The most significant change in this budget was the elimination of \$33,000 from HB 12. The agency had requested \$43,500 and the item had been reduced to \$33,000 by the Governor. It was with some regret that this item was deleted, for it carried with it matching funds from the Federal Government for placing oyster shells on grounds that had been rendered useless by the MSX blight.

Between 1963 and 1965 the commission spent \$150,000 appropriated to it for rehabilitation of the oyster beds. Each year since 1958 there were expenditures of \$10,000 annually — a total of \$90,000 — for research conducted by the University of Delaware. The present budget asked for \$10,000 to continue this research, and this was approved.

In a letter from the University of Delaware, the acting director of Marine Laboratories states in relation to the shell fisheries program:

"The general results have been less than satisfactory. It is only within the past year that the causative agent for the oyster mortalities has been identified and its life cycle worked out."

And,

"The program has not received the attention it should have — The Marine Laboratories could do a much better job for the State of Delaware and its shell fisheries problems than we have up to now."

Since well over \$200,000 has been spent studying and planting oysters, the committee felt no further planting on a large scale should be done until research reports that the disease problem is understood and that replanting will bring about reseeding of the beds, with the promise of the rebuilding of the oyster industry. This conclusion is in line with the feeling of the private oyster industry, who are not spending their own money for restocking until they are assured of a probable return.

And, incidentally, we are informed by the University of Delaware that the researcher on this project left the employ of the commission and took his reports with him!

A second major item eliminated from this agency's budget is a request for appropriation of \$5,000 for boat repair. There are two reasons for not including this item in HB 137.

First, the captain of the boat told the Committee at the hearing that the boat was in good condition. He said he had no knowledge of faults but said if they (a Wilmington shipyard) say it needs a new bottom, "I don't know."

Second, SB 16, introduced by Senator Cook on February 14, seeks \$15,000 for repair of the same boat. It would seem improper to appropriate funds in two different ways for the same job. Salaries and wages of employees were reduced \$14,900, which will necessitate some adjustments in the staff. On this matter many points of view were expressed to the effect there is opportunity for much improvement in the efficiency of this agency and its personnel.

On the subject of revenues from leases of oyster lands, the executive secretary of the commission provided information indicating 14,102 acres of lands were under lease. The revenue collected in 1966 was 9,125.25 which is equivalent to 13,010 acres. This would indicate revenues on 1,092 acres or 7.8 per cent of the total went uncollected.

For these reasons, it was the Committee's judgment that additional funds should not be appropriated until the commission defines clearly the services to be rendered and prescribes specific procedures to be followed in carrying out the work to be done.

STATE TAX DEPARTMENT

The principal item deleted from this agency was \$11,000 for an attorney. We found that the Attorney General has been furnishing legal service to this agency. Thus, the agency has been able to transfer the \$11,000 and use it as a slush fund.

The \$25,000 slush fund that has been widely discussed had to be left in the budget since it is established by law. Legislation is before the General Assembly to abolish this fund.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

The budget requests for all health and welfare programs totaled \$22.5 million. The Governor pared this to \$18.5 million, a cut of approximately \$4 million or 18 per cent. Subsequent to the introduction of HB 12, the Governor adjusted his figure by letters to the Committee in the sums of \$210,200. It is interesting to note that in these adjustments the Delaware State Hospital and Governor Bacon Health Center suffered further cuts of \$60,000 and \$26,000 respectively. These amounted to cuts of 1.3 and 1.8 per cent.

HB 137 appropriates \$18.4 million for the total health and welfare program, only \$100,000 or 0.4 per cent below the Governor's recommendation. That figure is insignificant when one considers the 1.3 and 1.8 per cent cuts made in the two agencies.

Actually, these agencies are better off under HB 137 than under HB 12, or the present year's budget, for the line items greatly restricted management of the agencies. These agencies have experienced adjustments in personnel because of resignations and the difficulty of obtaining replacements. Many agencies informed the Committee that technical line item restrictions had proven detrimental to patient care. HB 137 eliminates many line items.

Of the \$40,000 reduction for mental health, \$25,800 came in such areas as supplies, travel and personal services. Service to the public need not be adversely affected.

In the case of rehabilitation agencies, much the same is true. The major reduction for the Board of Corrections, for example, was the \$10,000 sought for the purchase of farming equipment. We point out that this equipment was requested for use at an institution not yet in existence, and that there is considerable difference of opinion as to the advisability of inmates learning farm trades as opposed to industrial skills. Also, this is an item that might more properly be contained in the capital budget. Finally, some Democrats joined us in opposing this expenditure.

