

Mayor Heads Monday Session After Recovery From Illness

Norma Handloff Expresses Appreciation For Efforts Of Deputy Mayor Mayer, Council In Conducting City Business Over Seven Week Period; Three Laws Passed

Mayor Norma B. Handloff, presiding at the council table last Monday night after an absence of some seven weeks due to illness, convalescence, and last week's trip to the New Orleans Congress of Cities, expressed her appreciation to Deputy Mayor Arthur P. Mayer and other members of Newark City Council for their transaction of municipal business during the period of her disability, and publicly thanked all of her well-wishers.

With but one person remaining from an audience that had numbered as high as four, Monday's meeting was adjourned at the 10:30 p.m. deadline after passage of three ordinances, the preliminary reading of two more; a 50 per cent adjustment on Albert Martia's appeal for tax relief with assessment of his Park Place Apartments, and a discussion of raising the city manager's salary.

Spinning Wheels

Racing and the spinning of wheels is prohibited with the passage of an ordinance levying a fine from \$25 to \$200 for offenders.

Parking is prohibited at all times on the east side of South College Avenue for a distance 210 ft. south of Main Street, from Delaware Avenue 330 ft. south, from a point opposite Kent Way south to the city limits, and on the west side from Main Street 75 ft. south, and from Delaware Avenue south to the city line.

No parking is permitted on the east side of Academy Street from Delaware to Lovett avenues between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday thru Friday, and parking in front of the police station is limited to police vehicles only.

Stop signs are to be installed on Cheltenham Road and Syphard Drive at Hillside Road, on Panorama Drive at Nottingham Road, and on Ash Avenue at Woodland Avenue.

A third ordinance established a Jan. 1 through Dec. 31, fiscal year for the city.

Proposed ordinances to revise police salary grades and establish plumbing fees were approved at first readings, with final hearings scheduled for Jan. 15.

Appel Settlement

City Solicitor Clyde M. England, Jr., recommended that the appeal of Albert Martia for relief with the \$105,000 assessment and \$662.50 tax bill for his Park Place Apartments be settled by paying a 50 per cent adjustment. Martia had obtained a writ from Superior Court directing review of council's denial of Martia's appeal, and England said that with valid points possessed by both sides, a middle-of-the-road ruling was probable.

Councilman William E. Coverdale and William E. Farnacht pointed out that proposed settlement of the Martia appeal would "open the door" for other cases, and Coverdale said he "thought when we hired professional appraisers, we would avoid things like this." He added that he did not "like to see anyone on the basis of threat of court action, push this thing through."

England said that proposed adjustment would not establish a precedent for other tax appeals, and Mayor Handloff reported that she had "served on juries in which civil suits were settled by splitting the difference."

A 50 per cent reduction of the Martia assessment was approved in a 3-2 vote over opposition by Coverdale and Councilman Otis R. Thomas.

City Manager's Salary

Concerning omission of the city manager's salary as a specific item in the 1969 municipal budget, Councilman Mayer proposed that a figure of \$16,500 be included, covering a \$500 merit increase effective Jan. 1, 1969. Finance Director Albert K. Martin said that while the city manager's salary had been omitted in the breakdown of the budget, \$17,000 had been included in the total to cover this salary contingency.

Councilman John H. Farnacht proposed a seven per cent raise for the city manager for a 1969 salary of \$17,200 "based on the national economy."

Thomas objected to continued expansion of "salary range" because it is completely unfair to persons who have held these jobs in recent years," and Farnacht replied that the "past has nothing to do with future salaries."

American Legion Honors

Brophy Of County Police

The American Legion has undertaken a program in support of law and order and in initial action, New Castle County Police Director William J. Brophy addressed the American Legion at Newark on Dec. 6.

Brophy was requested to place demands upon the Legion for aid and action to promote law and order in New Castle County.

District Commander Don Nell presented Brophy with an award as Law Man of the Year.

Learn To Swim Classes Offered To Fourth Graders

Newark School District Arranges Swim Lessons For Gym Period At YWCA

All fourth grade pupils in the Newark school district are given swimming lessons this year at the Newark YWCA. Each child will receive 10 lessons, one each week, consecutively.

Buses have been provided from school and back during swim gym periods, and fourth graders will be accompanied by their physical education teachers.

Each child is required to supply own bathing suit and towel, and each girl must have a bathing cap. Caps may be purchased at the YWCA.

The pupils spend one hour at the YWCA, with a half-hour swimming lesson conducted by certified Red Cross water safety instructors, and a half-hour gym period with their regular physical education teachers.

