#### 27TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

The House met pursuant to adjournment at 1:15 P.M. on Monday, March 23, 1959.

Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Harry L. Mayfield.

The President of the Senate introduced Governor Boggs who introduced the Speaker, Dr. Robert C. Anderson, who delivered the following address.

Address to a Joint Session of the Delaware General Assembly

by Dr. Rober C. Anderson, Director Southern Regional Education Board March 23, 1959, Dover, Delaware

Ten years ago a very happy marriage took place. A group of Southern governors signed the Southern Regional Education Compact on the theory that 16 could live cheaper than one. Not only cheaper, but better as far as higher education was concerned.

This was what you might call a marriage of convenience. After World War II there was a great demand in the South for professional, technical and graduate education. An expanding economy required larger and better educational facilities.

Realizing this, the Southern states decided that marriage was the only answer—that the states of the South must pool and share their resources in order to provide more and better education for every educational dollar spent.

The efforts of the governors resulted in the signing of the Southern Regional Education Compact. In 1955 the General Assembly of Delaware ratified that legal document which created a central agency, now supported by 16 Southern states, to help the states of the South work together to improve higher education and the economy of the region. The states party to the Compact comprise the full membership of the Southern Governors' Conference which was the birth place for the idea of regional cooperation in higher education.

The goal of this agency—the Southern Regional Education Board—is to improve higher education and to avoid unnecessary duplication: to save time, money and energy while increasing educational opportunities for the youth of

sixteen states.

Thus through this interstate agreement, Delaware and other states in the region can rely on the educational facilities of their neighbor states instead of trying to provide every kind and type of higher education within their own borders.

The money saved by this sharing enables a state to improve the quality of the graduate and professional programs it has already has, to expand these programs, or to establish new ones which do not exist elsewhere.

In the early days of the SREB, cooperation between the states was limited to sharing the use of established schools of veterinary medicine, dentistry, medicine and social work. Later as the program grew, the states began to work with the Board and other states in joint planning of educational programs. The states also began to encourage research and states studies of general problems in higher education, such as faculty shortage, and research in more specific fields like mental health, forestry, and nursing.

Today these states are using the regional approach more and more in attempting to solve the problems which face all of our colleges and universities: problems of making the best possible use of higher educational institutions so that each state can meet the growing demands for many types of skilled personnel.

As it completes its first decade of service to the region, the SREB is active in over 30 academic fields which are of special significance to the development of the South.

And now, let me review for you briefly the specific role of each state in the organization and administration of the Southern Regional Education Board.

Each of the 16 participating states contributes \$20,000

annually for the support and operation of the Board. In addition, the states appropriate certain amounts from time to time for specific projects and contracts. It is our hope that you will once again provide for Delaware's participation in the program at this session of the legislature.

The Board has also received some very generous grants from private foundations which have helped it to undertake research projects and sponsor fellowships in research on problems of higher education. Currently SREB has an annual operating budget of approximately \$750,000.

Governor Caleb Boggs and the governors of the other 15 participating states are members of the Board. Each Governor appoints four other members to the Board—including one educator and legislator. Thus each state has five representatives on the Board.

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, the Southern Regional Education Board has been sincerely flattered twice. Both the Western and New England states have adopted regional compacts similar to the one we have in the South, and today 35 states are being served by this type of interstate agency for higher education. As a member of the Southern Governors' Conference, the SREB was the logicial agency for your state to affiliate with.

Now let us consider for a moment what the Board does not do. The SREB has no coercive power over any state or any college. It does not accredit colleges. It does not and cannot force any state or college to take any course of action. The Board's job is simply to make it easier for states and universities to cooperate and work together if they want to do so. The Board helps the states to do things they cannot easily do for themselves. Its aim is to encourage a balanced growth of higher education in the region, with each college and university playing its own distinctive role.

How does the Board translate this aim into action?

I think you can better understand the services SREB offers Delaware and other participating states if we take a few minutes to look at a film released recently by the Board. Narrated by United States Senator Lister Hill of Alabama, this film describes the present activities and services of the Board and also gives some of the background for establishing the organization.

