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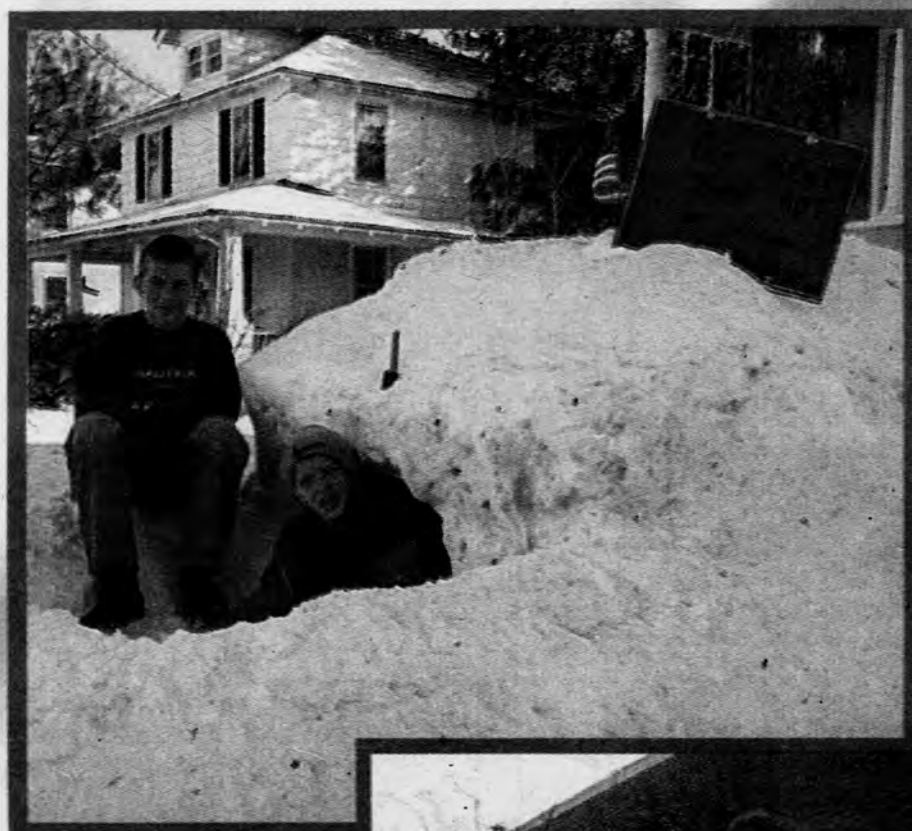
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Surprise Surprise!

800 MHz recommendations made

The House of Representatives 800 Megahertz Committee has recommendations following a three-month effort to address outage problems within the states's 800 MHz radio communications system.

First, the Delaware 800 MHz Radio Advisory Committee would be formed under a House Joint Resolution and would be comprised of police, fire service and public safety officials, as well as legislators. This Committee would be responsible for overseeing additional system improvements, addressing further outage problems, recommending solutions, and ensuring thorough training of personnel using the 800 MHz system.

The House Committee noted that the "Talk-Around" feature currently used by emergency personnel when in-building coverage is not available is better suited for non-emergency situations. They recommended that 90 percent in-building coverage

become a requirement.

The House committee also recommended having a group of volunteer technology experts (from the private industry) to assist in determining whether outside consultants should assist state agencies in certain technological projects.

Finally, they recommend a request to the Controller General's Office and the Budget Director to develop a professional services procurement manual. The manual would outline the procedures for all state agencies to follow in certain purchasing decisions. "This Committee initially came together to address outage areas throughout Delaware, from Claymont to Rehoboth Beach," said State Representative Stephanie A. Ulbrich (R-Newark), House Committee Chair. "There remains one spot in northern Claymont where we will continue to monitor, but for the most part, I am confident that

Appraisers to review water site

Value is only
question now
for Court

Newark is at least one step closer to a reservoir being built on land off Old Paper Mill Road.

According to city solicitor Roger Akin, depositing funds to cover the negotiated price of the property allowed the city of Newark to take physical possession of the site. "There has been no legal resistance to the city's possession," said Akin this week. "In fact, the funds have already been drawn on and no party in interest has challenged the city's right to condemn the site."

Akin told city council on Monday night that city staff posted the 112 acres with "No Trespassing" signs. "We have the legal authority to stop all devel-

It may be easy, but it's not cheap

A Newark man was charged on Jan. 18 with 49 counts of criminal mischief for defacing property of at least 17 businesses and government offices in the Newark area.

According to Newark Police, Brian J. Durkee, 21, was charged following a three-month graffiti investigation.

Police investigated damage on items ranging from trash dumpsters, utility boxes and meters, bridges, street signs, and mailboxes, to walls and windowsills of buildings and storage trailers. Total cost of the damage, which took place over a six-month period, was estimated at more than \$7,300.

Among the entities suffering property damage were Harvey & Harvey, Park and Shop shopping center, Newark Dodge, Portable Storage Solutions, Newark American Little League,

Armed invasion of home

Newark Police are asking for information about a home invasion which occurred on Jan. 17 in the 100 block of Madison Drive. The 18-year-old victim told police he answered a knock on the basement door and was confronted by two black males, one of whom displayed a handgun. The suspect demanded drugs and then money when the victim said he had no drugs. The victim handed over his wallet from which the suspects removed an undisclosed amount of cash. The two, described as one about 6 feet tall and one about 6 feet, 4 inches tall, both wearing dark color winter jackets and scarves, fled on foot. Anyone with information is asked to call 366-7111.

