## Local Unitarians To Hear 5 Talks By Rhodes Scholar

The Unitarian Fellowship of Newark will have Prof. Marshall Knappen of the University of Delaware as featured speaker in a series of Sunday morning addresses at the Fellowship Building, 101 Spylard Drive, Oakland.

H. Fletcher Brown professor of history and political science, Dr. Knappen will present five talks on "The Religious Liberal and Social Issues," a series dealing with positions that a liberal church and its members may take at the national, international and local levels.

The first of these talks will be given this Sunday at 11 a.m. Dates for the remaining lectures have been set for Oct. 14; Nov. 11; Dec. 16; and Jan. 20.

Professor Knappen came to the University of Delaware in 1958 as visiting professor; joined the permanent faculty in 1960, and was awarded the Brown chair by the board of trustees in 1961.

A Rhodes Scholar, he received BA and MA degrees from Oxford; his master of theology degree at Princeton Seminary; and his PhD at Cornell.

## 1134 Freshmen Report Sunday on Campus With Upperclassmen Coming Back Today

Capped with blue and yellow dinks and clasping handbooks, 1134 freshmen were welcomed to the University of Delaware last Sunday for the start of orientation week activities.

The new students and their parents were greeted by President John A. Perkins; representatives of the office of the dean of students; residence hall directors, and 100 junior counselors.

While the students were engaged in registering and getting acquainted with campus facilities, parents attended their own orientation period — a lecture by Dr. G. Gorman Lane, professor of psychology, who spoke on "The Parent's Freshman Year."

"The freshman year, for many a youth, will be a first opportunity to try out independent living. As parents you will have to help him to have this opportunity," advised Dr. Lane. "Yet the parent cannot go too far, for youth still needs guidance and love."

Printing out that while the student will receive guidance at the university, he will be thrown more on his own than ever before, Dr. Lane said that the university and the parents probably "will have to suffer through many a setback before the process is completed. No really mature person ever grows up without a struggle."

Dr. Lane urged parents to neither leave their students on their own too much nor to guide them too much.

## Capt. Dwight Dir Brings Connie In With Engine Out

A Super Constellation was landed safely at Los Angeles by a Newark pilot last Thursday after one of its four engines failed.

Aboard the crippled Capitol Airlines craft piloted by Capt. Dwight Dir of 110 O'Daniel Ave., Newark, were 113 passengers and crewmen arriving from Honolulu.

Dir said he had to feather his No. 1 engine when it developed ignition trouble. Emergency equipment rolled out on the field at Los Angeles International Airport but was not needed.

A Coast Guard plane escorted the airliner in, accompanying it for an hour and a half.

## 7,782 Enrollment In Public Schools Sets Local Record

Increase Of 705 Pupils  
Over Past Year's Total  
Announced For District

A record enrollment in the Newark special school district has been reported for the current term which began last Thursday, with 3,323 junior and senior high, and 4,459 elementary school pupils for a total of 7,782 — an increase of 705 youngsters in the classrooms compared with last year's enrollment.

In the senior high school, enrollment has increased from 1061 to 1404; in Central Junior High, from 850 to 911; and at Ogletown Junior High School, from 968 to 1008.

Elementary school enrollment includes 662 at Brookside, 375 at Central, 200 at Christians, 226 at Eden, 516 at Galloway, 683 at Medill, 671 at the Jennie E. Smith School and 838 at West Park Place.

In addition, 108 pupils are enrolled in seven special education classes at the Central, Christians, and Galloway Elementary Schools, and at Central Junior High School.

Enrollment increases over last year are reported at Central, Christians, Galloway, Medill and the Jennie E. Smith Elementary Schools, with decreases at Brookside, Eden, and West Park Place because of transfers to alleviate last year's overcrowded classrooms in these buildings.

## First Day at Sea

At 6 a.m. the lights go on and the ship's pipe shrills. Some of us, those with built-in mental alarm clocks and a distaste for the shock of the whistle, are awake at 5:55. This is the most restful five minutes in the world. The ship is rolling gently and the soft, red glow of the night lights seem to make the small compartment spread endlessly. Then the peace is shattered by the shrilling pipe and the gravel voice through the speaker harshly announcing the new day.

We swing down to the tiled deck and make our way across it. Dawn's gray light filters down the ladder into the berth deck.

Once on deck I note that the red lights seen the night before, are now resolved into sleek destroyers. Two Fletcher to port, another Gearing to starboard, and ahead the carrier Wasp.

