

135TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the STATE of DELAWARE 1ST LEGISLATIVE DAY DOVER, DELAWARE January 10, 1989

Pursuant to Section 4, Article 2 of the Constitution of the State of Delaware, the Senate met at Legislative Hall in Dover, Delaware at 2:12 p.m., Lt. Governor Woo presiding.

A Prayer was offered by Senator Adams.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

On motion of Senator Cordrey and without objection, Bernard J. Brady was appointed temporary Secretary of the Senate, Scotty Amerine as temporary Reading Clerk and Joy Bower as temporary Bill Clerk.

The Acting Secretary then called the roll of the hold-over Senators:

PRESENT: Senators Adams, Bair, Bane, Connor, Cook, Cordrey, McBride, Sharp, R. Still, Vaughn - 10.

ABSENT: Senator McDowell - 1.

Lt. Governor Woo appointed Senators Cook and Connor as a committee to receive and examine the Certificates of Election of the newly elected Senators.

The Chair called a short recess (in place) during the examination of the Certificates by the Committee.

The Senate reconvened and Senator Connor announced that he and Senator Cook examined the Certificates of Election and found them to be in order.

The Certificates of Election were as follows:

The Chair instructed the temporary Reading Clerk to read the Certificate of Election of Senator Herman Holloway (Senior Senator) in its entirety as follows:

The Speaker welcomed the Governor to the Joint Session and the Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Mr. Speaker, Lt. Gov. Wolf, Mr. President Pro Tem, members of the 135th General Assembly, Judiciary, members of my Cabinet, honored guests, and people of Delaware.

Last Friday, I had the honor to represent Delaware — to represent the people of this

state -- at President Bush's inauguration, and I'd like to share an impression of that event with you today.

I've been to Washington countless times.

But nothing could have prepared me for the moment when I walked out of the West Portico of the Capitol, first in line of the governors because Delaware is the First State, and saw a hundred thousand people -- two hundred thousand -- gathered between the Capitol and the Mall, with the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial in the distance, to witness the peaceful transfer of the American presidency.

It was an incredible sight, and an incredible feeling to be there as the entire government of the United States -- Congress, the judiciary, the Executive -participated in the inauguration.

The fact is, our country works because its institutions work, not because of individuals, no matter how popular or good they are. That's true in Washington, it's true in Dover. The continuity of government which sets this nation apart has little to do with leaders -- and everything to do with the way the people have invested their power in our institutions.

When I was sworn in last week, I accepted stewardship of this office -- an institution which belongs to the people -- and with it the relationship of trust and responsibility that exists between the governor and the people of Delaware. It doesn't matter whether the occupant of the office is Republican or Democrat, because the job carries with it a profound sense of obligation to each citizen of Delaware, an obligation which guides decisions and dictates policy.

Each member of this General Assembly shares that obligation.

Many of us who are gathered here today are old friends. We have not always been on the same side of every issue, but the state of Delaware has always been able to count us on her side.

We faced lean times together, and enjoyed the opportunities provided by prosperity.

To those of you who are new in this General Assembly, I commend your colleagues to you. They are dedicated, hard-working professionals, and they have contributed much to this state.

In preparing this report on the state of the state, I spent some time assessing projects begun in the last four years, with the object of evaluating our steady progress toward goals that once seemed unreachable. This might serve as a quick history lesson for our new members, because it will help

you understand the priorities which have moved state government, and to understand what we have accomplished these last four years.

o For instance, we set out early in this Administration to create a comprehensive structure of support and assistance for mothers, infants and young children. We did so in the belief that only by attacking all the problems that can undermine the future of our youngest citizens -- abuse, neglect, learning difficulties, mainutrition, lack of proper shelter -- can we truly help these children.

From a modest beginning which emphasized coordination and education for pregnant women and parents, today we offer a comprehensive program of maternal and child health programs. We have expanded Medicaid to cover pregnant women and children to age three with incomes up to 100 percent of the poverty level; we are providing comprehensive health and supportive services statewide to women who otherwise might not have access to health care; we have increased financial support for the Women, Infant and Child nutrition program; and we have made this a community concern as well as a community effort.

o When, in 1987, we began to enact a series of "Quality of Life" bills, we declared our intention to make sure that economic growth occurred in harmony with our wildlife and natural areas, with neighborhood integrity, and with the way of life that Delawareans cherish. With the General Assembly's support, we have strengthened both the resolve and the ability of the counties to develop good comprehensive plans and resist inappropriate zoning decisions; we have put people on notice that the state will play a significant role in providing information important to those decisions; we have created an advisory group to guide future development decisions; and we have made it clear that transportation decisions and development decisions must be made in tandom.

o We drew hundreds of concerned Delawareans into the debate about our state's

environmental future when we created the Environmental Legacy Program.

This undertaking, which was unique in its effort to bring together both environmentalists and industrialists to find mutually acceptable solutions to problems, has given us a blueprint for the next decades. Through the work of the original group, which numbered a few dozen, and the efforts of the hundreds of private citizens, community and business leaders, and the Department of Natural Resources and

Environmental Control, we have charted a safe course for Delaware for years to come.

O We have made the budget a tool in the hands of government, providing flexibility where none existed before, substituting planning for guesswork, setting goals and then working toward them, crafting new public policy instead of simply perpetuating old

policies.

At the same time, you and I have worked hard over the past several years to reform the bond bill process, so that capital improvement projects are selected on the basis of

Today the bond bill is an effective means for accomplishing the legitimate ends of government, and no longer simply a political grab bag. I'm proud of what we have accomplished in changing our approach to capital improvements, and each of you who has participated in that effort should be proud as well.