Inhalant incidents reported here

On Jan 13 around 1:25 a.m.,

Newark Police arrested John B. Inskeep Jr., 24, of Wilmington, Kara L. Betts, 22, of New Castle, and Daniel Jon Honorowski, 25, of Newark, in connection with selling and inhaling nitrous oxide (laughing gas) in the Deer Park parking lot. Officers said Honorowski, allegedly selling drug out of the back of a van in the lot, was charged with delivery of non-controlled prescription drug and possession of marijuana. All three were charged with illegal inhalation of vapor.

This is the second such incident in Newark since Jan. 12. Around 1:40 a.m. on that date, police found Richard Lee Coddling, 20, of Newark, selling the gas out of a van in a Municipal Parking lot. During that investigation, officers also found ziploc baggies, over 100 balloons, assorted fireworks, two marijuana pipes and two marijuana bongos. Coddling was charged with trespass, possession of drug paraphernalia, underage consumption and selling without a license. Warrants

was pending for selling of a non-controlled prescription drug.

Shoplifter would be very clean

Between 1:15 and 1:45 p.m. on Jan. 20, a suspect described as a black male, 35-40 years old, 5 feet, 11 inches tall, weighing about 260 pounds, tried to remove items valued at more than \$215 from the Pathmark store in College Square. A witness in the store observed the suspect placing items in a black gym bag. When the man realized he was being watched, he went to the front of the store and fled without the bag.

Inside the bag, store employees found 10 Gillette deodorants, four containers of Vaseline Intensive Care, one Gillette Aftershave, six containers of Shower to Shower, six Colgate Toothpaste tubes, 10 Lady Speedstick deodorants, four Neutrogena hand creams, and 10 packages of Gillette Mach 3 razorblades. Police said they

have no idea why anyone would want to shoplift this array of products.

Vandalism at downtown businesses

Sometime overnight on Jan. 18-19, unknown person(s) damaged plate glass windows with a BB or pellet gun at Second Source in the Newark Shopping Center and Bikeline on Main Street. On the same night, unknown person(s) cut the gas pump hose and removed the pump handle at the 896 Gulf Station on Main Street. Sometime overnight on Jan. 13-14, unknown person(s) damaged a sign and broke glass in a cabinet at Brew HaHa. On a previous occasion, vandals spraypainted graffiti in the bathroom of the coffee shop. Around 3:50 a.m., unknown person(s) broke out the front door glass at Rainbow Records on Main Street. Damage and property loss in these incidents was estimated at almost \$2,500.

Durkee was arraigned and committed to Gander Hill Prison in lieu of bail.

According to Media Officer Mark Farrall, the police identified Durkee during the investigation from information in the graffiti itself.

Farrall said the investigation

Four adults and numerous juvenile partiers at a house on Rahway Drive were busted on Saturday, Jan. 15., after someone called-in an anonymous tip.

According to Newark Police, officers received the call around 11:18 p.m. that an underage party involving minors was being held at a private residence in the 900 block of Rahway Drive in Newark.

When the officers arrived, they found more than 20 persons, the majority of whom were area high school students ages 15 to 19.

Twelve juveniles were charged with underage consumption. Officers charged David Sylvester, 18, Robert J. Standarowski II, 18, Travis M. Lawler, 19, and Elizabeth Walker, 18, all of Newark, with underage consumption.

Media Officer Mark Farrall said the minimum fine for underage drinking is \$200. Underage drinkers can also lose their driving license for up to 30 days.

The resident of the home was also charged with a noise violation.

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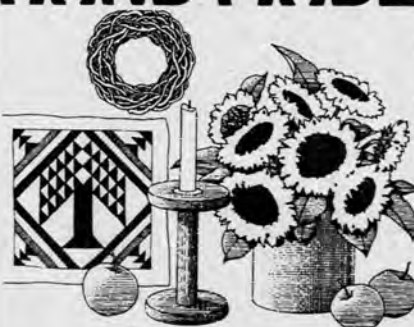
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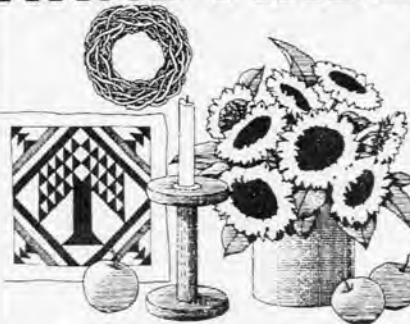

opment there," said Akin. "This means the matter will not become more expensive and complicated and the site will remain pristine until the case is settled."

This week, city council gave approval for Akin to retain two appraisers at a cost of \$29,000 to update the appraisal done prior to the condemnation proceedings. "A new appraisal assumes the fact that the Koelig site has been approved for a large number of private homes and updates the earlier Teis evaluation," said Akin. "We are recommending (Robert McKennon of Appraisal Associates and David Borek of Rehoboth Beach)."

According to Akin, both appraisers have extensive experience testifying at deposition and trial in condemnation proceedings and are known to the commissioners who will consider the evidence in this matter.

"In light of the high stakes involved in this particular case, we are of the opinion that (two appraisals) should be performed," Akin said. "Presumably each of the appraisals of two experienced experts will serve to confirm the other."

