Main Street losing iconic diner

Post House to close Sunday, be replaced by grilled cheese shop

The Post House, a historic diner and breakfast staple for many Newark residents, will serve its final meal on Sunday.

The eatery has had a presence in Newark for 55 years since opening its Main Street location in 1957.

Jane Woolsey, manager and cook for the Newark location, will leave the Post House at 3 p.m. Sunday for the last time, after having worked there for 46 years.

Woolsey, who started there at age 19, said there is no doubt she will miss her customers, many of whom have been loyal patrons for decades.

"They've become my family," Woolsey said. "The best memories were watching the children grow up."

Jacqueline Lukaszewicz, Woolsey's daughter, said her mother is the true icon of the Post House because she is one of a handful of people who have remained on Main Street for more than four decades.

Woolsey said the closing of the Post House will be a loss for the entire Newark community.

"It's very devastating to have such an icon in Newark closing," she said. "It's so much more than a restaurant. (Customers) come in there for friendship. They come in there for conversation."

Lukaszewicz said Woolsey mothered college students — nursing hangers and encouraging them to study for finals and call home.

"There was a time, back in the day, she knew the entire U of D football team by the way they ate

their eggs," Lukaszewicz said.

She said her mother would cut food for the elderly, deliver meals to people too ill to come to the restaurant, guide battered women and

pay out of pocket so the homeless could eat.

"I can remember when weather

City reaches \$950,000 settlement with landlords

The city of Newark has agreed to pay a nearly \$1 million settlement to a group of landlords, ending three years of legal wrangling over the city's rental permit fees.

The city has also agreed to significantly reduce the fees, which the landlords claimed were so exorbitant they represented an illegal tax.

City council approved the settlement during an executive session Monday night.

"I feel like it's a reasonable settlement between the city and the landlords," Mayor Vance A. Funk III said Wednesday.

Six landlords filed suit against the city in 2009, alleging the city's rental fees were illegal because they exceed the actual expenses incurred by the city for administering and enforcing its rental code. The suit sought a refund of past fees and a court order mandating the city lower the permit fees.

The suit was heard last month in Chancery Court, but the court gave the parties a chance to settle the matter out of court.

Under the agreement reached, the city will lower permits for houses from \$300 to \$200, lower permits for small apartment buildings from \$70 to \$55 per unit

Eight-year-old Paco, a motivated Newark Police K-9 and beloved family member of handler Cpl. Christopher Jones's family, died Sunday morning.

Paco retired last September due to Bi-Lateral Hip Dysplasia, which made it painful for him to run and walk. Recently, he became unexpectedly ill due to a tumor, Jones said.

After taking the dog to a veterinarian, Jones was informed that surgery was not an option, and that it would be in Paco's best interest to be put to rest.

"Sunday was a hard day," Jones said. "But today is the day to celebrate Paco and who he was."

Paco joined the Newark Police Department in August 2006 and was the department's first canine in more than two decades. Paco was acquired from Vohne Liche Kennels of Denver, Ind., one of the nation's foremost suppliers of law enforcement canines. He was trained by the Delaware State Police Canine Unit.

Paco was motivated, intelligent and hard-working dog, Jones said.

Biden papers delivered to UD library

The University of Delaware's Morris Library last week welcomed a delivery of 1,875 boxes full of Vice President Joe Biden's senatorial papers, the largest collection that the library's special collections department has ever received.

Crews moved the 33 pallets of boxes from two trucks into the library's basement, where the papers were secured on mechanical compact shelving, built especially to accommodate the large collection.

Library Director Susan Brynteson said the size of the collection is especially notable.

"It is by far the largest collection [in the special collections department]," Brynteson said. "We have other political papers and other literary papers, but not of this magnitude."

Biden announced the donation of his senatorial papers to the library in September when he delivered the inaugural James R. Soles

Lecture on the Constitution and Citizenship on campus. The documents were moved to the library from the National Archives and Hart Senate Office Building in Washington D.C.