It is against the background of those accomplishments that we consider the state of

Measured by economic expansion, by growing employment, by the increased wealth of our families, by the reduction of public welfare rolls, by improvements in our schools—the state of the state is extraordinary.

Measured by the spirit of the people, by their resolve, by the strength of our communities, the state of the state has never been better.

But any report on the state of the state must be a report on work in progress. role of government in society is to assure order and solve problems, and neither job is ever done. Our true success is not measured by works completed, but by works begun -as each new year brings opportunities which test our resolve and demand new commitment.

A commitment to the youngest children, and to children as yet unborn. A commitment to children as they begin their passage through our education system.

A commitment to young adults who are facing difficult choices which can derail their lives before they have completed their education.

A commitment to creating productive adults.

A commitment to work with the community to provide a safety net for citizens who need help.

And, finally, a commitment to a thriving, growing state -- to new jobs, to a modern transportation system, to a healthy environment and a strong and diverse economy.

The budget I am submitting to you today totals \$1,171 million.

Of that amount, the operating budget is \$1,126 million, and grants-in-aid and supplemental appropriations account for the rest.

The operating budget represents 7.9 percent growth over current spending, or roughly \$95.1 million in new revenues to offset inflation, expand existing services and provide new programs.

In this budget I am recommending the transfer of \$31 million in general funds to the capital improvement budget, and \$2 million to the Delaware Community Foundation to help that organization begin work.

And I am recommending changes in our tax structure which will increase revenues by \$4

million in the coming fiscal year and \$10 million in subsequent years.

When I delivered my Inaugural Address last Tuesday, I described some goals that I believe we should set for ourselves in the coming years. I intend to expand that list

I said in my Inaugural Address, let us start working toward the day when everyone either graduates from high school or completes an alternative program of education which prepares them for finding and holding a job. And let's make those diplomas the best academic credentials in America.

There's no question that we've made progress in education, raising standards, raising

salaries.

But I'm not satisfied, the parents I talk to are not satisfied, and many educators are not satisfied.

Today there is a gap between the best schools and the worst, and between the best schools — and their potential for excellence. We concern ourselves with the equalization of funds — when we should be talking about the equalization of learning, of homework, of classroom standards. If we tolerate that difference, then we are telling parents, educators and kids that it's okay to be mediocre, that second rate is okay in the First State.

Well, I say second rate is not okay.

Nor am I willing to accept the fact that one out of every four kids who start school

drops out before he or she gets a diploma.

What makes this fact worse is that, when we could be helping these kids, we don't do enough. And then when we should be putting obstacles in the way of their dropping out -- we help them quit.

Last year, we teamed up with the Education Commission of the States as one of five states to launch a pilot program in which teachers and staff in individual schools are given the freedom to design more effective teaching programs. The idea is that the real experts are in the classroom, and we should be listening to them about teaching and learning rather than dictating from on high.

That's going to help solve this problem of failure and dropouts, but there's more we can do -- and we don't have to wait to do it.

Last year we received one of the best and most thoughtful reports I've ever seen -the recommendations of the task force on children at risk, chaired by Bob Williams. "Children at risk" is one of those educational expressions that tend to confuse the rest of us. What they're talking about is kids who don't have a chance because life's problems are too big for them to handle.

Kids with learning problems, kids whose home life is full of loneliness or disruption,

kids who can't pay attention to their work because they're hungry.

And what's really tragic about these kids is that we know who they are. identify them even before they get to kindergarten, when the problems are smaller and easier to solve. We just haven't done the job well enough.

That's going to change.

In the budget I am sending to you today, I am recommending that we triple our spending in this area to implement a statewide, district-by-district strategy to assist children at risk with programs like the one in the Red Clay district, where schools are providing after-school and summer programs for kids who need extra help.

As for the dropout problem -- we've talked a good game, but done too little to solve the problem. So today I am proposing to you that we tell kids they can't drop out when

they're 16 anymore.

There are going to be times when a school district decides a child should not stay in school, but I do not believe that a 16-year-old has the experience or the judgment to make a decision that could well ruin his or her chances for success.

I propose that we require all children to attend school until they are 17 years old, unless school authorities determine that leaving school at 16 is appropriate, and prepare to increase the age to 18 in the future. Fifteen other states already require attendance until at least 17.

I am also proposing that we increase the number of school days by one day a year for five years -- and make sure that those days are used wisely and well. This is not a simple issue, but we cannot afford to ignore the question simply because the debate will strike sparks.

I believe, too, that every child between second grade and twelfth grade should do homework — homework that demands thought and challenges young minds — every school night, and that parents should be required to prove that they have at least seen it.

I understand that there will be some teenagers who cannot continue in traditional schools. For them, I am proposing that we fund the innovative Alternative Secondary Education program, providing a half million dollars to reach into the community and help kids on the verge of abandoning school.

Building and expanding on the Groves High School experience in providing continuing education, we will offer courses outside the traditional school environment and schedule

in an effort to help these young people graduate.

This is an important program, because it reflects a new attitude about education, one that holds that the goal of education is to help people learn, not punish them because they will not or cannot receive their education within the normal educational structure.

Since I became governor, we have made a tremendous financial commitment to education. Roughly a third of all new spending in five budgets has gone to our public schools and public school teachers.

Teacher salaries have gone from 21st in the nation to 12th in a few short years; only

one other state has increased salaries more.

We have made it possible for our school districts to compete for good teachers, and an average 5.7 percent increase in state funding for teacher salaries in the coming year will continue that commitment.

But there is one commitment the districts have consistently ignored -- the salaries

paid to starting teachers.