Akin said he believed the experience of the two experts would be invaluable to the city.

"It's very important to have a proper job done," Akin said. "The case could even settle if (the two experts) make a very convincing case."

In response to questions from council this week concerning the possible value and price of the property, Akin said it is public knowledge what the city's present price is.

the Committee has sufficiently addressed all the problem areas in the state."

In August, 1999, Governor Thomas Carper and other state officials told Motorola, which installed the system, to correct flaws after discovering the statewide coverage was not providing universal coverage.

Another problem became evident when agencies in the state discovered the system was not designed to work inside buildings. City councilmembers in Newark and Newark Police stated they believed the system would work inside buildings when funding was approved.

Ulbrich added. "We have offered long-term solutions to a very complicated issue. I appreciate the effort made by the Administration to provide the necessary background, as well as the department of Public Safety's assurance that these problems have been addressed."

The Committee will reconvene on March 15 to review a final report of the proposed recommendations, and to ensure the spot outages in the Claymont area have been fixed.

The appraisal obtained by the city during the negotiations last year indicated an estimated value of \$7,235,000 for the site. In April 1999, the city agreed to a purchase price of \$7,950,000 demanded in writing by the developers for the land. This amount was deposited in Court at the beginning of the condemnation proceedings.

"That has to be updated, of course," Akin said. "It could even be lowered, although I suspect that will not be the case."

If the case goes to trial, Akin said the Court and specially chosen commissioners with expertise in these matters will review the appraisals and decide the condemnation price.

Property owners approved the city's purchase of the land in a special referendum in November 1999. City officials have previously stated that another referendum will be necessary to approve funding estimated at \$18.6 million for construction of the water storage facility.

UD trustees authorize construction and other changes on campus

The University of Delaware's Board of Trustees has authorized the administration to proceed with several construction projects and to make special arrangements with Collegiate Housing Foundation and Ambling Companies, with the Delaware Technology Park and with the Biotechnology Institute.

Construction projects include: The two story office building and attached three-tier parking garage just south of the Perkins Student Center on Academy Street; and renovations to Squire Hall, East Hall, the Rust Arena roof and the south grandstands in Delaware Stadium.

In support of the new apartment complex being built at the intersection of South Chapel Street and East Delaware Avenue, the trustees authorized the administration to enter into an agreement with Collegiate Housing Foundation and Ambling Companies, whereby the University will be the financial beneficiary of the project.

Trustees also authorized a new affiliation agreement with the Bartol Research Institute, which has been associated with UD since 1976.

The new agreement more closely matches that of other research institutes at UD and will allow Bartol to become part of the College of Arts and Science and more integrated with the Department of Physics and Astronomy.

The board approved an interest-free loan of \$2.8 million to the Delaware Technology Park for the construction of a 66,000 square-foot office and laboratory facility to be leased for the Delaware Biotechnology Institute, of which UD is a partner.

In other action, the board approved resolutions granting permanent status to: the family nurse practitioner program leading to the master of science in nursing and to the post-master certificate; the women's studies major leading to the bachelor of

arts; and the finance management, marketing and operations management major programs leading to the bachelor of science in business administration.

The trustees disestablished the human development and family processes major program, since enrollment has remained low and students interested in studying family dynamics can enroll in the family research concentration in the family and community services major.

Trustees also authorize the University's request to the state for capitol funds for F.Y. 2001 and voted that \$150,000 in unrestricted gifts be earmarked and permanently invested in the endowment to support the non-profit capacity building program in the College of Human Resources, Education and Public Policy.

The earmarked funds match a \$150,000 challenge grant from the Jessie Ball duPont Foundation.

Winter driving needs our utmost vigilance

The death of 6-year-old Jennifer Neyman this week is a tragedy almost beyond bearing as any parent knows. The little girl was hit by a passing van while sledding with her younger brother and other children on Jan. 20.

The grief of the family, friends, and neighbors is all the more difficult because this loss was not due to any apparent carelessness.

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She slid face down, feet first on an inner tube, into the street. Neighbors reported children have been sledding on the steep lawns in the community ever since it was built 20 years ago.

The driver who hit her was a contractor in the neighborhood to do kitchen work. He has not been charged with any traffic violation.

There is really no one to blame – and we hope no one will try to find a finger to point.

Nevertheless, this is a terrible reminder that winter snow, ice, rain, fog and other assorted driving conditions require the utmost vigilance by all motorists.

Too often we hear that people simply don't know how to drive

in this weather. We are urged to stay home, stay off the roads, and leave plenty of time to stop when we have to brake suddenly on slippery surfaces.

But when we start out to work, school or shopping, we see drivers all around us trying to proceed at posted speed limits in dangerous conditions, passing on shoulders, driving on shoulders, and following too closely for comfort in any weather.

The increase in four-wheel drive vehicles like SUV's on the roads has not made things any safer for the rest of us. Many of those drivers seem to think they can proceed with reckless disregard of everyone else just because they are bigger and have more traction.

Realistically, the demands of daily life do not allow most of us to stay home when road conditions are less than perfect. But once launched into the stream of traffic, it is imperative that we all drive defensively, cautiously and with some consideration of the other people out there – on and off the road.

