Ever since Cupid fired his arrows, piercing the hearts of would-be lovers in Roman mythology, people have been expressing their emotions on Valentine's Day in strange ways.

Although the traditionally popular Valentine's Day gifts are considered to be candy, cards and flowers, many people are moving away from tradition and coming up with unique, creative ideas to show their feelings toward loved-ones.

"Anybody can buy cards, flowers and candy," said Sue Minotti, a worker at Silver-Works on Main Street. "That's getting off easy. I usually receive flowers or candy, but I would rather get something unusual or unique—something that someone put a little thought and effort into."

Balloon deliveries by people dressed as clowns, belly dancers and gorillas have become popular in recent years, and people are still receiving and sending singing telegrams.

"We'll do any original type of song in any tempo," said an operator for Western Union, one of the largest telegram services in the nation.

"Whatever someone wants done, we will do."

Not only does someone receive a singing telegram but now they also get a cassette recording of the telegram, the operator said.

"We (Western Union) used to have singing telegrams where a musician would perform the telegram in a tuxedo," the operator continued.

Some people, though, go to other extremes to express their love.

"One guy is going to Montreal on Valentine's Day for the evening and staying over with his sweetheart," said Edna Smith, manager of the Cambell Travel Center in Newark. "They are both schoolteachers and have to teach on Valentine's Day but are going to hop the next flight to Montreal where they will have dinner and then return home the next day."

Smith continued to say that the man came into the travel agency and said he wanted to do something different for Valentine's Day.

Many Main Street shops are also hoping residents do "something different" for Valentine's Day.

"One person came into the store after he bought a diamond neckless and



bought a bear so it would be used as the bearer of the gift," said Gail Dieffenbach of Claire's Bears on Main Street.

Her store specializes in bears ranging from hand-made collectors bears from Germany to a Cupid bear complete with wings, bow and arrows and a heart-shaped nose.

But, she said, it is the other stuff that is popular with students. Dieffenbach cited heart-shaped balloons filled with helium, bear valentine mugs, fun caps (capsules that dissolve in water, expressing five messages of love in hearts and musical notes) and kewpies.

Dieffenbach said kewpies are like Cupids and do mischievous things. The store carries little porcelain kewpies, kewpie cards and figures and kewpie books, all originated by Rose O'Neil in the early 1900s.

"Kewpies are, in the words of O'Neil, sort of little round fairies whose one idea is to teach people to be merry and kind at the same time," Dieffenbach said.

Mary Ann's Nut Farm wants its customers to go "nuts" for Valentine's Day.

"People buy heart-shaped and filled candies, nuts, and tins—a little bit of everything," said its owner, Mary Ann Loomis. She said the store's slogan is "show someone you're nuts about them—give 'em nuts for Valentine's Day."

Although people spend great amounts to show their affection on Valentine's Day, others stick to the old traditions.

It isn't a holiday where people spend tons of money," said Camilla Stout, manager of The Nook II on Main Street. "Cards say a lot, and they say things people wouldn't say normally. Plus, these days, cards are getting funnier."

Whatever way people say it, said Chris Reynolds, assistant manager of The Nook II, Valentine's Day is a holiday to express love.

"It is a holiday where everybody isn't afraid to show expression and emotion for the people they love," he said.

Newark to host 'Liberty' events

Newark will host a two-day festival designed to raise \$100,000 for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty, it was announced last week.

The festival, which is the brainchild of Newark businessman Fred Garyantes, will be held Saturday, April 19 and Sunday, April 20. It will include three major events:

- A cocktail reception and concert dinner with entertainment by the Wilmington Symphony and United Nations School Choir will be held Saturday, April 19 in Clayton Hall on the University of Delaware's north campus.

- A Liberty Torch Run similar to Olympic torch relays will follow an historic trail through the state. The run will begin Saturday and end Sunday in Newark.

- A Liberty Biathlon featuring a 10-kilometer run and 25-kilometer bicycle race will be run through the streets of Newark on Sunday.