The agriculturally-oriented members of the committee strongly challenged the Department's intent to expand the dairy herd from Delcastle Farm to the new institution in Smyrna, saying "it would be cheaper to buy milk."

In the area of salaries, the reduction amounted to just \$2,000 out of \$1 million, hardly a significant change. Small reductions were made in other areas also — \$1,000 for personal services, \$2,000 for supplies, etc.

There is an interesting point raised in an amendment the Governor suggested to HB 12 on corrections. He sought an increase in the number of employees from 73 to 81 but reduced the appropriation by \$52,400. How does he propose to accomplish this?

In the case of the Youth Services Commission, HB 137 contains only \$1,500 less than HB 12.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

A petroleum prover was eliminated when members of the committee questioned the benefit the state would receive from this equipment. The need was not adequately explained to justify the expenditure at this time. This decision also eliminated the new position of a lab technician to operate this machine.

STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Governor's recommendations are largely reflected in HB 137.

Attention should be paid to a \$50,000 addition in this agency budget. That is the appropriation earmarked specifically for the painting of white lines on either edge of state roads, something safety officials recommend.

Salaries for uniformed state police were restored to the full request, more than allocated by the Governor. We consider it regrettable that the Governor reduced salaries in this area with the growing crime and public safety problem in the state.

Changes in the engineering division came in capital outlay, supplies and travel. Again, there is no reason this agency cannot do its job.

This agency presents another case where line items were reduced to give necessary flexibility of administration. The Committee was told by this agency that in the last five years 89 employees were hired and 90 were lost because of line item restrictions. The department, we were again informed, was forced to use outside consultants for lack of internal staff and this resulted in a cost $2\frac{1}{2}$ times that of having the work done internally.

On mosquito control, most of \$2 million appropriated to eradicate this pest has been spent. It is our view that operational costs should therefore be decreasing.

EDUCATION

The main thing here, of course, is the \$125 increase over the current unit allotment — \$100 more than that recommended by the Governor. We have previously made our position clear on this matter, which we consider to be essential to the well-being of our school children.

Further, we added one assistant supervisor and five instructors for driving education and a supervisor for industrial arts. The latter position has been sought since 1957. We also deleted Section 13, which took away needed flexibility from local school boards.

The Committee demonstrated its support for higher education also by adding an additional \$38,000 to Delaware State College for professors' salaries, which the Governor refused to recommend. It was felt that this addition was wise at this time in order for the college to maintain its accreditation level. Without the appropriation the level would have dropped from a "C" to a "D", which would adversely affect the educational status of the college and its graduating students.

Omitted from the education budget was a State Board request for a school plant engineer. The ommission was not one of questioning the need but rather a feeling that the scope of the job and the benefits to be gained were not adequately outlined. If anything, the Committee felt when such a job is created the position should be filled with a man of greater experience and higher qualifications then requested by the department.

The Governor mentioned the area of educational television. While this agency made a fine presentation, our position here is that we have not been able to find enough substantial support for this program to justify the amount of additional funds requested. We find that many persons do not even know of the program's existence and that some schools and teachers are not utilizing this tool.

The Committee felt there should be more positive public awareness and reaction to this service before increased appropriations are made.

It is interesting to note that the Governor reduced the ETV request by \$493,000, or 31 per cent.

The Governor also referred to a cut to the University of Delaware. We only point out that it was \$2,000 out of an \$8 million budget item!

Finally, mention should be made that our amendment to HB 137 restores the \$25,000 for the Delaware Higher Education and Vocational Loan Program inadvertently left out of the bill.

STATE CUSTODIAN

Comparing the current year's regular budget with HB 137, we find this agency receiving \$22,000 more. During fiscal year 1967 there were projects of a special nature that we understand to be nonrecurring. Therefore, the amount seems adequate. This office did not appear for a hearing, and if there is a genuine need for more money, they should articulate it.

STATE DISTRIBUTION AGENCY

The Governor cut almost \$50,000 here, 32 per cent of the requested appropriation. The amount in HB 137, however, is still \$5,100 over the adjusted 1967 budget total. Removed is the new position of assistant director of purchasing. It s anticipated that as in recent years a substantial amount of Federal funds will greatly add to the total.

