Pursuant to Article III, Section 18 of the Delaware Constitution, I am returning to the House of Representatives without my signature House Bill No. 260, entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 30, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO ITEMIZED INCOME TAX DEDUCTIONS TO ALLOW A DEDUCTION FOR CERTAIN HOUSEHOLD AND DEPENDENT CARE EXPENSES."

I have no conceptual objection to, and in fact sympathize with, the deduction which this bill creates. But considering the form of the Bill and Delaware's deficit financial condition, I cannot agree with House Bill 260, and therefore must return the Bill without my signature. I have taken this action for the following reasons:

1. House Bill 260 was considered and passed without a fiscal note as required by Chapter 19, Title 29, Delaware Code. While this requirement can be waived, it is my view that to do so with respect to such important legislation, which on its face increases the financial burden of the State, constitutes a fundamental defect in the legislation.

I am advised by the Finance Department that the 2. estimated loss in income tax revenue for FY 78, occasioned by House Bill 260, is between \$1.3 million and \$2.5 million. Consequently, the measure increases the projected deficit for FY 78 in corresponding amount. I cannot agree with any increase in the deficit for the upcoming fiscal year without the assurance that the General Assembly will either further curtail expenditures or enact revenue measures sufficient to cover the cost of the proposed legislation. I could favorably consider legislation which reduces existing sources of income only at such time as I am provided with that assurance. Following passage of the FY 78 Budget and an adequate revenue package, it might be appropriate to reconsider this legislation.

For the foregoing reasons, House Bill 260 is returned herewith to the House of Representatives without my signature.

To the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 129th General Assembly of the State of Delaware

On June 2, 1977, I received House Bill No. 183, entitled as follows:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 431, VOLUME 60, LAWS OF DELAWARE. RELATING TO PUBLIC HEARINGS ON APPLICATIONS TO CHANGE THE FUEL ADJUSTMENT RATE."

I am returning House Bill No. 183 without my signature because it does away with one of the effective tools available to consumers to protest increases in their electric bills caused by changes in the fuel adjustment charge.

House Bill 183 repeals a section of the Delaware Code, enacted only one year ago, which requires public hearings on applications by utility companies to change the fuel adjustment charge.

In addition to requiring a public hearing, that section provides two other important protections for customers of Delaware utilities: first, it requires that any change in the fuel adjustment charge be approved by a majority vote of the Public Service Commission and second, it requires public notice of any hearing on changes in the fuel adjustment charge.

Without these provisions, Delaware consumers would have no effective notice of fuel adjustment charge increases until they receive their bills and would have no guaranteed opportunity to be heard by the Commission before the charges took effect. Moreover, there would be no assurance that any increases receive the attention of the Public Service Commission.

The protections which House Bill 183 would strike were enacted only one year ago. That earlier legislation was adopted by the House of Representatives on an affirmative vote of 37 members. Yet House Bill 183 would now remove these provisions designed to protect Delaware consumers.

The preamble to the legislation which House Bill 183 would repeal states the finding of the General Assembly that the fuel charge has been applied by utilities "with only pro forma approval by the Public Service Commission without benefit of the adversary proceedings normally required for rate changes." The Legislature also declared that public hearings are necessary so that "the public may know of impending changes in the utility rate and may offer evidence."

I am sympathetic to the concern over the cumberson bureaucratic procedures that the present law seems to require; I would hope that some mechanism could be devised to avoid them. But at the present time, in my opinion, Delaware consumers would not be well-served by a return to the situation and procedures described in this preamble. I am therefore returning this legislation without my signature. Respectfully submitted,

# June 21, 1977

To the Delaware State House of Representatives of the 129th General Assembly of the State of Delaware

On June 9, 1977 I received <u>House Bill No. 329</u>, as amended, entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 47, TITLE 7, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO PARK AND RECREATION FEES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN ON AN OFFICIAL SCHOOL OUTING."

I am returning this bill without my signature. This legislation exempts school groups on official school outings at Delaware State Parks from the user fees established by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

Because federal regulations preclude offering an exemption to Delaware school children only, this legislation necessarily has the effect of permitting out-of-state school groups free use of the facilities of Delaware State Parks, with the cost of such use being borne by Delaware taxpayers.

Already some 41% of the users of Delaware State parks are from out of state. And because many of our State parks are conveniently located near out-of-state metropolitan areas, I anticipate that many additional out-of-state school groups would take advantage of the exemption contained in this legislation. The result could well be even greater reductions of State revenues in the future that the \$15,000 reduction estimated for fiscal year 1978.

In addition, this legislation is counter to the efforts of this Administration to have those individuals and groups who use and enjoy State resources and facilities pay for such use. Indeed, in anticipation of increased revenues from park user and camp user fees, certain General Fund appropriations to the Park Section of the Division of Parks and Recreation, including appropriations for twelve permanent positions, supplies, materials, and capital outlay, have been eliminated or reduced in House Bill 300, the proposed 1978 Budget Appropriation Act. Thus, the bill would have an adverse effect on the laudable efforts of the Division to make certain park services self supporting.

