Teaching Of Composition To Feature Jan. 11 Event Sponsored By English Dept.

The ninth annual School-College English Teacher Conference of the State of Delaware will be held in the Student Center Rodney Room at the University of Delaware on Saturday morning, Jan. 11, being sponsored by the department of English at the university.

This year's session will feature "Teaching Composition in Our Schools and Colleges."

Dr. George H. Henry, professor of education and English, will preside at the morning meeting which opens with \$30 registration in the Rodney Room.

At 10, the conference will feature a panel of Thomas L. Erskine, new chairman of the university's program in freshman English; Mrs. Margaret B. Phelps, Felton High School; Sister Miriam Roth of St. Elizabeth High School, Wilmington; and Gary L. Hout, supervisor of English for the Delaware department of public instruction.

Dr. Richard B. Hovey, associate professor of English at the University of Maryland, will be guest speaker at the luncheon following the morning meeting.

The conference is open to all English teachers, grades 7-12 and college level instructors.

Clarence W. Lloyd, Jr., whose parents live near Newark was promoted to Army Sp5 on Nov. 28, in Vietnam, where he is serving with the 170th Assault Helicopter Co.

First Road Death Of 1969 Recorded Near City Limits

Elkton Woman Killed As Passenger In Car Striking Stone Wall

A 26-year-old Elkton woman became Delaware's first 1969 traffic fatality when the car in which she was riding smashed into a stone wall near Newark early last Sunday morning.

Shirley Perreze of 328 West Main Street, Elkton, was dead on arrival at Delaware Division at 1:35 a.m.

The driver of the car, Paul W. Vari, 21, of 19 Dawes Drive, Newark, and two other passengers, Curtis Line, 20, of New Castle, and Elma Fox, 20, of Elkton, were listed in fair condition at the hospital last Sunday night.

State police said Vari tried to pass another vehicle on a hill on Route 273 just outside of the Newark limits, swerved to the right to miss oncoming traffic, and lost control of the vehicle.

The fatality came four days earlier than last year's first highway death. On Jan. 8, 1968, an 18-year-old Pennsylvania youth was killed when he was thrown from an auto after a skid on U.S. 13 south of Smyrna.

The record for 1968 totaled 149 deaths, highest ever recorded in the state.

Bertha Morrison Dies At 90 In Fall Down Home Stairs

Mrs. Bertha E. Morrison, who would have been 91 next Feb. 17, was found dead at the foot of the stairs in her home at 60 East Delaware Avenue last Tuesday evening by a man who had been cared for as a boy by Mrs. Morrison.

Albert Couden of Jackson Hall Road near Newark—the boy Mrs. Morrison had guided years ago—stopped by on his way home from work for his customary check on the welfare of his lifelong friend.

And he found that she had died earlier that day in a fall after apparently tripping over her gown at the head of the stairs. He called the coroner.

Mrs. Morrison was born in Pleasant Hill, Md., and had lived in Newark for the past 50 years. She was a member of the Newark Methodist Church and the Newark Senior Center.

Her husband, George S. Morrison, died in 1937.

Her only immediate survivors are a brother, Norris Anderson of Newark; and a sister, Mrs. Essie E. Hanna of Coatsville, Pa.

Services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 at the Robert T. Jones & Son Funeral Home, Newark, where friends may call tonight. Interment will be in Union Cemetery.

Teacher Recruitment Movies At Newark By Calhoun, Toman Win National Acclaim

Two sound motion pictures produced in the Newark special school district have brought the national spotlight again to the local school system. The two motion pictures were a cooperative project between the personnel and the information services offices of the Newark district, with Dr. R. Thomas Calhoun directing the personnel office, and Philip A. Toman, the information office.

The two pictures are used in the teacher recruitment program of the Newark schools, and this innovation has been noted in the National Education Association publication "Trends."

One of the movies is nine minutes long and the other, 14 minutes. Both are designed to acquaint prospective teachers with Newark schools and the community.

The motion pictures are seen in a self-contained viewer which provides complete portability for the recruitment officer in his trips to find a top-quality staff for the schools.

Five years ago, Calhoun and Toman cooperated on the first audiovisual recruitment venture, which consisted of an automatic slide presentation with appropriate titles and which could be shown in the waiting rooms of college placement offices where prospective teachers come for interviews.

This program was updated twice before Calhoun and Toman began their motion picture project.

