Consider composting

As yard waste ban nears, residents look at options

s the deadline for allowing yard waste in Cherry Island landfill creeps closer, many residents in northern Delaware are exploring composting as a way to deal with future debris.

Carrie Murphy, an extension educator at New Castle County Cooperative Extension, has been fielding calls from many people with a variety of concerns, she said.

Some callers are confused by the ban on yard waste and what it requires; others have questions about the terminology associated with composting. "And, a lot of people are interested in com-

The 20-year-old Newark man involved in the Nov. 11, motor vehicle crash that killed a 78-year-old Newark woman was arrested and charged with second degree murder on Monday, Dec. 4, said Newark Police.

Christopher M. Monaco of the Brookside development, was driving a Saturn Ion on Elkton Road at a high rate of speed when his vehicle struck a car driven by Chinsu Park Un, 78, of Newark, who was turning left off of Elkton Road onto Casho Mill Road. The force of the collision caused Un's vehicle to break into two parts. She was pronounced dead at Christiana H o s p i t a l shortly after the crash.

Police said Monaco was

street racing a second car, a silver Nissan 350Z, that left the accident scene. Monaco was treated for minor injuries at Christiana Hospital after the accident. Police continue to search for the driver

Police said Monaco was arraigned on one count of murder in the second degree. He was released on a \$25,000 secured bail, pending a future court appearance.

The suspect then turned the car, traveling the wrong way in the east bound lanes. After a brief chase, the suspect's car became disabled in the back yard of an area home, said police.

Police said the driver was

forced from the car and taken into custody. Steele, who initially gave a false name, was charged with criminal impersonation, felony resisting arrest, criminal mischief, malicious mischief by a motor vehicle and several traffic offenses, said police.

Suspect linked to shooting

New Castle County Police have arrested a 23-year-old male who lives in the 200 block of Cobble Creek Curve in Newark and charged him with assault and weapon offenses stemming from a shooting that occurred on Nov. 27.

On Monday, Nov. 27 at 1:55 p.m., police received a report of a male victim who had driven himself to Christiana Hospital for treatment for a gunshot wound to the head. Officers discovered the man had suffered

a minor injury to the top of his head that required stitches.

The victim told police the shooting occurred in the Melrose Place Apartments after he attempted to buy drugs from a man named "Dre." The victim said he got into a verbal dispute with "Dre," at which time the suspect drew a handgun and struck the top of the victim's head with the butt of the gun. During the struggle, the weapon fired, causing a bullet to graze the victim's scalp.

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Busy city council agenda to round out year

Budget, special use permit to be discussed

The Monday, Dec. 11, meeting of the Newark City Council will be the last of the year, as council voted last month to cancel the second meeting of December, which falls on Christmas Day.

A busy agenda for the Dec. 11 meeting includes a vote on the 2007 budget and a discussion on an approved special use permit for a day-care center.

The 2007 budget, as presented by City Manager Carl Luft, does not call for a property tax rate increase. It proposes several service improvements, including the addition of a full-time maintenance employee, landscaping and plantings to improve the appearance of the reservoir and a reorganization of the police department to increase supervi-

sory positions.
Other improvements include a chemical root control program for sewer lines, two new seasonal workers in the street division to improve leaf collection and the installation of security cameras in parking lot No. 3.

Some discussion on the proposed budget at a Nov. 13, hearing centered on the possible out-come of pending litigation with Donald M. Durkin Contracting, the company fired from the reservoir job in 2004.

The total budget is less than damages awarded by a jury in Durkin's lawsuit with the city, but the city has filed an appeal, asking for a new trial and reduced judgement. At the budget hearing, Luft said the budget did not account for possible legal outcomes because "the matter isn't settled yet."

Luft will come back to the council Dec. 11, with a proposed amendment to the operating budget, calling for an increase in legal services to account for expenses related to the reservoir

appeal.

Luft is recommending an increase of \$250,000 to cover attorney's fees, which, if approved, will be funded by a 2006 carryover surplus. Also, he will propose a contingency plan in the event more funds are needed to cover expenses related to the reservoir trial.

Also on the agenda is the reconsideration of a special use permit granted on Sept. 11, that allows Fairfield resident Sheryll Perfinski to operate a family daycare facility at her Hilltop Road

The permit was approved with little discussion at the Sept. 11 meeting, but neighbors to the property have since protested the approval, claiming they were not contacted about Perfinski's intention to operate a daycare at the home

Council will consider the matter on Dec 11. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. in council cham-

County releases draft comprehensive plan

Public can view plan and make comments on Web site

Castle County Executive Chris Coons last week announced the release of the 2007 draft comprehensive development plan, which sets the vision and goals for future growth and land use planning for New Castle County.

