Army Quota Defers 309 ROTC Students

Sophomore Tests Set Up To Pick Out Candidates

Quotas under which University of Delaware ROTC students may receive Selective Service deferment during next summer when they otherwise might be drafted, have been established under authority of the Department of the Army, Col. Randolph T. Pendleton, commandant of the University's ROTC battalion, announced today.

Of some 270 Delaware freshmen who are now enrolled in the first-year ROTC training, 191 are eligible to receive deferments which will carry them through the summer until they are enrolled again next fall, Colonel Pendleton said. No student is to be drafted when regularly enrolled during any academic year.

There also are 175 sophomores in the basic ROTC program at Newark, of whom 118 are eligible to receive summertime deferment, Colonel Pendleton said. All the latter must indicate that they expect to enroll for the advanced course in their junior and senior years.

The quotas established for Delaware ROTC students are part of a nation-wide program affecting all ROTC installations. The Army will defer 118,600 students in ROTC and Air-ROTC courses at 231 colleges.

In order to qualify among the 191 to be named on the "deferred" list between their freshman and sophomore years, freshman ROTC students must satisfactorily pass a competitive examination, be approved by a joint military-academic committee, and be screened by the military department.

There will be no testing program for the present sophomore class, but all of its members indicating a desire to continue in the advanced ROTC training will be subjected to a general physical examination in the spring, Colonel Pendleton said. Formerly, the physicals were given in the fall of the student's junior year.

The 118 prospective junior cadet officers will be by far the largest group ever to participate. There now are 47 cadet officers in the present junior class, and only about 25 in the senior class.

The Selective Service established policy defers all students during any school year for which they are enrolled. Therefore, present deferments will lapse next June except in the case of veterans, National Guardsmen, Officers Reserve Corps members, and those who—through the new quotas—are expected to be in the advanced ROTC course in the future.

Colonel Pendleton pointed out that such deferrals were intended to insure selection of the best-qualified prospective officers, and

Beachell Makes Basic Study

The Office of Naval Research has made a \$7,000 research contract with the University of Delaware for a fundamental study of the stability of polyvinyl formal compositions, to be made by Dr. Harold C. Beachell, assistant professor of chemistry, it was announced by Dr. William A. Mosher, chairman of the chemistry department at Delaware.

Dr. Beachell's study, it is hoped, will provide fundamental information on the thermal deterioration of insulation compositions, which would be of direct interest to the Navy because no data now are available on the subject. His research will include a study of infra-red absorption of polyvinyl formal, the kinetics of accelerated age testing, and a study of insulation compounds.

In the research, Dr. Beachell is assisted by Janet Hucks and Peter Fotis, research fellows in chemistry. Dr. Beachell, who holds a Ph. D. degree from New York University, was associated for five years with the DuPont Company's Grasselli Chemicals Department at Cleveland, and has been engaged in instruction and research at the University of Delaware for the past two years. Miss Hucks is from New Brunswick, N. J., and is a graduate of the New Jersey College for Women. Mr. Fotis, of Reading, Pa., is a graduate of Franklin and Marshall College.

The new contract is the fourth provided by the Office of Naval Research within the past year to support fundamental research in science at the University of Delaware.

Bio-atom Research Pries Corn Secrets

The Department of Biological Sciences has been advised by the Division of Biology and Medicine of the Atomic Energy Commission that the research project, which the Department submitted for their consideration, has been approved. The Office of Naval Research has been authorized by the Division to make the necessary contractual arrangements with the University of Delaware. This research proposal is entitled: "Comparison of the Effects of X-rays, Neutrons, and Mustard Compounds on the Growth and Development of the Corn Seedling." The principal investigator will be Dr. Mary A. Russell who will be assisted by other members of the Department and by a graduate student who will receive a Graduate Fellowship Grant.

Mr. Vaklyes recently attended the first Students' Social Action Institute held at Detroit, as a delegate from the Middle Atlantic Province of Newman Clubs, of which he is vice-president. His new duties include organization of a committee of 17 members, one each from the 17 regional provinces throughout the country, and the presentation of a positive program to implement the theme of this year's federation, "The Social Responsibility of the Catholic College Student."

Mr. Vaklyes has been active in the extra-curricular activities at the University of Delaware. He served for two years as president of the Newman Club, is a former editor-in-chief of the *Review*, a member of Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, and a member of the University World Relief Committee.