There will also be a variety of exhibits, entertainment, food and a raffle.

The festival will conclude Friday, April 25 with a Statue of Liberty Campaign Luncheon at the Hotel DuPont. There local organizers will present a donation to the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, which is overseeing restoration of the 100-year-old monument.

Garyantes said the purpose of the festival is to raise \$100,000 and to "rally the resources of the community and the state to a common objective that reflects the spirit of pride and patriotism that the program is designed to preserve."

The national Statue of Liberty Centennial Celebration will be held July 3-6, which has been dubbed Liberty Weekend.





Library of children's stories
airs weekly on WXDR-FM

Once upon a time in the fair village of Newark, there was a young woman named Michele Schiavoni who was preparing to do a radio program for parents about how to select books for their children. Michele was relating her love of children's literature to a colleague when, lo and behold, what should come to her but a golden idea. Why not, she thought, tape children's stories to reach the children directly through the medium of radio?

And thus was born the two-month-old program, "Mr. Badger's Library," which airs weekly on the University of Delaware's WXDR-FM (91.3). "Mr. Badger's Library" currently airs at 2 p.m. Wednesdays, but will be moved to 11:30 a.m. Sundays beginning in March.

The program consists of a variety of children's stories — from folk tales such as Cinderella and Puss 'N Boots, to mythology and fantasy — read in dramatic fashion by Angela Breuer and Hugh Atkins.

Breuer formerly performed dramatic readings on Hong Kong radio, and Atkins is chairman of

the English department at Tower Hill School.

Schiavoni, who is the producer of "Mr. Badger's Library," said the program is truly a labor of love.

"We all had good feelings about being read to as children," she said. "There is something very relaxing and soothing about it."

And, she added, "We feel strongly about this program as a way of encouraging children to read."

Schiavoni got the idea for "Mr. Badger's Library" about one year ago while preparing a radio program on selecting children's books. She began discussing her love of the tales with Joanne Golden of the university's College of Education and decided to try to get a program on the air.

Golden helped Schiavoni, who is employed by the university's Office of Information Services, select a few stories.

It's not easy to find the right stories for the air, according to Breuer. "You need to find stories that are relatively dramatic in language, descriptions and vocabulary," she said, "because nothing is visual. Everything has to come through the voice."

"Reading aloud is not as simple as it seems," agreed Schiavoni, who has performed on a few of the programs.

Once she had an idea and a few stories, Schiavoni went to WXDR station manager Chuck Tarver. "We hit it off," she said. "We found that we had ideas which were similar."

Tarver readily agreed to run "Mr. Badger's Library" and the

crew began taping stories in the summer of 1985.

The program first went on the air in December, and the early reaction has been very positive. "You should see the college-age students gather around here about 2 p.m. every Wednesday," Tarver said, laughing.

It was decided to move "Mr. Badger's Library" from Wednesday afternoons to Sunday mornings in the hope of attracting more young listeners. Many children are in school or preschool settings Wednesday afternoons, Schiavoni said.

Besides the change in schedule, Schiavoni said the crew will also begin trying a new means of promoting "Mr. Badger's Library" and reaching out to children this spring.

"We are hoping to take the show on the road," she said. "By reading the stories in the presence of children, we will be able to get their feedback."

The readings will be designed for students in kindergarten through age 12. For information on the traveling reading show, contact Schiavoni at 451-2791 or Tarver at 451-2701.

Schiavoni hopes, as might be expected, that the new air time and road show will help "Mr. Badger's Library" live happily ever after. The end.

Veterans commission

Gov. Castle organizes new state panel

Gov. Michael N. Castle has signed legislation consolidating Delaware's efforts to better serve veterans through the establishment of the Delaware Commission on Veterans' Affairs.

At a bill signing ceremony held in his office, attended by representatives from many of Delaware's major veterans' organizations, Castle signed Senate Bill 332, which also calls for the hiring of an executive secretary and clerical staff to assist the Commission in carrying out its operations.