Finally, I note that the present fees for park use, as established by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control sets a fee of \$10.00 per day for a Delaware-registered vehicle, such as a school bus, carrying more than thirty persons. Similar vehicles from other states are charged \$20.00 per day. This means that a busload of forty-four Delaware high school students could enjoy a day's outing at a Delaware park for only 25¢ per person. This modest charge suggests that the burden on Delaware taxpayers for subsidizing out-of-state groups could well be greater than any benefit they or their children would receive from the legislation. Further the Department of Natural Resources received in excess of a hundred requests each year for exceptions to park fee regulations. Many of these exceptions are equally as meritorious as this one would be; to grant an exception for one group makes it difficult to deny exceptions to others. It is better to require each user group to pay a small fee for the use of Delaware's resources and, accordingly, I am returning House Bill 329 without my signature.

A recent court decision ruled that if an individual was killed in an automobile accident, his estate would be able to collect for earnings that he would have made in the <u>future</u>. This, is effect, would make the automobile coverage a form of life insurance in some instances.

HB 302 returns the Delaware No-Fault system back to its original intent. This would be to pay an injured party while he is disabled, with benefits other than funeral expenses to terminate with the expiring of the injured party.

If this bill is not passed, there will be a mandated increase in automobile insurance premiums brought about by the court ruled increase in benefits.

Dear Representative Oberle:

House Joint Resolution 19, which was reported out of the Administrative Services Committee on June 7, 1977, asks the Public Service Commission to report, within 14 days of signature by the Governor, as to what basis at law may exist for an immediate denial of Delmarva Power & Light Company's rate increase application in Docket No. 885.

I understand that the Resolution has been proposed by Victor Singer, an intervenor in this docket. While Mr. Singer, in his application for leave to intervene, raised questions similar to those in the Resolution, he has not offered any evidence or witnesses to support his position. The Hearing Examiner, has not, at this writing, received Mr. Singer's brief. Evidence is still being received by the Examiner, including the subject of tariff design.

The Commission must follow procedures established under the law by the General Assembly and the Constitution. These include receiving all evidence offered by all parties, opportunity for briefs or oral argument by all parties, a Hearing Examiner's summary of the evidence and applicable law, and, no sooner than 20 days after the Hearing Examiner's report deliberation and decision by the Commission. That date has been set for August 2, 1977.

If the Commission were to now decide a part of the case, any of the parties could sue to have the decision upset on the basis of pre-judgment.

The issues raised by <u>HJR 19</u> will be considered by the Commission when it deliberates. Further, the Commission will consider any other issues bearing on this case, on request, if testimony bearing on the issue has been offered. But to decide any part of this docket prematurely would be legally indefensible.

I will be pleased to discuss this further with you and any other member of the House.

### GENERAL OBLIGATIONS -- State of Delaware "A+" Rating Continued

The State of Delaware will fund an estimated \$30 million cumulative deficit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, through a negotiated 30-month loan from Citibank. The loan will be evidenced by \$30 million of notes of the State at interest rates of 3.84% for the first 60 to 90 days, and 4.34% thereafter. The notes will be callable in 60 to 90 days, during which period the state has the option of buying up the loan and then selling notes competitively to obtain a lower interest rate.

The notes are to be paid from an increase in certain taxes and fees recently enacted by the General Assembly. The gasoline tax was increased to 11 cents/gallon from 9 cents; the income tax on corporations, banks and building and loan associations to 8.7% from 7.2%; and the fee for certification of corporate documents by the Secretary of State to \$10 from \$7.50. The gasoline tax will revert to 9 cents/ gallon on the earlier of December 31, 1979 or the date of certification that sufficient monies are available to pay the total principal and interest requirements on the notes. The increase in the income tax is permanent.

The currently estimated \$30 million cumulative deficit for FY 1977, is considerable less than the \$56 million estimated in March, 1977 (see F.I.I. March 26, 1977). The actual cumulative deficit at May 31, 1977 was \$30,155,340. Due to this deficit financing, the state can begin FY 1978 in a balanced financial position.

Although elimination of the deficit in this manner is a difficult, but constructive step in meeting the problems of the past, the State will continue to be tested in its ability to hold expenditures in line with ongoing revenues in the future.

Our "A+" rating on Delaware's general obligation bonds is continued.

On June 21, 1977, I received <u>House Bill No. 388</u>, entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 13, TITLE 10, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO CERTAIN FEES RECEIVED BY THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS."

I am returning this Bill without my signature for the reasons set out herein:

By the provisions of Delaware Code Section 2112, the Sheriff of each of the three counties is entitled to be reimbursed monthy for his mileage expenses incurred in the performance of official duties. House Bill No. 388 authorizes the payment of all fees authorized for collection in respect of the services of the Kent County Sheriff to be paid over to him, without limitation as to reimbursement for mileage expenses as §2112 requires. House Bill No. 388 is therefore either impermissably vague if it is meant to harmonize with the current law, or directly in conflict therewith.