"This draft plan envisions communities where connections between people enhance our quality of life and where decent housing, good jobs and places to learn and play are available to all residents," said Coons. "More importantly, the draft plan sets a course by which we can make this vision a reality, emphasizing redevelopment, targeting new growth and protecting the character of

The draft plan, which can be viewed on the county's Web site at www.nccde.org/plan, proposes a future land use map for the county that includes Existing Community Areas, Community Redevelopment Areas, a New Development Community Area, Possible Future Growth Areas and Resource and Rural Preservation Areas.

The design of the future land use map is based on public comments gathered through a year of meetings, input from land use professionals and review of data about the impact of possible growth patterns on traffic, infrastructure, costs and other factors.

The policies focus new growth in a New Community Development Area located in southern New Castle Community and Redevelopment Areas located along major transportation arteries in northern New Castle

The draft plan proposes to



allow more flexibility in design by increasing the number of housing units allowed per acre in limited areas and allowing for mixed-use development in some areas. It supports strengthening existing communities through efforts to clean up problem properties, enforce new rental housing codes and renew an emphasis on community policing.

One section of the document speaks to the need to increase coordination between county and municipal level governments in order to better plan for future growth and ensure efficient use of infrastructure.

Residents are invited to offer comments about the 2007 draft comprehensive development plan through the county Web site at www.nccde.org/ plan or by sending comments to the New Castle County Department of Land Use, 87 Read's Way, New Castle, DE 19720.

Residents can also participate in public meetings that will be held by the Planning Board on Tuesday, Jan. 2, 2007, and Monday, Jan. 8, 2007, and by the County Council prior to the adoption of the plan in March 2007.

UD selects Roselle's successor

Wharton dean to take reins in July 2007

utgoing University of Delaware President David Roselle reached to the wisdom of Yogi Berra to describe the future of UD under the man named last week to be his successor;

"The future," said Roselle quoting Berra, "ain't what it used to be." But in a good way, he continued. "The future of the University of Delaware is brighter than it ever has been

Patrick T. Harker, 48, dean of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, will be in charge of steering that future, tentatively taking over the reins on July 1, 2007 The executive committee of the University of Delaware Board of Trustees voted to elect Harker, and news of the selection was made public on Friday, Dec. 1.

Harker will succeed Roselle, who has served as president since 1990. Roselle announced his decision to retire next year in May, sparking a nationwide search for a new president led by a 15-member search com-

mittee made up of trustees, alumni, faculty and professional and salaried staff.

The committee, said Howard E. Cosgrove, chairman of the university's Board of Trustees, found Harker had an "excellent combination of experience and skills to lead the University of Delaware forward.

"He has managed with foresight, creativity and innovation, expanding the reach of the Wharton School across the country and around the world, and those traits will serve him well as he leads this university into the future," said

Harker has served as dean at the Wharton School, one of the world's leading schools of business, since 2000. Among his achievements there was a fund raising campaign that raised more than \$450 million over five years.

He holds four degrees from the University of Pennsylvania, bachelor's and master's degrees in civil and urban engineering, a master's degree in economics and a Ph.D. in civil engineer-

Harker said Friday he knew it would take a "special place" to persuade him to leave the University of Pennsylvania, where he has dedicated so much of his career. "Delaware," he said, "is that special place."

Harker said he was looking



forward to getting to know university students and staff and to talking about "the next step." "I don't know what that is yet. That's a subject that needs a lot of conversation. I do know the new agenda, the new approach the university will take, will be built on an incredibly solid foundation,"

When asked his impressions of the city of Newark, Harker admitted to not seeing much of the community yet, but, he said, "The little bit I've seen is spectacular."

Harker and his wife, Emily, have three children, Thomas Patrick, Michael Francis and Meghan Emma.

Students creating podcasts for the Web

'Groundbreaking' project for Delcastle, Downes

Seniors from Delcastle Technical High School are traveling to Newark to help about 90 Downes Elementary students in a "ground-breaking" teaching project.

"We're using iStorybook and Garageband to collect stories written by K-2 kids at Downes," explained Delcastle digital media teacher Gary Phillips. "The Downes students will read their stories into the computer from paper with large lines and our students will combine the sound with video and special effects for Web podcasts."