"With the signing of this legisla-

tion, Delaware will finally have a single body to represent and advise our veterans, their dependents and survivors on matters pertaining to education, employment, health and financial support and to assist them in securing the benefits and privileges authorized under State and Federal law," Castle said.

"All Delawareans owe a tremendous debt of gratitude for the service provided by our state's veterans and the formation of this Commission will help veterans receive the services and benefits they are entitled to," he added.

The legislation authorizes the hiring of the executive secretary and the appointment of a Commission composed of 11 members. The Commissioners, all veterans, are appointed by the governor to serve four-year terms, although the initial members of the Commission will have terms of between one and four years.

The Delaware Commission of Veterans' Affairs will work closely with the Department of State, which is charged by the legislation with providing logistical support for the Commission.

Council on crime

The Delaware Council of Crime and Justice will hold its sixth regional victim services conference on Friday, Feb. 14 in the University of Delaware's Clayton Hall off New London Road.

The conference will feature a luncheon address by George Nicholson, the director and chief counsel of the National School Safety Center in Sacramento, Calif. Nicholson is a representative of the Victims' Assistance Legal Organization and the Victims' Committee of the American Bar Association.

Nicholson will discuss the messages adults send children when they talk to them about crime, specifically addressing how adults often transfer their fears to children.

The theme of the conference, "Take A Close Look," will provide a critical analysis of the systems and professionals working with crime victims. Facets of this will be explored in five different workshops. Speakers, all expert in their subjects, will address the areas of the cycle of victimization, victim rights, professional liability, victimization in institutional settings, and prevention issues.

The conference, which runs from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., will attract members of the legal, human service and educational professions. Nicholson will speak at 1:30 p.m. Registration fee is \$25, including luncheon and conference materials.

'Biotech' advances to be considered

Biotechnology is one of the most rapidly growing and promising areas of research in this century. Research in such areas as molecular biology and genetic engineering are raising new philosophical and ethical issues, posing new technical questions and creating new opportunities for commercial endeavors.

These issues will be the focus of "The New Biotechnologies: Promises... Problems... Progress," a free public lecture series beginning this month at the University of Delaware.

Four distinguished speakers will present perspectives on different facets of biotechnological research in monthly programs scheduled at 8 p.m. in Clayton Hall on the university's north campus in Newark.

Opening the series on Wednesday, Feb. 12, will be Dr. Frank E. Young, commissioner of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. In a speech entitled "A Societal View of Biotechnology," he will describe the regulatory safeguards already in place and discuss the technical, social and regulatory prospects for the future.

Young also will discuss how biotechnology will be used during the next 20 years to create a variety of new products, including new species of plants and animals, novel foods and breakthrough vaccines, drug therapies and diagnostics.

A member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science, he holds an M.D. degree from the State University of New York and a Ph.D. in microbiology from Case Western Reserve University.

"Genetic Progress in the Animal Kingdom" will be the subject of a talk on Wednesday, March 12, by Dr. Ralph L. Brinster, Richard King Mellon Professor of Reproductive Physiology in the School of Veterinary Medicine and Graduate School at the University of Pennsylvania.

The "super mice" that have received much attention in recent years owe their existence to Brinster. His early research resulted in the development of a simple system to culture mouse eggs that is still the most widely used method for maintaining mouse and other mammalian eggs in vitro. His early findings led to later research involving the introduction of new or modified genes into mice.

This research will be the basis for Brinster's lecture, in which he will discuss the development and use of transgenic animals, those into which a foreign gene has been introduced by microinjecting DNA into fertilized eggs. These genes are inherited by succeeding generations.

A member of the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania since 1964, Brinster received the New

York Academy of Sciences Award in Biological and Medical Sciences in 1983.