"The Biden senatorial papers will document a remarkable personal career but equally will help scholars understand a great deal about those significant decades in the history of Congressional legislation, the nation and the world," Brynteson said. "What an extraordinary sense of satisfaction it is to see all of those cartons here at last at the library."

The documents also include recordings, videotapes and web pages and will be processed and housed in the library's special collections department among other political papers.

The library also houses the papers of former U.S. Representative Mike Castle, former State Sen. Thurman Adams, Sen. Tom Carper and former Gov. Dale E. Wolf.

Under conditions set forth by Biden's staff, the papers

will not be publicly accessible until two years after Biden retires from elected public office.

L. Rebecca Johnson Melvin, who will serve as curator of the Biden papers, said the library staff will have to process the 415 gigabytes of electronic records and convert outdated video files into modern technology.

"It's a big job ahead," Melvin said.

The library received a \$30,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, which will support computer technology for the storage of the electronic documents and some archive supplies to house physical documents.

Biden's political documents reveal his role in developing American policy and diplomacy as a senator. In 1972, Biden was elected to the Senate as the sixth youngest senator in history. He served for more than three decades before being elected vice president in 2008.


Biden was a long-time member and former chairman

of the U.S. Senate Committee on Foreign Relations.

Melvin said she believes the senatorial papers will allow people to learn about the process of Congress and constituent voices. She said that when Biden announced the donation of papers, he said he hoped they would allow citizens to understand how government works.

Biden received a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware in 1965 and an honorary doctorate in 2004.

Newark officials consider switching to 'smart' utility meters

So-called "smart" energy and water meters could be coming soon to a Newark street near you.

The city is studying the possibility of replacing its aging utility meters with smart meters to improve efficiency.

Smart-meter technology has the potential to save the city millions of dollars in work hours and lost revenue. The meters use technology to record the consumption of energy or water and communicate that information on a daily

basis (or more frequently) back to the city for monitoring.

Officials say smart-meter data could identify leaks more quickly and would provide a more precise measurement of energy/water usage for billing.

It could also reduce the need for employees, since the readings on meters could be checked remotely.

Conceivably, it could help city residents save on their utility bills if they were able to track their usage on a daily or weekly basis.


Honeywell engineers are performing an audit to look at the feasibility of bringing

smart-meter technology to Newark, with the option of possibly adding a citywide wireless Wi-Fi network.

Early projections estimate the smart-meter proposal would cost the city \$11.6 million over 15 years, but that amount would be offset by a savings of \$16.1 million.

Honeywell is expected to present the results of its audit to city council members on July 16.

The city has already identified several low-interest funding sources if council members vote to move ahead with the proposal.

West Park Place students connect with soldier in Afghanistan

When a class of 23 third-graders at West Park Place Elementary School wrote letters to a soldier, they never expected the response to be personalized letters for each student and gifts flown over from Afghanistan.

However, Air Force Senior Master Sgt. Dave Miller provided just that.

Miller wrote letters to each student who wrote to him, and he enclosed Afghani currency as a souvenir. Miller also sent the class a handmade wooden bowl to show the craftsman-

ship of the Afghani people and an American flag that he had flown on several aircrafts while on combat missions.

Miller, who has been in the military for 22 years, wrote to the class that he was excited to see letters addressed personally to him and that he wanted to do something meaningful in return.

"I've been in the military for quite some time now," Miller wrote. "And I don't think I've ever been so touched to be thought of as when I opened the envelope full of personalized letters to me."

Beth Paris, a third grade teacher, said she got the idea

of writing letters to a soldier from colleague, Anne Feurer, who is Miller's aunt.

Ethan Easterly, a student in Paris' class, said he wrote about himself and what he likes to do. Ethan said he was excited when Miller sent responses back to the students.

"We felt great," Easterly said. "It was nice of him to send stuff back."

Jack Wiest smiled as he described the funny short story he wrote in his letter.

"I wrote about this monster in an ice cream shop," Wiest said.

Haley Dulebohm said her letter was the first time she had ever written to a soldier, and she wrote about her life.

"My letter was about me and my family and how my grandfather went to war," Haley said. "I wished him good luck."

