High School Construction Approved By 1927 To 743 Vote

Residents Of Newark Special School District Support
Board Of Education Proposal For \$1,200,000 In Local
Bonds To Avoid Double Sessions With New High School

Residents of the Newark special school district approved a bond issue of \$1,200,000 for construction of a new high school by a vote of 1,927 to 743 in the referendum conducted Saturday by the Newark Board of Education with polls opened at each of the eight local elementary schools.

A negative vote was registered at but one polling place, Christiana—with 107 voters in opposition to 60 proponents of the proposal.

With double sessions at the high school level because of declining enrollment within the three years, residents of the district supported the school board's recommendation for a new building to be constructed at a cost of \$4.4 million on a purchased site at the corner of Salem Church and Chopin streets, southeast of Ogletown Junior High School.

State Aid
The state is to supply \$1,200,000 for construction of the new school, the local bond issue is to be \$1,200,000 which school board has at hand.

The total 2,671 ballots cast, was but one reject.

The seven polling places where school board request was approved, the Brookside vote was 367-15; Central, 367-15; Eden, 78-35; Ogletown, 120-16; Medill, 234-12; West Park, 375-20; and West Park, 375-20.

Cost of the \$1,200,000 local issue is not to exceed an additional 10 cents per \$100 assessed on real estate owners within district, school officials reported.

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Aetnam Escape Snowstorm Calls With Alarm Lull

Monday Night Chimney
Fire On Prospect Ave.
Calls Forth 26 Firemen

Newark volunteer firemen enjoyed a bit of freedom from alarms during the Sunday and Monday morning snow storm. But last Monday night, shortly after 9 o'clock, Chief Clifford Knotts and 26 men with two engines, including a pumper and the ladder truck, fought their way through the deep snow and cold to prevent damage with a chimney fire at 30 Prospect Avenue.

Assistant Chief Andy Walp led 19 volunteers with a pumper to assist Christiana at 1:20 p.m. last Tuesday in extinguishing a fire in a trailer at the Briggs Art, Glasgow. The burning trailer was seriously damaged.

At 3:15 that afternoon, Walp led 21 men with four engines to extinguish a fire in a basement storage room at Brown Hall on the university campus. In fighting the blaze, Andy Walp suffered a head injury and was treated by a local physician.

On Saturday at 4 p.m., Chief Knotts led 32 men with five engines to control a fire in the 2½-story frame house of John David on Paper Mill Road, north of Milford Cross Roads.

The fire started in the basement, and extensive damage was reported beneath the first floor. A pumper from Hockessin was called to assist the Aetnam, and a Christiana pumper-tank truck reported to Newark for stand-by duty.

Snow Closes Schools, Industrial Plants In Newark As 11-in. Fall Blocks Roads

Snow began falling on Newark early last Sunday morning with little hindrance for early churchgoers, but traffic proceeded only with difficulty by mid-afternoon, and was at a standstill on Monday morning with the snow still coming down for a total of 11-inches. It finally stopped just before noon.

Newark public schools were closed Monday and Tuesday, and Holy Angels parochial school resumed classes yesterday, as crews of city, county and state workmen labored to clear streets, highways, and secondary roads, handicapped by high winds and sub-freezing temperatures that dropped to seven degrees below zero in areas.

Local stores and industrial plants were closed Monday, including Grant's on Main Street; the Continental and National fire firms, and the Chrysler plants.

The new restaurant includes a row of booths for two on the east wall; four-person booths along the west wall; and a double row of four-person booths in the center of the dining room.

Italian scenic murals decorate the walls; the booths are upholstered in orange and blue leatherette; the gray acoustic tile ceiling is illuminated with four chandeliers, and the flooring is of gray-brown asphalt tile.

Heavy tapestry provides privacy across the store-wide plate glass front window, and a modern kitchen is enclosed at the rear of the restaurant.

Neide Presents 1961 Budget; Main Street Rezoning Revived

Municipal Income Of \$1,449,000 Estimated With Budget
Submitted By City Manager To Council; New Ordinance
Presented To Rezone Property For Telephone Building

City Manager J. Francis Neide submitted the 1961 budget for consideration; the proposal to rezone the southeast corner of Main and Washington streets for construction of a telephone company office building was revived with the first reading of a proposed ordinance; and at the regular meeting of Newark City Council last Tuesday night, it was announced that the Home Housing and Finance Agency had approved the local municipal housing improvement program.

The budget includes estimated income of \$1,449,000, with anticipated expenditures of \$74,500 in excess of income. It includes \$61,000 for an electric sub-station and other capital outlay. This difference is expected to be more than compensated for with an anticipated cash balance of \$140,000 at the end of the fiscal year, and a "much higher cash reserve," Neide reported.

