A. council will gladly tell you the meaning of vespers, so integral a part of the Y activities: Voices, friendly and understanding... Evening, quiet and contemplative... Service, kindly and consecrated... Purpose, meaningful and well planned... Echoes, peaceful and murmuring... Reverence, respectful and devoted... Songs, tuneful and spiritual...

These are the main traditions. Between them as always are the little filling-in happenings that make Founders' Day a personal experience for each girl . . . always rehearshals . . . lining up in the proper order and counting off so as to get in the

Student Council

When in the fall of each year a girl enters the Women's College to begin a college experience she becomes a member of a system of government, the Student Self-Government Association. As the basis of this system there exists another, the Honor System. The executive and judicial powers of this campus government are vested in a representative group of girls who form the Student Council. The Council consists of a president and a vice-president, both seniors; a secretary and treasurer, both juniors; the respective heads of Warner, New Castle, and Sussex Halls; a sophomore representative; a freshman representative, which is the only appointive office. There are also on the Council the chairman of non-residents, the chairman of recreation for the non-residents, and the chairman of the social committee.

The Student Council has a wide range of duties, the primary one being the administration of rules. Another important duty is to see that a budget of allotments for various student activities is drawn up and kept. Throughout each season the Council has additional duties. Fall brings Thanksgiving with a banquet in celebration of the holiday . . . with winter comes Christmas and another banquet to be planned . . . the spring brings the annual

Parent-Student dinner . . . In fall, winter, and spring there are weekly assembly programs to be arranged. Always before the Council there are the duties of fair judiciary treatment and of a well organized campus activities program. With increasing campus needs new activities are organized through the Council by the students themselves. With 1941 and 1942 came the need for the establishment of a defense committee and of plans for Red Cross work in first aid and surgical dressings.

The Student Self-Government Association offers to the students of the Women's College opportunity for the development of leadership and practice in the art of effective living.

Commuter Life

Through autumn . . . cold in the mornings, warm at noon . . . through winter . . . damp fog in the mornings, warm breezes at noon . . . through all the vicissitudes of seasons and of weather the commuters keep coming. From Elkton, from the country, from Wilmington, from Newark, they come by car and train and bus . . . they come on foot.

They spend each day in class rooms for lectures and in their attractive lounge for relaxation. For study they have the library and the study room in Robinson basement. At lunch time there are problems. The more fortunate girls walk home, but the long distance commuters stay on campus. A few wander up to Main Street to a drug store, but the majority of the girls collect in their dining room in the basement of Kent Hall. They gather around the tables and talk of classes and of dates, of books and of programs.

When four-ten comes some leave for home again, unless there is a meeting to attend or a play to be rehearsed. When time for home comes at last, they are tired and their clothes have lost their freshness. If there's an evening program in the offing, a concert or a play, they have to make plans for that . . . a dinner to buy, a place to change their clothes, and a place to "freshen-up". These are the times the commuters wish for a dormitory room and the end of their dual lives.

But there are compensations . . . freedom from dormitory rules, entertainment at home, separation from an atmosphere of study, and a change of faces and of scenery. Theirs is a busy, rapidly moving life of travel from home to campus, from class to class, from day to day. But it is a well-rounded life of study and relaxation, of friends and family, and of classes and home.

The strain of the inconveniences of transportation and of changing weather hasn't prevented a valuable contribution from these non-resident students. They work at Mitchell Hall on scenery, on make-up, on properties, on all the staffs . . . they act in plays . . . they give time and thought to publications . . . to clubs . . . to the Council. They are an integral part of college life and have made their place on the campus.