PUBLIC ARCHIVES COMMISSION

The Committee is to this time unconvinced that this agency requires more funds.

STATE PARK COMMISSION

Here is an example of where the Committee saved the state money while at the same time actually improving the agency's ability to do its job.

The major item deleted was \$20,000 for the purchase of a beach sanitizer, a large machine to remove objectionable litter from beachlands. While such machines do perform a necessary task, the item was dropped because it would have been the third unit of its type to be purchased within a year.

Last year two beach sanitizers were purchased and delivered in mid- and late-summer. Since the oldest machine has been run only 57 hours and the other only six hours, it does not appear logical to purchase another until experience indicates the other two are performing to capacity. This agency does appear to function well, however, and the Committee increased overall salaries by \$7,000 over what the Governor recommended. As previously stated, we support separate legislation granting major salary increases for the positions of director and assistant director.

DEPARTMENTS OF ELECTIONS, KENT AND NEW CASTLE COUNTIES

In the case of Kent County, money to purchase two additional voting machines was deleted. We are informed that by moving a polling place the board will not require these machines.

In the case of New Castle County, it was our opinion that the agency sought more money than needed in an off-election year.

STATE PLANNING OFFICE — STATE BUDGET OFFICE

While the State Planning Office, a relatively new agency, certainly performs many essential services to state and local government, it was the feeling of the Committee that it was growing too fast. Thus, a very minor cut from HB 12 was made.

The Budget Office in HB 137 would receive \$18,000 more than in the current budget, an increase that would appear to be adequate.

STATE BOARD OF WELFARE

Here HB 137 and HB 12 are almost identical. Nothing was changed to affect the program, and the total is just \$3,000 down out of a total of \$4 million.

GAS TAX REFUNDS

This change was made to ensure a proper accounting of the way agencies are spending money. Under the present system agencies are appropriated money to pay the tax and receive tax refunds but never account for how the money is spent.

Mr. Bartleson asked for consideration of HA 1 to HB 137. Mr. Slawik and Mr. Zimmerman expressed desires to ask questions of Mr. Hering. Mr. Bartleson yielded his motion. After much discussion, HA 1 to HB 137 was given a Roll Call vote:

HB 160 — An Act to amend Sections 2101, 2126, 2127, 2322, 2323, 2324, 2325, 2326, 2330, 2332, 2348, 2350 and 2373, Title 19, Delaware Code relating to Workmen's Compensation by providing qualifications for board members, by providing for attorney's fee for an injured employee, by establishing a maximum amount and time for medical payments, by making medical reports available to both parties, by providing standards for changing physicians, by establishing a healing period and temporary total disability, by providing for permanent total disability, by permitting partial disability compensation in addition to the healing period, by providing permanent partial disability payments in certain schedule injuries after the healing period, by providing increases in maximum benefits, by providing payment of schedule injury awards to beneficiary after death of an employee for other causes, by providing for specific findings on evidence to be included in the board's award, by providing for superior court review of the board's findings and by providing for a discretionary order of the board for a self-insurer to deposit in trust the amount of any award.

Introduced by Rep. Cicione. Referred to the Committee on Labor.

Mr. Hale moved to adjourn. Motion carried. House adjourned at 6:40 P.M.

22ND LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Speaker called the House to order at 1:49 P.M., on May 18, 1967.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend William H. Miller.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

Messrs Hart and Ferguson asked to be marked present.

A messenger from the Senate delivered SB 39 and SB 101 having passed the Senate and asking concurrence of the House.

HS 1 for HB 135 — An Act to amend Title 9, Chapter 81, Delaware Code by providing for the taxation by New Castle County of certain mobile homes and by modifying Section 2, Chapter 275, Volume 55, Laws of Delaware, by the addition thereto of Section 1939, excluding New Castle County from its provision. Introduced by Rep. Pagano. Referred to the Committee on Revenue and Taxation.

HJR 3 — Establishing a Committee to make a thorough, unrestricted, long-range investigation into State finances. Introduced by Reps. Hart, Dodge, Hering, Benson, Hale, Murphy, and Quillen. Mr. Hart read a statement and moved to accept HJR 3 by voice vote.

STATEMENT BY REP. WILLIAM F. HART, R-NEWARK TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Upon assuming office, Governor Terry sounded a fiscal alarm. He said: "If we continue our current trends into fiscal year 1967, we will become painfully aware that we have been planning our budgets on nonrecurring sources of income."