This program is completely financed by the Newark special school district and there is no charge to students.

"The objective of the Newark school swimming program is to help every fourth grade learn to swim. 'Training in water safety is essential for the protection of every child,' Dr. John E. Allen, assistant superintendent of schools said.

"Incidentally, a person who does not swim is not thereby protected from drowning; many of the people who drown simply fall into the water. Each year between 6,500 and 7,000 Americans drown."

Allen continued in an explanation of why Newark was beginning a swimming program.

"One in every 15 fatal accidents is a drowning, making this the fourth leading cause of accidental death," he added.

"To teach a youngster to swim without an appreciation for some of the basic safety factors related to an aquatic environment is comparable to teaching a person to drive without respect for rules of the road."

"In the interest of maximum safety, this program includes activities designed to develop positive attitudes toward safety," Allen concluded.

Police To Combat Holiday Drinking For Driver Safety

Chief Pledges All-Out Effort To Reduce Danger From Highway Accidents

Newark Chief of Police Arthur S. Haussler has pledged the full efforts of his department to hold down holiday traffic problems.

"We'll not win popularity contests," Chief Haussler commented, "but we'll be out with all the manpower we can muster to protect those who can't seem to say 'no thanks' during the holidays."

The chief cited alcohol as the major holiday driving problem.

"Recent research gives new evidence of the part alcohol plays in traffic mishaps," he said. "It is suspected that alcohol is a factor in as many as half of the traffic accidents."

"We know," he continued, "that people get caught up in a complex form of this time of year — school and church entertainment — last minute rushes — parties — heavier than usual drinking — and all kinds of pressures."

A person subjected to such stress, according to the chief, is less able to cope with the normal, everyday problems of staying safe — whether walking or driving, and especially when roads are slick and glazed by adverse weather.

For those who think they dare overdo at parties and then slide behind the wheel of a car thinking, "I can get away with this time," Chief Haussler has this terse warning:

"Watch out — or we'll have to watch out for you!"

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In-Service Center At Shue Jr. High Planned By Board

Program For Junior High Pupils Of Other Districts Slated With Federal Funds

An Open Access In-Service Center — OASIS — costing \$164,667 in federal funds was approved for junior high students of several school districts by the Newark Board of Education Tuesday night.

It authorized by the federal government, under Title 3 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Newark District would open its Wilmer E. Shue Junior High School to pupils of the Newark, Marshalltown and Dover districts, plus parochial school pupils of the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington for a new form of junior high curriculum.

The Shue program would be carried out in cooperation with the University of Delaware.

"Many educators feel that the junior high level is a neglected area," a Newark spokesman said after Tuesday's meeting.

"There is the feeling among some of the pupils that they are attending a watered-down senior high school. They may feel that it's an interim thing."

Pupils chosen to attend the "oasis" would have more flexibility in choosing courses. The Shue school was selected because its facilities include collapsible walls to vary classroom sizes as needed.

Tuesday night's action formally established a development center to develop curriculum and a working relationship with the university on the project, and to work for revisions in junior high development.

Target date for the opening of the program is next September.

The board also authorized immediate employment of four assistant principals for the district's junior high schools. Approval has been granted by the State Board of Education.

Wayne Hill, a teacher at the Central Junior High was authorized to take interested members of his class on a trip to Mexico during the Easter recess on the basis that parents, sponsors and are aware that the trip is not a requirement of class session.

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Miss Eta J. Wilson Honored As State Educational Pioneer

Executive Secretary Of State PTA From 1918 To 1943, Miss Wilson Honored With Presentation Of Her Book "Dreams And Realities" Newly Published By U. of D.

Miss Eta J. Wilson, pioneer in the improvement of Delaware public education was honored last Friday the 13th, at her home in Newark, 109 Country Club Drive, Executive Secretary of the Delaware State Parent Teachers Association from 1918 to 1943, Miss Wilson was presented a copy of her newly published book "Dreams and Realities."

Miss Wilson's book is the story of the 14-year period when she traveled over dirt high-ways and muddy country roads as a missionary to 40 state parent teacher associations.

She is the aunt of Lt. Gen. "Iron Mike" O'Daniel of Newark.

Secretary to the late Pierre S. du Pont, Miss Wilson was administrative assistant to the Service Citizens of Delaware in which capacity she served as executive secretary of the State Parent Teachers Association. The Service Citizens of Delaware was made possible by an endowment by P. S. du Pont.