Rezoning Revived
Concerning the defeated measure to rezone the East Main Street lot from residential to business for construction of a telephone office building, four adjacent property owners—Edgar Trivits, Harold Lynch, George Getty, and Margaret Davis—have withdrawn their objections provided the Diamond State Telephone Company affirms willingness to accept deed restrictions.

The first reading of a proposed ordinance to rezone the property was approved by a 4-1 vote of council with LeRoy C. Hill, Jr., opposing the measure.

Chester H. Knowles, regional HIFA director, reported by letter that Newark's housing program had been certified by the federal agency, but advised that the citizens advisory committee set up a number of sub-committees for "active participation in minority group housing."

Election Board Chairman Harold Grant announced that registration days for voting in the April municipal election will be Jan. 28, Feb. 17-18, and March 17-18, with March 18 the deadline for council candidate filing.

Contracts
The contract for city purchase of a dump truck and snow plow was awarded to Diamond-T of Delaware for a bid of \$7,726, and the contract for renovation of the former library in the Academy Building was awarded to a local contractor Paul W. L. Brown at a bid of \$4,990.

A resolution pertaining to the A&D, Inc. request for city water service was referred to the public works department for agreement, negotiation, and a special council meeting was scheduled for Jan. 18 to discuss the sidewalk construction ordinance and award of the contract.

And concerning sidewalks, complaints of the general public for violations of the city ordinance requiring property owners to remove snow from their sidewalks within 24 hours.

And to keep things painless for both the young and the older generations, we didn't dig deep into the great stack of some 100 canvasbacks, redheads, baldpates, and blackheads decoyed in behind the blind, but contented ourselves with a slim string of 13 blocks bobbing in the Chester chop off the point.

Billy anchored the decoys as we rowed off the blind, and received his initial first-hand experience in picking up what seemed to be twice as many blocks with much longer anchor lines from the very frigid water at sunset.

Chesapeake Buck, retired from active service after a near disastrous display of retrieving activity and enthusiasm in the Elk River low tide mud last year, accompanied us for some bird watching, fresh air, and very little exercise. And old Buck enjoyed every minute of it, including the sharing of his companions' lunch and chocolate bars.

A total of five shots fired in two salvos—at a pair of high flying mallards, and at a skein of scudding scaup—featured the afternoon's gunplay, and time alone was killed—pleasantly, too.

Good old Buck's faith and trust in his friend has not wavered over the past 10 hunting seasons. With every shot, he whined in eagerness to get out of the blind to begin retrieving operations for the duck he felt sure was floating feet up after the shotgun thunder. And, after 10 years, the old rascal should know better.

A pair of bald eagles flapped powerfully and soared on unbelievable wings over the far shore of the river; six great swan beat their way like great white galleons against the wind over the decoys; a beautiful red-tailed hawk eyed us from a tree behind the blind; and a Cooper's hawk, trim and long-tailed, darted bullet-like from some heavy cover up the shore and sped across the river as we watched the panoramic parade of ducks overhead.

One great wedge of geese honked their way across the distant sunset, and two lone honkers passed behind us over the corn and wheat fields, but for the most part, silence rather than the gabble of geese lay over the Eastern Shore, and the thrilling flights of the great, gray Canadian voyageurs did not materialize.

A hen goldeneye or whistler swam trustfully into the decoys—and swam safely out again—the one duck of the day that we could have killed for sure.


Morrie Adams, who resides at 155 Courtney Street in Newark, has rolled four 300 games, and one 299 game in league competition.

PUBLIC NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF NEWARK

All Citizens are requested to reduce the danger of slippery pavements by complying with the following section of a City Ordinance:

Section 5. Removal of Obstructions, Snow and Ice from Side walks. The tenant or occupant of every building or lot within the City of Newark, or when the same is not tenanted or occupied, the owner, claimant, agent or person having it in charge, shall keep the sidewalk abutting such property free from all obstructions, and in the falling of any snow or the formation of any ice thereon shall have such snow and/or ice removed within six (6) hours from the time of its ceasing to fall or to be formed, except that when such snow ceases to fall or such ice to form between the setting and rising of the sun, such snow and/or ice shall be removed by the following noon. Any tenant, occupant, owner, claimant, agent or person in charge violating any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to pay a fine of five dollars (\$5.00) and costs for each and every offense. Provided: no snow or ice removed from any sidewalk shall be placed in the gutter. Provided further: whenever, according to this section, any sidewalk would have to be cleaned on Sunday, the same may be cleaned instead within six (6) hours after sunrise on the following day.