# (SHOW FILM — 15 MINUTES — COLOR AND SOUND)

I believe that you will agree that Senator Hill has done a very good job of showing how the SREB can serve Delaware and the other states of the region.

Now lets take a closer look at the SREB services available to Delaware, the use the state has made of these ser-

vices and the programs you may wish to consider during the years ahead.

As Senator Hill pointed out in the film, the Board offers to Delaware student places in medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine and social work. Under present contracts with SREB, universities reserve places for about 1,000 students a year in these key fields. States using the contract program are able to provide education for these students at a fraction of the cost required to build and maintain such expensive professional schools.

Thus far Delaware has made no use of the regional contract programs, although it lacks schools in each of these fields. This is one way Delaware could utilize the medical schools of neighboring states in the Southern Regional Education Compact for the young men and women who are anxious to obtain a medical education but are unable to enter various medical schools. The same thing applies to the other specialities for which your institutions of higher learning do not have facilities. Futhermore, under the Compact, the Southern Regional Education Board has the authority to enter into regional cantracts for Delaware students in other fields if requested to do so. Certainly your state may find that contracts are needed to hold places for students in the future when large student enrollments will require many institutions to limit out-of-state enrollments.

I think this is of particular importance to your state when you realize that the last survey by the U. S. Office of Education on migration of students showed that 43.7 per cent of Delaware's students attended institutions of higher education outside the state. This is the highest percentage of migration in our 16-state region and is the second highest among the states of the notion. The nation-wide average is only 20 percent.

Looking further at the U. S. Office figures, you will find that 49.8 per cent of Delaware's graduate students go outside the state for their education.

This survey showed that one out of four of Delaware's students leaving the state attended institutions in the South. Even more impressive is the fact that 65.7 per cent of the outmigrants attending public institutions went to school in the region served by the SREB. The survey also showed that 46.9 per cent of the graduate students leaving Delaware enrolled in schools located in the South.

The Board also offers other cooperative programs you should consider in providing the youth of this great state with full opportunities for obtaining higher education in fields not now available in the state. These include using SREB to administer scholarship plans of student aid in fields not offered by the state's university. An example of this type of

arrangement is the present student aid program the state of Tennessee has in offering out-of-state training to its young citizens in forestry and architecture—two important professions not offered in the state.

Still another example of cooperation is the SREB's program in graduate nursing education. Not so long ago there were no graduate nursing programs in the region. The Schools of Nursing got together through the SREB to start graduate programs in six universities in the region. They have done so, and the colleges of nursing meet periodically to talk about ways of achieving the best possible education for our nurses.

Two Delaware students graduated last year from the new master's degree program in psychiatric nursing at the University of Maryland. Students from Delaware are enrolled in this program at the present time.

Another good example of benefits a state can derive from the SREB took place a few years ago when several colleges in the South decided they needed summer courses in special phases of statistic to supplement their courses. None of the colleges could assemble enough faculty without outside help, so they turned to the SREB for assistance.

SREB sponsored a conference of representatives from all the statistics programs in the South to discuss a series of summer courses which would benefit all colleges in the region. That series of courses is going on now, using faculty members from all the schools with each campus in turn being host for the course.

In the highly specialized field of city planning a similar series of summer courses was sponsored.

This summer 13 land-grant colleges and universities in the region are sponsoring a summer graduate session in nematology at North Carolina State University. Nematology is a highly specialized science dedicated to the study of small deadly round-worms which destroy countless dollars worth of crops. Specialists are urgently needed to help wipe out this destructive worm, but no school in the region has enough instructors to teach a graduate course.

With the help of the SREB, these colleges combined forces to invite expert nematologists from England, Holland, Japan, Canada and the United States to teach graduate students from each of the 13 participating schools at the session this summer. Not only have experts been brought in, but the SREB has seen to it that graduate students attending these sessions will have their expenses paid by the National Science Foundation.

In 1954 the Southern Governors' Conference urged the SREB to establish the Council on Mental Health Training and Research to function within the framework of the Board. The

need for this type of activity was clearly shown in a year of self-study by the states of the region, including Delaware, on the status of their mental health needs and facilities.