To attract good new teachers today, a starting salary of over \$22,000 is necessary. In good faith, the state has funded over two thirds of this amount, with the understanding that the districts would pay the balance.

But most have not, and by their decision jeopardized the future of our education

system.

For that reason, I am proposing that we require districts to use local funds to begin increasing starting salaries during the 1989-90 school year, and bring starting salaries to over \$22,000 by September 1990.

There is one other appropriation that deserves mention before I go on: I am proposing a fifteen percent increase in Division II education funding for textbooks and school materials.

I said in my Inaugural Address, Let us start working toward the day when every Delawarean has the opportunity to live a life of dignity and hope, in which hand-outs are eschewed for a hand up and over the obstacles to self-sufficiency, in which the enormous promise of a young life is not squandered through neglect or abuse.

enormous promise of a young life is not squandered through neglect or abuse.

I had the good fortune to be at the right place at the right time three years ago, when President Reagan made welfare reform a national priority and the nation's governors asked me to represent the interests of the states in the debate over national welfare

policy.

By bringing together governors, Congressional leaders like Senator Moynihan of New York, and the White House — and by keeping the issue alive when political expediency suggested a quiet funeral for welfare reform — we succeeded in turning an assistance program with a small education and training component into an education and training program with a strong assistance component.

Of course, it was easier to urge people in Washington to act when, back home, we had already begun our own welfare reform effort. Not only has our "First Step" program succeeded in putting people to work, it has changed people's lives and made them

advocates for this system of opportunity and progress.

What I find especially interesting about welfare reform is the reaction it provoked, virtually from the day I got involved in it. Everybody liked it — eventually.

People who thought that welfare discouraged initiative and rewarded people for staying

home thought the change was long overdue.

People who were <u>on</u> welfare agreed. Some didn't like it at first, but they changed their minds when they saw their futures open up with new promise and hope.

We made government responsive. We allowed government to offer a hand in assistance. Instead of tailoring welfare reform to one political philosophy or another — and there were strongly held beliefs on all sides — we tailored it to the needs of people. And, finally, we built a system that would help and encourage people to break free of the system.

There will always be people who must rely on the state throughout their lives; our responsibility to them is to offer comfort and dignity. But for the rest, our goal must be to identify children and adults at risk and intervene as early as possible — and as often as necessary — to help them achieve independence and self-sufficiency.

Just as the best government is the least government, so the optimum level of government involvement in anyone's life is the least.

When we become involved in the life of a child through our kids' department, it is with the idea of solving whatever problems are troubling that child -- and then standing aside.

If a teenager is having problems in school, we should help with all the energy, dedication and resource we can muster -- understanding that our goal is to allow that youth to stand on his own.

The greatest good government can do is to help as soon as possible, as much as

necessary, but in a way that makes further help unneeded.

The increases in funding for the WIC nutrition program I am recommending in this budget, the increase in Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the decision to help hundreds of additional families obtain safe, high-quality day care for their children -are intended to provide assistance when people need it most, but not institutionalize that assistance.

At the same time, government must respond to the changing needs of the community. Delaware's elderly population is increasing more rapidly than the population as a whole — in fact, three times as fast. We cannot abandon our elderly, nor through neglect allow age to rob them of dignity and happineness, and today we are finding new ways to provide needed services for our senior citizens through counseling, day care, respite care programs and better coordination of community based services for the elderly.

We have a responsibility to address new problems and new threats to the health and well-being of the public -- threats like AIDS.

Today one of the most pressing concerns before us is the terrible affliction of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. To meet that challenge, we are increasing the state's efforts to provide additional counseling, testing and case management.

By combining state funds with the expected increase in federal funding for Delaware's programs, we will be able to increase our case management capability as well as our ability to coordinate outside programs. Statewide, I expect various revenue sources to provide over \$1.5 million for AIDS programs, up from \$34,000 just a few short years ago.

We have taken the first steps toward dramatically improving our mental health system. We have recruited two of the nation's best practitioners to lead us -- Neil Meisler in the Division of Alcoholism, Drug Abuse and Mental Health and Dr. Julian Taplan in the Division of Child Mental Health. Working separately, but sharing the same dream, they have given us direction, imposed a sound philosophy of treatment where none existed before.

And. since I proposed my first budget four years ago, recommended spending on community mental health services in Delaware for adults and children has gone from \$6.9

million to \$17.2 million, an increase of 150 percent.

Now we must invest our confidence in these two professionals and allow them to do their work without interference, encouraging innovation in an area where until recently there was only expensive confusion.

* *

said in my Inaugural Address, let us meet the challenge of opening the eyes of an

entire generation of young Delawareans to the dangers of drug abuse.

By executive order last week, I charged Lieutenant Governor Wolf

responsibility for coordinating Delaware's efforts to combat drug and alcohol abuse.

For many of us who grew up in what seems like a simpler time, the problem of drug abuse, youth's fascination with chemicals which hurt and even kill, and the terrible violence of drug dealers are almost incomprehensible.

Yet we see harm being done, and we know the need to act is compelling. Today, drug abuse -- and its companion, alcohol abuse -- is a problem which touches thousands of Today, drug families. It commands the resources of half a dozen state agencies, and crosses state lines with lethal impunity once confined to deadly diseases. It wipes out young lives.

In his Inaugural Address, President Bush said:

"There are a few clear areas in which we as a society must rise up united and express our intolerance, and the most obvious now is drugs. And when that first cocaine was smuggled in on a ship, it may as well have been a deadly bacteria, so much has it hurt the body, the soul of our country. And there is much to be done and to be said, but take my word for it: This scourge will stop."