Dr. Robert Haselkorn, F.L. Pritzker Distinguished Service Professor of Molecular Genetics and Cell Biology at the University of Chicago, will discuss "Building Better Green Plants Through Genetic Engineering" on Wednesday, April 9.

Current studies in plant

molecular biology focus on a broad range of topics, including photosynthesis, plant growth regulations, transformation of plant cells by DNA and the regeneration of plants from single cells. Haselkorn will describe the methods used to study these topics using illustrations from the current literature and from his own laboratory.

A member of the Sloan Ketter-

ing Institute Board of Scientific Consultants, he is president-elect of the International Society for Plant Molecular Biology.

Concluding the series on Wednesday, May 14, will be Dr. J. Lawrence Fox, director of corporate molecular biology for Abbott Laboratories. His talk, "Biotechnology in the Marketplace," will explore the shortcomings of current methods

for producing new pharmaceutical products.

He also will discuss how technologies developed from research in molecular biology can best serve the public commercial. He argues that technology does not pose biological hazards, rather that it is less dangerous than the hybridization procedures used with domestic animals and plants for the last several cen-

turies.

Fox also serves as an associate faculty lecturer in the Department of Biochemistry, Molecular Biology and Cell Biology at Northwestern University. Before joining Abbott Laboratories, he was a member of the zoology faculty at the University of Texas.





Mellon

Grant awarded

The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation of New York has awarded the University of Delaware a \$500,000 challenge grant for permanent endowment in support of the art conservation program, which is jointly sponsored by the university and the Henry Francis du Pont Winterthur Museum.

The grant is the second major grant for the art conservation program in the past two months. On Dec. 9, the university announced an identical grant from the Getty Conservation Institute, an operating program of the J. Paul Getty Trust.

These two grants, totaling \$1 million, must be matched on a one-to-one basis within the next three years by other endowment gifts in support of the program; they cannot be used to match each other.

The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, with assets of \$1.13 billion, is a major benefactor of the arts and humanities in the United States, focusing on basic support to strengthen institutions and programs. Since 1973, the Mellon Foundation has provided over \$1.1 million in operating support for the Winterthur/University of Delaware art conservation program.

The Winterthur/University of Delaware Program in the Conservation of Artistic and Historic Objects is one of only three graduate programs in the United States to train fine art conservators. Established in 1974, the program is the newest of the three, but it has the largest faculty and most extensive facilities.

The three-year program leads to a Master of Science Degree in Art Conservation. Ten students are graduated each year and go on to careers as practicing conservators of textiles, paper, paintings, photographs, furniture, decorative or archaeological objects.

Graduates of the Winterthur/University of Delaware Program in the Conservation of Artistic and Historic Objects are now employed at leading museums throughout the United States, including at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the U.S. Library of Congress and the National Gallery of Art, as well as at museums in Europe and New Zealand.

Nineteen full-time conservators, scientists, faculty in art techniques and photography and administrative staff members are available to students in the program on a daily basis for consultation or for concentrated instruction. Six additional scientists and conservators from other museums or university departments are hired annually on a contractual basis to cover additional subjects.

About 35 guest speakers are brought in annually for half-day or one-hour lectures on ethics, philosophy, recent research or other specialized topics.

South Africa lectures

Issues in troubled nation to be focus of university lecture series

The University of Delaware will present "The South Africa Lecture Series," an on-campus education program on South Africa, beginning this month.

The free public series is designed to provide information on the complex issues posed by the Republic of South Africa and the policy of apartheid. Speakers representing a wide range of knowledge and experience on South Africa will provide historic, economic and political perspectives on South Africa today.

Lectures are scheduled at 8 p.m. in Clayton Hall on the university's north campus in Newark.

On Thursday, Feb. 20, Daniel Purnell, executive director of the International Council for Equality of Opportunity Principles Inc., will open the series with a talk on "The Sullivan Principles: An Alternative Strategy to End Apartheid."