The resolution of the problem which Kent County has encountered in collecting from the State those fees to which it is entitled does not appear to require additional legislation. By copy of this message, I am respectfully requesting that the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, in his capacity as Chief Administrative Officer of the Courts, join with the Executive Department in establishing an administrative resolution of the matter which is satisfactory to each of Delaware's three couties.

TO THE DELAWARE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 129TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE

I am returning to the House of Representatives without my signature, <u>House Bill 300</u>, as amended by Senate Amendment No. 1, an act entitled "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE EXPENSE OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1978 AND TO AMEND CERTAIN PERTINENT STATUTORY PROVISIONS".

Early in the budget process, a cooperative effort between my Administration and the Joint Finance Committee produced a budget, HB 300, that was introduced with my support and joint sponsorship of both parties. Had that budget, with certain line items vetoed and a tax package similar to that adopted on July 2nd, been enacted by the General Assembly and signed into law, we would today have a balanced budget. Such a package had, and still would have, my support, as would two compromise packages developed on July 2nd. Unfortunately, none of these alternatives were acceptable to all parties.

Rather, virtually all the budget reductions I have proposed in the last four months have been rejected by the General Assembly, and a budget passed that is inaccurate, unrealistic, and detrimental to the future of Delaware. I cannot agree with a budget that so seriously distorts our priorities and fails to provide for essential programs to protect state employees, taxpayers, and the welfare of our citizens.

I have returned this legislation without my approval for the following reasons:

First, the budget is in deficit by approximately \$6.8 million, even though the General Assembly has enacted tax increases of \$6.5 million. It is in deficit because the General Assembly has again deliberately underfunded expenditures -- the same technique used a year ago that led to a \$23 million budget deficit.

Second, the budget fails to fund adequately a number of programs essential to the well being of our citizens -- programs which when funded, would add another \$1.8 million to the deficit.

Third, I cannot in good conscience certify to the investment community that this budget is in balance. The absence of such certification could seriously affect Delaware's ability to finance its future capital programs.

Fourth, I believe §97 (c) of the Act to be unconstitutional. That section provides, inter alia, that the Joint Finance Committee shall have the authority to reduce specific line item appropriations of any agency which fails to comply with the intent of that section, which is to achieve a general administrative reduction in the level of state expenditures of one percent. The exclusive authority to appropriate money is vested in the General Assembly, which may only do so by Act. This exclusive legislative function cannot be delegated. In re Opinion of the Justices, 177 A2d 205 (Del. Supr. 1962). The attempt in §97 (c) to delegate the authority to alter or amend a specific line item appropriation created by Act of the General Assembly to the Joint Finance Committee is therefore unconstitutional.

Fifth, the budget strikes all my recommendations for improving the budgetary process, the revenue division, and tax enforcement. Delaware's tax enforcement is among the weakest of our programs; if this budget becomes law there will be <u>less</u> enforcement than there is today, and no improvement in revenue collections.

Finally, the budget reflects an erroneous order of priorities, eliminating critical management personnel in finance and employee training, while adding sport fishing tournaments, a slush fund for the medical examiner, and other low priority items.

I have set forth below the specific corrections that should be incorporated in any budget act finally signed into law:

1. The budget underfunds by \$300,000 the appropriation needed to pay insurance premiums for Blue Cross for state employees. If the funds are not restored, employees could be left without this protection.

2. The budget underfunds by \$425,000 the appropriation needed to pay for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for state employees. If these funds are not restored, employees could be left without this protection.

3. The budget underfunds by \$600,000 the appropriation needed to operate the new state office building in Wilmington. Enough money is provided to operate the building for only five months. Since lease termination procedures have already begun and funds to pay rental for existing office space have not been included in the budget, some state agencies will have no office space available to them after February 1.

4. The budget eliminates funds -- \$168,000 -- for use of seasonal employees to process income tax returns and tax refunds. The budget allocates 60% less money to this program than was actually spent last year. Without these people, Delawareans can expect less tax enforcement and substantial delays in receiving tax refund checks next spring.

The budget mandates \$2.7 million in across the board 5. cuts in food, fuel, electricity, and other essentials for the operation of state government. My Administration suggested, and the General Assembly agreed, to trim all salary lines by 3% to recognize a \$5 million savings from the normal attrition of employees. Further, we will be developing a central purchasing system in the coming year to save \$1.3 million in supplies. Both of these figures had already been deducted from the budget agreed to before the General Assembly's final amendment. An additional \$2.7 million cut can only come from essentials in our institutions and hospitals, which means either hardship for the clients served by the institutions, or a later supplemental to restore these funds to the budget. The Chairman of the Joint Finance Committee has stated that cuts such as these are totally unworkable -- and will only produce increased supplemental appropriations next June.