I have told the lieutenant governor that I want this Drug Abuse Coordinating Council

to tell us what we are accomplishing today, and what we need to do to accomplish more. For instance, in my recommended budget I have proposed new deputy attorneys general to help the Attorney General handle drug and alcohol cases. I have increased the budget of the medical examiner to provide additional forensic chemists to handle drug analysis.

All together, from increased law enforcement to better treatment programs in corrections, from increased funding for outpatient programs in the kids' department to new efforts in Health and Social Services, we are spending \$1.5 million on new programs.

But we need to know whether we are doing the right thing, and how we can make our efforts more effective. That will be the lieutenant governor's assignment.

At the same time, I want his help in expanding anti-drug programs in our schools, in carrying the message of "Above the Influence" to more Delawareans, and in developing new sources of funding for our efforts.

This scourge will indeed stop, and this budget is our down payment on a future free of drug and alcohol abuse.

In the next four years, I propose that we dedicate ourselves to giving this state the best and most effective set of laws protecting the environment and preserving our quality of life in the nation.

I believe that we must never lose sight of the fact that we are the stewards of Delaware's heritage, and that our stewardship must influence every decision we make.

I believe that we must be the conservationists for tomorrow's generation, passing down

Delaware's legacy to our children and grandchildren untarnished and whole.

And I believe that our choices and priorities must reflect long-term goals, must take into account long-term impacts, and must resolve conflicts between today's needs and tomorrow's needs in favor of the future.

The last four years have seen unparalleled progress in protecting the environment, preserving natural lands, and creating the means to preserve a way of life which has long set Delaware apart.

With our neighbors to the north, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, we are developing a long-range plan to protect and restore the estuary of the Delaware River and Bay.

We are using computers and common sense to develop new ways to identify endangered lands and manage our natural resources.

And Delaware has brought together the states of the region to begin tackling the

problem of ozone pollution.

Most of these efforts derive from Environmental Legacy, which has become part of our way of governing and making decisions. The recommendations of the Environmental Legacy report provided the foundation upon which our Quality of Life initiative was based. Our efforts to rebuild Delaware's beaches, and the major program of land acquisition begun last year — were recommendations of the Environmental Legacy report.

There is no undertaking of the past four years of which I am prouder, because in acting to preserve Delaware's natural legacy, we have demonstrated a full measure of

care for the future of our state and for the generations that will follow.

While the men and women who worked so hard on the Environmental Legacy program provided the impetus for the "Quality of Life" initiative, there can be no question that it took on a life of its own quickly as we set out to strengthen the ability of the counties to plan their futures and make intelligent zoning decisions.

Now, having created the legal framework for managed growth in our communities, we must

turn to other, related issues.

We need to address the question of impact fees, deciding how those who profit directly from growth can most fairly pay for its impact on the rest of us. When a new shopping center increases traffic on a local road, for instance, how can the developer most fairly be required to underwrite the cost of improving the road?

We need to explore ways the state can provide better information and better support to

the counties as they make zoning decisions. And, perhaps most important, we need to make sure that the Delaware Advisory Council on Developmental Impact lives up to its full potential. Few other concerns of government are more dependent on information, and DACDI today represents our best hope for intelligent and informed decisions as we manage future growth.

Against that backdrop of sweeping changes in our approach to the environment, I am proposing a fiscal 1990 budget almost \$7 million larger than my first Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control budget an increase of over 36 percent.

There are other issues addressed in my proposed budget, issues I can only touch on here:

o Funding for a new vice chancellor.

o Funding to develop, equip and train a statewide advanced life support system.

Funding to open Delaware's veterans' cemetery.

A recommendation that we increase the Delaware State Police by 20 troopers. demands require more troopers, especially if we are to continue to push forward with our highway safety program, and this increase in strength will allow us to increase the number of troopers on the road.

- o A 3.5 percent increase in state employee salaries on July 1st, 1989, plus 3 percent movement toward midpoint on January 1st, 1990. The average state salary will increase by 5.7 percent as a result.
- o Increased funding for scholarships, and for both operating costs and capital improvements at our colleges.
- o And fifteen new probation and parole officers in the Department of Correction, our commitment to making Delaware's nationally recognized SENTAC program a success. This will create 350 new slots for alternative sentencing of non-violent offenders.

There is another goal this state should adopt, and that is to invest fully in our infrastructure, and by doing so gain full use of the tremendous investment we have made in it already.

During the next fiscal year, I am recommending a capital improvement program of \$83.6 million. When you add in Transportation Trust Fund appropriations, total capital spending will be \$306.7 million.

This includes \$31.1 million from general funds.

All together, our capital improvement budget will increase by almost \$67 million, or

28 percent. This increase reflects a much greater financial commitment to our highways.

This spending plan will make it possible to complete a number of major projects, including the Public Building in Wilmington, the new Public Health lab, the Trades and Industry Building at DelTech in Georgetown, and the Department of Agriculture expansion.

In addition to the projects we are completing, we are also funding new projects in a variety of areas.

o $\check{\mathbf{I}}$ am proposing over \$15 million in public education projects in the bond bill. Recent years have seen a concerted effort to repair and renovate school buildings throughout the state. This budget will allow us to keep up as an increased number of students move through our system.

o To meet the needs of Delaware's higher education community, I am recommending capital spending of \$13.2 million for our colleges and university. Although many projects are included, two deserve special mention: We will begin planning for a new chemistry, biochemistry and marine science building at the University of Delaware, and we will finance the \$5.5 million library addition at Delaware State College.

o We will provide new office and classroom space for the Fire Commission in Kent

County.

o While the capital improvement needs of every state agency are being met, I want to emphasize the commitment we have made to the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control. I am recommending \$7 million for our on-going land acquisition program, and \$1 million for beach preservation and \$1.6 million for Superfund and clean-up of leaking underground storage tanks.