Purnell directs and coordinates activities related to the implementation of the Sullivan Statement of Principles and has provided technical and educational

assistance on the adoption of the principles to nearly 200 civic, social, academic and governmental institutions. He also has served as director of community services at Cuyahoga Community College, as division head of school desegregation in Cleveland and as an administrator in the City of Philadelphia School System.

"Whether South Africa? A Historical Perspective" will be the subject of a lecture on Thursday, Feb. 27, by Dr. Leonard M. Thompson, professor of history at Yale University and a noted author on the history of South Africa.

Thompson is the author of "The Political Mythology of Apartheid," "A History of South Africa to 1870," "The Frontier in History: North America and South Africa Compared," "Change in Contemporary South Africa" and "Societies in Southern Africa." Educated at Rhodes University, South Africa, and Oxford University, England, he taught at the University of Cape Town from 1946-58 and at the

University of California at Los Angeles from 1961-68.

On Thursday, March 20, Dr. Stephen R. Lewis Jr., a member of the Council on Foreign Relations' Study Group on U.S. Policy Toward South Africa, will discuss "Economic Realities in Southern Africa." His talk will focus on the economic impact of apartheid on countries of the region.

Since 1970, Lewis has spent nearly six years in Africa, principally as a resident advisor-consultant in Kenya and Botswana. In 1983, he was awarded the Presidential Order of Meritorious Service by the Botswana Government in 1983 for contributions to that country's economic development.

For six years, he was provost of Williams College, and currently he chairs its economics department. He also has taught at Stan-

ford, Harvard and the University of Nairobi.

Concluding the series on Thursday, March 27, will be Jennifer Seymour Whitaker, a fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and codirector of a joint Council on Foreign Relations — Overseas Development Council project on strategies for African development. Her lecture is entitled "South Africa's Crisis: What Can the U.S. Do?"

Whitaker served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Nigeria, and at the Council on Foreign Relations she has organized a series of meetings, seminars and publications on Africa. Currently at work on a book about African development, she is the author of "Conflict in Southern Africa" and "Africa and the United States: Vital Interests."

STARChristiana's Danielle Vandyke
dreams of Olympic competition

Like most teenagers, Christiana High School's Danielle Vandyke has a dream. She dreams of competing in the 1988 Summer Olympics in Hong Kong.

"If you really want something, you can get it," said the 15-year-old sophomore. "At times I say I can't do it, but other times I think I can and I say I'm going to beat these girls. If you want it bad enough, you can win it. I don't know why but you can."

Vandyke's desire to win has been so strong that she has captured two Junior National Championship events and an astonishing first place finish in the National Sportsfest held in Baton Rouge, La.

"That I could not believe," said Vandyke of her first place finish in the 100-meter breaststroke. "It was weird. I knew I was on T.V. and I was shaking. I thought to myself that I better do good because my Dad's watching. When I touched, I could hear my Mom yell and I just couldn't believe it."

But for Vandyke, winning the race was just a preliminary to the full joy she would feel at the Sportsfest. Not only did swimming great John Naber—interview her, but her swimming idol Steve Lundquist presented her the first place medal.

"To this day no one has cleaned or even touched that medal," said Vandyke with a laugh. "No

one, because Steve touched that medal."

Vandyke started training in 1977 when she was six years old. Her parents, realizing her love for water, enrolled her at the Wilmington Aquatic Club where she has trained ever since.

"My grandfather had a big pool and I used to like to race my uncles," said Vandyke. "I tried other sports, but I just hated them so my parents signed me up for swimming."

Vandyke credits her parents a great deal for her success. Not only have they paved the way financially, but they've supported her in many other ways. "My parents are always there for me," said Vandyke, "whether I'm on top of the world or if my attitude is bad and I say I'm sick of it. I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for my parents."

More importantly, Vandyke wouldn't be able to make it to practice if it weren't for her parents, particularly her father.

WAC practices are held six days a week with three days being double sessions. For a parent who has a daughter with no driver's license, that's a lot of time and mileage going back and forth to Wilmington.