Both sound motion pictures were produced entirely within the Newark special school district.

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Weather Closings Of Local Schools Cited For Review

Philip A. Toman Stresses Need To Keep Phone Lines Open, Listen To Radios

"As we begin a new year and as the coldest months of this school year lie ahead of us, it's a good time to review procedures for emergency school closings," Philip A. Toman of the local public school administrative staff said this week.

All schools in the Newark district are to be presumed in operation unless specific announcement to the contrary is made on the radio.

If at all possible, school will be in session. If the district is informed that road conditions will improve during the day, there sometimes will be a "late start." Toman said, with starting times of all schools moved back one hour and bus schedules modified accordingly. Announcements of late starts also are made on radio.

Days on which schools close for emergency weather conditions must be made up for a total of 180 pupil days.

These days will be made up in the following order: June 12 will become a pupil day and Saturday, June 14, a teacher day; Feb. 21, April 11 and 10, June 16 and 17.

The decision to close school is made very early on the morning in question, and only in exceptional cases is it made the night before, Toman advises.

"If you have any doubts, please listen to the radio, and if you don't hear specific announcements, you are to presume that school will be in session," he added.

Occasionally it is necessary to change a school bus route due to the inability of the bus to operate on a given road. This information will be broadcast.

The best coverage of Newark school closings, late starts, and changes in bus routes can be heard from 6 a.m. to sundown on Radio Station WNRK, 1260 kc.

"You can do much to improve the operation of your school district on fog, weather, and other conditions for information and not calling the schools," Toman said.

"The jam-up of our switchboard during emergency weather conditions should be avoided. There are calls which must get in and out, and we request that parents and students listen to the radio for information and not block essential telephone communications," Toman concluded.

Newark School-In-The-Round Named After Etta J. Wilson

First Of Design In Newark District, 12th Elementary School Honors Pioneer Of Delaware Public Education, Lifelong Resident; Floyd Weidman Jr. Named Principal

The Newark district's first school in-the-round, under construction on Forge Road in the Village of Drummond Hill, has been named to honor Etta J. Wilson, longtime friend of education in the State of Delaware.

Located in the rolling hills of Pike Creek Valley, the school has many educational innovations. This is the Newark district's first school in-the-round, and school officials feel

that they have corrected many of the problems which developed in earlier attempts by other school systems to build such a facility.

Education Booster

Elementary School Fear

Before assuming his duties at Christiana-Salem School, Weidman was principal of the E. Frances Merrill Elementary School.

Weidman will be released from his duties at Christiana-Salem effective Feb. 1, to work full time on the Etta J. Wilson School which is scheduled for occupancy next September.

As the 19th school in the Newark district moves toward completion, land has been purchased and planning is underway for the 20th and 21st, and land purchased for the 22nd school, to meet the needs of enrollment which has doubled every seven years since the close of World War II.

Native of Newark

Miss Wilson, for whom the school is named, is a native of Newark. After five years of teaching in the schools of Newark she began reporting for the Newark Post, beginning her long continued dual career of education and reporting.

She retired from her active role in education in 1955, but has not abandoned her interest in working for educational improvement in the State of Delaware.

Miss Wilson began interrelating education to the public in 1917 when she was a member of the commission appointed by the Delaware General Assembly to evaluate the public education system which had been launched in 1829. Her rigorous commission was to convince residents to become personally involved in improving education for their children.

She helped institute a teacher-training program, taking teachers over the country to observe superior educational systems, and traveled in Europe, seeking new ideas to help the schools of Delaware.

George H. Gibson Appointed As U.D. Ass't To Provost

Dr. George H. Gibson, former coordinator of the graduate program for the Eleutherian Mills-Hagley Foundation, has been named special assistant to the provost at the University of Delaware.

Dr. John E. Worthen, acting provost, said that Gibson will be responsible for coordinating and implementing special academic projects and programs, particularly those with broad university implications.

An assistant professor of U.S. history at the University of Mississippi, Dr. Gibson came to Delaware in 1962 as a research assistant in the Hagley Museum.

He was named coordinator of the Hagley graduate program and an assistant professor of history at the University of Delaware in 1964.

Since 1967 he has also served as director of summer sessions. In his new post he will continue to serve as a director of summer sessions and as an assistant professor of history.

A graduate of Furman, he received master's and PhD degrees in U.S. history at the University of North Carolina.