I am also recommending significant percentage increases in capital improvement funding for our human service agencies, including additional recreation space at Ferris School and funding which will allow us to bring the new Medical Examiner's lab nearly to

completion.

At the same time, I am recommending a basic change in our approach to the bond bill: As we complete the major, multi-year projects I have mentioned, I believe we should, as much as possible, adopt a policy of single-year funding.

The state's new prison and state police center in New Castle County, for which I am recommending \$3.3 million, is an obvious exception, but generally speaking, a project worth doing should be worth funding all at once.

I believe that, in the next dozen years, we can move toward the day when affordable housing is available for every working Delaware family. I believe, too, that we must ensure that shelter is available to every person in this state.

The images of America's homeless are commonplace: Street people stake out heat vents along the streets of the nation; working Americans are forced to sleep in cars because they cannot afford homes; families with small children must seek refuge in shelters where violence and drugs are a way of life.

Not since the civil rights movement has the image of injustice and broken lives been so at odds with the vision of America, or the resolve to help so strong.

Here in Delaware, we have focused considerable energy and funding on this problem. Since 1986, we more than doubled the Housing Development Fund, to \$19.5 million. In 1988 alone, we were able to assist 450 units of housing statewide with \$8 million in loans and grants. In just two years, we have supported over \$18 million in major construction projects in Bridgeville, Wilmington, and Dover, plus smaller projects in all three counties.

Today I am proposing an increase double the amount of last year's, adding 6 million to help provide decent housing for the next generation of Delawareans and provide more help to Delaware's homeless.

My concern in this effort is families, because today single parents with children or two parents with children increasingly figure among the homeless. In Delaware in 1988, 45 percent of the nearly 3,000 people who received emergency shelter were children

accompanying one or both parents.

Delaware's traditional approach toward the homeless has been one of close cooperation between the state and those agencies which provide shelter and assistance. organizations and private agencies do an extraordinary job of helping the homeless, and I am not recommending that the state set up or operate shelters and other facilities. Instead, we must continue to provide financial support for existing services.

Presently, state and federal funds for shelter and assistance total \$1.4 million, and I am recommending that the Housing Development Fund increase state support for challenge grants for new or expanded shelters and for rent deposits.

Our decision to create the Transportation Trust Fund reflected the need to create a permanent and reliable source of funding for Delaware's future transportation needs.

A strong economy has brought healthy growth to all parts of Delaware, and with it new challenges for our transportation system. Fortunately, the Department of Transportation has responded with energy, and today is meeting our transportation needs with a many faceted system.

o Improvements to the busy Concord Pike corridor are nearly finished.

o Commuter rail service has been restored between Wilmington and Philadelphia.

o An aggressive program of improvements has brought relief to the Newark/Metroform

o Armed with a comprehensive, county-wide study of traffic in Sussex County, we are moving forward in our efforts to bring relief to this part of the state -- including a increased emphasis on public transit.

o And we are studying the feasibility of an integrated transportation system for Kent County, one that could well include public transit as a viable option. In fact, we are taking a new look at public transit options statewide, emphasizing the need for

taking a new look at public transit options statewide, emphasizing the need for involvement of the private sector.

o And the US 13 Relief Route, a project over 25 years in the making, is now a reality. I should note that the planning and public information process surrounding that effort was extraordinary, and today serves as a model for other states.

In other words, Delaware is in the midst of the most ambitious transportation improvement program in state history.

To make this effort succeed, we must reinforce our commitment to Delaware's new Transportation Trust Fund. Two years ago, the General Assembly approved creation of the fund, pledging to our citizens that we will provide safe and convenient transportation statewide.

To continue those projects, we need to infuse additional capital into the Transportation Trust Fund to meet the short-term demands created as we shifted additional financial responsibilities to it. I am recommending that we add \$16 million in revenues to the fund -- half by continuing the transfer of motor vehicle registration

fees, half through a two-cent increase in the gasoline tax — to assure its continued viability and address Delaware's transportation needs in the coming year.

At the same time, we must increase the capacity of the Department of Transportation to plan and supervise this greatly expanded construction program. Since the troubled days of the 1970s, Transportation has borne more than its share of the burden of reducing state spending.

It is to Kermit Justice's credit -- and to the credit of the fine men and women of

DelDOT — that they have found ways to do more with less year after year. But the time has come to make the department whole, if only because the amount of work DelDOT will undertake in the coming years will be enormous. I am recommending that we increase its number of positions by seventy-five. With this step, which addresses needs that range from routine maintenance to on-site supervision of projects, from right-of-way acquisition to training new engineers, we will provide the department with the capacity to ensure good, safe transportation and intelligent planning.

Finally, we must set new goals for economic development, goals which will help us strengthen our commitment to existing businesses at the same time that we aggressively seek domestic and international corporations to call Delaware home. Certainly 1989 has gotten off to an encouraging start.

General Foods, one of Delaware's largest and most important employers, has decided to continue its Dover operation. The strong relationship between the company and the state, developed over a period of years, paid off. It was a happy moment for me when the chairman of General Foods called to tell me the decision, and one that our Development Office and the local community can share.

Meanwhile, Chrysler Corporation, long one of New Castle County's most valued employers, announced a second production shift. This boost to the economy is welcome, and it reflects the faith the automaker has in our community and in our workforce.

and it reflects the faith the automaker has in our community and in our workforce.

Let me tell you something. It was glitzy when we flew to Detroit to try to sell GM on Delaware for its Saturn plant — but don't think for a moment that we forgot about the businesses and industries that already employed Delawareans.