We are about to enter fiscal 1968, and the Governor is still planning his budget on "nonrecurring sources of income." This administration has coasted along on windfall revenues, spending the divestiture funds when it found politicallyappealing "crash" programs, using interest from that fund to help reduce budget deficits, and relying on inheritance and estate tax receipts to stay in the black. His latest budget, for example, is \$7 million out of balance. Over the past six years the state has received \$27 million in abnormal inheritance and estate taxes.

This has been the easy way out. It is also the irresponsible way out, and the Governor knows well — he has forecast a tax increase by the next governor — that the day will soon come when these facts must be squarely faced. His intention is to postpone that day until after the 1968 elections.

In recent months, some of us have spent a large amount of time attempting to analyze the state's financial position. We discovered that the information does not exist upon which to base well-informed decisions in the area of state finance.

In 1965 the Governor did appoint a committee to study revenues. This committee was composed of capable people. But it was severely restricted by time and by the Governor's mandate and therefore did only a very limited, although creditable, job.

I believe that information such as the following is essential for the General Assembly, and the Governor, to make intelligent decisions about taxation, spending, and the like:

- 1. Reform spending. We need an evaluation of our present programs and expenditures to tell us how we are doing and how we can do better.
- 2. Collection. We need an evaluation of our revenuecollection process to tell us whether we are collecting efficiently.
- 3. Revenue projection. We need an educated look, based upon such factors as population increase and economic growth, at our revenues in the next 10 years.
- 4. Revenue structure. We need an evaluation of our present tax structure, where it is fair and unfair, where we have reached the limit and where we can increase if necessary.
- 5. Comparisons. We need updated comparisons on other states and their experience.
- 6. Federal grants. We need a determination of the impact of federal grants on our state finances.
- 7. Borrowing and debt. We need an evaluation of state borrowing policies and state debt and their effect upon our budget and credit.
- 8. Capital Investment Fund. We need suggestions on how to best utilize this large source of windfall revenue.

These are the types of information we need, and I feel it should come from economists, labor leaders, leaders of commerce, and so forth, not high school mathematics teachers. In order to provide a mechanism to obtain this and other related information, I propose the creation of a 15 member committee of outstanding and qualified citizens. Such a committee would be given a free hand to delve into these matters without restriction and would be asked to report back to the Governor and the General Assembly.

I propose in this joint resolution, that the Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tem of the Senate each name four members and that the Governor name five, one of them the chairman. The chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation and Senate Finance committees would be automatic appointments. The Committee would be as closely balanced politically as possible.

Basically, this committee's function would be to provide information and make recommendations on such questions as whether taxes will have to be increased, whether our debt policies must be changed, whether we can become more efficient and avoid increased taxes while still improving our programs, and so forth.

It could be that with sufficient economic growth in the state, and with reform spending and better collections, a major revenue increase would not be necessary. But we will never know until we have the basic information. Neither will the governor.

This resolution would give the committee one year from the date of its organization. This should allow a much more comprehensive job than the two-month study of 1965.

Some of the information may exist today. Some may be in the preparation stage already. But even when this is the case, the committee can pull it all together and get an overall look.

Several of us have discussed this matter for a long time. We have finally decided it is time to act and therefore this resolution is presented. I hope it will go to the committee briefly and then receive approval from both sides of the aisle.

Due to objection from the floor, HJR 3 was placed in the Revenue & Taxation Committee.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly.

The Governor's Message to the House and Senate in Joint Session, May 23, 1967, 2:00 P.M.

The Governor said he had no prepared talk but wanted to speak to us as good substantial citizens. Last year he recommended to the Budget—raise in salaries which were not granted. So he prepared a bill to include salaries above the budget figures. The Legislature passed the bill. This year, he made further recommendations which were not granted.

Now, two of our top men have left their positions. The salaries being contributive factors in their leaving, the Superintendent of Schools and the State Planner. There are some School Districts paying \$25,000 — the Superintendent gets \$20,000. The Superintendent of Wilmington Schools gets \$27,000.

We will be hard pressed to get a Superintendent of Schools like Mr. Gousha.

Mr. Bivens was a dedicated and able man. The Governor recommended a \$1,000 increase for him—which was denied.

"If we want to bask in the Sunshine of Greatness—this State cannot be small—cannot belittle," the Governor said.

