





Highway Accidents

Two automobile accidents occurred on Delaware highways early yesterday morning, one attended by three fatalities, that emphasize the importance of every driver always exercising the utmost care, taking nothing for granted, particularly during the night, when guiding his car past another vehicle headed in the same direction, or when crossing an intersecting road. While all of the circumstances connected with the fatal collision are not clear, now being the subject of an investigation, it appears as if the colliding car, after passing around one parked truck, was in collision with another truck that was about to tow the first one away.



Pending the outcome of the investigation of this accident, we advance no opinion, so far as it affects responsibility for the erash, but in analysing the known elements we see in them a lesson to all drivers, indicating how they should act when con-fronted by a similar emergency. The other accident, in which a car containing four young men was hit by two locomotives while one of the number was attempt-ing to drive the automobile across the tracks of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad at Newark, demonstrated the futility of warning gestures if they be not heeded. Perhaps the driver of the automobile was confused by the warnings, in this instance. If so, he should realize, as should all other drivers, that the safe plan, in approaching a railroad cross-ing, whether it be equipped with warning devices or not, is to stop and find out whether a train is approaching before attempting to cross. Nor is it safe to shoot across as soon as a train has passed, for another may be coming in the opposite direction or following the first one, moving in the same direction. All drivers should study the circumstances attending both of these accidents, and govern themselves accordingly when driving on the public highways.—Evening Journal-Every Evening, Tues-day, Nov, 28.