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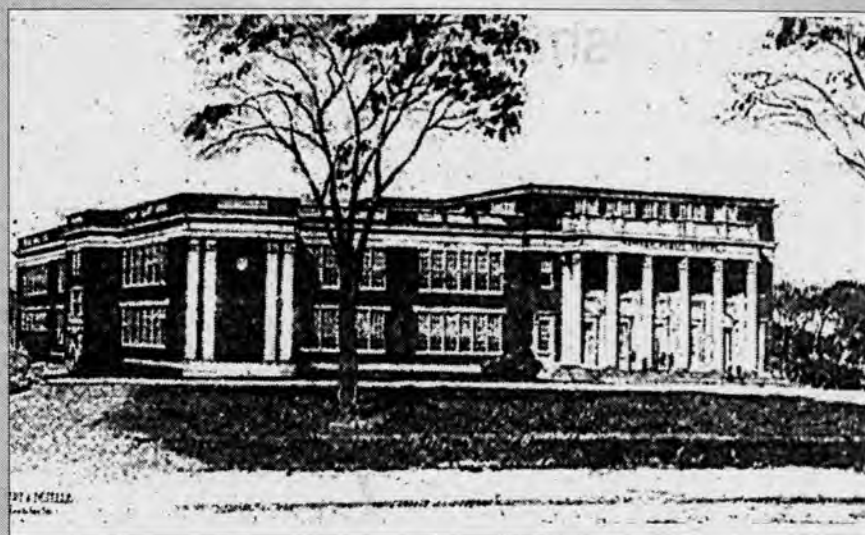

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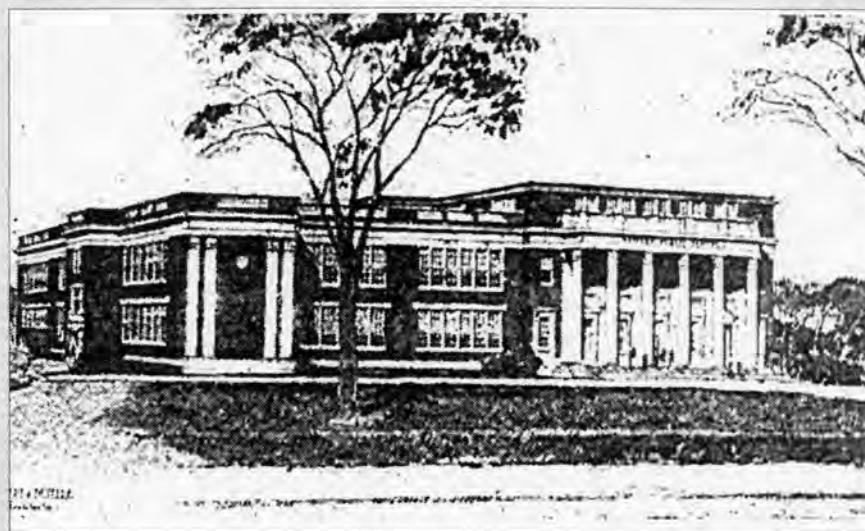

It's time to buckle up Delaware

During the past week, I've been bombarded by articles, press conferences and editorials that have the same message: People who don't wear seatbelts while driving or riding in motor vehicles are twice as likely to be killed or seriously injured.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that wearing a seatbelt decreases risk of death or serious injury in a crash by nearly 50 percent. Yet far too many people still do not buckle up.

While the national average for seatbelt usage in 1999 was 69 percent, it was 64 percent in Delaware, which means that 36 percent of our state's vehicle passengers go unbuckled. As of Dec 31, 1999, 70 percent of the Delawareans killed in car crashes were not wearing seatbelts, and the first three people killed on Delaware's highways in 2000 were not wearing seatbelts.

At a press conference hosted by the Buckle Up Delaware Coalition, Dr. John Madden, honorary chair, said, "Our main goal is to save lives," adding that as an emergency room physician for Christiana Care, he has seen "the devastating injuries to people who don't buckle up."

At this conference, several seatbelt users who survived crashes related how their lives were saved, yet one speaker had a different story to tell. She wasn't buckled up when the car she was riding in crashed. Initially, doctors thought her injuries so severe that she would remain in a vegetative state.

The young woman was in a coma for two months and hospitalized for four additional months; she will never fully recover from brain injuries sustained in the crash. She and her parents want others to know that a seatbelt could have prevented all the trauma and turmoil they have lived through.

The Buckle Up Delaware Coalition has launched an aggressive campaign aimed at getting a primary seat belt law passed in Delaware — H.B. 88. Passed by an overwhelming majority of 31-9 in the House of Representatives during the last General Assembly, the bill now sits in the Senate's Judiciary Committee.

States that have upgraded their laws to primary enforcement have seen an average of

The approach of the new millennium brought anxiety to many, but for Alexis Boyce of Bear, it marked five years since her cancer treatments and she couldn't be happier.

In the fall of 1994, Boyce was not too happy when she experienced stomach aches which progressively got worse.

Her mother, Brenda Pavlic, took her to A.I. Dupont Hospital but Boyce felt fine once they arrived. They went to the pediatrician the next morning because the pain quickly returned, but, again, by the time they got to the appointment, Boyce was feeling better. The pain continued off and on for 48 hours.

"It was so frustrating," said Pavlic. "They thought it was gastrointestinal problems...but I had a 6-year-old lying on the floor in agonizing pain begging me to take her to the hospital."