Recently in Washington, the Governor talked to the President of Washington & Lee University over a cup of coffee. He asked him if he knew any man he could recommend for our Superintendent of Schools. He knew of two such men—one from Pittsburgh—one from Richmond. One makes \$30,000 a year—one makes \$40,000 a year.

The Governor also talked to the President of the University of Tennessee. He said the same thing. He proposed a range of \$25,000 to \$30,000. So Governor Terry proposes salaries of minimum and maximum figures as follows:—

Superintendent of the State Board of Education, Executive Secretary of the State Board of Health, and the Commissioner of Mental Health—a range of \$24,000 to \$30,000. Director of Planning Department, Budget Director and Director of the State Board of Welfare—a range of \$17,500 to \$25,000. Director of Water & Air Resources and Director of Personnel—\$17,500 to \$22,500. The State Archives Director— \$12,000 to \$16,000.

"We must do something now—we cannot wait," the Governor said. The Governor cannot talk to people for these jobs until he has a salary to offer. He has a bill which will be distributed today.

Mr. Bivens leaves July 15th, Mr. Gousha leaves July 1st.

The Governor then quoted from an Editorial from the Journal Every Evening of May 22, 1967, as regards to "Line Item". He took personal affrontery to the editorial.

The Governor asked us to join with him and help raise these salaries since House Bill 137 was defeated in the Senate. He is requesting a group to have lunch with him on Friday, May 26th at 1:00 P.M. in the Governor's suite to try to reach an agreement on a bill.

My dear Mrs. Heckert:

I would like to express for you and the Members of the Health and Welfare Committee of the House my personal opinion on HB No. 166 which amends Section 122, Title 16, and adds the responsibility to regulate fluoridation of water supplies to the powers and duties of the State Board of Health. This Bill, if enacted, should enable the State Board of Health to extend the fluoridation process to those public water supplies which serve significant numbers of children. The State Board of Health has for many years been on record as favoring fluoridation to reduce the dental caries problem in the children of our State. Fluoridation is a well established and proven procedure and will reduce dental caries by approximately two-thirds in those children to whom it is furnished. Controls to assure proper fluoridation techniques in public water supplies have already been established by the State Board of Health.

It has been the position of the Republican legislators from the start of the budget discussion that we would always be willing to consider a later, supplemental amendment to the budget bill.

Now that HB 137, as amended, has been passed by both houses of the General Assembly, I would like to state this position once again.

We realize that no budget is ever perfect. Every budget requires some changes after it is approved. The following messages from the Governor were read: To the House of Representatives of the 124th

General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On July 6, 1967, I received House Bill No. 261, entitled: "An Act to Amend Section 2832, Title 31, Delaware Code, By Providing that the State of Delaware Shall Pay the Cost of the Operation and Maintenance of the Delaware Home and Hospital for the Chronically III and the Care and Support of its Inmates."

I respectfully return House Bill 261 without my approval for the reason that it is not accompanied by a revenue raising measure to pay for the increased cost to the State if enacted into law.

Undoubtedly House Bill 173 as amended was designed to provide the source of funds from which this increased cost could be met. However, that bill received my disapproval. It is necessary, therefore, to reject House Bill No. 261 since it reached my desk without any companion revenue raising bill.

Let me make it perfectly clear that I have no objection to the State assuming the responsibility of the cost of the operation and maintenance of the Home and Hospital at Smyrna.

To the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On July 6, 1967, I received House Bill No. 22 with House Amendments 3 and 4, entitled:

"An Act to Amend Sections 2151, Title 21, Delaware Code, Relating to Motor Vehicle Registration Fees."

I respectfully return House Bill No. 22, as amended by House Amendment No. 3 and House Amendment No. 4 without my approval.

It is evident that a reduction in automobile registration fees is something that is generally favored not only by most members of the General Assembly, but also by me.

On at least three different occasions, I have voiced my approval of a general reduction in registration fees through a return to the method of classification by weight as was effective in Delaware until the law was changed two years ago. It is my view that the state can return to the old weight classification, so that cars under 4,000 pounds would be licensed for \$15 and cars over 4,000 pounds at a rate of \$21, thus effecting a straight \$5 across the board increase.

While even such a minor reduction in revenue has serious overtones, it is within the budgetary projections I have made over the next two years and can be absorbed especially since we have had a phenomenal growth in total motor vehicle registrations.

