"SONS OF DELAWARE" VISIT UNIVERSITY

Spend Eventful Day In
Annual Trip To
College

Two hundred "Sons of Delaware," who are former residents of this state but who now live in Pennsylvania, were the guests of the University of Delaware last Saturday. Motoring from Philadelphia, the party was welcomed to Newark about two o'clock by a reception committee composed of members of the faculty and representatives of the student body.

After being taken to the Women's College where they witnessed the annual May Day Fete, the visitors saw the Delaware-St. John's baseball game played on Frazer Field. Immediately following the game, a banquet was served in Old College. Dr. W. T. M. Beale delivered the invocation after which one verse of "America" was sung. Because of the forced absence of Dr. Hullihen, Dean Dutton made the address of Welcome. Mr. Dutton stressed the point that no organization was more welcome to visit the University than "The Sons of Delaware."

Having been introduced by Mr. P. G. Moore, William S. Jackson expressed his appreciation for the support received by him during the last year. Mr. Moore then announced that James E. Wilson, '28, was to receive this scholarship for the coming year.

The principal speaker of the evening was Mr. John Dennis Mahoney. His interesting talk was on the subject of loyalty. "Our Delaware," a song which was written by G. B. Hynson, State Poet, and which was recently adopted by the Legislature as the official song of the state, was sung in concert accompanied by stereopticon views shown by H. V. Holloway. The day's outing of "The Sons of Delaware" was closed by chorus singing led by Mr. William P. White, of Wilmington.

Dr. R. E. Rose Addresses Wolf Chemical Club

The Wolf Chemical Club, in its last meeting for this year, was addressed by Dr. R. E. Rose, Director of the Technical Laboratory, E. I. du Pont de Nemours Company, Monday evening, May 18, on the subject "Dyes and Dyeing Processes." The lecture, which was attended by about fifty students and members of the Faculty, was very interesting and enlightening. By means of simple experiments Dr. Rose showed how very simple it is to operate the dyeing process, and at the same time demonstrated how easy it is to fall into complications. Election of officers for the coming year will be held next Fall.

Him

Other students would entertain an entirely different conception. Still other students would salaam to still other diverse ideals. WALK-OUT AT STUDENT COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Sigma Phi Epsilon Claim
Combines Were
Employed

The Student Council elections last Tuesday were dramatically interrupted when the members of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity left Wolf Hall in a body leaving the following letter behind as the sole explanation of their action:

"Being aware that certain organizations on the campus have secretly combined for the specific purpose of dividing among their particular candidates the political spoils of this morning's elections and to defeat other candidates—irrespective of merit or service—who happen to be non-members of the organizations engaged in this disgraceful machination, we, the members of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity, herewith refuse to participate in an election conducted in such a manner or to support a Student Council not elected under honorable circumstances."

The incident came as distinct shock to the students assembled and occurred directly after Richard Torbert followed by William J. Carroll had withdrawn their names from the list of those eligible for election to the Student Council as representatives of the Senior Class. After the letter had been read by President John G. Leach to the student body, Warner, Jackson, and Miller, of the Senior Class, were delegated to ascertain from

Papers by Dr. Paine To Be Published

The *Annals of the Astronomical Observatory of Harvard College* will shortly publish five scientific papers by Dr. Paine. These papers contain some of the results of his researches under the auspices of the National Research Council, at Harvard University, from 1919 to 1923. Conducted originally at the Wind Tunnel of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and continued at the Jefferson Physical Laboratory of Harvard College, these researches consist of a mathematical and experimental investigation of the laws of air-flow in pipes, channels and in the neighborhood of solid obstacles.

Air, drifting slowly along a channel, moves in a smooth, regular manner known as streamline motion. When, however, velocity of flow is sufficiently increased, the current breaks up into eddies and swirls. Air flow in this eddying state is said to be turbulent. It is, for example, turbulent air motion along the upper surface of the wing of an airplane that creates the low pressure making possible

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THE STUDENT COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Immediate action must be taken on the affair which occurred at the Student Body elections, Tuesday morning. The whole matter must be thrashed out without delay. The present unsettled condition of affairs is detrimental to the well-being of this Institution. Appalling inroads are being made into the unity and fellowship of the Student Body at Delaware College. Such a state of affairs cannot go on.