Campus Shorts

Because the regular Review has not been published for the past two weeks, this column of news and happenings of that period has been prepared.

Charles E. Grubb, business administrator, and Paul Dolan, political science instructor, represented the University of Delaware at a regional conference on higher education, held in New York City on December 3 and 4, under the sponsorship of the National Education Association's Department of Higher Education. Mr. Grubb acted as recorder at a session on "Finance," and Mr. Dolan was a discussion leader for a group meeting on "Faculty Personnel Problems."

Five members of the Department of Plant Pathology attended meetings of the American Phytopathological Society in Pittsburgh from December 6 to 8. They were Dr. John W. Heuberger, chairman of the department; Dr. Russell A. Hyre; Henry W. Crittenden; Andrew W. Culver; and Panos L. Poulos. Papers were presented by members of the group, and Dr. Heuberger served as chairman of the Fungicide Section.

Dr. John A. Munroe, assistant professor of history, has been elected president of the University's chapter of the Delaware State Education Association, for 1949, succeeding Dr. W. Earl Armstrong, dean of the School of Education. Other officers elected were: vice-president, Miss Emma C. Ehlers, assistant professor of education; secretary-treasurer, Paul M. Hodgson, director of academic extension.

Several representatives of the School of Engineering participated last week in sessions of the annual meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers held in Hotel Pennsylvania, New York City. Those attending were Dean David L. Arm, Dr. O. F. Bergelin, Dr. Allan P. Colburn, J. I. Clower, and Dr. J. A. Shields. Dean Arm assumed his post on the A.S.M.E. education committee, to which he recently received a five-year appointment, and Dr. Bergelin presented a paper. Dr. Colburn acted as chairman of several sessions of the Heat Transfer Division of ASME, of which he is chairman.

Dr. Kurt Wohl, research professor of chemical engineering, spoke on "Combustion—A Fundamental Problem Through the Ages," at the fourth of the Graduate Lecture Series on December 6. Dr. Wohl used motion pictures to portray research here at Delaware in the field of combustion.

Publication of a new volume, "Jephthah and His Daughter: A Study in Comparative Literature," by Dr. W. Owen Sypherd, University professor emeritus, has been announced. The book, which reviews briefly all the literary treatments of the Jephthah story which have appeared during the Christian era, is a summation of Dr. Sypherd's 24-year study of the Old Testament story of the Gileadite warrior. The book was printed by the Hambleton Company, and is on sale at Wilmington bookstores, and at the University bookstore.

Miss Hilda Somers, dramatic soprano, and instructor in voice, was guest soloist at a social meeting of the University's Kent County Alumni Club at the Caesar Rodney School, Camden, on Tuesday evening, Dec. 7. She was accompanied by Anthony J. Loudis, chairman of the University's Music Department.

Dr. Evelyn H. Clift, associate professor of history and ancient languages, was a speaker at the meeting of the Classical Association of the United States in Atlantic City on November 27. She spoke on "The Role of the Publisher in Ancient Rome."

J. Wallace Woodford of Dover, and James B. Wilson of Newport, prominent members of the Masonic Order of Delaware, were speakers last week in the "Demolay Night" program of the University's Masonic Club. The meeting was the first of a series to be sponsored by the Club in which the history, development and inter-relationships of the various branches of the Masonic fraternity are to be presented. G. Morgan Homewood is president of the Delaware Masonic Club.

Colonel R. T. Pendleton, P.M.S. &T., University of Delaware, was interviewed over Station WTUX on November 27, on the subject "What is the ROTC Today and What is its Purpose." The latest advantages offered by the ROTC, and requirements for it were discussed by Colonel Pendleton.

Winter Sports Schedule Starts Saturday With Swimming and Wrestling Contests

Swimming Season Opens With West Chester T. College

Harry Rawstrom's Blue Hen swimming team jumps off on a rugged 1948-49 schedule this Saturday afternoon in Taylor Pool against the West Chester State Teacher College in a meet that should provide a good clue to the possibilities of Delaware tank fortunes this season. For in biting off their initial hunk on the card, Rawstrom's men will be tackling the Middle Atlantic champions, and although the Birds will enter the fray as definite underdogs, any sort of a victory over the visitors will certainly establish them as a threat to conference laurels this year. Rawstrom, slowly reaping the fruits of a rebuilding campaign started in '46, is anything but optimistic about the melee this weekend. Beyond saying that "it might be close, but don't count on anything," the Bird mentor won't hazard any predictions. Anything can happen in an opening meet.