Phillips said the seniors will take pictures of the younger kids to use online or create the visuals and art. "We're still playing with the context and maybe we'll have the kids introduce themselves," Phillips said. "Each segment will be edited to 30 seconds, which is enough for about two to three sentences."

Phillips conceived and sold his project idea to Delaware Education Secretary Valerie Woodruff as a way to inspire kids to write. "We see this as a way to improve the younger students' reading and writing skills, while giving [Delcastle] students more experience in new technology," Phillips said. "This project breaks very, very new ground that's never, ever been done anywhere."

Using 45-minute sessions each day, the seniors can record about 20 students and stories a week. "We'll probably knock out about three at a time," said Phillips. "But, there's a learning curve, so we'll adjust as we go."

"Ms. Deshon loves this idea
so much, she already wants to

fifth grades," Phillips said. "She
wants to make academic podcasts
for math, social studies, and science with visuals that relate to the

to purchase two laptops and the software and upgrades for the project. "The upgrades allow us to do stuff 'out there' [beyond Delcastle]," explained Phillips. "You need a lot of power to drive video."

A former Web designer, Phillips found that Delcastle's communications students were only learning "print and video" skills when he arrived three years ago. "With advice from industry experts, we expanded the curriculum to include the Web and brought in new technology," Phillips said. "Now you end up with more skills so you're more

employable when you graduate."

In addition to planning, preparing and production of video projects, Delcastle's digital media students learn lighting, audio, switching and mixing video and sound, multi-camera operation, TV graphics, use of a teleprompter and non-linear editing. "We have to show we're training kids for a job, and with experience from co-oping, internships and job shadowing, these students can go directly into a career when they graduate," Phillips said. "We have an articulation agreement

A Jared Box is a shoeboxsize plastic storage container filled with small gifts, toys, cards and games. With items selected for a specific age and gender, each box is delivered to a hospital to use as a special diversion for a young patient undergoing chemotherapy or dialysis-type treatments.

To date, the football team, along with other Caravel students and faculty, has raised money to create and deliver 40 Jared Boxes to patients at A.I. DuPont Hospital for Children in Wilmington. Many more Boxes are in the works at Caravel.

Children at Our Lady of Victory School in State College, Pa., started the Project to honor Jared, a classmate and friend who was diagnosed with inoperable cancer in 1999 at age 5 and died November 2000. Jared noticed that many toys and games in the hospital were worn or missing pieces. His family began bringing a small box of diversions for Jared during his hospital stays.

Since the Project started, more than 10,000 Jared Boxes have been made and delivered to hospitals in 10 states.



with a number of colleges to accept credits for some of our classes, as well, because more and more jobs require post-secondary training."

Among Delcastle's alumni are an independent videographer who just finished "Spiderman 3" and another who worked a high-definition camera on the set of the newest "Rocky" movie. "The technology in this industry changes every four to five months," Phillips noted. "After spending \$50,000 to \$60,000 total in the last few years, [Delcastle's] only about a version behind the industry. That's important, because our students have to know what's going on outside in the real world if they want to be competitive when they leave here."

The money for the structure was appropriated by the state. The 1929 Legislature appropriated \$150,000 after cutting down the amount that was originally requested. This did not prove sufficient to build the kind of building needed and the last Legislature appropriated about \$80,000 more to finish and equip it.

UD grad student garden yields produce for Delaware Food Bank

bby Hird, a second-year fellow in the Longwood Graduate Program, was raised eating homegrown produce. Which is not surprising, considering that her family grows vegetable crops on their 1,000-acre Dutch Creek Ranch in Litchfield, Neb. When Hird arrived at the University of Delaware two years ago and set up housekeeping in a Newark-area apartment, she realized how much she missed fresh-picked corn and right-fromthe-vine tomatoes. So this past summer, she and about 15 other grad students in the department of plant and soil sciences got together and created a community garden on UD's Newark farm.

But first, the happy ending to this story — the garden proved to be so fertile that during the course of the summer the grad students donated 500 pounds of fresh produce to the Food Bank of Delaware. It was then distributed to community centers, summer camps, soup kitchens and food pantries throughout New Castle County.

The garden got its start thanks to Masayuki Shimizu, a soil chemistry grad student who approached Jerry Hendricks, a plant and soil sciences research manager, about the idea. The next step was to get permission from farm superintendent Scott Hopkins, who moved some research plots around so that the students could have a piece of land convenient to most of their offices. He also made sure it had easy access to water.

