# 'Quiet leader' honored

Richard Gays awarded for decades of service to community

He has served on the board of the Newark Senior Center, coached soccer for the Newark Parks and Recreation Department, beautified the Nottingham Green neighborhood where he lives and manned Code Purple shelters that give homeless people a place to go on cold winter nights.

His work with the Newark Area Welfare Committee includes stocking the food cupboard and doing the organization's public out-

At the Newark Empowerment Center, he regularly donates bottled water, and at the Hope Dining Room, where he volunteers once a month, they call him the "corn king.

Throughout his four decades living in Newark, Richard Gays has spent

# club sues city

The Newark Country Club is taking the city to court over a controversial, council-initiated proposal to rezone the country club property. Meanwhile, the planning commission is recommending council pull the ordinance to avoid the legal battle.

Talk of rezoning the club began at an Aug. 3 special meeting about Newark's comprehensive development plan, during which several council members expressed their desire to protect the golf course from future development, should declining membership and financial hardship force the club to close.

They voted 6 to 1 to draft a bill to "downzone" the country club's 120 acres at 300 W. Main St. from RS to RH, essentially cutting the allowable density in half. The RH zone would only allow for 112 half-acre lots,

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# **Expanded plan for Cleveland Ave. townhomes moves forward**

On Tuesday night, the planning commission recommended city council give a developer the goahead to expand a controversial, previously-approved plan for townhouse-style apartments on Cleveland Avenue.

The original Cleveland Station project slated for 63 W. Cleveland Ave. was approved in 2013 but never acted upon.

Developer Kevin Heitzenroder had intended to build six apartments on the site, but while crews prepared for the construction, adjacent parcels at 53 and 57 W. Cleveland Ave., formerly the Elk's Club, and a single-family home at 56 Church Street became available

Now, the Heitzenroder wants to combine all four parcels and ex-

plan by adding 11 additional apartments. His attorney, John Tracey, asked the planning commission on Tuesday to recommend that

pand upon the approved six-unit council amend the Comprehensive Development Plan, rezone the properties and approve the major subdivision.

Tracey said that in order for the

new Cleveland Station plan to move forward, the Comprehensive Plan for the area needs to be changed from light commercial (local shopping) and single family residential (medium density) to multi-family residential (medium to high den-

The properties also need to be rezoned to RM (residential multi-family—garden apartments), he said.

In 2013, the planning commission recommended council deny the original Cleveland Station plan. However, council approved it 5-1, despite outcry from several neighbors who passionately pleaded with council to stop the project, which they said will harm the character of the historically African-American neighborhood.

On Tuesday, however, the planning commission seemed to like the expanded Cleveland Station

"It's the kind of thing we need in Newark to spruce it up," Commissioner Edgar Johnson said.

However, Johnson was con-cerned about the project adhering to city codes.

In addition to the overall plan, Heitzenroder is also requesting relief from several of the city's code requirements including distance between buildings, amount of open area, setbacks from existing lot lines, the size of side yards and other requirements.

Planning Director Maureen Feeney Roser said plans are allowed to deviate from the code at the discretion of the planning commission.

Members voted unanimously in favor the project, which will now move to council for a final vote. If the 17-unit plan for Cleveland Station is not approved by council, the six units approved in 2013 will be built instead.



# CSX: 'Play it safe around railroad tracks

The same message adorned a huge banner hung from the second-story porch of the restaurant, and officials handed out T-shirts and other tchotchke emblazoned with train safety messages.

Smith provided students and other customers some sobering statistics about train collisions. Nationwide, there are approximately 200 collisions between trains and vehicles each year, resulting in an average of 270 fatalities.

The real fear is that 500 pedestrians lost their lives after being hit by trains last year," Smith said.

That number was up from 470 the previous year.

'Part of what we've seen is people wearing noise-canceling headphones," she said. "They literally

At the Main Street crossing, there have been eight train-vehicle crashes or near misses in the past seven years, making it one of the most dangerous rail crossings in the state. In the same time period, at least four pedestrians were killed on train tracks throughout Newark.

The crossing near the Deer Park has been the subject of increased scrutiny in light of a June 21 incident in which a driver turned onto the tracks and got stuck. Two Newark Police officers pulled him from his SUV seconds before a train smashed into the vehicle.

# City exploring municipal broadband service

When it comes to Internet providers in Newark, companies like Comcast and Verizon are the big players, but now the city is exploring getting into the game by providing a municipal broadband service.

According to IT Manager Josh Brechbuehl, the city's interest in a municipallysponsored Internet service was sparked by a few residents who spoke up at a previous council meeting, but staff and council wanted to gauge public support for the concept before moving forward with a \$43,000 feasibility study.