6. The same "negative growth" deception that was used last year in the education budget has been used again, to produce an illusory saving of \$600,000. Last year's budget was balanced by pretending a negative growth of 4.6 million. In fact, only \$1.4 million was saved, thus requiring a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$3.2 million. This year's budget engages in an identical deception, pretending that \$2.5 million will be saved when, in fact, the saving will be far less. The Department of Public Instruction advises me that the increased figure used in HB 300 has no basis in fact.

These six items total \$4.8 million in obvious underfunding that must be restored to the budget. To pretend that these expenses do not exist is to practice the same deception that led to a \$23 million deficit in last year's budget. In short, HB 300 as amended is not an honest statement of the state's known expenditures for the coming year.

7. The budget improperly juggles debt service accounting to produce an illusory saving of \$2.0 million. Through prudent financial management, my Administration has been able to reduce substantially the cost of debt service. Since the budget was introduced in April, anticipated debt service has been adjusted downwards, first by \$2.0 million, and then last week by an additional \$2.7 million. The initial \$2.0 million reduction was accounted for by increasing anticipated reversions by that amount. Senate Amendment No. 1 reduces debt service by the entire \$4.7 million, without considering the initial \$2.0 million

In addition, a number of proposals made by my Administration that are essential to the future of our state have not been funded in HB 300:

8. The budget does not fund \$800,000 for a new program of education for the handicapped. Legislation to begin

this federally mandated program in September has been a priority of my Administration and has strong support in the General Assembly. Not to begin the program is unfair to handicapped children.

9. In March, I proposed to hire tax enforcement officers to crack down on tax fraud and begin to collect the back taxes owed to Delaware. The tax burden on all will be less if those few who fail to pay their taxes are allowed to escape. The cost of this enforcement would be \$200,000. The legislature failed to approve the funds -- cutting all 13 positions I recommended -- an example of penny wisepound foolish thinking that will cost us millions of dollars in owed taxes. In addition, the budget does not contain \$500,000 needed to computerize tax data and improve tax collection. Every study of Delaware's finances has recommended this program; in my judgment, the state cannot continue to operate its tax collection system manually and expect to collect the revenue due us.

10. The budget does not contain \$300,000 essential to complete the transfer of operations to the state's new computer. The computer was installed last year; to eliminate the money needed to make it fully operational reflects the poorest judgment. In addition, the requested increase in the salary of the Director of CDP was not approved, meaning that we will not be able to attract needed talent to a critical area of state operations.

These three items add another \$1.8 million to the spending that I consider essential to Delaware's future. One of the reasons Delaware's government has been unable to successfully manage its affairs in the past has been the traditional underfunding of modern management techniques. HB 300 as amended encourages this unfortunate attitude.

Finally, beyond this obvious underfunding of essential programs, HB 300 displays an absurd order of priorities:

11. The budget eliminates the position of Training Administrator, the person in state government responsible for managing educational programs to improve the skills of 10,000 state employees.

12. The budget eliminates the position in the Office of Management, Budget and Planning responsible for capital spending analysis. With nearly the highest per capita debt in the nation, Delaware can ill afford to cease analysis of its capital program.

13. Program budgeting is an essential tool to help control expenditures and understand the true cost of our programs. Last week the General Assembly passed, with my support, HB 416 to begin program budgeting. Two days later HB 300 struck from the budget the three positions needed to implement the program budgeting approved in HB 416.

14. The budget cuts in half the contingency fund provided the Governor last year, severely limiting my ability to respond to an emergency. 15. The budget eliminates \$13,000 for merit pay increases for the Governor's staff. At the same time, the budget authorizes merit pay increases for employees of Legislative Council -- including an \$8,000, 48% pay increase for the Executive Director of Legislative Council. The Controller General, who works for the General Assembly, and the Budget Director, who works for the Governor, currently receive identical \$28,000 salaries. HB 300 provides \$2,500 in salary increase for one; nothing for the other.

Some of these fifteen items are themselves sufficient reason to veto HB 300 -- but taken together they provide the fundamental reason for doing so: the budget is in deficit because it does not depict the true obligations the state must fund in the coming fiscal year. If this budget should become law, supplemental appropriations will drive expenditures substantially beyond currently projected revenues, and vital management programs necessary to sound operation of the government cannot be implemented. But most important, we will have made no progress at all in solving one of Delaware's most basic problems -- chronic annual budget deficits.

For this reason I have returned HB 300 without my signature.

In addition, a number of proposals made by my Administration that are essential to the future of our state have not been funded in HB 300:

8. The budget does not fund \$800,000 for a new program of education for the handicapped. Legislation to begin this federally mandated program in September has been a priority of my Administration and has strong support in the General Assembly. Not to begin the program is unfair to handicapped children.