Many of the participating students come from international backgrounds and grew plant varieties from their home countries. "One student planted turnips from China that look nothing like anything I've ever seen on our farm," Hird said. "Unusual vari-

eties of spinach and leeks also were popular with some of international students."

For Hird, it was fresh corn that she missed the most from Dutch Creek Ranch. So she planted plenty of it, as well as tomatoes, beans, cabbage, some herbs and sunflowers. "It was nice to go out in the evening and work in the garden," Hird said. "There would usually be six or seven of us out there at any one time. We had a lot of fun together."

She estimates that the garden yielded 2,000-2,500 pounds of produce. Besides the 500 pounds donated to the Food Bank of Delaware, the students gave

away countless boxes of fresh veggies to Townsend Hall faculty and staff. The student gardeners said they hope to have a garden again next summer and open it up to all graduate students in the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Hird still has some late-season radishes, cabbages and herbs in the ground and said she is pleasantly surprised how much longer the Delaware growing season is compared to what she's used to in Nebraska. She said she is enjoying this last chance to have her hands in the soil before winter sets in.

Foundation awards up to \$25,000 per project

who ordinarily conduct research in the lab, library or field on the path to an advanced degree.

Currently, all three students are working on studies supported by the University of Delaware Research Foundation (UDRF). Students involved in 10 UDRF projects reported on their progress in a poster session at the foundation's annual meeting on Nov. 10 at the Courtyard Newark-University of Delaware hotel.

The foundation, a private corporation, was chartered in 1955 to support research at the University. Awards of up to \$25,000 per project are made annually to tenure-track faculty, early in their careers, in all fields of science. The foundation provides up to \$15,000 per grant, which is matched by \$5,000 from the provost and \$5,000 from the faculty member's respective dean.

The UDRF grants are designed to supplement funding that researchers receive from other sources, such as federal and state agencies, according to Carolyn Thoroughgood, vice provost for research. Her office administers the grants.

The foundation is governed by a board of trustees representing engineers and scientists from area industries. The board announces the awards each spring and receives progress reports on the funded projects at its fall meet-

Several graduate students also are involved in the UDRF projects, learning not only about the

day-to-day challenges presented by laboratory research, but also the management of grants, the preparation of reports and the presentation of findings that ultimately can be used by industry, academia and the public.



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

posting. I'd say 50 to 60 percent of them are interested, which is really good," she said.

Composting has been touted as an alternative for homeown-ers, especially those living out-side the city of Newark who must otherwise contract a hauler to remove their yard waste when the ban takes effect.

The city, which has a mulch area for grass clippings and leaves, will continue to pick up yard waste from residents, though it must be separated from the regular trash collection.

Murphy said, before starting to compost, residents should take stock of the size of their yard and how much yard waste, or biomass, they expect to pro-duce. Though composting isn't difficult to do or labor-intensive, it does require some education, she said.

There is a science to it. It's important to realize there is a process. When you set it up, you can't just completely walk away from it. You have to check in on it and make sure what's happening is what's supposed to be happening," she said.


Dot Abbott, Delaware's cooperative extension agent for renewable resources, described composting, simply, as the "speed-ing up of the decaying process." worms and fungi, go to work, breaking down the material into compost that can then be used later to fertilize gardéns and flower beds.

Anyone can do it, said Abbott, stressing that it doesn't take much time or effort. "It takes a few more steps and a little more energy," she said, but the benefits are worth it. "Besides putting that (waste) back in the environment where it really belongs, it's a great reduction of what goes out with your trash.'

This spring, the New Castle County Cooperative Extension will be hosting several composting workshops for those interested. "We're hoping this will be an opportunity for more people to get involved," said Murphy.

The yard waste ban takes effect Jan. 1, 2007. For more information about composting or the classes, call the exten-



Salesianum wins state crown

Sals top Sussex Central for second straight title

Junior running back Sal Viscount's outstanding performance propelled Salesianum to a 34-17 victory over previously unbeaten Sussex Central in the 2006 Delaware High School Division I Football Tournament championship game Saturday night at Alumni Stadium on the Delaware State University campus in Dover.

The 12-0 Sals won the Division

The 12-0 Sals won the Division title for the second consecutive season, after defeating Newark 28-0 in the 2005 contest. Sallies has now won five state football titles since the tournament began in the early 1970s.

