Dear Dean Robinson:



# SENIORS

College? It promised friendship, adventure, scholarship, romance to eighty-three eager Freshman who began turbulent college careers in September, 1934 with a memorable Freshman week, green aprons, and pertinent advice from Big Sisters. However, definite activities such as the election of Libby MacFarland as our class president and preparing for those horrible first exams soon overwhelmed that feeling of vague confusion. The Freshman Formal with Kay Castle as chairman, our competitive play, Toy HEART, and our lovely representatives in May Court as climaxes in our progress in social affairs and drama.

September, 1935. The first delightful problem of our second year was: how can we best show those poor Freshmen that we Sophomores love them? The answer was: Enhance their natural beauty by depriving them of make-up (well, Miss Osborne said that a rest from cosmetics would do anyone's complexion good), and by insisting upon their donning significantly green bibs. Then came Stunt Night with several dyed-in-the-wool judges in a mock court scene. Next, Esther Rayne, chairman, selected the Kennett Square Country Club as the scene of the Senior-Sophomore Luncheon. Delicious food, lovely weather, and entertaining company contributed to its success. Also '35–'36 was a significant year in sports—we carried away the honors in hockey, soccer, basketball, and swimming.

September, 1936. By this time, we were able to express our progress in having Little Sisters of our own, in selecting College rings, and in sponsoring the Junior Prom. Eleanor Samuel, chairman of the last delightful affair, secured the popular orchestra of Alex Bartha for rhythms, and diaries and cigarette cases for favors. Oh, night divine!

September, 1937. Seniors at last! To studious co-eds, this classification meant practice teaching, interviews, oral exams; to the more socially ambitious, participation in class activities, diamonds on one's hand; to the artistic, progress in drama, music, art, or sports. However, to all, it meant a realization that "intellect alone ain't all!"


## **SOPHOMORES**