The Wasp, the command ship armed with anti-sub planes, looks like a great black wall against the morning sun. Several helicopters flit about like great wasps, hovering over the carrier and about the destroyers. Going forward along the main deck, I stop off by Emergency Radio. One of the "thirds" sleeps here.

Britannica Junior is another reference set which is recommended as "good," meaning accurate. Published by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc., the Junior undergoes continuous revision. Written in large type, the volumes are easily read by the elementary grade child, to whom the set is slanted. There are 9,000 good illustrations including 700 Hammond maps. An atlas index with much text helps to explain the elementary subjects covered. This one is good for age group 9 to 13. It relates

subjects to the elementary curriculum studied. Price is \$150.

If you have been wondering about the "endive encyclopedias," those sold at the supermarkets, a recent evaluation shows the Funk and Wagnalls Standard Reference Encyclopedia, put out by Univox Books, to be a leader in this class. Accuracy is good (this is what you should watch for in any good reference work), and you may obtain a yearbook to keep up-to-date for \$1.69. It can be used by a child of ten and up. Comes in 25 volumes; no index. There are 6,000 illustrations and 16 pages of small maps in color. Price is \$24 per set, although there is an arrangement in the stores whereby one volume may be purchased at a time, for a special price. In this price range, the Hart Chart suggests that the "Lincoln Library" is a leader.

Harold "Sonny" Wilkins, Jr., president of the New Castle County Fire Chiefs Association, caught a bluefish to help believe in fishing with Capt. Ed Ahearn aboard the "Jet" some 2 1/2 miles northeast of Barnegat Light off the New Jersey coast on a calm Atlantic Ocean last Saturday.

The beautiful blue weighed 12 1/2 pounds, and a blue this big is a frightening as well as a thrilling thing to hook.

No fish outguts a blue — a supercharged chunk of satin silver dynamite in any size — and when you get a bluefish in a 12-pound package, well, it's a rare, tremendous experience.

This bluefish had a dredger-arm underjaw with the teeth and sheering power to chop a man's finger off with all the ease of a volunteer fireman snapping at a protest.

With Sonny Wilkins and his party that included Don Harvey, Dave Davis, Harvey Sharp, Dick Pelcher, and Ralph Ingram, Skipper Ahearn picked up three big blues in some relatively slow fishing at the south end of the Ridge off Barnegat, and they moving north, they found the real fishing.

Chumming with bunker and fishing from the anchored cruiser with strips of butterfish in the oily slick liberated as mossbunker were fed into a meat grinder, they caught 72 great blues weighing from six to 12 pounds as Mother Carey's Chickens and an assortment of shrieking sea birds soared and dipped over great turbulent surface swirls in the chumline.

And this was the kind of fishing one may often dream and occasionally read about!

Mr. Wilkins, Senior, a former New England commercial bluefisherman, has caught tons of blues, but his son's 12-pounder stopped him.

"What is it?" the veteran pro asked.

Norman Buchanan of 15 Choate Street in Newark, top honors for the biggest flounder caught last week out of Ocean City, Md. Fishing with live minnows from his boat in Synepuxent Bay, Mr. Buchanan boated a 5-lb 3-oz. doormat or a fluke or flounder to furnish fabulous little plenty.

Mrs. W. P. Zimmerman, manager for the Colonial Crest Cottages where Norman Buchanan stayed while ashore, took the trouble to call last Monday from Ocean City to tell us of the Newark flounder champion's prize catch. Thank you, Mrs. Zimmerman!

Concerning the fishing out of Longport, Jerseyman Johnny Kerns said last Monday morning in a brief visit at the Newark Post that he had "nothing to report."

But Mr. Kerns added, "we have all the blowfish you want and plenty of flounder — but small ones."

Things weren't too encouraging in the Delaware surf last Saturday, either, for Newark's Paul Hawthorne and Bob Mayer.

"After hearing of all the strikes you had a week ago," Mr. Mayer mused, "I called Paul Hawthorne and we took off at the crack of dawn on Saturday for a try at those blues I heard about."

"I caught one blue shortly after we hit the beach — a nice blue, too — and other surfmen were beaching fish, with schools of baitfish dimpling the surface close inshore."

"And then the sun came out — and all action stopped," Bob Mayer frowned.

We pointed out that sunshine has little to do with bluefish activity, and suggested that Messrs. Mayer and Hawthorne had quit the scene too soon without giving Delaware's Atlantic white water a thorough fling.

"Oh no we didn't!" Bob Mayer retorted stoutly concerning this latter proffered explanation. "We fished from 9 o'clock in the morning until 3 in the afternoon — and didn't catch a fish after that first five minutes."

Well, that's test enough.
