RULES OF ORDER

Rule 1-The House of Representatives shall meet every day (Saturday and Sunday excepted) at one o'clock P. M. unless otherwise ordered.

Rule 2—Every day before the House proceeds to other business, the Clerk of the House shall call the names of the members in alphabetical order and shall read the Journal of the preceding legislative day.

Rule 3—In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, eighteen of the members elected to the House shall constitute a quorum to do business, but a less number may recess or adjourn from day to day.

Rule 4—The daily order of business shall be as follows:

- Calling of House to Order. 1.
- Prayer by Chaplain. Pledge of Allegiance.
- 3. Calling of Roll.
- Reading of Journal.
- Communications from the Speaker and presentations of Petitions and Memorials.
- 7. Reports from Standing Committees in regular order.
- Reports from Special Committees in order of appointment.

- 9. Introduction of new business.
- 10. Business on the Calendar.
- 11. Miscellaneous.

DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER

Rule 5—He shall take the presiding officer's chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned and call the members to order.

Rule 6—He shall have general direction of the House Chamber and shall preserve order and decorum. In debate he shall prevent personal reflection and confine the members to the question under discussion. No member shall have the floor except when recognized by the Speaker.

Rule 7—He shall decide all questions or order or may submit the question to the House. An appeal from his decision may be made by any member, if properly seconded.

Rule 8—He may name a member to perform the duties of presiding officer, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment, except when the Speaker obtains leave of absence, in which case he may depute a member as Speaker Pro Tempore during such leave, which leave shall not exceed five legislative days.

Rule 9—He shall sign all bills and resolutions requiring the signature of the Speaker and the facts of the signing shall be entered upon the Journal; all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the House shall be signed by him and attested by the Clerk.

Rule 10—He shall determine the principal object of a bill or joint resolution and assign such bill or joint resolution to a committee to which such subject matter is appropriate.

Rule 11—He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Rule 12—Every member shall be in his seat at the hour to which the House shall have been adjourned, but any member desiring to be absent from a session may be excused by the presiding officer.

Rule 13—A member shall not be permitted to make a motion or address the Speaker unless such a member be at his own desk and when about to communicate any matter to the House or to speak in debate, he shall rise and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," confining his remarks to the subject before the House and avoiding personal reflections. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House.

Rule14—While the Speaker is putting the question or addressing the House or while a member is speaking, no member or other person shall engage in private conversation or be permitted to walk across or out of the House or pass between the Speaker and the member addressing the House.

Rule 15—If any member, in speaking or otherwise trangress the rules of the House, the Presiding Officer shall, or any member may, call him to order; and when a member shall be called to order he shall sit down, and not proceed without leave of the House, which if granted, shall be upon motion that he be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.

Rule 16—A member shall not be interrupted when speaking, except to a call to order by the Speaker or by a member through the Speaker, or by a member to explain, or by a motion for the previous question, or to adjourn; nor shall any member be referred to by name in debate, unless for transgression of the rules of the House and then by the Speaker only.

Rule 17—The standing committees of the House, consisting of five members each (except the Committee on Passed Bills of three members) to be appointed by the Speaker and to continue during the session, shall be as follows:

- Rule 18—Committee meetings shall be held as far as possible when the House is not in session and committee meetings shall not be held while the House is in session without the consent of the Speaker.
- Rule 19—Committee reports shall be printed, written or typewritten, and if so desired the minority of a Committee may make a report.
- Rule 20—The Committee of the Whole shall proceed under the rules of the House as far as the same may be applicable.
- Rule 21—The Committee on Rules shall have supervision of and give instructions as to their duties to the attaches of the House and shall keep a record of the attendance of said attaches; shall be responsible for the seating of members; shall make assignments of offices and committee rooms, and shall have charge of the furniture and fittings of the House Chamber, offices and committee rooms.

BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

- Rule 22—Every bill and resolution shall be introduced by a member or by order of the House or by report of a committee.
- Rule 23—Every bill and resolution shall be introduced with an original and at least eight backed copies. The copies shall be marked "duplicate" and at all times every bill and resolution shall be under the general supervision of the Clerk of the House. Until its passage by the House, the original copy of every bill and resolution shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chairman of the Committee to which it was referred or the Clerk of the House. The original of all bills and resolutions shall be either printed typewritten or stenciled and backed and no erasures or interlineations shall be allowed.
- Rule 24—Every bill and joint resolution when introduced shall be read one time by title only, after which it shall be assigned to the proper committee. When put upon its passage, each bill or joint resolution shall be given its final reading by title only unless any member requests a reading.
- Rule 25—A bill or joint resolution shall not be passed upon the same day it has been reported to the House by the Committee having charge of such bill or resolution, nor in the absence of the member who introduced the same, without his written consent.
- Rule 26—Any resolution carrying an appropriation or disposal of public moneys shall not be passed by the House on the same day that it shall have been introduced and read, excepting resolutions for House expenses.

Rule 27—Every bill and resolution may be amended at any time before final action is taken. No title of a bill may be changed, except for typographical errors.

Rule 28—Every bill or joint resolution which shall have been in committee for a period of ten days or more, shall, upon request of eighteen members of the House, in writing, be reported to the House for a decision, as to its further disposal.

Rule 29—Every bill and resolution, to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Assembly may be necessary, shall upon its passage in the House be certified to by the Clerk of the House and the date of the passage of the name noted at the foot of the backing hereof. Said bill or resolution shall then be delivered by the Clerk as soon as possible into the custody of the Senate.

MOTIONS

Rule 30—No Bill or Joint Resolution shall be received by the House unless it be prefaced by a brief statement of the purpose of the Bill or Resolution, which shall be known as the title, and shall also contain the text of the Bill or Resolution in full.

Rule 31—A substitute bill may be introduced under new business or by permission of the Speaker at which time it shall be given a first reading. The member introducing the substitute bill must explain briefly wherein the substitute bill differs from the original bill, after which it shall be referred to the proper committee. A substitute bill may be introduced only by the sponsor of the bill for which it is a substitute. A substitute bill upon being referred to committee shall supersede and render null and void the bill for which it is a substitute.