The forces that will be thrown into this initial assault will comprise a majority veteran group, considerably strengthened in some departments but still lacking the depth that is so important in competitive swimming. Rawstrom certainly has his squad in better pre-opening form than at any time in his tenure at Delaware. His squad opened work at the beginning of October, and the candidates have been alternating mile swims with half-mile jaunts combined with sprints. The distance chores are a departure from the usual Rawstrom plans, but the ex-All-American from Springfield seems to have hit the nail on the head; his squad is in shape.

Two medley relay teams will be available for duty, and the use of one, will of course, determine much of the strategy for the meet. The Hens will again be spreading the talent thin, and if the strength is thrown into the medley, then the going gets rugged later on. Either way, Lou Ward, Jim Crumlish and John Bishop will be available on one hand, with Murray Campbell, Jim Baird, and co-captain Frank Craig available as another combination.

Co-captain Jack Smith, and Hugh Dougherty will again hold up the distance chores, with Guy Tracy available to spot either. Craig, Bishop and Gary Carpenter will be ready for duty in the 50 and 100. Bauduy Grier, the Hens Middle Atlantic diving champion, is back again to present plenty of strength in this event, and Dean Toda, a sophomore converted just this year to diving, will back him up. Grier will be settling an old score Saturday. He was defeated last year in the "bath tub" at the West Chester "Y" by the Teachers' Ray Myrovich on one of the most peculiar pieces of judging that the Hens have ever seen. Bauduy thoroughly eliminated Myrovich in the Middle Atlantic, but he hasn't forgotten that blot on an otherwise nearly spotless record.

Ward, Campbell and Dick Murray furnish the home strength in the 150 yard back stroke, with Baird, Crumlish and John Koch set for plenty of exercise in the gruelling 200 yard breast stroke. Smith, Dougherty and Tracy will also have to hold up the 440, although the Teachers' Bob Kerper, one of the best swimmers in the East, is expected to throw up plenty of foam in this event and in the back stroke.

The final 400 yard relay, the centrifuge around which revolves much of the success of the meet, has always been a problem to Rawstrom. Depending on his strategy in the medley, Rawstrom will have Carpenter, Craig, Baird and Bishop, with Campbell ready. Smith or Dougherty may also have to fill in

Moral Victory Won In W and L Game

Delaware's Blue Hens lost the last game of the '48 season on Nov. 20, 1948, to one of the strongest teams faced this year. Brian Bell scored all three of the foe's touchdowns as the Generals of Washington and Lee jumped the gun on the opening kickoff by scoring twice in the first 15 minutes of play. But as the sea of mud finally dried out a little the Hens came bounding back, marching down the field for 85 yards and their first score. Later on, in the third quarter, Billy Cole made the Delaware fans go wild as he grabbed a punt and raced 76 yards down the sidelines, scoring on one of the most beautiful runs of the year. The Blue Hens gave the crowd many a thrill and were never defeated until the final gun. Washington and Lee won out, 21-14.

The Generals began their first scoring drive early in the first quarter, as Bob Smith pounced on a Hen fumble on the 38-yard line of Delaware. On the next three plays the Generals slipped, slid, and pushed their way to the Hens' 8-yard line where Bell broke off the Hens' right tackle and scored his first touchdown. Michael's conversion was good, as were his next two tries, and the Rebels went ahead, 7-0.

The Hens' offensive was unable to get rolling on the slippery field and Charley Smith was forced to kick to his 48, where the ball went out of bounds. It was here that the Generals set up their second scoring drive. The mud, wind, and even gravity, if one wants to argue whether the field slopes or not, seemed to be in favor of Washington and Lee during that first quarter. Mike Boyda, considered one of the best passers in the country, heaved a long aerial to Bell in the end zone just as the quarter ended. The Generals led, 14-0, as the teams changed sides.

