Delaware Food Market Report

With Easter Sunday just a few days off, make plans now to enjoy this special day instead of spending it in the kitchen working—preparing Easter dinner. Ham on the dinner table at this season has become traditional, and this year that Easter ham will cost less than a year ago.

There are many kinds of hams you may buy, but be sure you read the signs before you select your Easter ham so you will know what you are getting. Here is a guide to help you select a ham.

Whole Ham—Hind leg, usually weighs nine to 16 lbs. Three servings per pound.

Butt Half—Upper half of whole ham, serves 3 persons per pound.

Shank Half—Lower half of whole ham, three servings per pound.

Ham Slices—Slices from center section of ham. Four servings per pound. Cooked, boned, ready to serve in most cases. One to 10-pound sizes. Serves four per pound.

To use ham economically, know how to store it. As a general guide, refrigerate all mild-cure hams and use them within a week. To get the most from your ham, bake it slowly so it will shrink the minimum amount.

Bake a whole ham, uncovered, fat side up, on a rack in a shallow baking pan, allowing approximately 15 minutes per pound for hams weighing 10 to 12 pounds in a 300 to 325 degree oven.

When baking half a ham, place the fat side down on the rack of the pan and allow 20 to 25 minutes per pound at the same low oven temperature.

Many fresh vegetables such as asparagus, broccoli, lettuce, tomatoes, radishes, corn on the cob and sweet potatoes are wearing attractive price tags for a delicious Easter meal.

Don't forget to get two or three extra dozen eggs for dyeing as well as for extra baking during the Easter holiday. With abundant supplies, prices are low and grade A large eggs remain a best buy.

Take care of your woodlot and your woodlot will help take care of you. That's the advice of Samuel Dyke, chairman of the Delaware Tree Farm Committee.

Following basic fundamentals of woodlot care will bring the timberland owner the greatest financial return over the long pull and may provide substantial supplemental income at a time of strong need, Dyke points out.

Some basic forestry practices listed by Mr. Dyke for Delaware woodlot owners include:

1. Protect your woods from fire, insects, disease and destructive grazing.

2. Harvest mature trees, but always leave a stand for future harvesting or seed sources for a new crop of trees.

3. Plant seedling trees on idle acres.

4. Make periodic thinnings of woods for cash income and to speed the growth rate of the remaining trees.

5. In some areas, encourage the growth of more valuable pine by controlling undesirable hardwood growth.

Following some or all of these practices, Dyke said, will make timber owners eligible to become members of the American Tree Farm System, a nationwide, voluntary movement of more than 14,000 persons who have proved their good citizenship by their wise stewardship of forest land.

Certified tree farmers received a certificate and a handsome green and white sign to post as badges of their good forestry. There are no fees nor dues connected with the program.

ARBITRARY, DISCRIMINATORY, UNREASONABLE AND UNFAIR

Some time ago the Internal Revenue Service ruled that cost of institutional advertising placed by utility companies in opposition to socialization of this industry was not deductible in computing federal income taxes. It thus ruled that the advertising was not a legitimate business expense.

This attitude, it is important to note, did not meet with favor of the National Association of Railroads and Utilities Commissioners—the organization which represents the state utility bodies. In a formal resolution, it denounced the ruling as “arbitrary, discriminatory, unreasonable and unfair,” adding that it “represents a serious disservice to the public and federal agencies engaged in regulating the charges of such companies. . . .” It then resolved that the ruling be immediately rescinded and annulled.

Various individual state commissions have also protested. In Delaware, the Delaware commission, in a letter to the Federal Power Commission, defended, among other things, the right of utilities to use advertising “to seek support for preservation and maintenance of the private enterprise system. . . .”

Internal Revenue seeks censorship of opinion on pain of heavy tax penalties. It is heartening that defenders of the right to speak one's mind are rallying to the cause.

The chief executive pointed out that the landing of the Swedes on March 29, 1638, marking their first permanent settlement in what was later to become the State of Delaware, was one of the “best promotions of government, religion, agriculture, commerce and industry in the state.”

In his proclamation, Governor Boggs called for a display of national and state flags, and for observance of the anniversary in schools and in churches and by patriotic and historic societies.

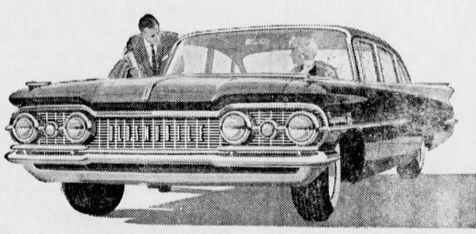

Ashton Cites Need For Safe Thinking With Automation

**Despite Automatic Trend
There's No Push Button
Thinking, Council Warns**

Modern automobiles come close to being automatic—but the driver still has to do his own thinking and his own reacting to traffic conditions, J. James Ashton, manager of the Delaware Safety Council, said yesterday.

"We have lots of automatic devices on cars today—everything from push button windows to push button shifting. But there is still no button to push to do your best behind the wheel thinking for you," he said.

"Every driver has to accept his own responsibility for traffic safety. If we are all to get where we're going and get home safely, every driver has to know the traffic rules and follow them to the letter."

Ashton said that some otherwise law-abiding citizens tend to treat traffic laws casually, ignoring them when it becomes inconvenient to comply. Some regard the rules as something to govern the conduct of others rather than themselves. Too many drivers leave their morality and common sense behind them when they get behind the wheel of a car, he declared.

"Traffic laws can't be treated lightly. They are basically important to the safe use of automobiles and highways in modern traffic conditions. One man alone on his own road on his own island would not have to agree to restrict his freedom to drive anyway he happened to like. But a man on a public road shared with millions of other drivers has to obey the rules in the interest of his own and other people's safety. It's as simple as that."

"Traffic laws just can't be treated lightly," Mr. Ashton continued. "The attitude that 'it's okay if I can get away with it' causes accidents. Every driver—with no exceptions—must be on the side of law observance if we are to share the use of the highways safely and cut down the shocking