Turning Point

This period, probably the most exciting in Delaware educational history, featured turning of the tide toward betterment of the state education system. Delaware became a laboratory for progressive education and moved to the forefront of education among the states.

The book published by the University of Delaware, will be made available to the Delaware State PTA for use in their work as a historical reference.

Written in retrospect from 1944, the book covers the period from World War I.

At Ceremony

Among those taking part in the ceremony in Miss Wilson's honor were Dr. James B. Heck, dean of the college of education at the University of Delaware; Dr. Aune Snyder, professor emerita of Adelphi College, who taught in Delaware Women's College in 1910 and worked with Miss Wilson in her efforts to improve state education; and Dr. George H. Henry of the college of education, who wrote the foreword for Miss Wilson's book.

During 1919-20 when hundreds of Delawareans in rural and small-town areas were asked to make modernization of the state school system.

Miss Wilson recalled there were times when wives of school trustees warned her not to talk to their husbands.

She also remembered how demonstration schoolhouses built as part of the educational revolution were burned in some parts of Delaware as a protest against the modernization of the state's school system.

And More Threats

The life of then Gov. John G. Townsend Jr. was threatened if he persisted in going through with what was known as the "1919 Delaware School Code."

The basic reason for the revolt, Miss Wilson said, was that the 1919 School Code stripped local school trustees of their power.

In 1947, years after she had retired, Miss Wilson wrote her story and it remained in manuscript form until recently when friends and officials of the university's College of Education took steps to have it published.

About 500 copies have been printed. Most of them will be given to libraries and parent-teacher associations.

"SNAP" FISHER DIES

World War II veteran and a local leader in the American Legion and VFW baseball programs, John E. "Snap" Fisher of 2 Ash Avenue, Newark, died this morning after a heart attack while working at the U.S. Post Office. Mr. Fisher had suffered several serious heart attacks requiring hospitalization in recent years.

Mr. Fisher had come out of a duck blind and gotten into his car parked nearby when he was stricken. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Union Hospital, Elkton.

Mr. Shanahan is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ethel Lundberg Shanahan; three sons, Cornelius Francis, Jr., and Frank P., and a daughter, Miss Cornelius Ethel, all at home.

Services were held Wednesday at the Chandler Funeral Home, with interment in Riverview Cemetery.

At Stiff's recommendation, council rejected the one bid received for valves. The lone bid exceeded the \$20,000 budget by \$8,000.

In a 6-1 vote over opposition by Mayor, council adopted a resolution amending the Cherry Hill Man- or agreement for electric heat and air conditioning structural requirements of Delmarva Power & Light Co.

For unto you is born this day in the City of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord.

And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the Babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger.

BLINDNESS

All is not lost when one is blind. Of course everything should be done to prevent blindness, and if there is a pronounced lessening of vision, every possible means should be employed before the condition is certified by competent eye specialists. When it is certain that vision is gone and cannot be re-erected, it seems that all is lost and life is over.

This need not be so. Many people adapted to this new condition and have surmounted impossible handicaps. Living with the blind, we find the first and most difficult problem is to get the newly blind person to accept his condition. They must be made to feel they can do almost anything that anyone else can do—and this is practically true. Blind people operate lathes, learn to compete with lawyers. Many jobs in offices and factories are today filled by blind people and the records prove that the work is done, in many cases, more accurately and efficiently than with sighted workers.

The greatest obstacle, by far, in getting people to accept the blind person as a normal worker is the sighted public themselves. They do not understand the problems and handicaps of the blind and, they tell themselves there is "nothing I can do about it."

The blind want understanding, not sympathy. They want an opportunity, not charity. They want an education as is normal in an environment as possible, and not a shelter. They have seen many transitions from the world of the discarded blind to the life of usefulness and independence. According to the National Eye Research Foundation, a great number of potentially useful citizens are lost each year because we do not recognize and face this problem as we should.

The turnpike between Newark and Wilmington cuts a great swath through the Churchman's and Newport marshes, but despite substitution of automobile and truck traffic, of concrete and solid road embankment for much of the marshland that attracted migratory waterfowl and local gunners, all wildlife has not abandoned the area.

Rolling along the turnpike recently at a maximum legal speed attained by a canvasback when the can is not trying too hard, we saw a bunch of ducks dark and low on the little open water remaining amid the ice at Churchman's Marsh, and some few miles beyond, a beautiful redtail hawk was hovering low over the Newport Marsh, great grappling hooks lowered and red tail fully fanned as the big tuft with its grand golden eyes prepared for action with prey below.