On Wednesday night, members of the public gathered at

the Church of the Nazarene to learn more about municipal broadband from Andrew Afflerbach, CEO at CTC Technology and Energy, a Maryland-based independent communications and IT engineering consulting firm that specializes in planning, design and implementation of communications infrastructure and networks.

He said the city itself needs broadband not only for Internet but for public safety, monitoring/SCADA, surveillance, parking meters, Cloud applications, code enforcement, GIS data and future Smart City technology.

The IT department has talked about providing free, localized Wi-Fi along Main Street in hotspots as well as

placing up to 10 smart advertising kiosks along Main Street. The touch-screen pedestal devices would provide visitors with restaurant menus and event information and show scrolling advertisement when not in

Last year, Brechbuehl said, the city installed smart water and electric meters that relay usage information over a new wireless Internet network called a Wi-Fi mesh, but it is not designed to service thousands of people and doesn't expand across the city.

Afflerbach said city-run broadband could allow the city to act as a wholesaler by providing high-speed Internet access to residents as a utility similar to water and electric.

Resident Brian Read said Wednesday he doesn't have broadband service, but would consider it if Newark provided

"I'd much rather give my money to the city and not some commercial company," he said.

Len Schwartz, a mechanical engineering professor at the University of Delaware, said he expects UD will be interested in municipal Internet and encouraged the city to include university officials in the conversation going forward.

"We share interest with them, and I think it would be helpful to explore such a partnership," he said.

Resident Keith Bart, however, was skeptical.

"I just graduated a kid from the university. He had Inter-

net everywhere he went on at a reduced cost. campus; he had it in his dorm and he had it wirelessly across campus. They're already set up for this," he said. "They may not be as invested in getting us up to speed as I as a resident might be or a business owner might be on Main

Councilwoman Marge Hadden suggested the city look into sharing the cost of the feasibility study with the uni-

will benefit even though they have their own infrastructure," Hadden, a UD employee, said.

She asked Afflerbach and city staff to think about the low-income residents in Newark and how this proposed service could be offered to them for free or

"They need to have access to this in their homes, not in libraries or McDonald's," she

Several council members expressed their desire Wednesday night to learn more about municipal broadband through a feasibility study.


Mayor Polly Sierer said she found the idea worth exploring for economic development reasons. City-sponsored Internet could attract new business to Newark and create an opportunity to partner with UD, she said.

"I do believe it does have potential," Sierer said.

Council will vote on a recommendation to move forward with a feasibility study regarding municipal broadband at a future meeting.

the Pencader Heritage Museum have been digitizing old Newark City Council meeting minutes. They share excerpts with Newark Post readers in a weekly column.

October-December 1912: Drainage on Cleveland Avenue through Mrs. Willis's property was under discussion. The first payment to-"macadamizing" the road was \$2,000.00. A contractor was paid \$563.00 for grading, furnishing stone and rolling North College Avenue, Prospect Avenue, and Wilbur Street.

Wires over the Philadelphia, Baltimore and Wilmington Railroad at the old station needed to be moved. The cost was \$75 to install a 32'x2 ½' culvert in at the west end of town. The board of health acquaint residents with the need for a town-wide sewer system. The board suggested that council collect information from Seaford, Lewes and other towns concerning financing for public sewer.

Alderman Lovett wrote council requesting "authority to spend a few dollars for a mattress, sheet, pillow, comforter and also a bucket ....

urged a public meeting to for sick cases or medical needs...and two keys. We will see that no drunks or tramps enter and will keep it

> January-February Mr. MacKintire of Red Men's Fraternal Home requested railroad replied in surprise, two street lamps. William and Council told it numerous Saunders was reimbursed \$20 for taxes paid in error between 1904 and 1911 on the "Old Colored School" proper-

It took applying to the Delaware Legislature to get the attention of the B&O Railroad regarding watchmen and blocked street crossings. The complaints had been lodged by the town with no results. The railroad superintendent said action would be taken to

alleviate the problems.

# Gunmen rob UD students in drug-related home invasion

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Two University of Delaware students were robbed at gunpoint in a drug-related home invasion last week, police said.

The gunmen entered the students' off-campus home in the unit block of East Cleveland Avenue through an unlocked door at 1:21 a.m. Oct. 2, according to Sgt. Gerald Bryda, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department.

After demanding money

and drugs, the men ran-sacked the home and fled with an undisclosed amount of cash.

The two victims were described as male students ages 19 and 20. One was pistol-whipped and assaulted but declined medical treat-

The Newark Police Criminal Investigations Unit is investigating this case as a drug-related, home-invasion-style armed robbery, Bryda said.