The Hens came to life in the second period as they pushed, ran, and slugged their way down the field for 85 satisfying yards and their first score. Billy Cole ran the kickoff back to his own 15 from which Delaware commenced to drive down the field. Paris and Stalloni opened up the attack by driving to the 26 for a first down. Cole and Stalloni brought the ball up to the 45 for another first down. Smith's pass to Cole was good for 5 more yards and Stalloni cracked through the middle to the Generals' 40. It was here that it looked like Smith, trapped while trying to pass, would be thrown for a big loss. But unpredictable Charley broke loose and galloped to the Generals' 27. A minute later the Hens found themselves on the 15-yard line of Washington and Lee. After three unsuccessful line bucks it looked like the Hens' attack might have been stopped, but once again Smith came through. Trapped when he couldn't find a receiver, Charley broke loose and ran down the field, shaking off tacklers right and left, until he was forced out of bounds on the one foot line. Stalloni plowed through the middle for the touchdown and the scoreboard blinked 6 points for Delaware. Stan Bilski converted and the score read W&L 14, Delaware 7. But the Hens were penalized 15 yards for holding and the try for extra point had to be taken over. However, Bilski was just as good 17 yards out as his boot sailed through the uprights and the score remained, 14-7.

With several minutes still remaining in the second quarter, the Generals began their final scoring drive carrying them 64 yards to pay-dirt. The Rebels took over on their own 36 and marched up the field to the Hens' 27. Mike Boyda tossed a pass which sailed right through a host of Delaware players into the hands of Brian Bell, who

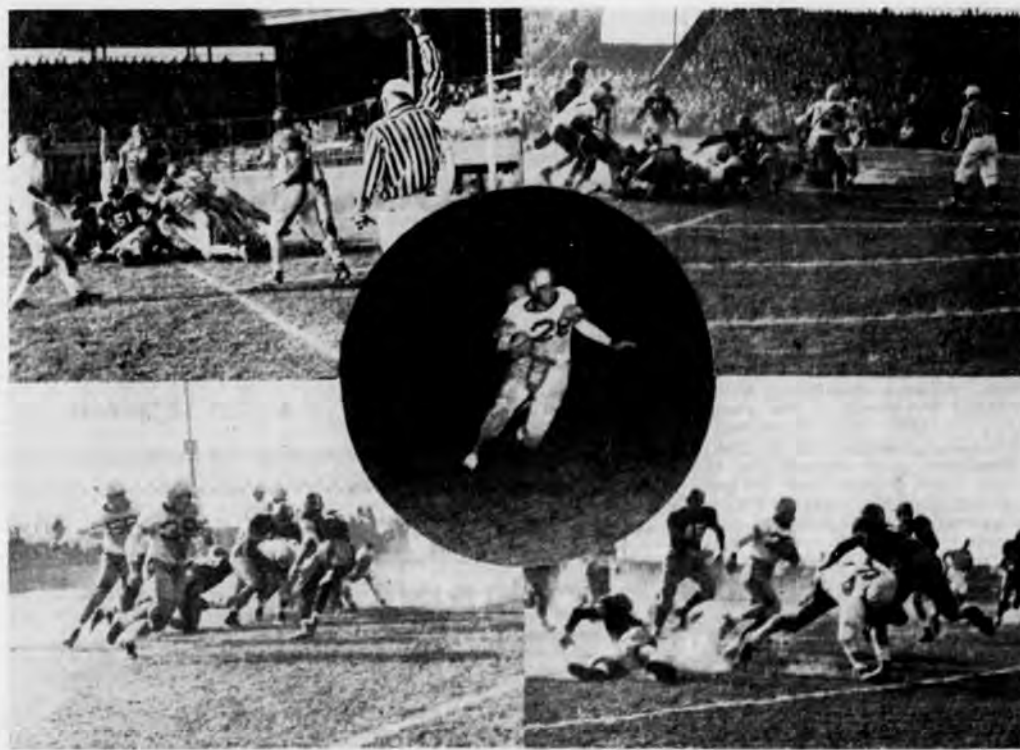

Dr. Kohler Speaks To Psychol. Club

Dr. Wolfgang Kohler, research professor of philosophy and psychology at Swarthmore College, was the guest speaker at the December 2nd meeting of the Psychology Club in Old College Lounge.

In his illustrated talk, "New Developments in Perception," Dr. Kohler presented the results, as currently completed, of his recent work to the members of the Delaware Psychological Association, the faculty and student body, and to the club. His work which involves the effect of figural after-images upon perception, when finished, is expected to invalidate some and modify much of the classic view of perception. Using the method of affecting the perception of some constant stimulus pattern by first producing an "after-image" in the subject, Kohler has presented evidence that the effect is a function of the cerebral cortex rather than the sense-receptor itself, say the retina. This influence has been found to hold for all sense-modalities and even three-dimensional effects may be made to appear. His work further advances the understanding of perceptual phenomena through his electroencephalographic recordings of the more or less constant potentials as contrasted with the sine wave rhythms of the brain which have hitherto been well known. In these experiments Kohler has aided greatly in establishing foundations for the neurophysiological study of perception.