But considering that practices begin at 5:30 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 7 a.m. on Saturday, it could make even the most loyal of parents wish their daughter had taken up running.

"It's a lot to ask of my father," she said. "He can't wait until I

get my license. He tells me whatever I do, please pass that course (driver's education)."

Besides swimming for WAC, Vandyke also competes for the Christiana High swim team. She holds the season's fastest time in the 100-meter breaststroke by almost four seconds. She is also a prime contender to win the in-

dividual medley and the 500-meter freestyle in the state tournament, which is just a few weeks away.

But, more importantly, she brings to the Viking swim team a sense of confidence and team pride.

"She has an overall positive effect on the team," said Viking

head coach Lori Noble. "Seeing that we only have 12 people on the team (most teams have 40), it's nice to have someone like Danielle to lead us along. Having Danielle do well gives us encouragement to do well and gives us confidence. As well, you can always count on her to finish first."

Being a sophomore in high school and training at least 16 hours a week, Vandyke admits that she does miss out on some of the activities that other teenagers enjoy. But she's learned to deal with the frustrations and said that she wouldn't have it any other way.

Christiana wrestling alumni hail 'Uncle Bill'

Christiana High School wrestling alumni gathered Saturday prior to the Christiana - Mt. Pleasant contest to honor long-time coach Bill Laurelli, who retired prior to the 1985-86 season.

Headed by Dan Reeder, the alumni presented Laurelli with a plaque which read: "In appreciation for years of dedication and service to Christiana High School wrestling program from his most grateful wrestling alumni. We thank you."

"He's Uncle Bill to us," said Reeder prior to the ceremonies.

"He's been a tremendous influence on my life, and we've all gotten real close. Everyone who knows him speaks highly of him."

Laurelli had been coaching at Christiana since 1973, and retired this season because of a bad back. He knows all the fine points of wrestling and if you have a question he knows the answer."

Spartans pin 'Penn

St. Mark's bounces back from Sallies loss

After an embarrassing 32-15 loss to archrival Salesianum School on Wednesday night, the St. Mark's High School wrestling team felt it had something to prove. Three days later it did, reasserting itself by downing powerful William Penn 28-22 in a non-conference bout.

"We needed this one bad," said Dave Wallace (141-pound weight class) who scored 16 points in the third period of his match to register an important six point technical fall. "It's one of our last hard meets before the states, and we wanted a win. After all, they (William Penn) beat Sallies."

Considering that the Colonials had defeated Salesianum and were one of the top-ranked teams in the state, and with the state tournament just a few weeks away, the Spartans had all the motivation they needed.

"We were really intense today," said Paul Collier (108), who recorded a pin with one second left in the first period. "We wanted this match to prove ourselves."

"I think we did so well today because we lost to Sallies," said Eddie Mendez (158), who scored a key victory in his match with Henry James. "That made us very intense today."

The team's intensity level was so high that head coach Steve Bastianelli was concerned. He held a limited practice on Thursday in preparation for Saturday's match.

"I thought the kids needed a mental break," he said. "Sometimes you push them hard and other times you've got to let go. That's the hard part of

coaching, deciding when to push and when to let go."

As well, he offered little to the team in terms of pre-game speeches.

"Some coaches are big on psyche, but we don't do that here," said Bastianelli. "If they rely on us to get prepared then they're in trouble. Against Sallies and William Penn they were so pumped up that they were bouncing off the walls, so I didn't say much at all to them."

William Penn jumped out to an early 3-0 lead before Collier came out and simply overpowered his opponent. At one point, Collier picked up Williams Penn's Derrick Sudler and carried him to the middle of the mat to keep him from crawling out of bounds. Seconds later Sudler was pinned and the Spartans had a lead they never relinquished.

"I felt like I let the team down against Sallies. I wrestled horribly," said Collier, who was pinned on Wednesday night. "I really wanted to win and I knew that I had to win. I was real glad to get 'he six points."