As you know, the state pays an additional \$8,000 per year for the support of the SREB mental health program. Delaware is ably represented on the program's advisory council by Dr. M. A. Tarumianz, Superintendent of the Delaware State Hospital.

In keeping with the survey findings this program concentrates on the fundamental problem of improving training and research rather than facilities. However where it is clear that training and research cannot be improved because the necessary schools and hospitals are not available or adequate, the SREB mental health unit will assist with the improvement of these institutions.

Your state is currently taking part in the mental health program's region-wide survey of mental health research to find out what research is being done (or **not** done) and what funds and facilities are available for doing it.

Delaware should also take advantage of the mental health program's in-service grants provided under a \$90,000 grant to the SREB from the National Institutes of Mental Health. These grants permit people working in Delaware's mental hospitals or institutions for the retarded to visit other hospitals anywhere in the country to observe new ways of doing their jobs more effectively. To date no Delaware mental health workers have applied for one of these grants.

Steps being taken under the mental health program will increase the number of psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers and nurses who will help Delaware as well as the other cooperating states.

As I mentioned earlier, the Board has conducted regional studies to determine whether states need to build additional graduate and professional schools, or depend on schools in other states within the region. Studies have been completed in architecture, veterinary medicine, recreation, public health, dentistry, forestry, graduate programs, mental health, foreign affairs and government. Copies of these completed studies are available for your use.

The Board has also helped with state studies at the request of individual states. SREB staff members have assisted in surveys of higher education in Florida, Louisiana, Tennessee and Alabama. It has just been asked to supervise a survey on the needs of higher education in the state of Virginia. The Board has supplied information to assist in surveys of higher education made in Arkansas and Kentucky. It has given information on needs for schools to a number of states: for example, medical schools in Florida and Kentucky; library and

social work schools in Maryland; forestry schools in Mississippi, South Carolina and Virginia.

Although Delaware has not requested assistance on state studies, the Board stands ready and willing to assist in any such undertaking you may plan in the future. This is a part of SREB's service to your state.

Under its research program the Board conducts university studies of problems common to institutions in the region. To carry out this program, the research program is currently supported by a five-year grant of \$450,000 from the Carnegie Corporation.

Studies have been made on projected enrollments, showing the number of college and university students to expect by 1970; bases for financing of higher education what attracts faculty members to teaching; how universities may increase their effectiveness through self-study.

Results of these research projects are available to Delaware for such use as it wishes to make. Representatives of the University have been invited to attend, at SREB expense, seminars held in connection with these studies.

Another service of the Board has been to encourage foundations to grant funds directly to universities undertaking regional programs. Grants of this type include \$600,000 for graduate programs in nursing at six universities and \$50,000 for a program for teachers of blind children at Peabody College. Over the past decade, SREB itself has received about \$1,500,000 from non-state sources for use with states and universities in making studies and initiating programs.

Delaware can benefit from non-state funds that have sponsored universities studies, graduate education in nursing and the in-service training grants in mental health. Your state has not yet received non-state funds for development of program like graduate education in nursing, where foundations made grants directly to universities to help them start programs made under regional agreements.

One Board group program I am sure many of you are familiar with is the SREB Legislative Advisory Council, which is composed of one member of the House and Senate from the legislature of each participating state. The Council advises the Board on legislative matters and serves as the steering committee for the annual region-wide Legislative Work Conference. Your legislature is ably represented on this council by Senator Wilmer Williams and Representative Charles C. King, and also sent legislators to the 1958 Work Conference at Charleston, South Carolina last August.

This unique activity of the Board brings together legislative leaders and educators for a work-study meeting which has been described as "the only regional forum for the shar-

ing of ideas among legislators and educators."

Thus you see a sample of the services avaliable to your state through the SREB and the use which Delaware has made of these services. It is certainly obvious that Delaware has not used SREB services as fully as have some other compact states, but it seems clear that Delaware has derived some very concrete benefits from the program. These could be increased and broadened, if you wish to take advantage of them.

