Christmas Day

A midnight service of the Holy Communion will be held Christmas Eve at 11:30 p. m. at St. Thomas Church. The choir will sing the communion service composed by Healey Willson and the Gloria in Excelsis of Tallis arranged by Tertius Noble.

The hymns will be: Adeste Fideles—Break Bread, O Beateous, Heavenly Light—Come Upon a Midnight Clear—O Little Town of Bethlehem—Of the Father's Love Begotten—Hark, the Herald Angels Sing. The choir will be directed by J. Robert King with Mrs. Arthur Johnson, organist.

On Christmas Day, there will be a service of the Holy Communion at 11 a. m. The Junior Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Johnson, will sing the communion service of Merbecke and the Offertory Hymn—In the Bleakful Mid-Winter, by Holst. Hymns will be: O Come All Ye Faithful—Thou Distant Thy Throne—Lamb of God, I Give Thee—I Worship Thee, Lord Jesus—Angels We Have Heard on High.

At 3 p. m. on Christmas Eve, the Episcopal Church will present a special program over the Mutual Broadcasting System. The famous singing stars, Gladys Swarthout and Lawrence Tibbett, will be accompanied by full orchestra and a special choral group in Christmas music. The Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church will read the Nativity Story of St. Luke.

SEEK DELAY  
ON SCHOOL  
MERGE VOTEBoard Wants  
Referendum  
Here Held Up

Unless the law requires that it be held immediately, the local referendum on the question of merging the Pleasant Valley School with the Newark District will not be held until after the new elementary school building is constructed.

This statement was issued by the local school board this week in response to a query from Dr. George R. Miller, state superintendent of schools, if the law requires that the vote be held immediately, authorities here want a provision inserted to the effect that if the merger is approved no pupils will be admitted to the local schools until after the new building is finished.

Beverly Taylor, daughter of Mrs. Board Taylor, has been granted permission to continue attending the Newark schools, although her family has moved to New Castle. This is in line with the policy of the local board to permit students who leave the district to finish the term here if they desire.

N. H. S. To Offer Free Night  
Classes In Adult Education

A free program of adult education, offering courses in general shop and sewing, will be launched at the Newark High School the early part of January.

Council Sets First Zone  
Law Reading For Jan. 3Revisions Made Since  
Public Hearing Listed;  
Changes Still Possible

The proposed zoning ordinance for Newark is slated for its first and second reading at a meeting of the Town Council on January 3.

In order to insure that the public is fully informed on the draft as it now stands, town officials this week released a list of changes made following the public hearing a few weeks ago. The major revisions follow:

1—Southside of East Park Place adjacent to South Chapel Street reclassified from RM to RD.

2—That Article V, Section C, D, E and F be removed and placed in Article VI and that in Article V the following proviso on duplex dwellings be inserted: "When the immediate neighborhood is more than 50 per cent developed approval of 75 per cent of the residents within a radius of one-fourth mile of the lands in question must be secured."

3—New Street area changed from RD to RS as result of petition.

4—Northside of East Delaware Avenue between Academy Street and South Chapel Street for a depth not exceeding 150 feet be redesignated RD area.

5—That the area on the east side of South College Avenue now designated commercial be redesignated RM area.

6—That the area now designated as commercial on the east side of North Chapel Street be changed to RM.

7—Article VIII, Section C, in reference to definition of commercial area, the following insertions: sale of feed and farm supplies, lumber and milling yards and customary incidental uses connected therewith and storage of materials not excluded in other districts, and laundries, cleaning and dyeing plants, and that the area east of the rear property lines of the properties on the east side of North Chapel Street and west of the property line of the Penna. Railroad of the way of Fomery Branch, south to the B. & O. and north of East Main Street, now zoned industrial be redesignated business district.

All properties shown as commercial to be changed to Business District.

8—Kershaw Street extended to be division line for RM and RA districts south of East Cleveland Avenue.

9—Section IV RS Districts—that a park be inserted as a permitted use in this section.

3 CONTRACTS  
FOR \$613,349  
ON SCHOOLSNo Date Set  
For Starting  
Construction

Three contracts, totalling \$613,349.90 and covering general construction, electrical and plumbing work, have been awarded for erection of the new elementary school building here.

Although the law requires that the work get underway within 20 days, this may involve only a few preliminary steps, school officials said, adding that it is not known as yet when full-scale construction would begin. Ground breaking ceremonies may be arranged.

Contract for the general construction has been awarded to the Rupert Construction Company for its total bid of \$477,124, broken down into a base bid of \$460,377, plus \$4,747 for the driveway and \$12,000 for the cafeteria.