If the members of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity know that certain organizations on the Campus were combining unlawfully to influence the elections, they were perfectly justified in refusing to participate in the elections. But, they were not justified in merely stating that corruption exists without tangibly showing cause for their assertion. It is not enough to say that certain reprehensible conditions exist without substantiating reference pertaining to them.

We must get to the bottom of the whole affair. If corrupt politics is played on this Campus, it must be torn out root and branch. Nothing can do more to undermine the foundations of an institution than such pettiness and chicanery; and those who promote it must be apprehended and punished. It is impossible to get at the cause of the case unless we know definitely and specifically who perpetrated it. Up to this time, officials of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity have declined to make direct accusations against persons or groups of persons said to be guilty of questionable actions in the elections. These officials must be duly impressed with the fact that it is their duty to do so. Their statements were such as to incriminate other organizations on the Campus. It is not fair to these other organizations to have suspicion fall upon them unless it is justified. Now is no time to scruple about openly accusing the guilty party or parties. A policy of passivity cannot be maintained. The movement has been started and must be carried to a close. Only one course of action is open.

This affair has affected Delaware College tremendously. It strikes into the very vitals of our existence as a Student Body. The publicity which has resulted from this series of events has hurt this institution. If there are underlying circumstances, they must be disclosed and dealt with summarily and drastically before they cause dissensions from which there is no recovery. Every student must lay aside personal or partisan feeling and try to see the whole case in a purely impartial light. The welfare of our Alma Mater looms behind the whole affair.

TENNIS

The Delaware College Tennis Team is making a record. Prior to this season not a single match has been marked to our credit in several years. At this point in the schedule we have been victorious in about half of our matches—an enviable record as compared to former years. Captain Malloy has whipped a team into shape which is a credit to the University. The splendid showing of the team this year should place tennis in an accredited standing here at Delaware.

ATTENTION, PLEASE!

Mention should be made of the activities of the Delaware College Freshman Debating Team. This is the first debating organization of any sort in Delaware in thirty years. A small group of Freshmen set about forming a team and made rapid progress under the tutelage of able coaches. They won both of the debates scheduled for the year by unanimous decisions in both cases, and were highly praised for their showing. The teams with which they

competed came from Temple University and St. Joseph's College, where debating societies have been established for many years.

The casual observer fails to appreciate the great amount of work which members of debating teams are compelled to do. Arguments can only be formulated by tedious and painstaking research. Members of a debating team should receive recognition for these services in much the same way that members of athletic teams are rewarded. The athlete and the debater are both giving time and effort to the University; the service of each differs only in the way it is expressed.

A debating team is a worthwhile organization in any college. It encourages thought and stimulates interest in intellectual subjects. We can foster the growth of a debating team here by recognizing and rewarding the efforts of those who instituted it. Given the proper sponsoring the organization should grow and become strong and flourishing. All that is needed is a little encouragement.

ble the flight of a heavier-than-air machine. Again, it is turbulent motion in the atmosphere that controls certain weather conditions. In the case of the airplane, air turbulence is usefully applied. On the contrary, in certain manufacturing processes, necessitating transmission of air or chemical gases through long channels, turbulence is the cause of great practical difficulty. Thus in Aeronautics, Meteorology and in certain branches of Engineering, it is of importance to add to our present knowledge of this most interesting type of fluid motion.

The first of Dr. Paine's papers accordingly contains an account of laws, discovered by him, of the flow of dry, turbulent air through a channel. This is followed by a similar investigation of the flow of dry air in a channel past a fixed obstacle. In the third paper, these results are extended to the flow of moist air, and in the fourth and fifth papers, developments of the theory are discussed which lead to a method of measuring the weight of water vapor in the air, which, in convenience and precision, is in advance of methods heretofore in use.

The entire investigation bears closely upon important problems in atmospheric circulation. As such, it has aroused the interest of meteorologists and astrono-

mers, and has thus lead to the publication of these papers in *Harvard Annals*.

It is understood that permission has been obtained from the Harvard authorities to bind reprints of the entire series with our *Delaware Notes*.

kritos, Kolotes, Theokosmos, and Alkamenes worshipped as their ideal teacher, Phidias, and if the Phidian Zeus at Olympia is considered to be the Greek ideal of beauty, then a formulation of the ideal is not impossible—perhaps, not even unpracticable.