House Bill 22 as amended, however, appears to have serious defects that do not, in my judgment, reflect the true intent of members of the General Assembly. Two of them are as follows: 1. House Bill 22 as amended would lower the registration rate for all buses to \$24. Many such vehicles now pay substantially more than that without complaint. Delaware now licenses a total of 1,179 buses which pay a total of \$230,-627.20 in registration fees. Under House Bill 22, they would pay only \$26,520, meaning a reduction of state revenue of \$204,107.20 which is unnecessary and, in my opinion, not intended by members of the General Assembly.

2. It is the opinion of attorneys working with me that in Section 4 of House Bill 22 as amended, the General Assembly has eliminated the station wagon registration altogether, which would mean that new tags and new numbers would have to be issued for every station wagon in the state to replace the PC tag under which they are now licensed.

Furthermore, House Bill 22 as amended has shortcomings in two other respects.

1. It would increase the cost of registering trucks in the state. This is a questionable change at this time because _ Delaware now registers a substantial number of out-of-state trucks which produce a considerable income for our general fund. There is belief on the part of experts in the trucking industry that to disturb the current rate would cause some firms to look to other states for the licensing of their truck fleets, and Delaware would bear the loss in revenue.

2. House Bill 22 as amended provides no appropriation for the Motor Vehicle Department. It is the estimate of the Commissioner that to administer the act he would need at least 15 additional employees and an increased appropriation of \$60,600. If Delaware is to go to a complicated weight formula for the registration of its motor vehicles, we would want it administered fairly and impartially. This could not be done within the current employee and budgetary limitations of the Motor Vehicle Commissioner.

For these reasons, I am returning House Bill 22 with House Amendments 3 and 4 without my approval. I hope members of the House will support the legislation being introduced today, I referred to earlier, so that the matter can be settled once and for all. It should be obvious to anyone having knowledge of the defects in House Bill 22 that I am compelled to return it without my signature.

On July 6, 1967, I received House Bill No. 173 as amended by House Amendment No. 1, entitled:

"An Act to Amend Section 361 (a), Title 8, Delaware Code, Relating to Annual Corporate Report Fees." I respectfully return House Bill No. 173, as amended by House Amendment No. 1 to the House of Representatives without my approval because it is unconstitutional.

Examination of this measure disclosed the absence of an enacting clause requiring the concurrence of two-thirds of the memebrs of each House of the General Assembly as required by Article IX, §1 of the Constitution of Delaware. Moreover, the bill did not receive the affirmative vote of more than a simple majority in each House.

In support of my conclusion is the attached Opinion of the Justices of the Supreme Court in response to my letter of July 5, 1967.

I am compelled, therefore, because of the failure of this bill to satisfy the constitutional requirement, to disapprove it.

THE SUPREME COURT OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE Opinion of the Justices of the Supreme Court in Response to

a Question Propounded by the Governor of Delaware.

To His Excellency Charles L. Terry, Jr.

Governor of Delaware.

Reference is made to your letter of July 5, 1967 addressed to the Chief Justice requesting the opinion of the members of the Supreme Court upon the constitutional enactment of House Bill No. 173, as amended by House Amendment No. 1, of the 12t5h General Assembly.

The precise question upon which you have requested our opinion reads as follows:

"Has House Bill No. 173 as amended by House Amendment No. 1 been constitutionally enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Delaware?"

You have submitted to us a copy of House Bill No. 137 as amended. This bill is an amendment of 8 Del.C., \S 361(a) and, as such, an amendment of the General Corporation Law of the State. Art. IX, \S 1 of the Constitution provides:

"No General Incorporation Law, nor any special act of incorporation, shall be enacted without the concurrence of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House of the General Assembly."

The State of Delaware is committed to the rule of law known as the Enrolled Bill Doctrine, the effect of which is to prevent a court, in the consideration of the constitutionality of the enactment of any piece of legislation, from going back of the enrolled bill and considering any matter which took place in the General Assembly prior to the final passage of the bill. State v. Schorr, 11 Terry 365, 131 A.2d 158. As a matter of fact, the application of the doctrine is constitutionally required in this State. This results from an amendment to Art. II, \$10 of the Constitution adopted to invalidate the decision in Rash v. Allen, 1 Boyce 444, 76 A. 730, which had adopted the Journal Entry Doctrine as opposed to the Enrolled Bill Doctrine.

We understand that this bill, while it has passed both Houses of the General Assembly, has not as yet received your approval. Nevertheless, we will consider the question as though it had in fact received your approval. This assumption requires the application of the Enrolled Bill Doctrine.