As legislators and interested citizens, I know that you realize that this is a time of crisis so far as our public higher education institutions are concerned. They are faced with the prospect of tripled enrollment by 1970. In all probabilities by 1970 the public higher institutions of the region will be called on to provide for three times as many students as they had enrolled in 1955 when Delaware approved the Southern Regional Education Compact.

The demands which this inevitable expansion of higher education will place on each state may seem overwhelming. Yet I am convinced that Delaware and the other states of the region can and will meet them. I am also convinced that we shall need every bit of ingenuity and every ounce of consecrated effort in order to do it. We can no longer afford to do just what we have been doing and hope for the best. We must do whatever we can to make sure that the best that can happen will happen.

The Southern Regional Education Board can help you solve some of these problems. As I have pointed out, its aim is to assist states and universities to advance knowledge and to raise the social and economic level of the region. Its method is cooperation — cooperation in planning and cooperation in programs — without regard to state lines. Are you prepared to fully utilize this instrument of regional planning and cooperation in higher education?

Instead of merely a "do-it-yourself" program, the SREB provides a "help-each-other-do-it" program. The Board helps states and institutions to see and do what each can do best. It then helps states and universities to fit these "bests" together across the region so that somewhere in this 16-state area there is provided what we need in the amount we need it. no more and no less.

Of course, all these problems cannot be solved entirely by a regional approach but through this type of cooperation over the past decade we have solved and reduced many of the problems confronting the states of the region.

It is true that Delaware is not usually considered to be a Southern state. Certainly your state does not share many of the characteristics of the states of the deep South. However, your state has much in common with your next-door neighbor, Maryland, one of the original member states of the Southern compact. Geographically, Delaware is no further "north" than is Maryland.

So far as higher education is concerned, Delaware faces the same kinds of problems as Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, and other states to the South. As far as educational organizations are concerned, Delaware is not a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, which includes most of the states to the South. But then neither is Oklahoma, nor Arkansas, nor Maryland, nor West Virginia, all actively participating states in the Southern Regional Educational Compact. Your state is a member state of the Southern Governors' Conference and your Governors have been active in the affairs of that organization.

If you are interested in the advantages of a regional compact program in higher education, your interest must be in the Southern compact. No other such program is available to you a tthe present time. All of the states of the union, except your immediate neighbors to the North and the 12 midwestern states are party to similar compacts. But populous and self-sufficient Pennsylvania and New York, and the less-sufficient, educationally speaking, State of New Jersey, do not have such a regional program.

It is my hope that you will continue, for the next few years at least, membership in the Southern Regional Education Compact. During the next year, if you wish, we will be glad to send staff members and consultants of the Board to Delaware to sit down with officials of this state and of your educational institutions, to develop a plan for Delaware's full participation in the compact program and full use of its facilities.

As you face a future which is filled with problems of tremendous significance for higher education, I know that you will search for those solutions which have the greatest meaning for your state and for the region. In this search, I urge you to use the SREB as a proven instrument of educational progress.

# STATE OF DELAWARE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Dover

March 25, 1959

To the House of Representatives of the 120th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

In my message to the General Assembly on January 8, 1959, I promised to make additional, detailed recommendations on Delaware's voting and election laws. Since early January, an extensive study of these important matters has been conducted at my direction.

We must establish fair election laws for the citizens of this State. These laws must be fair in providing voting opportunities through a modern registration system, fair in providing absentee voting rights, fair in establishing proper safeguards for election results, fair in apportioning the costs of of elections, and fair in providing an opportunity for citizens to review and contest an election.

As in many other areas, Delaware is operating with out-dated voting and election procedures. The right to vote is a fundamental and cherished freedom of each citizen. This freedom must not be destroyed by the existence of faulty voting laws or procedures. The last general election in 1958 demonstrated clearly the inadequacies and injustices of our present voting system, the opportunities for extremely close elections with a comparatively small population, and the pressing need for major reforms.

In the movement of our population in Delaware from city to suburbs, from county to county, and from one residential area to another, our antiquated registration laws have created many difficulties for individual voters and in some cases people have been prevented from voting. The votes of a sizeable number of citizens have been cancelled by unfortunate regulations of the absentee voting law. Many absentee ballots were thrown out on technicalities in the 1958 election.