Rule 32—Every motion except to adjourn, shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the mover, and any motion, if so desired by the mover, may be withdrawn before amendment or decision thereon and the proceedings in relation to the same shall be expunged from the Journal.

Rule 33—Every motion, except for leave to introduce a bill or resolution or for reading of the same, the daily adjournment of the House or to refer or postpone any subject, shall, if required by the Speaker or requested by any member, be reduced to writing by the mover, or may be typewritten as the mover may prefer.

Rule 34—Every motion shall be repeated by the Speaker, or presiding officer, before debate or discussion thereon; and if there has been any debate or discussion, the motion shall again be repeated distinctly by the Speaker or presiding officers before putting the question in the following

terms: "As many as are in favor of the question say "Aye," and, after the affirmative is expressed, "As many as are

opposed, say No."

Rule 35—Every motion shall be decided in a fair and impartial manner by the Speaker or presiding officer, and the vote of a majority of the members present and voting shall be prevail, unless contrary to these rules or in conflict with the provisions of the Constitution. The Speaker or presiding officer, if necessary for a fair decision, may cause, or any member may call, for a division, and the members voting in the affirmative shall be required to rise, and after the Clerk has counted and noted those so voting, the question shall be reversed. Excepting when provided by the Constitution the yeas and nays shall be taken, only on motion that the names of those so voting be entered on the Journal.

Rule 36—Every motion, to adjourn shall be in order (unless such motion has just immediately been decided, or the House is voting on another question) and shall be decided without debate.

Rule 37—The only motions, except as otherwise provided, that shall be permitted to interrupt the business regularly before the House, are as follows:

A motion to amend, commit or postpone.

A motion to lay on the table.

A motion for the previous question.

Rule 38—A motion for the previous question shall not be entertained except at the request of five members rising for that purpose, and shall be determined without debate; but when the previous question has been called and sustained, it shall not cut off any pending amendment. The vote shall be taken without debate, first on the amendments in their order and then on the main question.

Rule 39—A motion for the reconsideration of a question which has been decided shall be made and seconded by a member who voted with the majority on the original question; and no motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day or one of the three next succeeding days of actual session of the House thereafter. In the application of this rule the word "Majority" shall be construed to mean the number of votes that were sufficient to prevail in the decision of the original question.

Section 2—When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order, or message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the House and been communicated to the Senate, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Senate to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

CALENDAR

Rule 40—The Clerk of the House shall keep a calendar of business on which shall be placed the number and subject of all bills and resolutions and the name of the introducer thereof; and, if reported from committee, the action of the committee thereon. Said bills and resolutions shall be kept on the Calendar until final action is taken thereon, and such as lie over and other matters undisposed of, shall be placed in the order in which they are presented.

Rule 41—The business on the Calendar shall be called after the receiving of committee reports and any bill ready for its final reading may be called up for passage unless the House otherwise directs.

MISCELLANEOUS

Rule 42—Messages from the House shall be conveyed by the Clerk or a member, as the Speaker may direct, and when messages are conveyed to the House by a messenger from the Governor, or by a member of the State Senate, the members of the House shall rise. Messages to the House shall not be received while the House is voting on a question or a member is speaking.

Rule 43—Before any petition or memorial addressed to the House shall be presented, a brief statement of the contents shall be made by the introdeer, and upon motion, shall be received at the Clerk's table and read; unless the reference is objected to by a member at the time the petition or memorial is read, it shall be referred without further motion

Rule 44—The rules of the House shall not be changed or suspended except by a vote of a constitutional majority of the members unless these rules otherwise provide, but in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules, the rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts' Rules of Order Revised shall govern the House; and in all other cases the rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Jefferson's Manual shall govern in so far as they may be applicable and not inconsistent with these rules or Roberts' Rules of Order Revised

Rule 45—A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, and, unless submitted to the House, shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate, subject to an appeal to the House. When an appeal is taken any subsequent question of which may rise before the decision of such appeal, shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate; and any appeal may be laid on the table without prejudice to the pending proposition, and thereupon shall be held as affirming the decision of the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer may submit any question of order for the decision of the House.

Rule 46—When a skeleton bill is introduced it shall not be assigned to a committee, but it shall be listed on the Calendar as a "Skeleton Bill unassigned." When it has been filled in, it shall be assigned to a committee and take the usual course of other bills. Skeleton bills will be accepted until three days preceding the deadline for the acceptance of new business.

Rule 47—All audio recordings of the proceedings of the House Shall be under the control and in the Custody of the Chief Clerk of the House throughout the duration of the Assembly. At the final adjournment of the House the Chief Clerk shall transfer all such records to the custody of the Public Archives Commission.

JOINT RULES — 1963

Rule 1—Messages from one House of the General Asembly to the other shall be conveyed by such person as a sense of propriety in each House may determine. Announcements shall be made by the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House to which the message if being conveyed, and the message shall be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person or persons conveying the same.

Rule 2—Every bill and resolution upon being messaged from one House to the other shall be receipted for by the Chief Clerk of the House receiving same, and all papers on which the said bill or resolution may be based shall be transmitted at the same time.

Rule 3—Every bill and resolution to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Asembly may be necessary shall upon its final passage in both Houses be delivered by the Chief Clerk of the House and/or the Secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, in which such bill or resolution originated, into the custody of the Bill Clerk of said House and it shall be the duty of the Bill Clerk of the House of Representatives jointly to see that such bill or resolution has attached to it a proper parchment backing and that each and every page of the said bill or resolution has been properly initialed, sealed, or stamped, unless otherwise ordered, and upon being assured that such is the case, shall immediately, if the Houses be in session and, if not, at the earliest opportunity, present the said bill or resolution to the presiding officer of each House for his signature, the presiding officer

of the House in which the bill or resolution originated signing first. Said Bill Clerks shall then certify with the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House on the backing of said bill or resolution that such bill of resolution is the same as that which passed both Houses of the General Assembly, and the said bill or resolution shall then be delivered by the Bill Clerk of the House in which such bill or resolution originated to the Chairman of the Committee on Passed Bills of said House. The Chairman of the Passed Bills Committee shall then deliver the bill to the Governor within 5 calendar days unless instructed otherwise by a concurrent resolution passed by both Houses.

