## Rahn, Kuratle Cite EPTC As Potato Weed Control

EPTC applied to potatoes just after drag off in 3/4-in. irrigation water improves control of nutgrass and broadleaf weeds without reducing yields, according to E. M. Rahn, associate professor of horticulture at the University of Delaware.

In a paper presented at the 22nd annual Northeastern Weed Control Conference in New York, Rahn and research assistant Henry Kuratle reported that tests conducted at the university's Georgetown substation indicated that the most effective time of application for nutgrass control was pre-plant.

For best overall weed control without reducing yields, EPTC should be applied just after drag off, they said.

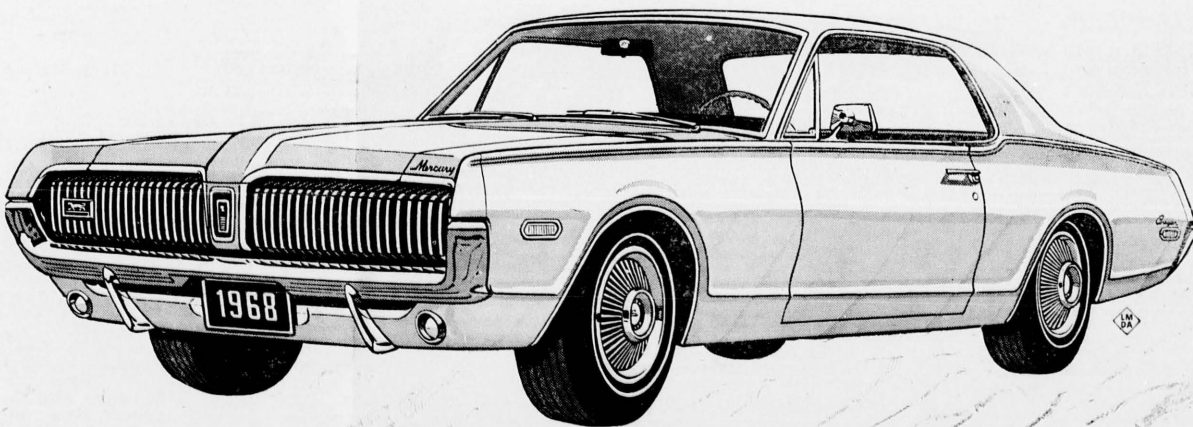

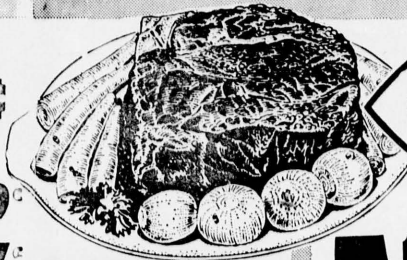

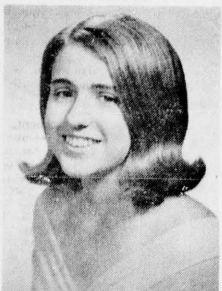

## Hesseltine Reports Promising Outlook For Dairy Farms

Delaware dairymen face a promising outlook throughout 1968 and into the 1970s, according to Dr. W. R. Hesseltine, extension dairyman at the University of Delaware.

Speaking at the opening session of the university winter dairy series on Jan. 10, Hesseltine predicted rapid expansion of the national economy in the 1970s with accompanying increases in dairy demand.

The 1970s will be years of great expansion for the national economy, Hesseltine also predicted. However, a large percentage of the dairymen will not realize that the boom is on, he said. These people will produce only enough to stay in business and will be concerned about increased costs, labor shortages and the need for higher farm prices.

Capital, farms and livestock will move into the hands of better managers, and dairymen must learn better management techniques to take advantage of national growth.

For 1968, Hesseltine advised dairymen not to be afraid of progress and change. "Take advantage of it," he said. Dairymen should use their knowledge and capital to make as much money as they can.

In the long run, those producers who gear their operations to a high degree of efficiency for the 1970s will come out on top, he said. The

## Kenn Barnett Tops Hens As Big Man Not Only In Size

Kenn Barnett, center on Coach Dan Peterson's Delaware basketball team, is the "big man" for the Blue Hens in more ways than one.

To start with Barnett is 6-8, the biggest player on the roster. But his physical size alone doesn't make him the Hens' "big man." It's the size of his contribution to the team which has a 10-3 record.

"It's impossible to measure his value to the team," Peterson says. "He has matured into a very fine team player. He is unselfish and he is the guy we look for to carry us through the tough situations."

Barnett, a senior from Braidwood, Ill., averaged 24.3 points in 12 games last year before running into academic difficulties. He has averaged "only" 17.9 points in the Hens' 19 games this season, but has had more help this year from the rest of the lineup.

"We have four players scoring in double figures and we are averaging eight points per game more than any Delaware team in history, so we don't need Barnett scoring so much," Peterson says. "What we do need—and what he has been giving us—is strong defense and rebounding."

"The Net," as the lanky senior is called by teammates, is averaging 10.7 rebounds and is close to that figure in shots blocked.

He has done an outstanding job defensively," Peterson says. "He has outplayed every big man he has faced this year."

Barnett, unanimous Pocono Classic all-tourney choice last two years in a row, is at his best in the Hens' tough games. He has been the team's high scorer in nine of 13 games, and high rebounder seven times.

Larson, who examined the carcass of the animal in a study of Western Maryland's resurgent beaver population, made the determination using a technique of dental examination developed in 1964.

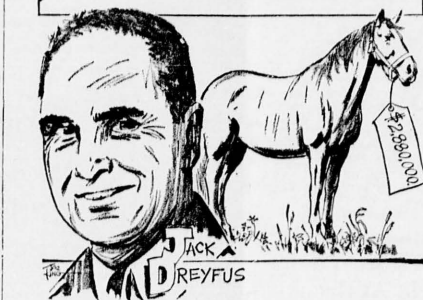

The state authorized limited beaver trapping to control over-populations in 1962.

If Jack J. Dreyfus Jr. paid as much for the remaining three-quarters of Beau Gar as he paid when he first bought a quarter interest in the horse, L. L. As a racing fan he became enamored of a filly named Belleseur belonging to Mr. Lawrence, Beau Gar was his first foal, and was sired by Count Fleet, another Dreyfus favorite. As a race horse, Beau Gar was handicapped by a chronic back injury, didn't race until four and won but four races. As a sire for Hobeau Farm, however, he has gotten such good ones as Beau Purple, Beaupe, Red Gar, and Handsome Boy, one of last year's top handicap performers.
