Water rates to go up in January

The Newark City Council unanimously approved a 14.5 percent increase for water rates, to be effective January 1, 2012, at their October 24 meeting

Co-presenting the pro-posal were City Finance Director Dennis McFarland and Roy Simonson, Water and Wastewater Director for Newark.

According to a report from McFarland, "The rate adjustment is needed to assure that funds are available to support needed capital investments in the water utility infrastructure. Additionally, the increase would enable the recovery of all

reasonably incurred operating costs as well as a sufficient margin." The ordinance will allow the city to set aside 20 percent of the increased revenues as a reserve fund to address any emergencies for the utility.

Representatives from Black and Veatch, the company who also performed an analysis of the city's electric utility, detailed that the large increase is necessary to keep Newark's water revenues in alignment with escalating costs in a timely manner. In a report presented to the council, Black and Veatch outlined that additional increases of 7.2 percent each year, from 2013 to 2016, will be also needed.

The new rates charged will be the following: for in-city customers, the first

1,273 cubic feet charged will increase from \$3.52 per 100 cubic feet to \$4.03 per 100 cubic feet, and all water

beyond 1,273 cubic feet will increase from \$4.48 per 100 cubic feet to \$5.13 per 100 cubic feet. Customers outside

of the city will see charges increase from \$4.67 per 100 cubic feet to \$5.36 per 100 cubic feet, for the first 1,273 cubic feet. All other water charged will jump from \$6.08 per 100 cubic feet to \$6.96 per 100 cubic feet.

In his report, McFarland further stated that the city would see an approximate increase of \$800 thousand in revenues per year. Newark saw its last water

rate hike in 2009, when rates were raised 35 percent. In the eight years previous to 2009, water customers received no rate increases.

The rate adjustment was proposed due to the need to repair and maintain the city's aging water infrastructure. Simonson said, before the council. that most of Newark's

pipes, especially in the downtown area, are over fifty years old and are in need of upgrades or replacement.

Though the Capital Improvement Program has listed a large number of projects that will be addressed in the next five years, according to Simonson, the Water Department has had to delay, and even do away with, several projects due to insuffi-cient funds.

McFarland's report estimates that capital improvement expenditures for water improvements will average over \$1.6 million per year for the next five years.

Many who crowded the Council Chamber expressed extreme displeasure at the

Man robbed/ assaulted during illegal drug trans-

Delaware State Troopers are investigating the robbery and assault of a 23 yearold man as he attempted to purchase marijuana, early Saturday morning.

The incident occurred on Saturday, October 22, at approximately 1:10 a.m. as the victim was meeting with the suspects to purchase marijuana in the parking lot in the area of the Wawa Store located at Salem Center, Pulaski Highway, Newark. Investigation indicates that the victim entered what was described as an older model minivan that was occupied by the four to five suspects. One of the suspects displayed a handgun and then the victim was assaulted by all of the suspects inside of the minivan. The victim received facial injuries but declined medical treatment. Troopers are continuing their investigation into this incident.

He said that the city's water utility is a monopoly and that residents are a "captive audience," leading to him to further state that "com-panies need to justify cost increases, [it seems] municipalities don't."

After the address, Councilman Jerry Clifton the quality of water service asked the State Representative