The GM plant we already have is the most important GM plant on my agenda, just as are the international chemical giants already in Wilmington are the overseas businesses I

most want to grow with us.

At a time when other states are losing manufacturing facilities, Delaware's manufacturing base is growing — because business executives know we have a good work force and good training programs, because they have confidence in our economy, and because they know the state is willing to work closely with them.

I have always believed that the best and most important economic development is that which encourages and supports the employers who are already part of the community, and the next year — the next four years — will see a rededicated effort to serve those employers effectively at the same time we are expanding our efforts to attract both domestic and foreign corporations to Delaware.

We have developed a reputation for working closely with the private sector. We have a skilled workforce, and our education system is responsive when employers need special training programs.

It isn't glamorous, but it works. It creates good new jobs to the state. And we're going to keep doing it.

Economic development isn't just factories and offices, however. A large percentage of our economy is devoted to agriculture, and I want to focus on the Delaware farm community today.

Two days ago we received a report from the Select Panel on the Future of Delaware Agriculture, chaired jointly by Secretary Chandler and Dr. Crossan. It is a brief, pithy account of agribusiness in the First State, and I urge all of you to study it carefully.

The members of the task force have given us a blueprint for the decisions we must make in years to come, a pragmatic discussion of the business of agriculture. Instead of evoking images of traditional American farms and the values they represent, the task force opted to remind us of the relationship between this vital business and our land and water. There's a tendency to assign agriculture to a category all its own, and to assume that those living the "simple" life on the farm don't face problems as complicated as our own In fact, the issues are identical, and the report demonstrates that.

My budget includes funding for new marketing efforts and an expanded alternative crop program, as the report recommends. But the real challenge to all of us, from Wilmington to Dagsboro, and from Newark to Rehoboth, is to be mindful of agriculture's concerns as we continue this debate about Delaware's the state of t

As I said earlier, I am recommending that we increase state spending by 7.9 percent in fiscal 1990. In fact, that is just about the average growth for the five budgets I have presented to you.

Despite that growth, we have reduced personal income taxes three times, cutting the effective tax rate for a family with an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 by over half. And we have eliminated any tax liability for approximately 40,000 Delawareans.

This tremendous real growth in funding for important programs has been made possible by an economy which has outperformed virtually the entire nation in recent years.

An economy that has kept unemployment in the 3 percent range.

An economy which has produced a dramatic increase in new jobs, with good salaries. Our per capital income grew 41 percent faster than the national rate between 1981 and 1987.

An economy which has helped us reduce our public assistance caseload by more than a third.

And central to the health of that economy has been our decision to reduce the individual tax burden whenever possible. Not only has this conscious tax policy helped control state spending, but it has sent a message to the business community that Delaware is a stable, well-managed state where initiative is encouraged, not taxed.

Today I am recommending another reduction in personal income taxes, one that will save taxpayers \$16.6 million in the coming fiscal year, and \$38.8 million in a full year.

In proposing this cut, I want to make a few comments about tax policy, because it may be the one area of government where there is still a resistance to making informed and intelligent decisions, where emotion and stagnant political philosophy often outweigh clear thinking.

In part, the blame lies with a handful of spendthrifts and naysayers who ignore the fact that five personal income tax reductions in less than a decade have helped make Delaware one of the most successful and prosperous states in the nation, people who

believe that the natural place for the state's hand in the taxpayer's pocket.

In fact, a dynamic and well-considered tax policy has made Delaware the state of choice for many employers, and the result has been tremendous job growth, tremendous income growth — and a dramatic increase in revenues to the state.

By spending less in the short term, we have been able to spend more in the long term, and today I can tell you that there is virtually no aspect of government where we have not seen greatly improved ability to provide services -- from housing to education, from services to transportation and welfare reform.

By reducing a heavy and unfair burden on individual taxpayers, we have given impetus

to an already growing economy, and helped ensure its continued health.

The tax cut proposal I am offering may well grow as our revenue estimate is refined later in the year, but for now I am suggesting reductions across the board, so that all income groups benefit. There are several important features to the proposal:

o Personal income taxes would be cut by an average of 8.1 percent.

Zero bracket would be increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000 and the number of brackets would be reduced from seven to five.

o Twenty thousand taxpayers would no longer be liable for taxes.

The top marginal rate would drop to 6.9 percent.

This proposal is well thought-out and fair, and it sends a signal to those who are considering Delaware for new or expanded business opportunities that we are still committed to an equitable tax policy.

The decision to support and enact this tax cut proposal is a decision for economic growth, for opportunities and prosperity for our citizens, and for a strong and effective state in years to come. I hope I will have your support on this important decision.

I said at the beginning that today I wanted to suggest some new goals for Delaware. As it happens, we are stopping to measure Delaware's progress and set our sights on new goals at a time when the great evolution of American government is unusually full of promise.

Today the states are re-emerging as a voice in the national debate about America's

future.

The revival of a true federal system, begun by President Reagan, promises to continue and flourish under the leadership of President Bush, who has already taken extraordinary steps to reassure the states and their governors — Republican and Democrat alike — that they will be encouraged to lead and that they will be listened to in the years to come.

For Delaware's part, we begin this year with reason to be proud of how far we have come, and with a clear sense of how far we must go.

Conservationists by nature, cautious in spending, committed to our neighborhoods and

communities, convinced that bipartisanship is the moving force of our state, we embark on the next four years with clear ideas of what must be accomplished if every Delawarean is to enjoy the prosperity so many enjoy now.

A healthy and growing economy has created new opportunities for our citizens, and for us opportunities to reach into communities to do good -- to do the right thing for Delaware and Delawareans.

Thank you.