He has published articles in historical publications and served as managing editor of Delaware History, the journal of the Historical Society of Delaware.

Tip Top Lounge On East Main St. Destroyed By Fire

Early Sunday Morning Blaze Causes Damages Estimated At \$40,000

An early Sunday morning fire in sub-freezing temperatures gutted the Tip Top Lounge at 117 East Main Street, in Newark with \$40,000 in estimated damage.

Density State Fire Marshal Richard C. Lynch estimated the content loss at between \$15,000 and \$20,000. Charles Walter of Newark, who handles financial matters for Mrs. Norma G. Thomas, owner of the building, estimated structural loss at \$20,000.

Walter also said the Vinlet Ray Laundry, at 179 East Main, suffered heavy smoke and water damage and would cost an estimated \$2,000 to clean.

The owner of the Tip Top Lounge, William J. Earley of 20 Tyre Avenue, Newark, said the lounge had been remodeled recently, with new bar, carpeting, paneling, tables and chairs.

Earley said he left the lounge at 1 a.m. and when he returned to the scene at 2 a.m. after the fire, "the whole building was gone. I couldn't believe a building could go that fast."

Lynch said that when firemen of the Aetna Hose Hook & Ladder Fire responded to the call at 1:30 a.m., flames were "roaring out the windows and door" over the sidewalk.

The fire was brought under control in less than 30 minutes, Lynch said by firemen from Aetna and Shirley at Elkton, Md.

The 2x4 delicatessen at 175 Main Street, separated from the lounge by an alley, also suffered smoke damage, Lynch added.

Lynch Cites Arson With Vacant House For Sale In Area

An unoccupied house for sale near Newark was extensively damaged Tuesday by a fire which Richard C. Lynch, deputy state fire marshal termed arson.

Fire in the one-and-one-half story structure at 1501 Capitol Trail, burned out the second floor and destroyed a large section of the roof.

Aetna Hose Hook & Ladder Co. firemen responded to the 12:34 a.m. alarm, arriving with flames already through the roof.

It was controlled in about 10 minutes. Lynch said there is evidence of purposely set fires on both the first and second floors of the frame dwelling.

According to firemen, the house has been unoccupied for the past several months, and vandals had broken the windows.

They Listen and Hear Not

Children with the best hearing in the world can develop a "deaf ear" when it suits them.

Much of what is said to them by their parents may "go in one ear and out the other." So don't depend entirely on going in the safe thing at home, just because you've warned them of possible accidental injury, says the Council on Family Health.

It's up to Mom to do the safe thing to prevent home accidents, as well as to try to teach accident prevention to little ones, says the Council, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by leading members of the drug industry, to promote home safety and family health.

If you're using an electric powered clothes wringer and you have to turn away for an instant, shut it off if there are children in the home. There are about 100,000 clothes wringer accidents per year in the United States. Most of the injured are children under five years of age. Even though children are warned not to touch a wringer, they forget conveniently when the noise comes to insist on using it.

Whenever you finish using medicine, take the time to put the cap back on the container, and then put the container in the medicine chest where children will not reach it. You may tell children over and over again that they are not to touch medicines, but curiosity may overcome their caution. They forget conveniently, and you may have an accidentally poisoned child.

You may take pride in having taught your child to wipe up

spills from the floor, and to put away his toys when he is through playing. However, he may fail to remember what mother said the next time he spills liquid on the floor, and someone could slip and have a serious fall. The same thing may happen when he forgets to put away his stack of toys. Making sure that spills are wiped up and clutter is removed are still mother's chores.

In a New Year's Day message for his congregation, a local Catholic priest said it — "I love you" — and it was impressive.

"I want to thank you for making this past year a most happy one for me," he said.

"Thank you for all that you have done, but particularly for the little friendly things — a wave of the hand — a touch of the horn."

"I love you" the clergyman said simply and so sincerely to his congregation.

And that is one of the finest New Year's messages ever.

President R. W. Cairns Hails Dividends With UDRF Support Of Young Men's Ideas

Reports from officers and research scientists were presented before some 150 persons at the annual luncheon meeting of the University of Delaware Research Foundation last Saturday at the Student Center.

In his preliminary remarks, President Robert W. Cairns noted that the organization's policy of supporting young researchers with promising ideas has yielded handsome dividends in recent years. The projects of 15 young men who received \$90,000 in UDRF grants, later were supported by \$2,140,000 in grants from the Public Health Service, NASA, the National Science Foundation and other governmental agencies.

