FIRST LEGISLATIVE DAY

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, a provision of Section 16 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Delaware authorizes and empowers the Governor of the State to convene the General Assembly under extraordinary occasions by proclamation;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of the State of Delaware by virtue of the authority vested in me, do hereby proclaim the following:

That the 115th General Assembly of the State of Delaware shall convene at Dover, the Capital of the State of Delaware, on Tuesday the 27th day of September A. D. 1949 at 11 o'clock a.m. Eastern Standard Time to consider and act upon certain matters hereinafter set forth, which are of great concern to the people of our State.

- 1. To enact Legislation for the payment of a Cash Bonus by the State of Delaware to Veterans of World War II;
- 2. Confirmation of officials appointed by the Governor since the adjournment of the last session of the Senate.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I, Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of the State of Delaware, have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Delaware to be hereunto affixed at Dover this thirteenth day of September in the Year of Our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Nine and of the Independence of the United

States of America, the One Hundred and Seventy-fourth.

SESSIONS

Rule No. 3. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State. the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate Consent to This Nomination?" which question may be put on the same day upon which the nomination or nominations shall be made by the Governor.

Rule No. 6. Nominations, confirmed or rejected by the Senate, may be returned by the Secretary to the Governor upon the day when confirmed or rejected, but shall not be so returned until disposition is made of any motion to reconsider.

Rule No. 10. The Senate may appoint by Resolution, a committee, which shall be styled 'The Executive Committee.' When a nomination of the Governor is referred to it, "The Executive Committee" may report back to the Senate upon said nomination, upon the same day the nomination was referred to the said Committee.

Mrs. Davis announced the same committees as during the Regular Session would act during the Special Session.

The Clerk of the House informed the Senate that the House had passed and requested the concurrence of the Senate in HCR 1.

Mr. Dickerson introduced the following resolution which, on his further motion, was adopted and ordered to the House for concurrence: SCR 1, Appointing a Committee to Notify the Governor That the General Assembly Is Organized.

Mr. Burkholder introduced the following resolution which, on his further motion, was adopted and ordered to the House for concurrence: SCR 2. That the Two Houses Meet in Joint Session to Hear the Message of the Governor.

Mr. Dickerson introduced the following resolution which on his further motion was adopted:

SR 3, Directing the Notification of the House of Representatives That the Senate Is Organized.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the 115th. General Assembly, in Special Session Assembled, that the Secretary of the Senate is directed to notify the House of Representatives that the Senate is duly organized and ready for business.

On motion for leave, Mr. Burkholder 1, Appointing introduced SJR Clerks for the Senate and House of Representatives for the Special Session of the 115th General Assembly.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the 115th General Assembly, in Special Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring therein, That Benjamin F. Simmons be, and he hereby is selected and authorized to act as Bill Clerk for the Senate, and that Norman Battersby be, and he is hereby selected and authorized to act as Bill Clerk for the House of Representatives, during this Special Session.

Upon motion, the resolution was taken up for consideration in order to pass the Senate.

On the question, "Shall the Resolution be adopted?" Mr. Burkholder moved the adoption of the resolution. Motion prevailed.

So by acclamation, the question was decided in the affirmative, and the resolution having received the required constitutional majority, passed the Senate and was ordered to the House for concurrence.

The Chair presented the following resolution which was read and on further motion of Mr. Burkholder was adopted and ordered returned to the House: HCR 1, Limiting the Presentation, Consideration and Enactment into Law of Bills at This Special Session.

On motion of Mr. Burkholder the Senate recessed until the call of the Chair. Same day, 4:55 p.m. Senate met at expiration of recess.

The President announced he is about to sign **HCR 1.**

The President Pro Tem of the Senate announced the appointment of Senators Burkholder and Dickerson, Majority and Minority floor leaders as a committee to notify the Governor that the Senate is ready for business.

Mr. Burkholder reported back to the Senate that the Governor had been duly informed that the Senate is ready for business.

JOINT SESSION

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives.

The Chair directed the Sergeant-at-Arms to admit the Speaker and members of the House of Representatives.

Mr. Burkholder moved that the House of Representatives and the Senate resolve itself into Joint Sesison. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Burkholder moved that the President of the Senate preside at the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The President of the Joint Session invited the Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tem of the Senate to come to the Rostrum. The invitations were accepted.

Mr. Burkholder moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives act as Secretaries of the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Burkholder moved that a Committee be appointed to notify the Governor that the Joint Session is organized and ready to receive any message he may care to convey and escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber. Motion prevailed.

The Chair appointed Messrs. Burkholder and Dickerson from the Senate and Messrs. Warren and Walsh from the House of Representatives.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced His Excellency, the Honorable Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of the State of Delaware.

The Governor of the State of Delaware was escorted to the Rostrum and seated.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Members of the General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

I have called this special session of the 115th General Assembly for the exclusive purpose of considering ways and means of making an immediate cash payment to the veterans of World War II. At the time of my inauguration, I urged that legislation be enacted to provide an opportunity to the citizens of Delaware for expression of their willingness to recognize through monetary compensation the services of our men and women who were in the armed forces of World War II. At that time I hoped this law might be enacted promptly and that an opportunity would be given to the people to express themselves by way of referendum on this question while the Legislature was still in session, so that in the event they voted in the affirmative the Legislature would then be able to promptly enact the necessary legislation to provide for this cash payment to the veterans of World War II.

Unfortunately, it was not until May 17th that the Bill passed the House and it was May 31st before it passed the Senate. Because of the fact that the Legislature adjourned on June 3rd, obviously opportunity could not be afforded for the referendum to be held during that session.