Dear Senator Holloway,

I am writing to you with a plea for help from all of our legislators.

My Mother, 94 years old has been in nursing homes for three years. She has exhausted all of her funds by now and we applied for help. She has spend \$90,000.00 and we were told that her social security payment of \$665.00 plus her paying 31.90 in Medicare coverage is \$14.50 too much to qualify for Medicade help. I do not understand why the Medicare payment is added as income as it would cost the state less in medical help.

All they tell me is to send her to Smyrna Home. I found out it costs the state \$93.08 a day to keep a patient in Smyrna. Why won't the state pay for help in private nursing

homes that charge \$65.00 a day.

I can's believe that a state such as ours is the lowest in medicade help in the

nation. We should be ashamed.

I am physically unable to care for Mother and there is no one else and my income isn't good enough to pay the nursing home and live myself. To be honest I am really scared. If she has to go to Smyrna I surely won't be able to see her very much. Now I visit her twice a day here in Lewes.

Mother said she doesn't know why she's still living and sits and crys about what may

happen to her.

My Father (deceased) told me there was enough money to take care of Mother but who would have thought she would live to this ripe old age.

I beg the state of Delaware to give these poor old souls a decent life in there final years.

Though the letter was signed, the name of the writer was not mentioned in the record.

I am returning this Resolution without my signature for several reasons. Chief among them is my belief that the federal government needs a great deal of flexibility in dealing with the deficit which currently plagues the country. I reach no conclusion on the issue of whether or not motor fuel tax revenues should be utilized for transportation programs or overall deficit reduction. However, by signing this Resolution I might, in essence, be acting to deny the federal government the latitude it needs to respond to this crisis.

Secondly, and of equal importance, is the fact that this is more an expression of legislative intent rather than a formal statute or constitutional amendment. A statement of legislative opinion reflects a belief of the General Assembly on a certain issue and should not require approval or rejection by me. Inasmuch as I do not desire to frustrate this expression of legislative opinion by preventing its enactment, I have specifically elected not to exercise my powers of gubernatorial veto and simply return this Resolution without my signature so that your legislative expression remains of record.

As this is a resolution reflecting the opinion and wisdom of the General Assembly, I respect your belief and wish you well in expressing your views to the Delaware Congressional Delegation.

I appreciate the fact that after last Thursday's House session you and I were able to sit down and work out an arrangement which, I'm sure you will agree, meets your concerns and mine with respect to business reestablishment costs reimbursements. This letter sets forth the agreement as I understand it:

- Establish a new cap of \$22,500 on business reestablishment expenses by a new amendment to H. B. 152, which you would not oppose.
- 2. At the end of each of the next two years, DelDOT would sit down with you and the respective Chairmen of the House and Senate Committees on Transportation and go over the Department's experience with the new benefit and its limits. If the cap does not address the needs of businesses which must re-establish because we must purchase their existing property during those years, the Department will support new legislation which would address those needs.

I believe this letter sets forth the terms of our agreement. If not, please let me know as soon as possible. As my staff and I tried to make clear, the Department's overall program is in greater jeopardy as the State drifts away from the April 2 deadline.

Thank you once again for the opportunity to work out our differences to a mutually satisfactory conclusion on behalf of the State.

To the Members of the Senate of the 135th General Assembly

On April 27, 1989, I received Senate Bill 22, As Amended by House Amendment 1, which is entitled: "AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE AND APPROVE THE TRANSFER OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY IN INDIAN RIVER HUNDRED, KNOWN AS WARWICK SCHOOL NO. 203, TO VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS POST 10638."

This legislation was intended to transfer what is referred to as Warwick School No. 203 to the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post which currently occupies the premises. The building has long since been discontinued its operation as a school building and has been leased to the VFW Post as a meeting place. During the terms of the lease the Post has undertaken several renovations to make the building habitable for its purposes. Certainly without the hard work of the members of this VFW Post the building would have fallen into disrepair and would not be suitable for any purpose. Despite the best efforts of the VFW Post, I am unable to sign this legislation.

Transfers of this type are regulated by the provisions contained in Title 29, Chapter 94, which is entitled "Real Property Disposition". This Act was passed by the General Assembly and signed into law in 1983 to control transfers of State properties to other entitles and persons. Its provisions apply regardless of the amount of good works performed by the recipient. This legislation requires that a determination be made by the State Surplus Real Property Commission as to the status of the property sought to be transferred. Upon reaching this decision, a specific set of criteria govern the disposition of the parcel involved. None of those clear-cut procedures were followed in Warwick School was governed by a separate section of the Delaware Code relating to properties owned by school districts. However, since this parcel is owned by the Department of Public Instruction, an agency of the State, those provisions do not apply in this instance.

While not passing on the merits of the application of the VFW Post, I am vetoing this piece of legislation based on the failure to comply with the guidelines regulating these situations. Should the Post desire to pursue this matter further, their proper recourse is with the State Surplus Real Property Commission. This is, therefore, a purely technical veto, based on a failure to comply with controlling state law and regulations.

For the reasons stated above, I am returning Senate Bill 22 as Amended by House Amendment 1.

On April 27, 1989, I received Senate Bill 34, As Amended by House Amendment No 1, which is entitled: "AN ACT AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE SECRETARY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO TRANSFER TO THE TOWN OF SMYRNA APPROXIMATELY 35.504 ACRES OF LAND, MORE OR LESS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF UTILIZING IT FOR CURRENT RECREATION PURPOSES AND FURTHER WAIVING THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 137, CHAPTER 1, TITLE 17, DELAWARE CODE."