The first suspect was described as a black man with

a dark complexion, approximately 22 years old, 5 feet 9 inches to 5 feet 10 inches tall, average build and 170 to 175 pounds. He was dressed in all black, including a hooded sweatshirt and a mask covering his face.

The second was described as a black man with a medium complexion, approximately 18 years old, 5 feet 11 inches to 6 feet tall and a slender build.

The third was described as a black man with a dark complexion, 5 feet 8 inches to 5 feet 10 inches tall and

approximately 18 to 22 years old.

# Driver charged with hitting three pedestrians in parking lot

A Claymont man was arrested after he allegedly hit three women with

his car and damaged two vehicles in the parking lot behind The Galleria over the weekend, police said.

The defendant is identified as Podgajny, 23. Kyle

According to Sgt. Gerald Bryda, a PODGAJNY spokesman for the Newark Police

Department, the incident occurred at approximately 12:10 a.m. Sunday after Podgajny had allegedly been kicked

out of a bar on Main Street.

Podgajny got into his car, which was parked in Lot 1 behind The Galleria, and started to drive away, striking three women walking in the parking lot, Bryda said. After hitting them, he reversed "at a high rate of speed" and drove back toward the women, forcing them to jump out of the way to avoid being struck again.

Two of the women were taken to the hospital for knee and shoulder injuries. The third woman was not injured, Bryda said.

As the women dodged the car, Podgajny swerved and hit a parked car, which was thrown into another parked car, Bryda said. He then drove toward the exit and tried to get around

the gate arm, but struck a small pole. He eventually exited the lot and attempted to make a left onto Delaware Avenue but hit a utility pole instead.

Bryda said officers arrived and charged Podgajny with leaving the scene of a collision resulting in injury, leaving the scene of a property damage collision accident, driving under the influence of alcohol, failure to have insurance identification in possession, failure to report a collision involving alcohol, criminal mischief under \$1,000, three counts of firstdegree reckless endangerment and three counts of second-degree vehicular assault.

He was released after posting \$6,200 unsecured bond.

# **Car mirrors damaged** on South Chapel and **Courtney streets**

Two people reported their car side-view mirrors were smashed over the weekend.

According to Sgt. Gerald Bryda, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department,

the first incident occurred sometime between 10 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. Sunday in the 200 block of South Chapel Street.

The victim said her car was parked in her driveway overnight and in the morning she noticed the driver's side mirror was

shattered and the covering was knocked off. The mirror cost \$100 and there was no other damage to the car, Bryda said.

The second incident occurred Sunday sometime between 12:30 a.m. and noon in the 100 block of Courtney Street. Both of the victim's

side mirrors were broken, resulting in \$250 worth of damage

Bryda said the two incidents are thought to be related due to the time frame and close proximity. He said police continue to investigate and there are no suspects at this time.

# The Cooch house - Part 3

This week's Out of the Attic item is a current picture of the Cooch house and its service buildings.

Thomas Cooch, a miller by trade, bought 200 acres with a grist mill and a saw mill when he came from England in 1746. He built the first two stories of this house in 1760. A smoke house and spring house were added in the later 1700s.

His great grandson, Levi Griffith Cooch, added the third story and rear wing about 1865. By the time of Cooch's death, his property had grown to be more than 850 acres and included an ironworks.

Thomas Cooch had a strong sense of community responsibility and service. He served as a militia officer for many years, as a captain in the French and Indian war, and was elected colonel for the lower half of New Castle County in the Revolutionary War.
Edward W. Cooch, Sr. served as Dela-

ware's lieutenant governor from 1936-40. Edward W. Cooch, Jr. is a major law firm partner. Richard Rodney Cooch is a Delaware Superior Court Judge.



It is a complex of historic structures and sites around Cooch's Bridge that includes houses, mills, dams and sites associated with more than two-and-a-half centuries of industrial development as well as the battle site. The Heritage District was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. The Heritage District is administered by the State of Delaware Division of Historical and Cultural Af-

After playing the clip, Newark Police Department Sgt. Chris Jones polled our citizen's police academy class on whether we think the shooting - which happened elsewhere in the country, not in Newark – was justified.

About half the class said ves. The other half, including me, said no.

The exercise was intended to show the snap judgment a police officer must make when deciding whether to use deadly force. Jones was also trying to show how videos of police shootings that are released to the media or surface online don't always depict the entire story.

It was a timely discussion, for sure, in light of recent incidents in Ferguson, Mo., and other places. Even here in Delaware, the

sets the gun on the ground, recent Wilmington shooting years." of a wheelchair-bound man who allegedly had a gun has drawn criticism from some

in the community. The clip Jones showed looked bad. If the man had already put the gun down, why did the officer shoot him?