Rule 4—Disagreement between the two Houses on a bill or resolution, or an amendment to a bill or resolution or over any other matter shall be made subject for conference at the request of either House. A committee, composed of memebrs who voted in the majority on the point or points of difference, shall be appointed in each House, and, at a convenient hour agreed on by their chairmen, shall meet in the conference chamber and state to each other, verbally or in writing, the reasons of their respective House for or against the substitution, amendment or other matter of disagreement, and confer freely thereon. Conference shall not have power or control over any part of the bill or resolutions or other matter save such point or points over which the Houses disagree.

Rule 5—Every bill and/or resolution, which shall have passed one House and been rejected by the other, shall be returned to the House which had approved it and notice given of its rejection and the same entered on the Journal.

Rule 6—Neither the Senate nor the House shall be permitted to substitute a bill or joint resolution for a bill or joint resolution originating in the other House of the General Assembly.

Rule 7—The General Assembly may, by a concurrent resolution passed by both houses, request the return of a bill or resolution after it has been delivered to the Governor. The Governor may or may not return the bill at his option, but if he returns it, he shall deliver it to the Chairman of the Committee on Passed Bills of the House in which the bill originated and the Chairman shall retain the bill unless directed otherwise by a concurrent resolution passed by both Houses.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the rules be suspended for the sole purpose of taking action on SCR 1. The motion prevailed by voice vote.

Mr. Eskridge moved that SCR 1 be given its third and final reading and taken up for consideration in order to pass the House.

SCR 1 was adopted by voice vote.

SCR 2 was given its first reading by title only.

SCR 2—"Appointing Roy D. Freeman As Accountant For The Joint Finance Committee And Melba Anne Webb As Secretary For The Joint Finance Committee Of The 122nd General Assembly Of The State Of Delaware."

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the 122nd General Assembly of the State of Delaware, the House of Representatives concurring therein that, Roy D. Freeman be appointed as Accountant for the Joint Finance Committee and Melba Anne Webb be appointed as Secretary for the Joint Finance Committee of the 122nd General Assembly of the State of Delaware.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the rules be suspended for the sole purpose of taking action on SCR 2. The motion prevailed by voice vote.

Mr. Eskridge moved that SCR 2 be given its third and final reading and taken up for consideration in order to pass the House.

SCR 2 was adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Eskridge moved that the House adjourn until January 10, 1963 at 2:00 P.M., in Joint Session in the Senate Chambers to hear the Message from the Governor. Motion carried.

3RD LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Speaker called the House to order at 1:44 P.M. on Thursday, January 10, 1963.

There was a prayer by the chaplain, Rev. Donald J. Maccallum.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag. The Roll Call revealed 34 members present and 1 absent. Members Present—Messrs. Annett, Atkins, Bartleson, Best, Blendt, Busker, Casey, Clifton, Correll, Darling, Davidson, Dineen, Downs, Eskridge, Exley, Fifer, Hale, Hanlon, Hocker, Livingston, Isaacs, Jarrell, Keenan, Kirkby, Lowe, McGinnis, Phillips, Pratt, Quigley, Shulties, Walls, Wootten, Younger, Mr. Speaker—34.

Members Absent-Mr. Shockley-1.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the previous session when Mr. Eskridge moved that so much be considered the reading of the Journal. Approved.

Motion prevailed.

Mr. Speaker announced that the microphone installation and the change in the seating arrangement were to facilitate the recording of a legislative with the possibility of adopting this procedure permanently in order to provide a complete record of proceedings in the House.

Mr. Eskridge commented that the House should join the Senate for the Joint Session in a body rather than as individuals.

Mr. Exley announced that he had received considerable comment from his constituents relative to SB 251 and that he thought all members had better acquaint themselves with this law dealing with cosmotology because of the unfavorable reaction it had caused.

The Speaker sent the House Messenger to receive information from the Senate when the Senate would be ready to receive the House in Joint Session.

Mr. Eskridge moved, at 1:58 P.M. that the House recess to meet in JOINT SESSION with the Senate. Carried.

At 2:00 P.M., The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives. They were admitted and seated. Lieutenant Governor Lammot invited the Speaker of the House to a seat on the rostrum.

JOINT SESSION

Sen. Donovan moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Sen. Donovan moved that the President of the Senate preside over the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Sen. Donovan moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House act as Secretaries of the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The chair appointed the following committee to escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber: Sen. Donovan, Sen. DuPont, Rep. Busker and Rep. Bartleson.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the Senate Chamber.

The President invited the Governor to the Rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-Second General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

During this meeting of the 122nd General Assembly, we have a splendid opportunity to carefully remold some of our important institutions and departments into improved patterns to better serve the future needs of the people of Delaware.

We cannot afford to complacently rest upon the splendid record made during the past two years. Our State, like our Nation, is moving ahead. We are in the midst of a dynamic program of Progress for People in Delaware. Just as this magnificent Legislative Hall has taken on a new, fresh and attractive appearance, so are the agencies and commissions of our State moving forward with new vigor and vision.

All over the State there are inspiring evidences by our people that they are no longer willing to mark time, to stagnate and remain in the status quo, but rather we are making monumental efforts in at least a dozen areas to analyze our weaknesses and our problems, and we are calling in outstanding study groups to evaluate our positions and make recommendations which should result in an approach to excellence in these fields. These studies are being conducted in the following areas:

- 1. Budget and Financial Control;
- 2. Corrections and Rehabilitation;
- 3. Welfare;
- 4. School Building Construction;
- 5. Educational Television;
- 6. Mental Health;
- 7. Retraining and Re-employment;
- 8. The problems of young Delawareans in obtaining higher education in subjects not offered in our State institutions;
- 9. Area Skills;
- 10. Juvenile Delinquency;
- 11. Bidding Laws;
- 12. Tax Collection Machinery.

These efforts indicate our impatience with mediocrity and our desire to make Delaware a better State and provide improved services for our people. Most of our emergencies have been resolved. The road of Progress for People has been charted and we can see and measure the successful steps already taken. Now, it is the joint responsibility of the Executive and Legislative branches, working cooperatively, to effect the second stage of our program to restore and refine the governmental machinery of our State.

