Water rates to go up in January

The Newark City Council unanimously approved a 14.5 percent increase for water rates, to be effective January 1, 2012, at their October 24 meeting.

Co-presenting the proposal were City Finance Director Dennis McFarland and Roy Simonson, Water and Wastewater Director for Newark.

According to a report from McFarland, "The rate adjustment is needed to assure that funds are available to support needed capital investments in the water utility infrastructure. Additionally, the increase would enable the recovery of all

reasonably incurred operating costs as well as a sufficient margin." The ordinance will allow the city to set aside 20 percent of the increased revenues as a reserve fund to address any emergencies for the utility.

Representatives from Black and Veatch, the company who also performed an analysis of the city's electric utility, detailed that the large increase is necessary to keep Newark's water revenues in alignment with escalating costs in a timely manner. In a report presented to the council, Black and Veatch outlined that additional increases of 7.2 percent each year, from 2013 to 2016, will be also needed.

The new rates charged will be the following: for in-city customers, the first

1,273 cubic feet charged will increase from \$3.52 per 100 cubic feet to \$4.03 per 100 cubic feet, and all water

beyond 1,273 cubic feet will increase from \$4.48 per 100 cubic feet to \$5.13 per 100 cubic feet. Customers outside

of the city will see charges increase from \$4.67 per 100 cubic feet to \$5.36 per 100 cubic feet, for the first 1,273 cubic feet. All other water charged will jump from \$6.08 per 100 cubic feet to \$6.96 per 100 cubic feet.

In his report, McFarland further stated that the city would see an approximate increase of \$800 thousand in revenues per year.

Newark saw its last water rate hike in 2009, when rates were raised 35 percent. In the eight years previous to 2009, water customers received no rate increases.

The rate adjustment was proposed due to the need to repair and maintain the city's aging water infrastructure. Simonson said, before the council, that most of Newark's

pipes, especially in the downtown area, are over fifty years old and are in need of upgrades or replacement.

Though the Capital Improvement Program has listed a large number of projects that will be addressed in the next five years, according to Simonson, the Water Department has had to delay, and even do away with, several projects due to insufficient funds.

McFarland's report estimates that capital improvement expenditures for water improvements will average over \$1.6 million per year for the next five years.

Many who crowded the Council Chamber expressed extreme displeasure at the

Delaware promotes use of electric vehicles

A partnership of Northeast states and jurisdictions including Delaware has finalized an agreement to develop an electric vehicle network to promote and support energy-efficient transportation in the region – and a newly-announced grant of nearly \$1 million from the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) will kick start the new network's first project.

The Northeast Electric Vehicle Network agreement involves Delaware and nine other states – Connecticut, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Vermont – plus the District of Columbia. Through the agreement, the partnership is committed to boosting economic growth, maintaining the region's

leadership role in the clean energy economy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions and dependence on oil by planning transportation infrastructure to support vehicles using fuel sources such as electric, biofuels and natural gas.

The agreement was forged by the Transportation and Climate Initiative (TCI), a consortium including the 10 states and the District of Columbia that formed in 2010 with the goal of developing clean-energy transportation-related projects. The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) was awarded the \$994,500 DOE grant in partnership with TCI, and 16 Clean Cities Coalitions, which are DOE-chartered local organizations that promote alternative fuel vehicles.

"Delaware is proud to be part of this regional initiative that will pave the way to more energy-efficient transportation," said Delaware Governor Jack Markell. "This network and grant helps Delaware and its partnership with other cities and states who want to move forward with developing our clean energy transportation economy and the jobs that will accompany it."

The network agreement will encourage the use of electric vehicles (EVs) through a variety of means: identifying obstacles to deployment, developing guidelines to locate reliable, convenient charging stations, and creating permitting and zoning language that can be adopted by local governments to make

Man robbed/assaulted during illegal drug transaction

Delaware State Troopers are investigating the robbery and assault of a 23 year-old man as he attempted to purchase marijuana, early Saturday morning.

The incident occurred on Saturday, October 22, at approximately 1:10 a.m. as the victim was meeting with the suspects to purchase marijuana in the parking lot in the area of the Wawa Store located at Salem Center, 1605 Pulaski Highway, Newark. Investigation indicates that the victim entered what was described as an older model minivan that was occupied by the four to five suspects. One of the suspects displayed a handgun and then the victim was assaulted by all of the suspects inside of the minivan. The suspects took an undisclosed amount of cash and removed the victim's pants and shoes, before throwing him out of the vehicle. The minivan fled the parking lot in an unknown direction. The victim received facial injuries but declined medical treatment. Troopers are continuing their investigation into this incident.

