










A Delaware linebacker attempts to break away from a tackle. Powerful plays like these resulted in Delaware's crushing defeat over Richmond.














A Blue Hen dashes past his opponents. The runners skill over tough courses resulted in a winning season.




All Around The Country

School records were established by Josh Smith in the 100 backstroke & 200 individual medley. Pete Holcroft set a school record in the 200 freestyle.






Racing Against Time



Highlighting the season for the Blue Hens and head coach Joyce Perry were upset wins over the University of Vermont, 1993-94 NAC Champion for the third consecutive season, and Northeastern, this year's runner up to the Catamounts.

With the disqualification of the University of Maine for the post-season NAC tournament because of too many regular season contests on its schedule, the Blue Hens earned a fourth place seeding and a first round home game for the North Atlantic Conference tournament.

Delaware went on a 16-0 run to take a 50-45 lead before the Terriers bounced back to tie it at 50. But Boston's Gretchen Klaus hit three clutch foul shots in the final minute to give Boston a 62-60 playoff win and put an end to the Delaware season.

Dominating The Net

fter capturing the North Atlantic Conference title each of the past two years and making back to back NCAA Tournament appearances, the Blue Hen men's basketball squad found the going a bit tougher in 1993-94.

Under ninth-year head coach Steve Steinwedel, a young Hen squad still posted a 14-13 record, the unprecedented seventh straight .500 or better season in school history. The Hens placed fifth in the NAC regular season standings with a 7-7 mark but were denied their third straight title when No. 4 New Hampshire downed Delaware 80-67 in the NAC quarterfinals in Durham, NH.

Despite the early exit from the NAC tournament, highlights were plentiful for the Blue Hens, who had no seniors on the squad and will return all 14 players for the 1994-95 season.

Junior guard Brian Pearl led the Hens in scoring with 16.7 points per game and was named second team All-NAC for the second straight year. He failed to score in double figures just twice all season and became only the third junior to reach 1,000 career points midway through the year vs. Hartford.

Pearl's fellow co-captain, 6-5 junior forward Robbie Johnson, was the NAC leader and among the nation's best three point shooters all season long. He averaged 12.6 points per game, second best on the squad, and set school records for three point field goals made in a game (7) and season (72) and for three point field goal percentage (44.2 percent) for a season.

Rob Garner, a 6-2 sophomore guard and a transfer from the University of Texas, made a strong first year contribution by leading the Hens in assists (5.0 per game) and scoring 11.9 ppg. One of the most pleasant surprises was 6-7 freshman forward Greg Smith who averaged 9.7 points and 5.8 rebounds per game and shot a team-high 55.8 percent from the field to earn NAC All-Rookie honors.









The Blue Hen men's tennis team, coached the previous 40 years by Dr. C. Roy "Doc" Rylander, kept its winning ways alive under LeRoy with a 10-7 dual record, the team's fifth straight winning season. LeRoy, the top player in UD women's tennis history, also doubled as the Blue Hen women's coach.

Delaware posted key wins over Lafayette, Towson State, and Drexel during the season but lost two of three matches at the North Atlantic Conference championships at Vermont in April and placed sixth overall.

Individually, all six singles players posted winning records led by senior Felix Nacson. 

ead coach Sue McGrath-Powell's women's outdoor track and field team completed another solid season in 1994.

Led by a strong corps of middle distance runners and weight throwers, the Blue Hens capped the season with a fourth place finish at the North Atlantic Conference championships May 7 at Northeastern University in Boston, finishing just 15 points behind the second place team.

Along the way, the Hens competed at meets at Penn, Navy, James Madison, Millersville, Army, and William & Mary.

Highlighting the NAC championships was the long distance running duo of freshman Tara Pointin and sophomore Chris Rolleri. Pointin captured two first place finishes, winning the 3,000 meters in 10:29.61 and capturing the 5,000 meters in 17:51.9. Rolleri won the 10,000 meters in a time of 38:53.7 and placed second behind Pointin in the 3,000 meters. Tiffany Stith was second in the 100 meter hurdles in 15.47, Katie Guarracino was second in the 1,500 meter run in 4:52.74, and Sheryl Hall was third in the 400 meter hurdles in 1:06.5.

Three records were set during the spring as Hall ran to a time of 14.79 at the Navy Invitational to set a school record in the 100 meter hurdles, Sarah Cowles ran to a UD record time of 2:14.86 in the 800 meters to place second at the James Madison Invitational, and the 4 x 1,500 meter relay team of Guarracino, Murphee Hayes, Pointin, and Maggie Leffer set a school record with a time of 20:27.3 at the Colonial Relays.

Pointin won the 3,000 meters at the Delaware State Invitational and the 10,000 meters at the Navy Invitational while Hall won the high jump competition at both Millersville and James Madison and Chris Delli Paoli won the hammer at both Penn and Navy.