Here are the most important and far-reaching proposals of our program:

Balanced Budget for Fiscal 1963 and 1964

The continued success of our program of Progress for People requires responsible financing. Responsible financing includes balanced budgets, especially during the years of an expanding economy. Last spring the budget for fiscal 1963 was prepared and enacted in the light of the best financial information available at that time. The indication then was that we could cover our expenditures, provide a cash balance of approximately \$1½ million on June 30, 1963.

Since that time the economy of our State has exceeded our predictions. In addition, higher agency reversions at the end of fiscal 1962 combined to build our cash position. During the present year the shift in harness racing dates and a substantial, unanticipated increase in revenue from inheritance and estate sources leads me to estimate the total revenue available during the present fiscal year, including the cash balance from the last year, of \$105,185,000. Based on appropriations to date, a cash balance of approximately \$9 million is anticipated on June 30th.

This encouraging financial picture means that there will be funds during the balance of this fiscal year to take care of minor emergencies and a few highly essential projects. A word of caution at this point is highly important. Although our financial picture has been brightened in fiscal 1963 by the change on racing dates and an unusual increase in inheritance taxes, this particular advantage cannot be carried into fiscal 1964.

My estimate of \$102 million revenue for fiscal 1964 is based upon a projection of our rising economy. The recommended Budget Act, when added to Automatic Appropriations and routine Grants-in-Aid and reduced by anticipated reversions, contemplates an expenditure of \$103,688,530. A cash balance of \$5 million to \$6 million on June 30, 1964 is highly desirable. This means that at least \$6.7 million of the anticipated cash balance on June 30, 1963 is committed for fiscal 1964, exclusive of desirable supplemental projects which the Assembly may wish to initiate.

Improved Efficiency in State Financial Management

In the early days of our Administration I reorganized the State Council of Presidents and Executives — the Governor's informal cabinet. One of the Council's working committees, cooperating with the Budget Commission, undertook a comprehensive study of Delaware's financial operation. Using funds appropriated by the 121st General Assembly specifically for this purpose, the firm of Cresap, McCormick and Paget was retained to give professional assistance.

This independent company, outstanding in the field of governmental fiscal management, has completed its preliminary study and its detailed recommendations, approved by the State Council committee, will be available for you in the next few days. Most of the recommendations can be implemented without statutory change, and it is the desire of the State Council Committee and of this Administration to retain the services of Cresap, McCormick and Paget to work with our State agencies to fully implement these reccommendations during the next 18 months. The additional cost of completing this project is \$50.000. They have recommended, and this Administration will present, a measure providing for the reallignment of the fiscal duties already asigned to the Executive branch in order to faciliate the performance of these duties. This measure would provide for a full-time Budget Director. appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The Budget Commission would be retained in an advisory capacity. The Budget Director would be responsible for the budget preparation and expenditure control duties presently vested in the Budget Commission, and the "pre-audit" duties of the Auditor. The State Auditor would be assigned the 'post-audit" duties now vested in the Budget Commission.

I concur with Cresap, McCormick and Paget that this is the extent of the statutory changes needed at this time to modernize our fiscal operation.

Reapportionment

Last summer a bipartisan committe, appointed by the Governor, unanimuosly recommended a Constitutional Amendment to reapportion the General Assembly and the call for a Constitutional Convention. The 121st General Assembly passed the first leg on the Constitutional Amendment, but rejected the call for a Constitutional Convention. The final action on the Constitution Amendment to reapportion our Assembly is now before this body.

The proposed amendment provides a much fairer representation in the House of Representatives, and is especially remarkable because it received the unanimous endorsement

of the bipartisan statewide committee. The amendment preserves the integrity of our bicameral Assembly, clearly placing representation in the House on the principle of population without destroying the traditional right of even the smallest Hundred to be represented. In addition, it recognizes the historic political autonomy of our counties. Just as each state has always had representation in the lower house of the United States Congress, based upon a census taken every ten years, so each Hundred in our State is represented in the House of Representatives of the Delaware Legislature. Just as each state, large or small, has an equal number of Senators in the United States Senate, so the counties would have equal representation in our Senate.

The Federal Court will be hearing argument on this case later this month. The amendment now before you, without change, is the only amendment within the constitutional power of this 122nd Assembly to effect. I urge you to give immediate and favorable consideration to this reapportionment amendment.

Earmarking of DuPont-General Motors Divestiture Revenue

The collection of personal income taxes this spring for calendar 1962 will include the first significant revenue from the DuPont-General Motors stock divestiture ordered by the Federal Courts. There is no practical way to estimate the amount of this first collection. We have excluded it entirely from our revenue estimate for personal income tax during this fiscal year, as well as during fiscal 1964. The State Tax Department which has just completed special forms for reporting this special revenue, will be able to determine the amount actually received from this source by early May of each year for the previous calendar year. While we will then know the amount involved, these monies cannot, under present law, be separated physically from the rest of the General Fund.

I strongly urge that legislation be enacted to isolate this windfall revenue from the General Fund and to limit its future use to expenitures for capital improvements of a permanent nature designed to benefit present and future generations of our State.

Reform of Correctional Program

During the spring of 1961, I appointed a Governor's Committee for a State Correctional Program consisting of 16 distinguished Delawareans, representing each county of the State and the City of Wilmington. The Delaware Crime Commission provided this Committee with \$25,000 which enabled it to employ the National Council on Crime and Delinquency to make a Study of juvenile and adult correction in Delaware.

It is my sincere hope that you will act promptly to implement the major immediate recommendations of this Study which provides for:

- 1. Expanded professional staff to step up the rehabilitation of those presently in our correctional institutions;
- 2. Expanded probation and parole staff and program to follow through to a logical conclusion in the field, the rehabilitative efforts begun in the institutions;
- 3. A single Family Court with statewide jurisdiction and expanded professional staff.

This program will result in over-all savings to the State, and over the years it will help to build a stronger community and strengthen the morale of our people.

Mental Health

At a special Governors' Conference on Mental Health in Chicago during November of 1961, it was ably demonstrated by national leaders in the field of mental health that with adequate professional staff, ample facilities and sufficient funds, it is possible to cut the population of our mental institutions in half by using the recently developed drugs and treatment.