The suspects are 4-5

black males, 20-25 years of age, 5'06"-5'10" tall. One suspect was armed with unknown type handgun. Suspect vehicle is described as an older style minivan.

Pair suffers injuries during robbery

A pair of University of Delaware students reported that they had been attacked by two unknown black males, who had departed the scene in an awaiting car, early last Wednesday morning.

The victims told officers that they had been walking on northbound New London Road, crossing Ray Street, when they were approached by two unidentified black males. One of the suspects grabbed one of the victims, struck him twice in the face, and took his backpack, which contained an Apple Macbook, valued at \$1,200,

text books, and a set of keys. The pair of suspects then ran across New London Road, into an awaiting white, older model, four-door Chevy sedan. The victims said that they had earlier observed a driver and a lookout at the car, just prior to the attack.

The victim who was struck was observed to have swelling to his left eye and blood coming out of his nose. He refused medical treatment at the scene.

No other witnesses were found and police have not named any suspects in the case.

Home invasion nets cash and electronic goods

Last Tuesday, a 25 year-old resident in the 900 block of Quail Lane reported that his home had been broken into and ransacked by unknown suspects.

The victim told officers that he had left for work at 8:30 that morning and that all doors and windows had been secured. When he returned from work that afternoon, he discovered that the back door had been pried open and that the interior had shown signs of damage.

A canvass of the neighborhood produced no witness reports.

The occupant stated that the following items had been taken: a lockbox containing \$2,000 in U.S. currency and a passport, a Nintendo Wii gaming system with games and controllers, two watches, and a Gateway laptop computer. The total value of the missing items is almost \$3,200.

The victim told authorities that he had recently thrown a small party of co-workers and friends, though he did not name any of these people as possible suspects. He further stated that a co-worker had also been the victim of a similar crime a few weeks ago.

The case has been forwarded to the Criminal Investigation division for further review.

Pizza delivery driver robbed in Bear

New Castle County Police are currently investigating a reported armed robbery of a 26 year-old food delivery driver that occurred in the community of Pine Woods.

On Thursday night, October 20 at 8:50 p.m., County Police responded to the intersection of Pine Woods Boulevard and Rue Madora Drive for a reported robbery that just occurred. The victim indicated he had responded to the 600 block of Corsica Avenue to deliver food to a residence when he made contact with a subject who robbed him.

The victim, who works for a local pizza restaurant, advised that after responding to the aforementioned area he made contact with an unknown subject who allegedly made a food order. Moments later, the subject displayed a handgun and

demanded property from the victim. The victim complied and handed the suspect his property and an undisclosed amount of cash.

Officers set up a perimeter in the area and a canine team responded to the community and attempted a track, but they were unsuccessful in locating the suspect. Officers also checked the surrounding area, but could not locate the suspect.

The suspect was described as a black male, between 30 and 35 years of age, approximately 5'08" tall, 160 to 170 pounds, with short hair and wearing a white shirt and dark pants.

Pizza delivery driver robbed at Fox Run Apartments

New Castle County Police are currently investigating a reported armed robbery of a 59 year-old food delivery driver that occurred in the Fox Run Apartment complex Thursday night.

On October 20 at 10:15 p.m., County Police responded for a reported armed robbery that took place in the 700 block of Woodchuck Place. The victim indicated he had responded to the apartment complex and made a food delivery and was then accosted by two unknown subjects as he was returning to his vehicle, who

robbed him.

The victim, who works for a local pizza shop, indicated that after he made a food delivery at the aforementioned address he was approached from behind by two unknown subjects who had their faces concealed and one of which was armed with a handgun. The suspects then demanded money from the victim at which time he complied and handed one of the suspects and undisclosed amount of cash.

A canine team responded to the apartment complex and attempted a track, but was unsuccessful in locating the suspects. Officers also responded and checked the surrounding area, but could not locate the suspects.

The suspects were described as two black males, 5'06" to 5'08" tall, 150 to 165 pounds, with an average build and wearing all dark clothing.

Residents concerned about quality, service

proposed adjustment and urged council to reconsider.

Leading the public discussion was State Representative John Kowalko, a Newark resident, who stated that the rate increase "borders on the outrageous." He said that the city's water utility is a monopoly and that residents are a "captive audience," leading to him to further state that "companies need to justify cost increases, [it seems] municipalities don't."