9. In March, I proposed to hire tax enforcement officers to crack down on tax fraud and begin to collect the back taxes owed to Delaware. The tax burden on all will be less if those few who fail to pay their taxes are allowed to escape. The cost of this enforcement would be \$200,000. The legislature failed to approve the funds -- cutting all 13 positions I recommended -- an example of penny wisepound foolish thinking that will cost us millions of dollars in owed taxes. In addition, the budget does not contain \$500,000 needed to computerize tax data and improve tax collection. Every study of Delaware's finances has recommended this program; in my judgment, the state cannot continue to operate its tax collection system manually and expect to collect the revenue due us.

10. The budget does not contain \$300,000 essential to complete the transfer of operations to the state's new computer. The computer was installed last year; to eliminate the money needed to make it fully operational reflects the poorest judgment. In addition, the requested increase in the salary of the Director of CDP was not approved, meaning that we will not be able to attract needed talent to a critical area of state operations.

These three items add another \$1.8 million to the spending that I consider essential to Delaware's future. One of the reasons Delaware's government has been unable to successfully manage its affairs in the past has been the traditional underfunding of modern management techniques. HB 300 as amended encourages this unfortunate attitude.

Finally, beyond this obvious underfunding of essential programs, HB 300 displays an absurd order of priorities:

11. The budget eliminates the position of Training Administrator, the person in state government responsible for managing educational programs to improve the skills of 10,000 state employees.

12. The budget eliminates the position in the Office of Management, Budget and Planning responsible for capital spending analysis. With nearly the highest per capita debt in the nation, Delaware can ill afford to cease analysis of its capital program.

13. Program budgeting is an essential tool to help control expenditures and understand the true cost of our programs. Last week the General Assembly passed, with my support, HB 416 to begin program budgeting. Two days later HB 300 struck from the budget the three positions needed to implement the program budgeting approved in HB 416.

14. The budget cuts in half the contingency fund provided the Governor last year, severely limiting my ability to respond to an emergency.

15. The budget eliminates \$13,000 for merit pay increases for the Governor's staff. At the same time, the budget authorizes merit pay increases for employees of Legislative Council -- including an \$8,000, 48% pay increase for the Executive Director of Legislative Council. The Controller General, who works for the General Assembly, and the Budget Director, who works for the Governor, currently receive identical \$28,000 salaries. HB 300 provides \$2,500 in salary increase for one; nothing for the other.

Some of these fifteen items are themselves sufficient reason to veto HB 300 -- but taken together they provide the fundamental reason for doing so: the budget is in deficit because it does not depict the true obligations the state must fund in the coming fiscal year. If this budget should become law, supplemental appropriations will drive expenditures substantially beyond currently projected revenues, and vital management programs necessary to sound operation of the government cannot be implemented. But most important, we will have made no progress at all in solving one of Delaware's most basic problems -- chronic annual budget deficits.

For this reason I have returned HB 300 without my signature.

I am returning to the House of Representatives, without my signature, <u>House Bill 429</u>, as amended by House Amendment 1, which I received on June 27, 1977. House Bill 429, as amended, is entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 69, TITLE 29, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO PUBLIC WORK CONTRACTS; PROCUREMENTS."

Its laudable purpose is to guarantee that out-of-state vendors doing business with the State of Delaware pay all taxes to the State. To this end, it contains two separate requirements.

The first is that all bidders on State contracts must have valid licenses from the State to engage in the type of business proposed in the advertisement for the bid and must have paid all State taxes. I fully concur in the desirability of this provision.

The second requirement applies to out-of-state vendors only and requires them to post \$10,000 bond when doing business with the State. Failure of any vendor to pay State taxes would result in the forfeiture of the bond to the State. I cannot agree to this requirement for three reasons: first, I feel the amount of the bond will deter many outof-state vendors from bidding on State contracts, which will in many instances result in greater cost to the State. Secondly, a \$10,000 bond is in many cases excessive. For example, it seems unreasonable to require the posting of a \$10,000 bond, in addition to performance bonds, to obtain \$2,000 in State business. Finally, I am advised that requiring such a bond from out-of-state vendors only constitutes a burden on interstate commerce, prohibited by the United States Constitution. Best § Co. v. Maxwell, 311 U.S. 454, Pennsylvania v. West Virginia, 262 U.S. 553.

For these reasons, therefore, I return House Bill 429 as amended, without my signature.

On June 30, 1977 I received <u>House Bill No. 430</u>, as amended by House Amendments 2,3, and 4, and Senate Amendment 2 entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 55, TITLE 29, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO STATE EMPLOYEES PENSION PLAN."

House Bill 430 as originally introduced was fundamentally sound and was supported by the Board of Pension Trustees and by my administration; however, during the legislative process amendments were added to the Bill which have rendered the legislation unacceptable. Accordingly, I am returning House Bill 430, as amended, without my signature for the following reasons:

1. House Amendment 3 would eliminate one of the most critical checks on the cost of State pensions--integration of State pension benefits with Social Security benefits for those employees who exercise their right to "buy-in" to the State plan with respect to service prior to 1977. This amendment compounds the deficiency in the buy-in provision itself, which is actuarially unsound.