There are a number of obstacles to be overcome before this desirable goal can be attained. It is estimated it will take double our present expenditures to accomplish this important target. Today, if the whole nation attempted to double its expenditures in this effort, sufficient psychiatrists and professional staff could not be employed because they are simply not available. Broad efforts are being made to train these all-important people so that an adequate number will be available within the next decade.

We in Delaware are slowly moving ahead in this field and a significant increase is being recommended in the budget of Delaware State Hospital.

Revision of Magistrate System

Under the leadership of the Supreme Court of Delaware, a study has been made of this archiac, outmoded system. The recommendations of this distinguished body should be enacted into law so that the people of Delaware will be assured of the best possible administration of justice. In addition to eliminating the fee system, these recommendations provide for a reduction of the total number of Justices of the Peace, for convenient locations of the courts throughout the State, and for staffing on a 24-hour basis. Constables would also be compensated by salary rather than by fees.

Education

Great strides have been made in both higher and public education in Delaware during the past two years. State support for the University of Delaware has been increased by 38% over this period. Additional funds for teacher salary schedule increases, for expanded special services, and for the unit appropriation for ALL OTHER COSTS have been provided.

This is as it should be. The future of our State and Nation depends upon the excellence of our educational system. The way we support and build our educational program will help to determine the success of our future leaders in government, business, agriculture and science. A sound educational program, turning out well-grounded, intelligent students, will help to lessen future unemployment and welfare claimants. Such a program will reduce the demands upon our mental health and correctional institutions.

1. Scholarships for Delawareans desiring to pursue studies in higher education not afforded to them within the State: Because of the small size of our State, we cannot economically provide top quality higher education in all the major fields. The concept of equal educational opportunity demands that qualified students who wish to pursue such programs as medicine, denistry, law, veterinary medicine, psychiatry and many other professions vital to the welfare of our society, be assisted just as we are now assisting those who choose engineering or some other field provided by a Delaware institution.

For several years now we have been part of the Southern Regional Education Board at an annual administrative cost of \$33,000. It was thought that we would some day provide the additional monies to place students in some of the Southern Regional institutions to meet these specialized demands of higher education. Last year I appointed a committee to study the value of Delaware's continued participation in this Lompact. After intensive research, it was the recommendation of this Committee that we withdraw from the SREB and provide a program of direct scholarships to students lesiring to pursue certain programs of higher education not provided in our Delaware institutions. I fully concur with these recommendations and urge that legislation for this surpose be supported.

2. Educational Television: In our efforts to step up he quality of our educational program, one opportunity vailable to us becomes more attractive with each passing ay. Delaware should be utilizing television as an educational-tool. This is a vast, untapped resource which is eadily available to us. It is not my idea to eliminate a ingle teacher through the use of educational television. It

is my strong belief that we will be able to broaden our courses of study and the effectiveness of transmittal of ideas through the use of teachers who are master communicators, broadcasting on educational television. In every case, they will be complemented by on-the-spot classroom teachers. I strongly urge the House and Senate Education Committees, or a joint committee of the Assembly, to work with the Governor to continue a study of the opportunities and benefits that are available to us. Closed circuit educational television could well be the answer to expensive school consolidations by providing a broad and uniform curriculum of high excellence, not presently available to all the schools of our State — large, medium and small.

- 3. Increase in the Driver Education Program. Presently, Delaware is providing about 65% of the qualified students in high school with the opportunity to share in the Driver Education Training Program. I believe that when this program becomes available to the entire qualified student enrollment, a splendid step will be taken to reduce accidents, injuries and fatalities on our streets and highways. To attain this goal I have caused sufficient funds to be included in the Budget being presented to provide 100% participation in this important program by those qualified students.
- 4. Repair and Replacement of Capital Investment. During recent years the lack of attention given this problem has encouraged unsupervised appropriations. Our system of uniform appropriations to the districts is based on units of pupils. It is my belief that we should follow this practice except in cases of most extreme emergency. Routine maintenance and repair of our school buildings such as the replacement of glass, painting, and refinishing of floors should be kept up to date and should be paid out of the unit appropriation of ALL OTHER COSTS. Major capital replacements such as a new roof, a new heating plant, a new plumbing or electrical system, or structural repairs expected to last a generation should be financed outside of this unit appropriation. There will be enough money in the General Fund to carry out a program of capital repairs of schools during this calendar year. An Administration measure will be presented to cover these major capital replace-This will set forth guidelines for the expenditure of these funds and will provide for the supervision of this program by the State Board of Education. I urge your prompt passage of this legislation so that the State Board and the schools may take adequate preparaion for the installation of these capital replacements during the period the schools are closed down next summer.

Labor and Full Employment

Our employment problem, which had reached a critical point two years ago, has been substantially relieved by our expanding economy. Despite this progress there is, and will continue to be, a persistent core of unemployment resulting from automation and the technical revolution in industry.

The Governor's Committee on Training for Employment has been systematically studying the causes and solutions of unemployment, and helping to coordinate the activities of the State and Federal agencies having a responsibility in this field. A statewide area skill survey by the Employment Security Commission and the University of Delaware to determine the long-range training needs is nearly complete. In cooperation with the Federal Manpower Utilization Act, we are starting our first class this month to train chemist assistants. Additional courses should be initiated within the next few months. The Apprenticeship and Onthe-Job Training program has been overhauled to the fullest extent possible under the present law.

Our efforts in this area will be stepped up during the coming year. I support the Training Committee's recommendations for legislation to establish an Apprenticeship and Training Council under the State Department of Labor.

This Administration favors legislation which will establish a state minimum wage to cover many of the workers not under the jurisdiction of the Federal Wage and Hour Law, and which would eliminate the unnecessary waiting period required before a qualified unemployed person can collect benefits.

Highways and Flood Control

During the past year our reorganized State Highway Department has demonstrated that it has the will and the energy to efficiently and effectively carry out the broad, progressive highway program Delaware needs. We cannot afford to have the experiences of 1960 repeated in 1963. Federal matching funds for Delaware are waiting our action. Major traffic arteries in northern New Castle County are seriously overcrowded and need to be promptly supplemented. Some of our important highways have deteriorated to the point where reconstruction is urgently required. Our citizens are entitled to not only a continued, but a stepped-up and improved program of suburban street renewal.