Assistant Secretary C. Lator Burdick gave a brief history of the foundation, calling attention to two important anniversaries being celebrated this year.

The first, dating to 1938-39, was the joint effort of the late Dr. Charles M. A. Stine and H. G. Haskell to stimulate support for research at the university by contributing funds for research on two diseases of cattle — mastitis and brucellosis. This work was successfully undertaken by a young man recently graduated from Yale University, Dr. James C. Kakavas, now emeritus professor of biological sciences, who was present at the meeting.

In 1942, the Haskell Research Associates was set up to administer royalties from patents received as a result of Kakavas' work.

A 20th anniversary, dating to 1949, was establishment of the Haskell Research Foundation, direct professor of the University of Delaware Research Foundation. Dr. Burdick noted that continued growth and success of the foundation rests largely upon the support of the Haskell and Brittingham families.

Harry G. Haskell Jr., recently elected mayor of Wilmington, is treasurer of the organization and Baird Brittingham is assistant treasurer and chairman of the finance committee.

During the last 20 years, holdings of the Foundation have increased substantially, permitting continued growth in the number and size of grants. Burdick said. There have been awarded to professors interested in biological sciences, mathematics, physics, agriculture, chemistry, engineering, geology, psychology and computer science.

University President E. Arthur Treadwell told the 150 members that "the university's mission is to be a public utility for the state" and said he will attempt to provide improved opportunities for effective interchange between industrial and campus researchers.

Treadwell said that last year was the first time, Delaware was among the top 100 universities in the na-

tion in educating advanced degree recipients.

The rapid growth of the university's physical plant and the quality of the faculty and student body mean that "greatness is within our grasp," he said.

Dr. John C. Kraft, associate professor of geology, in his discussion of the "Geology of Cape Henlopen Spit, Dune and Marsh Tract," showed how his research led him to interpret a new geology for the Cape Henlopen area of 1,000 years ago and relate this information to the Paleo-Indian cultures and the artifacts of that period found in the area.

Dr. William S. Galtner, associate professor of civil engineering and coordinator of the university's ocean engineering program, described construction and educational application of the ripple flow tank his research produced. The tank is used to simulate effects of wave motions on ships and other vessels.

Dr. Steven D. Skopik, assistant professor of biological sciences, described the biological clock which he said every organism contains. He pointed out that certain outside stimuli, such as light and darkness, influence this biological clock, or timing mechanism.

Research presentations were preceded by an interlude of violin music by Jorge Gardos of the University Resident String Quartet, accompanied by Anthony J. Loudis, professor of music and chairman of the music department.

Marines Offer 120-Days For Delayed Enlistments

According to GtSgt Paul Seavy, local Marine recruiter, young men can enlist now in the Marine Corps for two, three or four years and take up to four months before reporting for active duty.

Under the Marine Corps 120-Day Delay Program, young men are enlisted immediately but may select the day they are to leave for recruit training, up to 120 days from the date of enlistment.

The program is tailor-made for men who want to enlist but have unfinished business.

Dean McDaniel Cites Consumers' Stake In Maintaining Healthy Farm Economy

Delaware consumers have a great stake in maintaining a healthy and prosperous farm economy. In his annual New Year's message, Dr. William E. McDaniel, dean of the college of agricultural sciences at the University of Delaware, said consumers must watch farm developments closely. If farmers cannot maintain sufficient production efficiency to counterbalance increasing farm costs, consumer prices for food will have to rise.

McDaniel said consumer food prices are increasing along with prices of nearly all other consumer commodities as inflation continues. However, these price increases are the result of higher prices for equipment, labor and transportation and higher rates of interest paid by agribusiness. But farmers must pay these higher prices, also.

Because farmers have increased their efficiency and are producing more, the prices of farm products have gone up very little. Some have even declined.

"The farmer continues to receive less and less of the consumer's food dollar, and the percentage of the consumer's take-home pay spent for food continues to decline," McDaniel pointed out.

Research at agricultural colleges in Delaware and throughout the United States has to a large extent been responsible for the increase in farming efficiency. An overgrowing population is being fed by a decreasing number of people on the farm.

"Consumers have contributed much to this fantastic accomplishment by their tax support of state and federal appropriations to colleges of agriculture," McDaniel said.