2. Senate Amendment 2 provides increases in pension benfits, retroactive to January 1, 1976, to approximately four hundred pensioners who are expressly denied any such benefits at the present time pursuant to 29 Delaware Code, Section 5532, following a determination by audit that their benfits were in excess of those payable by reason of years of State employment.

Those pensioners were given protection against any decrease in benefits pursuant to 29 Delaware Code, Section 5533, but with the clear intent that the resultant overpayments would absorb any subsequently granted increase in benefits otherwise payable. Senate Amendment 2 plays havoc with both the careful balance struck by previous General Assemblies in protecting these pensioners, and with the fiscal note accompanying House Bill 430.

3. Finally, I note that I have received from the Board of Pension Trustees a Resolution urging me to veto this legislation "because the Bill, as amended, contains provisions that the Board of Pension Trustees has consistently opposed

RELATING TO SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS OF KENT COUNTY." This legislation raises the salaries of the elected officials of Kent County from \$6,000 per annum to \$9,000 per annum.

At a time when Delaware taxpayers are asked to bear the burden of higher taxes and when State employees, many of whom reside in Kent County, have had to forego cost of living salary increases, it is most inappropriate for the General Assembly to approve a 50% salary increase for certain elected officials.

For this reason, I am returning House Bill 525 without my signature.

On July 8, 1977 I received <u>House Bill No. 487</u>, entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 34, TITLE 14, OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS."

Unfortunately, there is a serious technical error in the bill which would result in no Delaware student receiving a higher education scholarship during Fiscal Year 1978. I am, therefore, returning the bill without my signature.

By inadvertence, the intended effective date of the legislation--December, 1977-- was omitted from the bill which means that the legislation would take effect upon my signature. That would present the following serious consequences:

1. The 1978 Budget Appropriation Act, Chapter 116, Volume 61, Laws of Delaware, appropriates \$200,000 to the Department

of Public Instruction for Higher Education Scholarships; this legislation, however, takes away the State Board's authority to grant such scholarships.

2. House Bill 487 gives to the Delaware Postsecondary Education Commission the authority to grant Higher Education Scholarships, but the Commission received no appropriation under the 1978 Budget Appropriation Act for such scholarships. Section 23A of the 1978 Budget Appropriation Act prohibits the transfer of funds between agencies.

3. If the funds could be transferred a problem would remain, in that students have already applied for scholarships under the rules and regulations established consistent with present law. Many of these students would not qualify under the new legislation since the states in which they will be attending college have not established reciprocity with Delaware.

I certainly favor the provisions of House Bill 487 and would like to see them become law to enable the State promptly to establish scholarship reciprocity with neighboring states--but not at the expense of the three hundred or so students who would not be able to receive scholarships in fiscal year 1978. I am, therefore, returning the bill without my signature, but I am hopeful that a corrected bill will be dealt with by the legislature at the earliest possible time.

On July 8, 1977 I received <u>House Bill 532</u>, as amended by House Amendment 1, entitled:

"AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 5, SUBCHAPTER IV, TITLE 4, OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO LICENSES TO SELL ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS."

I am returning House Bill 532 without my signature for the following reasons:

1. There is already a procedure set out in Section 543, Title 4, Delaware Code, to be followed when the holder of a liquor license wishes to move his location because of demolition of his building, loss of lease, or similar circumstances beyond his control.

2. The procedures specified by House Bill 532 differ from the procedures contained in the present law in ways which I feel undermine the authority of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission over the relocation of liquor stores. Section 543 presently requires a licensee who wishes to change location to apply to the Commission for a new license, and directs that he is to be given preference by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission. This requirement that a licensee apply for a new license is in harmony with the rulings of Delaware courts that a license to sell alcoholic liquors is not property in any legal or constitutional sense. <u>State v. 0.622 Acres of</u> <u>Land</u> (Super. Ct. 1969). Under House Bill 532, such a licensee would not have to apply for a new license, but would be permitted to move his existing license. Also, Section 543 now imposes a distance requirement for relocation of a liquor store in a county to .9 mile from an existing licensed establishment. House Bill 532, on the other hand, changes the distance to .5 mile.

The State of Delaware exercises, through the Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission, peculiar and exclusive control over alcoholic liquors. The provisions of House Bill 532 appear to affect adversely the authority of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission to regulate the location of liquor stores, and to alter the existing procedures and requirements which have proven practical and effective.

Accordingly, I am returning House Bill 532 without my signature.

On July 8, 1977 I received House Bill 530 entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 46, TITLE 29, DELAWARE CODE,

RELATING TO PUBLIC DEFENDERS AND PRIVATE CLIENTS."

I am returning House Bill 530 without my signature for the following reasons:

1. First, the bill contains a technical error in that it erroneously amends Section 4601 of Title 29, Delaware Code, rather than Section 4602.