Haley said she was glad the class was able to write letters to a soldier and that she never expected the response.

"I was a little surprised that we got so much stuff back," she said.

Miller wrote in his letter that he wanted the students to be able to under-

stand a little bit more about Afghanistan through the gifts he sent. He also wrote that he wanted the flag to represent the honor of all the soldiers that had served in Afghanistan.

"These are all just small tokens of my appreciation for what you and your class have done to try to keep my family

and all military members in your thoughts," he wrote.

Paris said writing to Miller was a good learning experience for the students.

"It was a great way to incorporate letter writing in a fun and interesting way," Paris said.

When the class received the letter back from Miller, Paris

said she had a difficult time reading what he wrote to the class.

"It was a great surprise — an emotional surprise," she said.

and lower permits for large apartment buildings from \$70 to \$45 per unit. Officials also agreed not to raise the fees until 2020, except for increases in proportion to the con-

sumer price index.

In addition, the city will pay a settlement fee of \$950,000 to the group of landlords.

Funk said the settlement is in the best interest of the city, especially in light of comments made

by Chancellor Leo E. Strine during the trial.


"Anytime you're involved in litigation, you're rolling the dice," Funk said. "Obviously, the court wasn't too happy about the \$300 fee."

He said the city will take the money from its reserves and will not have to raise taxes or cut services.

"The city has reserves set aside for unusual events, and we'll tap into those reserves to pay the \$950,000 settlement," he said.



Man sought in Stanton Home Depot robbery

Delaware State Police are looking for a man who robbed the Home Depot store in Stanton Sunday evening.

Officials say the man entered the garden area of the store, located at 1301 Churchman's Road, at approximately 5:45 p.m.

He walked up to a register and handed an employee a note demanding money. He implied he was armed but did not show a weapon.

The robber left with an undisclosed amount of cash. The employee was not injured.

The suspect is described as a white man around 30 years old, approximately 5 feet, 8 inches tall and 160-170 pounds. He was last seen wearing blue shorts, a grey T-shirt and black glasses.

Four stabbed at Newark-area bar

Four employees of a Newark-area sports bar were stabbed early Sunday morning after confronting a customer who refused to leave after last call.

The incident happened at approximately 1:10 a.m. at Tailgates Sports Bar and Grill

in the Harmony Plaza Shopping Center on Chestnut Hill Road, east of Newark.

Police say the four employees, all men in their 40s and 50s, were involved in a physical altercation with a male customer who would not leave, according to Delaware State Police.

A second man approached, took out two knives from his pocket and stabbed the four employees. He then attempted to flee, but was caught by officers who saw him running across the parking lot.

The man, later identified as Clifford R. Perry, 46, of Trenton, Ohio, was charged with four counts of first-degree assault and related offenses.

He was committed to Young Correction Facility in lieu of \$100,000 bail.

The four employees were taken to Christiana Hospital to be treated for non-life threatening injuries.

Middletown man charged in robbery outside Christiana Mall

A Middletown man has been charged in connection with an attempted armed robbery outside Christiana Mall.

Delaware State Police say Craig L. Brown, 41, allegedly attempted to rob a 26-year-old Wilmington man who had agreed to meet him to sell him prescription drugs.

The incident took place at approximately 8:40 p.m. Friday when Brown met the victim in a mall parking lot.

Brown allegedly entered the victim's car, told him to drive away from the area, pulled out a handgun and attempted to steal the prescription drugs, police said.

A struggle over the gun ensued, causing the victim to crash the car into a wall on Center Point Boulevard. Both the victim and Brown fled from the scene.

When police arrived to investigate the crash, they found the car empty, with the handgun laying on the driver's seat.

Brown then approached the officers and claimed he had been the victim of a robbery, police said. However, authorities realized Brown's story was false after watching surveillance video from the mall.

Brown turned himself in Saturday and is facing several charges, including first-degree attempted robbery and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

He was committed to Young Correctional Institution in lieu of \$53,000 bail.