Another important reason to modernize voting and election laws in the possibility of close elections in our small state. Last year, the election of Delaware's one United States Representative was decided by less than 700 votes—two votes per election district. The State Treasurer was elected by only 495 votes. One State Senator won by 70 votes. Six State Representatives out of 35 won by less than 150 votes. One member of the New Castle County Levy Court won by 440 votes. These close elections underscore the need for immediate enactment of adequate voting safe-guards to insure that the will of the people will be served.

Fair election laws must be soundly based on at least three basic principles:

First, the opportunity to vote should be made conveniently available to the maximum number of citizens;

Second, a correct and honest voting system must be enforced;

Third, state-wide uniformity in election procedures is essential to avoid confusion and injustices, but the administration of election laws must be kept as close to the people as possible to insure a rapid, economical and efficient election system.

In view of the glaring deficiencies that exist in our election laws, I strongly recommend that the General Assembly take immediate action to bring far-reaching election reforms in the following categories: registration rules, absentee voting privileges, election costs and administration, and voting safeguards.

# I. Better Registration Rules

Registration is a basic requirement for every person who wishes to exercise the right to vote. It is important that we take the following action to create better and easier registration rules for our citizens:

- 1. Issue voter identification cards to everyone who registers. Identification cards will make it easier to transfer voters who move from one district to another. This measure has already been passed, I am happy to say.
- 2. Repeal the law requiring the Department of Elections to send the applicant for a transfer notice of the transfer of registration.
- 3. Increase the number of registration days to make sure everyone has an opportunity to register.
- 4. Enact a Constitutional amendment to enable a voter who moves from one election district to another to vote in his previous election district if he has not established residency requirements in his new election district.
- 5. Remove from the registration lists the names of persons who have not voted in two consecutive general elections. There have been many complaints concerning the retention of names of deceased persons and persons who have moved out of the state.
- 6. Prepare lists of registered voters for county chairmen.
- 7. Appoint the Attorney General to determine, at the request of election departments, the names of deceased voters. In the past, it has been difficult to make this determination from information provided by the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

# II. Adequate Absentee Voting Procedures

The General Assembly should take immediate steps to

establish adequate absentee voting privileges for residents of Delaware who are required to be out of the state at election time. In addition, we should establish procedures which will guarantee that absentee ballots properly cast by citizens will not be tossed out on some minor technicality. The following improvements in absentee voting rights should be enacted without delay:

- 1. Provide absentee registration and voting privileges for members of the Armed Forces and their dependents and for other persons whose work with the Armed Forces keeps them out of the state. This improvement has been advocated by military officials and is long overdue. It will have special meaning for many of our young men in Delaware who may be called into military service at the time they are first eligible to vote.
- 2. Repeal the part of the absentee voting law which requires county election clerks to sign the absentee ballot envelope in order that it may be counted. In the last election, Sussex County election clerks failed to sign the envelopes and a substantial number of votes were destroyed through no fault of the person casting the vote. This situation must not continue.
- 3. Provide that the Certificate of the Vote shall contain the number of absentee ballots cast for each candidate in an election.
- 4. Improve the handling of requests for absentee ballots and other communications by recording the date and time they are received. There have been past difficulties in this area.

# III. Improved Administration and Allocation of Costs of Elections

The administration of our election laws can be materially improved in several respects, and it is important that this administration remain as close to the people as possible, at the county and local level of government rather than at the state level. There is no sound reason to continue the administration of these laws at Dover and the State Auditor who is the present State Elections Commissioner has neither the time nor the facilities to carry out his election reponsibilities. Also, the costs of conducting elections should be placed at the county and local levels. Therefore, I urge the General Assembly to enact the following legislation:

1. Abolish the State Department of Elections and assign the administration and costs of elections to the City of Wilmington and the Levy Courts of each County. This should improve the conduct of our elections and save the state government nearly a half million dollars each biennium. 2. Require that expenses of individual Departments of Elections should be paid only after approval of the Department.

3. Require that each Department of Elections should

meet at least once a month to conduct its business.

4. Limit merger of election districts to those districts where there were less than 300 voters in the district at the last election and it must be accomplished on or before the first of May in the year in which an election is to be held.