They finally did an ultrasound and Pavlic recalls them whispering and pointing to the screen. "I had a mixed feeling of relief because they found something, but horror as to what they found."

A specialist confirmed what was on the screen. "They showed me a grapefruit size tumor, a gray mass that should not be there," Pavlic said.

Test results found 90 percent of a teratoma tumor connected to one of Boyce's ovaries was soft tissue and most likely cancerous. Three days after the first pains, a specialist from Jefferson Hospital in Philadelphia was performing surgery to remove the tumor. Pathology tests confirmed cancer.

Initially they were told Boyce would not have to undergo chemotherapy.

"But within a few days we got the call from the oncologist that we would definitely have to do chemo," said Pavlic. "It was a roller coaster."

Boyce started her week-long, monthly treatments which continued for five months. "She was such a good patient," said Pavlic.

Looking back, Boyce said she was not aware of what was

happening. "I didn't know to be afraid," she said.

Pavlic said her daughter was very much a part of her treatment at the hospital, setting up the chemo and running it, bleeding the air out of the line. "She even gave a demonstration to student nurses who were amazed," said the mother.

Pavlic said while at the hospital all that time, she found her daughter loved to watch ice skating. "I told her as soon as she got better she could have ice skating lessons."

Then they were approached by social worker, Lee Lucas, about the Make-A-Wish Foundation and Boyce chose to meet Olympic ice skater Kristi Yamaguchi.

"We went in a limousine to Philadelphia in January 1995 and Alexis got to go back into the dressing room and see all the outfits," said Pavlic.

At the end of the show, Kurt Browning picked her up and skated around the rink waving to the huge crowd.

Boyce was all smiles despite her bald head covered in a pink hat.

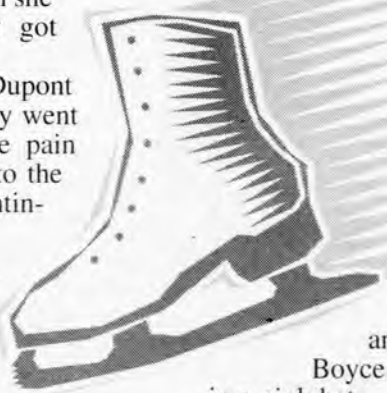
A few weeks later, she started skating lessons at the University of Delaware in addition to continuing her home-schooling. She went back to school in May, finishing first grade with second honors.

Since then, she has gone to "Can Do" camp each year with other cancer patients who have formed friendships and given each other support. "I feel like God used me and I can talk to other kids and give them encouragement," Boyce said.

Pavlic said her daughter did what she had to do to get well. "Alexis has always been an independent, determined child," continued Pavlic. "She had no reservations then going out on the ice with no hair, but she can't believe it when she looks back at it now."

Boyce has won several medals including a gold and is gearing up for this year's competitive skating season which starts in February.

"I just really had the desire to do it," said Boyce. "I want to skate in the Olympics."



First State Ballet opening in Delaware

First performance is in Newark

The newest star in the State of Delaware's cultural firmament is the First State Ballet Theater, co-founded by Pasha Kambalov and Kristina Dippel, formerly principal dancer and ballerina with the Russian Ballet Theater of Delaware.

The mission of the new company, headquartered in Newport, is to present professional quality dance performances to audiences throughout Delaware and in nearby states.

Following a distinguished dancing career, in which he was a laureate of the International Ballet Competition in Varna, Bulgaria, Assaouliak was named ballet master of the Perm State Ballet Theater, the Russian State Theater of Classical Ballet, the Dublin Ballet Company in Ireland and the former Russian Ballet Theater of Delaware.

The title, Honored Artist of the Russian Republic, one of Russia's highest honors for extraordinary artistic achievement, was bestowed on Assaouliak by the Russian Ministry of Culture.

First State Ballet Theater will perform full-length works from the classical repertory and will also commission contemporary pieces from noted choreographers.

The company will perform as frequently and widely as

possible in order to provide performing opportunities for aspiring professional dancers and to build a larger audience for dance in Delaware.

Its corps de ballet will be drawn from professional level dance students in Delaware dance schools and principal roles will be danced by guest artists, including other former members of the Russian Ballet Theater of Delaware.

The company's first production will be the classical ballet Coppelia, which will be performed at Mitchell Hall, University of Delaware Newark campus on May 20.

The company also plans to present a full-length Nutcracker ballet in December 2000.