The actual draft of the bill submitted to you for approval or disapproval recites in the enacting clause as follows:

"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Delaware."

By long-established custom, the General Assembly has invariably included in the enacting clauses of proposed legislation a statement to the effect that the bill has received the concurrence of a constitutionally required majority when such a requirement exists. A presumption, therefore, arises from the failure to recite such a concurrence that the bill did not receive more than a simple majority of each House. The application of the Enrolled Bill Doctrine requires the application of such presumption in this case.

We understand the fact to be that House Bill No. 173 did not receive the affirmative vote of more than a simple majority in each House; but such information may not be considered in view of the prohibition required by the Enrolled Bill Doctrine against going behind the face of the bill, itself. The fact must be presumed, however, in view of the failure to recite in the enacting clause the concurrence of more than a simple majority of members, that House Bill No. 173 received only a simple majority concurrence.

The point, therefore, becomes whether or not an amendment of the General Corporation Law of the State may be made by the affirmative vote of a bare majority of the members of both Houses of the General Assembly, or whether, to make such an amendment, a larger majority of all members of each House is required.

Article IX, § 1 of the Constitution prohibits the enactment of any General Incorporation Law or any special act of incorporation without the concurrence of two-thirds of all of the members elected to each House of the General Assembly. House Bill No. 173 as amended is, of course, a purported amendment of the General Corporation Law of the State.

The same constitutional requirement as to affirmative vote in the General Assembly for passage of a General Corporation Law is likewise required for amendment of that law. State v. Emerson, 1 Terry 328, 10 A.2d 515. It follows, therefore, that in the absence of the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of each House of the General Assembly, House Bill No. 173, as amended, has failed to receive the constitutionally required majority and, therefore, is an invalid enactment by the General Assembly.

The answer to the question stated above is, therefore, in the negative.

41ST LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Speaker called the House to order at 10:20 A.M., on Friday, August 4, 1967.

There was a prayer by Representative Everette Hale.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

Rep. Hale moved the House recess for a Joint Session in the Senate Chamber to hear an address by the Governor and reconvene in the House at 1:30 P.M. Motion carried. House recessed at 10:25 A.M.

JOINT SESSION

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives. Lieutenant Governor Tribbett invited the Speaker of the House to a seat on the rostrum.

The House and Senate met in the Senate Chamber for Joint Session at 10:36 A.M. Senator Cook moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Senator Cook moved that the President of the Senate preside over the Joint Session. Motion prevailed. Senator Cook moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Assistant Chief Clerk of the House act as Secretaries of the Joint Session. Motion carried.

The Chair appointed the following committee to escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber: Senator Manning and Representative Gooding. The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the Senate Chamber.

The President invited the Governor to the Rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Thank you for convening here today.

I apologize for the necessity asking you to come, but in my opinion and in the self-evident point of view of thousands of Delawareans the necessity exists.

I have endeavored to schedule your session today so as to interfere with your week end plans as little as possible.

Last Friday night the City of Wilmington was shaken by a series of incidents with which we are all familiar.

Thanks to the good work of the City administration, and of Wilmington and State Police the ill effects of that outbreak were held to a minimum.

No one was seriously injured and the wanton looting that was characteristic of mob behavior in many other cities of the Nation did not develop in strength.

Since Friday night we have enjoyed a breathing spell in Delaware, and there have been no serious incidents. But the potentiality of trouble and the rumors of violence hang over our heads as ugly threats which we cannot in conscience ignore.

The decent, respectable people of Delaware—white and Negro alike, I am not referring to race in these remarks must have reasonable assurance that they may conduct their affairs during the day and rest secure in their homes at night without having to live with the underlying fear that accompanies civil disorder and lawless disregard of the rights and property of others. Because of the threats, the rumors, the information reaching me—both rumored and reliable—I have believed it necessary during the past week to keep the State Guard under alerted conditions and to keep more men on duty than would normally be necessary.

There are some who say that the situation has eased entirely and that we can afford to relax. Those people can afford the luxury of relaxation but the people who live where the threat exists and the people who have the responsibility for maintaining law and order—such as the Governor, the Attorney General and members of the General Assembly cannot ignore nor overlook any possible threat of violence or disorder.

We must be prepared to cope with it and that constitutes the reason I have asked you to come to Dover today.

