# niversity officials cancel commencem

In a move that university officials called a "com-promise," the Faculty Senate yesterday decided to cancel graduation exercises because of the widespread dissatisfaction of the site and speaker choices

President E.A. Trombone said yesterday that he was tired of having every one of his suggestions criticized.

- C-, there's just no pleasing the little punks. They're just like a bunch of kids. If they don't like the proposals I've chosen, I'm going to take my college and go home.'

Dust president Men Leech said that his group had tried every possible way to meet the university officials half-

"They think their ideas and decisions are cut and dry. I mean, I realize that the students only pay their wages. But jeez, don't we deserve some consideration?"

Leech cited some of their alternative ideas for the commencement site and speaker.

"We figured that the site should be someplace that students are familiar with. We first thought of one of the dining halls, but we felt that the atmosphere would not be in keeping with the dignity of the ceremony."

Concerning the question of the speaker, Dust felt that the financial restrictions shouldn't interfere with the choice.

'There are loads of possible speakers, all able to fit in-to the budget," he said. "How about a popular janitor, or perhaps a distinguished U.S. Congressman from the state? The possibilities are endless."

He said that with student opinion poll the group might be able to reverse the administration's decision.

One university official said that even with a student poll to back them, there will be no changing their decision.

"We never release the results of those silly polls, anyway," he said.

Harrington Salami, food service director, has been looking into "borrowing" the idea from the Pot House. Rumor has it he plans to change the name of The Pub to The Joint.



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# Defense department offers trip a nice place to visit, but

The United States Department of Defense is offering college students, preferably male, a discount spring break package to the adventurous nation of El Salvador.

Students interested in the deal will depart tonight from Dover Air Force Base and arrive in San Salvador, the nation's capitol city, at 10 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time) tomorrow morning.

The vacation package is being offered as a way to in-crease student appeal for the armed forces, which "decreased ridicuously" after mandatory draft registration last summer, according to Army Colonel B.A.Moron, coordinator of the program.

University representative Raymond Giddy said he is confident that students "will

dive at the opportunity to spend a fun-filled week in one of our country's potential battle grounds.'

According to department of Defense estimates, 250,000 "anxious" students are expected to participate in the program throughout the nation.

The trip is being offered at discount because the a government feels "that this is what the young people of today need to get motivated," according to a tour pamphlet.

The price of the vacation was not mentioned in the pamphlet and Pentagon officials were not available for comment on the cost.

The vacation includes free camouflage clothing, Army "grub" and a chance to see live confrontation between "upstandable Latin America citizens" and the "radicals."

Students signed up for the vacation will also learn how to "napalm small, neutral villages, fire M-16 machine guns and play a mean game of Russian Roulette with .45 caliber pistols."

The finest dates in the picturesque city of San Salvador will be offered to those students participating in the program, courtesy of the United States Navy, who claim to know their "dames."

Moron said, "This should give the kids a chance to experience the realities of war."

Students participating in the program will be flown back to Dover on Saturday April 4.

The pamphlet emphasized the point that the students have the option of remaining in El Salvador, if they wish.


Decisions on the applications will be made by the Space Allocation Subcommittee of the Student Center Board of Directors. The criteria for making decisions may be obtained in Room 107.