This legislation purported to transfer approximately 35 acres of land owned by the

Department of Transportation to the Town of Smyrna for use as a recreational area. The residents of the area currently enjoy the benefits of this property as it is leased to them and is being used as a baseball field and associated open spaces. The preservation of park land and other open spaces is an integral part of any town's development. However, I will not permit this transfer of property to occur for the reasons set forth

The lands in question were originally acquired by the Department of Transportation for use as a borrow pit. When the area ceased to serve that function, the Town was permitted to lease the land from the State for use as a baseball park. The Town and the Department of Transportation have, to my knowledge, cooperated for several years in making the necessary arrangements for the citizens of Smyrna and its surrounding communities to utilize these facilities. To date, I have seen no indication that this cordial and cooperative relationship will change. Nonetheless, the Town desires to own the entire area outright with the State retaining a right of reversion should the area be needed for highway purposes in the future.

My rationale for vetoing this proposal lies not in an objection to the transfer itself. I commend the Department of Transportation and the Town of Smyrna for working together for many years to the benefit of the area. Instead, my veto is based on the procedures utilized in accomplishing this transfer.

The bill purports to transfer the land in question by exempting it from the provisions of Title 17, Chapter 1 of the Delaware Code. This section of the Code speaks to the acquisition and sale of property acquired for highway purposes. The language of this section clearly indicates the effect to be given to the words contained therein. References such as "highway purposes", "highway facilities" and "service roads" indicate that the intent of this section is to regulate lands acquired for roadways, buildings and the like Borrow nits and similar facilities cannot be construed to be a "highway and the like. Borrow pits and similar facilities cannot be construed to be a "highway purpose". Nonetheless, assuming <u>arguendo</u> that such intent may be ascribed to these words, the procedures mandated to be followed in the disposition of such property were not followed in this instance. The Code clearly requires an appraisal of the lands be performed prior to its sale. This procedure was not followed in this instance. Thus, while I do not believe that this section controls the disposition of this parcel, even if it did, its requirements have not been complied with.

Instead, I am convinced that the proper procedures for disposition of parcels such as these lie in Title 29, Chapter 94 of the Delaware Code. This section, entitled "Real Property Disposition" establishes the criteria for transferring all State lands other than those acquired for Department of Transportation Right-of-Way purposes. Clearly the lands here in question were not acquired for right-of-way purposes. This section requires that a determination be made by the State Surplus Real Property Commission as to whether or not the lands are indeed surplus. After this determination is made, a rather specific set of criteria dictate the procedures to be followed for final disposition of the parcel in question. None of those procedures were followed in this matter. As a result, I have no alternative but to veto the instant legislation.

A veto of this legislation in no way indicates my opposition to the underlying transfer. Instead, I believe that the proper procedures were not followed and as a result the transfer may not proceed. I urge the citizens of the Town of Smyrna to pursue their goal by following the procedures set forth by the Real Property Disposition Act. This is, therefore, a purely technical veto, based on a failure to comply with controlling state laws and regulations.

For the reasons stated above, I am returning Senate Bill 34, As Amended by House Amendment No. 1.

Dear Senator Cordrey:

The Court of Chancery exercises a particular responsibility with respect to the administration of trusts in Delaware. For hundreds of years in the American and English law, trusts and trustees have been closely regulated by courts of equity. Therefore, the judges of Chancery do take particular notice of legislation designed to regulate trustees and are anxious to supply to the General Assembly such insight as our close familiarity with this subject affords.

The questions with which S.B. 177 deal have been reviewed for some time by the judges of this court. I should note, however, that Vice Chancellor Chandler, because of his very recent addition to the court, has not participated in the ongoing consideration of proposed changes to trust administration. It is my considered conclusion, and in this my colleagues agree, that S. B. 177 is an appropriate statute for enactment by the General Assembly. It provides certain flexibility, while containing appropriate safeguards and continuing to recognize in the Court of Chancery general supervisory power over trustees. We have given this matter a great deal of consideration (and indeed commissioned some rather lengthy studies which I am happy to share with you or

other interested members of the Assembly) before coming to this conclusion.

I do not go so far as to urge a particular course of action by the General Assembly; it is not, ordinarily, the place of a judge to do so in my opinion. However, believing as I do that S. B. 177 is consistent with the public good, I did wish to share that

opinion with you,

SA 1 to the Bill (sponsor: Senator Bair) was introduced and considered for adoption. The roll call vote on the Amendment was taken and revealed 17 Senators voting YES and 4 (Connor, Martin, Minner, Sharp) ABSENT; therefore, the Amendment was declared adopted.

The roll call vote on HJR 7 w SA 1 was then taken and revealed 19 Senators voting YES and 2 (Connor, Sharp) ABSENT; therefore, the Resolution was declared adopted by the Senate and returned to the House for consideration of the Senate Amendment.

Senators Minner and Martin marked PRESENT during the above roll call. SB 158 was lifted from the table for consideration on motion of Senator Cook and the roll call vote taken which revealed:

YES: Senators Adams, Bair, Bane, Cook, Cordrey, Hauge, Holloway, Knox, Martin, McDowell, Minner, Neal, J. Still, R. Still, Torbert, Vaughn, Venables - 17.

The roll call vote on <u>SB 176 w SA 1</u> was then taken and revealed 19 Senators voting YES and 2 (Connor, Sharp) ABSENT; therefore, the Bill was declared passed by the Senate and sent to the House for consideration.

At 2:59 p.m. on motion of Senator Cordrey, the Senate recessed for Party Caucus and reconvened at 4:18 p.m., Lt. Governor Wolf presiding.

SCR 61 was introduced and considered for adoption on motion of Senator Vaughn:

was declared adopted by the Senate and sent to the House for consideration.