"(Paul) looked very aggressive out there tonight," said Bastianelli. "He looked like the Paul we saw at the beginning of the year."

After Collier's victory, Shawn Thomas (115) decisioned William Penn's Jeff DelliCompagni to pick up another three points and make the score 9-3. Then after two ties and a loss, the Spartans reeled off four consecutive victories. Two of the victories went to Wallace and Mendez, while co-captains John McColgan (148) and Brandon Little (170) gained decisions to seal

the win.

"We're in good shape right now," said Bastianelli. "There's no way that we're wrestling our best, but we will be. We'll keep shooting and hopefully we won't peak too soon."

In other action, Glasgow battled back from a disappointing loss to William Penn to record victories over Concord 47-15 and neighborhood rival Christiana 34-23.

Against the Raiders, the Dragons won nine of the 12 bouts with Dave Sheridan (108), Paul Hoff (135), Russell Grant (158) and Keith Truitt (188) recording pins.


Against the Vikings, Chip Hill (115), Grant and Sheridan recorded pins.

With the victories, the Dragon record improved to 5-2 in Blue Hen Conference competition and 9-3 overall.





Bee pollen

Agent says evidence doesn't support claims

"Bee pollen is a current favorite among promoters who promise to cure all of our ills with just one product," says Dr. Sue Snider, University of Delaware foods and nutrition specialist. "We all want good health, but achieving it is a lot more complicated than swallowing pills or powder. The claims for bee pollen are simply not supported by scientific research."

Promoters often sell products such as bee pollen by using testimonials from people who swear by their curative powers. For example, you may hear that pollen retards aging. As proof, proponents cite the natives of Russian Georgia, saying they owe their longevity to a pollen-rich diet.

However, according to a study of elderly persons in that region,

60 percent ate a diet of milk, vegetables, meat and fruit. Although honey, which contains some pollen, was sometimes included, Snider says bee pollen was not mentioned as a food source.

Another claim is that pollen kills bacteria. Actually, pollen has no antibacterial qualities and is rapidly attacked by bacteria, yeast and other fungi when exposed to air. So it should be stored as any perishable food.

Claims have been made that pollen is the richest known source of protein. "But in fact," says the nutrition specialist, "pollen is mainly carbohydrate. Although it contains more protein, quality and quantity vary depending on the plant source. Even if bee pollen were rich in protein, there are much less expensive sources including filet mignon."

Promoters may claim that bee pollen relieves allergies, asthma and hay fever. But some scientists believe that bee pollen can actually trigger allergic reactions and so is especially hazardous for people suffering from these conditions.

There's no proof that bee pollen enhances athletic performance either. Tests in which one group of athletes was given bee pollen and another group was given placebos revealed no significant differences in the athletes' performances.

Bee pollen is fine for bees, but Snider says there is no evidence that it is a superior food for humans. It has not been proved that bee pollen can cure anything, and it is not classed as a drug. It is illegal to market bee pollen with labeling claiming any therapeutic effects.

Rock salt

Beware damage

Many people reach for rock salt to rid their walks and driveways of unwanted ice. But this solution poses problems of its own.

"Excessive salt can cause one

type of concrete to flake and deteriorate," warns University of Delaware extension agricultural engineer, Dr. Jim Scarborough.

There are two kinds of concrete, he explains. The more expensive type-air entrained concrete—contains millions of tiny bubbles that help it withstand freezing, thawing and salt damage. The other type—non-air entrained concrete—is not protected against these elements.

"The two types look identical at first," says Scarborough. "But after a hard winter or two, you can tell you have air entrained concrete if it's holding up well. The other kind will show signs of flaking and exposed stones."

Salt won't hurt air entrained concrete, but it damages the cheaper type.

Another reason to avoid using rock salt to melt ice is the corrosion it can cause on the finish and aluminum parts of your car. Excessive salt may also damage or even kill plants and shrubs.