2. Second, the legislation in in conflict with a provision of the Delaware Lawyer's Code of Professional Responsibility which prohibits the Public Defender and Assistant Public Defenders from engaging in the private practice of criminal law. This prohibition, which became effective July 1, 1977, pursuant to an order of the Delaware Supreme Court, is in accord with the recommendations contained in the <u>American</u> <u>Bar Association Standards of Criminal Justice</u>, and with recommendations of the Judges of the Superior Court of the State of Delaware, the Censor Committee of the Delaware Supreme Court, the Ethics Committee of the Delaware State Bar Association, and the Criminal Law Committee of the Bar Association.

Not only do there appear to be sound policy reasons for the prohibition, but also, since traditionally in this State regulation of the practice of law has been the responsibility of the judicial branch, it is questionable whether this legislation would supersede the court rule. For these reasons, I am returning House Bill 530 without my signature.

On July 12, 1977 I received House Substitute No. 1 for House Bill No. 417, as amended by House Amendment Nos. 1, 2, 15, and 20, entitled:

" AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 28 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO THE SPANISH GAME OF JAI-ALAI."

I am today returning this Act to the House of Representatives without my signature.

House Substitute 1 for House Bill 417, permitting the game of jai-alai to be played in Delaware, has attracted a great deal of public attention since the initial proposals were brought forward in the spring of this year. Because of the potential economic benefit which may accrue to Delaware and the City of Wilmington as a result of the introduction of this game, I have given the legislation careful and sympathetic consideration. I have not had, nor do I today have, any strong objection in principle to the introduction of jai-alai in Wilmington.

Serious reservations have been expressed by some as to the constitutionality of permitting wagering on jai-alai exhibitions in light of Article II, Section 17 of the Delaware Constitution which prohibits any gambling in Delaware except for lotteries under State control, horse racing and bingo. While I share these concerns, the ultimate test of constitutionality must be decided in the courts, and a veto of the bill on constitutional grounds would be premature.

But as I have had the opportunity in recent days to examine the legislation in some detail, I find that in the rush to judgment on this legislation, Delaware has been left with a toothless statute which does not provide for adequate protection against potential abuses that may accompany the operation of and the gambling associated with the game of The statute was drafted, introduced, and enacted jai-alai. in haste. There were inadequate legislative and public hearings. There was no critical comparison of the Delaware statute with the statutes, rules, and regulations governing the operation of jai-alai in states such as Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Nevada which have more experience in this game than does Delaware. In short, I believe the inadequate opportunity for a careful consideration of the potential ramifications of jai-alai wagering upon our State and its people has fostered legislation which contains the following problems:

1. First, House Substitute No. 1 for House Bill No. 417 does not adequately protect the State of Delaware and its people against the potential infiltration of organized crime and other forces of corruption into the ownership and operation of the enterprise. United States government officials, for example, have recently acknowledged an investigation into the circumstances surrounding an \$11 million loan from the troubled Central States Teamsters Pension Fund to finance the jai-alai fronton in Bridgeport, Connecticut. Upon comparison of the controls in the hastily drawn Delaware legislation with the controls contained in the legislation of other states, I find the following deficiencies:

a. Most importantly, the Delaware statute provides only for the licensing of the corporation and does not require the licensing of individual officers, employees, ownership interests and others who may control the game. I think it is essential if we are to provide adequate guarantees for our citizens that there be full financial disclosure by all individuals and corporations involved prior to the issuance of a license, and that these disclosure requirements and controls be ongoing. Full disclosure of financial interest, criminal record, prior employment, and evidence of personal character must be required by statute.

b. The Delaware statute does not give the Commission the power to impose fines.

c. The Delaware statute does not require the licensing of persons providing concessions such as food, beverage, and parking.

d. The Delaware statute does not contain a prohibition against the Commissioners having an interest in the property or premises used for the fronton.

e. The Delaware statute is silent on the matter of a transfer of ownership or substantial interest by a licensee.

In short, if we are going to permit wagering on the outcome of jai-alai exhibitions in this State, we must first guarantee that everyone involved in the enterprise stands in the brightest spotlight of disclosure and scrutiny. I am not persuaded that these guarantees could, or should, be left to rules and regulations of the Commission.

2. Secondly, Section 632(a) of the Act requires that any application for a license to conduct a jai-alai meeting must be filed on or prior to the 15th day of August preceeding the year for which the license is sought. This deadline-less than one month away--creates a possible disadvantage for all potential licensees except for the potential licensee which fathered the legislation. Additionally, Commissioners would have to be appointed, the Executive Director and staff hired, and all rules and regulations promulgated in approximately three weeks--a goal which I do not believe to be reasonable. While the subject section permits a license application to be filed at a later date for good cause, the Act provides no guarantee that such will occur.

