DISASTER RESEARCH CENTER (DRC)

The Disaster Research Center (DRC) relocated from the Ohio State University to the University of Delaware at the end of 1984. The Center reopened at a building in 102 East Main Street, Newark in January 1985, although the library and other components were not fully operational until the spring. Field research operations were resumed in August.

Two grants and a contract were obtained by DRC during the year. They were from the:

Field Trips

DRC Library

The DRC library received approximately 1,000 new publications during the year. This number does not include continuing periodicals, announcements and photographs, and newspaper clippings. A total of 556 were fully processed into the library. About 500 other items were eliminated from the DRC holdings; most were contributed to the University of Delaware library system (many of these items dealt with hightly technical or engineering aspects of disaster phenomena not usually part of the DRC library subject coverage).

Agreements to exchange DRC publications for their relevant organizational publications, to be put in the DRC library, were made with:

The Flood Hazard Research Center at Middlesex Polytechnic in Great Britain;

The Natural Hazards Research and Application Center at the University of Colorado, ESA;

The library at the Center for Technology, Environment and Development at Clark University, USA;

The Center for Research on the Epidemiology of Disasters at Louvain University in Belgium.

Old exchange agreements were reconfirmed with disaster research organizations and key researchers in Canada, Italy, Sweden, and Japan.

An agreement was made with the Joint Assistance Center in New Delhi, India to distribute in southeast Asia most of the available items on the DRC Publication List.

The American Sociological Association Section on Collective Behavior and Social Movement asked DRC to house the archives of the section. This will be done starting in 1986.

It was also decided during the year that the DRC library will house the archives of the International Sociological Association Research Committee on Disasters, and the archives of the committee journal, <u>Mass</u> Emergencies and Disasters.

A partial reordering of the DRC library classification system was initiated. This involves the renumbering of some old categories and the addition and elimination of subject categories to more accurately reflect the current DRC library collection.

Work continued on inventoring the DRC library holdings, on updating the subject index of the DRC library card catalog, and on processing the backlog of items and work that accumulated or were delayed as a result of the relocation of DRC.

A small duplicate collection of the rarer and the more important publications in the DRC library was established. Stored elsewhere, this collection is intended as a backup for losses by theft from the DRC library which is open to the public.

Contacts were maintained with the centers at the University of Colorado, at Clark University, and at the University of Pittsburgh (as well as the Federal Emergency Management Agency) to insure compatability of software and hardware in the parallel work of these centers and DRC towards computerization of some of their library and/or data holdings. DRC was also represented at a meeting on this matter at the University of Colorado in July and at the University of Pittsburgh in November. The first DRC publication placed on the computer was the 442 page long volume, Inventory of Disaster Field Studies in the Social and Behavioral Sciences. 1919-1979.