Shortly there will be submitted for your examination and consideration three bills which I believe will give the Governor, Attorney General, police and judiciary powers that they need if we are to contain violence before it has an opportunity to break out in an uncontrollable surge, such as happened in Newark, Detroit, Plainfield, Milwaukee and numerous other communities.

The bills would:

-Give the Governor authority to declare a state of emergency.

-Outlaw possession and use of firebombs and Molotov cocktails, instruments of destruction that serve no useful purpose.

Provide a mandatory three year jail sentence without proabtion or parole for those convicted of malicious destruction of property during the state of emergency.

Give the Governor authority to impose curfews and related regulatory protections either on a statewide basis or in specific areas of the State.

The measures are, in my estimation, a minimum of what is needed to deal with the critical situation that exists and that may continue to exist for sometime to come. We must be prepared to deal effectively with force against the laws of this state and the safety of our citizens.

The Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau is on hand to explain any of its provisions that might be under question. He will be glad to meet with Legislators on the floor of their respective Houses or in caucuses with either or both of the political parties represented in the Legislature. August 4, 1967

Address by the Honorable Charles L. Terry, Jr.

to a Joint Session of the 124th General Assembly

The previously named Committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber. Senator Cook moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Assistant Chief Clerk of the House compare their respective Journals.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Assistant Chief Clerk of the House compared their Journals and found them to agree, and so notified the President.

Senator Cook moved the two Houses now separate to re-convene in their respective chambers. Motion prevailed. Joint Session adjourned at 10:55 A.M.

The House reconvened at 2:56 P.M.

Mr. Speaker Hering asked if there were any additions or – corrections to the Minutes of the previous legislative day (July 18, 1967). There being none, the Minutes were approved as posted.

The following resolution was introduced:

HJR 5 — Establishing a Committee to make an Immediate, Viogrous, and Comprehensive Examination of the Basic Underlying Problems Causing Civil Unrest.

WHEREAS, recent events in certain areas of the State illustrate the potential for wide spread civil disorder; and

WHEREAS, action to be taken today will strengthen the criminal statutes to help deter such disorders but do not eliminate the basic causes of such; and

WHEREAS, there exists within certain communities of the State wide spread unemployment, poverty and lack of adequate housing, recreation and educational opportunities; and

WHEREAS, positive and constructive proposals to solve these problems are necessary and of prime importance to the welfare of all citizens;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Governor of the State of Delaware is hereby empowered and requested to appoint immediately a committee which shall include representatives of business, local government, religious and educational groups and organized laobr, plus individuals from the neighborhoods most directly involved. This Committee shall also include two members of the House of Representatives as appointed by the Speaker of the House and two members of the Senate as appointed by the President Pro Tem of the Senate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Committee shall immediately undertake a vigorous and comprehensive examination of the basic underlying problems causing the civil unrest and report back to the Governor and the General Assembly within sixty (60) days of its formation with recommendations for action that the State Government can take to solve these problems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the sum of \$10,000 be appropriated from the General Fund to the Governor for the use of this Committee in carrying out its responsibilities. Introduced by Reps. Hering, Zimmerman and Evans. Mr. Hale moved for suspension of rules to act on HJR 5. Rules suspended by voice vote. Roll Call was then taken and revealed:

State House, Dover, Del.

Recent civil disorders in many cities throughout the country have gained marked public attention in Delaware. The General Assembly has been called into special session on August 4 to consider means of coping with the problem of potential mass crime and violence in our state.

Correctional Council of Delaware wishes to commend Gov. Charles L. Terry, Jr., for his forthright plans to prevent and contain such potential disorders in Delaware.

It is recommended that the General Assembly give close attention to the governor's recommendations. Civil disorder, looting and violence cannot be tolerated. Respect for law and order must be preserved. Particular attention must be given to existing statutes and proposed changes in our Criminal Code to ensure adequate protection of the public from crime, both now and in the future.

What we say does not imply support for a mandatory sentence, which does not allow for consideration of the extent of participation in the crime or the individual characteristics of the offended.

We urge that parole eligibility not be removed from sentences given to participants in riots if they occur. Such unthinking and irresponsible behavior cannot be corrected by the rioters being isolated from virtually all responsibility in our prisons and then returned to society without the guidance and restraints which good parole provides. Parole, when properly administered, has proven to be one of the best means of turning irresponsible offenders into responsible and lawabiding citizens.