Newark man found guilty in Elkton bar stabbing

A Newark man accused of stabbing three men outside an Elkton bar in May 2011 is facing eight to 15 years in prison after accepting a plea deal on Monday.

Matthew Thomas Slavish, 24, entered an Alford plea to three counts of first-degree assault as part of the plea agreement reached by Assistant State's Attorney Steven L. Trostle and Slavish's lawyer, C. Evan Rollins.

In an Alford plea, the defendant maintains his innocence while acknowledging that the state possesses enough evidence to convict him or her at trial.

Cecil County Circuit Court Judge Keith A. Baynes found Slavish guilty of those three counts of first-degree assault after Trostle read a summary of the state's case against Slavish.

As part of the plea deal,

prosecutors dropped 10 related charges, including attempted first-degree murder and attempted second-degree murder.

Under the plea agreement, Slavish faces at least eight years of incarceration in a Maryland Department of Corrections prison. The plea deal, meanwhile, sets a 15-year cap on the maximum sentence Slavish could receive.

As of late Monday, a sentencing date had not been scheduled. Slavish will remain jailed locally until his sentencing.

More than 20 people saw Slavish stab the first victim in the abdomen outside the now-closed Drunk Monkey at 989 E. Pulaski Highway about 2:30 a.m. on May 21, 2011 during a heated dispute, according to Trostle.

Those witnesses told police investigators that Slavish and that man, an Elkton resident, were "jabber-jawing" in

the parking lot amid a crowd, Trostle said in the courtroom. And then, Trostle added, Slavish pulled a knife from his pocket.

"He lunged and stabbed (the victim) in the stomach, near his sternum. He effectively disemboweled him. His intestines popped out," Trostle told the judge, adding that the blade also cut the man's liver.

That critical stab wound put the man in a trauma unit at Christiana Hospital in Delaware, Trostle reported.

The other two men, also Elkton residents, suffered their relatively less serious stab wounds — one to the thigh, the other to the arm — during a group effort to subdue and disarm Slavish, according to Trostle.

"They (people in the crowd) started screaming, 'He's got a knife; he's got a knife,' and then they swamped the defendant," Trostle said.




The Summer Games are

Valedictorian Cynthia Bai advised the class of 2012 not to live in the shadows of someone else's expectations, as she spoke June 5 at Newark High School's commencement ceremony.

"Not only because you won't get anywhere, but you also won't get a tan," Bai said.

The Bob Carpenter Center seated approximately 2,000 family members, faculty and friends who celebrated the graduation of 350 NHS

students, marking the school's 119th annual commencement.

Superintendent Marcia Lyles advised the graduates to savor the moment and take a second to remember the emotions of the evening — the pride for a job well done, relief and amazement that their high school experience is over, regret and sorrow that it is over, and anticipation and anxiety for what's next.

"Remember how you got here, remember the friends who cried with you and laughed with you," Lyles said. "But never forget that you are your greatest resource. Just

listen to the voice that speaks inside of you."

Salutatorian Laurne Terasaki reflected on coming from a family of no college background, with an incarcerated father, and working his way being accepted to Columbia University. He said that he is confident that people know what they want to do in life, but are scared to say it out loud, out of fear that other people will doubt them.

"I am telling you it is good enough, and is absolutely attainable," Terasaki said.

Principal Curtis Bedford took a moment to thank the parents for choosing Newark High School out

The search for Rudy: Couple closer to finding missing dog

Two Newark-area pet owners who have been searching for their missing dog for more than six months are one step closer to finding their beloved dachshund, Rudy.

With the help of a nationally renowned pet detective and a pack of scent-tracking dogs, Donna Watson and her husband, John Ohnstead, believe they have finally located Rudy's "hot zone," an area the wandering dog visits frequently.

"Unless he unexpectedly moves, we have located him," Watson said Monday. "The next step in the investigation is capture and recovery."

Rudy has been missing since Christmas Day when he escaped from the Christiana Village home of a family friend, who was dog-sitting him while Watson and Ohnstead went on a cruise.

Since cutting short their vacation to search for him, Watson and Ohnstead have made finding Rudy their full-time jobs and have already invested several thousand dollars in the effort.