# IV. Stronger Election Safeguards

The last election in November, 1958, pointed up the short-comings in present procedures to provide citizens with a real opportunity to determine the possibilty of fraud or error in voting results. The Supreme Court determined that any complaints about an election had to be presented by one O'clock of the day that the Court convened. Apparently, this procedure has been established by custom. Also, following last year's general election, it was found that proper protection of voting machines containing election results was not enforced. With these problems in mind, the following action is recommended:

- 1. Provide that complaints under oath of fraud or mistake in an election shall be filed with the Court within 24 hours after the Court determined the state of election in an election district. This will give citizens a real opportunity to be heard and establishes a time limit by law.
- 2. Establish proper procedures and the necessary enforcement to protect voting machines containing election results following the election.

These are the principal improvements which must be made if Delaware citizens are to have a body of fair election laws. The recommendations have been compiled as a coordinated, overall program of election reform, and bills incorporating many of these points have been introduced.

It is my hope that the General Assembly will act favor-

ably on this program.

# STATE OF DELAWARE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

April 28, 1959

To the House of Representatives of the 120th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On April 17, 1959, I receiver House Bill No. 75, entitled: AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE METHOD OF COMPUTING THE PENSION OF JENNIE C. JOHNSON, WIDOW OF A DECEASED EMPLOYEE OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE.

I respectively return herewith this Bill without my approval.

This Bill would change the present method of computing the pension of a widow of a deceased employee of the State of Delaware. As the Pension Law now stands, a surviving spouse of a state pensioner receives one-half of the amount of the pension to which the primary pensioner was entitled.

This Bill is returned without my approval for the follow-

ing reasons:

- (1) The present Pension Law applies to all primary and secondary pensioners in the same manner. To change it for the benefit of one person would place all other state pensioners and future state pensioners in an inequitable position.
- (2) While the cost to the State of this individual case may amount to about only \$3,000.00, on the basis of present inquiry it is not known what the utimate cost to the State would be if this same type of legislation were applied to all pensioners.

- (2) The impressive record of good administration and progress under the present system should be encouraged rather than arbitrarily switched to the uncertainty of an elective system likely to be switched back under the local option referendum provision. Such uncertainty and resulting unrest could have nothing but a harm effect upon the proper administration of this school.

The Governor delivered the following message to the Joint Session.

Mr. President
Mr. Speaker
Members of the One

Members of the One Hundred and Twentieth General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

The citizens of Delaware are paying a high price in taxes and inadequate services for an antiquated, inefficient, sprawling state government. The government consists of about 100 separate agencies, boards, and commissions, which are far removed from the people. The duties of these agencies often conflict, their expenditures often overlap, and their operating heads cannot be directly responsible to the citizens. There is built into the system a lack of direction, coordination, and cooperation.

It is for this reason that I firmly believe we must take bold and decisive action to carry out a full-scale reorganization of the present government in Delaware into a system that can provide better services, greater efficiency, lower costs, and bring government closer to the people.

This message is designed to outline the first step in this reorganization or reform program which can update and modernize the overgrown and inefficient system we are now operating in Dover.

There will always be some persons who attack any governmental reorganization as a means of increasing political power. Let us erase any such thoughts right at the start. I strongly recommend that the changes to be proposed become effective July 1, 1961. My term as Governor will expire about seven months prior to that date, and I am not eligible under the Constitution to seek another term. Obviously I cannot personally benefit from them. Furthermore, a general election will be held next year, and neither party can know whether Republicans or Democrats will be in office at the time this governmental reform becomes effective. Therefore, the benefits derived from this reorganization will be for the people of this state, and not for either political party.

I have been personally studying the present structure of our state government and, having served two terms as Governor, I believe I can speak with some feeling about the strangling effects of our present cumbersome system. I am planning to submit a series of reorganization plans to bring about modern government in Delaware. As each individual plan is ready, I shall make it public. If the legislature is not in session, I will have bills prepared and ready for delivery to the General Assembly at its very next session. The legislature will have ample time to study the plans, sample public opinion, then act when they are again in session. It is my firm conviction that the people will not tolerate any longer this inefficient government organization.

