the 52 year-old male employee and demanded money. The suspects removed an undisclosed amount of cash from the business and fled on foot in an unknown direction. There were no injuries reported as a result of this incident.

Suspect #1 is a black male, 5'07"-5'10" tall, 170-190 lbs., average build. Last seen wearing dark colored pants and jacket, dark ski mask covering face. Suspect armed with unknown type handgun.

When officers arrived, the victims indicated that while they were standing outside an apartment building, they were approached by four unknown males who demanded their property.

The investigation revealed the suspects stole property and an undisclosed amount of cash from a 17 and 18-yearold victims, both from the Newark area, prior to the suspects fleeing.

Garrett was charged with and Robbery First Degree and committed to the Howard Young Correctional Institution on \$30,000 secured bond.







Out of the Attic

This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated view of the Washington House Hotel on East Main Street at the center of town. Attic's guess is that it is from the late 1800s or the early 1900s based on the clothing, the horses and horse-drawn carriage, and the barn in back. Let Attic know

This view shows the front and west side of the structure. The hotel was built on this site in 1825 and gained many additions over the years. Vic and Mary Jane Willis bought the hotel in 1911 using his savings from his 15-year major league baseball career to finance his dream of owning a hotel. The family lived in the hotel and Vic did everything necessary to run it. This was a gathering place for friends and townspeople for more than three decades until a stroke led to Willis' death in 1947. Vic was born just over the line at Iron Hill Station in Cecil County, Maryland. While an infant, his family moved to Newark where he grew up, attended Newark Academy and Delaware College, and developed his baseball skills. A century after his professional baseball career started, Vic Willis was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York in 1995 upon election by the Veterans Committee. Willis is the only person from the Newark Area to be enshrined there. He was also inducted into the Delaware Sports Hall of Fame in 1977 and the University of Delaware Sports Hall of Fame in 2003.

Visit the Newark History Museum located at the historic 1877 passenger train station on South College Avenue beside the bridge on the town side of the tracks.







Andre Horne finally comes home to Newark

Born and raised early on in Bridgeville, Del., Andre Horne, 18, moved to Newark with his father when he was 8 years old because "there was more competition and more exposure," he says.

Little did he know then that his future high school basketball career would traverse four schools in three different states.

He played at Philadelphia powerhouse Roman Catholic High as a freshman, but then transferred to Hodgson Vo-Tech because the daily commute by train to the city became too expensive and cumbersome.