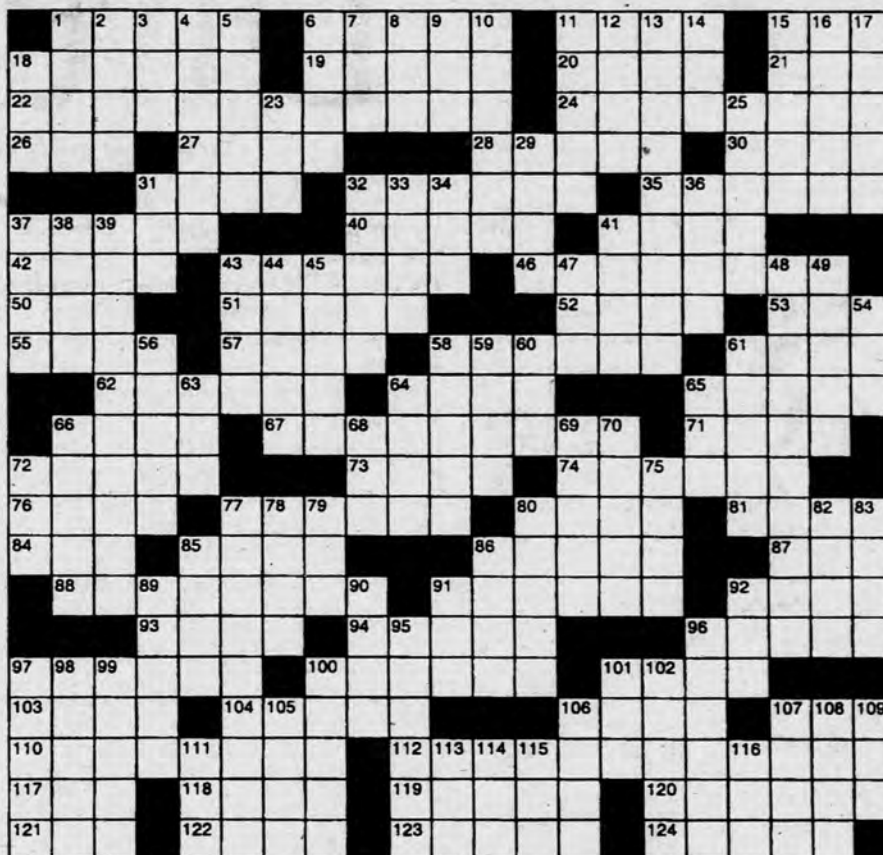

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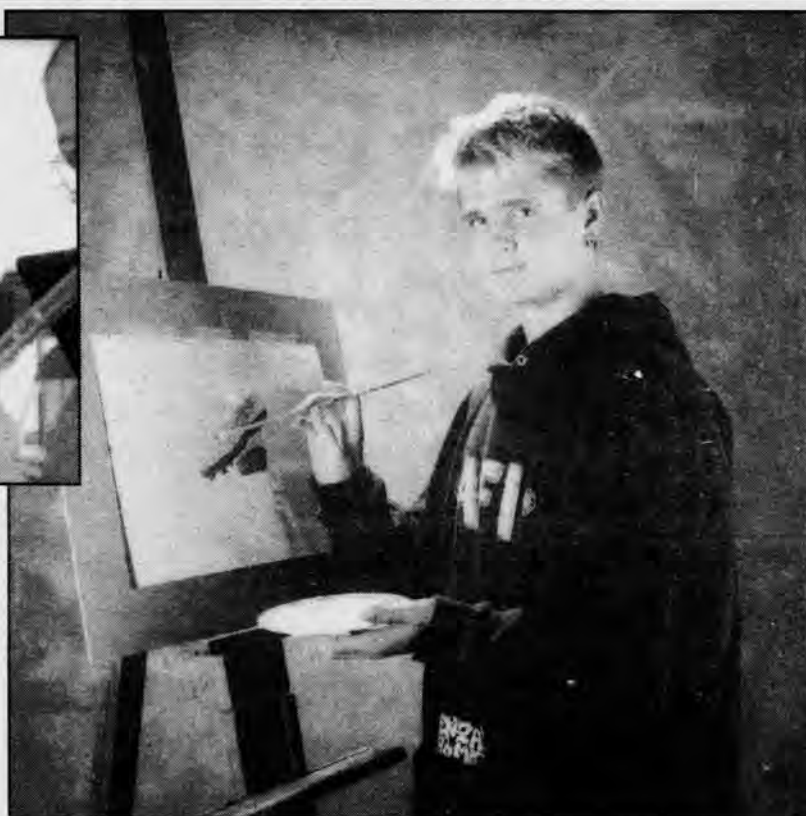

Stanford wins Harris sweepstakes

State's Offensive Player of the Year and All-American to receive full athletic scholarship from Pac-10 champions

Newark High's Kwame Harris, one of the most sought-after high school football players in the country, has decided to enroll at Stanford University on a full athletic scholarship, Yellowjackets coach Butch Simpson said Tuesday night.

A first team all-state offensive and defensive lineman and Offensive Lineman of the Year, Harris made a verbal commitment to become a Cardinal during a visit to his home Tuesday by Stanford Coach Ty Willingham.

Harris, who is six feet, eight

inches tall and weighs 335 pounds, was the No. 1-rated high school offensive lineman by several publications.

In the Jan. 30 edition of Parade Magazine, Harris is a member of its All-America High School Team and the top lineman out of 17 picks.

Harris helped lead the Yellowjackets to their third consecutive Division I state title last fall.

A formal announcement is scheduled to be made by Harris at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 2, the date on which players are permitted by the NCAA to sign with colleges.

"(Willingham) and (assistant) Tom Brattan drove up from Virginia in the snow," Simpson

said. "They didn't want to pass up the opportunity to visit and (Willingham) didn't have any idea he would commit."

"It's just one of those wonderful moments for those involved and the end of a long journey."

Brattan is also a graduate of Newark who went on to play football at the University of Delaware.

Stanford was one of several colleges Harris visited along with the University of Michigan, which Simpson said was Harris' second choice, Penn State, and Wisconsin.