After the address, Councilman Jerry Clifton asked the State Representative

what his suggestions would be on how to fix the present problem without raising rates. Kowalko stated that he would be willing to sit down with the council to explore options on the possibility of receiving state funding, if the item would be tabled. "I have would try my best, but no one has come to me to ask for money," Kowalko said.

Other citizens voiced concerns over the added stress to taxpayers that are on a fixed income.

A block of residents from the Kells Avenue area expressed their dismay over the quality of water service in recent years. Resident Ron

Walker told council that he had contacted the city about rusty water in his local water system, a problem, he said, that has persisted for over 27 months.

Simonson assured the group that steps have been taken to address the problem, but that "our solutions have not been perfect."

City Manager Kyle Sonnenberg, addressing both the council and the audience, said, "We are trying to [utilize] the most cost-effective means as possible. We need to collect the resources to maintain the system."

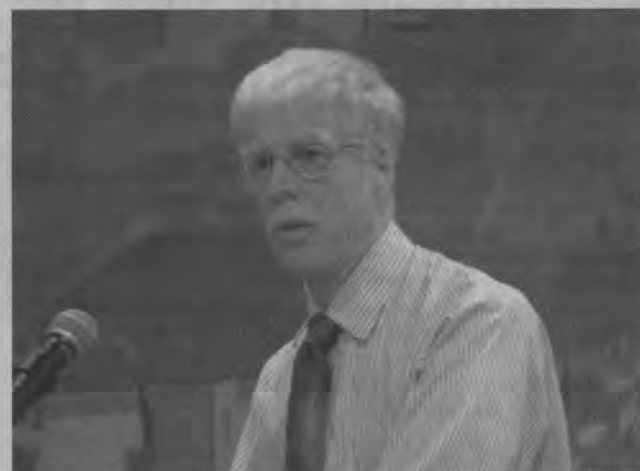
Councilman Clifton stated, "It is our responsibility to

deliver a quality product to our constituents."

Several councilmen, though recognizing the strain the rate increase will have on residents, agreed that the adjustment is necessary to correct a complex and ongoing problem.

Councilman David Athey complimented Sonnenberg on the job his staff has done in "recognizing and addressing the neglect" of the city's water system. Councilman Stu Markham stated that the increase is "a small price to pay for a major investment."

installation of charging stations easier. Work will also include training key stakeholders and promoting public awareness of the benefits of EVs.

"Over the past two years, Delaware has emerged as a national leader in electric vehicles with vehicle-to-grid innovations at the University of Delaware, the attraction of leading plug-in electric hybrid vehicle manufacturer Fisker Automotive, and the growth of electric vehicle conversion company AutoPort," said DNREC Secretary Collin O'Mara. "Now, with the help of a strong regional partnership agreement and grant funding, Delaware will be able to help accelerate the widespread adoption of elec-

tric vehicles across the region and seize greater air quality and economic development benefits for our state."

"The Northeast Electric Vehicle Network demonstrates how the transportation sector can play a key role in improving air quality and reducing greenhouse gases that affect climate change. Efforts such as TCI also show how transportation, energy and environmental officials across our region can work together to develop alternatives to save our environment while maintaining or improving the quality of life for our citizens," said Shailen Bhatt, Secretary for the Delaware Department of Transportation.

The DOE Electric Vehicle Readiness Grant will be used to develop a plan to accelerate the introduction of a net-

work of EV charging stations throughout the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic regions to ensure that travelers can drive electric vehicles with ease locally and region-wide, from northern New England to the District of Columbia. The grant project also seeks to attract private investment and encourage development of an EV market both for

consumers by making the EV experience common, standardized and easy to use, and for the EV industry by simplifying local regulations, building codes and permitting processes.

Delaware is a leader in electric vehicle technology, development and promotion. The University of Delaware has led the nation in research,

with UD professor and engineer Dr. Willett Kempton pioneering vehicle-to-grid (V2G) electric car technology and the first V2G vehicles – production automobiles specially modified by Wilmington-based AutoPort – driving on Delaware roadways. Delaware passed a first-of-its-kind bill in 2009 to allow V2G users to take advantage of the tech-

nology by paying for only the net amount of electricity the vehicles draw. On Sept. 26, UD signed an agreement with renewable energy company NRG to promote V2G technology. Delaware is also home to a Fisker Automotive plant in Wilmington, which began gearing up this summer to begin production of electric vehicles.