Kohler, familiar to those who have had a course in introductory psychology as a member of the Koffka, Kohler, Wertheimer triumvirate of Gestalt psychology, was professor of psychology at the University of Berlin before coming to Swarthmore in 1935. As the occupant of the Berlin chair it could, at least, be said that Kohler was one of the most important figures in German Psychology of that time. Perception is merely one field in which Kohler is eminent; others include motivation, learning, memory, psycho-physics, animal psychology, and psychological relations. Also familiar to the student is the study of ape intelligence which occurred while he was stranded in the Canary Islands during World War I. It should be noted that Kohler is, as well, a philosopher of international repute, and that as a physicist he was a student of the great Planck of quantum theory fame.

His books include "The Mentality of Apes," "Gestalt Psychology," "The Place of Value in a World of Facts," and "Dynamics in Psychology."

200 Newmanites Attend Communion

Father Smith Addresses Catholics At Breakfast

"Do everything in your power to make this country strong and secure for future citizens," urged the Reverend Dr. Ignatius Smith, dean of the school of philosophy at Catholic University, at a communion breakfast attended by approximately 200 members and guests of the Newman Club at Kent Hall on last Sunday. The speaker was introduced by the Rev. Thomas A. Carlin, chaplain of the club. Andre Korenyi, the club's president, was toastmaster.

Father Smith told of the seven deadly sins of the American people against the nation. Abuses of the American home, economic injustice, political inequality, indifference of the people to the whole process of American democracy, lawlessness, indifference to God and religion, and degradation of Liberty were pointed out as major offenses of the American people against their democratic government.

Enlarging on these points, Father Smith gave examples of how the American people are creating an ever-widening abyss between practice and the ideals of our government as set forth by its founders.

At a regular meeting of the group on Tuesday evening in the Lounge of Old College, Miss Cecilia V. Tierney, faculty moderator of the club, gave a talk entitled "The Social Responsibility of the Catholic College Student."

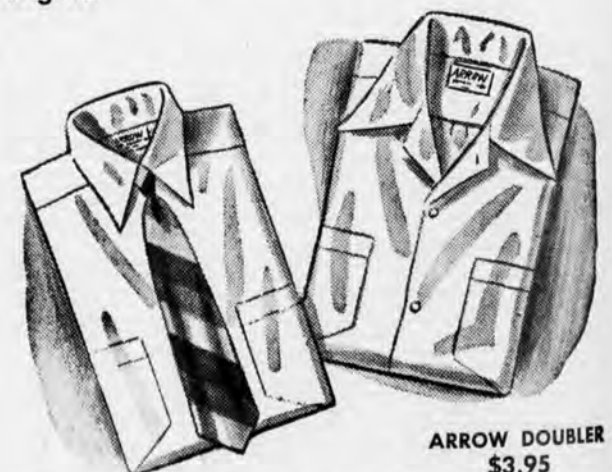

Miss Kelly Elected At N. Y. Conference

Miss Elizabeth G. Kelly, assistant professor of home economics at the University of Delaware, has been elected to another two-year term on the Central Coordinating Committee of the College Textiles and Clothing Teachers of the Eastern Region. Other members of the committee include representatives of the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pennsylvania State College, University of Maryland, and Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

The annual conference of the organization was initiated by the Educational Policies Committee of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges, to offer special opportunities for professional improvement. The program of the Eastern Region, like that of the other two regions of the nation-wide organization, is arranged by the Central Coordinating Committee. Highlights of the recent conference in New York City at which Miss Kelly was elected, included studies of curriculum evaluation, research, and visual aids in the college teaching of textiles and clothing.

Math Club to Hear Jackson on Dec. 14

Dr. Robert F. Jackson will be the speaker at the meeting of the Mathematics Club on Tuesday, December 14, at 7:00 p. m. in the Warner Hall Lounge. His topic will be "The Application of Probability to Contract Bridge." Dr. Jackson joined the department of mathematics at the University of Delaware this fall. He received his bachelor's degrees from the University of Oregon; in 1935, won a first-class honors degree in mathematics as a Rhodes scholar at Oxford University; and in 1940, took the degree of doctor of philosophy at Harvard University. He was a naval officer during the war.