The referendum was held on July 19. 1949. Of the 60,000 people who went to the polls to indicate their desires, only 10,000 opposed the cash payment to veterans of World War II. In the election of November 2, 1948 over 140,000 voted. This Delawareans was greatest number of people to vote in an election in our history and can be considered to be the high-water mark of participation up to that time. The fact that only 10,000 of our citizens who when given an opportunity to express themselves voted against the cash payment would indicate to me that there were at least 130,000 of our citizens who were either for the payment or who were not willing to openly oppose it.

It should be a matter of much comfort to all of us to know that this overwhelming majority of Delaware citizens recognized the sacrifice and service which was made and rendered by the flower of our young men and women.

We cannot ever hope to fully compensate them for their sacrifice. These brave citizens were willing to give their lives and their all in order that we might continue to enjoy the blessings of our democracy, that we might continue to keep our land free and to preserve our way of life. They were willing to risk injury or their lives, to sacrifice time when at their age time was so important, while receiving small monetary compensation for their service. I am sure that this great group of people is happy and proud because their home state so strongly indicated their recognition of this loyalty, service and sac-

Our duty is plain. Our course is clear, The people of Delaware have overwhelmingly indicated their desire to provide an immediate cash payment for the World War II veterans of Delaware.

Because of this mandate, I have called you into special session and I am sure that you sense the need for imme-

diate, adequate action.

During the past month your administration has been consulting with leaders of veterans organizations, of the two major political parties and with administrations of other states who have successfully approved and implemented a program of payments to the World War II veterans of their states. After careful consultation it has been determined to present legislation in the House jointly sponsored by representatives of the two major political parties and which has the endorsement of the two major veterans organizations.

It is estimated that in order to provide approximately 33,000 Delaware veterans with a maximum cash payment of \$300 for those who served overseas and a maximum cash payment of \$225 for those who served within the boundaries of the United States, it will cost the State between 7½ and 8½ million dollars.

After carefully reviewing the fiscal position of the State of Delaware I am able to recommend to you that this amount can be paid without raising additional taxes at this time.

In my special budget message to you on March 9th, last, I indicated it was estimated that at the end of the biennium our available cash balance would be 7 million dollars. The cash balance which was actually available on June 30, 1949 was \$7,996,971.99 or approximately 1 million dollars more than was estimated last March. By floating a bond issue of 8½ million dollars for the payment, this additional million dollars over and above our estimates will be sufficient to provide for the interest and amortization up until the end of this biennium which will be June 30, 1951. By the time the next Legislature is in session we can determine whether or not it will be necessary to raise additional taxes. In the event that conditions remain stable, it should not then be necessary to increase taxes above their present level.

It is my sincere hope and I believe the hope of the people of Delaware that you will apply yourselves promptly to this task and will enact in a minimum of time this important legislation.

I want to assure you of my desire to give the Assembly my full cooperation in this matter and I hope that you will feel free to call upon me whenever the occasion arises. You have my sincere good wishes for a highly successful session.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Elbert N. Carvel, Governor of the State of Delaware by virtue of the authority vested in me, do hereby proclaim the following:

That the 115th General Assembly of the State of Delaware shall convene at Dover, the Capital of the State of Delaware, on Friday, the 4th day of November A.D. 1949 at 1:00 o'clock P. The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives, who were admitted and seated. The Chair requested the Speaker of the House and the Pres. Pro Tem of the Senate to be seated on the rostrum.

On motions of Mr. Burkholder, the President of the Senate presided over the Joint Session; and the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House acted as Secretaries of the Joint Session.

The Chair appointed the following as a Committee to escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber: Messrs. Burkholder, Dickerson, Warren, and Walsh.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced his excellency, the Governor of the State of Delaware, who delivered the following message:

Members of the General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

Once again I have found it necessary to call a special session of the 115th General Assembly to consider specific legislation.

This legislation has been written to correct and improve acts related to the bonding of the State of Delaware. Bond acts approved in the regular session of the 115th General Assembly called for a capital improvement program larger than any undertaken in the history of our State, involving construction and additions to our schools, roads, state institutions and other necessary improvements to our physical property which was imperative at that time because it had been so long delayed by the war and post war years.

Because many of the laws on our statute books relating to the issuance of State bonds were enacted twenty to thirty years ago, it was found that they could not be economically applied to the floating of bond issues under present day market conditions. Not until these Acts were analyzed by competent financial counsel schooled in the customs and procedure of the New York bond market where our bonds must be sold, was it possible to determine these many flaws. Then, upon the advice of leading bond attorneys in New York City and our own Attorney General, I finally determined that the only way to correct these defects was by action of the Legislature. I promptly called you into session so that you might remedy these defects in order that the State might promptly sell its bonds in a highly favorable market.

Our Delaware Attorneys, together with our New York bond counsel, have spent long hours during the past ten days preparing corrective legislation to be introduced today so that Delaware may have an opportunity to sell its bonds at the lowest possible rate of This applies to local school interest. district and State bonds and I believe will save our tax payers many hundreds of thousands of dollars during the period these bonds are outstanding. I would be remiss in my duty as Governor if I did not give you the opportunity to make these savings possible

to our citizens.

Many of the changes and improvements which have been incorporated in the bills to be introduced today are of a highly technical nature. They have been carefully developed through the cooperation of attorneys who represent some of the best legal thought of our State and Nation.

I have arranged the presence here today of all of the legal counsel who had a part in drawing this legislation and they are available for your consultation. I am sure they will be happy to give you the full benefit of their knowledge and they stand ready and willing to discuss with you any questions which you may have about this legislation.

As in the past, I shall hold myself readily available to confer and advise with you at your request. With your cooperation, I am confident that we will promptly accomplish our purpose.