"It's a great feeling to win the championship again," said Salesianum coach Bill DiNardo. "This was a hard-working team, and I couldn't be more proud of them, and what we accomplished this season."

this season."

Viscount rang up 284 yards on 26 carries on the frosty evening. He found the end zone three times, First, he opened the scoring in the first quarter on a 51-yard sweep, next on a 48-yard punt return in the second period, and finally on a one-yard run in the third to put the game out of reach for the Golden Knights.

"We knew Sussex was going to bring it tonight," said Viscount.
"They are one of the premiere downstate teams with a great coaching staff, so our coaches wanted us well-prepared with a good game plan to challenge this team, so to win again is indescribable, it's such an incredible feeling," he said.

In last year's semifinal game, Viscount also ran for more than 200 yards against Sussex Central.

Two long passing plays in the second quarter also help key the Sallies victory.

After Viscount's punt return,

Sals quarterback Will Salus found Tight End Andrew Szczerba behind the Golden Knights defense for a 62-yard touchdown completion. The 6-7 Szczerba actually drug the defender the last five yards into the end zone.

"It felt great to get that pass," said Szczerba. "We're a running team, so that caught them off guard. That's what coach DiNardo did all year, where we just pound the ball on the ground to soften them up a bit, then we hit them with a long pass to really kill their

momentum," said Szczerba.

Moments later, Geoff Vanover intercepted a Sussex Central pass, and Salus went right back to the air, this time hitting John Kuderka for a 48-yard touchdown pass. The Sals scored three touchdowns in under four minutes to stymie the Golden Knights defense, and build a 27-10 lead at the half.

Following Vicount's first score, Sussex Central's offense kicked into high gear. The Golden Knights scored a quick touchdown thanks to a good return by Darshon Adkins. Quarterback Brad Hilovsky scored two plays later on a 10-yard run.

The Knights kept up the pressure, and on their second possession scored on 26-yard field goal to take a 10-7 lead about four minutes*into the game.

Darshon Adkins scored the final points of the game late in the fourth quarter on a seven-yard run.

"I really wanted a championship," said Adkins, "We worked really hard all year, and I thought we could win this game tonight." Sussex Central finished its best

Sussex Central finished its best season in about 30 years with an 11-1 record, just one game shy of winning the elusive state title.

"It was still a great season for us," said Sussex coach John Wells. "We were Henlopen Conference champs, with a 10-0 regular season record. We beat a tough Middletown team. So I guess you could say we didn't bring our "A" game, but that's a result of Sallies being a great team," he said.

Caravel falls to Concord in Division II title game

It was a case of deja vu in the 2006 Delaware High School Division II Football Tournament championship game as perennial powers Concord and Caravel Academy squared off yet again for the title.

This time, No. 5 seed Concord dethroned the defending state champion Caravel Buccaneers 21-7 Friday night at Delaware State University's Alumni Stadium.

The victory gave coach George Kosanovich and his Raiders three titles in the last four years

Last year Caravel downed Concord 9-0 to win the school's first football crown since 1990, and third overall.

Junior tailback Josh Morris led the charge for the Raiders' offense, rushing for 120 tough yards on 30 carries.

Quarterback Jon Bacher threw the ball only four times on the blustery night, completing two, and connecting on a game-clinching 11-yard touchdown pass to Justin Brown.

Concord's defense did a commendable job, limiting Caravel to one of their lowest points totals of the year

The Raiders defense harassed Bucs' quarterback Brian Potts all night, sacking him five times and knocking him down on several other occasions.

"They did an incredible job against us, and they had a great game plan," said Caravel coach Mike Aruanno.Concord scored two touchdowns to jump out to a 14-0 first quarter lead. Defensive tackle Brian McGovern pounced on his team's fumble, and returned the ball four yards for the first score of the game.

Later in the quarter, Bacher plunged in from one yard away to build the two-touchdown lead.

The weather was a factor throughout the game. The gametime temperature was near the freezing mark making the ball hard to handle.

On top of that, it was very windy and it rained early in the second half.

"It was tough out there," said Bacher. "Throwing the football was hard, so the plan was to run the ball as much as possible."

Caravel finally got on the board in the second quarter when junior running back Vinnie Ranauto scored on a nine-yard run. Little did anyone know that would be the only score of the night for the usually potent Buccaneer offense

hensive Strategic Plan;

Engage a wide range of community stakeholders;

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 Create opportunities for the public to share ideas and feedback;

 Present a final plan to the Board for approval by March 13.