All students who wish to do so are cordially invited to join the club. The varied programs cover topics, not taken up in the classroom, which are discussed in ways that interested students of all classes will enjoy. As the members gather for meetings, coffee is served and students have the opportunity to become acquainted with each other and with members of the faculty.

The officers of the club include: James M. Goldey, president; Nancy M. Peter, vice-president; Julian G. Russo, corresponding secretary; Patricia Reybold, social chairman; and a recording secretary-treasurer to be elected. Miss Edith McDougle is faculty adviser.

Net Work Unveiled By Kapp, Gazley

The first bulletin published by the University of Delaware Engineering Experiment Station is now being distributed, according to Dr. Allan P. Colburn, chairman of the station. On the subject, "Diffusion Flames," the bulletin is by Dr. Kurt Wohl, research professor of chemical engineering at Delaware; Numer M. Kapp, research fellow, and Dr. Carl Gazley, Jr., former research fellow at the University.

The work embodied in the 44-page lithographed bulletin was undertaken originally by the authors as a research project for the Pratt & Whitney Division of the United Aircraft Corp. Because of the basic nature of the work, and its possible application to ram-jets, the work was extended last year under the sponsorship of Project Meteor (Bureau of Ordnance of the Navy) and administered by United Aircraft's research department.

For nearly four years, Dr. Wohl has been engaged in research on combustion as related to jet propulsion. The experimental work was carried out by Kapp and Gazley in preparation for master's degrees which they since have received at Delaware. Gazley also received his doctor's degree here this fall, and Kapp is continuing his advanced work toward that degree.

The box office for the sale of tickets to the University community was opened in Mitchell Hall December 1. The ticket sale to the general public began December 9. Mr. Edward Braun, business manager, announces that tickets for the entire seating capacity of Mitchell Hall will be available for the afternoon performance of *Macbeth* at two prices, \$1.60 and \$1.20. Only about 400 seats are available for the evening performance and these will sell at \$2.00, with a special rate of \$1.20 for UD students presenting their Student Theatre Tickets.

The Margaret Webster Company is making a 28-week tour of American theatres, playing mostly in colleges and universities. The performances in Newark will be the only ones given during the tour between Philadelphia and Baltimore.

Margaret Webster is admittedly one of the finest directors of our modern theatre. She has an enviable record for the direction of Shakespearean productions in this country. She is responsible for the direction of *Richard II*, *Hamlet*, and *Henry IV* for Maurice Evans; *Twelfth Night* for Helen Hayes and Maurice Evans; *Macbeth* for Judith Anderson and Mr. Evans; and her own productions of *Othello* with Paul Robeson, and *The Tempest* with Vera Zorina.

Miss Webster also directed *Henry IV*, *What Every Woman Knows*, and *Androcles and the Lion* for the American Repertory Company. She is also the author of one of the finest books on Shakespearean production, *Shakespeare Without Tears*.

Charging down the sidelines, Cole was momentarily lost in the shuffle, but broke into the clear at mid-field and galloped the rest of the way to score on one of the most beautiful scoring jaunts ever seen at Wilmington Park. Back in the melee at mid-field two key blocks were thrown by Bob Campbell and Jack Gallagher which opened up the hole. This proved to be the last score of the game and with Bilski's successful conversion the score read, W. & L. 21, Delaware 14. It is interesting to note that Cole pulled the same stunt on Thanksgiving Day several years ago while playing his last game for P. S. duPont High School. Taking the opening kickoff of that game, Cole headed for the sidelines and raced down the field to score while a whole host of tacklers tried in vain to catch him. So Cole proved to be a hero in his last high school game and also in his last college game.

The Generals drove deep into Delaware territory three times in the last quarter but each drive was stopped by the Hens.

that "the progress of the individuals will be observed closely by members of the Military Department in conjunction with the civilian faculty."

"Failure to pass qualifying examinations, sub-standard academic and military grades, unsatisfactory leadership traits, or unauthorized absences from the ROTC program," he said, "will be reasons for cancellation of deferment certification." He said also that the deferment policy did not give preference in any way to the college man over the non-college man. All students are liable to eventual military service, said Colonel Pendleton, subject to temporary postponements for those who meet ROTC requirements and quotas.