Harris, whose grade-point average is about 3.6, has expressed an interest in pursuing a career in medicine. Stanford, often referred to as

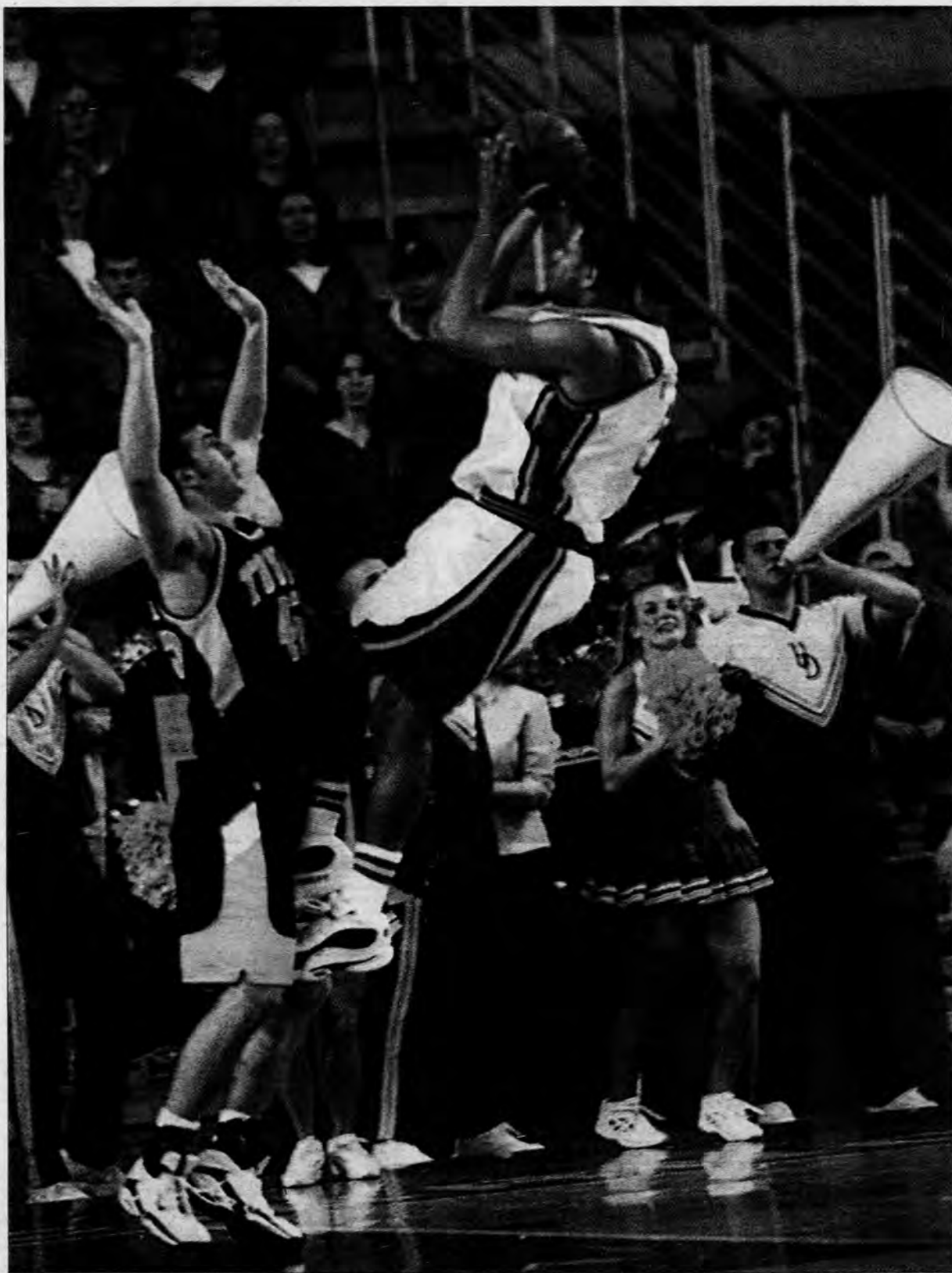
the 'Harvard of the West,' is annually rated as one of the top academic institutions in the country.

In a release from Stanford's board of governors found on the Internet, undergraduate tuition at the school for the 1997-98 school year was \$21,300, and \$27,827 for tuition, room and board.

On Tuesday, Harris cooked dinner for his future coaches, a meal that included jerk chicken and spicy meat loaf, said Simpson, who also benefited from Harris' culinary talents.

"They went back for seconds," Simpson said. "And I'm a

Hens rebound against Towson

The University of Delaware's 82-70 victory over Towson before a sold out Carpenter Center was significant in more ways than one.

Most importantly, the Blue Hens rebounded after suffering a loss at Northeastern. They beat a good Tiger squad that was just one game behind them in the conference standings. The win also improved the Hens' record to 14-4 overall and 6-2 in the America East. They were just one game behind Hofstra (7-1) heading into this week's play.

"That was a good win," said Delaware coach Mike Brey. "That's a very good basketball team, one that I've worried about all last summer."

Also satisfying to the Hens was the way they played defense — an aspect of their game that was questionable after giving up 90 points at Northeastern.

"I thought we were much better defensively," Brey said. "That is one of the things we concentrated on all week."

Shot blocking was one of the areas that really helped the Hens' defense. Ndongo Ndiaye recorded eight while Mike Pegues added four.

"I think our team defense was great," said senior Mike Pegues. "It's the best it's been all year."