The reflexes of Messrs. Shorty Bearman, Vic Ewing and Bill Taylor were far better in their recent shooting over one of the Delaware River's myriad, muddy, tidal estuaries near Odessa.

Shorty, Vic and Bill come in with a drake mallard and six black ducks — and that's good shooting in Delaware or anywhere.

Bill Taylor's two-year-old Chesapeake Cuddy moved unerringly in retrieving the downed ducks — she missed a wing-tipped teal growing no fault of her own. The little green-wing was off and swimming with the tide around a bend in the ditch, hopefully and probably, to fly again.

There were plenty of ducks but little shooting in the normally productive area, cold winds of very early morning, and the charged stove in Bill Taylor's snug blind proved the feature attraction with but one duck by 10 o'clock.

"It was cold," Vic Ewing said with a reminiscent shiver. "We'd smell rubber or wood burning — and move our boots or gloves a little further away from the stove."

But singles, pairs, and weaving bunches of ducks moved over the Odessa marshlands in the late morning and early afternoon, and the mallard and five more blacks remained for some stellar salvage by Chesapeake Cuddy.

A Bumper Crop



One of the western horse magazines has as its motto "Stop Air Pollution—Buy a Horse" and apparently it is having an effect. According to a survey made by the Morris Animal Foundation of Denver, Colorado, which concerns itself with veterinary research, the horse population in the United States has jumped by 116 per cent in the past eight years.

While Thoroughbreds have played their part in the equine population explosion, foal registration increasing from 11,935 in 1959 to more than 21,000 last year, the total Thoroughbred population on breeding farms and race tracks is only about 121,000 as compared to a total equine head count of 7,000,000.

The last equine census taken by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1959 counted 2,947,000 horses on turf field and farm. A count made for the Morris Animal Foundation by Thoroughbred, Inc. of Topeka, Kansas, showed a bumper crop of 6,380,000 as of the first of this year, with 1,000,000 of these being expectant mares.

While horses are being bred in increasingly greater numbers, a goodly number of the pleasure horses kept today are Thoroughbred dropouts—race horses sold without papers due to minor injuries or a lack of proper competitive spirit. Hardly a day goes by that the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau isn't asked to identify a horse bearing a lip-tattoo number. However, if Santa Claus brings you a horse with a lip-tattoo, your query should be addressed to The Jockey Club Registration Bureau.

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Newark's Dick Kelley Scores Two TDs As Raymond Hens Win Boardwalk Bowl

All-State halfback from Newark High School, Sophomore Dick Kelley scored two Delaware touchdowns last Saturday as Coach Harold Raymond's Middle Atlantic Conference champions and Lambert Cup winners defeated the Big Indians of Pennsylvania's Indiana University 31-24 in the first Boardwalk Bowl at Atlantic City's Convention Hall.

Kelley scored on a 31-yard touchdown pass from Quarterback Tom DiMuzio in the first quarter to put the Fighting Blue Hens ahead 6-0, and with Delaware trailing in the 21-10 halftime count. Kelley threatened his way through a swarm of defenders for a 31-yard touchdown run to put Delaware back in the ball game early in the third period.

A fabulous fourth frame featured time, fierce, frenzied, fabulous football with a finish rivaling the best of the pros.

Leading 23-21 in the third quarter with Kelley's two touchdowns, DiMuzio's pass to End Ron Withelder for a 45-yard TD, and Jeff Lippincott's 29-yard field goal and pair of extra point kicks, the Hens found themselves on the short end of a 31-23 count when Lee Emmone's punt

was blocked by Indiana's Mike Priest; Jerry Clark recovered for the Big Indians on the Delaware 25 — and Bob Tate kicked a 32-yard field goal with 1:04 left in the game.

From Delaware's 31 after Jim Tazewski's 34-yard kickoff return, DiMuzio passed eight yards to Withelder, 11 yards to light end Pat Walker from Newark, and 27 over the middle to Flanker Sam Brickley.

With a first down at the Indiana 31 and seconds remaining, Kelley gained two, and then Delaware called time with 17 seconds left.

"I went over to Coach Raymond and told him I'd like to run the curl-pass to Withelder," DiMuzio said. "The coach said, 'Okay, but if he isn't open throw the ball away.' We felt we had time for another play and then a field goal if needed."

Withelder stepped into the abbreviated end zone, turned and caught DiMuzio's pass for the big win.

And then Mark Lipson grabbed DiMuzio's final shot for two extra points and the seven-point Delaware victory margin.