Scarborough recommends several ways to minimize the harmful effects of deicing salt. Don't use it as a substitute for shoveling. Remove as much ice and snow as possible before sprinkling lightly with a mixture of salt and sand.





Heart-healthy cooking

Extension service offers courses to improve Delawareans' diet

changed their diets enough."

To teach people how to select and prepare acceptable, appetizing foods that are low in fat, cholesterol and sodium, for the past two years the Delaware Extension Service in cooperation with the American Heart Association of Delaware has offered a culinary hearts course.

The course provides information on these substances, identifies their major food sources, explains why controlling them is important for some individuals, and shows how to buy and prepare appropriate foods. Though designed for heart patients and their families, it is appropriate for anyone interested in a healthy diet.

Classes are taught by extension home economists in each of Delaware's three counties. Most of the courses consist of six sessions lasting an average of two to two and a half hours each. To meet client needs, some shorter courses are also being offered. A registration fee is charged to

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S., as well as in Delaware.

A heart attack occurs every 60 seconds. The average hospital stay of a few days costs \$2,200, but total costs run much higher and include both financial and physical stress for the victims and their families.

To treat heart disease physicians routinely suggest patients reduce consumption of fat, cholesterol and sodium. However, they seldom offer practical suggestions for altering dietary patterns. For many people, heart-healthy eating requires a major change in cooking and eating habits.

"When a doctor recommends reducing the sodium, cholesterol or fat in their diets, most patients don't adjust well to the change," explains Dr. Sue Snider, University of Delaware extension nutrition specialist. "Some suddenly feel there's nothing they can eat. Others worry that, though they've made some changes, they haven't

cover materials and food costs.

Since March 1, 1984, when the first class met, more than 175 people — most of them over 61 years old — have attended these heart-healthy cooking courses. Follow-up surveys indicate that after taking the classes, most participants have experienced positive changes in their eating habits.

"I've always been a label reader," said one Sussex County resident, "but I was astonished to learn about hidden sodium, so I'm even more careful now."

"I've stopped frying anything except in a silverstone pan using no fat or very little oil or margarine, and I've cut in half or eliminated the salt in my baking," a New Castle County resident said.

Learning how to eat more heart-healthy meals isn't all a matter of giving up appetizing foods, either. "I'm now able to eat some foods I haven't eaten in over twenty years," one person wrote.

Although mean levels of sodium, fat and cholesterol at the start of the six-week course were within accepted guidelines for the group as a whole, at its end participants' average consumption of sodium, fat and cholesterol was significantly reduced.

Snider, who evaluated the survey results, says that mean intake of other nutrients also decreased, but remained within acceptable limits.

According to Snider, most people said they adopted at least one suggestion from the course to reduce their sodium, fat or cholesterol intake. For example, over three-fourths of those surveyed reported using less salt in food preparation, while over 70

percent said they had changed from frying foods to other cooking methods. Forty-one percent said they had removed the salt shaker from the table.

Participants also indicated that as a result of the course they were better able to recognize food sources of sodium, fat and cholesterol. Many now read labels to compare the amount of these elements in different products.

They limit their consumption of salty snack foods, prepare food with herbs and spices instead of salt, buy leaner meat cuts, use less fat in seasoning vegetables and eat fewer egg yolks. Many have also switched to polyunsaturated fats.

Their eating habits weren't the only thing that benefited. Relationships with other family members also improved as a result of the classes they attended. "The heart patient feels better about following a diet recommended by a doctor," says Delaware extension home economist Debbie Amsden. "And family members don't have to nag the patient to follow doctor's orders."

"Our heart-healthy foods course can ease the dietary transition period for heart patients and potential patients who want to improve their eating habits," Amsden continues. "It shows people through first-hand experience that meals low in sodium, cholesterol and fat can be tasty."

The current series of Heart-Healthy courses is already under way, but more will be offered later this winter. For further information or to register, contact the county extension offices in Newark at 451-1239.