In the message which I presented to the General Assembly at the beginning of this session in January, I outlined the two fundamental and pressing governmental problems which confront Delaware. The first problem is the critical financial situation, which includes a heavy deficit for the present fiscal year, the complete absence of efficient budget controls, and the failure to provide a long-range, realistic revenue structure for future state needs. Appropriate recommendations were made again to head off financial chaos through a balanced budget, a new Department of Finance, and a top-to-bottom revenue study.

The second basic problem is the futile attempt to meet adequately the demands of our people for state services with

an ancient governmental structure.

The recommendations I made in January are designed to help create a new day for Delaware. These new proposals for governmental reorganization might be considered a second phase, a Part II, of the new day for Delaware program.

Our system of government in the United States rests on three equal but separate branches; the Legislative branch which has the power to make the laws by which we live; the Executive branch which is responsible for administering those laws; and the Judiciary which has the duty to administer justice under the laws.

Today, in Delaware, the operation of the Executive branch of the government cannot be truly responsible to the people because it is not under the administrative direction of the Governor who is elected as the chief executive of the state. All of the 100 agencies are in reality operated independently. About seventy agencies are run by commissions or boards over whom there is little or no control provided by law. Hence we have a government-by-commission in this state.

As a matter of comparison, the nation's most populous state, New York, has a maximum of nineteen departments all of which are responsive to the direction and leadership of the Governor and are really responsible through him to the people.

I believe that the people elect a Governor with the thought that this one man can be held accountable for the operation of the Executive branch of the state government according to the laws which are established by the legislature. Further, I believe our citizens elect a Governor who is expected to carry out the program which he has proposed. Our Constitution says, "The supreme executive powers of the State shall be vested in the Governor."

In Delaware, however, the Governor has very little, if any chance to direct the activities of the Executive branch of the government. He is blocked in attempting to carry out any program. A Democratic Governor and a Republican legislature in 1949 recognized this situation and had an extensive study made by a bi-partisan commission and a professional consulting firm. Concrete recommendations were made in 1950 for reorganizing the government but both Republican and Democratic legislatures have completely ignored this pressing problem.

I do not mean to infer that the people who are appointed to operate our 100 agencies are doing a poor job. I believe that almost all of them are doing a good job, an outstanding one in many instances. Regardless of the caliber of the people heading our agencies, Delaware's government is run by several hundred people, over whom the citizens have no effective control through the Governor. Over the years, our government has been moved farther and farther from our citizens. Also, through the lack of coordination and central administration in our system there is ever present the risk of inefficiency, duplication of activities, lack of attention to certain important problems, waste, and an absence of planning.

In the January message to the legislature, I recommended the first step in reorganizing the Executive branch of the government. I asked that the present Highway Department be reorganized into a Department of Public Works. A special message was promised to spell out the details of such a reorganization plan.

It seems to me that the Highway Department is a sensible and logical place to begin our streamlining efforts. It is an agency that spends over \$30,000,000 a year. It is an agency which is vitally important to the progress of our citizens. It has about 1,400 employees scattered throughout the state. Most important of all, it is in real need of reorganization because it now contains many activities that do not have any direct relationship to its primary responsibility of building and maintaining highways and some of the other public works in the state.

Specifically, it is recommended that a Department of Public Works be established to take over functions of the present Highway Department and appropriate legislation has been prepared to carry out this recommendation.

This legislation will be introduced immediately and I respectfully recommend that each member of the legislature devote careful study to the bill, the details of its provisions, the reorganization concept, and also seek the advice of his constituents.

The new department would have the following responsibilities: (1) to provide the planning, design, contracting, construction and maintenance of all public works in the state such as buildings, highways, bridges, and interstate highway.

facilities; (2) to provide a central service for all state engineering needs; (3) to insure close budgetary and administrative control of all these activities; and (4) to perform the present functions of the State Board of Housing, the Buildings and Grounds Commission, the State Custodian, and the Interstate Highway Division.