The plumbing work went to T. T. Weldin and Sons Company for its total bid of \$117,337, and the electrical work to Garrett, Miller & Company for \$18,689.90.

A request to the 1949 state legislature for additional funds to complete the above contracts will be made by the local school boards. The request will be total \$40,400, and authority for it has been granted by Dr. George R. Miller, state superintendent of schools. Added to the request figure will be another \$70,000 item for renovation and extension of the gymnasium in the main building.

The contracts were awarded last Thursday at a meeting of the local building commission. Those present were: Joseph McVey, W. F. Wilson, Wilmer E. Shue, secretary; Fred Fowler, engineer; A. J. Taylor, school auxiliary; Robert S. Gallaher and J. Pearce Cann, board of education and Frederick B. Kutz, high school principal.

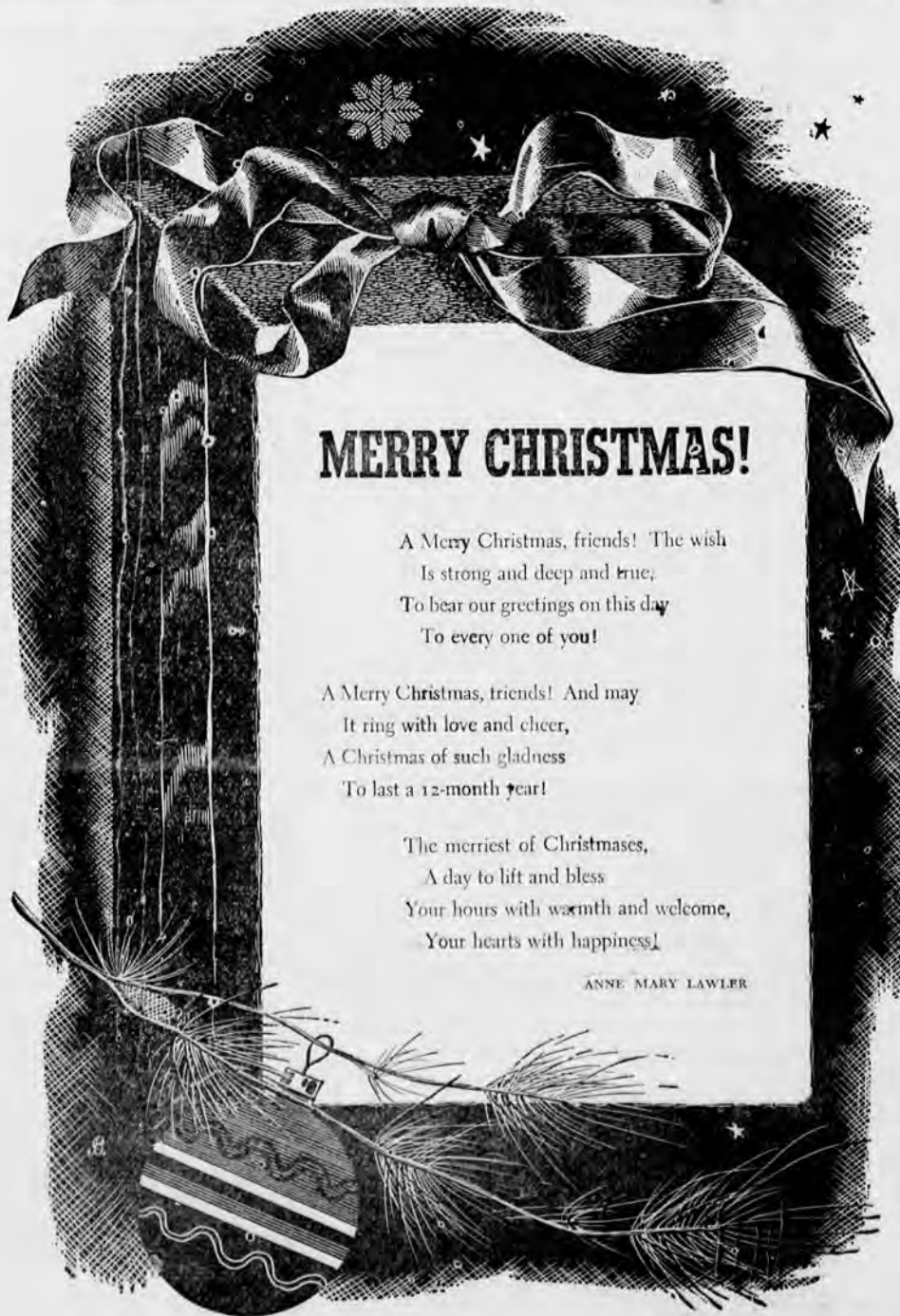