"He's our kid, he's our family member, and we want him home," said Watson, who lives with her husband in the Brookhaven neighborhood east of Newark.

Earlier this spring, they enlisted the help of Karin Tarqwyn, a Nebraska-based pet detective who has been featured on Animal Planet. Tarqwyn started out as a private investigator who specialized in finding people, but after her own

dog went missing, she applied her tracking skills to find the animal. For the past eight years, she has made a career out of tracking lost pets.

She and her team made their second trip to Delaware last weekend to follow up on Rudy sightings called in by members of the public.

Traveling in a caravan made up of "Team Rudy" supporters, Tarqwyn and her crew spent the day Sunday traversing New Castle County and parts of Maryland looking for signs of Rudy. The tracking dogs found Rudy's scent in several places, including the railroad tracks behind Pencader Plaza, the shuttered Newark Housing Authority complex on Cleveland Avenue and a neighborhood off of Walther Road near Bear.

They also investigated sightings in Elkton, Md. but determined they were not Rudy.

However, the break in the case came one day later when Watson received a tip of a Rudy sighting within the past 24 hours. Tarqwyn used her tracking dogs to confirm that Rudy has been visiting that area,

located in the city of Newark.

Watson won't release the exact location due to fears that a well-meaning but misguided citizen could scare the skittish dachshund away from the area.

Though Rudy has presumably been located, capturing him is still difficult, Tarqwyn said.

"Many of these dogs, after 72 hours they won't respond to their domestic training to come to their name," Tarqwyn said.

A dog gone as long as Rudy has likely reverted to survival mode and will not necessarily respond immediately when it sees its owner.

"The dog has to make a deci-

sion," said Tarqwyn, who set up a feeding station and trap in the area where Rudy was spotted. "It can take hours."

She believes Rudy has traveled along railroad tracks, diverting off into neighborhoods and shopping centers when hungry. A dachshund usually travels two to three miles each day, she said.

While Watson waits to see what happens, she said what keeps her going is the outpouring of support she has received from the public. Thousands of people have followed the story through the Bring Rudy Home Facebook page, and many have volunteered to pass out fliers, put up signs and man feeding stations.

"This little 11-pound dog has brought together a community all around Delaware," Watson said.

One of those volunteers is

Joanne Yenkevich, who read about Rudy's saga and contacted Watson to see how she could help. On Sunday, she spent several hours following around Tarqwyn's team to lend her support for the search.

"I have two Basset hounds, and if that was my dog, I would want someone to help," Yenkevich said. "If my doggie was missing, I'd be totally distraught."

If you think you see Rudy, call Donna Watson and John Ohnstead at 302-437-5112. They ask that you do not chase Rudy because he is skittish and will run away.



was so bad that nothing in Newark was open, but the Post House was. She would be the only place that your work crews during storms could go for a hot cup of coffee and a warm meal."


Three generations of Woolsey's family have worked there, including her daughter and grandchildren, who started washing dishes as soon as they turned 14.

"I was always known to everyone on Main Street as 'Jane's daughter'," Lukaszewicz said. "As a teen, it was annoying; as a grown woman, I am more than proud to have this title."

Mayor Vance Funk said he remembers going to the Post House for breakfast during his college years and called it the "neighborhood greasy spoon".

"It's a shame to lose Jane," Funk said. "She's a personality in and of herself."

A new gourmet grilled cheese shop will open in the Post House's location, Funk said. There was a prospective buyer who was willing to keep the location open as the Post House, but the landlord decided to sell it to

other tenants, Woolsey said.

Ricky Neitubicz, planner and administrator for the Downtown Newark Partnership, said losing a locally owned business in Newark is unfortunate for Main Street.

"It's a shame to see them go," Neitubicz said. "They were a fixture of the Main Street landscape for a long, long time."

The Post House, known for its low-priced, home-style breakfast and faithful regular patrons, is one of the few remaining quaint diner-type businesses that mark the history of Newark's Main Street.

