State Crop Kings Honored For Work With Agriculture

Worrilow, Phillips Laud Guests Of Valliant Firm At Testimonial Luncheon

At a luncheon recently given in Dover, by Valliant Fertilizer Company, Levy Court Commissioner John G. Tarburton of Dover, and Elwood T. Fox, Jr. formerly of Bear—customers of the Valliant Company for years—were presented engraved gold watches in recognition of their contributions to Delaware agricults.

Fox was Delaware Soybean King in 1938, producing a yield of 51.8 bushels per acre. Both Tarburton and Fox stressed the importance of using good seed, plenty of lime, heavy applications of plant food, and high plant population. They indicated optimism in opportunities to raise food production, and both plan to exceed their former records through the use of best known agricultural practices—and hard work.

Dr. George M. Worrilow, dean of the school of agriculture and director of agricultural extension at the University of Delaware, congratulated Mr. Tarburton and Mr. Fox.

Dr. Worrilow stressed the importance of growing high yields of corn and soybeans to cut production cost and increase profits per acre, and cited the importance of efficient marketing of Delaware crops. Professor Claude Phillips, chairman of the U. D. department of agronomy, and initiator of the 100 Bushel Corn Club, the 40 Bushel Soybean Club, and the Green Pastures Contest in Delaware, expressed pleasure at the "fine progress Delaware agriculture is making," pointing out that last year Delaware farmers averaged over 65 bushels of corn per acre, the highest average corn yield per acre in Delaware history.