To carry out its assigned responsibilities, the Department of Public Works would have a director appointed by Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The director would be paid \$17,500 a year in order that a man of high caliber could be attracted to the jobhe. The Director should serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

I propose a department which will have six permanent divisions. The division managers will be appointed by the department director and will receive not more than \$12,500 a year. The Engineering Division would provide the central service for engineering required by all state agencies. At the present time, we require the services of highway engineers, sanitary engineers, drainage engineers, water pollution, air pollution and survey engineers. This central engineering division would provide the design and engineering work for all public works and for all other activities of government in need of engineering assistance.

The Highway Division would plan, supervise the construction of, and maintain the state's highway system. It would also have the responsibility for developing and administering our part of the interstate highway program.

The Buildings Division would administer the present activities of the Buildings and Grounds Commission, which is now a separate state agency. It would administer the maintenance programs for all state buildings, allocate space for government activities, plan for additional space requirements, and serve in an advisory and planning capacity for school construction where needed.

The Housing Division would take over the present functions of the State Board of Housing which is designed to implement public housing plans initiated by the Federal Government and to administer state housing programs whenever they are indicated.

The Contracting Division will be responsible for preparing, negotiating, and letting all contracts for work to be conducted by the department for itself or for other state agencies. This division will be staffed by men who are thoroughly familiar with the problems of contracting work, and it will guarantee performance under contracts through testing, inspection, and contract supervision, in conjunction with other personnel.

The Administration and Control Division will provide the so-called housekeeping functions of the entire department and

will provide close control of all expenditures under the budget appropriated for the department by the General Assembly.

There will be a Division of Temporary Services. This division will provide the means of continuing other activities of the present Highway Department, including the State Police, Motor fuel tax collection, public lands, motor vehicle registration, mosquito control, and communications, until they are transferred to other new departments to be recommended shortly. Since no reorganization plan is to take effect before July 1, 1961, it is hoped that reorganization of the entire executive branch of the government will be completed by that time.

A final organizational feature of the new Department of Public Works will be an advisory board of eight members. The Board will be comprised of two members from each county and two members at large, all with specific qualifications in some field allied with public works. The Board members will serve without compensation except for expenses incurred. This reorganization plan, which might be referred to as Reorganization Plan Number 1, will eliminate the need for the present Highway Commission of twelve members.

What will this new modern Department of Public Works mean to our citizens? In my judgment it will have these benefits:

- 1. It will save money by consolidating in one department the engineering and contracting functions now carried on independently by many present state agencies. It will also consolidate maintenance service for all state buildings.
- 2. It will improve the quality of the state public works services by centralizing planning, coordinating the talents of experts in these fields, and removing from the Highway Department many unrelated activities.
- 3. It will reduce the number of state agencies by lopping off four other separate agencies: the Buildings and Grounds Commission, the State Board of Housing, the State Custodian, and Delaware Interstate Highway Division, and centralize allied functions of others.
- 4. It will provide citizens with greater control over public works projects by having the director of the department responsible to the Governor, an elected official.
- 5. It will eliminate at least 25 specific, top-level administrative jobs in the state government.

Even greater benefits will be evident when the additional reorganization plans are presented. Since January, I have

been studying the deficiencies in our governmental organization, drawing on experienced sources, and planning the best way to modernize our present system. We must discard our commission-type government and establish a cabinet-type government that will bring the state's services back closer to the people.

To be really effective, the new departments to be developed under these reorganization plans must be permanently established in our Constitution. This certainly is a matter that should be dealt with by the Constitutional Convention that I have recommended. Constitutional provision will insure that neither political party can tamper with the foundation of our government for political patronage purposes. Ripper legislation will be as dead in Delaware as the dodo bird.

The future stature of Delaware and the quality of its services to the people will depend in large measure on the enactment of sound reorganization plans. We can no longer shore up our present governmental organization with piecemeal action.

The time is here when a complete rebuilding job must be undertaken and accomplished. Anything less will mean that the people will suffer. I will work for this reform program with every ounce of energy that I have. I will fight for it if that is required. A modern state government will depend on action by the General Assembly. A new day for Delaware depends on a new government responsive to the needs of the people.

After having delivered his message the Governor was escorted back to his office by the appointed committee.