Neitubicz said Main Street in Newark is an attractive real estate market, meaning retailers or restaurants would value the Post House's location. He said the DNP tries to

attract locally owned businesses, but ultimately the negotiations are up to the landlords and renters.

"The face of Main Street is changing slowly," Funk said. "Fortunately a lot of people from the old days are still around. It never hurts to have new businesses, but you hate to see something like the Post House go."

"He always wanted to work," Jones said. "Whether it was midnight or daytime, he always wanted to be in the police car."

During Paco's career, he spent most of his time in the field searching for drugs and searching buildings with open burglary alarms, Jones said.

He handled more than 1,500 complaints, 400 burglar alarms and participated in more than 100 tracks and 700 searches. He also discovered \$150,000 in drug-tainted money, 30 pounds of marijuana, several firearms and two vehicles used for transportation of narcotics.

"He was exactly what we needed him to be," Jones said. "He'd go in a blink of an eye to being a fierce sounding and looking police dog."

When Paco was off-duty, he was easygoing, social and loved to be around kids, Jones said.

"He was a sucker for attention," he said.

Nic DeCaire, owner of Fusion Fitness Center, has hosted the Main Street Mile run for five years to raise



money to benefit the Newark Police Department's K-9 unit.

"We started raising the money for Paco," DeCaire said. "We appreciate the amount of work he did, and what he did for the city."

Paco was recognized by the United States Police Canine Association as a national-

ly certified narcotics detection dog. Jones and Paco were recognized in 2008 by the USPCA for the fastest completion of the timed certification course by a first time participant.

"He did everything we could've asked of him," Jones said.

Painting a brighter future

Charity art auction will raise money to send craft supplies to India

When artist Jen Easterday began going to into the community to bring art to those less fortunate, it changed the way she viewed her craft.

"That part, community service, really changed me," said Easterday, who teaches several art classes in Elkton, Md. "Once

I took art to other people, it affected me differently."

Therefore, she wanted her students to have the same experience. Four years ago, she started the Children's Charity Art Auction, which allows her students to sell their work to help other kids.

The first year she held the auction, it raised money to send art supplies to a children's

home in India.

Now it works as an inter-continental partnership. The Indian kids send their art to the United States to be sold at the auction, and then with the money raised, Easterday sends more supplies to the children's home.

More than 50 kids from India and the Newark/Elkton area, ranging in age from 5 to 15, will take part in the auction, which

will be held at Ogletown Baptist Church on Red Mill Road east of Newark. The 6 p.m. event is free to attend, and bidding starts at \$5 on each piece of artwork.

"The mission is that all kids have the ability to change the world," Easterday said. "Art is a means of doing that."

For many of the kids, she said, seeing people buying their art is an eye-opening experience.

"The kids sit in front of their art and the bidding sheet and they get to watch the bidding war," she said. "They get so excited. They see a great response and then get that much more excited to do it again next year."

"It's a great way for kids to see they can use their art to help people all over the world," she added.

The kids are no strangers to helping others, however, because community service is a strong component of all of Easterday's classes. While she wants her students to learn the fundamentals of painting, pottery and other art forms, of equal importance, she said, is instilling in them the importance of helping others.

Her students often meet up with inner-city kids or children with disabilities to help teach

them to do artwork.

"The fabric of this art program is using what they're learning to help others," Easterday said.

Last year, the auction raised nearly \$3,000, with individual pieces being sold for as much as \$150.

Most of the money is used to sponsor a child in India—it costs only \$300 a year to provide for a child's yearly needs there—and to send more supplies to the children's home.

A portion of the money is also used to support a local charity. This year, it will go to the Bear Babe Ruth baseball league, which is raising money to build a handicapped-accessible baseball field.

Easterday said that while raising money is the goal, she emphasizes to her students that any amount helps.

"The most important thing for them to know is that they're helping the world, whether its \$5 or \$150," she said.

What keeps her doing the auction, she said, is not only the lessons it teaches her students but also the stories she

hears about the Indian kids who get to use paint, brushes and canvases for the first time.

"It's so new to them and so special," she said. "It's amazing for them to hear they have people over here who really care for them."