The City of Wilmington is in the heart of Delaware's prosperity and industry. During the past seven years, wide areas on the eastern and western side of that City have been razed to provide for slum clearance and FAI-2, the new Freeway. As a result, population and the taxable base has de-

clined, posing a serious threat to the vigor and progress of this, the most important city of our State. To arrest further deterioration in the heart of this great Delaware metropolis, and to encourage business and redevelopment in that area, I urge that the completion date for FAI-2 be set for 1965 instead of 1967 as presently contemplated. This stepped-up program will require in the main, stepped-up appropriations. Our Highway Department has assured me that if the necessary funds are provided, the work can be completed by the stepped-up target date, albeit this would entail a tremendous effort on their part.

The State Highway Department will present a compreehnsive highway program bond bill in the near future. It is imperative that the Assembly give early and favorable consideration to this measure or to a similar measure with such modifications as the Assembly in its wisdom may deem necessary.

The rapid population boom in New Castle County has created drainage as well as traffic problems. During recent years the State Highway Department has, when directed by Act of the General Assembly, carried out or participated in a number of drainage projects not directly connected with highway work. Such Acts have not been comprehensive in coverage, nor provided for maintenance of the project after completion.

New Castle County has advanced to the point where it should assume the responsibility for storm drainage. The Delaware Code does not clearly assign this responsibility to either the State or the County. It is my belief, previously expressed and supported by the Levy Court of New Castle County, that our laws should be amended to designate the Levy Court as the agency responsible for storm drainage in New Castle County and to provide a method of financing this work.

Additional Legislative Program

The enactment of the following legislation is highly important to the progress of the people of our State, and I strongly urge you to take positive action on these items during the present session:

- 1. Authorization of a Personnel Department to provide job classification and uniform personnel policies for State employees;
- 2. Pass the first leg of a Constitutional Amendment to provide for zoning in Kent and Sussex Counties;
- 3. Authorize enabling legislation to provide for Delaware River and Bay Crossings when submitted by the new Delaware-New Jersey Crossing Authority. I strongly urge

that the authorization of a ferry crossing between Lewes and Cape May be vigorously supported, both by the new Authority and the Legislatures of Delaware and New Jersey;

- 4. Authority to our State Police to prevent the operation of highway vehicles which are emitting poisonous and noxious gasses into the atmosphere due to improper and inefficient combustion;
- 5. Provide whatever funds are deemed to be necessary in conjunction with Federal financing, to protect the shores and beaches of our valuable and highly regarded ocean and bay frontage;
- 6. Inter-State Compacts on: (a) the placement of children, (b) juveniles, (c) driver licenses, and (d) safety equipment;
- 7. The "Uniform Manual on Traffic Control Devices" as approved by the Delaware Highway Department;
- 8. Increase the ceiling presently over Old Age Assistance from \$75 per month to \$100 per month;
- 9. The proposed Bidding Laws drafted by the Governors Committee to improve and revise the present outmoded statutes;
- 10. The construction of a State Office Building to be located in the Poplar Street Redevelopment Project in Wilmington. This building would be one of a complex of Federal, State and City buildings in that area;
- 11. The construction of new State Office Buildings in the Dover area to provide space for a) the present occupants of the Old State House, and (b) the State Highway Department;
- 12. Restore our Old State House so that it can be preserved as a beloved and hallowed Historic Shrine for present and future generations;
- 13. The purchase of the Hope Building on the Dover Green for State offices;
- 14. Ratify the U. S. Constitutional Amendment to eliminate the payment of the Poll Tax as a requirement for voting in Federal elections;
- 15. The revision of Delaware's Election Laws, as recommended by the State Auditor, who is also the State Election Commissioner;
- 16. Provide for a financial accounting to the Secretary of State of all expendiutures over \$100 by the major political parties and candidates in all primaries and general elections;
- 17. A Leasing Law to provide for offshore leasing practices for the exploration of mineral and oil resources;
- 18. Funds to step up Delaware's Youth Fitness Program.

Our Employees and Executives

The opportunity to work with the thousands of people who are connected with our State as employees, executives, or as commissioners and board members, has to me been an experience full of inspiration and personal satisfaction.

I believe that our State employees are dedicated to the purpose of sincerely serving the people of our State in every area of their responsibility.

We are likewise indeed fortunate to have the splendid assistance of hundreds of talented and capable Delawareans who serve the State on its boards and commission, many of whom receive no compensation except the satisfaction of making their personal contribution to the successful operation of their State.

On behalf of a grateful Delaware, I express our warm thanks to all of these public servants for the splendid record they have made in the outstanding service they have given their State.

Conclusion

Delaware is moving forward. We are facing up to our problems and we are making a determined effort to find the answers to our perplexing questions.

Unemployment is on the wane. New, desirable industry is finding our State to be a good place in which to locate. The spirit of our people is good and we look forward to a future of greater opportunities and accomplishments.

We are endowed with few natural resources, but with great human resources. The most important contribution which our State can make to a successful future is to nurture, encourage and inspire our great human resources, the vibrant, vital and valiant people of our State.

May we, the people of Delaware, continue this forward progress, thankful for the many blessings which God has seen fit to shower upon us, ever seeking more light and understanding, and ever using this knowledge for the welfare and advancement of all humanity.

At 2:53 P.M., the previously named committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

Sen. Donovan moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compare their respective Journals.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compared their Journals found them to agree, and so notified the President.

Sen. Donovan moved the two House now separate to re-convene in their respective chambers. Motion prevailed.

At 3:48 P.M., the Speaker called the House to order.

Mr. Eskridge intorduced **HR 11**—"In Reference to Election of Officers".

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 122nd General Assembly of the State of Delaware that the following named person be and is hereby elected to the office appearing opposite his name:

It was given its first and only reading in its entirety.

It was regularly moved and seconded that HR 11 be adopted by voice vote. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Walter Pyle was sworn in by the Speaker as Assistant Chief Clerk.

SUBJECT: Report Requested Under Chapter 86, Volume 51, Laws of Delaware

Title 14, Section 5524 of Chapter 6, Volume 51, Laws of Delaware read as follows:

"Within a reasonable time after the end of each fiscal year the University officer responsible for the administration of Sections 5520-5524 of the Title shall submit through the appropriate University channels a written report to the General Assembly in which shall be outlined the number of grants given, the amount received by each student and an analysis of whether the aim of Sections 5520-5524 of the Title to eliminate economic need as a bar to an education at the University of Delaware has been accomplished."