However, then Jones told us the rest of the story. The shots actually came from a second officer, who was rounding a corner behind the man. As the man set his gun down, the officer could see him starting to reach for a second gun that was hidden in his back waistband. Fearing for the life of the first officer, the cop shot the gunman.

You have that split-second to make a decision," said Jones, who also serves as a firearms instructor for new officers. That decision, he said, "will be Mondaymorning quarterbacked for

Jones admitted that not every police officer is correct

'We won't paint this rosy picture and say we're perfect," he said. "We're not perfect and we make mistakes

Still, his message to our class was that there can be more to the story than a photo or video from one perspective shows.

"When we make rash judgments without knowing what was in the officer's mind, we're skipping a whole part of the process,' Jones said. "All I ask is, don't judge us until all the facts are out."

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

there with signs and flags, it was very moving," Padgett said, tears filling his eyes.


Andy Bernt, who served in the U.S. Air Force for 10 years, also was over-whelmed by the turnout to greet the procession.







which is significantly less than the 270-unit plan that was approved by the city in 2008 but never built due to the recession.

While the ordinance is pending a final vote, the country club is not allowed to resubmit its 2008 subdivision plan, apply for any permits or submit any new

development plans.
In a lawsuit filed in Chancery Court last week, the club claims the Aug. 3 meeting violated the Freedom of Information Act, which requires a public body to provide notice of items that will be discussed and possibly voted on at a particular meeting. The meeting was advertised only as a discussion about the comprehensive plan and did not mention the Newark Country Club or indicate a possible vote on the property, the lawsuit states.

The club contends downzoning would reduce its property value by \$7 million.

Instead of taking a final vote last month, council referred the downzoning proposal to the planning commission. The board reviewed it Tuesday night, just four days after the country club filed suit, and several members were "displeased" with the situation.

This was not a community-supported request. This came from a councilman in that district whose main concern seemed to be traffic, and I don't see that the rezoning benefits the community in the sense of providing more public space," Commissioner Willard Hurd said, referring to Councilman Luke Chapman, who suggested the rezoning back in August.

"The rezoning will reduce the value, and that's going to get us sued. I think that's really what makes me most angry about council bringing this to us is to say that they're dumping that on us," Hurd added.
Commissioner Edgar

Johnson said he, too, was upset with council as well as the steps that were taken to change the property without the country club's consent. He said the commission does not typically consider rezoning a property unless it is at the owner's request and he didn't feel it was appropriate to do so Tuesday night.

Commissioner Alan Silverman said he would not this week.

support rezoning the club's 120 acres because there was no development plan to consider along with it. He said the 2008 project has laid dormant for years and there have been no new plans that require the requested RH zoning district.

"We just don't have enough to work with," he

The commission unanimously voted against rezoning the property, and the recommendation may move to council to be considered at a later date.

Meanwhile, a standstill agreement between the city and the country club has been placed on the agenda for Monday night's council meeting. If agreed on by both parties, council will not vote on rezoning the property while the country club submits a new plan for up to 310 units restricted to residents 55 and older.

The plan, which would have to go through the usual approval process, includes converting the existing clubhouse into either medical offices or community amenities, opening the club's swimming pool up to the public and preserving a portion of open space for a possible city park.

Under the proposed agreement, the country club would not be allowed to submit any applications other than the 310-unit development.

Councilman Mark More-head said Wednesday that the agreement came about through discussions he had with the country club.

Morehead said that he

had heard of another plan for the country club site several years ago and recently reached out to the developer to "see if the project was still out there.'

"And it was," he said. "So I'm just bringing the discussion to the table."

He said he is worried downzoning the property may cause a legal battle and is instead bringing forth an alternative he hopes will make both parties happy, although he insisted he is not directly advocating for the 310-unit plan.

"If we partner with [the country club] we're going to get a better result than if we anger them," he said.

Shawn Tucker, an attorney representing the country club, declined to comment on the agreement.

Chapman and Mayor Polly Sierer have both given up their membership in the Newark Country Club in order to avoid a conflict of interest, Sierer confirmed

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countless hours serving the community but, his friends say, most people have no idea what he's done.

"That's where I saw Richard really at his best - his silent service, his leading by example, his inspiring others," Baumbach said. "It's with quiet leaders like Richard that it becomes contagious."

Delaware First Lady Carla Markell served as the keynote speaker Tuesday.

"You are an unsung hero for some people and for others a very much appreciated person who has worked very hard to make a difference," Markell told Gays.

Born in Milwaukee, Gays majored in physical education at tiny Campbell University in North Carolina. During his senior year, he took an internship working with disabled students. That experience prompted him to go into the field of deaf education.

He moved to Newark in 1973 to take a job as principal of Delaware School for the Deaf. He later served as director of statewide deaf education services.

His love for volunteering started early, when he