"That's how we are going to succeed the rest of the season," Ndiaye said. "Great team defense is the key."

In addition to all that defense, there was some offense — especially from Pegues. The senior forward scored 26 points (the 34th time he's scored 20 points) to move within just three points of breaking the Delaware career scoring record held by former

Newark High's resurgence to the top of the state's wrestling fraternity continued last week with an upset win over Salesianum and a hard-fought win over Howard.

Providing two pivotal wins in those victories was junior Bram Walker, whose pins at 189 pounds helped seal both matches for the Yellowjackets.

The victories improved the surging Yellowjackets to 5-1 in dual meets.

Walker is currently in his third season with the varsity and his experience is showing, according to Newark assistant coach Paul McCloskey.

So far, Walker has posted a 16-2 overall record. He finished first at the North East (Md.) Tournament and was second at both the Yellowjacket Invitational and Seaford Tournament.

Walker also picked up the lone win by a Yellowjacket against conference leader William Penn.

Half of Walker's wins this season are by pins. He also has one technical fall and one major decision.

Walker is also one of Newark's captains along with Jeff Hudson, Justin Wample and John Brennan.

"He's not a real vocal person," McCloskey said about what makes Walker a good leader. "We have a couple people for that and that's fine. People lead in different ways."

"He's kind of like the role model for the kids on the team because he's a 4.0 (grade-point-average) student. He's been on the all-academic all-state team the past couple years."

"He kind of takes the approach in sports that he does in the classroom. He asks a lot of questions. He doesn't ask the question because he knows the answer to it, he asks because he wants to know the what-ifs about something, and the alternative."

Walker's ability to pin down good grades is also no accident, McCloskey said.

"He takes some college classes in the summer. You'll never see him without any school books."

"Even when we go down to the state tournament (in Dover), he brings his books and when he's done (wrestling) he goes back to the hotel and studies."

The event was started to help raise money for the non-profit organization, which was created to help provide assistance for scholarships and to help promote the sport. Some of the programs include holding clinics for inner-city youth in Wilmington.

Wellborn, of Newark, was killed in a motorcycle accident in 1992. He was an all-state soccer player and a captain of Millersville University's soccer team and dean's list physics major.

"It's a great time of the year for this to occur because it's the one time when, other than some indoor games, people aren't too busy and have a chance to socialize and talk soccer," said Dave's father, Paul Wellborn, who is secretary of the organization.

"It's neat and I enjoy meeting the people. It's really a labor of love. It's just a soccer kind of thing."

Teams are encouraged to attend as a group or as a way to have a reunion, similar to what Christiana's 1988 team did last year, Wellborn said.

Harris may also get a chance to play against teammate and two-way all-state lineman Micah German, a 6-5, 225-pounder who will attend the University of California-Berkeley.

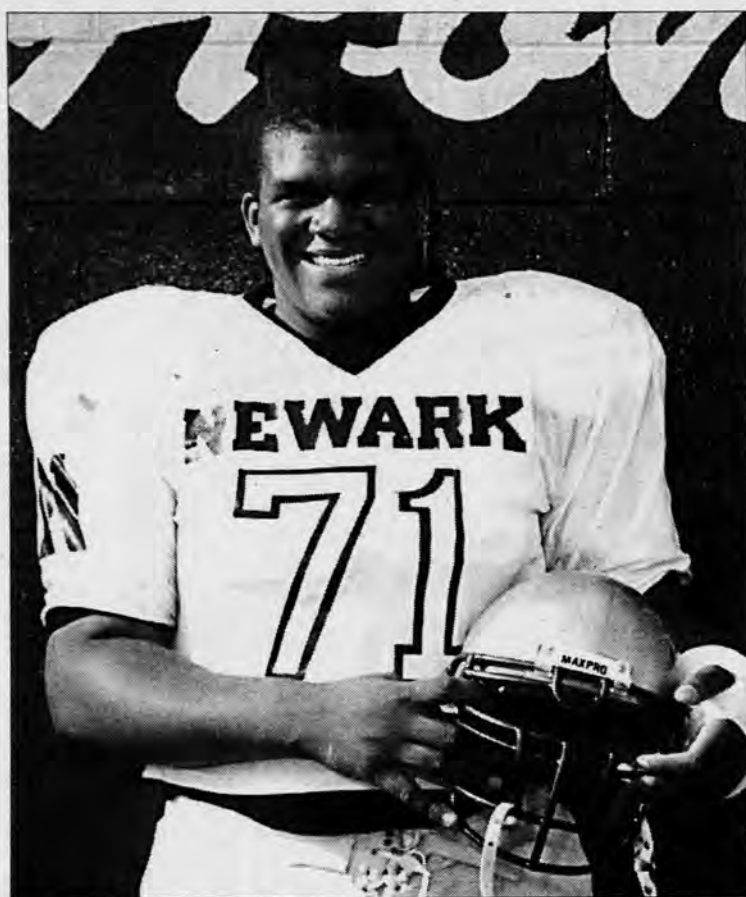
The two schools are about an hour's drive apart and are arch-rivals in the PAC 10 conference. They meet in the last game of the season.

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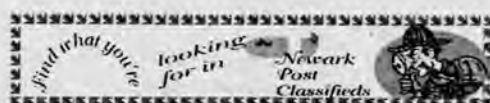