The enclosure to this memorandum lists the 198 students who were awarded Delaware Right-to-Education Grants during 1961-62, the stipends they received, and gives other personal data about these students. A total of \$56,160.32 was expended for grants awarded for 1961-62. The appropriation by the General Assembly to support these grants amounted to \$57,000.00. The University refunded \$1,180.15 in Delaware Right-to-Education money to the State on July 5, 1962 as follows:

Unexpended balance from 1961-62 appropriation \$839.68

Payment by student for previous year's award Return from student accounts previous years 165.47

Title 14, Section 5524 calls for an "analysis of whether the aim of Sections 5520-5524 to eliminate economic need as a bar to education at the University of Delaware has been accomplished." This analysis follows.

The following points made in my reports dated July 28, 1958, October 9, 1959, December 28, 1960, and December 19, 1961 covering the Delaware Right-to-Education Grant programs for 1957-58, 1958-59, 1959-60, and 1960-61 respectively, are repeated here since they apply equally to the administration of this program during 1961-62:

- 1. Every effort has been made to administer this law fairly and strictly on the basis of the applicant's need. companying each application for aid completed by the student is a detailed form which must be filled out by the parents disclosing their income and liabilities, size of family, and other personal data. Several letters of reference are also called for. The University is in no position to perform an actual audit of the facts as returned on the applications and set forth in the letters of reference. Some people may be less than completely honest in providing the information. If this is at all obvious, further investigation is made and if substantiated, financial assistance is refused. The University conscientiously endeavors to determine financial need. It cannot always verify it. The costs in administrative time and money to do so would be beyond our resources. There is a question, too, whether any great financial outlay to do this would be either effective or justifiable.
- 2. The applications of all students selected for grants under this act show genuine financial need in accordance with well-established criteria accepted generally in American higher education. This need is attested to by statements made by references.
- 3. Since academic merit was not a consideration in making these awards, a number of marginal students whose records would not have entitled them to consideration for academic scholarships were awarded Delaware Right-to-Education Grants.

Fifteen per cent of the total recipients were dropped from the University for academic reasons. The corresponding figures for 1960-61, 1959-60, 1958-59, and 1957-58 were fourteen per cent, fifteen and one-half per cent, nineteen per cent, and fifteen per cent respectively.

An additional thirty-five percent of the total recipients experienced academic difficulty (placed on academic warning or academic probration) during the year, but their records were such that they were permitted to continue in attendance. The corresponding figures for 1960-61, 1959-60, 1958-59, and 1957-58 were fifteen per cent, twenty-one per cent, eighteen per cent, and twenty-two per cent respectively.

Four per cent of the total recipients withdrew voluntarily for personal reasons during the school year. These reasons include a lack of confidence, sometimes rightly conceived, in their ability to do creditable college work. During 1960-61, 1959-60, 1958-59, and 1957-58, the withdrawals among recipients of these grants totaled three per cent, two and seventenths per cent, five per cent, and eight per cent, respectively.

The Delaware Right-to-Education Fund, together with other scholarship, grant-in-aid, and loan funds, plus part-time work opportunities, has sufficiently eliminated economic need as a bar to an education at the University of Delaware for students who are residents of the State and whose parents are desirous of their undertaking higher education. Approximately one-half of the students assisted during 1960-61 through grants from the Delaware Right-to-Education Fund could not have qualified academically for other scholarships awarded on an academic merit-financial need basis. The remaining students aided from this fund could have competed for academic as well as financial need scholarships if money had been available for such other awards. JAP:vb

HCR 6—"Adopting Permanent Joint Rules for the 122nd General Assembly."

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein, that the joint rules in effect at the end of the 121st General Assembly are hereby adopted as the permanent joint rules for the House and Senate of the 122nd General Assembly, except that the following rules are to read:

Joint Rule 3.

Every bill and resolution to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Assembly may be necessary shall upon its final passage in both Houses be delivered by the Chief Clerk of the House and/or the Secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, in which such bill or resolution originated, into the custody of the Bill Clerk of said House and it shall be the duty of the Bill Clerk of the Senate and the Bill Clerk of the House of Representatives jointly to see that such bill or resolution has attached to it a proper parchment backing and that each and every page of the said bill or resolution has been properly initialed, sealed, or stamped, unless otherwise ordered, and upon being assured that such is the case, shall immediately, if the Houses be in session and, if not, at the earliest opportunity, present the said bill or resolution to the presiding officer of each House for his signature, the presiding officer of the House in which the bill or resolution originated signing first. Said Bill Clerks shall then certify with the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House on the backing of said bill or resolution that such bill or resolution is the same as that which passed both Houses of the General Assembly, and the said bill or resolution shall then be delivered by the Bill Clerk of the House in which such bill or resolution originated to the Chairman of the Committee on Passed Bills of said House. The Chairman of the Passed Bills Committee shall then deliver the bill to the Governor within 30 calendar days unless instructed otherwise by a concurrent resolution passed by both Houses.

Joint Rule 7.

The General Assembly may, by a concurrent resolution passed by both houses, request the return of a bill or resolution after it has been delivered to the Governor. The Governor may or may not return the bill at his option, but if he returns it, he shall deliver it to the Chairman of the Committee on Passed Bills of the House in which the bill originated and the Chairman shall retain the bill unless directed otherwise by a concurrent resolution passed by both Houses.

Mr. Phillips introduced **HCR 6**. It was given its first reading by title only and assigned to Committee on Rules.

HR 19—"Adopting Permanent Rules for the House of Representatives."

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 122nd General Assembly of the State of Delaware that the permanent Rules of Order of the House of Representatives of the 121st General Assembly are hereby adopted as the permanent rules of this House except that the following rules are to read as follows:

Rule 8.

He may name a member to perform the duties of presiding officer, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment, except when the Speaker obtains leave of absence, in which case he may depute a member as Speaker Pro Tempore during such leave, which leave shall not exceed five legislative days.

Rule 23.