3. Finally, I cannot support the distribution of the parimutuel betting pool mandated by Sections 665 and 666 of the Act. The State is allotted only five percent, a percentage which is exceeded in every other state having jai-alai except Rhode Island. The bettor would receive 80 3/4% of the pool, which is the lowest of any state having jai-alai. And finally, the successful licensee would receive 13 3/4% of the pool, which is the highest percentage allotted to the promoter-operator of a fronton in any of the participating states. Only the 3/4% set aside for the City of Wilmington, should a fronton be located there, appears reasonable.

For these reasons, I am returning House Substitute 1 for House Bill No. 417, as amended, without my signature. If this legislation will provide as much potential benefit for our State as its most ardent supporters would have us believe, then I certainly feel confident that it will stand the test of a short delay for more careful consideration and an opportunity to address the points which I have raised. We should be wary of claims that we must act now or forever lose the golden opportunity, and proceed down this path with due care and deliberation. Quoting from the Commission on the Review of the National Policy Toward Gambling's October 1976 report:

"The Commission recommends that any State that introduces jai-alai as a forum for legalizing gambling should exercise a high degree of caution regarding both the quality of the players and the regulatory procedures used in overseeing the sport."

The regulatory procedures in this legislation are weak and inadequate to protect the people of Delaware from potential abuse should jai-alai gambling come to our State. For these reasons, I am returning this legislation without my signature.

Dear Judge Latchum:

I am both puzzled and concerned by your statement that appeared in an article by Ms. Ida Kosciesza, a reporter for the paper, in the News Journal, Wilmington, Delaware, Saturday, November 12, 1977, in response to Attorney Rodney M. Layton's statement on the medical center's contractual agreement with Medicare. In the article Attorney Layton said:

"The medical center has a contractual agreement to run the transportation system and will run it whether Medicare pays the bill or not."

You stated, "The court is not concerned with whether Omega is financially sound or with 'who is going to suffer' if it is not. I have a matter of law to decide. It may be they've made the dumbest mistake that's ever been made in New Castle County, but I can't correct that mistake on account of dumbness. The court can judge the case only on the record and can determine only if HEW, in approving Omega, has been 'arbitrary and capricious'."

Although I do not question the technical accuracy of what you said, it seems to me as a public servant that your choice of words could have been better when you said you are not concerned with whether Omega is financially sound or who is going to suffer. There are community-based people who interpret your statement as meaning you do not care about their welfare, and I am one of those people. It is my opinion that a Federal Judge has a special obligation to be concerned about who will suffer, for whatever reason, and, by virtue of his position and wisdom, has great discretionary latitude.

I would hope that my comments are not taken as an attempt to run your business, but rather as the position of one concerned about the elderly and other poor, who realize that often public officials couldn't care less about what happens to them.

It is also my hope that, in the spirit as well as the letter of the law, you are indeed concerned with who will suffer.

On October 14, 1977 I received <u>House Bill 603</u>, entitled: "AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 5, TITLE 28, DELAWARE CODE, RELATING TO STATE TAX ON ADMISSIONS AND ON CONTRIBUTIONS TO PARI-MUTUEL AND TOTALIZATOR POOLS CONDUCTED OR MADE AT HARNESS RACING ACKS."

This bill authorizes a credit against the State's tax on pari-mutuel and totalizator pools for harness racing tracks, based on a track's loss before taxes on its operations during the previous fiscal year. Dover Downs is the only harness racing track which would currently qualify for the tax credit under the provisions of the bill, due to its average parimutuel handle and losses sustained. For the current fiscal year, the State had anticipated receiving some \$634,869 in pari-mutuel and totalizator pool tax revenues from the track. However, the fiscal note prepared for the General Assembly estimates that as a result of the tax credit afforded by House Bill 603, the State would lose some \$518,689 of these anticipated revenues, receiving only \$116,000.

In my opinion, the fiscal situation in the State simply does not permit, at this time, the loss of some halfmillion dollars in anticiapted revenues. In addition to the amounts appropriated by the 1978 Annual Appropriation Act, the General Assembly has already authorized some \$1.6 million in supplemental appropriations and the State can presently identify more than \$3 million of additional supplemental appropriations that will probably be necessary during the remainder of the fiscal year. This leaves less than half-a-million of monies available to meet those emergency and unanticipated supplementals which have not now been identified under current projections.

This tight budgetary situation obviously mandates that strict management controls be continued. At some point further into the fiscal year, when it is possible to predict more accurately the funds which will be needed to meet remaining unknown supplemental appropriations, the situation might permit reconsideration of this legislation.

Accordingly, I am returning House Bill 603 without my signature.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, PIERRE S. du PONT, IV, Governor of the State of Delaware, have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the said State to be hereunto affixed at Dover, this 7th day of December, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the two hundred and first.

1. Granting personal income tax credits based on the amount of State Income Tax withheld from employees in newly created jobs which add to the total number of jobs.

2. Having each person so hired work at the normal wage, salary and fringe benefits for his or her occupation as others in similar jobs.

3. Documenting the deduction through the use of a specially marked State Income Tax withholding form.