In information presented at the only public meeting to date, District administrators stated that the overall goal of this process is to develop a Strategic Plan for Christina that will reflect the priorities of the community, will serve as a true plan of action – not just a static document – and will hold the district accountable for meeting specific goals.

The District's previous Strategic Plan for 2001-2006 (which was no longer online as of this month) identified four major objectives and strategies as well as action plans to meet each objective:

Objective #1: By 2006, all students will be able to read, comprehend and write at or above grade level as measured by the

DSTP, SAT 9 or other state designated tests.

Objective #2: By 2006, 70 percent of eligible children enrolled in early childhood education programs will meet or exceed State standards by the end of kindergarten.

Objective #3: By 2006, all students will be able to do math at or above the proficiency level, category III, on the DSTP, SAT 9 or other State designated tests.

Objective #4: 100 percent of approved capital building and renovation projects will be completed within three years after receipt of the bonds.

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Two years later, an independent consulting group told Christina's newly arrived school superintendent Joseph Wise that the "ambitious" plan approved in 2001 was already largely ignored. "A strategic planning process engaged a broad group of constituents in identifying major organizational thrusts for the 2001–2006 period," said William J. Slotnik, executive director of the Community Training and Assistance Center (CTAC) in a November 2003 report. "This produced an ambitious plan document, but has not necessarily resulted in the district planning strategically and

reporting progress on an ongoing basis."

According to Slotnick, the five-year Strategic Plan included goals, objectives, specific implementation targets and measurements but lacked operational strategies. Further, the District's mission statement was incorporated into the 2001-06 strategic plan, but very few of the 60 interviewees who met with CTAC could identify the basic elements of either the mission or the strategic plan. "A pivotal intent of strategic planning is to provide glue across initiatives, to effectively link a district's priorities,' Slotnick said then. "In Christina, the plan needs to be strengthened to provide these linkages.

Slotnick advised Wise and the District to identify a set of core priorities and related resources, responsibilities, timelines and progress monitoring that would allow the District to evaluate the impact on student achievement. "This would significantly strengthen the existing strategic plan and the District overall," Slotnick concluded at that time.

The District and Region III PTA Council held a Community Forum on Nov. 9 to explain the current strategic planning process to the public. A second Forum planned for Nov. 16 was cancelled for weather-related reasons.

A Stakeholder Committee consisting of representatives from the business community, elected officials, and members of Region III PTA Council, Special Needs PTA, Vision 2015, community organizations, and employee unions was scheduled to meet for the first time on Wednesday, Nov. 29, to begin the actual planning process.

Additional Community Forums are planned after the winter break on Jan. 4, Jan. 10 and Feb. 10, 2007. Concurrently with those Forums, the District will seek additional community input through questionnaires.

CHANGES ARE MADE IN DETERMINATIONS OF BASE FLOOD ELEVATIONS FOR NEW CASTLE COUNTY, DELAWARE UNDER THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM

On January 17, 2007, the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency identified Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs) in New Castle County, Delaware, and Unincorporated Areas, through issuance of a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). The Mitigation Division has determined that modification of the elevations of the flood having a 1-percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year (base flood) for certain locations in these communities is appropriate. The modified Base Flood Elevations (BFEs) revise the FIRM for the communities.

The changes are being made pursuant to Section 206 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Public Law 93-234) and are in accordance with the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as amended (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, Public Law 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR Part 65.

A hydraulic analysis was performed to incorporate the effects of the fill placement along Tributary to Belltown Run from approximately 240 feet upstream to approximately 750 feet upstream of confluence with Belltown Run. This has resulted in an increase and decrease in SFHA width, and establishment of BFEs for Tributary to Belltown Run. The table below indicates new BFEs for selected locations along the affected lengths of the flooding source(s) cited above

*National Geodetic Vertical Datum, rounded to nearest whole foot

Under the above-mentioned Acts of 1968 and 1973, the Mitigation Division must develop criteria for floodplain management. To participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), the community must use the modified BFEs to administer the floodplain management measures of the NFIP. These modified BFEs will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing build-

Upon the second publication of notice of these changes in this newspaper, any person has 90 days in which he or she can request, through the Chief Executive Officer of the community, that the Mitigation Division reconsider the determination. Any request for reconsideration must be based on knowledge of changed conditions or new scientific or technical data. All interested parties are on notice that until the 90-day period elapses, the Mitigation Division's determination to modify the BFEs may itself be changed.