- (a) Every bill and resolution shall be introduced with an original and at least eight backed copies, the copies shall be marked "duplicate" At all times every bill and resolution shall be under the general supervision of the Clerk of the House. Until its passage by the House, the original copy of every bill and resolution shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chairman of the committee to which it was referred or the Clerk of the House. The original of all bills and resolutions shall be either printed, or stenciled on permanent rag content bond paper and backed and no erasures or interlineations shall be allowed. They shall be produced in such manner as shall be approved by the State Archivist and the Executive Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau.
- (b) In addition to the backed copies each member shall be provided with a true copy of the bill or resolution at the time of introduction.

- (c) The stencil used to produce the bill or resolution (except in case of printed bills or resolutions), together with 150 true copies of the bill or resolution, shall be made available to the Legislative Reference Bureau immediately after the introduction of a bill.
- (d) Every bill and resolution shall be first submitted to the Executive Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau or the House Attorneys for their comments before introduction.

Rule 44.

The rules of the House shall not be changed or suspended except by a vote of a constitutional majority of the members unless these rules otherwise provide, but in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these rules, the rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall govern the House.

Rule 47.

Any equipment or tapes used to record the proceedings of the House shall be under the control and custody oof the Rules Committee.

WHEREAS, some representatives of the Mental Health Association of Delaware and the Governor's Advisory Committee to the State Board of Trustees objected to the Fernhook location, citing the possibility of 'stigma' because of the nearness to the State Hospital and, further urging that Clinic services should be available within the City of Wilmington; and

WHEREAS, the Board studied such objections thoughtfully and twice met with representatives of the Mental Health Association of Delaware, and once with the executive committee of the Governor's Advisory Committee, in a sincere effort to bring about mutual accord and understanding; and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Trustees did establish a full time Clinic for the people of the City of Wilmington, at 12th and Walnut Streets in mid-city, and opened such Clinic on January 7, 1963; and

WHEREAS, the members of the General Assembly upon visiting the Delaware State Hospital on January 23, 1963, inspected the proposed location of the authorized headquarters building; and

WHEREAS, in the minds of the members of the General Assembly, the idea of 'stigma' by proximity to the State institution for the mentally ill is a great injustice to those in need of its special care and, wherever this opinion still exists, the true service would be to work vigorously to change such misconception, rather than encourage it by such artificial device as demanding distance between the State institution and Mental Hygiene Clinic Headquarters; and

WHEREAS, the time for erection of the State Headquarters for Mental Hygiene Clinics and Lower New Castle County Therapeutic and Diagnostic facility is limited; and

WHEREAS, the members of the General Assembly feel that the majority of the people will endorse the decision of the State Board of Trustees, which is composed of four physicians, one dentist and four men and women who are recognized throughout the State as being mindful of, and active in meeting, community needs:

NOW THEREFORE:

Assembly of the State of Delaware, the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the General Assembly approves the decision of the State Board of Trustees in regard to the selection of the location for the State Headquarters for Mental Hygiene Clinics and Lower New Castle County Therapeutic and Diagnostic Clinic and encourages the State Board of Trustees to proceed with the erection of the above building as soon as possible.

Mr. Downs introduced **HA 1** to **SB 44**. It was given its first and only reading in its entirety. It was regularly moved and seconded that **HA 1** to **SB 44** be adopted by voice vote. The motion prevailed.

The following Committee Report was given as follows:

SB 44—Public Buildings and Highways, 4 favorable.

Mr. Annett introduced HA 1 to HB 141. It was given its first and only reading in its entirety. It was regularly moved and seconded that HA 1 to HB 141 be placed with the bill. The motion prevailed.

At 2:22 P.M. it was regularly moved and seconded that the House recess to the call of the chair. The motion prevailed by voice vote.

At 4:45 P.M. the Speaker called the House to order.

SS 1 to SB 1 was given its first reading by title only and assigned to the Committee on Revised Statutes.

SS 1 for SB 1—"An Act to Amend Titles 9, 10 and 12, Delaware Code by Increasing the Salary of the Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, Comptroller, Levy Court Commissioners, Recorder of Deeds, Receiver of Taxes, Prothonotary, Sheriff, Register in Chancery, Clerk of The Orphans' Court, Members

of the Board of Assessment and Register of Wills in and For Sussex County."

Mr. Younger introduced **HA 1** to **HB 90**. It was given its first and only reading in its entirety. It was regularly moved and seconded that **HA 1** to **HB 90** be placed with the bill. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Eskridge introduced **HA 1** to **HB 125**. It was given its first and only reading in its entirety. It was regularly moved and seconded that **HA 1** to **HB 125** be adopted by voice vote. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Eskridge introduced **HB 164**. It was given its first reading by title only and assigned to the Committee on Revised Statutes.

WHEREAS, the monthly reports prepared by the Permanent Budget Commission for the use of the members of the General Assembly and the state officials are helpful but not fully informative, and

WHEREAS, these reports do not provide all of the information that members of the General Assembly need to vote intelligently on legislation dealing with appropriations, and

WHEREAS, the members of the House will soon have the heavy responsibility of considering the General Appropriation Bill for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1963, and

WHEREAS, it is of the utmost importance that the financial condition of Delaware be fully disclosed to the members of the House and the Senate of the 122nd General Assembly,

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the House of Representatives of the 122nd General Assembly request the Governor of the State of Delaware to make available to the House of Representatives the latest balance sheet with a forecast concerning the outlook for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1963,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Honorable Governor of the State of Delaware be requested to make this information available on or before April 15, 1963.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the roll call on

HR 38 be laid on the table.

Mr. Younger introduced **HB 165**. It was given its first reading by title only and assigned to the Committee on Revenue and Taxation.

HB 165—"An Act to Amend Section 8002 (b) Title 9, Delaware Code so as to Limit the Tax Rate for New Castle County to Forty-Five Cents (\$.45) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of Assessed Valuation."

Mr. Wootten introduced **HR 39**. It was given its first and only reading in its entirety. It was regularly moved and seconded that **HR 39** be adopted by voice vote. The motion prevailed.

HR 39—"Expressing the Best Wishes of the House of Representatives of the 122nd General Assembly to Representative W. Carlton Clifton on his Birthday."
