However, definite activities such as the election of Libby MacFarland as our class president and preparing for those horrible first exams soon overwhelmed that feeling of vague confusion. The Freshman Formal with Kay Castle as chairman, our competitive play, Toy Heart, and our lovely representatives in May Court as climaxes in our progress in social affairs and drama.