However, as the nation's prosperity ebbs, consumers must not forget that only four per cent of that population still resides on the farm. "All people in the U.S. and many people in foreign countries have — and will continue — to receive benefits resulting from the very small number of farm workers required," McDaniel stated.

Farmers released from farms are employed in manufacturing and distribution of many non-farm consumer products, contributing to this country's standard of living.

Modern farmers like their predecessors dating back to the days of the Revolution, are independent. They prefer to operate their farms in competition with each other with little, if any outside interference. They like to sell their products in a competitive market, Dean McDaniel added.

However, continuation of this pioneering spirit has meant increased production. As a result, the prices of farm products have not increased as rapidly as the prices farmers must pay.

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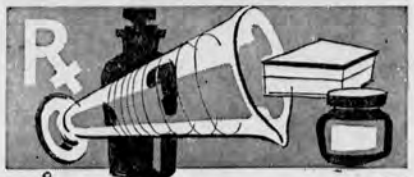

And always at noon on a hunting day, George and Marie insisted that we join the family at dinner — a fabulous feast, always, but a special one on a Thanksgiving Day when the house was bulging with other visiting members of the Luff family.

Good old Chesapeake Buck was less than a year old when we took him on his first duck hunting trip — with George Luff and Ted Maxwell at Pickering Beach.

And we won't forget that one. A wing-tipped black duck sailed down far out in the chop of Delaware Bay, and Buck had not seen the duck fall, nor did he know just what a duck was.

The wounded black lay flat like a stick in the choppy water — barely discernible from the man's vantage point of two-legged elevation. But Buck reared up at his companion's urging — instantly spotted the slim spot on the water — and with a classic, splashing plunge, swam straight and true to the distant quarry — overtook the strongly swimming black — and after a lunge with those great jaws and bull neck, turned to come surging ashore with his very first duck.

George Luff was an excellent shot, but we remember him deliberately missing a pair of black ducks and a lone mallard in some rare face-saving for a companion.

Peterson's passers denied Drexel's offensive in the first half with a man-for-man defense led by Steve Jackson that held the host team to five field goals.

At intermission, the Hens led 42-19 — and wasted.

"That first half was our best defensive effort this season," Peterson said. "We were very aggressive, particularly Jackson."

"He always is given the opponent's toughest shooter, whether he's a guard or a forward. This time he was on Ron Coley and held him to six points in the first half."

"Jim Couch also did a great job, both offensively and defensively," Peterson added.

Couch scored 14 points in the first half, and held his man, Ed Robinson, scoreless.

In the second half, the Hens moved into a zone because they had some men in foul trouble. This allowed Coley some outside shooting room for the first time and he wound up with 22 points, the game total racked up by Couch.

Coach Don Harnum's Delaware freshmen bombed the Drexel Frosh 96-62 in the preliminary.

Former P.S. du Pont star Kenny Hoffman led the Blue Chicks with 19 points.

Yellowjacket All - State Football Trio Leads Plitnick's Cagers To Twin Wins

Coach George Plitnick's Yellowjackets, featuring the All-State football trio of Ed Gary Hayman, Hallback Pedro Swann and Quarterback Bob Tucker among four returning lettermen, romped to an 89-79 opening win over visiting Wilmington High last Friday night, and handed William Penn a lot more of the same at the Newark High School gym on Tuesday in breezing to a 97-36 victory.

The Yellowjackets entertain winless Dickinson this Friday and play at McKean — the McKean are in quest of their first win, too — next Tuesday, Jayvee games at 6:30 precede the varsity tests.

In welcoming Wilmington, Swann, Tucker and Hayman scored 20, 24, and 22 points.

Gary Ludwig, the fourth letterman returning for Newark in Plitnick's first season as Francis Fulghum's successor, accounted for 11 points.

Plitnick singled out the long range shooting of Swann, and of Hayman who did a creditable job in his first start in the backcourt, as keys to the easy victory over Wilmington.

He also credited an aggressive 1-3-1 zone for the Yellowjacket success.

"If Pedro and Gary can hit from outside the way they did tonight, we'll be all right," Plitnick observed. "It's accurate shooting like Pedro's that opens up Tucker inside. We shot 49 per cent, and a zone can't afford to let us hit that percentage from outside."

Although both clubs opened in a zone, Newark's was vastly more effective. It held Wilmington's high-scoring Crawford Woodruff to just seven points in the first half, forcing him to take long jump shots