With this comforting thought, I will attempt to set down my ideas as to what are the characteristics which go toward constituting professorial perfection.

The ideal college professor is aware that culture is an individual affair, and not a mechanical process of standardization. He also realizes the significance of a general dilettantism. He possesses a sufficient growth of hair not to irritate the aesthetic souls of his students by a bare-faced baldness. Yet he is sufficiently bald to indicate polish and intellectual power acquired through continual application to study. He is conscious of the necessity of complete intellectual and social freedom for college students. However, he also recognizes the need of compulsory lectures and chaperones. He is good and kind; yet there is a lurking devil in his eye (either eye).

He is a severe censor of cigarette smoking. But he appreciates the comfort and mental stimuli to be derived from a pipe. Although he is not entirely oblivious to the differences between "courses" and "knowledge," "textbook" and "lecture," and other paradoxical synonyms, nevertheless, he realizes the absolute necessity of the student's taking the required courses.

He is a collector of "men" in-

stead of Chinese china or Canadian dry—I mean dimes. However, he can see the mental relaxation to be had from accumulating an assortment of postage stamps or golf balls.

The ideal college professor is entirely free from the superiority, inferiority, and the suppressed-sexual complexes. But he realizes that youth is sometimes impetuous. He enjoys golf, bridge, and chess; but he frowns deeply on all forms of gambling.

He is dignified, aristocratic, majestic, and sublime. Notwithstanding this, he is a "good fellow." He is sympathetic when a student is overworked; he is gently amused at the frog-like dancing of the more active of the younger generation; and he appraises, with an understanding interest, the cult of Collegiateism.

He knows the value of advertising, the significance of progress, and the purport of daylight saving. He is a booster; but not a vulgar one. He is a radical conservative. He is a diplomat without guile or deceit. But above all else, the ideal college professor has a sense of humor. (Consequently this article should get by.)

Another Tennis Win

All citizens of the State are invited to attend the exercises. Special invitations have been sent to every contributor to the building fund whose address could be secured. The address list of Gold Star Mothers obtained from the War Department was found to be so incomplete and inexact that it is feared that many will not receive invitations and the Committee on Arrangement desires to have it known that it particularly desires that every Gold Star Mother in the State shall attend the dedication.

By special order of the War Department, the First Engineers' Band from Fort du Pont will provide the music. The singing of the Star Spangled Banner at the opening of the program at the Library will be led by a chorus of one hundred male voices from the service clubs and musical organizations of the State, led by William P. White, of Wilmington.

The keys of the building will be formally presented to the President of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Henry B. Thompson, by Dr. Joseph H. Odell, Director of the Service Citizens of Delaware. the officials of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity more specific information concerning their action, but they returned with the report that officials of that fraternity had nothing more to say than was in their letter. It was decided after much discussion to proceed with the elections and not to accept the withdrawals of Carroll and Torbert. The presidents of the fraternities on the campus assured the Student Body that the charges contained in the Sigma Phi Epsilon letter did not apply to their respective organizations.

Ballots were then cast, resulting in the election of Mannix and Pryor to the Student Council, and who together with R. G. Taylor, president of the Senior Class, and J. C. King, editor-in-chief of THE REVIEW, were on the ballot for president of the Student Council. James Mannix was elected president, Taylor, King and Pryor withdrawing their names.

Eyer and Beatty won out over Lohman and Mendenhall in the election for Junior representatives on the Council; and G. G. Poole was victorious over J. W. Jones in the Sophomore competition.

The action of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity has caused quite a stir on the campus and attracted much publicity in the Wilmington papers to the University. Officers of the fraternity are recient concerning their walk-out and accusation, and the student body is awaiting with interest the result of the forthcoming investigation. President John G. Leach has requested A.

J. Taylor, president of the Alumni Association; C. E. Grubb, member of the Executive Council; and George L. Townsend, Wilmington attorney; to investigate the charges made by the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity and to determine the status of student government at the University, which has now been placed under suspicion. It is believed that this committee will accept and will commence their investigation immediately.
